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Tentative Stark Co. school tax levy shows 4 percent increase

For The Prairie News WYOMING - The Stark County School Board plans to post several open positions that will be created with the retirements of three individuals who are currently employed by the school district. This was approved by the board at its Nov. 15 meeting.

The three teachers who are retiring at the end of the school year are: Scott Paxson, health and junior high physical education teacher, plus athletic director; Theresa Strode, third grade teacher; and Jody Jones, kindergarten teacher.

Superintendent Brett Elliott indicated by writing that the school district will not fill one of those teaching positions -"We plan to reduce the number of teachers at one grade level at SCES [Stark County Elementary School]." He later clarified that the position to be eliminated is undecided at this time.

On a related note, Elliott stated in his report that the school district has to meet legislation passed that calls for a \$40,000 minimum salary for teachers in the near future and has to meet the 2025 minimum

wage requirement of \$15 per hour for other employees.

Elliott also said that a tentative tax levy has been prepared for a December approval. He estimates that there will be a 4 percent increase, which translates to a small increase in taxes for property owners. The 2020 actual equalized assessed value [EAV] was \$123,023,423 and the 2021 estimated EAV is \$127,944,360.

On a state report card, Elliott said that the Stark County school district's graduation rate was up 1 percent, but well below the 95 percent goal. The

rate has remained in the low to mid-80 percentile, with an increase in 2021 from 81 percent to 93 percent graduation rate. The district is anticipating an increase of that rate over the coming several years.

The board will hear next month a renovation update concerning the new Toulon campus high school building construction from contractor CORE and the district's engineering firm, Farnsworth Group.

After an executive closed session, the board reconvened in open session and approved John Groter as boys' basketball second assistant coach for 2021-22; approved Mary Beth Newby as Stark County Elementary School RTL aide for 2021-22; accepted the resignation of Abbey Desplinter effective Nov. 23, as a Toulon cafeteria worker; and approved the hiring of Sarah Barnes to replace Desplinter immediately.

Snow bids were approved for this year from David Steward for the Wyoming facilities, and from Nelson, Henderson and Steward for the Toulon facilities at \$90 per hour with a two-hour

Galva school board OKs lower tax rate

For The Prairie News GALVA - Galva's school board indicated support on Monday for a plan to reduce its tax rate from \$4.84 to \$4.71 per \$100 of assessed valuation. The final figure will be voted on at the December board meet-

The change would mean a \$44 decrease for the owner of a house valued at \$100,000.

In other financial news, a representative from Gorenz and Associates went over the district audit. He noted the district's real estate tax has been on an incline for several years.

He concluded the Galva district had a "clean audit" and a perfect audit score of 4 out of 4.

Superintendent Joe

Becker recognized the Galva school board members, Laura Burke, Kaleena Conrad, Andrew Larson, John VanDeVelde, Mike Clucas, Erik Bates and Brittany Boston for State School Board member day in Illinois.

Board member Brittany Boston reported that the elementary windows would begin to be installed over Thanksgiving, the Junior-Senior High School's new windows are out for bids, and the chair lift at the Elementary School needs to be replaced.

Greg Wertheim, the executive director of the Henry-Stark County Special Education District 801, gave the board a short

Continued from Page 1 presentation on the program which provides services for 8 school districts and 32 buildings. In 2011, 18.30 percent of Galva's student body was served for a cost to the district of \$546,266 and in 2022 the tentative projected cost is \$549,639 serving 18.90 percent of the students.

Superintendent Becker went over the school report card, which he said is very limited due to last year's shutdowns. He said more figures might be available in the future. Galva has a graduation rate of 90 percent, teacher retention of 88 percent and 18 percent chronic absenteeism. Becker said that the state's average on chronic absenteeism was 21 percent. He said this was due to groups of students being sent home if they were exposed to COVID.

The board also approved:

- the resignation of Josh Morris as high school volleyball coach.
 - the retirement of Kristine Sullen.
- Tressa Rogers as a volunteer assistant girls varsity basketball coach.


sion," Orville said of his service years in the United States Army. "I served from 1950 to 1952, in Korea."

Of dogs, spilled beans, stuffing and oaks

Rambling through central Illinois, pondering reasons to be thankful.

For most of the first two days of pheasant hunting last week, I was thinking of creative ways to tell my wife we needed a second dog.

My young **Buck**, age 11 months, was not so much bad as he was

clueless about hunting. The little Labrador retriever stayed close and he generally listened to commands (even when hunting alongside a female in heat). But for two days

he showed very little interest in pheasants, alive or dead.

Then suddenly, the switch flipped. Buck got to a downed bird first, wrassled with the pheasant and came out of the experience with blood on his muzzle and fire in his skinny gut.

The White Weasel, as I call him, turned into the White Streak. The dog grew up over the final two days of a cold, wet trip to northern Iowa that saw me fall face first into a ditch while attempting to jump across 3-foot deep water ("Does anyone have video?" my loving wife wondered).

There is no video of that frigid moment, thankfully. And no need for another puppy. Seems there is still reason to feed Buck.

Back in late October, I made the mistake of writing about what appeared to me to be an abundance of cover crops planted around central Illinois. But it turns out that abundance of green in Illinois fields was not due to cover crops, but rather thanks to spilled crops. Retired agronomy professor Roger Higgs was one of several folks who brought this to my attention. Wrote Higgs, "I noted in your editorial column of Oct. 21 that you applauded the green in harvested corn and soybean fields I was in central Illinois a week ago and unfortunately the green was mostly the worst case of harvest loss and subsequent regrowth of 'volunteer' corn or soybeans that I have ever witnessed in my lifetime. The green carpet was corn seedlings or soybean seedlings.

"What I witnessed in 500 miles of travel in central, northern and eastern Illinois were fields that appeared to have harvest losses of 10 or 20 or more bushels per acre.

[That is a quick estimate without doing a measured check.]

"And, those bushels on the ground represented many dollars of value for the crops at the current commodity prices. I rarely saw genuine cover crops panted such as rye, radishes, or buckwheat. The good news is that the 'volunteer' corn or soybean seedlings are annual species and will not survive the winter, and they will provide some cover."

Higgs surmises that the scattered grain was mostly caused by "combine loss and pod shattering in soybeans."

Just to double check, I examined a few fields that looked to have been planted. Sure enough, that sea of green was soybeans. Wow. You can learn something new every day, if you let yourself.

Today I am thankful for: Eli and Peyton Manning, who make long Monday nights in the office enjoyable. They have the best sports show on TV right now. ... Multiple Thanksgiving dinners. One day of turkey, stuffing, mashed potatoes and gluttony is never enough. ... Truck toppers. Lost my last one in the straightline winds 12 years ago and finally got a replacement last week for my trip west. To have a topper on a pickup is to laugh at rain trying to soak your luggage or winds trying to hurt young trees as you move them from spot to spot. Having a truck topper is peace, until you have to load a deer into the bed while using the loader on your tractor. ... Pin oaks. Gimme the longlasting brown leaves of a pin oak, or any other oak that holds its leaves well into winter, over any glorious color a maple produces. When other trees are barren and gray, the oaks still provide some color. And this year has been one of the best in a long time for trees holding their leaves.

November is the month that will drive me to retirement. There's just so much to do and not enough time to do it all while holding down a job. ... Parting shot: Shotgun deer season arrives Friday through Sunday and with that comes an annual caveat: This weekend is not a good time to let your big, brown dog run wild through the woods.


Galva school hosts veterans program



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manufacturing incentives become law

SPRINGFIELD – Gov. JB Pritzker signed into law a tax incentives package Tuesday that state lawmakers hope will help Illinois become a manufacturing hub for the budding electric vehicle industry.

The Reimagining Electric Vehicles in Illinois, or REV, Act, passed the General Assembly with near-unanimous bipartisan support during the recently concluded fall session. It provides tax credits for income tax withheld for EV manufacturers and costs to train new or retained employees.

It also applies to the manufacturers of EV parts, such as batteries. It's an effort to lure new manufacturers to Illinois while incentivizing existing manufacturers to invest in their Illinois facilities and workers.

"With this bill, we intend to attract more EV manufacturers, charging

station manufacturers and automotive parts manufacturers, more than ever before, and it will help Illinois become one of the leading EV hubs in the entire nation," Pritzker said during a signing ceremony at the Rock Valley College Advanced Technology Center in Belvidere.

The tax credits created by the new law range from 75 percent to 100 percent of income tax withheld for creating new jobs or 25 percent to 50 percent for retained employees, depending on factors such as company location and number of employees hired. A 10 percent credit for training expenses would also be available.

Tax credits for construction wages and building materials are also included in the bill.

The added incentives complement Illinois' other advantages when it comes to manufacturing, Pritzker said, but they are needed to make Illinois competitive with other states

from a financial perspective.

The other advantages to choosing Illinois, according to Pritzker, are a centralized location in the U.S., strong infrastructure, the secondlargest crop of computer science engineer graduates in the nation and a pair of major national laboratories.

Those assets helped lure the electric vehicle manufacturer Rivian Automotive to a closed Mitsubishi plant in the Bloomington-Normal area in 2017. Its vice president of public policy, Jim Chen, said the bill will be a major support for the company that already employs more than 3,000 Illinoisans in its 3.5 million square feet of manufacturing space.

"Today's bill signing represents the next step in promoting Illinois as the Silicon Valley of EVs, as we work together to attract new investment from suppliers and other supporting players in this industry," he

Per his request, there will be no services. Cremation Specialist of Central Illinois is assisting the family.



Water trees, shrubs now heading into winter

University of Illinois Extension URBANA – After this year's

summer drought in Illinois, it is more important than ever to monitor soil moisture conditions and water trees and shrubs going into winter.

Drought conditions in the late fall, along with dry air and low soil moisture, can lead to plant damage if no supplemental water is provided.

Plants under water stress are more susceptible to insects and diseases. They can also experience injuries to roots or foliage.

Before watering, check the soil moisture. Monitor the moisture levels about once a week. Dig a small hole under the tree's drip line, 4 to 6 inches is enough. Feel for moisture. If the soil is dry, the tree should be watered.

In particular, newly fall-planted trees, shrubs, and perennials should be monitored and watered late into the season, since they do not have as much time to develop extensive root systems as anything planted in the spring.

Pay attention to evergreens and shallow-rooted trees such as birches and maples. Some shallow-rooted trees can be identified by roots breaking the surface of the soil. Evergreens do not go dormant in the winter and are still actively respiring and lose water through their needles.

Dormant trees respire at lower rates. Since soil insulates and cools down later in the year than the air temperature, roots stay warmer longer and respire at higher rates than the above-ground parts, the trunk, and branches, of deciduous trees after their leaves drop.

Only water when the temperature is above 40°F. In some places, that could be as late as the end of De-

cember. Stop supplemental watering after the ground freezes.

To water, use a soaker hose to provide a slow stream of water. Soil should be moist, but not waterlogged. This method results in less runoff and the water is more likely to be absorbed by the root zone.

Water at the tree's drip line and not right against the base. To conserve water, start with newly planted trees and shrubs weekly and then large and established trees once a month.

Avoid fertilizer, which stimulates late-season growth, and instead, consider applying mulch. Mulch can help conserve moisture. Apply mulch 2 to 4 inches away from the base of the tree all the way to the drip line.

As always, planting hardy species or cultivars with deep roots is best since they are more likely to be able to survive temperature fluctuations and prolonged periods of cold.

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
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

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Now's the time to feed our feathered friends

And here we are in November, with snow on the horizon. Before we know it, winter will be settling in around us. That's what makes this the time to get out your birdfeeders for coming hard times that our beloved songbirds will soon be facing.

Backyard birdwatching and feeder stations were once just a passing hobby or done only by the most avid birders. That has changed significantly over the past few years.

Birding and birdwatching in the United States has become one of the fastest-growing outdoor recreational activities. Our backyard bird friends do much to enrich our lives during the dark and dreary months of winter. They inspire us, bring us bright bits of color and entertain us with their social behaviors\ and feeder squabbles.

So how do we bring the magic of birds to our yards.?

It's straightforward. Birds find food by sight. "Build it, and they will come" absolutely applies to backyard bird feeding. Put the food out, and in almost all cases, the birds will show up.

Backyard bird feeding and the enjoyment it brings can be as elaborate or simple as you wish and can afford. Some folks choose to take things to a whole new level with specialized species and seed-specific feeders and landscaping. Yet simply hanging one or two simple, inexpensive feeders can bring your family lots of birdwatching fun.

If you have a particular type of bird you want to attract, it's a good idea to do a little research into what attracts that specific species. Some birds like to feed at elevated levels, like the chickadees, nuthatches and gold-finch. Juncos, doves and native sparrows feed primarily on the ground. Then we have woodpeckers and brown creepers who are happier feeding on and around a tree trunk or log.

Some birds aren't at all picky – cardinals and blue jays are just plain opportunistic and will feed wherever seed is provided.

The two easiest to inexpensive feeders for attracting a large variety of birds are hopper feeders and seed tube bird feeders.

Other popular styles include ground and platform, bird feeders. Many consider the platform feeder the best at attracting a variety of species.

For variety and to bring in even more birds, consider adding a tube or sock feeder for thistle seed and some suet cakes.

It's not just the type of feeder that attracts specific birds but also the kind of food you put out. Birds that prefer elevated hopper and tube bird feeders love sunflower seed, safflower seed and a few nuts mixed in. Be aware if you use a general wild bird mix in these feeders. The birds may well pick through things looking for the favorites and kicking everything else onto the ground. That's not all bad – little ground-feeding birds will generally clean up that mess.

General wild bird mixes usually consist of millet with cracked corn, sunflower seeds and occasional bits and pieces of nuts or berries. I've always found these to work great on platform and ground feeders. Birds seem to find the bits and pieces they prefer without kicking out as much

of the other food.

My platform feeder has a small roof over it to shield things from the weather. I also supplement inexpensive mixes with a handful or two of more expensive treat-type seeds such as black-oil sunflowers or nuts and dried fruit.

Read the label when buying seed. Many inexpensive mixes contain fillers such as milo, wheat, red millet that birds don't find attractive. Sometimes almost 40 percent of a bag may be these fillers.

No discussion about backyard feeders is complete without mentioning squirrels, those crafty little bottomless pits that can empty a feeder in the blink of an eye. If squirrels are driving you crazy and gobbling up all your seed, you can add a baffle or invest in a squirrel-proof feeder.

Another trick I have learned is to use safflower seed in feeders that squirrels like the most. While most backyard birds enjoy safflower seed, squirrels will not eat it.

To encourage birds to visit your backyard regularly, make sure you have a water source. Even in winter, water is essential for their survival. A well-placed source of open water will attract more birds than birdseed alone. Shop around and consider adding a heater to your birdbath for the winter.

Lastly, consider planting birdfriendly habitat in your yard. Hedges, shrubs, small brushpiles left to overwinter offer shelter and protection.

Whether you go all out with feeding stations, habitat and other bird attractants or just hang a few feeders, you won't be disappointed. Nothing perks up a dreary winter day like a backyard bustling with birds!
