No more dairy

Demolition of Elmwood dairy starts Monday

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD - Demolition of a controversial dairy south of town starts Monday, and new owners of the property pledge there will never be a concentrated animal feeding operation there again.

Doug and Diane Oberhelman purchased the 73-acre property after a Sheriff's auction in late May for \$160,000 from the Bank of Yates City. The Oberhelmans are the fifth owners of the dairy, whose last operators declared bankruptcy and were forced to halt operations.

That should effectively close the book on a mass milking operation that

opened in the late 1990s and has struggled to find success ever since, with problems ranging from bankruptcy to battles with the Environmental Protection Agency.

There have been no cattle on the property since the most recent dairy operator the Etcher family of Lovilia, Iowa – declared bankruptcy in 2018. Doug Oberhelman said there will be no more dairy cows there again, either.

"For 20 years, that's been an eyesore and a nose sore for all of us. Moving forward, we want to make sure it's something everybody in the community will be proud of and we'll have no issues with the neighbors," said Oberhelman, a former

Every July day offers a new blooming daylily

ELMWOOD - Ardeanne Ekena points to a bloom and smiles.

"That one is 'Ruby Red Spider.' And there's 'Butter Pecan," she says, gesturing toward an orange and gold flower that has fancy ruffled edges.

Nearby stands 'Leprechaun Eyes,' which is not far from 'Doll House' and 'Disco Rose' – all planted in welltended flowerbeds behind the rural house north of Elmwood

that Ekena and husband Ron have lived in since 1973.

Daylily season has arrived in central Illinois, and not just along roadsides or at old

farmsteads, where the familiar orange-flowering variety stands mute testament to those who planted bulbs years

ago. Also known as corn lily

or ditch lily, the orange daylily is the most common variety of an Asian plant that has become nearly ubiquitous across the Midwest thanks to its ease of care and abundant flowers.

The more colorful flowers that bloom in Ekena's yard are every bit as hardy as the familiar orange ones, but Ardeanne's are much less common and far showier than their orange cousins. Since the 1990s, Ardeanne has steadily added to her collec-

Caterpillar Inc. CEO who owns 1,437 acres west of the former dairy. "I could see where we could bale hay from time to time and maybe graze a few pastured cattle. But there will never be an issue with a CAFO or mass manure on that property again."

Previous attempts to sell the dairy at auction in 2019 met with no success, as some would-be operators said the 1,800-head operation was too small to make a profit.

Starting Monday, that will no longer be an issue. Hitchcock Scrap Yard from Canton is scheduled to start tearing down, hauling away and recycling steel from buildings on the site.

"Everything metal on the property will be gone with the exception of the big shop on the north end and the scale," Oberhelman said. "Everything down to the cement."

Lots of cement. About 230,000 square feet worth. Disposal of that will take longer than demolition of the buildings, Oberhelman said.

"I'm going to take some time to see what options there are for that. Ideally I would like to break it up and remove it," Oberhelman said. "But people will be able to see a lot of progress very quickly."

Eventually, Oberhelman

said he will plant trees, prairie grasses and native forbs and wildflowers on the property. That's why the LLC affiliated with the property is Elmwood Habitat LLC.

"Our family is very committed to the Peoria region and we all love Elmwood," Diane Oberhelman said. "Doug and I and our family want to be great stewards of the land, leave it a better place and hope our small part in returning the dairy land to habitat does just that."

After the buildings are gone, Doug Oberhelman plans to address the 41-million gallon waste lagoon, which has been at the center of several problems for the dairy.

Oberhelman said the current level of liquid in the lagoon is "well within the EPA requirement" or he would not have purchased the property. His plan later this summer is to pump out all liquid to spread on farm fields.

"It's mostly water at this point," he said. "That will reveal the amount of solid in the bottom. Then we'll determine what to do with that. At that stage it will be no harm to anyone and no risk of harm to anyone."

Oberhelman said he will grant an easement to Elmwood Township for upkeep of an old Civil War cemetery located on the property.

"Everyone has been very positive, which makes me feel good about this," Oberhelman said.

The Oberhelmans also praised the efforts of the Bank of Yates City, which wound up with the property after the Etcher bankruptcy.

"They did a phenomenal job for the year or two they had it, cleaning up the manure and dead animals and all the organic material that was creating problems," Oberhelman said. "They were the best owner of that property in 20 years."







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

Of the value of heart doctors & Sir Chuck

My rambling path never crossed that of the late Dr. Dale Geiss, which is good and bad, it seems.

Bad because he sounds like a fascinating and inspiring man.

Good because meeting Geiss would likely have meant my ticker needed work and he would have probably told me to stop eating pie for breakfast.

Geiss was a heart surgeon and, by

most accounts, he was one of the best in Peoria, where he spent much of his career. His accomplishments at OSF St. Francis Hospital are legendary and former coworkers speak with admiration of

the man who died June 11 after completing more than 12,000 surgeries.

Among those parising Geiss is Shannon Glover of Elmwood, who spent hours beside him in open-heart suites at OSF and Methodist hospi-

"I can't say enough about how much he taught me to be the nurse I am today," Glover said. "He was often tough on us one minute, but then laughing with us the next. He truly was a legend in cardiac surgery, for adults and pediatrics."

Many others emailed similar anecdotes, including Farmington native **Nicole Largent** of Wyoming.

You get a feel for why they took time to write after reading tributes to Geiss posted under his obituary at woolsey-wilton.com. Family after family wrote notes about loved ones Geiss had saved. Some included pictures of their infant children, with follow-up pictures of these "babies" who are now adults.

That message should resonate with anyone. It strikes home even closer for me because my wife had succesful open-heart surgery when she was 5 years old. Living in Decatur at the time, her best option was to travel to St. Louis to find a surgeon who could handle the procedure. Many face similar long journeys to find topnotch care.

We don't. We are truly blessed to be so close to major medical centers where doctors like Dale Geiss can and do make a positive difference in so many lives.

Leave it to Doubet: **Scott Doubet** of Elmwood is never at a loss for words. And he usually comes up with a few worth hearing. Most recently, Doubet said "sovereignty" was misspelled in the stained-glass state seal that crowns the Illinois Capitol. Sounds crazy, right? Nope. Turns out a 19th-century artist painted the word as "sovereignity" in a banner that's held in the beak of an eagle. While the glass was cleaned in the 1980s, the misspelling was left because of its historical significance. ... Parting shot: Somebody told me recently they wish Charles Barkley was president. Not me. I just hope Barkley sticks with his current job as an analyst on TNT's Inside the NBA – the closest thing to must-see TV left. I've laughed out loud almost nightly at the antics of Sir Chuck and Shaquille **O'Neal** during the playoffs. 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

This time the scoreboard tells the whole story

In farming, the late Farm Journal economist John Marten liked to say, we keep score with acres.

Right or wrong, acres – and the wealth they represent – have always

been a measure of personal and professional success. The converse is true, too; the lack or loss of acres usually implies failure of sorts.

That critical

measure is at the center of the latest U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) effort to remedy its well-documented, "vast" and "systematic" discrimination

against "minority farmers" through Section 1005 of the recently enacted \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan, commonly referred to as the 2021 Covid relief package.

In the new legislation, Congress set aside as much as \$4 billion to address the devastating impact USDA's failure to fully implement and fairly administer color-blind, government ag lending programs. That failure can, as usual, be found in the numbers.

According to USDA, 949,889 Black farmers worked 41.4 million acres in 1920. Today, just 48,697, or only 1.4 percent of American's 3.4 million farmers, own or rent 4.7 million acres, a staggering 88 percent less than a century earlier.

By any measure – acres, farmers, percentages - that's a virtual wipe-

There are many reasons for the steep decline - industrialization of the U.S. economy, domestic migration, the rise of new ag technologies – but one, indisputable reason that USDA itself acknowledges is its widespread discrimination in ag lending programs. That overt action helped fuel an exodus of black and socially disadvantaged farmers from U.S. agriculture.

A June 18 federal court filing by the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) charts decades of USDA loan program discrimination despite several court-ordered and Congressionally-mandated remediation

The revealing, cathartic DOJ filing came in response to a June 10 federal court order that required USDA to halt the \$4 billion loan relief program. The order came after the Wisconsin Institute of Law and Liberty sued USDA on behalf of "white farmers who" contended they were "not eligible for the same debt relief," according to DTN.

The Wisconsin lawsuit isn't the only legal challenge the \$4 billion program faces but it is getting the most attention. After the federal judge issued the temporary restraining order to freeze USDA's action, the lead attorney for the white farmers praised the judge's order by noting the "Biden Administration is radically undermining bedrock principles of equality under the law."

Nonsense, wrote DOJ lawyers in their tart, 42-page reply to the judge's order. Almost every government effort to redress past discrimination in USDA lending programs has been litigated - some, repeatedly – and rendered legal, it noted. The 2021 program is meant to finally fix a broken bureaucracy that USDA now readily admits it has repeatedly failed to remedy.

Remarkably, that failure continued

even in the early Covid relief programs because, DOJ explains, "...nearly the entirety of USDA's Market Facilitation Program," a \$14.4 billion Trump Administration scheme to counter the market impact of its export tariff policy, "and almost all of the \$9.2 billion provided through USDA's first Coronavirus Food Assistance Program, went to non-minority farmers."

How does USDA send almost \$24 billion in no-strings-attached taxpayer money to U.S. farmers and ranchers in two years and socially disadvantaged farmers and ranchers end up with nothing more than chicken feed?

Simple, DOJ notes in its June 18 court filing, "Congress again found ... the lingering effects of systemic discrimination in USDA programs."

In fact, it added, quoting Senate Ag Committee Chair Debbie Stabenow, a Michigan Democrat, USDA's "latent barriers and historic discrimination" remain so strong that "73 percent of Black farmers were not even aware of the agricultural aid provision of the[se] coronavirus rescue programs."

That's unbelievable until you listen, really listen, to Stabenow's words. Systemic discrimination. Latent barriers. Historic discrimination.

This is 2021, not 1921 or even

But you wouldn't know it by the scoreboard.

Elmwood OKs new HVAC for elementary school

 $ELMWOOD-The\ Elmwood$ Elementary School is poised to have a new HVAC system installed after this school year.

The Elmwood School Board met on June 23 and among the action items for the night was approval of a \$110,000 agreement with Keith Engineering of Brimfield to design, bid and ultimately award the HVAC project. Work is slated to be completed in the summer of 2022. Funding comes from the federal CARES program.

More good news on the financial front came from Superintendent Chad Wagner, whose end-of-year projections showed another year "in the black" for the district. Wagner

said the district saw positive gains in all Operations Funds and he expects to present a final Fiscal Year 2021 report at the July board meet-

The board also received good news regarding the district's insurance policy for 2021-22. The premium with the Unland Companies decreased from the previous year by \$20,127 to a cost of \$90,109, which the board voted to approve.

Wagner reported that the board had received many thank-you cards after each staff member received a \$750 gift card last month as a show of appreciation for their efforts during the pandemic.

Summer school wrapped up in the last full week of June and custodial staff will be busy cleaning the

school buildings over the rest of the summer in preparation for next school year.

Parents of Elmwood students can expect to receive registration information after July 1 according to Elementary Principal Marcy Brugger. The first day of school for students is set for Aug. 17.

In personnel, the board approved:

- Hiring Amber Burnett and Rachel Whitney as part-time paraprofessionals for the 2021-22 school year for \$13 per hour.
- Employing Steve Herridge as junior varsity softball coach.
- Hiring Bruce Bouchez as a firstshift custodian in the Elementary School for \$12 per hour.

Pritzker says Delta variant coul be an issue

SPRINGFIELD - Gov. JB Pritzker stressed the importance of COVID-19 vaccinations Monday as positivity rates and hospitalizations continued to decline but variants of the virus have proven to be more transmissible and dangerous to those who are not vaccinated.

The governor cited a central Illinois youth camp that has led to more than 85 associated COVID-19 cases.

The governor said at least one "unvaccinated adult" from the central Illinois camp was hospitalized after the outbreak. According to an Illinois Department of Public Health news release, "although all campers and staff were eligible for vaccination, IDPH is aware of only a handful of campers and staff receiving the vaccine." The outbreaks occurred in Schuyler and Adams counties, according to a news re-

IDPH had identified 9,697 COVID-19 variants in the state. That includes 84 instances of the Delta variant.

Pritzker said his administration expects the Delta variant, which has proven more transmissible and dangerous to unvaccinated individuals, "to dominate our cases statewide by

the fall." He and others appeared masked at a Chicago news conference. He said he was wearing a face covering because he thought it was "appropriate to do so."

According to IDPH, 53.1 percent of Illinoisans over age 12 were fully vaccinated as of Monday, while the number was 55.7 percent for those 18 and older and 73.7 percent for those 65 and older. For those receiving at least one dose, the numbers were 68.8 percent, 71.3 percent and 89.8 percent, respectively.

Still, Pritzker said, that left more than 5 million Illinoisans not fully vaccinated and therefore "unprotected."

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

Continued from Page 1 tion of cultivars and can now enjoy more than 54 different blooms over the course of a summer. Flowering starts in late June and will continue through the end of July.

"My mother [Louisa Weller] got me interested. She liked daylilies," Ardeanne said.

Each morning during flowering season, Ardeanne wakes up and starts removing spent blooms. Each day, she is greeted by new blooms while deadheading the old ones.

"This is just the beginning," Ardeanne said Monday in between rain showers. "Before long [the back yard] will be a sea of color."

That's because over the years, the Ekena's acreage has transformed from a working farm into a garden space. Gone are the sheep and cattle that once grazed on a pasture east of the house. Gone too is the barn and hog shed that housed the Ekena's livestock.

In place of pasture there is now a green, grassy lawn and flower beds.

"I wish I still had the sheep, then I wouldn't have to mow all the time," said Ron, who figures it takes him three hours to mow the yard.

But he too plays a role in the daylily operation. In his working days, Ron, 83, farmed, raised livestock and for more than 30 years made seed corn at the nearby Shissler Seed Company.

He has put that agronomy background to use once again with daylilies, keeping busy crossing different varieties.

In one part of the yard, young daylilies are growing next to wooden stakes. On each stake is a number that tells Ron which cross is growing where. His goal is to develop a new color strain.

"I don't care what it is, just so it's different," he said.

Good luck with that. Some estimate there are more than 35,000 daylily varieties, with more being discovered all the time by the legion of daylily fans across the country. Among those is Theresa

Among those is Theresa Roth, whose Roth Daylily Farm in East Peoria features more than 3,000 different plants. The Roth garden is a favorite place to visit (and shop) for Ardeanne.

Once planted, daylilies are very easy to raise, she said. She adds horse manure mulch to the flower beds occasionally and Ron uses a pre-emergent weed killer called Preen to help keep weeds at bay. But aside from weeding and removing spent flowers, the daylilies can pretty much fend for themselves.


"They're just like weeds, they're easy to grow," Ardeanne said. "But they do like the sun."

As for picking an overall favorite, that's tough.

"It's hard for me to pick a favorite," she said. "There's beauty in all of them."






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Hall of Fame lures Billtown baseball caravan

For a team of young men with a passion for the game of baseball, this trip could only further feed that

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

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

Illinois economy surges in first quarter

SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois economy showed strong signs of recovery during the first quarter of 2021 as businesses continued to reopen from the pandemic and direct government payments flowed to businesses and individual consumers.

Data released last week from the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis showed the state's economy grew at an annual rate of 6.4 percent during the quarter as its gross domestic product – the market value of all goods and services produced by labor and property – approached its pre-pandemic level.

That growth rate was on par with the rest of the nation and slightly ahead of the pace set by most of Illinois' surrounding states.



Tomato blossom end rot can be prevented

Blossom end rot is the scourge for any tomato

grower. What starts as a light tan spot at the end of the fruit where the blossom was, will expand and eventually turn black and leath-

"When it comes to tomatoes, it is most commonly seen on larger fruited cultivars or long-fruited varieties like roma," says Ken Johnson, a University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator. "Blossom end rot can also affect peppers, eggplants, squash, and watermelons."

Contrary to popular belief, blossom end rot is not caused by a disease or insects. It is actually a physiological disorder caused by low levels of calcium. Usually, it's not an issue of a lack of calcium in the soil, but rather how well the plants absorb calcium.

"Plant leaves transpire and naturally lose water so they then take up more water along with nutrients from the soil," Johnson says. "Anything that gets in the way of transpiration can reduce calcium uptake."

Drought stress, inconsistent soil moisture, cold or waterlogged soils and rapid vegetative growth due to too much nitrogen fertilization can all lead to blossom end rot. High concentrations of ammonium, potassium, and magnesium in the soil, often due to over-fertilization, can also cause issues.

"Others argue that blossom end rot is caused by abiotic stress to the plants," says Johnson.

Drought, high light intensity, or heat cause cells in the fruits to die which results in blossom end rot.

Regardless of what exactly causes blossom end rot, there are steps to pre-

Start by picking tomato varieties that are less prone to developing blossom end rot, such as 'Celebrity,' 'Mountain Pride,' and cherry tomatoes. Do a soil test to find out the calcium levels and if calcium should be added.

Avoid excessive fertilization of plants during early fruiting, especially with fertilizers using ammonium as their nitrogen source (ammonium competes with calcium up-

Water plants deeply

starting when fruits first form and continuing throughout the growing season. In general, plants need about one inch of moisture per week, whether from rain or irrigation. If hot, dry weather is predicted, make sure plants are well watered before it arrives and continue watering daily. Adding a layer of mulch can help conserve and even out the moisture.

Containers dry quickly, so these plants are more likely to develop blossom end rot without consistent watering. Potted plants should be fertilized.

Unfortunately, once a fruit has blossom end rot, there is nothing you can do. Foliar applications of calcium don't help much because the calcium doesn't move into the fruit well. It is best to remove the fruit and discard it.



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


