

Kids collect rocks to raise money for Peoria Honor Flight

For The Weekly Post DAHINDA – Ever since Chris Burgin-Lytle, 9, was old enough to hold a shovel, he spent most of his free time in a ravine behind our Knox County house. He loved digging in the shale and excavating rocks. He loved it so much he began his own "mining company."

In his mind, he thought he really had started a busi-



ness. He even recruited friends to be members of the mining company. When Chris invited playmates over, they were generally greeted

with, "You wanna go down to the mine?" Then they would take shovels, pick axes, bars and buckets to glean rocks of all shapes and sizes, offering them to local neighbors and businesses for donations.

Over time, the kids decided their donations would go to the Greater Peoria Honor Flight, whose mission is to escort veterans to Washington to see the memorials dedicated to wars in which they fought. After

Farmington cops help capture jail escapee

By LORI HEROLD For The Weekly Post FARMINGTON – Less than 24 hours after four men escaped from Fulton County Jail on July 7, three were in custody.

And while Farmington police were called to Lewistown that evening to help with leads on all four escapees, they were most instrumental in apprehension of the second escapee, Jesse R. Davis, 35.

Davis was reported to be running through yards along West Court Street in Farmington around 6 a.m. on Thursday, July 8, according to Farmington Police Chief Chris Darsham.

Darsham first encountered Davis north of town as Davis drove a stolen van at a "high rate of speed" from West Court Street to Main Street.

Darsham pursued Davis as the escaped prisoner "blew" through stop signs heading downtown on Fort Street be-

fore turning on North Hedden Avenue.

Once there, Davis left the road and drove through several yards, hitting whatever was in his way. At that point, Darsham gave up the chase. According to Darsham, Davis made it back to the roadway and eventually got stuck in a pasture near the Peoria/Fulton County line.

At about 6 p.m., Davis was taken into custody by Fulton *Continued on Page 10*

Pollinator pockets gaining in popularity

I'm almost ashamed to admit that I had not been aware of the "Pollinator Pocket" movement until recently. It was only while gathering resources for adding a pollinator garden between our house and the field that I stumbled across the pollinator pocket information. bed or grouping of containers filled with plants that attract pollinators of all types. They are small plantings that are easy to fit into most yards, urban or rural, and help to provide much-needed pollinator habitat. Entire neighborhoods can get on board, and these little pockets, when stretched out across a neighborhood or community, provide distinct benefits not only for our pollinators but for those who plant them. around the globe have been declining dramatically. A 2019 study determined that 40 percent of all insect species are in decline and some may reach extinction in the coming decades if populations are not stabilized.



What the heck is a "pollinator pocket" anyway?

A pollinator pocket is a small flower

It's no secret that insect populations

Sadly, the causes for these notable declines are all human-induced.

Some issues include habitat conversion to human use (this one tops the list), closely followed by use of pesticides and fertilizers, invasive species, *Continued on Page 2*

Pollinators are more than just pretty insects that are incredibly enjoyable to watch; they are critical to human populations and native biodiversity. Pollinators are the keystone in the process of pollination. Pollinators have intricate relationships with native plant species that help us to maintain the rare and usual plants across Illinois.

And without pollinators, many of the crops we rely on for food would be imperiled.

Enter a wide variety of interested parties who want to do their part to help protect and provide for our pollinators. Gardeners, farmers, naturalists and outdoor enthusiasts all are looking for doable solutions, large and small, to encourage pollinators.

As these same interested parties began looking for small ways to help insects, the pollinator pocket movement was born.

The University of Illinois Extension generously provides multiple sample layouts and designs for pollinator pockets – for full sun, shady spots and containers. Even those with small



apartment container gardens can add a small corner of plants dedicated to pollinators. The U of I designs offer an entire season of blooms by utilizing plants with different flowering times.

As enjoyable as the pretty blossoms and the feeding flying jewels may be, the plants play other vital roles. Pollinators also use these same plants for different parts of their life cycle. For many pollinators, their larvae require a specific species or group of species for feeding. Plant leaves, stems and other parts are as important to the larvae as to the adult insects we enjoy watching so much.

U of I extension also helps pollinator pocket growers with resources to better manage their property throughout the growing season to provide maximum benefits. Did you know many species need standing dead stems or leaf litter to overwinter? As much as we humans like perfectly manicured spots, our pollinator friends need a little mess, a little scraggly looking site to keep their life cycle going. So it's essential to ignore the urge to clean everything down to the ground in late fall. Leave those key habitat elements as they are over the winter and save your clean-up frenzy for late spring after pollinators have emerged.

What also seems obvious is that cutting back pesticides can help. Gardeners can do this by using a more organic type of pesticide or by choosing native plants that require less pest control. Natives also usually need less care overall and can free up time, water and other resources, so you can enjoy your garden.

U of I Extension also offers the ability to register your pollinator pocket, obtain signage and place your pollinator pocket garden on a statewide map. To find a plethora of pollinator pocket resources, visit extension.illinois.edu/cfiv/pollinatorpockets.



Everything - corn, soybeans, truth - needs sun

Stop me if you've heard this one before: A local grain company does well year-in, year-out buying, storing, and processing a few million bushels of soybeans. Nearby farmers love it; a strong local processor means strong local prices.

As the years pass, the plant ages and – too soon for local farmers – closes. A statewide farm group, knowing the plant's importance to the regional ag

economy, joins

some investors to purchase it. Shortly thereafter, however, that group throws in the towel, too.

Two ag titans, poultry producer Perdue Farms and grain giant Archer-Daniels-Midland (ADM), show an interest in buying the aging (Estill, SC) facility. The former plant manager urges the investor-owners to sell to the chicken grower hoping it could integrate the plant into its poultry operation. Instead, the group sells to ADM in December 2010 for a reported \$5.5 million.

Shortly thereafter – as the former manager "suspected" – ADM shutters the plant. That move has "a huge impact on the town," and removes an important market for the region's farmers because it "meant ADM, one of the biggest players in soy processing, could purchase beans at a lower cost."

In short, he opines, 'They bought the market."

Old story, right? U.S. farmers and ranchers have witnessed similar, market-flattening events over the last 30 years as almost every aspect of American agriculture has been consolidated, industrialized, and integrated.

This one is different, however, because of who and what comes next.

That part of the story, told June 29 by the Washington Post in a 4,500word account, begins in 2015 when ADM approached Danny Brown, the president of a company named AGrowStar, to buy the plant for the discounted price of \$4 million. Too high, Brown tells ADM, and both haggle for more than a year over a better price.

Finally, in February 2017, they agree on a price almost as shocking as the name of the new owner: ADM sells the plant for the bargain basement price of \$250,000 to the former Georgia governor and just-nominated secretary of agriculture, Sonny Perdue.

How does anyone buy an aging soybean processing plant with 3 million bushel storage – that an independent appraiser recently valued at \$4.6 million – for less than a nickel on the dollar?

The Post suggests an answer: "The timing of the sale just as Perdue was about to become the most powerful man in U.S. agriculture raises legal and ethics concerns, from the narrow question of whether the secretary followed federal financial disclosure requirements to whether the transaction could have been an attempt to influence an incoming government official..."

And, worse, "Months after Perdue took over the U.S. Department of Agriculture," explains the Post, "his family trust sold AGrowStar to a group of investors along with all its real estate..." for what Brown, its

former president, says was "about \$12 million."

The quick sale was "obscured by complex financial moves that appear to have evaded at least the spirit of an agreement Perdue made with the U.S. Office of Government Ethics," reports the Post. Those moves, mostly involving asset transfers among Perdue family trusts, were as technical then as they now appear to be questionable.

And questioned they will be, promised the Senate Ag Committee Chairwoman Debbie Stabenow (D. Mich.), on June 30.

"I've already called on the Office of Government Ethics to review this situation," Stabenow told the Post, "and believe (it should) coordinate with the Department of Justice, the Department of Agriculture, (and USDA's) Inspector General... to get to the bottom of this."

Perdue declined to comment either for the story or after it was published. ADM strenuously denied any link between the sweet South Carolina soybean deal and any sweet deals it may have gotten during the Trump Administration through Perdue.

The "no comment" by public officials on details of actions, private or public, while on the public payroll has become a tiresome fact, too. If you hold public office, the public has every right to know what happened under your watch.

PHYSICALS / DENTAL EXAMS / IMMUNIZATIONS

*All student health & immunization records must be on file before the start of school. Examinations: Students entering Kindergarten, 6th and 9th Grades must have a new physical exam on file in the school office before they will be allowed to start school. Students entering Kindergarten, 2nd, 6th, and 9th grades are required to have a dental examination. Students enrolling in Kindergarten or upon first entry into an Illinois school beyond Kindergarten (i.e., grades 1-12) are required to have an eye exam. Please Note: It is also recommended that children entering Kindergarten or Preschool for the first time be lead tested.

Immunizations: One chickenpox/varicella vaccination is required for Pre-School and proof of having had two chickenpox/varicella vaccinations is required for students entering Kindergarten, 6th and 9th grades or a letter from their physician stating they've had the chicken pox. All students entering 6th grade are required to have proof of completion of the Hepatitis B series shots. All students entering, transferring, or advancing into 6th through 12th grades will be required to show proof of receipt of one dose of DTap vaccine (tetanus, diphtheria, acellular pertussis) and proof of receipt of two doses of MMR (measles, mumps, Rubella). All students entering 6th & 7th grades will be required to show proof of one dose of Meningococcal Meningitis vaccine given on or after their 11th birthday. All students entering 12th grade will be required to show proof of two Meningococcal Meningitis vaccines with the second dose being given on or after their 16th birthday. (Only one dose is needed If the student's first dose was given at age sixteen years or later).

FEES & INFORMATION

Registration: Kindergarten students must be 5 years of age by Sept. 1, 2021, in order to enroll. All Kindergarten and newly enrolled students must bring a certified copy of live birth when registering. All students will need to bring their quote for work on the west side of the building.

Elmwood to create chicken committee

By JOHN A. BALLENTINE For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD – After spending

more than 45 minutes of a July 8 meeting discussing whether or not to allow chickens and ducks within the city limits, the Elmwood City Council has decided to create a committee to study the issue.

This was the third time in less than a year that the council has discussed allowing chickens in the city. Alderman Nathan Brunnelson suggested that a committee be formed to help write an ordinance to vote upon.

Alderman Adam Duvall echoed that suggestion, plus he said that the council should obtain the community's input. Councilman Andrew Almasi also would like to have more community feedback before deciding on this issue.

At this point, the council said it wants more information in order to be able to write an ordinance covering livestock, in particular chickens. Parameters would have to be known, such as how large of a setback from property lines will be required should chickens be allowed in Elmwood.

According to Alderman Walt Avery, there appears to only be a very limited number of properties in Elmwood that are large enough to house chickens based on possible setback regulations. The council would also like to know what concerns exist among community members, plus what problems other communities have had with allowing chickens.

At the end of the discussion it was decided that a committee would be formed with Avery as chairman, along with council members Dara

Wagner and Almasi. Their purpose is to present an ordinance to the entire council for a vote.

In other agenda business, an ordinance amending handicapped parking spaces in downtown Elmwood was passed that allows additional spaces. Tabled to next month's meeting were: VFW flags in Central Park; and donating to the TNR organization that would trap feral cats in the City of Elmwood for the purpose of neutering and then releasing them.

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

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Media literacy requirement among new laws

By PETER HANCOCK For The Weekly Post SPRINGFIELD - Public high schools in Illinois will soon be required to teach students how to access and evaluate various kinds of news and social media they see online and elsewhere as part of their regular curriculum.

That was among 53 bills that Gov. JB Pritzker signed last Friday, bringing the total number of bills signed from the current General Assembly to 97.

House Bill 234 provides that, starting in the 2022-23 school year, all public high schools will provide a unit of instruction on media literacy that will include instruction on how to access information and evaluate the trustworthiness of its source; analyzing and evaluating media messages; creating media messages; assessing how media messages trigger emotions and behavior; and social responsibility.

The State Board of Education is tasked with preparing and distributing instructional resources and providing learning opportunities for educators.

Another new law makes it illegal to import into Illinois, with the intent of selling, any body parts or products made from a long list of endangered and exotic species.

Illinois, like many states, has long banned the importation of ivory and rhinoceros horns. Under House Bill 395, the list of animals whose parts or products are banned from being imported is expanded to include cheetahs, elephants, giraffes, great apes, hippopotami, jaguars, leopards, lions, monk seals, narwhals, pangolins, rays or

sharks, rhinos, sea turtles, tigers, walruses, whales or any other species listed in the Convention on International Trade or listed as threatened or endangered under the U.S. Endangered Species Act.

Illinois residents applying for admission to public colleges and universities in the state will no longer be required to submit SAT or ACT scores starting in January 2022.

House Bill 226, known as the Higher Education Fair Admissions Act, requires all public higher education institutions to adopt a "test optional" policy for admissions, meaning they may not require students to submit standardized test scores, but may allow it.

Student athletes in public and nonpublic schools are now allowed to alter athletic or team uniforms for purposes of modesty, in accordance with their religion, cultural values or modesty preferences. House Bill 120 provides that modifications can include such things as hijabs, undershirts or leggings.

Any modifications, however, may not interfere with a student's movement or pose a safety hazard to the student or other athletes. There are also limits on headgear modifications. Students who choose to modify uniforms are responsible for the additional costs, unless the school district chooses to cover the cost.

Drivers passing through school zones will have to slow down a little earlier on school days under another bill. House Bill 343 provides that special speed limits around schools will begin at 6:30

a.m. instead of 7 a.m. The new law takes effect immediately.

And children operating lemonade stands will no longer need to worry about first getting a permit. Senate Bill 119 provides

that neither the Department of Public Health nor any local health department or public health district may regulate the sale of lemonade, nonalcoholic drinks or mixed beverages by a person under the age of 16.

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Orange petunias finish long road to legality

By RON DIETER For The Weekly Post Some flowers you can only imagine – a blue marigold, for example. Yes, you can order blue marigold seeds on Ebay, but save your money. They're not marigolds, they're chrysanthemums. Nor are they blue, but shades of mauve and lavender instead.

Despite today's cancel culture and fluid definitions of words, we can still say chrysanthemums are not marigolds without being accused of having some kind of phobia.

Mother Nature never saw fit to make orange petunias either. Nevertheless, one showed up in a planter near a train station in Helsinki, Finland, and stirred up considerable international trouble. Kelly Servick wrote about it for the journal "Science."

Back in 1987, scientists in Cologne, Germany, discovered they could insert a gene from maize (corn to us lesser beings) into the DNA of petunias, and produce petunias with salmoncolored flowers. They published the results in the journal "Nature", but at the time the idea of moving genes around sent chills down the spine of the general population and visions of endless regulations to power-hungry bureaucrats. So the researchers decided to avoid the costly battles and destroyed the plants.

A couple of companies, however, licensed the transgenic procedure from them and in 1995 they announced the development



of a petunia with vivid orange flowers. They planted experimental plots in Germany and Florida, but decided not to market the seed, probably because of the costly and ever-changing regulatory hurdles involved. The orange petunia died on the vine again.

Fast forward to 2015 when a plant biologist was walking near a train station in Helsinki. A planter of brilliant orange petunias caught his eye. Ordinarily those vivid flowers would have been nothing special to him except that he was aware of those transgenic studies in Cologne.

He took one of the flowers to his lab and discovered it had the same genetic code as the Cologne petunias. He also found the identical genetic code in other orange-flowered petunia varieties offered for sale at the time.

He mentioned his observation to a colleague who just happened to work in the Finnish government's gene technology agency. Eventually, the tale of the orange petunias drifted through the halls of government to Finland's food safety regulators. In 2017 they ordered retailers (not breeders) to destroy all orange-flowered petunia plants because they were produced without the necessary paperwork and permits.

Other countries jumped on the bandwagon, including the United States. The USDA said that even though they posed no risk to human health or the environment, the plants must be destroyed.

So how did the orange petunia show up at that Finnish train station? It turns out that plant breeders, apparently unaware of the orange petunia's transgenic history, began using them in their traditional breeding programs to develop improved varieties. Unless the breeder specifically tested his stock for the foreign DNA, or was aware of the 1987 paper, he had no reason to suspect the plants were modified genetically.

In recent years the media has focused on "more important" phobias and lost interest in vilifying genetically modified plants. Bureaucrats have embraced diversity and inclusion and allowed genetically engineered plants to become part of everyday life. Besides corn and soybeans, think cotton, canola, potatoes, squash, sweet corn, papaya, sugar beets, even apples.

And here's breaking news. Next spring, the orange petunia rises from the dead yet again. The German company Westhoff ran the regulatory gauntlet and gained USDA approval to sell all varieties of petunias containing the maize DNA.

Look for varieties such as Hell's Fury, Hell's Bells, Trilogy Mango and African Sunset, to name a few. Actually there's quite a number of varieties carrying the corn gene, many with colors other than orange, such as Trilogy Deep Purple. The corn gene intensifies flower color by expressing the orange pigment, even if the orange color is not dominant. Of course, the USDA's permission to splice the maize gene into the petunia does not extend to other plants and genes. That requires another run of the gauntlet.

So, to the breeder who wants to insert a gene from a blueberry into the DNA of a marigold, well, good luck.

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



The board also heard a report from the municipal code officer about enforcing ordinances regarding tall grass and illegally parked vehicles.

Illinois duck blind drawings start Sunday

By The Weekly Post SPRINGFIELD - Drawings for waterfowl hunting blinds at several public hunting areas in Illinois will be held in July.

Continued from Page 20 shooting. Coach Jeff Coulter started the program in 2020, but due to COVID restrictions, the team never got to shoot that spring.

So this spring was the first opportunity for Elmwood students to shoot trap, even though the season was shortened to five weeks from the usual eight.

Both local high school programs shot at the Elmwood Trap Club's facility in Sweetwater Park, which was very busy this spring, with five days of action per week - three for the Brimfield and Elmwood teams. Avery praised Elmwood Trap volunteers Mike Monari and Tim Chatten for their help handling the school teams.

Avery also praised his fellow coaches at Brimfield, a staff of six that includes Boger Hessing, Jason Sparks, Adam Zimmerman, Jim Hill and Luis Vazquez.

"If it wasn't for the additional coaches helping, I couldn't manage 38 shooters from week to week," Avery said. "Over half of our new shooters had never fired a gun before and many of them did not even have guns to shoot."

All that help will come in handy moving forward, as Avery said, "As a sport for us, I don't see this slowing down at all."

A national shortage of ammunition was another issue for teams this year. For awhile it looked as though teams might not get the required 50 shots per shooter per week. Fortunately, Federal Ammunition sold directly to the Brimfield team.

"Thankfully, a Federal

delivery truck showed up four days prior to our first scheduled range week with enough .12 and .20 gauge ammo to get us through the spring season," Avery said. Team members shoot at 50 targets each week during the season and then post their scores online.

Brimfield trap shoots at nationals

Despite COVID-19 complications and a nationwide ammunition shortage, local trap shooting teams enjoyed a busy season this spring.

That's particularly true for Brimfield High School, which in its fifth year as a program added 16 new shooters and, for the first time, took a team to the nationals in Mason, Mich.

Brimfield's squad of five shooters -Sam and Jake Avery, Ethan Ehnle, Ben Rule and Ty Kenney – placed 111th out of 160 teams in Michigan after qualifying by shooting at the Illinois High School Clay Target state tournament on June 5 at Brittany Shooting Park in Bunker Hill.

Brimfield's team placed 21st overall at the state tournament, which attracted 300

shooters from 30 high school teams. Brimfield shooters were also third in the novice division at state. Calhoun High School, which won the Illinois tournament, also placed first at nationals.

But placing high at events is not the main emphasis for Coach Scott Avery, who said he's more interested in getting new shooters involved in the sport. That seems to be working. Of the 16 new members this year, more than half had never held a gun, Avery said.

Overall, Brimfield had 38 shooters sign up and 34 who competed regularly during the five-week season.

"Some students participating in numerous sporting events at once had to drop out," Avery said.
