### **BIRDS**: ownload guide to aid in identification

Continued from Page 1 bringing with it a sunrise accompanied by a remarkably cool, bearable breeze.

Then just as the sun rises, I hear them in the distance: Honking and clucking and clattering away as the older, wiser geese start teaching this year's youngsters the routine.

"Fly out early at sunrise for breakfast! Move off that roosting lake, soar across the cornfields and meadows and find a nice field to snack away. Preferably one with a pond to loaf away the afternoon."

If not the geese, then I'll take the first ducks heading south - the teal, or as I have been known to call them, "Those little fast and furious F14s."

Teal zoom, bank and dive. They most generally elude my every shot. But they are magnificent to watch! Teal are such bright, colorful, carefully choreographed flyers.

Then there are the wood ducks flushing up out of the creeks and stretches of backwaters, or the mallards who come soaring into snack on soybeans. It's just plain a wonderful time of the year that will only get better as we get deeper into fall and winter. The promise of wet dogs, frozen waders and duck-blind breakfasts hang heavy in those first cool, foggy mornings.

For those who prefer to watch birds, it's an equally enjoyable time. We watch with anticipation for that odd migrant, or "lifer." We watch, wait and mark off on our lists who is arriving, who is leaving and how that matches up with previous years.

One guide that has been invaluable to me over the years for "waterfowl watching" both as a hunter and as a general birdwatcher is "Ducks at Distance" by Bob Hines. I am honestly not sure how old my





little tattered paper copy might be. I got it free from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and I think it was initially published in the late 1970s.

I do know that I have recommended this nifty guide to almost every novice hunter and birdwatcher I know. It truly is that handy of a small pocket guide.

Now that the whole world has moved to digital everything, we can carry almost anything we want securely on our phones. I am pleased to report that USFWS makes this book available as a PDF file that can be downloaded to your phone, with pages that fit just right on a phone screen and display very well.

While it doesn't replace more extensive, more in-depth field guides, Hines' books sure packs a ton of info into a small and very userfriendly package.

The guide shows examples of eclipse plumage, feeding patterns, and typical flock flight patterns. A beneficial section shows the comparative sizes of waterfowl - from very, very large trumpeter swans down to the tiny ruddy ducks and buffleheads.

There's more than one tattered, seemingly ancient book on my bookshelf, in my pack, or now in

the digital age on my devices that Bob Hines has illustrated. I like to think we share a similar love of not just wildlife, but especially our feathered friends.

According to Wikipedia, Robert W. (Bob) Hines (1912-1994) was an American wildlife artist who had a long career with the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. Born in Columbus, Ohio, Hines had virtually no formal training in art or wildlife science. Yet, by age 27, he worked as a staff artist with the Ohio Division of Wildlife.

In 1947 (or 1948), he accepted a similar position with the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS). He illustrated many works for the USFWS, including "Ducks at a Distance," "Migration of Birds," "Fifty Birds of Town and City" and "Wildlife Portrait Series" (including "Song Birds" and "Alaska").

His illustrations were also used in such works as "Wildlife in America" by Peter Matthiessen, "Ducks, Geese, and Swans of North America" (both the Bellrose edition and the new 2014 edition by Guy Baldassarre), "Runes of the North" by Sigurd F. Olson, and in Rachel Carson's "Under the Sea Wind."

For any bird or waterfowl lover, it's almost a given that you have seen some of Hines's exquisite illustrations. I encourage you to download a copy of "Ducks at a Distance" from the USFS, save it to your phone and start watching the horizons on your outdoor excursions.

You won't be disappointed as you learn to spot and identify the myriad of waterfowl that bless us here along the Mississippi Flyway.

## Ethanol's future is running out of gas

The key ingredients for a looming crack-up in ethanol - the fast rise of electric vehicles, lukewarm politics and more evidence of climate change - are in place and few in U.S. ag policy circles are prepared to face that

reality. In fact, none of those woes are new; they've been building for years. For example, the Trump Ad-

ministration's almost carte blanche blending

waivers for gasoline refiners

shrunk ethanol's biggest funnel into American gas tanks. Next, its early denials of the COVID pandemic helped stall gasoline sales. In 2020, gas sales were 119 billion gallons; by comparison, they were 140 billion gallons in 2017.

Both combined to slice ethanol usage, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, from 15.7 billion gallons in 2017 to 13.7 billion gallons in 2020 while ethanol imports doubled from 77 million gallons to 144 million gallons.

The Biden Administration's biofuel blending plan, now being discussed at the Office of Management and Budget according to Agri-Pulse, "is expected to propose reducing the renewable volume obligation for 2021 but increase the mandate for next year."

This having-it-both-ways approach means, at best, a stagnant biofuel fu-

ture. "Farm and biofuel groups are pushing for 15 billion gallons of ethanol in the targets and an increase to the 2.43-billion-gallon biomassbased diesel goal set in recent RVOs," or Renewable Volume Obligations, explained Agri-Pulse.

Good luck on achieving either because, in early August, the Biden White House announced its goal for up to 50 percent of all new cars sold by 2030 to be electric-powered. U.S. carmakers, already on that road, eagerly accepted the challenge.

Neither Biden plan - reduced biofuel blending mandates or increased governmental favoritism of electric cars and trucks - means the end of ethanol. Together, however, they make it plain that ag-based biofuels, and ethanol in particular, face a very tough future in the coming years.

How severe is yet to be determined but corn-rich states like Iowa, where about 60 percent of the state's field corn flows to ethanol plants, will be hardest hit. Nebraska, the nation's second largest state producer of ethanol, will take a hard pop, too.

In fact, Nebraska might face more pressure because much of its corn is grown under irrigation. The 2017 Ag Census shows 4.5 million of Nebraska's 9.5 million corn acres that year were irrigated. (The 2017 Ag Census also shows Nebraska with more total irrigated acres than California: 8.6 million compared to 7.8 million.)

Nationwide in 2017, 2.4 billion bushels of corn were grown on 11.6 million irrigated acres by using, on

average, 325,500 gallons of water per acre. That same marketing year, U.S. ethanol plants used 5.6 billion bushels of corn to make ethanol.

So, sooner or later, ever-greening American taxpayers will want to know why the nation continues to use ever-dwindling, irreplaceable natural resources to grow a federally-subsidized feedstock for a federally-mandated biofuel market that - mandate or not - is likely to shrink by at least one-third in the coming decade.

Any farmer or farm group official want to take a crack at that one?

On Aug. 22, two Iowans, Matt Russell and Robert Leonard, took a swing in an editorial published by the Food and Environmental Reporting Network, or FERN. Their idea positions biofuels with electric vehicles as allies, not enemies.

In brief, they explain, while electric-powered cars are likely the future, there will still be a large market for "liquid fuel" and "advanced biofuel" vehicles. "But the most durable market for liquid fuel will be in heavy equipment, aviation and container ships."

Perhaps, but Big Ag's default position is to defend an increasingly indefensible blending mandate built on 50-year-old home-grown fuel gibberish that has little relevance to today's changing gasoline market and already changed climate reality. © 2021 ag comm

POTABLE WATER SUPPLY BY THE INSTALLATION OR USE OF POTABLE WATER SUPPLY WELLS OR BY ANY OTHER METHOD WHEREAS, certain properties in the City of Galva, Illinois have been used over a period of time for commercial/industrial purposes; and WHEREAS, because of said use, concentrations of certain chemical constituents in the groundwater beneath the City may exceed Class I groundwater quality standards for

human health from groundwater contamination while facilitating the redevelopment and productive use of properties that are the source of said chemical constituents:

#### NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GALVA, ILLINOIS: Section One. Use of groundwater as a potable water supply prohibited.

The use or attempt to use as a potable water supply groundwater from within the corporate limits of the City of Galva, as a potable water supply by the installation or drilling of wells or by any other method is hereby prohibited. This prohibition does not include the City of Galva. Section Two. Penalties.

Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of up to five hundred dollars (\$500) for each violation.

#### Section Three. Definitions.

"Person" is any individual, partnership, co-partnership, firm, company: limited liability company, corporation, association, joint stock company, trust, estate, political subdivision, or any other legal entity, or their legal representatives, agents or assigns.

Understanding

The City Administrator of the City of Galva is hereby authorized and directed to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency ("Illinois EPA") in which the City of Galva assumes responsibility for tracking all sites that have received no further remediation determinations from the Illinois EPA. notifying the Illinois EPA of changes to this ordinance, and taking certain precautions when siting public potable water supply wells

#### Section Five. Repealer.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed insofar as they are in conflict with this ordinance.

Section Six. Severability If any provision of this ordinance or its application to any person or under any circumstances is adjudged invalid, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or of any portion not adjudged invalid.

Section Seven. Effective date This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication

## **Rebels fall in home opener** A-Town QB hurts Stark County in 44-9 setback

For The Prairie News WYOMING – An elusive opposing quarterback and an inability to finish drives were two major problems for the Stark County football team in a 44-9 home-opener loss to Abingdon-Avon.

Ethan Schisler ran for 109 yards and one score and passed for four more touchdowns last Friday as Lincoln Trail Conference newcomer Abingdon-Avon – aka A-Town – routed the Rebels.

"They had the touchdown passes, but I thought the big deal was they were able to run on us and really control the line of scrimmage," Stark County Coach Jade Noard said. "What got them down the field was their ability to run the ball."

There was also another nagging issue for the Rebels (1-1, 1-1 LTC). For the past few years, Stark County has been in contention well into the first half in several games against

favored teams, only to wind up losing by a sizable margin. Last Friday was no different.

Trailing 6-0 in the first quarter, Stark County drove deep into A-Town territory, only to have an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty force a field goal attempt, instead of a possible touchdown. Daniel Kieser made the 32-yarder, an impressive kick for the prep ranks, but instead of a possible Rebels lead, the score was 6-3 after one quarter.

More of the same came

sandwiched around intermission. After pinning A-Town at its 24 late in the second quarter, the Rebels gave up a quick 76-yard scoring drive to make the score 22-3 at halftime.

Then Stark County fumbled the kickoff to start the second half. Two plays later, A-Town was up 29-3 and the game was effectively over.

"We have to mature enough that we can handle the big-game situations and not implode. We've done that a few times," Noard said. "You put yourself into a good position and now you have to handle the pressure. That's something lately we have not been able to do.

"It's all part of the process of trying to get back as a program to where we were. You've got to be able to keep yourself in games."

Stark County finished with 183 yards rushing against A-Town and 5.1 yards per carry but did not score again until Matthew Shipp went in from 1 yard

out as time expired in the fourth quarter.

Jack Meinders was the leading rusher out of Stark County's wing-T formation, carrying 10 times for 88 yards. Kieser had 53 yards on 13 carries.

Noard said shifting to the wing-T from the spread formation he had favored in recent years "better fits our personnel."

A-Town racked up 388 total yards, including 286 on the ground and 9.2 yards per carry.

Schisler was 8-of-13 passing for 102 yards and

also averaged 12.1 yards per carry.

"I saw him live and I knew he was pretty good, but he's better than I thought," Noard said. "He's elusive and they did some good things for him ... and we had some huge breakdowns."

Things don't get any easier for the Rebels this week, as they travel to face the other LTC newcomer, Knoxville. The Blue Bullets (2-0, 2-0 LTC) are preseason favorites in the league and are coming off a 2-0 forfeit win over Mercer County last week. Mercer County could not play due to an increase in COVID cases at the school that cause a shift to remote learning.

In Week One, Knoxville routed Princeville, 42-7.

"You know what they're going to do. They are big and strong and they are going to run it right at you," Noard said. "We've got to try to find a way to make them do things they don't want to do."
