### Bills aplenty Legislators keeping

SPRINGFIELD - The state Senate and House passed more than 750 bills last week, addressing isolated timeouts in schools, youth vaping, teaching Muslim history, the commemoration of Juneteenth and automatic voter registration in prisons, among other topics.

Friday was the deadline for the General Assembly to pass bills out of each chamber, for consideration in the other chamber. The General Assembly's session is scheduled to end May 31.

Capitol News Illinois has summarized below a few of the notable bills that passed one chamber last week. To become law among other pathways – the bills will still need to receive approval from the other chamber and the governor.

### Gobbles in the timber mean it's turkey time

Nothing says spring in Illinois quite like the flashy noisy show put on by the Eastern Wild Turkey as they gobble and strut and in general show off much like a teenage boy at the spring dance, all in hopes of attracting a mate.

The United States is home to six recognized subspecies of wild turkey, but the eastern sub species is the only found in Illinois.

Wild turkeys can be found in all 102 counties in Illinois and have even started finding their way into urban areas where they sometimes become a bit of nuisance. Wild turkeys in urban settings have been observed chasing the mail man or

walkers, pooping on patios, and wrecking the occasional garden and flower bed with their scratching around looking for food.

As abundant as wild turkeys appear today across the landscape, that wasn't always the case in Illinois.

It wasn't until 1970 that Illinois re instituted a hunting season for wild turkeys, after a 67-year hiatus.

Habitat loss and overhunting had eliminated wild turkeys from Illinois by 1910. Between 1959-67, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) obtained wild-trapped turkeys from Mississippi, Arkansas and West Virginia. These birds were released in small groups at five locations in southern Illinois.

In 1970 a total of 1,000 lucky people held permits for the state's first wild turkey hunting season in 67 years. The reintroduced wild turkeys had successfully established breeding populations, producing enough offspring that a trap-andtransfer program could be established.

That first season, populations were not yet widespread, but DNR officials felt that enough wild turkeys existed in just three Illinois counties to allow hunters a modest take. By 1980, a total of five counties were open for turkey hunting, with 165 gobblers bagged that spring. By the mid-1980s, the Illinois harvest began topping 1,000 birds.

Hardly what turkey hunters today have come to expect!

Compare those numbers with 2020's harvest data, when 15,800 wild turkeys were harvested in the spring. That total includes the 2020 youth harvest of 1,744 birds. The statewide record total was set in 2006 with 16,569 turkeys.

The numbers of tags, hunting opportunities, and recorded harvest numbers of at this point in Illinois truly point to a conservation success story.

Even if you aren't an ardent turkey hunter, there is much to enjoy from wild turkeys in the spring — whether it be listening to them gobble across the landscape or just enjoying the show a group of strut-

ting and gobbling tom turkeys put on much to the delight of bird and wildlife watchers.

Indeed, most Illinoisans are pleased with this conservation success story, but we are also starting to see turkeys make their way into urban areas where they can be a bit problematic. Wild turkeys are large birds. The average adult male (gobbler or tom) stands 3-3½ feet tall and weighs 18-24 pounds. Females (hens) are smaller, typically 2½-3 feet tall and weighing 8-2 pounds.

When a bird of that size decides your yard or garden is their territory, they can indeed be a little intimidating. Not to mention that startling effect of a big tom turkey marching up to

the patio door pecking, fanning, and in general trying to knock the daylight out of its reflection!

The potential for conflicts between wild turkeys and people is real and is likely to continue as turkey populations grow and human development increases.

According to the Wildlife Illinois website, "In some cases, nuisance turkeys are not wild birds, but can be pen-raised turkeys from game-farm stock. While it is illegal to release penraised turkeys in Illinois, some turkeys have escaped or been released into the wild. These birds often look like wild turkeys, but they lack a wariness of humans, are not adept at living in the wild, and often associate people with food. Besides leading to humanturkey conflicts, the escape of pen-raised turkeys has wildlife biologists concerned about the spread of disease to wild flocks and the loss of genetic purity caused by hybridization."

If you are concerned about conflicts with wild turkeys and would like to reduce the potential for issues here are some tips:

• Do not feed wild turkeys. Providing food attracts more birds than would naturally be found at a site. It also makes the turkeys less wary of people, and this can become a problem during the breeding season. If wild turkeys have found your bird feeders, it's good to run them off before they become regular visitors.

- Temporarily cover windows or other reflective objects if they have attracted the attention of a misguided tom during breeding season. Turkeys have even been known to attack super shiny and reflective cars and trucks resulting in some nasty scratching to that prized vehicle!
- Protect flower beds and garden plants from marauding turkeys using polypropylene bird netting (1/2 or 3/4-inch mesh).
- Lastly, the Illinois Wildlife Code protects wild turkeys. It is illegal to kill (unless you have obtained the proper permits and licensing to legally harvest a wild bird) or remove wild turkey or to destroy their nests or eggs. If you need assistance with a turkey problem in an urban area, contact a local DNR District Wildlife Biologist.

For now though, just rejoice in the return of this much sought-after species and take a moment to observe and marvel at the turkey's annual spring show—it is worth watching.

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

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

### Managing climate risk is good business

With the wave of a wand, you're the boss of the Farm Credit System (FCS). You manage a portfolio of 592,000 ag-related customers holding 946,119 loans totaling \$315 billion – \$113 billion in real estate debt alone – according to December 2020 FCS data.

Those numbers keep most people up at night but you sleep like a baby because your staff understands risk and how to

"price" loans based on the Five Cs of lending: collateral, capital, character, capacity and conditions.

Recently, though, a sixth and seventh "C" have made your days longer and

your nights sweatier: climate change. How do you factor into your loans the unknown damage bigger, more frequent hurricanes, floods, droughts, harsher winters and hotter growing seasons will have on agriculture?

The only solace you've found so far is that you're not alone. Other ag lenders like commercial banks, insurance companies and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency are fumbling for answers, too. In fact, all have been fumbling for years, notes Dr. Steve Suppan, a senior policy analyst at the Institute of Agriculture & Trade Policy, in a detailed report, titled "Agricultural Finance for Climate Resilience," published last fall.

Worse, the best answers so far - " ... larger and increasingly frequent ad hoc disaster payments and increasing subsides for private crop insurance from taxpayers funds" – clearly are "not sustainable fiscally, economically or environmentally."

Still, a reformed federal crop insurance program could be a key element in a new, climate-flexible lending program. The reason is obvious: the need is so big – there was \$83.5 billion in "weather and climate-related (losses)" from 2001-16 – that only government can handle the risk.

More importantly, Suppan explains, "Crop and livestock insurance policies could be written ... to reduce premiums and increase indemnification payouts for farmers and ranchers complying with practices ... to reduce sources of greenhouse gas emissions."

The inverse could become law, too: insurance premiums will increase and coverage decrease for farm operations that add to climate woe.

That's smart government; much smarter, in fact, than underwriting questionable carbon sequestration schemes Big Ag groups are pushing

Lenders have other ways to encourage climate-friendly – and, in turn, loan friendly - agriculture.

For example, explains a recent report titled "Financing Resilient Agriculture," from the Environmental Defense Fund, "Lenders can establish differential interest rates" meaning lower rates - "for loans ... to farmers with positive attributes" like climate-friendly practices.

Right now, however, "Lenders have a blind spot when it comes to understanding the connections between conservation adoption and farm finances," especially with Big Ag's gassy livestock production methods.

That is something Congress can fix fast if it's committed to underwriting climate-resiliency in the coming dec-

For example, since the Farm Credit System is a GSE, or a government-

sponsored enterprise, it receives market benefits because of its special status. As such, Congress could require it to make climate-friendly lending the standard for all loans to farmers, ranchers, cooperatives, and rural communities.

Congress could require USDA to do the same in its direct ag lending, estimated at \$17 billion in 2018. If commercial lenders were added in, Congress could influence another \$170 billion in ag loans.

To get an even bigger climatechange bang for their dollars, Congress (and lenders) might offer even larger loan and larger federal crop and livestock insurance subsidies to farmers who add (or add to) a complementary crop/pasture/livestock enterprise to their farms or ranchers to maximize climate mitigation.

There are other, climate-affecting actions lenders could take – make soil health a measure in loan appraisal, write clean water incentives into loans, steer borrowers into longer-term "relationship" loans – to make agriculture more climate friendly and more sustainable.

Whatever action is taken, it needs to happen fast; there's no time to waste on phony solutions to real problems. And farmers and ranchers should flock to join if, that is, they really hope to live their creed as the "first environmentalists."

Besides, it's good business now and decades from now.

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

The same bank was held up on Nov. 11, 1990, when it was doing business as First Financial Bank of Elmwood. According to Elmwood Police Chief Aaron Bean, George A. Doubet held up the bank at 12:03 p.m.

Doubet, who lived at 301 N. Magnolia in Elmwood, was identified on a security camera. Officers received a search warrant to examine Doubet's car, Bean said. They found money in his vehicle and Doubet was then arrested.

Beck's arrest came nearly as quickly. Within hours after the April 20

robbery, Asbell called Beck "a person of inter-

Beck was released on parole last August after serving part of a 25-year sentence for a 2008 bank robbery in Champaign County. Beck is also a suspect in an April 19 hold-up at a Paxton convenience store and has previously been arrested in Piatt, Macon, Sangamon and Adams counties. In Livingston County, Beck was convicted of forgery in 1993. He was also charged with forgery and aggravated robbery in Sangamon County, aggravated robbery in Macon County and in Piatt County, theft of \$300-\$10,000, aggravated battery and theft of \$10,000-\$100,000.

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

### **Jumping worms** confirmed in Peoria Co.

Jumping worms have been confirmed in Peoria County, according to the local University of Illinois Extension Office.

These large worms can grow up to 4-8 inches long and have a dark, metallic body that is darker on the top than on the bottom. When handled they tend to jump and thrash.

Used for fishing bait, they are voracious eaters, which creates concerns that they can damage roots and alter soil's water-holding capacity.

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




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### Farm Bureau awards scholarships

The Peoria County Farm Bureau Foundation has awarded 10 scholarships worth \$1,000 apiece to Peoria County students pursing an agriculture related degree.

Since the Foundations inception in 1982, 136 Peoria County students have been awarded a scholarship. Total scholarship dollars awarded is \$123,150.


Job Feucht is the son of Mark and Paula Feucht. He is a graduate of Princeville High School and has an interest in pursuing a career in the cattle industry.

"Murals cost \$10,000 apiece, so one of the building owners has offered to pay for their mural, the other building owner is putting \$2,000 in. Each committee member is pledging \$100 to the project."

Murals will be put up at Scott Jehle's Elmwood Insurance Services, LLC, at 124 E. Main and at 112 E. Main St., a building owned by Pam and Fred Paige. Davis said murals will draw visitors to Elmwood to view the paintings.

Davis believes the effort has received \$1,000 in donations. Donations can be made at Farmers State Bank or to Fred Paige.

Davis requested a donation to the mural project from the City of Elmwood and the Elmwood Township. The city council voted to donate \$2,000 from the marketing fund

for this year.

In other business, Alderman Bob Paige said during his report that the cost for the city to replace the noon whistle would be \$2,364. The Elmwood Fire Department was to vote to pay the other half of the \$4,728 total cost of the siren. The city council previously approved an expenditure up to \$2,500 for the siren.

The council also approved extending the COVID-19 relief discounted liquor license fee of \$1 for Elmwood businesses, with the exception of Casey's General Store.

During committee reports, Alderman Nathan Brunnelson said hydrant flushing throughout Elmwood could occur as early as May.

### Illinois will lose seat in **Congress after Census**

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - The U.S. Census Bureau announced Illinois will lose a seat in Congress based on results of the 2020 census.

Illinois will move from 18 to 17 seats in the U.S. House, an expected result after some advocates had warned that an undercount could lead to the loss of two seats. The state has lost at least one congressional representative in eight of the last 9 decades after peaking at 27 seats in


Six other states will also lose a seat, including California, Michigan, Ohio, West Virginia, Pennsylvania and New York.

Illinois, Mississippi and West Virginia are the only three states to lose population over the past decade, Census Bureau officials said Monday.

According to data released Monday, the state has a total population of just over 12.8 million people, a drop of 0.1 percent compared to 2010.

Under the state constitution, members of the General Assembly draw new legislative boundaries following the decennial cen-

### Princeville library seeks community input

PRINCEVILLE – The Lillie M. Evans Library in Princeville is planning a community engagement meeting on Tuesday, May 4, at 7 p.m. at the library. Feedback will focus on a grant that LME Library recently received from the American Library Association (ALA) to help establish a Library of Things.

A Library of Things is any collection of objects that are outside the traditional items loaned by libraries. Objects can include items such as electronics, science kits, craft supplies, and equipment.

The meeting on May 4 will be an opportunity to discuss the circulation of equipment already owned by the library, as well as to consider items that the LME Library can purchase

that could assist local residents, businesses and organizations.

The library would like as many local organizational representatives as possible to attend this event, since that will help library officials better engage the community and execute a plan.

The Library of Things movement has expanded in the last decade and it makes sense to base it at the public library. LME library has established hours convenient to our community and is a safe and reliable place to pick up and drop off items. LME has a powerful circulation system in place that can be adapted to circulate equipment and we have the ability to track a variety of statistics. People are familiar with borrowing materials from libraries, so a Library of Things has the advantage of being both inno-

vative and familiar at the same time.

The grant from the American Library Association (ALA) is part of the association's Libraries Transforming Communities: Focus on Small and Rural Libraries initiative. Since 2014, ALA's Libraries Transforming Communities initiative has re-imagined the role libraries play in supporting communities. Our award includes facilitator training and \$3,000 in grant funds. ### BILLS: Stricter youth vaping rules likely

Passed the Senate

**Senate Bill 512** creates the Youth Vaping Act, which prohibits the use of certain harmful additives in electronic cigarettes – including vitamin E acetate – that are associated with lung illness.

It also would ban the use of deceptive advertising that encourages the use of electronic cigarettes, or vaping, to quit tobacco products, unless the product has U.S. Food and Drug Administration approval to market for such use.

It also amends the Prevention of Cigarette Sales to Persons under 21 Years of Age Act to include electronic cigarettes. The bill, sponsored by Lake Forest Democrat Julie Morrison, passed unanimously, 57-0.

Senate Bill 134 creates a Local Journalism Task Force to study areas underserved by local journalism in Illinois and review strategies to improve local news access and public policy solutions to develop more sustainable business models for local media outlets.

The task force would consist of members of the General Assembly, a member appointed by the governor, members from local journalism schools and members representing press groups, including the Illinois Legislative Correspondents Association and the Illinois Broadcasters Association. The bill is sponsored by Sen. Steve Stadelman, a Rockford Democrat who was a television reporter and anchor before joining the General Assembly. It passed 57-0.

Senate Bill 564 amends the Illinois School Code to require that history education taught in public schools in 8th grade include the study of the contributions made by Muslims and Muslim Americans to society.

It would also establish Jan. 17 as a holiday commemorating the birthday of Muhammad Ali, one of the greatest American boxers and a convert to Islam. The bipartisan bill, sponsored

by Naperville Democrat Laura Ellman, passed 46-3.

Senate Bill 2129 amends the state criminal code to allow a county state's attorney to petition the court to have a person's prison sentence reduced "if the original sentence no longer advances the interests of justice," according to the bill.

In its decision to resentence, the court can consider the person's disciplinary record while in prison, and whether age, time served or diminished physical condition have reduced the person's risk for future violence, among other factors.

It preserves the rights of crime victims, as afforded under the Rights of Crime Victims and Witnesses Act. Sponsored by Chicago Democrat Sen. Robert Peters, the bill passed narrowly by a vote of 31-17.

### Passed the House

House Bill 219 requires the State Board of Education to create specific benchmarks for schools to reduce the use of timeout, isolated timeout and physical restraints, with the goal of eliminating the practices within three years.

HB 219 and similar bills to reduce and end isolated timeouts in K-12 public schools were filed in the previous General Assembly in response to an investigation by ProPublica and the Chicago Tribune. The investigation found elementary students were being detained in "isolation rooms" for minor infractions, and teachers' use of these practices often violated the law.

The bill has received bipartisan support and passed out of the House unanimously, 113-0. Rep. Jonathan Carroll, a Northbrook Democrat who sponsored the bill, said HB 219 is the most important bill he has sponsored during his time in the General Assembly. A similar measure passed in the Senate.

**House Bill 2928** creates the Relieve College Costs Pilot Program Act to establish a pilot program for

a new four-year bachelor's degree pathway called the Fundamental Issues and Texts Humanities Degree that has total tuition costs capped at \$20,000

Under the bill, a program director for the new pilot program would develop the curriculum for one high school, one community college and one university that would include foundational texts from western civilization and the Enlightenment. The bipartisan bill, sponsored by Elmhurst Republican Deanne Mazzochi, passed 112-0.

House Bill 3922 would make June 19 an observed state holiday, Juneteenth National Freedom Day, to commemorate the day in 1865 when Union troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas, to free more than 250,000 enslaved black people.

A 2003 state law recognized Juneteenth National Freedom Day on the third Saturday in June but did not establish it as a state holiday. The bipartisan bill, sponsored by Chicago Democrat La Shawn Ford, passed 99-0. A similar bill passed in the state Senate.

House Bill 3235 would require the Illinois Department of Corrections to provide individuals with information about obtaining a voter identification card and information about voter registration at least 45 days before being released from prison.

It would also allow the Department of Corrections to contract with the state Board of Elections to participate in the automatic voter registration program and be designated as an automatic voter registration agency. The bill, sponsored by Chicago Democrat Camille Lilly, passed by a vote of 72-42.



### Farmington routs Elmwood-Brimfield, 59-0

ANNAWAN – Coltin Quagliano saw his first varsity action as a quarterback for Annawan-Wethersfield in a game vs.
Princeville four years ago. He also saw his final action vs. the

Princes last Friday.
You can't blame folks in

shortened season.

Quagliano passed for five touchdowns and 321 yards and ran for another score as A-W (4-1, 4-1 Lincoln Trail) used a big-play offense to claim its third straight LTC title.

"The kid is a stud. He's an all-state quarterback, there's no doubt," Princeville Coach Jon Carruthers said. "They never drove the ball on us. It was just big play after big play."

Among Quagliano's scoring passes were tosses of 80, 37, 34 and 27 yards. The 80-yarder came on the fourth play from

scrimmage. But after A-W got up 14-0 in the first on another Quagliano TD pass, Princeville began what would be a pattern of battling back.

Hunter Boland began finding holes, as he has all season despite playing with what this week proved to be a broken right hand. Sam Streitmatter capped the drive with a pass to Denver Hoerr for a score to make it 14-7.

Princeville replied after another quick A-W score to make it 22-14 on a Boland 2yard run. A-W scored again and then, in a key sequence, Princeville was stopped at the 1-yard line just before halftime.

"That was probably the turning point of the game," A-W Coach Logan Willits said.

The stop loomed larger when Boland scored early in the third to make the tally 30-22. From there, A-W got a rushing score from Quagliano and a final TD pass. For his career, Quagliano passed for 6,435 yards and 74 TDs and ran for 1,622 yards and 24 scores.


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
