Trick or Treat?

Elmwood Council seeks adherence to guidelines

ELMWOOD - Elmwood will allow trick or treating this Halloween, but the City Council on Sept. 15 urged all participants to heed state COVID-19 guidelines in terms of social distancing and mask requirements.

"I'd like to say that this is a very touchy situation and I'm highly concerned about what direction we're going to go," Mayor Bryan Davis said. "It's a lose-lose situation."

The council learned that the Elmwood Ministerial Group has cancelled its Trunk or Treat event for this year.

But council members did not call off candy collecting in Elmwood, instead urging families who wish to participate to follow state guidelines. Homeowners who want to give out candy are asked to leave their porch lights on from 5-8 p.m. when trick or treaters will be out.

It was also suggested that candy that is to be handed out should be wrapped. During committee reports, Mayor Continued on Page 2

FARMINGTON - After the Fulton County Board rejected participating in the Hanna City Trail agreement, representatives from the City of Farmington, the Village of Hanna City and Peoria County collaborated on an option to proceed with the purchase of 24.7 miles of Union Pacific rail line. But without Fulton County's involvement, the financial commitment for each of the three entities would increase.

Farmington aldermen were hesitant to back the changes at Monday's meeting. While the City Council didn't exactly reject the higher price tag of \$111,000 (less a possible \$22,000 state grant), the additional money, the lack of commitment by Farmington schools so far, and new questions caused aldermen to postpone action until the next meeting.

"There was some disappointment in the school not stepping up," Farmington Mayor Kent Kowal said, "and there were Continued on Page 9

ELMWOOD: Treasurer may want to step down

Continued from Page 1 Davis informed the council that Treasurer Bonnie Beal had expressed that, "she may not want to be treasurer anymore."

Davis said that she "is turning down work that she can bill \$100 per hour per business" as opposed to work done for the city, for which she earns \$40 to \$50 per hour on average.

Davis continued by saying that if Beal could earn \$6,000 to \$7,000 per year with the city (instead of the current \$4,000), she would reconsider staying. Davis suggested to the council that they speak with Beal prior to the next council meeting in order to make an informed decision about the treasurer's salary.

The council approved hiring Robert Ackerman, of Canton, at \$65 per hour, plus paid mileage, to be Elmwood's commercial inspector. Also approved was the hiring of Robert Simpson to replace Jason Simpson as crossing guard.

Water shut-offs were discussed, but Councilman Nathan Brunnelson wants to discuss this subject more in committee, so no action was taken during the council meeting.

The council approved the sale of items such as a John Deere Gator, Cub cadet tiller and a John Deere mower for funds to help pay for a new side-by-side that would cost \$17,350. Also approved was an animal control service contract with the Peoria County Animal protection Service.

Finally, approved was the purchase of a truck for the streets and water department estimated to cost between \$80,000 and \$95,000.

Continued from Page 1 thanked Lona Sumner, Julie Albritton and Bill Robison for their leadership and collaboration to keep students and staff safe and healthy in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic with the opening of the school year.

Shinall also thanked the faculty and staff of both

high and grade schools "to do what we feel is best for kids."

In particular, Shinall thanked Dave Wiltz, Lee Ray, Jim Treadway and Terri Reeves. Shinall said the custodians have cleaned the facilities thoroughly to help combat the COVID virus.

Shinall also pointed out



that the U.S.D.A. and ISBE have extended the Summer Food Service Program through Dec. 31, 2020. That means the school can offer free school lunches to all students.

High School Principal Robison reported that "the staff and students have gone above and beyond to keep the high school building safe and to ensure we are doing our part to be able to sustain inperson learning."

Grade School Principal Albritton reported that total enrollment is at 426. Also, 23 new teacher laptop computers are in the process of being ordered. Albritton wrote that the

laptops "will mainly go to the high school teachers." In other action:

• The board heard from Keach representatives concerning the Brimfield Grade School air-conditioning maintenance plan options.

• Parent-Teacher conferences will be held via ZOOM, in 15 minute increments.

• Tabled was approval of intent to spend \$105,000 on Health/Life Safety projects.

• Also tabled to next month's meeting was the eligibility of home schooled students to participate in extracurricular or interscholastic activities.





Princeville board OKs remote-learning plan

By BILL KNIGHT For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE – The Board of Education on Sept. 15 approved a Remote Learning Plan in the event the pandemic causes another school closure. Revised Aug. 26, the 10page outline details steps for staff and students.

"Although our plan helps us prepare for a complete switch over to remote learning, the plan includes numerous provisions for limited in-person learning," said Superintendent Shannon Duling. "If we need to utilize our remote plan, in-person learning will continue to be a high priority for our youngest grade levels, as well as for our special education population and for students who have significant issues learning in a remote setting."

Thus far, Grade School Principal Julie Bayless reported, the Grade School began the school year with 44 students choosing remote-only instruction, but 12 students of them have returned to in-person instruction and 4 others have inquired about returning to class. No teacher has more than three remote students in a class, she added. Duling stressed the need for everyone in the community to do their best with wearing masks, social distancing and using sanitizer and with following health-department guidelines.

"When someone is in isolation (positive test result or probably positive), they *must* stay home in isolation," he said. "When someone is in quarantine, they *must* stay home until cleared by the Health Department.

"We know we have students in our community who are supposed to be in isolation or quarantine but are still out hanging with their classmates," he continued. "This is fueling the spread in our community.

"We are doing everything we can at school, but if our families are not reinforcing good choices with their adolescents, we will be facing much more of a community spread and will be forced to implement our remote plan," he added.

The Board also approved the District's budget for Fiscal Year 2020-21, and it shows deficit spending in four funds over the 12 months: Education is projected to be in the red \$554,676, Transportation down \$148,842, Social Security and Municipal Retirement down \$15,555, and Working Cash down \$94,000.

However, considering District fund balances at the start of the Fiscal Year on July 1, all fund will finish in the black.

In other business, the board approved replacing the inclined lift at a cost not to exceed \$59,967.

"The current lift is broken and the cost to fix it was over \$15,000," Duling said. "The company working on the lift had much difficulty finding replacement parts – the lift is over 20 years old – and is recommending complete replacement since any future repairs may not be possible due to the lack of available parts."

The Board also: • OK'd a Request for Proposal for additional access integration, power wiring and switch installation for the Grade School entrance for \$11,367.50.

• Heard Bayless report that the PTO's annual Fall Fundraiser for K-8th grade will be 100 percent online and donation-based. With the theme "Step it up," it will run Sept. 29-Oct. 14. • Approved hiring Belinda Rodriguez as Migrant Head Start/daycare and bilingual aide upon certification/licensure, Tait Sennett as assistant golf coach, and Chelsey Sunderland as permanent substitute for PreK/Early Childhood Education; and approved a Family Medical Leave for aide Kathy Hohenbery; and accepted the retirement of van driver Helen Gualandi.

Two Toulon men drown fishing in Knox County

WILLIAMSFIELD – Two Toulon men are dead after an apparent drowning at a strip-mine lake in Knox County last Saturday afternoon.

Two Knox County Sheriff's deputies responded to a lake in the area of 2100 Illinois Route 180 north of Williamsfield at 1:27 p.m.

William J. Self, 40, and Lawrence R. Self, 26, were pronounced dead at the scene, according to the sheriff's office, after being located by conservation police officers who conducted a sonar search to locate the bodies.

Preliminary autopsies did not indicate evidence of foul play. An investigation is ongoing.

Continued from Page 1 new concerns, so we decided to delay for two weeks to look at it again and try to see what would really happen" under the revised plan.

In another issue that's been discussed even longer than the Hanna City Trail – the City complex on East Fort Street the Council received an asbestos inspection report from Ideal Environmental Engineering of Bloomington and discussed a detailed estimate on renovations from CORE Construction of Peoria projecting costs between \$1.8 million and \$2.6 million, depending on options.

The asbestos inspection confirmed findings from years earlier, but it offered no estimates on abating the west wing of the main building nor on demolition of the two-story building that formerly was the junior high school.

"It shows it's cleaner

than we thought it would be," said City Administrator Rollen Wright, who said the Council will meet at 6 p.m. Oct. 5 to try to reach consensus on which alternatives to include and the extent of the renovation project.

In other business, Kersh Café approached the City about adding video gaming to a separate room within the building on West Barlow Road/Illinois Route 116, and though aldermen were supportive, an update to local liquor license limits would be necessary, and the Council may consider making a change next month.

Farmington has several classes of liquor licenses, and each has a limit. Establishments seeking video gaming must have a liquor license, and Kersh Café obtained a liquor license this month.

Previous requests by other businesses to expand video gaming were opposed by current li-

cense-holders, who said the community was already saturated with video gaming. However, Kowal said, "It's free trade." In other news:

• Police officer Hayden Fox resigned, and the Council approved hiring an earlier applicant who passed local tests, but the state's required Police Training Institute has no openings until November, and the new officer probably can't start until March.

• A suggestion that the City add handrails and trash receptacles throughout the business district was referred to committee.

• Public Works Superintendent Dave Ehlers reported that work on the Wilson Street project is scheduled to start on Monday (Sept. 28) after the bid was awarded to Tazewell County Asphalt of East Peoria for \$75,662.

•The Tax Increment Financing report showed

State police warn of phone scam

Consider how you pay –

METAMORA – Illinois State Police District 8 is warning the public of a recent phone scam. On Sept. 18, a District 8 Trooper took a report of a phone scam. The victim informed the trooper he received a phone call from an unknown number with a local area code. The scammer told the victim that he had one of his family members and demanded a ransom.

"In the heat of the moment, these calls can be terrifying," said District 8 Commander Captain Chad Peterson. "Slowing down and taking a few additional steps could help you get out of a scam."

Here are tips from the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to help you stay a step ahead of scammers

Credit cards have significant fraud protection built in, but some payment methods don't. Wiring money through services like Western Union or MoneyGram is risky because it is nearly impossible to get your money back. That is also true for reloadable gift cards.





A good day at Detweiller

E-B runners make most of visit to state course

PEORIA - There was no impressive mass of runners at the start and no roaring crowd ... there were even plenty of parking places at Detweiller Park last Saturday. No, it was not a typical high school cross country race on the state course.

But in this weird season, it was the one chance Elmwood-Brimfield will get to run on the hallowed state grounds. And, for the most part, the Trojans made the most of their opportunity at the Peoria Notre Dame Boosters Invitational.

Several E-B runners posted personal best times and the boys got a good chance to size themselves up against what some pollsters say is the top-rated Class 1A team in Illinois, Stanford Olympia.

"There was a little more intensity and focus knowing that was the only time they'd get to run there," E-B Coach Gregg Meyers said. "At least we got to run there once."

The E-B boys finished with 58 points to place second to Olympia (40 points). Elmwood's five scoring runners averaged a time of 16:17, Olympia's were at 16:03.

"It was 14 seconds a man, which in a normal year would be very doable" to make up," Meyers said. "This is completely different, so we'll see what happens."

The finish caught the eyes of Illinois Mile Split pollsters, who moved the Trojans up to No. 2 (from No. 6) behind only Olympia.

Luke Hoffmann (3rd, 15:40.6) led E-B and was followed by Thomas Harmon (5th, 15:57.2), Tyler Sheridan (11th, 16:20.1) and Victor Lampe (17th, 16:37.4). Meyers said Sheridan had "the best race of his life" and was pleased with his other top four and with freshman Isaiah Hill (24th, 16:53).

Added good news came Monday in practice, when senior Eli Stevenson who has missed the last two races with a soft tissue injurt – was able to go three miles in practice.

The Trojans girls also had a strong race at Detweiller, particularly Addie Symonds (6th, 19:25.8) and Melody Glenn (19:43). The finish moved the E-B girls to 25th in Class 1A.

"Melody wanted to break 21 minutes. She skipped over all the 20s and got right into the 19s," E-B Coach Kyle Anderson said. "[Glenn and Symonds] were both excited to do what they did. They were getting after it."

Anderson said he hopes that attitude spreads to his other runners.

"The work is being done, now we just need to be a little more confident in ourselves and a little more aggressive and good things are going to happen," he said.
