

Galva hires firm to set up new TIF

GALVA – The Galva City Council voted unanimously to hire Moran Economic Development of Edwardsville to get things in place for a new downtown TIF district, since the current TIF expires Dec.

Moran will charge \$28,900 to create the new TIF, whose boundaries will change, and \$125 per hour to close the old downtown TIF not to exceed \$5,000.

In other business, the council passed the petition, agreement and

ordinance to annex the former Herbster property owned by the Galva Park District into the city of

The council also unanimously agreed to close the railroad crossing near the Catholic Cemetery. BNSF railroad will pay the city \$165,000 to close the crossing. Money will be used in the motor fuel tax fund.

The council passed its appropriations ordinance, which was up \$353,530 over last year. City Administrator David Dyer said the increase is due to a grant the city is receiving from the American Rescue Plain grant for water, sewer and broadband work of up to \$350,000.

During public comment, Galva resident Paul Bersell addressed the council regarding tractors, trailers, and campers sitting in residential yards. He gave each alderman a picture of what he sees in a neighbor's yard: three tractors, a long trailer and a camper.

Bersell also thanked the city for what they have done to clean up more than 100 properties and said he was not coming to the meeting

Back to school

Masks optional at Stark Co. schools

WYOMING – During its July 19 meeting, the Stark County School Board of Education approved a Return to Learn plan for the 2021-22 school year, which is scheduled to open Aug. 18.

The plan was shared with the public on July 16 and will make wearing of masks optional, among other things, though changes may be necessary if guidelines change.

The July 19 meeting started with a public hearing, during which Superintendent Brett Elliott provided an overview of the plan.

Elliott said 10 community members sent emails supporting the optional mask policy. One member had concerns about masks being required on buses. Elliott said the bus guideline is a CDC/IDPH requirement and is not under local control.

During public comment, Phillip Stubbs asked about the 30 minute drop-off before school policy, which is for convenience. He was informed that policy has been reinstated.

Gloria McCauley inquired why the school district is promoting the vaccine. She said Continued on Page 2

Galva recommends masks for H.S., requires masks for grades PreK-6

GALVA – At a special meeting on Monday, July 26, the Galva School Board voted 6-0 to approve a "Return to Learn" plan that spells out expectations for remote learning, mask regulations and more.

While the plan is subject to change, at present, Galva schools recommend the use of masks indoors for high school students, staff and administrators who are not vaccinated. Students and staff in grades PreK through 6 will be required to wear masks while indoors, since the COVID vaccine is not available to children under the age

The first day of school for Galva students is Aug. 16.

This is Why You Should Start

Masks will be required of any students who ride buses.

Remote learning will be made available for students only while they are under quarantine for close contact.

Social distancing will continue in the classrooms, providing at least 3 feet of distance between students.

During the public comment, Amanda Norway, the **GEA Association President** expressed thanks on behalf of GEA for all the work and effort that went into the plan.

The plan had also been discussed during a July 19 regular school board meeting. At that meeting, Norway addressed the board about a

Continued from Page 1 coach getting a summer stipend and being hired as a Dean of Students and PE teacher without the jobs being advertised.

Norway said it seems like we are "sweetening the pot to get a football coach." She said if a summer stipend was paid, a grievance will be filed.

"We are a school district not a sports club," she said.

The board did not answer but Superintendent Joe Becker said he would meet with Norway.

The coach in question is Tyler Nichols, who was officially hired to coach Galva's first season as an 8man football team at the July 19 meeting. He was also hired as a PE teacher and Dean of Student Serv-

Nichols is a graduate of Macomb High School and has been coaching football since 2004, when he began as a volunteer assistant at Macomb. Most recently, Nichols had worked as a special education teacher in the Princeton school district, where he also worked as a football assistant.

Nichols has also coached at South Fulton (JV coach, 2005-08) and at Kewanee, where he was head coach from 2014-19 and defensive coordinator from 2009-13. Nichols had a 23-34 record at Kewanee and his

teams made the playoffs in 2013, 2016 and 2017.

In other business, the board approved several goals from a recent board retreat:

- The Galva School District will return all students to a pre-pandemic instructional environment in all buildings in accordance with the current ISBE/IDPH guidance
- Galva will adopt a science curriculum and resources with fidelity across grade levels using researchbased methods, Illinois State Stand/NGSS, and best practices.
- Projects will be scheduled each year, with expenses ranging between \$200,000 and \$300,000. Projects will

be selected by the board with input already collected by the Facilities Working Groups.

• Galva will keep its community informed about positive accomplishments, timely events and critical issues. Expanded use of the district website will be the primary vehicle for enhanced communication.

Becker reported that Galva applied for an Esser III grant for \$1,292,000. Becker said 20 percent of the grant must be used to combat learning loss.

Becker also said that window installers met with administrators. Windows were supposed to have been put in this summer, but due to supply shortages, the project is scheduled for this fall. Contractors plan to work from 3-10 p.m. and full days when school is not in session.

Becker said he will send letters to neighbors, but does not expect much noise from the installation, which should be finished by Thanksgiving.

The board also approved the following hirings:

- Casey Miller as assistant football coach.
- Tayler Kuenneth as cross-country coach.
- · David Saunders and Gaylene Gilbert as bus drivers.
- · Ladosha Bystery as food service coordinator.

Elliott said that as a public school, Stark County provides information to the public, which includes hosting vaccinations for the Emergency Management Agency, and that families can decide whether or not to partici-

Other highlights of the plan, which could change due to new guidance from the CDC, include:

- Remote learning will only be temporarily available for a student placed in quarantine due to close contact or a positive COVID test. Students in grades 2-12 will livestream classes using a school-issued device.
- Social distancing will

be maintained in all school areas to the greatest extent feasible.

- Student meals will be free for 2021-22.
- Temperature checks and symptom screenings will be discontinued. Parents should keep children home from school if they are sick or exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19.
- Athletic programs will run as normal with activity fees charged and gate admissions for home events.
- Field trips and fundraisers will resume as normal.

In other business at the board meeting, finance committee chair Bruce West presented an update regarding renovation bids submitted by July 15. Thirteen of 15 bids were within parameter ranges, with two bids higher than expected. Those two bids are to be rebid and are to be opened

Board President Ann Orwig presented an update from the Athletic Activities committee. The group,

which includes the athletic director, coaches and board representatives, will meet before each sporting sea-

High School Principal Megan McGann presented a revised high school curriculum guide for fiscal year 2022. No action was taken since this was a first reading of the guide. Spanish I will be offered for the upcoming year.

Shirley Striping was approved to stripe the football fields. Also approved was an annual agreement with Tri-County Opportunities Council for the school to provide food service for the Head Start

And a \$20,549 purchase

of 13 round lunch tables was approved for the elementary school cafeteria. After executive session,

I never minded the searches and, after a bit, got pretty good at reading the cultivator ridges – or, really, the lack of ridges – that hinted on what row I might find the missing parts. Along the way I often found other items like arrowheads, musket balls and wrenches dropped by You Know

Then, sometime in the late 1970s, an acquaintance brought a metal detector to the farm to, as he explained, "see what we couldn't see."

One afternoon in a field with the detector delivered several broken ½ -inch cultivator bolts (no surprise), a handful of musket balls (whoa) and a wooden-handled (missing), foot-long monkey wrench.

Monkey wrenches were Honey's favorite tool because they allowed

him to over-tighten every bolt on the cultivator and, if the need arose, a quick turn of the wrist transformed the tool into a serviceable hammer to "persuade" any balky part into some level of submission.

A month ago, I returned to the fields of my youth with a metal detector more advanced than the one we used 40 years ago. My detector (I sold my bicycle and reinvested in a hobby with less chance of permanent injury) discerns between iron, aluminum, silver, nickel and copper.

My two days of detectoring, as purists insist on calling any search, suggested we had farmed more acres of aluminum beverage cans, T-top posts, and hog wire than we did corn, soybeans and alfalfa. Stray metal was more bountiful than dirt clods.

The most prominent metal parts were, no surprise, broken cultivator bolts. There were so many, in fact, that when the detector indicated "Iron 4 inches +" deep, I quickly learned to see Uncle Honey, not a centuries old French knife or Native American axe head.

Then, on a slow mosey along a deep dead furrow in a soybean field, the detector buzzed "Iron" so loudly and so long that I had to dig to see if, just maybe, Honey hadn't buried the entire cultivator.

Two shovelfuls of tough, dry clay uncovered a short length of round, rusty steel about one inch in diameter. Ooh, French flintlock rifle maybe?

More shovelfuls of stickier, heavier gumbo revealed the rusty steel

bar angled so steeply downward that I couldn't budge it. Finally, several minutes more of sweaty digging told the tale: the bar had an unnatural bend – a Honey-made unnatural bend – about a foot down its steadily thickening shaft.

I knew from that bend alone that I had found the farm's monster, 20pound-plus pry bar that everyone called the "railroad bar" because, with the right fulcrum, one person could move a railroad car with it.

How did it wind up angled deeply into the gumbo abyss in the middle of this field?

When I asked my brothers that question, all replied with the same two words: Uncle Honey.

Our collective best guess is that Honey likely used it to pry something – maybe a steel fence post – from the cultivator and, when done, tossed it and the pry bar across the cultivator and forgot about it for, oh, say, 38 years.

Why 38? Because soft-spoken, machinery-bending Honey joined the heavenly chorus 38 years ago so that pry bar was sent to its dark, gumbo purgatory sometime before

Still, finding ironclad evidence of his earthly journey is now as reassuring as finding a musket ball or arrowhead. All speak to me but only Honey makes me smile.







IDPH aligns with stricter CDC mask-wearing rules

SPRINGFIELD – The state will have new COVID-19 guidance on face coverings after the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated its guidance Tuesday to reflect that even individuals vaccinated against COVID-19 should wear masks while indoors in areas of the country where the virus is surging.

CDC officials also recommended all teachers, staff, students and visitors in schools, regardless of vaccination status, should wear masks indoors as well, according to news reports covering an afternoon briefing by the federal agency. As of Tuesday afternoon, the full guidance had not been posted online.

The Illinois Department of Public Health announced it will adopt the CDC guidance after Gov. JB Pritzker had said he would review it Tuesday.

Prior to Tuesday, Illinois had been following CDC guidance of the past two months which said unvaccinated individuals should wear masks indoors, but those who were vaccinated needed them only in certain settings.

The Illinois State Board of Education had recently fully adopted CDC guidance as well, which strongly encouraged but did not mandate masks.

But the Illinois Department of Public Health issued a news release later Tuesday saying it "is fully adopting" CDC masking guidelines, including recommendation for schools.

The CDC guidance says masks should be worn by all individuals in areas of substantial transmission, which include those with 50 to 99 cases per 100,000 people over a 7-day period. Areas of high transmission are above that amount.

The case positivity rate in Illinois was also on the rise Tuesday, reaching 3.7 percent, a high since April 22. There were 1,669 confirmed or probable cases reported Tuesday out of 31,019 test results. Positivity rates were higher in southern Illinois, with Region 4 seeing a rate of 9.2 percent and southern Illinois' Region 5 at 8.5 percent. All other regions were on an increasing pace as well.
