Aupperle earns honor from ag group

TOULON – Eldon R. “Bud” Aupperle has dedicated his life to advancing the Future Farmers of America program from the national to the local levels.

His association with FFA began in 1946 when he joined the FFA at Fairbury Township High School as a freshman. It was then that his Ag teacher and FFA teacher, Robert Maurer, significantly influenced Aupperle for the rest of his life.

“We had a super fantastic Ag teacher. I became very active in FFA although I had three brothers [Elias, Willis and Elmer] who were in FFA, but they never really got that excited about it,” Aupperle said.

Aupperle has attended 49 national FFA conventions during his lifetime, but decided against attending his 50th, on Oct. 28, because of health reasons. He was subsequently awarded the Forever Blue Circle membership award for his planned gift to FFA, a percentage of his estate.

In his stead, Aupperle made arrangements for his great-great nephew, John Aupperle, president of the Maroa-Forsyth FFA chapter, in Maroa, to represent him and wife, Virginia. This is another FFA award among the many Aupperle has achieved during his years in FFA. He received the VIP Citation award in 2016 and the Honorary National FFA membership award, as well.

Aupperle is a charter member

of the National FFA Alumni Association and has served as its president and secretary. He has been State chairman for two years in a row of the Illinois FFA Foundation, a fundraising organization for the FFA chapters. In

Illinois recommends vaccine for ages 5-11

SPRINGFIELD – One day after the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommended that children between the ages of 5 and 11 receive the COVID-19 vaccine manufactured by Pfizer and BioNTech, the Illinois Department of Public Health adopted the same recommendations Wednesday.

That vaccine had previously been approved for people 12 years of age and older. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration authorized its emergency use for 5- to 11-year-olds last week, and the CDC made the recommendation official Tuesday night.

IDPH Director Dr. Ngozi Ezike said medical experts have reviewed data from clinical trials that included more

than 3,000 children, leading to the CDC recommendation. Those trials showed the vaccine to be more than 90 percent effective in preventing COVID-19 in children in the age group.

Children in the trials saw the same side effects as adolescents and adults but to a lesser extent, according to IDPH. The side effects included injection site pain, redness and swelling, fatigue, headache, muscle or joint pain, chills, and fever. They generally lasted one to two days.

State officials have urged parents with questions or who are wishing to vaccinate their children to call their pediatrician’s office to learn more.

Pediatric COVID-19 vaccinations will also be available

Stark Co. students learn from local veterans

Editor’s note: These are the last of the series of student interviews with local veterans published in honor of Veteran’s Day.

An Infantry Hero

Many people have served in the military at some point in their life, and my father, Craig Grinnell, is one of those people. He began serving in the infantry as a PFC at age 20. He served in the U.S. and in the Saudi Arabian desert. He started serving because he wanted to give something new a try.

Craig was born in Pontiac, Mich., and grew up in Lapeer. During his youth, he enjoyed playing war games and Dungeons and Dragons. When

he grew up, he enlisted in the military. He felt excited to start serving for our country.

He started his service by getting basic training at Fort Benning, Ga. He received training for, and officially joined, the infantry. They wore camo uniforms and slept in tents when on the battlefield; otherwise, they slept in barracks. The rules were mostly strict, but on occasion, they were relaxed. Whenever he had free time, he liked relaxing at the park.

Around Labor Day of 1990, he and the infantry started heading over to Saudi Arabia to fight in Operation Desert Storm. They flew in a commercial plane and landed at King Fahd International Airport. He was

assigned to the 101st Airborne Division and fought without a specific job. When he was on the field, he wrote to his friends whenever he could. Once the war was over, he flew back home on a commercial airline. He remained in the military for six months after that. His most exhausting experience, outside of the war, was going to Florida to train for 36 hours at night.

When he was discharged, he went to the University of Michigan in Flint to train for a new job. He met his wife when he was online and they got married in 2002. He currently lives in Speer, with his wife and four kids, and he works for the post office

addition, Aupperle has been a national sponsor of the foundation for 56 years.

In 1947, Aupperle received a Santa Fe Railway award that made it possible for him to attend his first FFA National convention, in Kansas City.

“That was my first time away from home and that’s when I decided that I wanted to give other young people the same opportunity,” Aupperle explained.

Aupperle is an Army veteran and received his Master of Ag Education from the University of Illinois. In 1958, he created the agriculture program and FFA chapter at Warren High School, near Monmouth, that is now part of the United School District. He taught there through 1964.

In 1967, Aupperle was hired at the

Black Hawk College East Campus, near Kewanee, when that institution was formed. There he developed the now nationally recognized agriculture program. He retired in 1988 and was named professor emeritus.

Aupperle was born on a livestock farm near Fairbury to immigrant parents Ernest [Germany] and Lena [Switzerland], in 1932. He also has a sister, Anna.

VACCINE: Mandate for kids up to General Assembly

at local health departments, many pharmacies, Federally Qualified Health Centers, and from other providers who offer the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, according to a news release.

That includes about 2,200 pediatric providers in Illinois who have already enrolled in the state immunization registry and can administer COVID-19 vaccines.

IDPH said more than 1,200 youth vaccination events have been held or are scheduled, and the department continues to work with schools to schedule more.

While children don’t often get se-

vere COVID-19, Ezike said, it is still possible, and infected children play a major role in disease spread.

“We need as many people as possible, including children, to be vaccinated to stop the spread of the virus and end this pandemic,” she said in the news release.

Last week, Gov. JB Pritzker said the state expects to receive 306,000 doses, with another 73,000 going to the city of Chicago and 100,000 doses to pharmacies.

In a Tuesday news conference before the approval, Pritzker and Ezike said it is premature to talk about mandating the vaccine for children in order for them to attend school. Such

a decision would have to wait at least for full CDC and FDA approval, not just emergency use authorization.

Pritzker also said that decision would be up to the General Assembly.

“We require lots of vaccinations, as you know, when kids go to school already, to make sure that kids don’t get polio, to make sure they don’t get measles and mumps and rubella and so on,” he said.



Cresting the wave, looking into a trough

There's no good time for bad news. Most farmers and ranchers, however, prefer to hear it sooner than later to factor it into the day or season's plan.

Maybe that's why our good friends at farmdocDaily, the online consortium of Land Grant extension specialists hosted by the University of Illinois, released a "Stress Test of 2022 Crop Returns" in late August: they want corn and soybean farmers to begin to focus on what a return to "average" could bring after three years of government payments and wild market swings.

Their collective view is clear. "Positive returns are projected for both" 2022 corn and soybeans "given a \$4.25 corn price and \$12.00 soybean price..." But lower prices for both, such as a "return to 2014-2019 prices," they warn, will bring "meager incomes, and possible pressures for another round of ad hoc Federal payments."

That's Extension-speak for, "So far, so good but this could go south in a hurry." (Links to farmdocDaily bulletins and tables cited here, including all imputed costs, are posted at farmandfoodfile.com.)

For example, if 2022 corn prices average \$4.50 per bushel compared to this year's estimated \$5.25, and yields drop from today's 235 bu. average to a normal 220 bu., the es-

timated "farmer return" per acre collapses from a thick \$343 now to a skinny \$20 next year.

A continued strong market in soy, however, would soothe that bruise. According to the analysts, if 2022 bean prices average \$12.00 per bu., just \$1 under 2021's projected average price, per acre bean profits slip from a fat \$294 to a still-plump \$122.

That means a central Illinois "high productivity... 50% corn, 50% soybean rotation" this year will "return \$315 per acre, a record level exceeding the previous high of \$290 per acre set in 2011."

But \$4.50-corn and \$12-beans in 2022 means the "projected farmer returns" on the same 50/50 rotation would be "\$71 per acre," a whopping \$244 an acre less but still three times the paper thin, 2014-to-2019 average of \$25 per acre.

That's the still-good news; here's the potentially bad: "While returns are projected positive for 2022, relatively small declines in prices could cause returns to be negative."

If, for example, 2022 corn prices average \$4.41 per bu. and bean prices average \$10.23 per bu. or lower, farmer "returns would be negative on cash rented land..."

Lower crop prices, though, aren't the only reason. Crop input prices for 2022, especially fertilizer, are far higher and, too, for the first time in years there will be no "ad hoc Federal payments."

While no one can say where fertilizer prices will top out – potash, nitrogen, and diammonium phosphate, or DAP, are now at record levels

and rising – we do know that federal payments to productive, central Illinois farms averaged from 2018-20, respectively, \$1, \$110, and \$68 an acre for corn while soybean payments were \$122, \$94, and \$45 an acre those same years.

Nationwide, that's billions more in tomorrow's production costs and tens of billions less in yesterday's government payments.

And what do the number gurus see for per-acre returns if U.S. markets revisit "2014-2019 average prices of \$3.64 per bu. [for corn] and \$9.91 per bu. [for soybeans]"?

In a word, disaster. "At those prices, the average return for corn is -\$164 per acre and -\$17 per acre for soybeans. The 50-50 rotation return is -\$86 an acre, well below all returns since 2000."

While no one predicts that happening, the analysts are quick to point out that corn prices averaged \$3.49 per bu. in 2016 and soybeans averaged "\$9.39 per bu... in 2018..."

Still, the farmdocDaily pros are suggesting that U.S. corn and soybean farmers now are riding a high-profit wave that's probably already crested. Whatever comes next includes the words "lower and less."

And "Cowabunga!"

Stark County XC season ends at sectional

OREGON – Despite running her best race ever on the challenging new sectional course here, Stark County senior Ashley Orrick narrowly missed advancing to the Class 1A state cross country meet last Saturday.

Orrick placed 29th out of 148 finishers overall in 21:31 on the 3.1-mile course for the Lady Rebels, who placed 12th as a team. Alex Welch (64th, 18:54), the first SC boys runner to compete in a sectional, also ran well, but missed advancing to state Saturday at Detweiller Park in Peoria.

“Ashley ran her best race ever on this layout and came up just short of qualifying as an individual, but did run very well,” Rebels Coach Bob Rennick Jr.

said. “Alex also ran a great race in a very fast field. I was very pleased with his performance. Our choice was run for time, or lay out and run at qualification, he chose the later and went for it.”

Other scoring girls runners for Stark County were Paige Rewerts (50th, 22:26), Kokone Kasaya (79th, 24:03), Keagon Hamilton (99th, 24:51) and Emily Orrick (122nd, 26:28). The other SC runners were Sarah Kraklow (123rd, 26:29) and Katie Grinnell (142nd, 30:01).

“Overall our season was very successful,” Rennick said. “Of the eight girls on the team, only two had run regularly over the last few seasons, Ashley and Paige. We were very young and inexperienced, but I was very pleased at qualifying

out of regional and how competitive we were. For the boys, we did not have numbers for a team, but they were focused and trained very hard.”

Football playoffs – The postseason has not been kind to local teams, as only Abingdon-Avon remains out of the Lincoln Trail Conference.

And A-Town’s 14-8 win came over Annawan Wethersfield. Only Farmington is left out of the Prairieland Conference, which had crossover games with the LTC this season.
