Morel memories

All signs pointing to the season's onset

It's April, spring is springing, turkeys are gobbling and legions of morel mushroom hunters are headed to the forests and the creek bottoms, the bluffs and berms all in search of the mystical, ethereal, magical morels.

So grab your 'shroom sack, walking stick, camera and head on out – it's the perfect time to get out in the spring woods and capture "Morel Memories."

The key with morels is to find them. There are many myths, stories and suggestions about how and where one will find morels. The simple truth is morels can appear most anywhere; seemingly overnight or between a lunch and breakfast foray. One moment – it's bare forest floor; the next there's a stand of "Big Yellas" as far as the eye can see.

But certain times are better than others. Signs that the time is near include trees beginning to bud, flagship wildflowers begin to make an appearance – when trillium, phlox, trout lily, Dutchman's breeches, violets, mayapples, wild strawberries and many more paint the timber floor in a natural palette.

When the weather has warm, rainy days and nights, with temperatures ranging between high 50s at night to high 70s in the daytime, it's definitely time to gather up your stick and sack and set out.

Dandelions and lilacs, apple blossoms and spawning crappie are also good indicators that it is time to hit the woods. Spring turkey season also coincides with morel season in many areas. Remember, in Illinois, on most De-

Continued from Page 1 excess of 40 hours per week caused by the impact of COVID-19.

Farquer said Tuesday the rate of pay is \$13.96 per hour beyond 40 hours. He said if a teacher worked five extra hours per week for the school year, the bonus could be \$2,652.

Also passing by a 4-2 vote (Brian Howard and

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Chuck Ingle were the "no" votes) was a collective bargaining agreement with WEA extending the contract for three years with annual percentage raises of 3.25, 3.5 and 3.75.

The board also voted 4-2 (Stewart and Hanson were "yes" votes) against a collective bargaining Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that would have al-

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lowed the WEA "to retain the right to bargain the impact of remote learning and the implementation of mini-courses for the duration of the contract."

Board members had several questions in regards to this item and others from the negotiating process, prompting Superintendent Tim Farquer to say, "The thing that is continually lacking is trust."

Countered board member Brian Howard, "It's called governance."

Absent was April Bouchez, who along with Stewart and Hanson were the board members on the negotiating committee.

In other action, the board:

• Approved the latest re-

visions to the Williamsfield Schools Professional Evaluation Plan, under which staff members are evaluated.

- Hired Jaynee Bowker as a full-time substitute teacher and administrative assistant.
- Approved adjustments to the RESTART plan allowing parents to choose full-time, in-person learning. That was implemented last week and according to Farquer has gone "fine" except for some "anxious folks" and some adjustments to meals and snacks necessitated by more students being in the school.
- Heard that 38 percent of staff members have received COVID-19 vaccinations.



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
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

Global meatpackers filet U.S. taxpayers

Like many global meatpacking companies, JBS SA, the giant Brazilian meat and poultry packer with extensive operations in North and South America, Europe and Australia, spent most of the last six months buying its way out of trouble with U.S. customers and the American government.

Even a cursory examination shows JBS spent \$221.5 million in February to settle allegations it helped rig

U.S. poultry prices and, last October, it paid \$280 million "to settle charges it violated (U.S) anticorruption laws."

Both those deals came after a JBS subsidiary paid

GUEBERT the U.S. "\$27 million to settle charges it used illegally obtained money to finance the pur-

chase of Pilgrim's Pride," the second largest U.S. poultry company, in Even more astonishing, the money river flowed both ways: JBS USA,

the serial bad boy of global meatpacking, received \$90 million in 'trade mitigation commodity contracts" for pork purchased by the Trump Administration in its 2019-20 tariff fight with China.

Still, as noted here last week, JBS wasn't - isn't - the only global meatpacker making an already dirty business even dirtier. Other packers are targets of ongoing market investigations while some, like Tyson Foods, have joined JBS in paying millions to settle civil suits.

In fact, given these settlements and an ongoing U.S. Department of Justice investigation, Big Meat might

just be the most collusive, most corrupt and most unrepentant business sector in the U.S. today.

Which begs two questions: Why do we, both its customers and lawmakers, tolerate so much confessed – and unconfessed – corruption in meatpacking? And what, if any, benefits do we receive in return for all this evident corporate lawless-

It can't be great value because Big Meat doesn't provide great value.

Indeed, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) data, as meatpacker control on both the animal buying side and meat selling side grew since 2000, consumer prices have risen 82 percent in beef, 44 percent in pork and 33 percent in poultry.

Moreover, it's not like farmers and ranchers now receive better prices for their livestock and poultry. In fact, if calculated in current 2021 dollars, total "cash receipts" farmers pocketed for their sales have fallen since 2000.

For example, in today's dollars, farmers received \$76.4 billion for cattle and calves in 2000. (USDA doesn't divide the two.) In 2021, they will pocket an estimated \$66 billion, or \$10 billion less.

Similarly, in today's dollars, U.S. farmers received \$25.5 billion for their hogs in 2000. This year, the estimated market value will be more than \$1 billion less, or \$24.3 billion.

Also, two decades ago, broilers (frying chickens) brought farmers \$28.7 billion; this year, they'll bring 15 percent less, or \$24.3 billion.

So, today, farmers are receiving less for their livestock and poultry, consumers are paying more their beef, pork, and chicken and meatpackers – the highly integrated link between the two – are paying hundreds of millions in civil and criminal penalties to keep their admittedly-crooked system more than profitable to continue operations and expand their global reach.

And expand they are.

On November 10, two months before it announced it will pay \$221.5 million to settle "broiler chicken antitrust civil price fixing litigation," Tyson Foods announced "plans to invest in new processing facilities and expand existing plants in Thailand, China and The Netherlands."

In early April, JBS, the global poster child of meatpacker malfeasance, announced that it is prepared to spend part of its 2020 "record cash flow" to both "boost capital spending by as much as 48 percent this year" and "actively seek acquisitions."

Meanwhile, according to recent reporting, U.S. taxpayers sent cattle producers \$7.17 billion under the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program Aid (CFAP), "\$2 billion more than any other eligible livestock or crop," while "(p)ork producers so far have received about \$1.14 billion..."

Little wonder then why meatpackers like JBS can buy their way out of corruption charges one day and announce plans to expand their empires the next: they're not using shareholder money to fund any of it. They're using yours.

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Farmington board OKs parking lot repairs

For The Weekly Post FARMINGTON - The Farmington School Board approved the purchase of two activity buses and awarded a bid for parking lot resealing as part of a relatively short agenda at Monday's meeting.

"We tried to keep it light with the transition coming," Superintendent Zac Chatterton said, noting that new board members will be seated April 29 at 5:30 p.m. in a special meeting.

Elected last Tuesday were Keith Deppermann, Daniel Gorsuch and Dustin Blunier. Still to be determnined is how the board will pick someone to serve a two-year seat, since nobody ran for that position.

"After that meeting on the 29th, we'll give notice to the regional office of education and then the

board has 45 days to fill the seventh spot," Chatterton said.

The bid from Johnson Trucking and Blacktopping of just over \$26,000 for crack fill and resealing was well under last year's cost of more than \$60,000. Chatterton said engineers have included other materials that could be used in the process, which made the bids more competitive.

One decision the new board will face is hiring a boy's basketball coach, as current coach Jeff Otto has stepped down from that job to become athletic director. He replaces Jeff Flater, who will be retiring.

Other resignations approved Monday were: Sara Hanlin as a junior high cheer sponsor, Kelsey Swearingen as a student facilitator and Nicole Lettow as a junior high teacher and

Hired was Dylan Hayden as a PE teacher for the 2021-22 year, Steven Gilstrap as junior high boys track coach and Jim Hardesty as interim junior high track coach. Chatterton also received a 2 percent raise for 2021-22 (after forgetting to include himself in a list of administrators who received raises at the last meeting) and Dina Janssen was approved as a music department volun-

The board also voted 5-2 to deny a union grievance that focused on terms of the evaluation process for the 2020-21 school year. Some changes in evaluations were made because of uncertainty over in-person learning due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Student fees were also discussed, but no action was taken. The goal is to have a plan in place by the start of the 2021-22 school year, Chatterton said.

Farmington expands TIF grant programs

FARMINGTON – The Farmington City Council has again paved the way for commercial and residential facade improvements, approving both the Residential Redevelopment grants and facade grants starting May 1.

Operations of the funds are very similar to years past, except the council also approved increasing the total allotted for residential grants by \$25,000 to \$75,000.

Applications are available at www.cityoffarmingtonil.com.

Residential grants awarded to properties that are in Farmington's TIF district are limited to a benefit for the property owner of 75 percent of the cost of a project, which is not to exceed \$2,000. Properties for which grants were issued in the past are limited to a \$1,000 award.

Eligible projects include, but are not limited to: window repair/replacement; siding repair/replacement; roof repair; additions of porches, steps or ADA ramps; dead tree removal and demolition of structures that pose a risk.

There are also residential grants for homes outside the TIF district. Requirements are the same as for homes in the TIF, except the total amount allotted is \$25,000.

Facade grants for businesses in the Downtown Historic District will be allocated with the same requirements as in past years. The total amount to be awarded is \$30,000. Businesses can also apply for TIF benefits for other needs on a case-by-case basis. To learn more, visit the city building.



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MORELS: Wait for turkey hunters on DNR land

Continued from Page 1 partment of Natural Resources properties that allow turkey hunting, there is no mushrooming until after 1 p.m.

The "where" to find morels isn't so simple. Morels can be nearly anywhere.

Black morels tend to be more exclusively found in hardwood forests, but not around any particular tree. Finding them is often like a connect-the-dots game. When you find one, be still and look nearby. Mark the first morel you spy with your stick. Sit down, look around at ground level, you will most likely be rewarded with masses scattered all the way around you. Follow the trail of

mushrooms up or down hill. Blacks will generally lead you along waterways, creek banks and hillsides.

Envision the way spring rainwater would flow and that will help you connect the black morel dots.

White, gray and yellow morels, which tend to appear later than the blacks, are frequently found in forests, fields, orchards, fence rows, hedgerows, islands, railroad tracks, floodplains and grown-over strip mines. Disturbed ground, such as old home sites, is notorious for producing big yellows and grays.

Unlike the blacks, the gray/yellow varieties sometimes tend to congregate around certain types of tree, often a tree that is in a death throe – bark peeling, limbs dropping, rotting down at the base. Look for bigger, fading away elm,

ash, sycamore, cottonwood and silver maple.

If you find a great "morel tree," mark the spot. The same tree could provide you with spongy sweetness for up to five years.

When you head to the woods, it's prudent to wear long pants and a longsleeved shirt for protection. Be sure to liberally apply insect repellent as ticks, mosquitoes, chiggers and morels thrive in the same places. Don't forget your camera, as the spring forest floor is filled with photo opportunities. A compass, whistle (for hailing), drinking water and snack are all good things to also have along. If you will be traversing ditches and creeks a good pair of waterproof knee boots is a must.

The most important item, however, is your collection bag. Avoid plastic bags, regardless of how handy they may seem. Plastic is fungi's mortal enemy. After a long foray you may return home to find a sludge of soggy broken, slimy yuckiness in the bottom of that plastic grocery or bread sack.

Instead, use mesh bags and tell others why it's important. Recycled orange and onion bags are quite usable and adequate but can abrade the edges of your mushrooms.

What I've found works best for me is a simple lingerie bag found for less than a dollar. I usually pack three or four along, they fold up flat when not in use and can easy be stuffed in a pocket. It doesn't matter which type of collection vessel you use, as long as the spore gets spread.

Let's fast forward to the woods: You've found yourself smack dab in big patch of morels – now what?

First of all, never pull the morel out of the ground, that method breaks the mycelium trial and can destroy future harvests. Pinch off at ground level or use a sharp knife to slice through stem. Give the morel a little shake and toss it the bag.

When arriving home with your bounty, slice in half, rinse under cool running water and place wrapped in damp dish towels or paper towels in refrigerator. Forget leaving them to soak in salt water - that will only net you a slimy, salty, mess. If you are particularly concerned about bugs that might be living in the nooks and crannies, a short 15-minute soak in lightly salted water helps. Rinse well after and then store.

Because the season is so fleeting and so steeped in tradition, photos of your mushroom madness are a must. There's nothing more uplifting during a cold winter evening than looking back at memories from a warm spring day when you "found the biggest mushroom ever!"

Now, that you have a guide for the when, where and how; take to the forest, take to the fields and start snapping "Morel Memories" of your own.

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

Elmwood postpones chicken discussion

ELMWOOD – Will the new mayor of Elmwood and city council allow chickens to be kept within the city's limits? That question will be facing the council after mayor-elect JD Hulslander and the council convenes May 18.

Outgoing mayor Brian Davis and the council heard a presentation from Brooke McClaskey proposing that up to six chickens to a coop or pen be allowed within city limits by residents.

"I'm really hoping that you guys [the council] will consider allowing up to six hens in the city limits kept within a coop, a run, or a fenced yard," McClaskey began. "This is something that is a huge trend with a big push with young folks."

She cited Hanna City and Washington as communities that have approved keeping chickens within their city limits.

"Brooke, we will be having a changing of the guard coming in four weeks,"
Davis said. "We're going to have two new councilmen and a new mayor."
As a result, Davis suggested tabling the item.

McClaskey stated that she has received positive feedback concerning her proposal about chickens. Davis retorted that six years ago the council had a similar discussion and that it was very heated. He said that was another reason why he suggested tabling the discussion, because he was adamantly against chickens within the city.

Treasurer Bonnie Beal reported that the council and city are 75 percent through the fiscal year and that 74 percent of revenues have been collected.


"The police fund received \$73,000 [\$73,561] for COVID [relief] money," Beal said. "All that money went into the police fund and now I won't be transferring money from the general fund to the police fund like we normally would until the COVID money is

one."

In a related agenda item, the K9 fund is to reimburse the general fund for past overcharges.

Police Chief Aaron Bean reported that the department for March had no arrests, 11 stops, no citations, 13 warnings, 22 reports taken, three open doors investigated and 49 incidents handled.

Finally, Economic Development Director Amy Davis said the Strawberry Festival is scheduled for June 5 and that the Farmers' Markets begin June 11. Municipal band concerts start June 6.



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Village of Princeville Residents: Public Works will be flushing hydrants on April 21st and 22nd

Hydrant valves are opened and closed to control the flow of water and flush the system lines of sediment. Given the scouring velocities involved, flushing operations will likely

lead to discolored water during, or immediately following the flushing. Hydrant flushing may also result in sediment being disturbed within the water mains. Although this sediment is common and expected in any system, we are now required by Illinois EPA regulations to notify our customers that this sediment may contain lead even though our water system contains no known lead conduits.

The benefits of flushing include removal of rust and sediment, improved chlorine residual, and reduction in taste and odor; all of which can help provide high quality water to our residents.

Things you can do as a homeowner or business owner:

- If water discoloration is noticed in your residence or building, stop all water use and wait. Several hours may be required to rid the cloudiness from the water mains that serve your home or business.
- Turn on outside spigots, cold-water bathtub faucets, flush toilets, and run a cycle through the washing machine to clear the water in your service line.
- Do not wash clothes or run a dishwasher during or immediately after flushing takes place. Washing clothes with discolored water can cause laundry stains.
- Discolored water poses no threat to your health. You may wish to avoid drinking or cooking with the water.


