Dragonfly migration reaching peak

For The Weekly Post Just last week, a friend who lives along the Kaskaskia River messaged me with a video exclaiming, "Look at all these dragonflies!" Throughout the next few days, I received similar messages there were large swarms of dragonflies being sighted.

I had marked on my calendar for Aug. 20, "start watching for dragonfly migration," so I wasn't off by much.

Out of the nearly 100 species of dragonflies and damselflies (called odonates) found in Illinois, we have a few migrating species. Species we are most likely to see in "migration swarms" are green darners, black saddlebags and meadowhawk.

While scientists know that

dragonflies and damselflies migrate from mid-August through mid-September, there's still lots of research to be done.

We know that some years, especially those years that tend to produce many mosquitoes, we see more significant swarms and more prominent migration movements. Mosquitoes are one of a dragonflies' main foods. So not only are they pretty flying jewels, their feeding habits are a bonus. A single dragonfly can consume

100 mosquitoes in one day! Dragonflies have evolved to be almost perfect insects. Their quad wings and expert flying combined with their nearly 360-degree vision make them not only very adept predators but also efficient *Continued on Page 7*

Brimfield reverses decision on masks

For The Weekly Post BRIMFIELD – After a lengthy and emotional meeting last Wednesday, the Brimfield School Board reversed its stance on wearing masks in school.

The board had previously opted to follow its own Return to School plan when classes started on Aug. 18, which meant mask wearing was optional so long as local COVID case numbers remained under a certain threshold.

But Brimfield schools were placed on probation by the Illinois State Board of Education, and board members voted 4-2 at the Aug. 18 special meeting to heed Gov. JB Pritzker's mask mandate. Voting in favor of the change were board members Steve Updyke, Todd Johnson, Brent Graham and Jason

Snyder. Voting no were Mark Bell and Patrick Meyer.

Starting Monday, students, teachers, staff and visitors in Brimfield schools over the age of 2 were required to wear masks while indoors.

That decision came the same day as a capacity crowd packed into the Illinois State Board of Education room on Aug. 18 – with many more standing outside the building – to protest the indoor mask mandate in all public and nonpublic schools.

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MASKS: More than 24 schools on probation

Continued from Page 1 Resilience is something you choose," said Ruby Johnson, a mother of seven children from New Lenox. "Our kids did not choose to be masked all day, unable to see their friends or teachers smile at them, to have to COVID test to stay in school, to be burdened with the idea that they carry an invisible disease that they could make their friends sick with."

Pritzker issued the mask mandate in an executive order Aug. 4, shortly after the U.S Centers for Disease Control and Prevention issued updated guidelines for schools in response to a surge in the highly contagious delta





variant of COVID-19. Those guidelines urge "universal indoor masking" by all students over the age of 2, staff, teachers, and visitors to K-12 schools, regardless of vaccination status.

Since then, ISBE has put more than two dozen public and nonpublic school systems on probationary status for refusing to comply with the mandate, although some have since had their status restored after later agreeing to comply.

Under the state's administrative code, schools can be placed on probation for "deficiencies that present a health hazard or a danger to students or staff." When that happens, the schools are given 60 days to submit a plan for correcting the deficiency and, if they fail to do so, risk losing state recognition.

"I'm taking this requirement extremely seriously because every single student in Illinois deserves a safe in-person education this fall," State Superintendent Carmen Ayala said at the start of the meeting. "I know this is a difficult time to be a leader, and I deeply appreciate the cooperation and the leadership of all the superintendents and principals across our state."

But several local and regional superintendents argued the decision about how to reopen should be left to local leaders, as it was during early phases of the pandemic.

"For decades now in Springfield, our school leadership across the state has fought one battle after another over state mandates," said Kyle Thompson, regional superintendent for Region 11 in east-central Illinois. "Our politicians at the state capitol are often well intentioned when they add to our daily demands over the curriculum we provide, the meals we serve, our dress codes and much more. However, too often they don't realize the costs that come from these more isolated decisions. Under COVID-19, mandates have become politically polarizing and our students are suffering as a result of it."

Shane Gordon, superintendent of Bluford USD 318 in southern Illinois, said the polarizing atmosphere surrounding mask mandates has been a challenge for all school officials in Illinois, and he said ISBE's strict enforcement of the mandate was adding to the challenge. "My district did choose to follow the mandate, by a 4-3 vote," he said. "Quite honestly, this decision was one made out of fear of this organization and the consequences associated. I'm before you today to express that fear is no way to govern, and fear is no way to lead."

Since that vote, Gordon said, he and members of the Bluford school board have been targets of harsh criticism in the community.

"I wish to express the current situation created by Springfield is untenable in many school districts across the state," he said. "Good people are leaving as a result of this."

Not all superintendents who spoke opposed the mask mandate or ISBE's enforcement of it.

Sheri Smith, superintendent of the Forrestville Valley School District in northwest Illinois, argued that putting districts on probation might be too lenient because it actually gives districts additional time to continue defying the executive order.

Those statements came during the public comment portion of the meeting. The board took no action on the mask mandate, and Ayala gave no indication that she intends to ease up on the enforcement of it.

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Pandemics are good for Big Ag oligopolists

This year of striking contrasts continues to build: a late winter of pandemic horror, a spring of vaccine relief, a summer of social sunshine, now a Covid reprise this fall.

For agriculture, August delivered its own contrasts. For example, the often market-rattling August Crop

Report carried the unlikely news of near-record 2021 corn and soybean crops and nearrecord 2022 corn and soybean prices.

On the food side of the farm-andfood divide, the news was equally

record-smashing. Cargill, the global commodity player, reported fiscal 2021 sales of a staggering \$134.4 billion and a profit of nearly \$5 billion, a record in its 156-year history.

Likewise, Tyson Foods, Inc., the giant poultry and livestock butcher recently reported third quarter profits 93 percent higher than a year ago.

Both results prove again that there's a lot of money in putting blood on the slaughterhouse floor. They also prove that pandemics are really good for Big Ag oligopolists.

The hungry poor in America finally got their day this month, too, when Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack announced Aug. 16 that Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits will rise 25 percent on Oct. 1. That's great news for the still-shockingly high number of U.S. citizens - one in eight, or 12 percent - who receive the monthly food assistance.

A 25 percent increase in SNAP benefits sounds like an absolute windfall until you do the math. According to FERN, the Food & Environment Reporting Network, the Biden Administration's boost in food assistance will increase "SNAP benefits by \$36 per person per month from their pre-pandemic average of \$121 per month."

That means that after Oct. 1, SNAP recipients will move from spending an average \$1.33 per meal per month to a whopping \$1.75 per meal per month.

But that's not entirely accurate either. While the Oct. 1 boost will increase monthly benefits 25 percent, the actual rise will be just 10 percent because previous "emergency" Covid legislation had already raised standard SNAP benefits 15 percent.

Before SNAP critics rise to (again) baselessly claim that enhanced benefits will encourage enrollment, the fact is that the pandemic - not a crack at a measly \$0.42 more per meal - has already done that: six million more Americans enrolled in SNAP during the pandemic when dire need, not nickel-and-dime benefits, fueled the rise.

Few people, after all, choose to be poor and no one chooses to be both poor and hungry.

The additional people and better benefits will increase SNAP costs. In 2019, the program cost \$60.4 billion; in 2021, USDA forecasts the cost will total \$114 billion.

That near-doubling of SNAP has Congressional deficit hawks sharpening their knives and wagging their tongues. The two senior Republican members of the Senate and House

Ag committees, in fact, asked the General Accountability Office (GAO) to review the math USDA used to boost the benefits before USDA even announced the boost.

But spending limits aren't the key to slowing SNAP's rapid rise. The key is just the opposite: earning. Somewhere between 60 and 70 percent of all SNAP recipients are employed; they work. Most, however, earn too little to purchase enough healthy food to sustain themselves or their families.

And we're not talking older, unskilled people who work for mom & pop businesses.

Indeed, "Among the 15 [state] agencies overseeing the Medicaid and food-stamp [SNAP] programs," studied by GAO for a 2020 report, "Walmart was among the top four employers with beneficiaries in each of the 15 programs. McDonald's was among the top five employers whose workers received federal benefits from 13 of the 15 state agencies."

Two other stores with a large rural presence on GAO's 2020 list of shameless government grifters were Dollar Tree and Dollar General.

So, if you really want to limit SNAP's rising costs, make its biggest beneficiaries, Big Biz and Big AgBiz, use a tiny portion of their record profits to pay their employees a living wage.

Until they do, American taxpayers - you and me - will pay.

Some optimism for the future of Illinois

I had lunch the other day with two friends from way back. As we sat down at a public golf course in Prophetstown in northwest Illinois, I realized each of us has been pres-

ident of a respected statewide organization over the many decades.

There might be a column here, I thought.

Bud Thompson (his longtime neighbors would

be surprised to learn his given name is Howard) was called back early from art school in Taos, New Mexico, as a teen in 1948 to take over the family

business. Bud built the business into five hog-buying stations, and sold millions of pigs to packers across the Midwest over a successful career. Bud was elected to his local school board in 1958, and a few years later as president of the Illinois Association of School Boards.

In 1978, Gov. Jim Thompson appointed Bud to the Illinois State Board of Education, where he became vice chair. Now 90 and sharp as a tack, Bud was reelected in 2020 to the Whiteside County Board, making him maybe the oldest elected official in the state.

A craggy, tall drink of water, Jon Whitney went to college on a basketball scholarship, and dreamed of the NBA until he realized his Converse sneakers were basically glued to the gym floor. Educated to teach English literature, Jon instead bought the Carroll County Review in 1967, which he and his wife have about every civic, service and local government group you can shake a stick at.

So, with two-and-a-half centuries of active life experience among us, I'd say we have the credentials to do some summing up.

I asked my buddies: What guidance do you have for your grandchildren, going forward?

"Education, and more education," declared Bud immediately, which wasn't surprising, "and do something you're passionate about. Develop the capacity to learn new skills in a society that is changing at breakneck speed."

In other words, the best protections against the vagaries of life are marketable education and skills.

What are the biggest changes you have seen in society since World War II?

"The American family has changed dramatically," Jon said.

Indeed, I chimed in, drawing on earlier reading about how singleparent households had increased from 7 percent of all in 1968 to 25 percent one recent year (66 percent among African American households).

"Ozzie and Harriet are gone, the churches are almost empty and the jails are full," Bud continued. "Interest in public service is down as well, and ditto for membership in service clubs," added Jon.

My contribution to the conversation: The pace of life since my childhood eight decades ago seems to have gone from slow and calm, to frenetic and stressful. If so, I collar television, smartphones and social media for bringing the world and all its crises, catastrophes and conflicts into our noggins, relentlessly. It's enough to keep us on edge, possibly create snappish behavior. After all, the mind can handle only so much at one time. The big, indeed pleasant, surprise to me at lunch was the bullish attitude these two lifelong Prairie Staters have about the future of Illinois. I expected the same gloom and doom I hear elsewhere. What do these guys know that others don't?

The two seemed to brush off our fiscal, corruption, high property tax and other problems as addressable, at least for leaders who want to solve problems.

As for positives: "Land," declared Jon, "and water," blurted Bud. The latter was understandable, us being at a public golf course within not much more than a stone's throw from both the Mississippi and Rock rivers.

"And it's not only the good earth we have," said Jon, "but the availability of good land, right in the middle of the nation, for housing and production."

In support, I recalled the cogent observation of entrepreneur Jim Schultz of Effingham, which I have used before: In each of the five Rs critical for economic development rivers, runways, rails, roads, and routers – Illinois is among the top three states in the nation.

So, instead of an echo chamber of negatives, Bud and Jon lamented, we must do a better job of trumpeting our many pluses to the world. We couldn't over one lunch resolve all the issues we raised. Yet, I am encouraged these two friends of mine, obviously not yet over the hill, still have the fire in the belly to contribute, and keep looking ahead.

The board also discussed the possible loss of funding if it did not heed the mask mandate, liability concerns and the possible loss of recognition status by the ISBE.

Afer the mask discussion, the board heard that the district has been unable to hire a part-time art teacher for the elementary school. The board voted in favor of the administration's recommendation to

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move art to the K-5 classroom for teachers to teach and adding a Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics class for all K-5 students.

Princeville hires K-5 teacher for STEAM

For this year, preliminary enrollment totals for Princeville show 284 students in grade K-5, 147 students in grades 6-8 and 206 in the high school.

Kelly Jenkins provided the tech report and said that 450 new devices have been enrolled and set up and 500 devices have been updated, cleaned and repaired as needed. Students in grade 6, 9 and 12 have been issued new HP G9 Chromebooks as part of the district's regular replacement cycle.

Duling reported that the Unit Office/Head Start renovation is nearly completed and "looks great." He also accepted a resignation from Kelly Trees as a special education aide.

Finally, Duling presented a budget that he said is very tentative since work is still being done to finalize grants and because teacher salary negotiations started Aug. 19.

In other action, the board approved:

• An agreement with Princeville State Bank to continue to lease the former grocery for storage through Dec. 31.

• Various policy updates and the District Consolidation Plan (an annual ISBE requirement).

• Rachel Bowermaster as high school newspaper half sponsor.

• Kathy Hunt as aide and Kristi Christianson as part time grade school library aide.

• Donald Rice as high school English teacher and Sonja Headley as STEAM teacher.

• Carrie Thomas as parttime nurse.

DRAGONFLIES: Migration happens during day

Continued from Page 1 at avoiding becoming prey themselves.

Fossilized evidence of giant dragonflies has been found dating back 300 million years, and some of those early versions had wingspans upwards of 2 feet.

During migration periods, the flying jewels follow the water, lakes, ponds, rivers, etc. It's worth noting that scientists have learned that the migrators don't like traveling miles upon miles across large bodies of open water and tend to stick to shorelines where there is ample food and cover.

Dragonflies migrate during the day, most commonly following shorelines and other long landscapes. They use the sun to navigate. The why behind dragonfly migration is something that remains a bit of a mystery. However, their basic body design, with long wings relative to their body size, like birds, offers one clue that they have evolved to migrate.

Dragonflies spend the bulk of their lives buried in the muddy bottom of our water bodies. Dragonflies and other odonates can spend years on the bottom-living as nymphs. When conditions are just right, they make their way up vegetation located at the water's edge. Once there, they will rest on the top of the vegetation as they grow and ultimately emerge from their nymph skin, becoming adults. Adult dragonflies can live up to five months.

Since so many of our favorite recreational trails are along shorelines, it makes for some good opportunities to "dragon watch."

Many of us enjoy watching and photographing the brightly colored flying jewels. There are two ways that average Jane and Joe can contribute their observations to science as "citizen scientists."

One way is to utilize the app iNaturalist (www.inaturalist.org), which works across all devices and allows users to import photos, species locations. It offers assistance with identification and a host of other fun things. This app can be used with all manner of things in the natural world, from animals to plants, fungi, and yes – insects and odonates.

The other way to contribute your time as a citizen scientist is to work with the Illinois Odonate Survey. According to the Illinois Odonate survey website (www.illinoisodes.org): "Within Illinois there are

Historically, management activities involved plant communities. In 1987, the Nature Conservancy created the Butterfly Monitoring Network to assess the effects of management on animals.

"The Chicago Academy of Sciences' Notebaert Nature Museum has collaborated with this successful effort to explore the effect that habitat management has on butterfly populations. Based on this effective model, the Dragonfly Monitoring Network was created. Through this project, we hope to be able to gain a greater knowledge of the distribution and abundance of dragonfly and damselfly species in the Chicago region and eventually expand the network across Illinois and

beyond.

"In 2011 the Dragonfly Monitoring Network had been renamed to become the Illinois Odonate Survey and has been expanded to receive information from throughout Illinois, and to include one-off species accounts."

The Illinois Odonate Survey requires a bit of a time commitment as a volunteer and some specific training. Still, it can genuinely be a delightful way to give back to science as you enjoy your weekly dragonfly-filled walk.

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Lawmakers to meet Tuesday on maps

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - Lawmakers will head back to the Capitol on Tuesday, Aug. 31, to consider changes to the legislative maps that Gov. JB Pritzker signed into law earlier this year.

Those maps – which set the new boundaries for the 118 state House and 59 state Senate districts for the next decade – were passed based on survey data in May, as the full U.S. Census block-level numbers were not made available until Aug. 12. The release of that data, however, appears to show population deviations far exceeding the 10 percent threshold allowed under Supreme Court precedent, so some changes are necessary to put the maps in compliance.

The remap effort, which occurs every 10 years after the census, was a key talking point Thursday for Republicans during their day at the Illinois State Fair, which followed Governor's Day, a celebration of Democrats, the day prior.

In the run-up to the legislative maps passing, GOP leaders warned that using survey data as opposed to the full census results would lead to the exact problem the maps now face.

But if Democrats would have waited on the census

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data, they would have missed a key deadline in the Illinois Constitution that would have put mapmaking in the hands of a bipartisan commission and possibly given Republicans a 50-50 shot at mapmaking control.

Republicans have filed a lawsuit asking a federal panel to send the matter to a commission as described in the constitution. Last Thursday, the GOP filed a motion for summary judgement in light of the census data, an effort to send the matter to a commission and void the current legislative maps.

But Democrats filed a motion to dismiss the Republicans' amended complaint, and another Friday seeking to halt the process until Sept. 1, after the oneday session.

In their court filing to dismiss, lawyers for the Democrats called the GOP effort to send the maps to a commission one "to exploit exigencies resulting from a global pandemic, which were out of the legislature's control, for political gain."

The matter is otherwise set for trial at the end of September.

Senate Minority Leader Dan McConchie, R-Hawthorn Woods, characterized Democrats as trying to "pull a fast one" and acting "pure and simple for power" during a GOP



"We are going to be pressing the federal court to do what the Illinois Constitution says, and that is to send it to the bipartisan commission, where it should have gone in the first place, and have that be the decision maker to actually draw the maps going forward," he said.

House Speaker Emanuel "Chris" Welch, D-Hillside, and Senate President Don Harmon, D-Oak Park, on Friday issued a joint statement confirming the Aug. 31 one-day session.

"Our goal has always been to implement a map that is fair and represents the diversity of the population of Illinois," Harmon said in the statement.

Democrats appeared to indicate the session would focus on only state, not congressional mapmaking.

Per the census, Illinois will drop from 18 to 17 congressional districts, and Democrats are expected to draw the maps in a way that would make it difficult for Republicans to maintain the five seats they have now.

How that map is drawn is expected to play a major role in how the statewide Republican field will shape up ahead of 2022's June 28 primary, which was postponed from March due to the census delays.

That's largely because U.S. Rep. Rodney Davis, a Taylorville Republican, is holding out his decision on what to do next until he

sees the congressional maps drawn by Democrats.

"My job is to serve the constituents of the 13th District right now," Davis said. "My ability to continue to do that job is going to depend upon the supermajority Democrats who run the House and the Senate here in the Statehouse, and also Gov. Pritzker who has broken his promise already to the voters of Illinois, that he would not sign legislatively drawn maps."

Davis is also considering a run for governor and got a speaking spot at Republican Day at the Illinois State Fair along with two of the state's other sitting GOP members of congress, while the current gubernatorial candidates did not.

The gubernatorial field as it stands includes Darren Bailey, a state senator from Xenia who has challenged the governor's executive orders; Gary Rabine, a suburban paving business owner; and Paul Schimpf, a former state senator and 2014 GOP candidate for attorney general.

Davis' presence in the race could affect other potential statewide candidates, including state Rep. Tom Demmer, who said last Thursday "nothing's off the table right now" as he considers a statewide run, although he specifically mentioned the secretary of state's office.

State Rep. Dan Brady, of Bloomington, is also considering a secretary of state run.

COVID taking a toll on prep football

Pandemic yet another factor in declining participation rates

The timing for a pandemic was bad for so many segments of our society: politics, national unity, business and, yes, high school football.

The decline in prep football participation is not a sudden development. Concerns over injuries – in particular concussions - have been mounting for years. In 2019, a report showed national participation in 11-player football had dropped 9.6 percent from its peak in 2009.

Just the other day, NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Brett Favre urged parents to not allow their kids to play tackle football until the children are 14.

But the COVID-19 break, which has hurt participation in all sports, may well take an even more severe toll on football.

"I think the year off was bad. I



really do," Stark County Coach Jade Noard said. "I think kids found other things to do. They found other outlets." Noard says

Jeff that even though **LAMPE** he has about 45 kids out for foot-

ball in a school of 211. That's a very good turnout. But five starters from last year opted not to play. They found other things to do.

Similar stories abound in the football ranks. Numbers are down some dramatically.

"The shutdown really damaged small-school football and smallschool athletics, in general," Farmington Coach Toby Vallas said.

Agreed Princeville Coach Jon Carruthers, "I think numbers across all sports have been going down. I don't think it's just a football thing, I think it's a high school athletics thing."

But football feels the loss more, Vallas said. "Football is such a

numbers game, more so than the others," he said. "One good football player does not have the same impact as one good basketball player."

One answer many have promoted in response to declining numbers is 8-man football, which has grown rapidly in popularity in Illinois.

But as the situation at North Fulton has shown, 8-man is not a sure panacea. North Fulton, a co-op of Cuba and Spoon River Valley that struggled to compete in 11-player football, switched to 8-man in the fall of 2019.

This fall, only 12 players showed up for the first practice, including two seniors and three juniors. That led North Fulton to call off its season. The same is reportedly true for Lowpoint-Washburn and Danville Schlarman, where low turnout caused cancellation of the season.

Galva's first season in 8-man has seen a better result. New Coach Tyler Nichols has 18 players out, 10 more Galva players than competed for the Mid-County co-op last year. Yet that total includes only four seniors and four juniors, which means underclassmen will likely need to step up earlier than is often desired. Too much varsity action too early can have a negative impact on whether kids want to keep playing.

"I get the point of 8-man," Noard said. "But in some ways, it seems like taking the easy way out instead of fighting through some tough years. It doesn't always help get more kids out."

ELMWOOD-BRIMFIELD TROJANS Plenty of speed, two-way players for E-B

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD - With an unusually small senior class of five, Elmwood-Brimfield won't have its usual depth and will likely play more starters both ways than was once the custom for the Trojans.

But that's OK with Coach Todd Hollis, who says the seniors have been great leaders and deserve to play both sides of the ball, anyway.

Hollis said he was looking back through game films of his first two playoff teams and was struck by how many players on those teams started on offense and defense.

"So the two-way doesn't matter. If they're good enough to play, they're good enough to play," Hollis said. "The senior class is solid. They all started last year and they've played a lot of minutes.

"And what our seniors have done for the culture and attitude of this team ... I think that's huge right now and is laying the groundwork for what our group next year will be."

The most veteran of the senior crew is quarterback Noah Hollis, who has started parts of two and a half seasons and knows the ins and outs of the Trojans' run-dominated offense. He figures to be handing the ball off plenty this year to speedy running backs Johnny York, a 5-foot-9, 155-pound senior, and junior Aiden Frail (5-7, 135). They were two legs of E-B's state-qualifying 4x200 relay team and both will cause headaches for opposing defenses.

"They can erase mistakes with their speed," Todd Hollis said. "And when you have the speed at running back that we have ... we've worked on some stuff that's a little more open. But it's just having a split end instead of a tight end. Nothing crazy."

Junior Rohman Mitchell (5-7, 140) is the starting fullback.

If teams pack the line too much, 6-5 senior tight end Victor Lenzi and 6-1 junior Tyler Scheps figure to be good options in the pass game. But there's no question about the Trojans bread and butter, Coach Hollis said.

"Our guys ... they're not drunk with the idea that we're going to come out and throw the ball 20 times a game," Todd Hollis said. "When I go into the huddle and give them a situation ... they're not calling for passes. The

We're still that."

Leading the offensive line are senior returnees Jack Trone (5-9, 235) at right tackle and Corbin Draher (5-9, 210) at right guard, with sophomore Caleb Hollis (6-1, 240) at left guard after starting last year at center. Junior Mason Geeseman (6-0, 210) is the center and freshman Aaron Brown (6-0, 270) will start at left tackle.

Brown and starting linebacker Bo Windish are the first freshman to start for the Trojans since Brady Westart.

"The first day of summer practice, a few of the junior and senior linemen came up to me and said, '[Brown] is ready to play right now," Todd Hollis said. "And Bo is just gifted. He runs like a deer.

"For a number of years, I've gone to the all-conference meeting and [Farmington Coach Toby Vallas] has had some freshman who are playing. And I'm like, 'Where do these kids come from?' Now we have a couple of them and I realize, 'Oh, they walk out there and they're ready to go.""

Windish is part of a fast linebacking corps that also includes Mitchell and junior Slone Windish (6-0, 175), who did not play this spring because of

work constraints on the family farm. Coach Hollis said those linebackers are among the six fastest players on the team.

Two of last year's linebackers – Caleb Hollis and Draher – are moving to the line, with Draher at tackle and Caleb Hollis at end.

"So in theory, you have five linebackers on the field, which is nice," Coach Hollis said.

Lenzi will play the other defensive end position, with Trone inside at the other defensive tackle.

York and Frail are both fast, hardhitting defensive backs and Coach Hollis said York "has to be one of the best in the conference." They will be joined in the secondary by juniors Jacob Avery (5-11, 135) and Oliver Heinz (6-1, 145), with sophomore Bailey Elwell (5-7, 150) providing depth.

Given that speed and experience on defense, Coach Hollis said that side of the ball may be a bit ahead of the offense heading into the season opener with Illini West, which won its last meeting vs. the Trojans. Hollis said Illini West has about the same amount of experience back as the Trojans.

Plenty of new faces in Farmington lineup

For The Weekly Post FARMINGTON – Chris Haggard looks around him and sees lots of new faces filling key roles for the Farmington football team.

A three-year starter on the line, Haggard has a simple message for those inexperienced teammates, many of whom gravitate toward the senior.

"He's got many young guys around him and has taken them under his wing," Coach Toby Vallas said. "But he doesn't want to be their buddy. He wants them to be their best."

At stake is a six-year regular season home win streak that stretches back to Aug. 28, 2015, and a 20-14 loss to Annawan-Wethersfield. That's the last regular season game Farmington has dropped on its home field.

To avoid something similar in this year's opener, Haggard and his young Farmer teammates will need to come together quickly. Friday's foe Mercer County is considered to be one of the consensus favorites to win the Lincoln Trail Conference.

"They are impressive," Vallas said of Mercer County. "They fly around, especially defensively. I'd like to have them down the road a little bit."

That's because Vallas thinks this Farmington team will be good in time, he just isn't sure how long it will take to hit its stride. One half? One game? Time will tell.

"I love the group of kids we have now. They are great workers, though a little low on numbers," Vallas said. "But we've never had to replace this many kids since I've been here."

Haggard is optimistic. "Come Week 1, I think we'll be ready to go," he said. "The vibe I get, there's a lot of talent that's hidden still."

The line is built around 6-foot-2, 240-pound right guard Haggard, who Vallas said "is the best player in the conference."

"He's one of the stronger players we've ever had and he's very quick for a big guy," Vallas said. "Offensively and defensively, he plays so solid. He's just an excellent leader."

Other starters on the line figure to be junior right tackle Rese Shymansky (6-1, 200), senior center Austin Utt (5-11, 185), sophomore left guard Collin Behrens (6-1, 265) and junior left tackle Virgil Haggard (5-10, 210), who Vallas said "had a great

Other starters back are seniors Riley Embry (5-11, 175) and Ethan Evans (6-2, 185). Both will play a variety of roles in the multi-faceted Farmington offense, with Embry a wideout/running back combo and Evans a hybrid tight end/wideout.

"He's really a great player," Vallas said of Evans. "Maybe one of the most underrated in the area."

Embry had seven catches for 63 yards and eight carries for 104 yards this spring while Evans had three receptions for 51 and carried five times for 71 yards and two TDs.

In the backfield, Vallas has confidence in junior quarterback Gage Renken (6-2, 185) and senior running back Kevin Shultz (5-11, 185) – even though they have no varsity rushing or passing yards between them.

Renken is a threat to run and pass and "is going to be solid" according to Vallas. "Offensively, I feel better. I always feel better offensively."

Another big part of the passing at-

after having to sit out several practices for medical reasons. Rutledge had four touchdowns in seven catches last spring and averaged 25.2 yards per catch.

Shultz is better known on defense, where he is the anchor at outside linebacker. He racked up 23 tackles in four games last spring. Shymansky also saw time at outside linebacker last year and finished with seven tackles. Senior Matt Kenney (6-4, 220) is slated to be starting middle linebacker.

Haggard is the lone returnee up front at defensive tackle, where he will be flanked by junior Sam McMillin (6-3, 215) and defensive ends Brock Capitani (senior, 6-2, 220) and junior Sam Gronewold (6-1, 195).

Starting cornerbacks look to be juniors Colin Terrell (5-9, 175) and Kaden Runyon (6-0, 170) with senior Kane Fox (6-1, 170) and junior Logan Morse (6-0, 165) the top safety candidates.

Vallas said Embry and Evans will

Princes must replace strong senior group

For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE - Sometimes, a very strong senior class can leave a void that is hard to fill in a football program.

So it was with remorse and intrigue that Princeville bid adieu to last year's strong senior group, which led the Princes to a 5-1 record.

But so far, Coach Jon Carruthers has mostly praise for his nine returning seniors and for a group of 10 juniors who also figure to play a key role.

"We didn't play a full season last year, but that was one of the stronger senior classes we've had. And you always worry about how the next class is going to do. Who is going to step up?" Carruthers said. "Pretty much the whole senior class has stepped up and come together. The freshman, they have to see someone leading by example and, fortunately, the seniors and the juniors - for the most part - have been doing a good job of leading by example."

Certainly that's true of senior Denver Hoerr, one of five players who saw starting time this spring on offense and one of four who played a good deal on defense. A gifted athlete and gritty competitor, the 6-foot-1, 160-pound Hoerr will likely rotate between running back, wideout and possibly even quarterback.

"He's a natural athlete," Carruthers said. "Somewhere, sometime, somehow" Princeville plans to get him the ball.

Last spring, Hoerr caught 28 passes for 579 yards and six scores, averaging 20.7 yards per reception. That's production the Princes will have to find a way to tap into again, whether in the run game or pass game.

And Carruthers said likely starting quarterback Jordan Johnson (junior, 6-0, 160) can be expected to throw the ball, since the Princes also have returning starter Hunter Stahl (senior, 5-11, 155) at wide receiver and some promising backups including senior Torrence Kieser (5-9, 160).

Even so, a betting man would expect the Princeville QB to be handing it off plenty to the Princes' speedy backfield.

The running back stable beyond Hoerr includes a trio of sprinters: senior Grant Hunt (5-10, 145) and sophomores Tayshaun Kieser (5-10, 165) and Marcel Primera (5-5, 130).

ing it to the house if you give them a crease," Carruthers said. "They are quick."

The offensive line could take some time to gel, as the only starters returning to the same position are 6-2, 245pound sophomore Kellen Francis and 6-0, 275-pound senior right tackle Gage DeVries.

"He's a good one," Carruthers said of DeVries.

The other likely starters up front are sophomore left tackle Zach Stalter (6-1, 180), senior left guard Cole Brower (6-0, 180) and senior right guard Austin Herold (6-1, 215). Herold opted for remote learning last year, so did not play during the spring season.

There's even more to sort out on defense, where the entire linebacking corps will be rebuilt around three returning starters who played other positions in the spring. Those three are Brower, a defensive end last year, Hoerr, starting free safety in the spring who racked up 24 tackles, and Grant Hunt, who was a cornerback and had 20 tackles. Other linebackers figure to be Torrence Kieser and Stalter.

"The defense is definitely a question mark. We're just trying to fit the best pieces in," Carruthers said. "The problem is, a lot of kids are being shifted to linebacker, so they haven't had those reps for three years. And last year, with the COVID season, they didn't get the time to do individual drills."

That meant more time was spent on individual skill drills this summer and team defensive drills did not really get started until later than usual this preseason.

At this point, the line looks to be Francis at nose guard and Herold and DeVries at end. DeVries saw time early in the spring at end before hurting an ankle and focusing strictly on the offensive line to limit reps.

The three defensive backs will come from a group that includes Johnson, Stahl, junior Liam McGrath (5-11, 150), Primera and junior Griffin Crear (6-2, 150).

Also back for Princeville is senior all-conference kicker RJ Ahten, who hit on 17 extra points and three fields goals in the spring.

As a result, R-W had to call off its Community Night on Aug. 20 and there was no team picture taken.

The lack of practice also put thirdyear Coach Grant Gullstrand – who generally likes to keep information close to the vest anyway - at some disadvantage in finalizing a starting lineup.

"We haven't practiced for the last 10 days and I'm not listing any starters," Gullstrand said on Saturday. "Honestly, we're not to that point yet."

What Gullstrand would say is that



he has been impressed by the response of some of his returnees in the face of an unwelcome break.

"We've had a group of upperclass players that have kind of stepped up this

past week and sped up the process for some of our younger players," Gullstrand said. "I applaud our upperclassmen for bringing it this week. When we get the full team back and we should be ready to get it going."

Among those who Gullstrand mentioned as leading by example on the roster of 48 are junior Graham Wight, senior Carson Malek, senior Seth Johnson, senior Kai Moore and senior Will Koss.

The 6-2, 205-pound Johnson averaged nearly 6 yards per carry last spring and offers a hard-running complement to returning senior quarter-

CAPITOL ROUNDUP Democrats, Republicans rally at state fair

SPRINGFIELD – Ten months before Illinois' 2022 primary elections, Democrats from across the state descended on the capital city for the annual political events that coincide with the Illinois State Fair as an election kickoff.

Party leaders at the Illinois Democratic County Chairs' Association brunch delivered a message of unity and stark contrast with Republicans, including former Gov. Bruce Rauner and former President Donald Trump.

"So whatever you may read in the press, Democrats in Illinois are united. There's too much at stake to be divided," said Kristina Zahorik, IDCCA president, at the brunch.

Democratic unity was in question in the lead-up to the first major party event organized under the new Democratic Party of Illinois Chair, U.S. Rep. Robin Kelly, a U.S. Congresswoman, from suburban Matteson.

Gov. JB Pritzker supported Chicago Alderwoman Michelle Harris, a rival candidate, for the DPI chair position vacated by former Illinois House Speaker Michael Madigan. But Kelly won the post in a narrow vote by county chairs in March. Pritzker decided earlier this month that he would skip the IDCCA brunch, which was originally planned for the indoor ballroom of the Crowne Plaza hotel in Springfield, due to concerns about the COVID-19 pandemic.

But when the event was moved outdoors, Pritzker still didn't attend, citing private family plans he made in the meantime. Instead, he recorded a brief video message which followed closely to his remarks made less than two hours later and 10 miles away at the Governor's Day event at the Illinois State Fair.

Pritzker said he will continue to contribute to Democrats up and down the ballot through his Blue Wave Illinois advertising campaign which he launched in 2018 and has supported with millions of dollars of his own personal fortune since.

Fire Pritzker – Republicans rallied at the Illinois State Fair on Aug. 19 with their eyes firmly set on trying to regain control of Congress and winning back the governor's office and hear messages from members of the state's congressional delegation, legislative leaders and officials from the state party and Republican National Committee.

"I've spent a lot of time in blue states this year and I like what I've seen," RNC Co-Chairman Tommy Hicks, of Texas, said at the rally. "I've been in the state of Washington, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, New Jersey and now Illinois. Every event is packed. The excitement is real. And the enthusiasm is firmly on the Republican side."

Despite the enthusiasm on display at the annual Republican Day gathering at the fair, the Illinois GOP faces an uphill battle in the 2022 elections. The party holds a superminority in the General Assembly, and no Republican has won a statewide race since former Gov. Bruce Rauner was elected in 2014.

GOP races – Illinois' GOP candidates for governor did not speak at the State Fair's Republican Day, although potential candidate and U.S. Rep. Rodney Davis addressed the crowd along with other sitting congressmen.

Davis' central Illinois district is one that is likely to change markedly when the General Assembly draws the new congressional maps. He has even said that depending on what the district looks like when the new maps are drawn, he might consider stepping down from Congress to run for statewide office, possibly for governor.

"I don't know what my future holds because my future and the political future is going to depend upon what the corrupt Democrats in Springfield are going to do when they redraw our congressional map," he told reporters Thursday. "I'll know what I want to do in the future based upon what that battlefield looks like."

Candidates Paul Schimpf, a former state senator and Republican attorney general candidate, Darren Bailey, a current state senator and Pritzker antagonist during the pandemic, and Gary Rabine, a suburban businessman, all spoke at the same GOP breakfast Thursday morning.

The only statewide office that will be an open seat next year is secre-

that office, but state Rep. Dan Brady, of Bloomington, said Thursday he is seriously considering the race.

State Reps. Dan Brady, of Bloomington, and Tom Demmer, of Dixon, expressed interest in the office Thursday.

Republican voters will select their nominees for the 2022 races during primary elections on June 28. Illinois primaries are normally held in March of election years, but lawmakers pushed back the date of next year's primaries due to delays in the redistricting process.

Fairgrounds plans – The state of Illinois is teaming up with the Community Foundation for the Land of Lincoln to develop a master plan for year-round use of state fairgrounds facilities in Springfield and Du Quoin.

The larger state fair in Springfield typically draws more than half a million visitors during its two-week operation, while the Du Quoin fair has been drawing about 100,000 in recent years.

Gov. Pritzker and Department of Agriculture Director Jerry Costello II made that announcement Aug. 13 along with John Stremsterfer, president and CEO of the foundation.

"Today, we honor the legacy of paving an even better path forward for these fairgrounds for generations to come," Pritzker said during a news conference early Friday morning outside the Department of Agriculture building next to the Springfield fairgrounds. "That's our intention. That's what our state fair advisory board is tasked with."

Both fair sites also host other events occasionally throughout the year, but Stremsterfer, who grew up just blocks away from the Springfield fairgrounds and said the idea is to turn them into year-round venues.

"It's such a great asset for the people in the state of Illinois. I think we all want to be proud of everything that in the state, but especially the property that we're all responsible for our citizens," he said. "And I think nothing exemplifies that more than the State Fairgrounds."

Ameren Illinois Company d/b/a Ameren Illinois: Ameren Illinois (or the Company) hereby gives notice to the public that on April 15, 2021, it filed with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC or Commission) proposed changes in its rates and charges for electric delivery services throughout its territory in Illinois pursuant to its Rider MAP-P, performance-based formula rate tariff, and updated its calculation of rates and charges per the formula rate tariff. The changes are applicable to Ameren Illinois Rate Zones I, II and III, as more fully described below. The changes in rate schedule are proposed to take effect with the January 2022 billing period - after the Commission issues its final Order. The Commission has up to 240 days to complete this proceeding and issue its final Order.

This filing conforms to Illinois Public Acts 097-0616, 097-0646 and 098-0015 (the "Law"). These Public Acts also require the Company to spend \$625 million in electric system modernization investments over a 10-year period. This modernization will benefit customers and create 450 new jobs during the peak program year. In addition, the Law requires the Company to meet various performance metrics intended to increase reliability, reduce outage durations and provide improved service to customers, or be subject to financial penalties.

The proposed updated formula rate revenue requirement results in an overall annual increase of \$64.09 million from the electric revenue requirement last ordered by the ICC in Docket No. 20-0381. Proposed rates in this proceeding will reflect rate design changes, including rate uniformity among the same Rate Classes in different Rate Zones, with two exceptions as approved in Docket No. 19-0877. The Pole Charge for DS-5 lighting customers in Rate Zone III and Meter Reassignment Charge for certain DS-3 and DS-4 customers in Rate Zone I will remain independent by Rate Zone.

For the DS-1 Residential Delivery Service classification, the proposed increase in electric delivery service and electric distribution tax (EDT) cost recovery revenue is 6.2 percent.

The rates for delivery service and EDT cost recovery constitute only a portion of the total bill of a customer currently taking bundled electric service from Ameren Illinois or taking supply service from a third-party supplier. The following compares the Company's proposal to the bundled bill (delivery service charges that are in effect today and purchased power charges effective through May 2021) for residential customers:

1) For a residential customer using 5,000 kWh annually (or average of 417 kWh monthly), the effect of the delivery service bill changes being proposed by the Company produces an average monthly increase of \$1.86.

2) For a residential customer using 10,000 kWh annually (or average of 833 kWh monthly), the effect of the delivery service bill changes being proposed by the Company produce an average monthly increase of \$2.77.

3) For a residential customer using 18,000 kWh per year (or average of 1,500 kWh monthly), the effect of the delivery service bill changes being proposed by the Company produce an average monthly increase of \$3.69.

"If I had to take a guess as to how the season may play out, I think we may have to endure some struggles at the beginning of the season," Meyers said. "But if we do the things we need to do during the season, I think we can be a team that is in the trophy conversation at the end of the season."

Here's a look at areas teams.
