# Abbey Haste earning accolades

There was a time when it could be said that girls who played percussion marched to the beat of a different drum. Today, it's more common to see girls seated at drum sets, and that's what drew Abbey Haste, 18, of Edelstein to play.

"I always enjoyed seeing other girls playing drums, it was very inspiring for me," Haste said. "I wanted to be like them."

Haste is anything but common, though. Since fifth grade, the Princeville High School senior has packed enough musical hours and experience into her young life to produce a resume that could rival the most talented and ded-

icated of her musical peers. Proficient with the xylophone as well as the drums, she has been a part of four high school bands, the Bradley Honor Band, and the Eastern Illinois University Honor Band.

Her accolades include winning music competitions and being selected for various ensembles.

The criteria for these competitions and selections can differ. For instance, she competed with other musicians in her district before being selected to participate in the Illinois Music Education Association (ILMEA) Concert Band for six years. on foot with an undisclosed amount of cash.

called "The Best Of The Rest," a list of special miscellaneous or minor bulbs. At the top of the roster was a "new" item: Corydalis solida 'Beth Evans.' Like bees to honey, many gardeners are attracted to any "new" plant. I'm no exception. I admit to being an "avant garde-ner," so to speak.

Doing some research, I learned that 'Beth Evans' wasn't really new. It was first exhibited in 1988. Nevertheless, I ordered a few dozen bulbs, technically tubers, and set them out in groups here and there in the garden. I'm really happy with the result. The bright pink flowers of C. 'Beth Evans' provide a pleasing counterpoint to the yellows and blues

Continued from Page 1 Jazz Band, a first for a Princeville High School student. For the Prairie Wind Ensemble competition, she had to prepare a piece within certain criteria and perform before three judges, netting her a cash prize, the accompaniment of the Ensemble to her piece during a concert and a professional recording. But she says her greatest victory was winning the Prairie Wind Solo Competition's "Best of Day" award. Winning this means her performance was the best the judge heard all day and Haste has received the award three times on xylophones solos.

"I was up against a lot of really good musicians from around the area which made it much more difficult but also made me feel very good to win," she

In addition to all the other musical ensembles,

Haste is part of her own band with two other musicians, Cami Proctor and Josh Sweeney, who she met by chance at the 2016 Princeville Heritage Day Fair at a "Battle of the Bands" competition.

Proctor and Sweeney had heard Haste play in a talent show before the competition and asked her to stick around for their performance.

"It was truly fate that we found each other ... it was their first time playing in public and I was very close to not playing in the talent show," Haste said.

Haste's Band, The Blank Stairs, has performed pop and rock music in local venues such as The Betty Jayne Brimmer Center for Performing Arts, Monarch Music Hall, Cyds in the Park, Wander Down Music Festival in Makanda, the Peoria Riverfront, Kenny's WestSide Pub and Kellehers. One of the band's goals is to expand beyond the Peoria.

"For the future," said Haste, "we plan to continue playing around and writing music together and hopefully branching out of Peoria. We'd love to tour around Illinois to wherever we can."

At the beginning of this year, The Blank Stairs released their first album, "Face Paint," produced by Connor Billard. According to Haste, the songs on the album are "described in Spotify and Google as alternative and Indie, but there could be a lot of fluctuation in that."

Though Haste described the making of the album as "very fun," it wasn't accomplished without "many long nights at our producer's studio recording and hanging out," sometimes only clocking two hours of sleep. This accomplishment is a source of pride for the band because "we feel it's a good demonstration of what we're capable of...and what our sound has become."

Like other talented entertainers, Haste said she has had a lot of support. She said she feels fortunate to have attended Princeville schools because of the

music programs, resources and support of teachers. She specifically mentioned her mother; her first band director, Jodi Slagel; drum teacher Jeremy Clark; and ensemble instructor Peggy Bonnor. She said they inspired her, motivated her, and pushed her to improve.

And while the pandemic has limited public performances, Haste and her band members haven't wasted the time. As they wait for the opening of venues, they've worked to improve other skills. Haste says it's been a good time for songwriting, practicing and preparing to record.

As pandemic restrictions lift and people are able to return to their favorite entertainment haunts, Haste will once again sit at her drums with The Blank Stairs. Her main goal after graduation is to continue performing and songwriting with her band. But, she said, she's also "open to becoming a studio musician and playing with artists who don't have a drummer."

So, who knows? As
Haste's star continues to
rise, maybe one day we'll
be able to say, "Abbey
Haste, the drummer? Yeah,
I know who she is. She's
from my corner of the
world!"



Hmmm. Larry has always struck me as a reasonable guy. So I was sure the note, written in my wife's hand, was incorrect. Surely Larry had not reported seeing a large South American rodent.

Shortly thereafter I encountered Larry and Mary Ann Hanlin at Toot's Treats in Elmwood.

"Yes, that's exactly what it looked like," Hanlin said of the alleged capybara. "We've been looking for it since, but have not seen it again."

Once upon a time, I might have burst out laughing. But age – and being wrong so often – has made me wiser. My motto? When it comes to critters, never say never (except for Bigfoot sightings in Illinois).

That lesson was hammered home by a phone call a few days after

Christmas in 2002 when I was still writing the "critter column" for the Peoria Journal Star. The caller was Randy Worker, of Henry, who claimed he had just accidentally shot a wolf in Marshall County. Uh huh.

"Email me a picture," I said, expecting to see a coyote.

What I saw looked exactly like a wolf. And it was - an impressive 84pound canine that became the first wolf confirmed in Illinois in more than a century. The guy who confirmed it was Bob Bluett, then the Illinois furbearer biologist – a good guy who was always good for a story.

That same year, though, Bluett uttered a comment that would haunt him. Asked about mountain lions in Illinois, Bluett bellowed, "Show me the money." His point was not to steal from the movie "Jerry Maguire," but rather that if there were mountain lions in Illinois (as so many alleged), somebody would have produced a dead one. Within a week, somebody found a bona fide cougar killed by a train in Randolph County in southern Illinois. Bluett was slightly less bombastic after that.

So it goes for me. A capybara in central Illinois? Not probable. More likely, it was a mangy coyote. Maybe a long-legged beaver. But it is possible ... or a really good ruse.

One year, my buddy **Chef Todd** and I *jeff@wklypost.com* 

went on a fishing trip to Pickwick Lake. The farther we drove south, the more we saw armadillos - some running but most dead along the road.

Eventually, this hatched an idea: Let's bring some dead ones home, toss them out by a few roadsides and see how long it takes somebody to call the Journal Star in amazement.

The idea seemed sound until we learned armadillos can carry leprosy. By then, we already had one roadkilled 'dillo in the back of my truck. Weighing leprosy vs. a great prank, we decided one was plenty and the less handling, the better. Upon returning home at 3 a.m., Todd dispatched the carcass after we crossed the Interstate 474 bridge over the Illinois River. We figured somebody would either call me or Presley's Outdoors to report their find.

Like clockwork, my phone rang at 6:30 a.m. "Jeff, you'll never guess what I found along Interstate 474," said the caller.

Real quiet, I whispered, "Is it an armadillo?"

The caller was flummoxed, then laughed as I explained the situation.

All of which is a roundabout way of asking: Do you know anybody who raises capybaras? Because I smell a rat.



# The boys of my summer arrive every April

I was very young – I had just turned eight - to begin a torrid love affair, but the St. Louis Cardinals made it easy. It was 1963, Stan Musial's last year in baseball, and the young team began the season hot and stayed hot through July.

So hot, in fact, that the starting infield for the National League's All Star team that year was all Cardinals; around the horn, first to third, it was Bill White, Julian Javier, Dick Groat and Ken

Boyer. And on the bench was Stan the Man himself, playing in his record, 24th All Star game.

Like I said, love came easy in 1963.

That final Musial summer was only a taste of the supreme delight to come in 1964. When that team came north from spring training, though, it still had a hole in its line-up, Stan's left field spot. No one that Manager Johnny Keane had tried seemed to fit. Who could replace a legend?

Only another legend and on June 15, 1964, it arrived when the Cardinals traded a tiring star pitcher, Ernie Broglio, for a fleet-but-floundering Chicago Cubs outfielder named Lou Brock. The leadoff-hitting Brock would never replace Musial, but Stan's ghost gave the skinny kid room and he blossomed.

Still, Brock's spark couldn't ignite

the team that had won 90 games the year before. Two months after his arrival, the Cardinals languished 10 games back of league-leading Philadelphia.

Cardinals' owner, beer baron August A. Busch, Jr., decided to act. Since Augie Jr. couldn't fire any players, he fired the team's general manager, Vaughn "Bing" Devine. It was Devine, of course, who only 60 days earlier had pulled off what would soon become the biggest steal in baseball history, the Brock-for-Broglio deal.

In mid-September, the team turned some unseen corner and began to make a run at league leaders Philadelphia and Cincinnati.

Then, at the end of the month, one of those beautiful baseball things happened: the Phillies lost 10 games in a row while my Cardinals won eight in a row. The Cards, improbably, were in first place and stayed there until late Sunday, Oct. 4, when they clinched their first pennant in 18 years.

When the final out that sent the Cardinals to the 1964 World Series was made, my father danced a little jig in the milking parlor. I know because I was with him, too nervous to stay home and listen to the game alone.

What a sight! What a day! What a

The World Series pitted the nowflying Cardinals against the powerful New York Yankees, the only major league team to win more pennants and World Series than St. Louis.

But there was a hitch; by tradition, all World Series games were day games. That meant, of course, several games would be held on school days. What rotten luck.

But lightning struck again: My teacher at St. John's Lutheran School that year – a dour lady who ruled the classroom with a pine scepter made from a bed board – was a Cardinals fan. She brought a transistor radio to school so no one missed one pitch or one beer commercial of one game.

The 1964 Series was baseball at its best, a seven-game nail biter that was won by the boys of my youthful spring and summer. I cried - it seemed like everyone cried - when pitcher Bob Gibson got the final Yankee out on a weak pop fly to sec-

And now I tear up whenever I hear that one of these incredible players has traded baseball glory for eternal glory. It's hard to let go of those who were bona fide heroes on the southern Illinois dairy farm of my youth and, in most cases, I never will.

Brock. Gibson. Boyer. Shannon. McCarver. Flood. Sadecki. Washburn. Maxvill. Groat. White. Javier.

Yes, they won a few World Series but they also won millions of hearts, and mine still beats faster at the mention of their names. That's love, right?

# Farmington water main work starts soon

FARMINGTON - Illinois American Water is planning to start work this month on a \$635,000 project to replace more than 3,000 feet of water mains here.

Work is slated to begin this month in the following areas:

- North and South Cedar Street
- West Cottonwood Street, between South Cedar Street and South Mill Street
  - South Mill Street
- · West Court Street, between Oak Street and Elmwood Road
- Pleasant Street

Eric Larson, senior manager of op-

erations, explained the company works to replace water mains annually to keep up with aging infrastructure. He referenced results from the American Society of Civil Engineers Report Card for America's Infrastructure, which supports increased investment in our nation's drinking water and wastewater infrastructure.

Since acquiring the City of Farmington's water system in April 2018, Illinois American Water has replaced about 10,000 feet of water main. This is part of the company's commitment to invest \$5 million in the first five years of ownership. Investments were also made at the water treatment plant, including upgraded electrical and security systems, installing a new high service pump this year, repairing the backup generator and replacing

FARMINGTON - The Farmington City Council on Monday voted to exit two agreements pertaining to the construction of a new city building.

Council members voted to end an agreement with Sam Lillie to purchase three vacants lots on East Fort Street. The council also voted to end an agreement designating D. Joseph Construction Co. as the Design Build position for the proposed new building.

Soil testing at the vacant lots showed the site was not currently suitable for construction of a new building. At the last council meeting, the council and several members of the general public balked at the idea of spending more money to prepare the site for construction of a new twostory building.

After informally polling council members, Mayor Kent Kowal suggested ending the two agreements.

City Administrator Rollen Wright said the effort to find a new city building has been tabled for now until "things calm down a bit with COVID and building material costs."

In other business, the council heard that there was no change in the \$555,310.34 balance in the TIF fund.

Continued from Page 1 9 and weighing 160 pounds, wearing a camouflage ball cap, blue jeans and a face mask.

Beck fits that size description and was reportedly released on parole last August after serving a portion of a 25-year sentence for a 2008 bank robbery in Champaign County.

Beck is also a suspect in the April 9 robbery of the Odell Bank in Livingston County and in an April 19 hold-up at a Paxton convenience store.

Beck, who is considered very dangerous and has an extensive criminal history, is believed to be driving a stolen white Toyota Prius, registration 436976.

Beck has also been arrested in Piatt, Macon,

Sangamon and Adams counties. In Livingston County, Beck had been convicted of five counts of forgery/make/alter document in 1993. At that time, he was also charged with three counts of forgery/make/alter document and one count of aggravated robbery in Sangamon County, two counts of aggravated robbery in Macon County and in Piatt County, one count of theft of \$300-\$10,000, aggravated battery/great bodily harm and theft of \$10,000-\$100,000.

Beck reportedly has a tattoo of two roses on his upper left arm, a tribal tattoo on his upper right arm, a scar on his right arm and a scar on the palm of his left hand.

# **GARDEN:** Asian native adds color

Continued from Page 1 of the other bulbs.

The common name for Corydalis is fumewort, which comes from the Latin words for "smoke of the earth." The silvery-grey foliage of some relatives of Corydalis resemble smoke from a distance, hence the fumewort moniker.

Corydalis solida, the species from which 'Beth Evans' was selected, is native to western and central Asia and Europe. It appears in the garden in early spring and produces a mound of "fern-like" foliage about eight inches high and wide. Numerous upright flower stems support clusters of tubular reddish-purple flowers above the foliage.

C. 'Beth Evans' was singled out from the species for its bright coral pink flowers, which are showy even from a distance. There may be as many as twenty tubular one-inch flowers clustered on each arching stem.

Maybe I'm being particularly persnickety, but I have a problem with the description, "fern-like foliage." Picture fern foliage in your mind. Did you conjure up an image of Boston fern, or did you imagine maidenhair fern, or even asparagus fern? Three distinctly different foliages. You get my point.

A more accurate description is to say that the leaves of fumewort resemble those of columbine (Aquilegia), only more delicate and finely dissected. At first glance you could easily mistake a fumewort for columbine or even dwarf bleeding heart.

Corydalis solida and its cultivars are spring ephemerals. They pop up in early

spring and break forth in bloom while most perennials are asleep. Then they fade and die back to the tuberous root, disappearing until next year. They provide bright color in the shade garden before hostas and ferns even think of emerging.

I'm going to try two other C. solida cultivars for next spring, 'Purple Bird', with violet-purple flowers, and 'G. P. Baker', which bears bright red flowers. Planted near each other, the varieties often cross and produce varying shades of pink, purple, and red.

I've tried several times to grow Corydalis flexuosa 'Blue Panda' but I've never been successful. Native to China, it bears intense sky blue flowers in spring, goes dormant for the summer, and blooms again in the fall. I already have plenty of blue flowers in spring, so I can get along without 'Blue Panda'.

Another fumewort, Corydalis lutea, has been wandering around our gardens for several years. It has soft lemon yellow flowers and blooms from spring through early fall. It self-seeds prolifically, popping up here and there throughout the garden, even in stone walls and sidewalk cracks. A white-flowered species, C. ochroleuca, is another self-seeder that's happy at our place. The flowers are milky white with yellow throats. I love the serendipity of these plants and because they're shallow-rooted, I can easily pull out any that show up in the wrong places.

No serious diseases or insects cause trouble for the fumeworts. Rabbits and deer leave them alone, preferring to wait for the tastier hosta, I suppose.



But the decision also could determine whether lawmakers themselves will draw the maps, or whether the job will be handed over to a bipartisan commission. That's because delays in the 2020 census mean official census numbers needed for legislative redistricting won't be available until several weeks after the June 30 deadline set out in the state constitu-

• **FOID cards** – A bipartisan group of lawmakers are backing legislation that seeks to modernize the way the Illinois State Police processes and issues Firearm Owners Identification cards and Concealed Carry Licenses, a change that supporters say would speed up the process and improve public safety.

Senate Bill 1165, and its companion, House Bill 745, would essentially turn FOID cards and Concealed Carry Licenses into a sin-

gle card so when someone renews their Concealed Carry License, their FOID card would automatically renew.

It would also provide for automatic renewals for people who voluntarily agree to submit fingerprints. And it calls on ISP to develop an internet portal in which state, local and federal law enforcement agencies could access information about people whose FOID cards have been revoked or suspended.

ISP Director Brendan Kelly said the agency was inundated with new and renewal FOID card applications last year, which he attributed in part to the "social tensions caused by civil unrest and the global pandemic." From 2017 to 2020, he said, FOID card applications grew 167 percent.

The surge in applications over the last year resulted in a massive backlog of applications that have not been processed within the required 30-day timeframe.







When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. Source of Water: ELMWOOD: To determine Elmwood's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, a Well Site Survey, published in 1991 by the Illinois EPA, and a Source Water Assessment Program, were reviewed. Based on the information contained in these documents, twenty-one potential sources of groundwater contamination are present that could pose a hazard to groundwater pumped by the Elmwood community water supply wells. These include two stores/sales, a hardware store, five below ground fuel storages, a small engine repair, four above ground fuel storages, a warehouse, a manufacturing process, a ready mix/cement, a de-icing agent, a pile of material, a lagoon, a feed lot, and a mortuary. Based on information provided by Elmwood water supply officials, the following businesses, also indicated as potential sources in the site data table, are no longer present: J&J Oil, Maplelane Country Club, Elmwood Construction Co., Linder's Garage, Central Illinois Monument, Croziers Auto Parts, Blumier Concrete Co., Gorham Brothers, Knox Sunoco, and an unknown feedlot. Based upon this information, the Illinois EPA has determined that Elmwood Wells #1, #3, and #4 are not susceptible to IOC, VOC, or SOC contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydrogeologic data for the wells. In anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that Elmwood's community water supply wells are not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the community's wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper site conditions; there is a hydrogeologic barrier that restricts pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a

# Farmers run to win

Lewis leads ground game vs. 4A foe Kewanee

FARMINGTON - There are no playoffs this football season. Nothing normal, for that matter in this odd time of COVID-19, when games are cancelled hours before kickoff and the Illinois High School Association doesn't even bother to keep track of team scores.

So when Abingdon-Avon said it couldn't play because too many players were hurt, Farmington found another foe – a Kewanee team that last year won a Class 4A playoff game.

"We wanted the kids to have a playoff experience and it felt like a playoff," Farmington Coach Toby Vallas said.

Having already missed two weeks for COVID quarantining, Farmington was hungry to play. And last Friday, the Farmers showed that hunger in a 49-20 win over the Boilermakers.

"I think that's the best we've played in a few years," Vallas said. "I was just really proud of our kids. We had guys stepping up and making plays. And not just the guys you would think."

That's obvious when you consider that the pass-happy Farmington offense attempted just six passes. Instead of throwing, Farmington (3-0) ran the ball for 293 yards and 7.7 per carry.

Senior back Dridyn Lewis led the way with 130 yards and two scores on 17 carries, while senior quarterback Josh McMillin added 116 rushing yards and one score on 14 carries in what Vallas called, "the best game he's played for us."

Ahead 14-7 after halftime, Farmington took control in a 28-0 third quarter run when Sam Fletcher returned a fumble 61 yards for a score. From there, the Farmers got rushing TDs from Lewis and McMillin and a 33-yard bomb from McMillin to Corbin Rutledge.

"We really got the run game going," Vallas said. "Dridyn, he was carrying three and four guys at a time. He was what we thought Dridyn was always going to be. He finally got the rust off."

Meanwhile, on defense, Farmington survived a pass-happy Kewanee attack that racked up 219 yards through the air on 32 attempts. Halftime adjustments were a key for Farmington, Val-
