State moving in right direction to lift restrictions

Stark 'cut ties' with principal New school board members seated

For The Prairie News WYOMING - The Stark County School District has "cut ties" with Junior/Senior High School Principal Jeff Ut-

singer, according to Superintendent Brett Elliott.

Utsinger has been out of the schools since March and last December was hired as Assistant Superintendent in Canton, where he was scheduled to have a start date of July



1. Utsinger had been a principal at Stark County since the 2019-20 school year.

Megan McGann was hired in March to replace Utsinger.

"Mr. Utsinger had accumulated enough vacation/leave days to close out the school year," Elliott said. "We agreed along with the board to cut ties with Mr. Utsinger and allow him to exhaust all leave time for the remainder of the year."

In other school-related business, at a special meeting on April 28, newly elected members of the Stark County School Board were sworn in to their seats. Elliott, who was president pro tempore, gave the oath to the newly elected board members.

Those members are Ann Orwig, Emily Holman, Brian Rewerts and newly elected board member Erin Price, who replaces Beth Rumbold. Price is from Toulon and is married to husband Bob Price, owner of Bob's Concrete.

Those four members join Bruce West, Dave Stewart and Matt Nagode on the board of education. After the swearing in ceremony, officers were elected. Orwig will return as board president for another two -year term, West as vice-president and Nagode as secretary. Barb Loane was approved as board treasurer and recording secretary.

The new board will meet the third Monday of every month, with the exception of January and February of 2022, when meetings will be Jan.18 and Feb. 22. All meetings will commence at 6 p.m. beginning in July. Currently the start time is 6:15 p.m. All meetings will be at the Stark County Elementary School cafeteria, unless designated otherwise.

Committee assignments were tabled to a later meeting in order to allow Orwig to confer with new member Price. Those committees are: Building and Finance; the Henry-Stark Cooperative board; the Stark County Foundation board; education and policy; plus athletics and extracurricular

Prior to seating the new board, the old board dealt with unfinished business. The Junior High English Language Arts curriculum and resources was approved for \$28,369 to be paid through SAVVA (a school resource/textbook company).

"City Clean Up" Dumpsters

On Saturday, May 8th, the City of Wyoming will have two Roll Off Dumpsters available for City residents only. They will be located south of the Water Tower on Main Street from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon. I.D.'s will be checked to verify residency. One dumpster will be for Appliances and metal items. The other dumpster will be for all other items (couches, chairs, mattresses, etc.). Residents will be responsible to unload items.

The following will not be accepted:

- 1) Electrical items.
- 2) Landscape waste
- 3) Hazardous material as in kerosene, fuel oil, paint
- thinners, batteries, and tires. 4) No bricks or building materials.

CLEAN UP DAYS

City of Wyoming's "Clean Up Days" everything to be picked up must be out by Monday, May 10th. The garbage truck will start in the North end of Wyoming and move south. They will not revisit an area they have already picked up.

It will be free to all residential households in the corporate limits of the City of Wyoming. Per state laws they cannot pick. up any electrical items. Large non electrical appliances and large pieces of furniture as in couches, large chairs, mattress and box springs will require a tag at a cost of \$10 each. Tags can be purchased at City Hall. City Hall's hours are Monday - Friday, 7:30 to noon and 12:30 to 4:00 p.m. Anything placed out should be easily picked up by one man and placed into the back of the garbage truck. Bundle items when necessary so they may be picked up quickly. The following will not be picked up:

1) Electrical items

2) Landscape waste.

3) Hazardous material as in kerosene, fuel oil, paint thinners, batteries and tires.

4) No bricks, building materials and long poles as these items damage the garbage truck.

Murphy's has the right to refuse to pick up any piles of garbage that is larger than a 4 ft. by 4 ft. pile or contained items. mixed in that are not allowed,

Any large items set out without the required bulk tags will be in violation of City's Ordinance and subject to possible fines.

Of mothers, career choices & the smell of dirt

Mothers and career choices float through my head as we race through this month of bittersweet celebrations and graduations.

My late mother, bless her heart, never told me what I had to do for a career. What mom did was support me ... in her own way. That meant she analyzed all the possible pit-

falls of a decision and worried endlessly about possible problems – then gave her blessing. She made her life harder than it had to be – something I increasingly empathize with after

inheriting the same traits.

But she also prepared me for this life of worrying too much by introducing me to the healing powers of dirt. It's a topic I write about often and one that is so near to my heart that – if ever some hard-up institution of learning needs a graduation speaker – that's what I will talk about. Graduate today, but keep dirt in your life always!

The onset of the pandemic brought that message home to many last spring. Sales of plants, vegetables and flowers skyrocketed. People who had nothing else to do because of COVID restrictions suddenly turned to gardening. They stuck their hands in dirt and some worries went away.

So it goes for me almost every day. Visitors "marvel" at the hundreds of trees that dominate the front of our office. The cleaning lady mutters about tripping over them. Staffers must deal with friendly insects that live in all the peat moss and pots. I suspect many leave our office pondering my sanity – which would be a very valid concern if not for the trees.

See, when things get bad, there's always a tree that needs tending or watering. When my undiagnosed A.D.D. kicks in after wearying of yet another story about yet another dry meeting, there are acorns to transplant or leaves to identify. Mom taught me that. When she was stressed or life sent her reeling, she went into her yard and dug her worries away.

Yes, dirt gets in the way of work sometimes. Cuffs on most of my dress shirts are stained. The bugs flying around are annoying. And growing trees takes lots of time. All of that is a small price for sanity and a fine way to remember mom, who had some quirky approaches to gardening.

The other day, my brother uncovered sheets of plastic bubble wrap mom had

put in her flower beds to keep weeds at bay. Previous archeological digs in the garden have uncovered layers of shingles she obviously thought might also help. They failed. Weeds always won and mom was too "natural" to use herbicides that might have got the job done. As if burying an old asphalt shingle or bubble wrap is somehow natural.

And she never wanted me to prune forsythias, fretting that would kill them. So I would hack them when she wasn't around – then deal with the repercussions ... until the following spring when she would note the yellow blooms looked even better. I miss those exchanges. The closest I come now is when my hands are in the dirt, my mind wanders and I hear her words.

Which brings me back to that graduation speech I will never deliver. Living with a career choice is tougher than ever in this fast-changing world. The job you like after high school or college might not be the job you like in your 40s or 50s – or it might not even exist. There's no easy answer. But among your coping mechanisms, keep your hands in the dirt after work or, better yet, at work in between tasks.

And remember the words of writer Margaret Atwood: "In the spring, at the end of the day, you should smell like dirt."













Warm spells & cold snaps create headaches

There once was a margarine commercial on TV warning us that "It's not nice to fool Mother Nature." Well, it's not very nice of her to fool us either. Those warm sunny days around Easter this year had us thinking spring had arrived. Some landscape plants got fooled too.

Magnolias are a good example. The warm spell put them in a blooming mood. Many were in full flower when recent nighttime temperatures dropped into the upper twenties.

I have three such magnolias. They are cultivars of Magnolia liliiflora, the lily-flowered magnolias. Two are out in the lawn and the third is sheltered by nearby oaks and hickories. Of course the two on the open lawn really took a hit. Their lovely open flowers weren't so lovely when they thawed out, turning to brown mush. Even the unopened buds were damaged. Although their inner petals were unscathed, the outer ones were frostbitten. Not pretty, even from a distance.

The sheltered magnolia had only minimum damage, even though it was really cold. I was surprised that the bare-branched trees provided it with any protection at all. Perhaps the trees limited air movement just enough to prevent the warm air near the ground from radiating skyward.

I have a fourth magnolia at my place that I am particularly enamored with. It's a yellow-flowered variety, Magnolia 'Louis', which blooms later than those I've already discussed. When the buds are about to open they look like a flock of yellow finches perched on the branches. They open to primrose yellow cup-shaped flowers. Rather spectacular.

This year I went into panic mode when the weatherman issued freeze warnings. I wasn't about to let Mother Nature massacre the yellow flowers, which were in the tight bud stage. Mine is a young tree, only ten feet tall or so. I bungee-corded the flexible branches up tight to the trunk and covered the whole thing

with four layers of floating row cover, that lightweight spun poly material used to protect garden crops. I tied the corners together at the base of the tree and hung a 100 watt light bulb inside the "tent" to provide a little heat.

I removed the covers when the prognosticators gave the "All Clear!" The buds looked just fine and last week they opened up into beautiful yellow flowers. My efforts paid off. Take that, Mother Nature! While it's possible the tree would have been okay without my intervention, since it blooms later and the buds were still tight, I wasn't taking any chances.

At my former homestead, I had a star magnolia, M. stellata, which has pure white flowers consisting of 12-18 narrow strap-like petals. It typically blooms in early spring and that's a problem. Every year mine was covered with promising buds. But I can count on two fingers the number of years its flowers had not turned to mush in freezing temperatures. After a frigid night, the whole shrub would look as though someone had decorated it with wet Kleenexes.

Windy days wreaked havoc on those delicate narrow petals too. So even though a specimen of M. stellata in full bloom is a genuine Kodak moment, I don't recommend planting it around here. While you may have a place protected from the wind, those sudden cold spells are murder on such an early bloomer.

Meanwhile in the flower garden, the daffodils, snowflakes and bluebells bowed their heads down close to the ground in the frosty weather but quickly recovered in the warm sunshine. I'm always amazed at how durable they are in the cold. Warm breezy weather, on the other hand, shortens their flowers' lifespan considerably. It's always something.

Old-fashioned bleeding hearts, Dicentra spectabilis, another delicate early bloomer, easily sustains a light frost, but its fleshy stalks will succumb to a hard freeze. I learned that the hard way last year.

This time I covered them with a couple layers of row cover. That protected them from the cold, even down to 28 degrees. Additional layers would provide even more safety.

So, Mother Nature, be nice. Please give us springs with nice gradual warm-ups. Quit foolin' around.







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Heirloom flowers offer fragrance, pollen

Illinois Extension URBANA – Spring brings thoughts of beautiful, colorful, fragrant blooms that brighten landscapes after a long winter.

But while many anticipate the arrival of the first flowers, pollinators, too, are on the lookout. Heirloom flowers provide them with more of the resources they require.

"Hybrids are a cross between two flower types that create specific traits such as flower shape, color, plant height, or disease resistance," says Nicole Flowers-Kimmerle, a University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator. "These varieties are very uniform in the first season of growth. Seeds saved from those first plants develop into plants with much more variation."

Heirloom varieties are open-pollinated. These flowers stay true to type if another variety does not cross-pollinate them.

"If you plan to save seed from your heirloom flowers, plant other varieties of the same plant at least 3 feet away from each other," says Flowers-Kimmerle. "Plant them closer together to experiment with creating your own varieties."

As good sources of pollen and nectar, these blooms attract bees, butterflies, and hummingbirds. Gardeners can plant heirloom flowers in groups to maximize benefits. Learn more about pollinator pockets at go.illinois.edu/Pollinator-Info.

"Heirloom varieties are also known to have more fragrance than modern hybrids," says Flowers-Kimmerle. "You may notice that old-fashioned roses and sweet peas have more scent than newer varieties. Finding a unique bloom color that varies from the current trend is also possible with heirloom varieties."

Because heirloom varieties are usually taller, they are excellent for cutting gardens and should be supported with stakes. These heirloom annuals, which can be planted directly into the garden, will produce an abundance of blooms.

• Sweet peas, Lathyrus odoratus, have beautiful, colorful, fragrant blooms. This vining plant does best in cool weather and is one of the first blooming annuals in the garden. Harvesting flowers encourages more bloom growth, and they will produce blooms until the heat of summer. Look for old-fashioned heirloom varieties for the best sweet pea fragrance.

• **Bachelor's buttons**, or cornflowers, Centaurea cyanus, are hardy annuals that self-sow and are great for a flower bed or as an addition to cut flower bouquets. "These pretty little blooms range in color from white to blue to burgundy," says Flowers-Kimmerle. "They are a lovely flower to add to a cottage-type garden."

• **Cosmos**, Cosmos bipinnatus, are delicate-looking flowers that are drought tolerant and prefer poor soils. Varying in color from white to pink, burgundy, yellow, and orange, these blooms are lovely bouquets. This plant will produce flowers from summer to fall.

• Four o'clocks, Mirabilis jalapa, are easy to grow from seed. Flowers open in the cooler evening temperatures, and their trumpet-shaped blooms have a lemony-sweet scent that attracts hummingbirds and moths. Flowers can be white, yellow, or magenta with stripes or splashes of colors on the petals.

Growing 'cole crops' like broccoli is easy

Now is the time to set out young plants of cabbage, broccoli and the like in the garden. All of the cole crops – cabbage, broccoli, Brussels sprouts, kale, kohlrabi and collards- are members of the Mustard family. "Cole" comes from the Latin for "stem," referring to the edible stems of most members of the family.

Cole crop plants prefer cool spring weather and can easily tolerate frosts and light freezes.

New gardeners often won't try any cole crops because they think they're difficult to grow. But that's not true, especially for cabbage, broccoli and kohlrabi. They're really no more trouble than tomatoes and peppers.

Homegrown cabbage is much sweeter than storebought, in my opinion. Al-

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though cabbage can be stored for a long time in a refrigerator, it loses that crispy crunch and

sweet flavor over time. Lord only knows how long those store-bought cabbages have lingered in coolers from field to store. It always tastes best fresh from the garden.

If you started plants from seed indoors, they'll need some preconditioning (hardening off) to tolerate the outdoor environment with its cold nights, strong sunlight and wind. Toughen them up by setting them outside in a shady spot for a few days, bringing them in when nights are colder than 40 degrees or so.

During the hardening off process, plants strengthen

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their cuticle layer. The plants become stiffer and stronger, more resilient.

You can also harden off tender young plants by planting them in the garden and protecting them with a floating row cover. Row cover material breathes and allows rain and sunlight to pass through. You may be tempted to use plastic sheets but don't. A sunny day will cook your cabbage and a hard freeze will burn any plants in contact with the plastic.

Cole crops planted early in the season get established and growing before the hot dry summer days arrive. And they will be growing during the longest days of the year, perfect for forming large firm heads.

Just like tomato plants, cole crops do best when the soil is kept evenly moist. This is especially true for cabbage. If subjected to a dry spell followed by rain, a cabbage's inner leaves will begin to grow too quickly, causing the head to split open. If that happens, it's best to harvest it right away.

And here's a neat trick. If your cabbage is ready to harvest, but you're not ready to use it, grab hold of the whole plant and give it a quarter twist. That will sever some of the roots and slow down growth.

The best way to keep soil moisture levels even is to use a layer of mulch. Cole crops are heavy feeders so use a garden fertilizer according to directions.

Flea beetles, cabbage worms and cabbage loopers attack most cole crops, but covering the plants with a floating row cover right away after planting will keep them at bay. You can leave the cover over the plants all the way to harvest. A natural pesticide, commonly called Bt, or Dipel, or Thuricide, will control cabbage worms and loopers without harming beneficial insects.

Growing broccoli is a cinch, but it's important to harvest the main head before it breaks into bloom. Don't let those little buds open into yellow-petaled flowers, or the plant will cease production.





Spring sports in full swing

Stark County track starts out strong; baseball opens with win

For The Prairie News The Stark County boys and girls track teams are out of the starting blocks fast this spring.

The Rebels started strong on April 30, with both teams placing second in a six-team meet at Wethersfield High School. Tuesday at Galva was even better, as the boys team won with a record 117 points and took first in nine events while the girls had five first-place finishes.

At Galva, Keagan Newton won four events and improved his triple jump ranking to 12th in the state. Blake Orwig also won two events and set a school record in the discus.

At Wethersfield, Orwig won both discus and shotput for SC, which also got a first-place finish from Newton in the 300 hurdles (46.85). Newton was also second in the triple jump (12.46 meters) while Colby Carroll was third (11.19 meters)

Other top boys finishes at Wethersfield were posted by Carroll (second in the 400 in 54.82 and third in the 100 in 12.11); Payton Stahl (second in the 800 in 2:16.16); and Alex Welch (second in the 3,200 in 14:26.21). The Rebels 4x400 relay was also second at Wethersfield.

The girls team is also poised for a strong season and had seven firstplace finishes at Galva. Lindley

Both Stark County teams run at Princeville today, as do both Galva *Continued on Page 10*







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






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
