Wyoming cleanup is May 8

WYOMING – The Wyoming City Council set May 8 as the date for a citywide cleanup during its Monday meeting and heard that tickets will be issued to residents who do not cleanup their properties, according to Mayor Pat Maher.

In a previous council meeting, Maher said cleanup day is for Wyoming only and people have to prove residency in order to participate. Dumpsters will be available for residents to bring acceptable items for disposal.

City Attorney Michael Evans swore in four elected officials at the beginning of the meeting. Those officials are Mayor Pat Maher, City Clerk Diane Baker, Ward One Alderman Ginger Carlisle and Ward Three Alderman Dan Hardman.

Evans reported that the sale of a small piece of city property to Mid-Century will be concluded this week and that a rightof-way fee requires discussion by the council in regards to companies wanting to perform underground directional boring that utilizes the city's right-of-way property.

A letter will be sent to the owners of 119 E. Williams Street concerning action on that residence. City officials want the owners to show that they are actively fixing the property up or the city will demolish the residence.

Also, the old Wyoming Locker property has been cleaned up and documents are needed to sell it. The city has a lien on that property for the cost of clearing it of debris and hauling off that trash that had accumulated there.

During public comment, representatives from the Stark County Baseball Athletic Program discussed the need for a sewer connection to the city's sewer system. A septic system is not feasible at the North Baseball Diamond because of water level concerns.

Superintendent Joe Kinsella said that a hook-up to the city's sewer system would be possible, but estimated the cost at \$15,000. The Athletic Program currently does not have the funds for such a project *Continued on Page 2*

Bradford First Baptist Church razed; will become parking lot

For The Prairie News BRADFORD – A Bradford landmark is no more.

The First Baptist Church, the oldest church in Bradford, and Kline Hall which were located on Main Street in Bradford were torn down in early April. Both buildings had been vacant for approximately 15 years.

On May 1, 1870, almost a year after Bradford was officially established, the Bradford Baptist Church was formally organized. The congregation chose the name "First Regular Baptist Church of Bradford." Since there was no available building for services, the congregation made do by meeting in various locations. One such place was Doyle's Hall located above Doyle's Saloon. With the need for a more permanent building, the congregation decided to build a church. Land on Main Street was donated by Bradford Foster and construction of the church building was begun

in 1871. The original debt of the building was \$2,725. There was a slight delay in opening the church as the windows that had been sent to Chicago to be glazed were destroyed in the Chicago Fire of October 1871.

The first service held in the new church was on Christmas Eve of 1871. The Baptist Church on Main Street served the congregation until its final service on Palm Sunday 2006. Easter Sunday, 2006, was celebrated in the new First Baptist Church located on Bonita Avenue.



in 1908, as a safety measure requested by the Phoenix Bank located to the east of the church. Kline Hall was added west of the church in 1972 as a place for Sunday school classes and gatherings.

Then in 1994, the second tower and bell were removed for structural and safety reasons. In 1995 a combined sign and bell rack were built on the lawn in front of the church. On June 11 of that year, in celebration of the 125th anniversary of the church, the bell was rung 125 times by members of the congregation. Now that the church and hall have been removed, the area will become a parking lot to accommodate extra parking near the Bradford Fire Department and EMS building. This project is scheduled for completion by June 1, in time for use at the Bradford Hog Roast which is scheduled for Saturday, June 5.

Galva extends deadline for property cleanup

For The Prairie News GALVA – The City Council heard Monday that 43 of 110 property owners who received letters in March concerning junk, unlicensed vehicles etc., have complied. That was the word from Galva Police Chief Kraig Townsend, who said eight others have partially complied, bringing total compliance to 35-40 percent.

It was noted at the March 29 city council meeting that those remaining properties had two weeks to comply. Violators are now given until the conclusion of Galva's clean ups days, to be held June 21-25.

In the past, residents who can transport items they wish to discard, were asked to bring them to a roll off at the City Maintenance building during certain hours. More details will be available on clean-up days at a later date.

The council also heard that residents can put yard waste out in yard waste bags, but must have a sticker on each bag. The city picks up the bags every first and third Monday morning of the month. Residents must have bags out by 6 a.m. and stickers can be purchased by calling City Hall at (309) 932-2555.

Fire hydrant flushing will occur on May 17 and 28, so Galva residents should be aware that process can result in rusty water.

A major water leak was discovered under U.S. Route 34 near the Grace Methodist Church. The road will have to be dug up to repair the underground leak. The repair will begin next week and Ratliff Brothers of Kewanee will do the excavating.

The council approved a franchise for Mid-Century for the installion of high-speed internet access which will be available in Galva residential areas. Several sections have enough subscribers for Mid-Century to begin work.

Mayor Rich Volkert said several remote workers would like to live in Galva, but have not been able to make that work given current internet suppliers.

The council approved Night Watch security to provide cameras in Wiley Park. There will be a camera on the new band shelter, playground, picnic shelter and outside the restrooms for a cost of about \$5,000. The DVR will store about 30 days of action.

Third ward alderwoman Jackie Clucas asked several questions regarding the response to children surveilled on camera doing damage or other actions of misconduct.

Chief Townsend said parents would be notified first before possibly making a juvenile referral or court date. "Maybe this will wake up some parents," Volkert said.

Townsend said sometimes community service is required as "they like to punish the child not the parent."

Townsend said he feels it will help just getting the word out, since cameras previously used in the parks need to be updated.

A presentation was given from a representative of BOW Renewables for a solar project at the former land-fill in the northeast corner of Galva. The project could produce 5,343 megawatt hours per year which would help 507 households.

If the city could successfully lease the property, the solar project could generate \$912,781 over a 30-year span for the City of Galva.

The company is going to send a lease for the city to review.

In regard to questions about an increase in trains blocking crossings in Galva, Chief Townsend said recently all tracks were blocked for 1 hour and 20 minutes. Anyone needing to cross the tracks had to drive East of town to The Dunes to cross.

Volkert said all city officials have called BNSF and he urges the public to get involved. The number to call BNSF police is (800) 832-5452 or (312) 850-5678. They will ask for the crossing number, which at the Chester Street crossing is 079756X and at Exchange Street is 079757E.

WYOMING: Medical groups hesitant to open facility

Continued from Page 1 because COVID restrictions have curtailed their fundraising events. Maher suggested to the representatives that they find out exactly how much the cost would be to hook into the city's sewer system and return with those costs to the next council meeting. Economic Development Advisor Denny Rewerts reported that he has met with medical groups in an attempt to get a medical facility in Wyoming. This is an ongoing project that has yet to be realized. Rewerts said that medical groups are hesitant to open a facility in Stark County because they believe that it would not be profitable.

In other action, the council approved \$5,500 for a new city map to be drawn by Chamlin and Associates. It has been 18 years since the last map was drawn. Also, a new shed to store city documents was approved for \$10,882 from Diamond Buildings, LLC.

CLEAN UP DAYS

City of Wyoming's "Clean Up Days" everything to be picked up must be out by Monday, May 10th. The garbage truck will start in the North end of Wyoming and move south. They will not revisit an area they have already picked up.

It will be free to all <u>residential households</u> in the corporate limits of the City of Wyoming. <u>Per state laws they cannot pick</u> <u>up any electrical items</u>. Large non electrical appliances and large pieces of furniture as in couches, large chairs, mattress and box springs will require a tag at a cost of \$10 each. Tags can be purchased at City Hall. City Hall's hours are Monday - Friday, 7:30 to noon and 12:30 to 4:00 p.m. Anything placed out should be easily picked up by one man and placed into the back of the garbage truck. Bundle items when necessary so they may be picked up quickly. The following will not be picked up:

1) Electrical items.

2) Landscape waste.

3) Hazardous material as in kerosene, fuel oil, paint thinners,

batteries and tires. 4) No bricks, building materials and long poles as these items damage the garbage truck.

Murphy's has the right to refuse to pick up any piles of garbage that is larger than a 4 ft. by 4 ft. pile or contained items mixed in that are not allowed.

Any large items set out without the required bulk tags will be in violation of City's Ordinance and subject to possible fines.

The pool will open for 2021 season with the same limited capacity and COVID regulations.

Katie Laurin was re-elected as park board president; Larry Morse as vice president and Laura Nordstrom as secretary.

Board member Doug Anderson told the board that Galva's TIF 1 will expire at the end of 2021. The park district would receive tax dollars that had gone to the TIF starting in 2023. Anderson said he felt the board should consider lowering their tax rate at that time. Anderson pointed out that the park mowing equipment was suffering age and wear and needed to be updated.

Anderson will resign at the May board meeting and be sworn in as Galva's third ward alderman. He cannot serve on both boards. Pete VanDeVelde will replace Anderson on the park board.

The board will offer its annual pool membership special in May. Swimmers can get applications and save money. Applications are available at Porter Hay Insurance, 314 Main St. in Galva.

Adult aerobic classes are available June 8 through Aug. 12, 6-7 p.m. at \$2.50 per class or \$20 for 10 sessions. Daily pool fees are \$3 for ages 3 and over, and free for those aged 0-2. Jumping worms seen in Peoria County

Jumping worms have been confirmed in Peoria County and are an invasive earthworm, probably brought into the country as fishing bait. They go by many names, such as crazy worms, Alabama jumpers, or snake worms.

The worms are known to change the soil structure, and deplete

nutrients, damage plant roots, and water-holding capacity of the soil. This is a concern in forests, where organic matter is limited. It is important to stop the spread of these worms, which have a characteristic milky white band that encircles their body. These worm jump and thrash wildly, move in a snakelike manner and can shed their tails when threatened.

The species can be found in leaf litter and top soil and appear in mid to late summer.

Bradford sets May 14 for 8th-grade promotion

By Prairie News Staff Reports BRADFORD - The Bradford School Board on Monday approved a tentative eighth-grade promotion for May 14 to be held in the junior high gym. Graduates will be limited to four family members apiece for the graduation ceremony.

The board also approved a parade through town for eighth graders and for high school seniors, similar to what was conducted last year.

Board members who won in the recent election were sworn in during the meeting. Election winners were Sherri Code, Reyna Barto-Colvin, Brad Kieser and Jessica Peterson.

Tanya Walker was voted in as board president, while John Murphy will be

vice president and Peterson is secretary.

Superintendent Chad Gripp outlined uses for funds from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief fund. He said \$65,000 will go toward the purchase of 120 Chromebooks, cleaning supplies and other technology upgrades and \$257,000 will fund summer school and tutoring, curriculum upgrades, drinking fountains and sinks, purchase of a new van, bus cameras, air conditioning units, Smart TVs for classrooms, livestream equipment, cafeteria tables and student chairs, tables and desks, among other things.

Gripp said the budget looks "very good" but suggested a few changes

prior to the end of the fiscal year, necessitating an amended budget.

During public comment, Betsy Dunehew and Mary Trobaugh introduced themselves to the board, which is seeking a school photographer. In other action, the board:

• Approved the third Monday of each month at 7 p.m. as the regular meeting time in the Junior High Health Room.

• Approved the amended 2021 calendar, with a last day of May 26.

• Set the amended budget hearing date for June 21 at 7 p.m. in the Junior High Health Room.

Rebels lose, A-W wins

Titans tops Princes to win LTC championship

WYOMING -- If ever a football season could be seen mostly as a building block for the future, this was the one. No playoffs, players coming and going due to quarantine and a limited schedule made the spring football campaign a bit of a mess.

That's good news for the Stark County Rebels, who finished 1-5 following last Friday's 50-8 seasonending loss to Mercer County (4-2, 4-2 Lincoln Trail Conference).

While the spring was not a success in terms of wins and losses for Stark County, there could be payoffs soon enough, as the next season is just three months away.

"We did get a lot of kids experience. Hoping that pays off in the fall," Rebels Coach Jade Noard said.

Indeed, the Rebels' young roster took plenty of lumps against a Lincoln Trail slate that was loaded with senior-dominated teams like Annawan-Wethersfield, Princeville and Ridgewood. And last week's foe, Mercer County, looks to be on the way back up.

Even so, Stark County was in the game at halftime trailing just 14-8. After Mercer County ran for a score on its first possession in the first

quarter, the Rebels responded with a 1-yard scoring run by quarterback Ethan Unhold to tie the game and eat up the rest of the first quarter. While MC scored again on a run in the second quarter, the Rebels also made two big fourth-down stops in the quarter.

But in the second half, turnovers and mistakes cost the home team, which had five drives end on turnovers.

"We just gave away too many scores," Noard said. "Hurt us all year."

After a scoring drive to open the third quarter, Mercer County went on to score on a fumble in the end zone and ran another fumble back for a score to put things out of reach.

Braden Williams finished with 212 rushing yards on 39 carries for the Golden Eagles, who also passed for 99 yards.

Jack Meinders had 68 of Stark County's 95 rushing yards. Unhold was 1-for-11 passing for 5 yards.
