## Mask wearing to be optional, for now, at most local schools

Back to school preparations include a unique twist this summer. In addition to shopping for shoes, clothes and books, many parents have been attending school board meetings in numbers seldom seen.

Usual crowds of 5-10 people ballooned to nearly 100 in some cases in the past month. The reason for all the sudden school board interest? To get the low-

down on rules regarding COVID-19, specifically in regard to wearing of masks for the 2021-22 school year.

So far, three local districts – Farmington, Brimfield and Elmwood – passed plans that make mask wearing optional or that merely “recommend” mask wearing. Williamsfield’s administration currently plans to require students who are not vaccinated to wear masks, though a final plan has not yet been released.

Princeville’s board plans to vote on a plan at its Aug. 10 meeting, according to Superintendent Shannon Duling.

All of that could be trumped by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, which Tuesday said individuals vaccinated against COVID-19 should wear masks indoors in areas of the country where the virus is surging.

The first board to make a decision was in Farmington, which voted to make masks “optional” at its July 19 meeting.

On July 21 in Brimfield, the school board approved language saying, “To start the year, the

District anticipates that masks will be optional in the school and at school events based on the current COVID-19 positivity rates in the area.”

Brimfield Superintendent Tony Shinall said, “When I speak with folks, I tell them masks are recommended.”

Monday night, Elmwood’s board approved a plan that says, “masks are recommended for all unvaccinated individuals.”

“We are not going to be man-

## Shipley born with a passion for rodeo

**WILLIAMSFIELD** – If Cade Shipley’s passion for rodeo competition seems uncommon east of the Mississippi River, he comes by it naturally. The Williamsfield 14-year-old’s parents, Matt and Janet Shipley, have also competed in rodeo – most notably in team roping.

“It’s always just been what my family does together,” he said.

All those years of practice – beginning with “PeeWee level barrels, poles and cattle sorting”

before joining the Illinois Junior Rodeo Association (IJRA) in first grade – have evidently paid off.

In June, Shipley traveled to Des Moines, Iowa, where he competed in five events in the National Junior High Finals Rodeo (NJHFR).

He placed 15th in Team Roping and 11th in Breakaway Roping. That’s saying something since, according to the Catch Des Moines website, this is one of the largest rodeos in the world and attracts “approximately 1,200 middle school students who

are the ‘best of the best’ from 43 states, 5 provinces in Canada, Australia, and Mexico.”

In Team Roping, one member of the team ropes the horns of a steer while the partner ropes the back feet. It’s a timed event that concludes

cated closer to home.

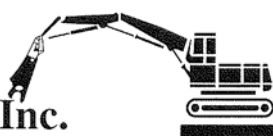

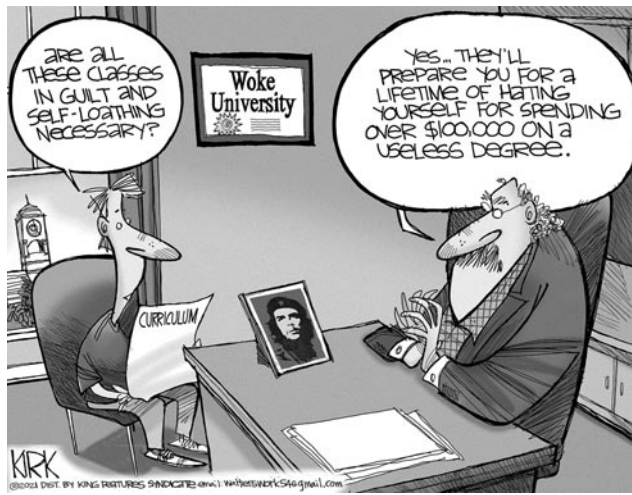

# Riding the metal wave left by Uncle Honey

One job on the southern Illinois dairy farm of my youth was to walk just-cultivated corn or soybean fields to find the cultivator parts – disk blades, sweeps, even whole shanks – left broken and unseen by my quiet, iron-bending great Uncle Honey earlier in the day.

Honey was a skilled cultivator killer. The problem wasn't the design of our Case cultivator. The problem was that it was rear-mounted and Honey rarely looked back to see, well, anything such as a cultivator, silage chopper, or even yesterday.

I never minded the searches and, after a bit, got pretty good at reading the cultivator ridges – or, really, the lack of ridges – that hinted on what row I might find the missing parts. Along the way I often found other items like arrowheads, musket balls and wrenches dropped by You Know Who.

Then, sometime in the late 1970s, an acquaintance brought a metal detector to the farm to, as he explained, “see what we couldn't see.” One afternoon in a field with the detector delivered several broken 1/2-inch cultivator bolts (no surprise), a handful of musket balls (whoa) and a wooden-handled (missing), foot-long monkey wrench.

Monkey wrenches were Honey's

favorite tool because they allowed him to over-tighten every bolt on the cultivator and, if the need arose, a quick turn of the wrist transformed the tool into a serviceable hammer to “persuade” any balky part into some level of submission.

A month ago, I returned to the fields of my youth with a metal detector more advanced than the one we used 40 years ago. My detector (I sold my bicycle and reinvested in a hobby with less chance of permanent injury) discerns between iron, aluminum, silver, nickel and copper.

My two days of detecting, as purists insist on calling any search, suggested we had farmed more acres of aluminum beverage cans, T-top posts, and hog wire than we did corn, soybeans and alfalfa. Stray metal was more bountiful than dirt clods.

The most prominent metal parts were, no surprise, broken cultivator bolts. There were so many, in fact, that when the detector indicated “Iron 4 inches +” deep, I quickly learned to see Uncle Honey, not a centuries old French knife or Native American axe head.

Then, on a slow mosey along a deep dead furrow in a soybean field, the detector buzzed “Iron” so loudly and so long that I had to dig to see if, just maybe, Honey hadn't buried the entire cultivator.

Two shovelfuls of tough, dry clay uncovered a short length of round, rusty steel about one inch in diameter. Ooh, French flintlock rifle maybe?

More shovelfuls of stickier, heavier

gumbo revealed the rusty steel bar angled so steeply downward that I couldn't budge it. Finally, several minutes more of sweaty digging told the tale: the bar had an unnatural bend – a Honey-made unnatural bend – about a foot down its steadily thickening shaft.

I knew from that bend alone that I had found the farm's monster, 20-pound-plus pry bar that everyone called the “railroad bar” because, with the right fulcrum, one person could move a railroad car with it.

How did it wind up angled deeply into the gumbo abyss in the middle of this field?

When I asked my brothers that question, all replied with the same two words: Uncle Honey.

Our collective best guess is that Honey likely used it to pry something – maybe a steel fence post – from the cultivator and, when done, tossed it and the pry bar across the cultivator and forgot about it for, oh, say, 38 years.

Why 38? Because soft-spoken, machinery-bending Honey joined the heavenly chorus 38 years ago so that pry bar was sent to its dark, gumbo purgatory sometime before 1983.

Still, finding ironclad evidence of his earthly journey is now as reassuring as finding a musket ball or arrowhead. All speak to me but only Honey makes me smile.

I'm nearly three weeks into this and the excruciating pain is now discomfort, especially when I try to walk any distance. The rash and blisters are drying and I'm hoping the super sensitivity in the skin will go away soon! When this all clears up, I will be getting the shingles vaccine.

If you are advised by your doctor to get the vaccine, do it. Believe me, you do not want shingles!

# Farmington plans to make masks optional

FARMINGTON – Wearing masks will be optional for Farmington students when they return to school this year.

That was among the points in a back-to-school plan approved by the school board at its July 19 meeting by a 4-3 vote. Voting against the plan were board members Travis Mahr, Keith Depperman and Eric Stanley.

And while masks will be optional in school – unless positivity rates increase or guidelines change – wearing masks will be required of students who ride the buses based on Centers for Disease Control policies regarding public transportation.

Remote learning will be available for anyone with medical conditions, which according to Superintendent Zac Chatterton is a “small percentage” of students. Junior high and high school remote learners will participate in classes that are live-streamed. Elementary remote students will be given “appropriate instructional content and access to teacher support.” Medically fragile students who opt for remote learning will not be allowed to participate in extracurricular activities.

Chatterton said quarantining students who are symptomatic or exposed to a positive COVID case will be based on directives by the local health department.

The school proposes three levels of mitigation (minimal, moderate and substantial), which will be deter-

mined based on case numbers reported weekly by Peoria County. Increases in positive cases will lead to stricter mitigations.

At the minimal level, masks are recommended if students are closer than 3 feet for more than 15 minutes. Social distancing of 3 feet will be sought wherever possible.

“At the elementary level in the general classroom setting, [3-foot distancing] will be extremely challenging,” Chatterton said. “And we’re brainstorming on how to get meals served while maintaining as much distance as possible.”

At the top level of mitigations, the plan stipulates that, “Masks may be required for all students and staff.” Based on a motion by board member Dustin Blunier, that line was amended from an earlier plan which read, “Masks may be required for all unvaccinated students and staff.”

Lockers and drinking fountains will again be available under the plan, band and physical education classes will resume and field trips and school assemblies may be possible pending administrative approval.

“This can change at any time,” Chatterton noted.

The board will hold an open hearing on Aug. 9 regarding its e-learning plan.

In other business, the board, which spent nearly three hours in a closed executive session, approved:

- Contracting with Mobex, Inc., and Athletic Training for athletic drug testing.

- Hiring LifeTouch as district photographer.
- A slight increase in bread costs under a bid from Alpha Baking Company.
- Several five-year policy updates.
- A slight decrease in the milk bid from Prairie Farms, which will once again provide for 1% chocolate milk.
- A contract with Pro Com for collection of unpaid student fees.
- A resolution for Chatterton to prepare the Fiscal Year 2022 budget.
- An agreement with the Canton YMCA to provide before- and after-school care for students in grade K-6, including delayed-start Mondays.
- Resignations of Monty Morris (custodian), Donovan Benson (boys golf coach), Lesia Stanley (cafe) and Julie Springer and Lori Vallas (junior high/elementary yearbook).
- Hiring Kelly Cratty (district secretary), Dale Horn (junior high student supervisor), Kelli Miller (elementary student facilitator), Benson (junior high boys basketball assistant and freshman coach), Caitlyn Clayton (junior high student council sponsor), Nathan Schroeder (JV boys basketball coach) and fall sports volunteers including: Dylan Hayden, Zach Lozier and Waylon Nolan (football); Kent Simmons and Ciara Ulm (cheer), Kathryn Zaborac and Ashley Howard (softball), McKenzie Skaggs and Emma Vallas (girls basketball), and Eric Higgs (boys basketball).

# Princeville sells final lots in subdivision

PRINCEVILLE – The Princeville Village Board approved the sale of the last four lots in the Aten Acres subdivision on Veterans Drive during its July 20 meeting.

“We’re out of lots,” Village President Jeff Troutman said. “We can extend the subdivision a little bit and we have some undeveloped ground. But right now we’re pursuing how much it will be to put in water lines [and other infrastructure].”

“So it will be another year before we do anything, at best.”

In other business, there was no motion made to extend a zoning change that had allowed Princeville State Bank to rent out the old grocery store to be

used as a storage facility by the Princeville School District.

The village had provided a special use zoning exception to allow for storage in a commercial property. Troutman said he informed the bank they have until Aug. 31 to “get it cleared up and back to normal” barring another change.

The board also voted to make two \$500 donations to the Princeville Sports Boosters, the same level of donations as were made last year, Troutman said.

A representative from the South Side Coalition also spoke to the board about speed bumps that were installed in that part of town.

The board’s next meeting will be Aug. 2 at 7 p.m.

### Scuffle leaves Brimfield man, officer with injuries

BRIMFIELD – Four people wound up with injuries on June 29 stemming from an incident at a Brimfield residence, according to a Peoria County Sheriff's report.

Police were called to the scene and were signalled to go inside by a man outside of the residence. While entering, an officer saw Sean A. Eeten, 45, exiting the residence.

When the officer attempted to engage with Eeten, Eeten walked away and tried to enter a vehicle, even though he was warned repeatedly that he would be arrested if he did so. As the officer took him into custody, Eeten resisted. The ensuing tussle resulted in the officer suffering several abrasions and Eeten suffering an injury to his face.

Once Eeten was secured, officers spoke to a man who claimed Eeten kicked in the door to the residence and attacked him. A woman there said Eeten, "punched her in the face, stuck his hand into her mouth with a lit cigarette in his hand attempting to burn her, choked her to the point she was unable to breathe, slammed her onto the ground, kicked her in the legs, back, stomach and head."

Both victims claimed their phones were taken away by Eeten when they tried to call 911. They also said Eeten wouldn't let them leave the house. According to the sheriff's report, injuries were commensurate with what police were told. Another witness at the scene also corroborated both their stories.

Eeten refused medical attention on the scene. The responding officer transported him to Methodist Hospital for the injury to his face. Eeten was uncooperative both in the squad car and at the hospital where he insulted the Methodist staff, according to the report.

As a result, he was released by the hospital and taken to Peoria County Jail where he was charged with home invasion/injury to a person, two counts of aggravated domestic

battery, aggravated battery to a peace officer, three counts of unlawful restraint, interference with a report of domestic battery and resisting/obstructing an officer, according to the sheriff's report.

### Elmwood man charged with aggravated assault

ELMWOOD – A woman who claimed she was in fear for her life managed to dial 911 before Zachary A. Nichols, 32, of Elmwood smashed her phone on July 23, according to an Elmwood police report.

When police arrived at the scene, Nichols told them he was laying on the couch when the woman who called police "started yelling at him." He said a shoving match took place and he didn't remember anything after that.

The woman claimed an upset Nichols emptied her purse, threw her around and slammed her head against the wall "several times." She told police that after Nichols grabbed and shot off a firearm, she ran into the bedroom.

Evidence at the scene included a spent 9mm shell casing and a smashed phone, which corroborated the charges, as did physical injuries to the woman. Nichols was charged with aggravated assault, aggravated discharge of a firearm in an occupied building, domestic battery, unlawful carrying/possession of a firearm, criminal damage to property \$500-\$10,000 and interference with emergency communication.

# Farmington council to resume talk of building

FARMINGTON – The Farmington City Council ushered in something new and talked about something old at its July 19 meeting.

The new element at the meeting was a recently purchased OWL camera that will allow council meetings to be livestreamed on the City of Farmington YouTube site. The camera includes eight microphones and is supposed to shift its focus to whoever is speaking in the room. The July 19 meeting was the first to be livestreamed and, as city administrator Rollen Wright noted, “we still have some tweaking to do on this.”

The new camera did a good job of streaming conversation related to the current City of Farmington building, though.

That discussion began after Wright discussed the possibility of spending an estimated \$24,400 to provide air conditioning and heating units and duct work for four rooms in the building used by the city and the police department.

Wright said adding the HVAC units would save wear and tear on the 1967 boiler, whose operation is “always a wing and a prayer.”

Council member David Black questioned whether improving the HVAC units was the best choice until a firm future has been mapped for the Farmington city building.

“We would want to poll the community to see if they want another building or see if this is where we’re going to stay,” Black said. “I think we would want to make that decision before we start adding HVAC units.”

Discussions on plans for a city building date back at least three years and came to an abrupt end earlier this year after a proposal to build a new building was shelved due to problems with the site selected and construction cost overruns.

That conversation will start anew on Aug. 2 at 6 p.m., when the Public Grounds and Buildings Committee will meet prior to the general council meeting.

“I think we need to hold off on repairs until we determine what direc-

tion we’re going to go,” said Councilman Joey Boggs, chairman of the grounds and buildings committee.

The council also heard from a member of the local recreation commission, who said there were 110 boys signed up for baseball this year and 34 girls in softball. The council heard that lights at the softball diamond were problematic this season, but repairs have since been completed.

The council also voted unanimously to approve an ordinance that will allow for remote participation by council members, even by cell phone, so long as a quorum of members is present in-person at a meeting.

Finally, while speaking in the public comment portion of the meeting, Farmington resident Aaron Kevilus asked for a vote of no confidence in Mayor Kent Kowal and attorney Bill Connor at the next council meeting on Aug. 2. There was no response to his request.

# Williamsfield board hires 3, discusses masks

WILLIAMSFIELD — The Williamsfield School Board on July 12 approved the hire of three employees and heard that back-to-school plans are still being finalized.

Hired as a full-time district bookkeeper was Laura Danner, while Lucille Grey was employed as a full-time sub/paraprofessional and Jeremy King was hired as a full-time bus driver, monitor and custodian.

The bulk of the 49-minute meeting, though, was spent discussing plans for the upcoming school year.

“The CDC has said that people should still wear masks indoors if they are not immunized. So we’ll plan to adhere to those guidelines,” Superintendent Tim Farquer said.

Asked by board member Wes Wrage if the school had to require masks of unvaccinated students, Farquer replied, “We should. This is my firm belief and will always be my recommendation. We don’t pick and choose which recommendations from public health officials we adhere to and which ones we don’t.”

Farquer said at the meeting that the district would be seeking input from the community via a survey, which has since been posted on the district Facebook page.

As of Tuesday, July 27, Farquer said there had been 83 responses to the survey.

“More people that completed the survey provided feedback that they don’t want kids to wear masks,” Farquer said.

He said the plan is to post information about the district’s return-to-school plan on Monday or Tuesday, Aug. 2-3.

When the information is posted, parents will receive notification via the “all-call style” through email, text and voice calls, Farquer said.

Farquer said he did not plan to wait for a vote to approve the plan at the Aug. 9 board meeting.

“We reached a consensus in July that we’re going to follow the guidelines” from the CDC, Farquer said.

The board also approved

a concrete replacement bid from Goetz Construction Corp. Goetz’s had the lowest of three bids at \$66,750 to replace a concrete ramp by the music room and broken concrete going into the boiler room and near the art room. The project completion date is in October.

In other business, the board approved the 2021-22 Student Handbook.

Farquer reported that the district has purchased a

full-size school bus and an activity bus and has hired additional drivers. But Farquer said the district is still a bit shorthanded in terms of drivers, though.

Farquer also told the board that Williamsfield had teamed up with the Joliet school district in seeking a \$25 million grant from the Illinois Department of Transportation for electric buses. Under terms of the grant request, Williamsfield would re-

ceive 6 buses and Joliet would get 84. Farquer said a decision is expected by November.

A scheduled meeting of the finance committee was moved to July 27. The next meeting of the full board will be Aug. 9 at 7 p.m.

Continued from Page 1 dating masks," Elmwood Superintendent Chad Wagner stressed.

Williamsfield has had a different take. At a July 12 meeting, Williamsfield Su-

perintendent Tim Farquer said, "The CDC has said that people should still wear masks indoors if they are not immunized. So we'll plan to adhere to those guidelines."

Asked if the board would vote on masks at its Aug. 9 meeting, Farquer said that was not his plan.

"The approach I'm taking right now is we're adhering to the guidelines," Farquer said. "We'll come up, the administration, with the teachers, with community feedback, we'll come up with the implementation plan as how to implement the guidelines."

To gather feedback, Williamsfield posted a "Back-2-School Feedback Form" on Facebook. Farquer said Tuesday the district had re-

ceived 83 responses.

"More people that completed the survey provided feedback that they don't want kids to wear masks," Farquer said.

He said the plan is to post information about the district's plan on Monday or Tuesday, Aug. 2-3.

Farquer said children under 12 will be required to wear masks, since they are not yet eligible to receive the vaccine. Older students who are not vaccinated will be asked to wear a face covering, he said.

Farmington, Brimfield and Elmwood boards also voted to allow use of lockers and drinking fountains, for the resumption of music programs and field trips, and a return to the traditional time schedules.

At all schools, masks are being required for students who ride buses, as per previous CDC rules for public transportation.

Beyond masks, the districts had different plans for remote learning, mitigation levels and quarantine rules as well as which source for numbers they use for positivity rates.

All involved stressed that plans are subject to change based on COVID positivity rates and new recommendations by the CDC.

# Brimfield board adopts return-to-school plan

BRIMFIELD — After a special meeting on July 14 that drew nearly 100 people, the Brimfield Board of Education met again on July 21 to finish a return-to-school plan.

The crowd at the July 21 meeting was closer to 30 people, including a Peoria County Sheriff's deputy, and was more reserved than during the previous meeting, when 11 audience members spoke.

Board members discussed remote learning, quarantining and contact tracing, mask requirements and vaccinations. A number of changes to the school plan were suggested by board members, some of which became part of an amended school plan approved by the board and now available online at [brimfield309.com](http://brimfield309.com).

Wearing masks had been a hot topic at the meetings and the board voted in favor of the following language in the plan.

"Masking requirements in the District will be based on the mitigation levels found at the end of this Return to School Plan. To start the year, the District anticipates that masks will be optional in the school and at school events based on the current COVID-19 positivity rates in the area. Per CDC and IDPH requirements, masks will be required for ALL staff and students when riding in school vehicles."

Superintendent Tony Shinall said, "When I speak with folks, I tell them masks are recommended."

The plan also includes a return to the traditional bell schedule, with school starting at 8 a.m. and dismissing at 3:05 p.m.

Lockers and drinking fountains will again be used, field trips will be allowed and music programs can resume, including competitions and programs.

Also according to the plan, students who come in close contact to positive cases of COVID-19 must quarantine unless they are not symptomatic and are

vaccinated. A six-foot standard will be used for contact tracing.

Shinall said remote learning will be offered to students who are quarantining due to close contact to positive COVID cases. Other students who seek to not attend in-person classes will be evaluated on a "case-by-case basis" according to Shinall.

"We will have recordings and Webcams up and running during classes and teachers available via e-mail," he said. "We're excited to have our kids back from 8-3 every day and we're glad to welcome back as much normalcy as possible."

In other action, the board: approved paying \$24,829 for the Brimfield Grade School literacy curriculum; \$16,864 to HEART for cabling and hosted material; committee assignments; and discussed a Brimfield High School bass fishing team cooping with Farmington High School.

Also approved was the resignation of John Florey as grade school softball coach; the resignation of Tyler Harr as grade and high school band and choir director; the resignation of Josh McKown as high school assistant baseball coach; the hiring of Pam Asbell as a grade school teacher, pending certification; the hiring of Erick

Weiger as grade and high school band and choir teacher; and the hiring of Lynne Breitbarth as grade school cafeteria worker.

In his report, Shinall congratulated the custodial staff for preparing the schools for the new school year.

Billy Robison, high school principal, reported Brimfield's students SAT scores were higher than the

state's average.

Robison said students have the option to change their class schedules during the first week of school, in August.

Grade school Principal Julie Albritton reported the new bleachers were delivered July 16 and installation began July 19.

Construction on the secure entrance has begun and a new entrydoor was in-

# Elmwood will not 'mandate' mask wearing

ELMWOOD – Moments into a school board meeting that had drawn an unusually large crowd of more than 30 people, Elmwood Superintendent Chad Wagner made an announcement.

“We are not going to be mandating masks,” Wagner said. “For non-vaccinated people it is recommended to wear masks. That’s it.”

From there the board went on to discuss and to vote on a return-to-school plan that features optional mask wearing and no provisions for remote learning. Instead, students who are unable to attend school will participate in what Wagner called “synchronous learning” by following a livestream of a teacher in the classroom.

The board voted 4-2 in favor of the plan, with board members Mark Davis and Kevin Windish casting no votes.

During the meeting, Davis handed out to the audience a flyer he had produced independent of the board that was entitled “Statistics you should know about COVID-19.” Davis also said he did not like language in the plan that differentiated between vaccinated and unvaccinated students and staff.

Windish suggested the plan was not needed and that the district should go back to the way it operated prior to the pandemic. “Let’s let everybody be responsible for themselves,” Windish said.

The plan also includes three mitigation levels: minimal, under which positive cases are not increasing by more than 3 percent for two consecutive weeks; moderate, under which positive cases are increasing by 3-6 percent for two consecutive weeks; and substantial, for which positive cases are increasing by more than 6 percent each week.

To determine those positivity rates, Wagner said the district will consider numbers from “the Elmwood schools” instead of relying on local zip codes or Peoria County totals.

Other parts of the plan that were approved include:

- A return to the traditional bell schedule of 8:10 a.m. to 3:15 p.m., with early dismissals on Wednesdays at 2:15 p.m.

- Band and choir programs will resume regular programming, including concerts and competitions.

- Field trips are OK but all-school assemblies will not be held until vaccines are available for all students.

- Use of lockers and drinking fountains will resume.

- Visitors will not be permitted during school hours.

- SHIELD testing for students who come in contact with a positive case may be added at a later date pending findings by Wagner and approval by the board. The intent of the saliva tests, Wagner said, is to allow students to remain in school even after close contact with a COVID-positive case that would normally trigger quarantining. Wagner planned to

learn more about the SHIELD testing today and said he would provide more information at a later date.

In other business, the board welcomed new fourth-grade teacher Kayla Peters after approving her hire during the consent agenda.

Also approved was the hiring of: Janelle Meyers as JV volleyball coach, Luke Pratt as sophomore class sponsor, America Harmon as an elementary paraprofessional at \$13 per hour, Tom Bowers as a high school social studies teacher, Karen Mottaz as part-time high school art teacher at a salary of \$30,000 per year, and Charles Vermillion as part-time high school athletic director for \$8,587.23 per year.

Volunteers coaches approved include: Shawn Stage, Lynne Allen and Erin Magee (JH softball); Tucker Blum, Brett Stevens and Braden Collins (JH baseball); Tricia Little and Rachel Whitney (JH cross country); Kenny Blum (HS golf); Sarah Christy (spirit squad); Jeff Coulter (trap shooting); Joe Malone and Kolby Martin (bass fishing); Lance Zaerr (HS girls cross country); Tom Gorham and Mike Sullivan (HS boys cross country); Sullivan and Jackson Harkness (HS track); Kevin Faulkner, Mike Walker, Tom Bowers and Brady Westart (football); Kayla Peters (volleyball); Eric Yarbrough (HS marching band).

The board also approved retaining Midwest Orthopaedics for sports medicine services under a three-year contract at a cost of \$5,000 per year.

# IDPH aligns with stricter CDC mask rules

SPRINGFIELD – The state will have new COVID-19 guidance on face coverings after the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention updated its guidance Tuesday to reflect that even individuals vaccinated against COVID-19 should wear masks while indoors in areas of the country where the virus is surging.

CDC officials also recommended all teachers, staff, students and visitors in schools, regardless of vaccination status, should wear masks indoors as well, according to news reports covering an afternoon briefing by the federal agency. As of Tuesday afternoon, the full guidance

had not been posted online.

The Illinois Department of Public Health announced it will adopt the CDC guidance after Gov. JB Pritzker had said he would review it Tuesday.

Prior to Tuesday, Illinois had been following CDC guidance of the past two months which said unvaccinated individuals should wear masks indoors, but those who were vaccinated needed them only in certain settings.

The Illinois State Board of Education had recently fully adopted CDC guidance as well, which strongly encouraged but did not mandate masks.

But the Illinois Department of Public Health issued a news release later Tuesday saying it “is fully adopting” CDC masking guidelines, including

recommendation for schools.

The CDC guidance says masks should be worn by all individuals in areas of substantial transmission, which include those with 50 to 99 cases per 100,000 people over a 7-day period. Areas of high transmission are above that amount.

The case positivity rate in Illinois was also on the rise Tuesday, reaching 3.7 percent, a high since April 22. There were 1,669 confirmed or probable cases reported Tuesday out of 31,019 test results. Positivity rates were higher in southern Illinois, with Region 4 seeing a rate of 9.2 percent and southern Illinois’ Region 5 at 8.5 percent. All other regions were on an increasing pace as well.

when the ropes are tight and the horses are facing each other. Shipley's partner was Bronc Bogner of Arenzville.

For Breakaway Roping, a small string attaches a rope to the saddle horn. Attached to the rope near the string is a flag. A competitor is required to rope a calf, which breaks the string as it runs. When the judge sees the flag, the time is called.

In addition to these events, Shipley competed in Ribbon Roping, Goat Tying and Light Rifle.

About his accomplishments at the NJHFR, Shipley said, "You know you've done well in your state and have been a consistent competitor. But it's totally different to compete in that huge setting on TV with that much pressure and compete against the top four competitors from every state and also outside the U.S. Placing well at nationals is an honor because it means my roping really was good enough to stand up to that level of competition."

His greatest sense of victory at the competition was "catching absolutely everything I threw my rope at that

From spring to fall, he uses practice dummies and cattle at home where he has an arena. Sometimes he practices elsewhere, often at his roping partner's house. In winter, he also practices at an indoor arena in Delavan. This involves transporting his two horses, BarBee and Rabbit.

Horses are important for kids interested in rodeo. Shipley's advice is "to buy an older, trained experienced horse" for learning and success.

Ever the representative for rodeo, Shipley is one of four Cinch team members in Illinois. He was selected for the team by a committee that chooses members through a nomination process. As a team member, Shipley's role is to "promote rodeo and encourage kids to join."

Those interested can join the IJRA, which is open to grades K-8, the Junior High Division of National High School Rodeo Association (NHSRA), which is open to grades 5-8, and then the High School Division of NHSRA.

"We love to have people come watch and hope they will want to try it. We are always looking for new members," Cade said.

Regarding calf roping, he said, "I have a bad habit of jumping off because I started when I was a lot shorter. Now that I'm taller, I need to step down the right way."

# Law repeals criminal penalties for HIV transmission

SPRINGFIELD — Gov. JB Pritzker signed a bill into law Tuesday that repeals criminal penalties for people who transmit HIV to others.

House Bill 1063 deletes language adopted in Illinois and many other states during the early days of the HIV epidemic that made it a felony for an individual to engage in certain activities such as unprotected sex, donating blood or tissue or sharing nonsterile intravenous needles knowing that he or she was infected with HIV.

At a bill signing ceremony in Chi-

cago, Pritzker said the legislation is one more step his administration is taking to ensure equal rights for members of the LGBTQ community.

Other steps have included providing financial aid to transgender students who otherwise would not qualify for federal aid, requiring curriculum in public schools that includes contributions of the LGBTQ community, and expanding Medicaid to cover gender-affirming surgery.

The bill decriminalizing HIV was one of four bills Pritzker signed Tuesday supported by advocates for LGBTQ rights.

Senate Bill 139 establishes a pro-

cess for individuals to change the gender language on their marriage certificates while House Bill 2590 establishes a uniform standard that county clerks must adhere to for name changes on marriage certificates. Pritzker also signed House Bill 3709, which prohibits insurance companies from imposing restrictions on coverage of fertility medications and treatments, enabling LGBTQ individuals and single parents to receive those treatments under the same conditions as heterosexual individuals. It also reduces the waiting time to receive those treatments for women over age 35.

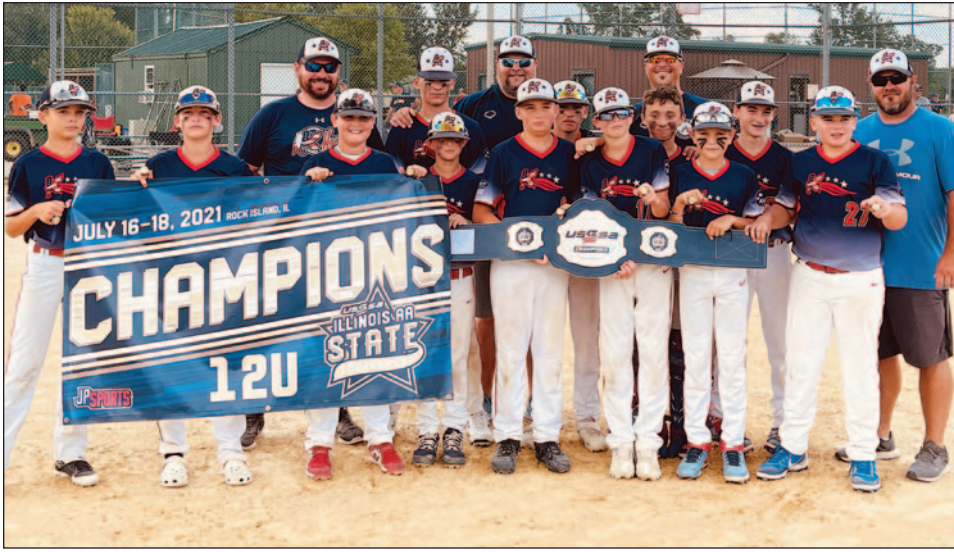
