Filling storefronts

Toulon council discusses development

TOULON - The Toulon City Council participated in a lengthy discussion and presentation concerning economic development at its meeting Monday.

Kyle Howard, a Toulon native who now lives in St. Charles, gave a presentation outlining the possibility of Toulon developing its downtown with new businesses in storefronts that are currently vacant. Howard has been aiding with management of Julie's Cafe Market on Main in Toulon.

Howard said he would like to obtain locally made products, such as beef, pork and produce, "and take that to build off of." Besides selling locally, Howard envisions selling Stark County products to other areas of the state.

Howard's proposal is to work with Toulon's city council to develop and implement short- and long-term economic development plans.

Howard initially was asking the city council what goals they would have to develop the city's economy. He suggested filling every storefront with a business, plus trying to recruit a sizable business to the Toulon area, such as some sort of manufacturing.

Another problem to overcome, Howard said, is to attract people to the businesses and market those businesses to other areas to expand the customer base.

Mayor Larry Hollis said the current project of revitalizing Main Street would help "sell" Toulon to people who would be business owners or customers. Hollis added that a new school building would help attract people to the area to reside here.

After the presentation and discussion, the council initially decided to have Howard concentrate with filling the storefronts with Continued on Page 2

Galva schools switch to remote learning

For The Prairie News GALVA - Galva Junior-Senior High School went to remote learning this week due to a staff member testing positive for the Covid virus.

Superintendent Doug O'Riley said at Monday's meeting of the Galva School Board that students are scheduled to return to the classroom on Tuesday, Jan. 19.

O'Riley said that the Henry-Stark County Health Department called the Galva School District and asked how many vaccines are needed to vaccinate all of the employees under the state's latest Phase 1B protocols for COVID-19 immunizations.

O'Riley said Tuesday afternoon that no date had been given yet for the school district employees to get their vaccines. He said that 85 percent of the employees are signed up to receive immunizations and he noted that the district is not requiring employees to be vaccinated.

O'Riley said he hopes to have students back in school on more of a full-time basis starting on Tuesday, April 6, which is the first day of the last nine-week period.

Once students return, masks and the 6-foot social distancing rule will still be in effect, since the students have not been vaccinated and there is currently no plan for the immunization of those 16 and under.

In other business, the board learned that bids are being sought for the installation of new windows for Galva Elementary School, according to O'Riley.

Details on school board candi-

dates were discussed Monday. Seeking the two, two-year seats are newcomers Eric Bates and Brittany Boston. Seeking the three, four-year seats are incumbent Andrew Larson and newcomers Kaleena Conrad and Laura Burke.

Superintendent O'Riley and Jerry Becker, who takes over as superintendent as of July 1, will meet with the new candidates and give them the resources and goals for the Galva School Board and make sure they'll have materials to make the transition smooth.

Candidates will also be invited to the February and March board meeting, whether in person or online.

The board voted to change the May board meeting from Monday, May 3 to Monday, May 17.

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

Joanne R. Clow



Her parents, her husband, a son, Earl, and a daughter, Paula, preceded her in death.





SPRINGFIELD - Rep. Emanuel "Chris" Welch, D-Hillside, will be the next speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives after days of closed-door meetings with fellow Democrats.

Michael Madigan, who has been speaker for all but two years since 1983, issued a statement congratulating Welch as "speaker-elect" minutes before lawmakers were set to vote.

Welch will be the state's first black speaker.

• Criminal justice bill – The Illinois Senate passed a criminal justice omnibus bill early Wednesday morning after a grueling 20 hours of politick-

ing during Tuesday's lame-duck ses- lawmakers, who said its chang sion. The House followed suit Wednesday, clearing the way for the bill to head to the governor.

Welch new speaker; policing bills passes

The legislation is made up of several provisions that touch all facets of the criminal justice system. The Pretrial Fairness Act, a longtime passion project to end cash bail in Illinois by Sen. Robert Peters, D-Chicago, and a complete overhaul of police certification crafted by Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul were both absorbed into the omnibus package.

Many debated aspects, such as ending qualified immunity for law enforcement, were reduced or removed from the bill. The scaled down version was attacked by Republican

would negatively impact the safety of Illinois communities.

Effective Jan. 1, 2023, all bail bonds and conditions of bail will be replaced by a system of pretrial release to be developed by the Illinois courts. The General Assembly also intends to establish statewide use-offorce standards by 2022.

A police certification provision was also added to the bill. It gives the state more power over who can be a member of law enforcement.

Also, the Law Enforcement Officer-Worn Body Camera Act is amended so that all law enforcement agencies must eventually use body cameras.





Disabled Persons Homestead Exemption provides a \$2,000 reduction in a property's EAV to a qualifying property owned by a disabled person. Applications must be submitted annually to the Supervisor of Assessments office.

Returning Veterans Homestead Exemption provides a one-time \$5,000 reduction in a property's EAV to a qualifying veterans who return from active duty in an armed conflict involving armed forces of the United States. To receive this exemption, the veteran must file an application with the Supervisor of Assessments office upon their return home.

Disabled Veterans Standard

Homestead Exemption provided a reduction in a property's EAV to a qualifying property owner owned by a veteran with a service connected disability certified by the U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs. A \$2,500 homestead exemption is available with a disability of at least 30% but less than 50% or a \$5,000 homestead exemption with a disability of at least 50% but less than 70%, and a disability of 70% or more, the property is exempt from taxation. The veteran must file an annual application with the Supervisor of Assessments office.

IHSA and **IESA** Sports still on hold

For The Prairie News The guessing game continues for school sports in Illinois. While a vaccine is being distributed and some parts of the state appear to be headed for less strict COVID-19 mitigations today, there is still much uncertainty about when and if seasons will start.

At present, all IHSA and IESA sports are on a holding pattern. And though both of the sanctioning bodies met with top officials from the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) and Gov. JB Pritzker's staff on Jan. 6, it is uncertain whether sports can resume any time soon.

"We don't necessarily know that all parts of the state can start at the same time and play at the same time, and we don't have clarification of if we can start, what can start," said Matt Troha, an assistant executive director of the IHSA. "It's like with most of this, we don't have any good answers."

The IHSA Board of Directors was to meet Wednesday, Jan. 13, and may have to start ruling out some sports, since time is running short.

"Our Board of Directors is going to have difficult decisions to make regarding the seasons' for medium- and high-risk sports very soon," said Craig Anderson, IHSA Executive Director. "With no specific IDPH timeline or statistical benchmarks established for the return of sports and the calendar shrinking, putting together a puzzle that allows for all sports to be played becomes increasingly improbable."

Last year when sports were first postponed, the IHSA had talked about basketball season running through Feb. 13, football and volleyball happening Feb. 15 to May 1 and spring sports opening May 3 through June 26.

Delays have made those dates look improbable, though several officials say volleyball appears the most likely to happen. As IESA Executive Di-

rector Steve Endsley said, "The calendar always wins."

While nobody has said it openly, most observers doubt the IHSA can fit boys and girls high school basketball seasons into the current framework. Football and wrestling seasons also look unlikely, given the present restrictions in place for high-risk sports.

Could football be called off to allow for a basketball season? Or vice versa? Could girls basketball be sacrificed to allow for volleyball, a lower-risk sport?

All those are hard decisions the IHSA board has to face.


"I feel like we're going to play the spring sports [baseball, softball and track and field], and maybe in the next week or two start some bowling and swimming and badminton," Troha said. "But I'm starting to worry about if we are allowed to play football in the fall."

Yes, he said next fall, not this spring.

The IESA had planned to start basketball practice on Jan. 4 and volleyball practice on Jan. 11. Endsley said he expects to get "bombarded" with calls if Gov. Pritzker announces a reduction in mitigations. "But right now I have no

answer," he said.
