

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Elmwood gets first Walldog mural

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD – The first of several murals depicting historically significant scenes from Elmwood's past is now on display.

The mural is located 1 mile south of Elmwood near the intersection of North Wiley Road and West Graham Chapel Road, within a stone's throw of the historic Phelps Barn. The mural depicts a group of fleeing slaves and gives details on the history of the barn, which was built in 1845 and was a signal station on the Underground Railroad.

As the story goes, when lanterns were lit and light shined through a cross carved near the east peak of the barn, fugitive slaves knew it was safe to continue their travels north. If there was no light, the

slaves knew not to pass.

The mural was created by the Walldogs, artists and sign painters who delight in installing murals across the country, with a concentration in Kewanee and nearby towns like Galva, Toulon and Wyoming. Some painting was done in a studio on "wallboard" and finishing touches were completed on site by Scott "Cornbread"

Lindley of Mount Pulaski and Michael Clark of Aledo.

Elmwood carpenter Fred Lantz built a framework to support the mural, which functions similar to a permanent billboard. The Elmwood Historical Society funded the \$10,000 project.

Back to school gets heated in Brimfield

By JEFF LAMPE For The Weekly Post While mask-wearing debates have played out among most Illinois school boards, among area schools, only the Brimfield board passed a Return to School plan that does not comply with Gov. JB Pritzker's Aug. 4 mask man-

date. At its Aug. 11 meeting, the Brimfield School Board joined a handful of other Illinois schools by opting to make mask wearing optional, based on its own plan. The Brimfield plan includes three different mitigation levels and, based on COVID-19 positivity rates, the expectation was that school would open on Aug. 18 in Mitigation Level 1, under which mask wearing was not required of all students and teachers.

The board vote was 5-2 in

favor of that plan. Members Todd Johnson and Steve Updyke voted to follow Pritzker's mandate. Voting in favor of the Brimfield plan were Mark Bell, Brent Graham, Patrick Meyer, Jason Snyder and Lauren Coyle.

Since that vote, Superintendent Tony Shinall said he has received a letter from the Illinois State Board of Education to inform him that the Brimfield district's status has been changed to "on probation."

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SCHOOLS: Brimfield to hold special board meeting

Continued from Page 1 tion is being advertised in this newspaper. She had no comment on her resignation when contacted.

The Brimfield board also scheduled a special meeting for Wednesday, Aug. 18, well in advance of its scheduled Sept. 15 meeting.

Shinall said last Friday that he had been contacted by the ISBE after the board vote.

"They had been made aware of the adopted plan and wanted confirmation, either positive or negative, that the executive mandate was going to be instituted on campus," Shinall said. "I replied that the board

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had passed their plan and that the board's plan would be operating in Mitigation Level 1, if appropriate."

Shinall said he planned to calculate case positivity rates daily, based on data for zip codes in the Brimfield School District (61517, 61528 and 61529). Mitigation levels are based on the average positivity rate in the 10 days prior to the Aug. 18 school start date.

Shinall also said last week that, "If there is a change in [the Return to School] policy, it would be directed by the board in a meeting."

In a letter to the Brimfield community on Sunday, Shinall sought to answer questions regarding the school year.

Among the bullet points in his letter were:

• "Our Return to School Plan follows the CDC guidance in regards to masking in mitigation level 1."

• "Our Return to School Plan is much more restrictive than the CDC guidance and follows the Governor's mask mandate in mitigation levels 2 and 3."

• "The legality of the Governor's mask mandate as well as the ability of

ISBE to punish schools for not following is currently being challenged in at least one case."

• "Assuming we receive the same letter that was sent to other schools from ISBE, if we are placed on probation, we will likely be given 60 days to implement corrective action before any further punitive action is taken. During this probationary period, we believe the following:

- "We likely will not lose state funding."

- "Outdoor sports that are not co-op will likely not be affected."

- "For indoor sports, teams are to communicate with opponents what our mitigation plan is. In that communication, we are to ascertain if we are welcome on the campus of our opponents and/or if they feel comfortable coming to play on our campus. Our opponents have the right to require us to wear masks if they allow us to compete on their campus."

- "Co-op sports will be required to follow the universal masking requirement in the Co-op partner's plan."

Warsaw is another Illinois school at which the board voted to open without adhering to Pritzker's

mandate. That west-central Illinois school was subsequently sent a letter from State Superintendent of Education Dr. Carmen Ayala informing the district that Warsaw had its status lowered to "On Probation" for exhibiting "deficiencies that present a health hazard or a danger to students or staff."

Ayala said Warsaw was required to submit a "corrective plan" within 60 days of a conference to be scheduled with the ISBE. If no plan is submitted after that, or if the plan is not approved by ISBE, Ayala wrote that Warsaw would be dropped to "Nonrecognized."

That could impact state funding and IHSA sports participation.

Shinall said the letter Brimfield received from the ISBE was "similar" to the one sent to Warsaw. Other nearby schools that have so far voted to make masks optional or recommended include Abingdon-Avon, Monmouth United, Spoon River Valley and West Central. Timothy Christian, a private school in Elmhurst, originally opted to make masks optional, but later said it would enforce the mask mandate.

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

Calculating the 'true cost' of food

Like any chain, today's ubiquitous "supply chains" are only as strong as their weakest links. Americans again learned this elemental lesson a year ago when the rapidly exploding COVID-19 pandemic swept the nation's streets, sidewalks, and pantries clean of cars, people and groceries.

Less evident are today's stillbroken links in the global food supply

chain. For example, according to the American Farm **Bureau Federation** (AFBF), handling delays continue to cripple the ports

of Los Angeles, Long Beach, and Oakland, Calif., the three key U.S. avenues to the vast Japanese and Chinese ag export markets.

In fact, the delays are so long, noted AFBF in mid-June, that some shippers now "consider it more efficient to ship empty containers" back to Asia "which has led to a significant decline in the number of containers available to agricultural exporters."

And that's not the only weak link the pandemic exposed in today's ever-longer, increasingly thinner food supply chain. In a detailed, 38-page analysis titled "True Cost of Food," released late last month and referenced here in a recent column, the Rockefeller Foundation took a hard look at the cost of "producing, processing, retailing, and wholesaling the food we buy and eat."

In 2019, the year before the mar-

ket-cracking pandemic, that cost was \$1.1 trillion.

This enormous sum, however, "does not include the cost of healthcare for the millions who fall ill with diet-related diseases," the report states. "Nor does (it) include the present and future costs of the food system's contribution to water and air pollution, reduced biodiversity, or greenhouse gas emissions ... "

If you "take those costs into account ... it becomes clear that the true cost of the U.S. food system is at least three times as big – \$3.2 trillion."

And, says the Rockefeller analysts, there's no way to put lipstick on any part of this pig.

"Poor nutrition is now the leading cause of poor health in the United States" and "(t)he majority of adult hospitalizations (are) 'attributable to one of four pre-existing conditions: obesity, hypertension, diabetes, and heart failure, in that order."

Ironically, the Americans who carry "the burden of impact of these costs are disproportionately borne by communities that are marginalized and underserved, often communities of color, many of whom are the backbone (of our food system) as farmers, fishers, ranchers, and food workers."

Principally the rural working poor and immigrant communities that handle almost 70 percent of every helping of meat, poultry, vegetable, fruit and dairy served daily in the U.S.

Today's rising costs can be slowed, then clipped, suggest the authors, by following strategies already in place in other nations. For example, "If diet-related disease prevalence rates

were reduced to be comparable to countries such as Canada, health care costs could be reduced by close to \$250 billion per year," in the U.S.

How? Simple, by doing better at what we're all guilty of not doing most meals - eating better.

The same is true for working to better the health of the only world we have: "Similarly, if the U.S. can reduce agriculture-specific emissions to comply with the 1.5C pathway," contain the rise of global temperature to just 1.5 degrees Centigrade - "then close to \$100 billion could be reduced in additional environmental costs."

So we do have a choice.

We can work collectively to put more slack in today's costly, climatealtering, and often unhealthy food supply chain or, "If left unaddressed, the true cost of food will continue to rise and negatively contribute to climate change, the prevalence of dietrelated diseases, and growing inequity."

Which has been the commonsense conclusion of nearly every examination of the American food system long before business-school talk of supply chains, block chains, and export chains came to dominate U.S. agriculture.

In fact, we have enough chains. What we badly need more of is less costly, more environmentally-sound regional and local food systems. © 2021 ag comm

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

2022 a rebuilding year for Illinois GOP

To borrow a popular sports metaphor, 2022 is likely a rebuilding year for an Illinois Republican Party that is on the ropes (can't get away from sports lingo). To be honest, chances of the GOP winning statewide offices

next year are slim, but not impossible. And unless overturned by the courts, the hideously tortured redraw of legislative and congressional districts - an af-

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will if anything build on the twothirds majorities Democrats hold at the district level.

I suggest the Illinois Republican Party focus on nominating a broadly attractive slate of state candidates, which will be hugely difficult in and of itself. Second, the party should also focus on the one potential bright spot opportunity - electing a majority on the seven-member Illinois Supreme Court - for the first time in six decades!

After all, it is the Dem majority on the state high court that has repeatedly blocked efforts to provide voters fair districting, and has over the decades reliably blocked any court matter that would importune Cook County Democrats.

Here's the situation:

At the top of the ticket is inoffensive U.S. Sen. Tammy Duckworth, an Army helicopter pilot who lost her legs fighting for our country. Next on the ballot is Gov. JB Pritzker, who is rich as Croesus and willing to spend the same \$171 million, more if necfor guv.

How would you like to go up against those two?!

Complicating matters is the shadow cast by Donald Trump. The Donald is wildly popular in small town and rural Illinois. This means that candidates who trumpet their Trumpism are odds-on favorites to win statewide GOP primaries – and lose the general election in the voterich Chicago suburbs where women tend to disdain Trump.

When I was a kid in politics half a century ago, the GOP party organizations at the state and county level still had some influence over who would win primary nominations. That, by the way, was the historic purpose of party organizations: To influence, even control, primary nominations, by rallying the precinct workers in behalf of candidates the party leaders felt had the best chance of winning the general election.

Not today, when GOP party organizations have many chieftains, but almost no Indians to work the trenches. And no money unless a Daddy Warbucks sort, like billionaire Ken Griffin, once again matches Pritzker.

The Cook County Democratic Organization has always done a good job of building a bench of attractive up-and-comers, promising them good jobs in government should they lose, until the next elective opportunity came along.

Look at it this way. If you were an attractive young GOP contender, why would you put yourself up against the Democratic state slate, likely lose, and then watch others walk over your dead political body to run when prospects might subsequently be better?

in just my central Illinois, such as state Senators Jason Barickman (Bloomington) and Sue Rezin (Morris) and Representative Ryan Spain (Peoria; a former student of mine).

So, ideally, the Illinois Republican Party should somehow identify the best prospects across the state, and say to them, "We will find money to back your campaigns for state office in both the primary and general. If you lose, we will find positions for you at good law firms or companies until you have a better shot at electoral success. We have your back."

That is, obviously, easier said than done. Instead, I worry that the party will, out of impotence, endorse an open primary, leave the field to Trump acolytes, and go down in a ball of flames in November.

Now, to the GOP opportunity: The Dems created new state Supreme Court districts, and there are races to fill judicial slots in two, possibly three, of the five new districts. Even though the Dems redrew the districts to give them a chance at holding on to their 4-3 majority, Republicans have a good shot at winning all the open seats, which would give the GOP a 4-3 majority.

I am betting the issues in the court races will be: 1) law and order, and 2) "A GOP court is the only way to prevent total, absolute Democratic control of the state, which is never healthy."

For the present, the Illinois Republican Party ought to be looking to a post-Trump world, by building a bench now that can win, if not now, in the future.

Lawmakers honor Peoria's ties to pen-

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD – Lawmakers gathered Tuesday at the University of Illinois Springfield to designate a new state microbe and add agriculture sciences to the list of courses that fulfill admissions requirements at state universities.

Penicillium rubens NRRL 1951, which yields the antibiotic penicillin, was designated as the official state microbe in House Bill 1879, which Gov. JB Pritzker signed Tuesday.

While the first mold spore that produces penicillin was discovered in Europe in 1928, the National Center for Agriculture Utilization in Peoria, known as the Ag Lab, was the site of the penicillium rubens discovery in the 1940s which allowed for speedier production of the antibiotic used to treat several infections.

Peoria Democrat Sen. Dave

Koehler, who sponsored the bill in the Senate, noted penicillin's contribution to halting bacterial infections such as gangrene in soldiers wounded in World War II.

"There was no way to treat it," Koehler said while holding up a specimen of the mold discovered in Peoria. "Penicillin stopped that."

"Not only did the mass production of penicillin in Peoria change the world by helping us win World War II and saving countless lives across the globe, but it also provided an important recipe that I think we should follow here in Illinois today," House sponsor Rep. Ryan Spain, R-Peoria, said at the news conference.

Spain announced stakeholders from Peoria are launching a "comprehensive effort to return bio manufacturing and pharmaceutical mass production to central Illinois," known as Peoria Bio-Made. "We are collaborating with leading biotech entrepreneurs in San Diego and Boston to bring discoveries from the coast back to Peoria for last-mile testing and full scale production," he said.

A bipartisan group of lawmakers also celebrated the governor's signature on House Bill 3218 and Senate Bill 1624, which add "agriculture education" to the list of acceptable electives to qualify a student for admission to state universities, and "agricultural sciences" to the list of acceptable science courses for admission.

"These young people who are taking agricultural science, it allows them to meet the science requirements in high school, so as they move through college, they've got that background," said Sen. Elgie Sims, D-Chicago.

The bills take effect in January.

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Farmington council discusses city building

For The Weekly Post FARMINGTON - The search for a suitable city building once again dominated a Farmington City Council meeting on Monday.

At issue were estimates for roof repairs for the current city building at 322 E. Fort St. and an engineer's report on two other buildings that have been proposed as a viable option by local business owner Cassandra Anderson.

City administrator Rollen Wright reported on the leaky roof at the city building after having reached out to three contractors for estimates and feedback: Kreiling Roofing Co. of Peoria, Holthaus Companies of Canton and Massey Roofing of Edwards.

A representative from Holthaus identified six "soft spots" in the rubber roof that were patched for under \$800. A Massey estimator also looked at the structure and said the "integrity" of the rubber roof was still good, but speculated that the main source of leaks was around the 19 protrusions cut in the roof for pipes, chimneys and vents. Massey proposed a plan to reroof and seal around those protrusions for \$10,000.

Council member Chuck Rask suggested the council should move forward with patching the roof and "making this building feasible for a little longer." Added Rask, "We

know we're going to have to stay here for several years until things calm down with the virus ... and with building materials."

The council asked to see formal roofing bids at its next meeting on Sept. 6.

Wright also presented a report from Keith Plavec of Maurer-Stutz, Inc. on three buildings at 16 N. Cone St. owned by O'Brian Companies, LLC and the Froehling Weber & Schell building at 165 E. Fort St.

Plavec's report noted that if the city were to buy the properties, it would take those buildings off the tax rolls. He also indicated that the buildings have issues with ADA compliance and said demolition could cost \$100,000 to \$125,000 if the city sought to pursue that option. That could bring the total cost of acquisition and demolition to \$450,000 to \$500,000 before a building was even constructed.

Anderson objected to demolition costs being mentioned, since she said that was not part of the intent of having an engineer examine the buildings. She had previously presented the council various "layouts" for use of the buildings that would involve remodeling and renovation to make them suitable for use by the city. Anderson said she thought the engineer was going to report on the structural condition of the buildings, which was not part of the report presented.

Council members Rask and Joey Boggs said that now was not the time to consider renovations or construction of a new building due to a shortage of building materials and inflated costs.

"Personally I think we need to table this thing until prices get back to normal," Boggs said.

Wright also played a video narrated by council member David Black that shows the interior of the current city building and highlights some of the problems with the structure, including roof leaks and obsolete heating and cooling systems. That video was to be posted online for public perusal.

In other business, the council approved the Farmington JFL using bleachers from Jacobs Park at its JFL field this season.

Superintendent of public works Dave Ehlers presented a report and told the council that concrete work should be completed this week on First Ave., Second Ave. and Apple Street. Ehlers said there is not a firm date yet for milling and overlay on those streets.

Finally, in public comment the council heard complaints about two properties on West Fort Street, one that is overgrown with weeds, high grass and trees and another that has numerous old vehicles. Farmington police plan to issue reminder notes to the property owners.

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MURALS: Two more murals to go up in October

Continued from Page 1 have spearheaded the effort to bring Walldogs art to Elmwood. The Phelps Barn piece is the first of three planned to go up this year. Two more are expected in November: a mural dedicated to Frank J. Wing at 112 E. Main St. and another focusing on city founder William J. Phelps on the east side of the Elmwood Insurance Services building at 124 E. Main St. Both of those murals will be painted directly onto the buildings.

While the story of Phelps is familiar to every Elmwood schoolkid, and even many adults, Wing is a less well-known figure. Fred Paige said Wing went to school in Elmwood in the late 1800s and, after graduating from Grinnell College in Iowa, taught at the nearby Paradise Chapel one-room schoolhouse.

From there, Wing took a job as a cartoonist at the Minneapolis (Minn.) Journal newspaper, one of many Twin Cities papers he drew for while developing a widespread and loyal following. Wing also taught at an art correspondence school in Minneapolis, and it was in the latter role that he became a mentor for famed cartoonist Charles M. Schulz, creator of

"Peanuts" and familiar characters Charlie Brown, Snoopy and Lucy. Will one of Schulz's iconic characters appear on the mural? Time

will tell. Wing and his wife, Armina, are buried in Elmwood Township Cemetery.

Paige said at least three other sites are being considered for murals next year. Ultimately, he said the hope is to have eight of the artworks in town.

"The focus of this is to give people something else to do when they visit," Paige said. "It's another reason to visit town. Elmwood has a lot of art attractions."

Funding has come from business owners, committee members and from donations - which can be made at Farmers State Bank, to the Elmwood Historical Society or to the Elmwood Development Association.









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

GOP says census proves maps illegal

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - Republicans in the Illinois General Assembly say new, detailed census numbers released last week show the legislative maps that Democrats pushed through in the spring are unconstitutional.

The Census Bureau released the data Aug. 12, several months later than usual due to delays caused by the COVID-19 pandemic and other factors. The numbers show population counts down to the




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block level, which is what lawmakers need in order to draw districts that are as close to equal in population as possible.

Due to the delays, Democrats who control the General Assembly drew maps using population estimates based on survey data. Under the Illinois Constitution, waiting beyond June 30 for the official data would have triggered a provision putting the process in the hands of a bipartisan legislative commission.

"Just as we predicted, the maps that were drawn by



said Monday. Previous U.S. Supreme Court decisions have held that in state legislative districts, populations can vary by as much as 10 percent between the largest and smallest districts. Variations below that amount can still be found unconstitutional if they are shown to be discriminatory. But variations of more than 10 percent generally have been held unconstitutional.

Republicans are arguing that based on their analysis, the smallest and largest districts contained in the new maps that were passed this spring and signed into law by Gov. JB Pritzker vary by just under 30 percent from 92,390 in the 83rd House District, which includes Aurora, to 124,836 in the 5th House District.

In June, Durkin and Senate Minority Leader Dan McConchie, of Hawthorn Woods, filed a federal lawsuit seeking to have the maps overturned and asking the court either to order the formation of the bipartisan redistricting commission or appoint a special master to draw new maps.

Ameren Illinois Company d/b/a Ameren Illinois: Ameren Illinois (or the Company) hereby gives notice to the public that on April 15, 2021, it filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC or Commission) proposed changes in its rates and charges for electric delivery services throughout its territory in Illinois pursuant to its Rider MAP-P, performance-based formula rate tariff, and updated its calculation of rates and charges per the formula rate tariff. The changes are applicable to Ameren Illinois Rate Zones I, II and III, as more fully described below. The changes in rate schedule are proposed to take effect with the January 2022 billing period - after the Commission issues its final Order. The Commission has up to 240 days to complete this proceeding and issue its final Order.

This filing conforms to Illinois Public Acts 097-0616, 097-0646 and 098-0015 (the "Law"). These Public Acts also require the Company to spend \$625 million in electric system modernization investments over a 10-year period. This modernization will benefit customers and create 450 new jobs during the peak program year. In addition, the Law requires the Company to meet various performance metrics intended to increase reliability, reduce outage durations and provide improved service to customers, or be subject to financial penalties.

The proposed updated formula rate revenue requirement results in an overall annual increase of \$64.09 million from the electric revenue requirement last ordered by the ICC in Docket No. 20-0381. Proposed rates in this proceeding will reflect rate design changes, including rate uniformity among the same Rate Classes in different Rate Zones, with two exceptions as approved in Docket No. 19-0877. The Pole Charge for DS-5 lighting customers in Rate Zone III and Meter Reassignment Charge for certain DS-3 and DS-4 customers in Rate Zone I will remain independent by Rate Zone.

For the DS-1 Residential Delivery Service classification, the proposed increase in electric delivery service and electric distribution tax (EDT) cost recovery revenue is 6.2 percent.

The rates for delivery service and EDT cost recovery constitute only a portion of the total bill of a customer currently taking bundled electric service from Ameren Illinois or taking supply service from a third-party supplier. The following compares the Company's proposal to the bundled bill (delivery service charges that are in effect today and purchased power charges effective through May 2021) for residential customers:

1) For a residential customer using 5,000 kWh annually (or average of 417 kWh monthly), the effect of the delivery service bill changes being proposed by the Company produces an average monthly increase of \$1.86.

2) For a residential customer using 10,000 kWh annually (or average of 833 kWh monthly), the effect of the delivery service bill changes being proposed by the Company produce an average monthly increase of \$2.77.

3) For a residential customer using 18,000 kWh per year (or average of 1,500 kWh monthly), the effect of the delivery service bill changes being proposed by the Company produce an average monthly increase of \$3.69.

For non-residential customers, the proposed changes in electric delivery service and EDT cost recovery revenue are as follows:

For DS-2, Small General Delivery Service, 10.2 percent increase;
For DS-2, (Optional Charges), Small General Delivery Service,

- 11.6 percent increase;
- For DS-3, General Delivery Service, 12.1 percent increase;
- For DS-4, Large General Delivery Service, 11.2 percent increase;

• For DS-5, Lighting Service, 11.9 percent increase; and

• For DS-6, Temperature Sensitive Delivery Service, 12.1 percent increase.




