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Stark County one step closer to E911 service with Peoria County

TOULON - The Stark County Board of Supervisors approved

an intergovernmental agreement to join Peoria County's Emergency Telephone System Board [ETSB] for the purpose of providing Enhanced 911 service to Stark County.

The new system will be known as the Peoria/Stark Joint Emergency Telephone System Board [JETSB], or simply

The newly formed board will

consist of 15 members, 13 from Peoria County and 2 from Stark County. All board members on the Peoria County ETSB will be automatically appointed to the joint ETSB, and the two Stark County members will be appointed by the Stark County board chair, Al Curry.

The JETSB will be charged with creating an E911 system that covers Stark County. Once in place, the system will transfer 911 dialed calls to Stark County's dispatching system.

Those calls will automatically

be displayed on a screen as the telephone number and physical location of the caller regardless if a landline or a cellphone.

Currently, if 911 is dialed, the call could be routed to a dispatch center in a nearby county without an accurate physical location. With the Peoria/Stark Joint E911 system, that will no longer occur – once the equipment is purchased and installed for Stark County. No time frame for that was discussed at this board meeting. The equipment is planned to be paid for by

grants.

The Stark County Board of Supervisors also approved a \$26,000 expenditure of American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds on a request from Stark's Assessment/Zoning officer Renee Johnson. Johnson requested \$8,700 to purchase a new file server for the county's offices, and \$17,000 for a GIS aerial flight of the county, which has not been updated for some time.

In his report, County Engineer Judd Giffin informed the board that the highway department is

"continuing to meet with IDOT personnel to process closeout paperwork and update databases for old MFT project files."

Giffin said that the department has spread, graded and packed rock on County Highway 24 and on Duncan Road.

The board approved the renewal of the county's insurance package for \$88,794 that was presented previously by John Leezer, of the Leezer insurance Agency, in Toulon.

Toulon council unhappy with street repair work

TOULON - The Toulon city council is critical of the work performed by contractor Porter Brothers, of Rock Falls, on the Washington Street refurbishing project.

The council decided months ago to have Washington Street refurbished and, in particular, to make the base of it thick enough to handle heavy truckloads of grain. Washington Street is the designated truck route in Toulon for grain trucks coming and going to the grain yard of Rumbold and Kuhn's business.

The city bid the project to contractors, but only Porter Brothers responded. They were subsequently awarded the contract.

Mayor Larry Hollis asked city engineer Ed Andrews, "Are you happy with the way it [Washington Street] ended

up?"

Andrews said, "I reached out to them right away, No. 1 even if we were perfectly happy, they invoiced [charged] more than the IDOT maximum because of their own overage. Obviously we still have concerns on the [street] base repair."

After the contractor completed their work, the street base had problems.

"The standard sealcoat meets IDOT specs and the feedback on performance is generally acceptable. We have the three blocks of aggregate base repair that is still a concern," Andrews said.

The contractor redid some base repairs that were unacceptable to the city. But, other problems appeared a week later, indicating an issue with the base work that was initially done. Andrews recom-



TOULON: Councilman: roadwork 'subpar altogether'

Continued from Page 1 mended withholding payment for the base work completed, because of the existing problems with the refurbishing work done.

"I couldn't be more displeased with that road – it's worse than it was before [the refurbishing work was done]," Councilman Jason Musselman stated. "I'm not going to vote for payment of any portion of that road until it's fixed. We're spending a lot of money to fix that road. They [the contractor] used 110 percent of everything else, but only 64 percent of aggregate base."

Musselman added, "It's subpar altogether. This has been two months now."

The city plans to approach the contractor about properly completing this project. "We're not happy [with the work done so far]," Hollis said

City officials are continuing to work on obtaining a grant for the Uptown Sidewalk project and passed a resolution "of support and commitment of local funds" in the amount of \$250,000 that would indicate to the grant issuer that the city is serious about completing this project.

The sanitary system lift station was discussed again and city engineer Andrews reported that an undocumented water main was discovered on the south side of Prairie Street where the sewer line was planned to be run. Andrews said that the sewer line will now probably have to be run on the north side of Prairie Street between Whittaker and Henderson Streets. There was no change order brought to the council concerning this alteration.

City attorney Kate Carter reported that ordinance nuisance cases continue to be scheduled for court action in the future. The vehicle ordinance has been updated concerning abandoned or inoperable vehicles on private property. And, the codifications project is still in progress with American Legal Publications who is compiling the statutes in to a "book".

Ben Leezer, of the Leezer Insurance Agency in Toulon, gave an insurance presentation for the city. The total policy renewal amount equals \$42,114 for 2021-22, which the council approved.

Also approved was a \$1,000 donation to the Annual Christmas Walk.

Several agenda items were tabled until next month including a raffle ordinance, the 2021 tax levy, and insurance quotes for city employee health insurance policies.

Discussed with no action was changing the start time of city council meetings from 6:30 p.m. to 6 p.m.


During the public comment portion of the meeting, Castleton residents stated that the community's four water wells have not functioned for over four months. According to the residents, those wells are on Penn Township property.

The Penn Township board does not want to be involved with this problem, although they signed a paper saying that they would receive money to pay the well companies that have attempted to get the wells functional again.

The residents said that they need a government entity to be a recipient of funds from a grant or the ARP funds. So far, no entity has volunteered to be that recipient on a long term basis.

Previously the Castleton Water Association maintained the wells, but it has been defunct for some time. The residents want to reinstate the association, but they have been unsuccessful in securing emergency funding because of the problem with having an entity receive the funds.

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

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

America needs Trump – without Trump

The recent election of Republican Glenn Youngkin to be governor in Democratic stronghold Virginia displays emphatically that Trump conservatism fares better - without Trump. The conundrum for Republican Party leaders, a weak lot, is how to double down on this fact in 2022, and keep former President Donald Trump off the ticket in 2024.

Youngkin upset former Democratic

Virginia Governor and national Democratic Party leader Terry McAuliffe by capturing significantly greater percentages of independent as well as women voters than did Trump in

2020 – while apparently keeping the support of the Trump base.

This suggests strongly that campaigning on Trump-like issues while downplaying connections to Trump could help the GOP take back a sizable majority in the House in 2022 and win the presidency in 2024 without Trump.

An anti-Trump Republican, I find much of the Trump program positive, straightforward:

• Make "Made in America" great

- Orderly immigration
- Stand up to China
- Strengthen the American family
- Safe streets

I would add "fiscal integrity," something out of favor in both the Trump and Biden administrations.

Yet the man himself is a pathological narcissist, dangerously obsessed with self; everything else – everything – is subservient.

But, as is obvious, Trump dominates the Republican Party right now. After all, he was there to speak loudly for his base in 2016 and 2020, while the GOP before him had only mealy-mouthed nostrums to offer.

The Trump base may have been rallied to come out for Youngkin even though the governor-elect rarely mentioned him – because opponent McAuliffe incessantly advertised a Trump-Youngkin connection, which was in fact rather weak.

And, can dissatisfaction with the Democrats' big spending, quite liberal messaging be enough alone to bring out Trump voters, if Trump is not front and center?

Related, what can GOP leaders at the national and state levels do, if anything, to keep the Trump excitement alive – without Trump? Maybe nothing, which would be tragic.

Or, maybe the following:

- The "chattering class," even those like me with small megaphones, hammers away, as follows: Trumpism does better without Trump. Over time, the message might bring some Trump backers to conclude this as well, and
- GOP leaders quietly encourage even-keeled political types like Youngkin to contest congressional seats next year in many suburban districts across the country. Dems are vulnerable in the 'burbs, and Trump is far less popular there than in rural and small-town America. If highly successful next year in the suburbs, the GOP would send a strong message to all that to win in 2024, do it with a Trump-like platform — but without Trump.

Even this might not be enough to dislodge The Donald from candidacy, yet I feel it must be tried. After all, GOP party leaders, and even the Trump base, I would hope, want to win, even if just on the issues, even without Trump.

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



Toulon's American Legion's new building

TOULON – Toulon's American Legion Post 416 has expanded into its new building that is attached to the existing Legion Hall located on West Court Street. The new building is west of the existing building and will be used for cooking meals and for general storage.

This new building was made possible through generous donations by businesses and various individuals. "I want to thank the community for its help over the years because the future of the Legion is important," past Commander Doug Murray stated. "And, the Womens' Auxiliary has purchased a new cooker for the meals."

The Legion Hall building was built in 1897 by Bradford F.
Thompson and it first served as a location for a real estate business in

the south half and a law office in the north half. The Legion obtained the southern part of the building in 1928 when it was available and later that year gained full possession of the entire building.

Toulon's Legion Post came into existence on Aug. 10, 1920 when its charter was issued via the United States Congress' act to form "an unincorporated patriotic society of the soldiers, sailors, and marines of the Great War, 1917-1918." There were 17 charter members and Curtis Utz was elected its first commander, according to a published article in the Stark County News.

Recently, new officers for the Legion were elected: Andrew Jackson, Commander; Josh Streitmatter, Vice-Commander; Ken Dienst, Junior Vice-Commander; and Robert Winn, finance officer.

In conjunction with the first Tou-

lon Legion, plans were made to form a Womens' Auxiliary organization in Aug. of 1920. Women who are related to a Legion member are eligible to be a member of the Auxiliary. It was decided to form a temporary organization in 1920 until the Auxiliary received its formal charter, which an application was sent to the national headquarters.



MSW Projects offers nutrition sites and outreach to seniors

MSW Projects offers a nutrition program which has nutrition sites and home delivered meals available to people aged 60 and over in Marshall, Stark and Woodford Counties. MSW Projects also offers public transportation to those residing in Marshall or Stark County regardless of age. MSW Projects also has an outreach program to assist seniors aged 60 and over with reduced license plates, wheelchair ramps or other solutions to problems a senior may encounter.

MSW Projects Nutrition Program has changed a bit due to the pandemic. The nutrition sites continue to be closed for dine in service, but meals are available to be picked up at the Toulon and Henry Nutrition Sites. Meals are also available for delivery to seniors aged 60 and over who may be either homebound, unable to prepare a meal, unsteady, returning home from a hospital or nursing home or recovering from an illness or injury. Safety precautions are still being followed to ensure the safety of everyone. Home delivered meals are available in Stark County within city limits of Toulon, LaFayette, Wyoming, and Bradford. The

suggested donation for a meal is \$4. If you or someone you know are in need of home delivered meals or would like more information, please contact the MSW Projects office at (309) 364-2287. If you would like to pick up your meal at the Toulon Nutrition Site, please call (309) 286-6861 the day prior to make your lunch reservation.

Public transportation also continues to be available to residents of Marshall and Stark Counties. The transportation that is available is the regularly scheduled van and individual transports. The regularly scheduled van has predetermined destination cities. Within the destination city, riders can make as many stops as needed prior to 2:30 p.m. when the van departs from the destination city. The regularly scheduled van is limited to 3 riders or families due to COVID precautions set forth by the FTA (Federal Transit Authority). The regularly scheduled van requires reservations the day prior to when you will be riding.

Individual transports are available Mon. - Fri. between the hours of 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. Individual transports are available to riders within their community and to surrounding cities such as Peoria, Princeton, Bloomington, Ottawa, Peru, Chillicothe, Galesburg, and East Peoria. These transports are also available for rides to grocery stores, banks, post offices, medical facilities, physical therapy facilities, and beauty salons. The individual transports require a two week advance reservation and can be made by calling MSW Projects at (309) 364-2287. Masks are required to be worn in the vans. Fares for individual transports are for riders under the age of 60. People aged 60 and over are welcome to make a voluntary donation.

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



Vaccination mandates legal under new law

SPRINGFIELD - A new law in Illinois will soon clear the way for employers to enforce vaccination, testing and other mitigation measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

The measure, Senate Bill 1169, amends the Illinois Health Care Right of Conscience Act, a 1977 law originally intended to shield doctors and pharmacists from liability for refusing to participate in abortions. Gov. JB Pritzker's office reported that he signed it late Monday while he was at an overseas trip to Glasgow, Scotland, for the United Nations Climate Change Conference.

Illinois was one of several states to enact such a law in the wake of the 1973 U.S. Supreme Court decision in Roe v. Wade. Federal law also provides similar protections.

It states that doctors and health care providers cannot be held liable for refusing to provide services that are contrary to their conscience. It also states that no employer or regulatory agency can discriminate against an individual for refusing to participate in or receive any form of health care services contrary to their conscience.

In recent months, though, that law has been used by individuals in Illinois to block employer mandates that certain workers receive COVID-19 vaccines, disclose their vaccination status or undergo regular COVID-19 testing as a condition of employment.

In some cases, those plaintiffs have been successful in obtaining restraining orders against such mandates, including a group of nurses in Kanakee who objected last month to a local hospital's vaccine mandate.

The new law, which becomes effective June 1, makes an exception to the Health Care Right of Conscience Act by saying it is not a violation of the act for an employer to impose or enforce any requirements "that involve provision of services by a physician or health care personnel intended to prevent contraction or transmission of COVID-19 or any pathogens that result in COVID-19 or any of its subsequent iterations."

The bill was the subject of intense debate during the General Assembly's fall veto session last month. More than 50,000 individuals and groups filed witness slips in opposition to various iterations of the bill, including the Chicago Police Department, Chicago Public Schools and an individual who described himself as "Wants freedoms back."

Only about 1,000 people filed slips supporting amendments to the bill.

The bill passed the House Oct. 27 by a vote of 64-52. It passed the Senate the following day, 31-24. Because the votes took place after May 31, and because it did not pass both chambers by at least a three-fifths majority, under the Illinois Constitution the new law cannot take effect until June 1, 2022, unless lawmakers

come back and pass an identical bill during the 2022 session, which begins in January.

Critics of the bill argued that it would violate individual religious freedoms by taking away their right to refuse certain medical treatments that they find morally or religiously objectionable while others argued that individual health care decisions should be a matter of personal choice.

But even the federal conscience statute, known as the "Church Amendment" - named after its sponsor, former U.S. Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho - may not extend to shielding individuals from COVID-19 mandates.

On Monday, a federal judge in Fort Worth, Texas, ruled in favor of Chicago-based United Airlines by refusing to block that company's policy of placing unvaccinated employees on indefinite unpaid leave, even if they qualify for a religious or medical exemption.

In his opinion, U.S. District Judge Mark T. Pittman did not rule on whether United's policy violated U.S. law or the U.S. Constitution. He said only that the plaintiffs in that case had failed to prove that they would suffer "irreparable injury" without a preliminary injunction.


