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Wyoming mail hauler pleads guilty to felony theft

Ratcliff

By John A. Ballentine TOULON – A 55-year-old Wyoming man pleaded guilty to felony theft by deception of over \$500,000 last Friday in Stark County Circuit Court.

In a negotiated plea, he received in exchange for pleading guilty to a Class 1 felony, all other charges being dismissed by the State. Those included a Class X theft over \$1 million, another lesser theft charge, mail fraud and wire fraud.

Keith Ratcliff received a six-year prison term for pleading guilty to theft from the U.S. Postal Service and was fined the minimum amount of \$869. With day-forday credit, that cuts the six years to three and Ratcliff is also given six months off for good behavior, which brings the sentence down to two and a half years.

"Keith can also earn time off if he is eligible and completes programs while in the Department of Corrections," said Ratcliff's legal counsel Kevin Sullivan, of Peoria. "I'm surprised that the State didn't ask for restitution. That would have made more sense to seek that from my client than to ask for prison time, which will cost the state

money." Sullivan added, "My belief is that this was pushed by the upper echelon of the State's Attorney General's office. They wanted to send a message to the other mail carriers."

Sullivan said that

Ratcliff would lose money more often than he would make a profit hauling the mail and that Ratcliff hired additional personnel during peak times, such as Christmas.

During the sentencing, Sullivan asked

Circuit Court Judge Bruce P. Fehrenbacher to recommend that Ratcliff be sent to a minimum security prison close to Wyoming and "preferably a medical facility" because of Ratcliff's diabetic condition.

After his court sentencing, Ratcliff was taken to the Stark County Jail for incarceration and to await extradition to the Illinois Department of Corrections intake facility, once the Department resumes accepting prisoners, again.

According to the Illinois Attorney General's website, Ratcliff, who owned Ratcliff Enterprises, Inc. was "paid by the U. S. Postal Service between July 2005 and Sept. 2017 \$1.9 million for workers' compensation insurance that Ratcliff never purchased." Under the contracts between Ratcliff and the Postal Service, Ratcliff Enterprises was "paid directly or reimbursed for most expenses."

The Attorney General's office continued, "The defendant enriched himself at the expense of taxpayers while risking his employees' health and wellness, unbeknownst to them."

The investigation into Ratcliff was conducted by the U. S. Postal Service Office of Inspector General. The investigations were based on a tip from the Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission after a Ratcliff Enterprises driver filed an injury claim and it was discovered Ratcliff had no workers' compensation insurance.

"This is a crime of greed that must be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law," said Michael Brennan, chairman of the Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission. "We are proud that our joint efforts with the Postal Service and the work of the Illinois Attorney General's Office led to Ratcliff's eventual conviction and sentencing."

Deputy Bureau Chief of the Illinois Attorney General's Office, John Walz, was lead prosecutor in this case.

Toulon updates hundreds of ordinances

By John A. Ballentine TOULON - The Toulon City Council spent two and one-half hours Monday evening painstakingly revising hundreds of city ordinances at a special meeting. Besides the ordinances, police fines were updated, as well.

Many ordinances from the early 1900s were eliminated because they no longer pertained to the city,

especially from 1911 where nearly a chapter was deleted.

Ordinances covering the Civil Defense Unit, the city library and city jail were stricken from the code book because they no longer exist. Chapters concerning water and sewer were updated, as well as, traffic ordinances.

Other topics were prohibited animals, the curfew bell, trash regulations, cemetery rules, nuisances and

general offenses were modified or eliminated.

Once the updated code book is completed, the city council will adopt it at their next regularly scheduled meeting.

Briefly discussed were updates on the new fire hydrants' installation and the concrete curbing on Prairie Street north of the schools, which is to be replaced.

and then he would turn over the investigation to either the State Police or the Henry County Sheriff's Department. Townsend said the Galva Police Department will not investigate their own department.

Wheeler said at the meeting she would get the form from Townsend on Tuesday.

In regular action, the council unanimously approved purchasing a new GMC-Chevy truck for a cost of \$98,023. The truck will be used for snowplowing, waterworks, brush pick-up and cemetery work.

Volkert reported that the Galva Senior Citizen Center and St. John's Church will not be available for voting in November. Volkert said that perhaps City Hall could be used for the third ward.

In regards to using the Fire House for voting, Chief Nate Byers said everything would have to be moved out of the new fire station and then there is very limited parking if there was a fire.

Townsend gave an update on the K-9 dog that Galva has ordered for the Galva Police Department The dog as well as two others, one for Mercer County and one for McDonough County, were to be flown here from the Netherlands on Aug. 20. Townsend said that due to extreme heat, the flight was pushed back to Sept. 1. There will be an announcement on the purchase of the dog at a later time.

The dog will then go to training in the middle of September.

In other business, the council increased the impound fee on vehicles from \$7.50 to \$25 per day. Townsend told the council that they

average about four impounds per month due to an arrest or a traffic hazard. He said that most towns charge \$20-\$40 per day.

"Normally if they stay more than a week we are usually stuck with them," Townsend said.

The wrecker service also charges \$100 to tow to the impound lot at the City Maintenance building. Galva charges \$125 for towing.

Townsend said they call Cernovich's or Hodges's in Kewanee and usually receive \$140 to \$170 per vehicle for scrap.

It was on the agenda to lower the speed limit from Subway to the corner of Southwest 9th Avenue and Southwest 2nd Street from 30 miles per hour to 25 miles per hour. There was no motion so Mayor Volkert said it would be tabled until the September board meeting. Those absent Monday night were alder-

man Jim Hartman, Wayde Buck and Rick Otterstrom.

The council amended the tree ordinance. If a resident pays someone to take a tree down, then they must haul it away and not leave it on the curb. Also anyone cutting down a tree must have insurance to cover the damage. Utility wires were damaged recently, a street blocked and many sidewalk squares have been damaged and left in the past from having trees taken down.

Supervisor Greg Thompson reported that the uptown water tower has been inspected and sand blasted and painted inside. Thompson said both towers will be inspected this year at a cost of \$13,500 apiece.

Thompson said that the uptown water tower was put up in 1951 and will need replaced in the future.

Thompson said that Well number 4 also needs work in the very near future.

Thomspon praised water employees, Jake McClintic, John McArthur and Jeremy Wood on their good job Monday on fixing a water main break.

Supervisor Richard Plummer reported that fall clean-up of Galva Cemetery will be Oct. 18-23. All shepherd hooks and flowers will be removed. Plummer said solar lights and statues can be left unless they are broken.

Volkert said he has been talked to neighbors on Southeast 6th Street to lower the speed limit near the Park District. No action was taken Monday.

Volkert also said Tuesday morning that there are seven households in Galva with COVID-19 and the count of cases is up to 18.

Farming is a dangerous field to get into. Be safe out there.

University of Illinois Extension Illinois areas still reeling from the elimination of ash trees damaged by the emerald ash borers have another threat: oak wilt.

The state has almost 5 million acres of forests and oaks play an important role in those forests, according to Chris Evans, University of Illinois Extension forestry research specialist.

Oaks are the most abundant group of trees in Illinois, in nearly every stand of trees across the state, and they're an important source of wildlife food, valuable timber and great shade trees.

"Oak wilt is a fungal disease that threat-

ens our oaks and can be found anywhere in the state," Evans says, adding that all oaks can be killed by oak wilt, but red oaks are the most susceptible. "In Il-

linois, we have 12 species in the red oak

group, includ-

ing the northern red oak, pin oak, black oak, shingle oak, and cherrybark oak," he says. "These trees, once infected with oak wilt, can die in as little as three to four weeks."

Oak-wilt symptoms often start at the top of the tree and rapidly progress downward in red oaks, Evans says. Leaves turn color, starting at the tips or outer margins and, likely, prematurely fall from the tree. Trees may display dark staining in the wood of small branches or under the bark on larger stems.

In white oaks, the disease may be limited to one branch and will not likely show rapid progression.

"Oak wilt can move from tree to tree via root grafts, often causing large clumps of dead trees," Evans says. "This is most likely to happen in forests with a lot of red



spores that spread the disease." In addition, trenching around trees with oak wilt at the dripline may help prevent this type of spread through root grafts, he continued. Trenches should be around 4-feet deep near the dripline of the tree. A second line of trenches further

out helps as well. Finally, homeowners should avoid creating any wounds on oak trees, regardless of the known presence of oak wilt, by using caution with trimmers and lawn mowers near the base of the tree. That includes pruning, which Evans advises to never do during the growing season.

Only prune oak trees when the leaves are off or after the first hard frost.

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Apply now for COVID mortgage assistance

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - Approximately 10,000 Illinois households whose members have struggled to pay their mortgage during the novel coronavirus pandemic can receive grants worth up to \$15,000 each from the state Housing Development Authority.

A U.S. Census Bureau survey found that more than one in 10 residents have "little-to-no confidence" they can afford their loans in September due to economic repercussions caused by COVID-19 economic restrictions.

And helping those homeowners is beneficial to families, financial institutions and local governments, Kristin Faust, the authority's executive director, said in a news release. According to IHDA, "a single foreclosure costs the homeowner, servicer and local government nearly \$80,000."

"Everyone suffers when a friend, family member or neighbor goes into foreclosure, and the pandemic has left too many families at risk of losing their homes," Faust said.

The Emergency Mortgage Assistance Program will distribute funds directly to the financial institution through which a household's mortgage is serviced. That money can go toward past-due payments as well as future ones. No repayment is required.

Qualifying Illinoisans include those whose household had at least one adult who experienced lower or no wages due to COVID-19 and whose mortgage was paid on time before March 2020.

Applications opened Aug. 24 and can be found at ema. ihda.org. They will be accepted through Sept. 4, but the application window may close early due to anticipated high volume, according to a news release.

The program is designed to "provide critical support for our homeowners, giving them the time they need to regain their financial footing," Gov. JB Pritzker said in a news release.

"At a time when the connection between housing and health is clearer than ever, it is critically important that we keep families stably housed for individual wellbeing, public health and the recovery of our state's economy," he said. "My administration remains committed to doing everything we can to provide much-needed support for Illinois residents who have been hit hardest by the pandemic..."

The funds for the program came from the federal CARES Act – or, Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security. Illinois received \$3.5 billion in total. The General Assembly, when its members were in an abridged session in May, allocated \$396 million of that for the House Development Authority to assist homeowners and renters.

Kindergarten readiness up for second year

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD — The number of Illinois children entering kindergarten who are fully prepared to start school grew for the second consecutive year in 2019, a possible indication that the state's increased spending on early childhood education is paying off.

But the latest kindergarten readiness report, released Monday by the Illinois State Board of Education, also showed that more than one-third of all pupils who entered kindergarten last year were unprepared across all three developmental areas that the state tries to measure.

"As a former kindergarten teacher, I believe that it is important to do everything possible to support Illinois children in those critical early years," State Superintendent of Education

Carmen Ayala said in a news release. The numbers come from the third

the state developed to allow school districts to use a uniform system of measuring a child's development across three key areas - social and emotional, language and literacy, and math.

Under the program, kindergarten teachers are supposed to observe their pupils during the first 40 days of school using 14 different measurements to determine their readiness for school.

The latest report showed that 29 percent of the pupils entering kindergarten demonstrated readiness across all three developmental areas. That was up from 26 percent in 2018 and 24 percent in 2017, the first year of the program.

The report also showed there has been steady growth within each of the three development areas. The percentage of kindergartners demonstrating social and emotional readiness grew to 56 percent, up from 49 percent in 2017; 47 percent demonstrated readiness in language and literacy development, up from 44 percent in 2017; and 35 percent demonstrated readiness in math, up from only 30 percent in 2017.

That same report also showed 37 percent of last year's kindergartners failed to show readiness across any of the three developmental areas. Still, that number was down from 39 percent in 2018 and 42 percent in 2017.

There were significant disparities between various racial and socioeconomic groups, although some progress has been made.

For example, among pupils who qualify for free or reduced-price meals, only 20 percent demonstrated readiness across all three categories, although that was up from 18 percent in 2018 and 16 percent in 2017.

Meanwhile, only 14 percent of students from non-English speaking households demonstrated readiness across all three development areas, up from 11 percent in 2018 and 10 percent in 2017.

IHSA OKs postseason plan

XC, golf limited to one regional event in postseason

The postseason will look very different for high school athletes competing this fall.

The Illinois High School Association (IHSA) Board of Directors voted Aug. 24 to approve a plan to conduct modified postseason state series tournaments in boys and girls golf, boys and girls cross country, girls swimming and diving and girls tennis this fall.

The approved plan will allow for a single round of regional geographic competition to be conducted the week of Oct. 19-25, with the majority of the events expected to be held on Saturday, Oct. 24.

Exactly what that event will consist of remains to be seen.

"The health and safety of the student-athletes, their coaches, and their school communities has been our priority from the start of the pandemic," said IHSA Executive Director Craig Anderson. "Throughout the spring and summer, we looked for ways to reengage student-athletes with their peers and coaches,



and our membership has shared countless positive experiences from that initial 'return to play' period. We have found similar value in being able to conduct fall sports, and believe the participants deserve a culminating experience if we can offer it safely."

The IHSA State Series tournaments will meet all Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) guidelines as it relates to COVID-19. The IHSA will be finalizing and releasing details for each fall state series tournament in the coming weeks, including dates, schedules, awards, structure, and additional safety precautions.

In conjunction with the modified fall state series, the Board also approved a \$100 state series entry fee for any school entering a team or individual in any of the fall sports.

"The IHSA office is

charged with the responsibility of being a good steward of the Association's finances," said Anderson. "The past few months have seen a significant reduction in the IHSA's income, given the cancellation of the IHSA Boys Basketball State Finals and the entire spring season. Financial challenges remain on the horizon in 2020-21 due to the limited number of sports currently classified as 'low risk' by the state, making the chances of conducting full state series tournaments unlikely at this time."

The IHSA By-laws allow the Board of Directors the discretion to implement entry fees into IHSA State Series tournaments. The IHSA last charged a tournament entry fees in 2004-05.

"An overwhelming number of school administrators supported the fees in recent surveys," said Anderson. "Not charging entry fees has been a point of pride for the IHSA. We are humbled by the support of our

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member schools during this difficult time, and appreciative of their support."

The Board will continue to look at the postseason options by sport and season as the school year progresses, so they can accurately gauge the allowable IDPH options and most current COVID-19 data.

"Interscholastic sports, like the IHSA and IESA, have rightfully followed stricter return to play guidance than non-school events since the start of the summer," Anderson said. "While we understand and appreciate the frustration felt by high school coaches due to the stricter guidance, we also recognize the need for that added guidance, even though it may create more challenges for us. There is a responsibility that exists within the school setting to create a safer environment for the community as a whole, while nonschool competitions are often conducted without any standardized safety protocols."
