### Latest school report card shows impact of COVID-19

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - The COVID-19 pandemic resulted in significant drops in enrollment, academic performance and the likelihood of graduating high school on time, according to the latest school report card released recently by the Illinois State Board of Education.

The report card is an annual report that tracks how the state, and each school and district, are progressing on a wide range of educational goals.

But the report also showed that more Illinois students than ever are preparing for college and careers by taking dual credit, Advanced Placement and career and technical education, or CTE courses, while schools themselves are doing a better job of retaining veteran teachers.

"We have witnessed both tragedy and heroism in our schools over the past year," State Superintendent of Education Dr. Carmen I. Ayala said in a state-

According to the report, which

covers the 2020-2021 academic year, total enrollment in Pre-K-12 schools fell 3.6 percent from the prior year, or by about 70,000 students, to just under 1.89 million. State officials said recent trends would have predicted a 1.1 percent decline, meaning the additional 2.5 percent can be attributed to the pandemic.

The biggest enrollment declines were in Pre-K and kindergarten, with pre-K enrollment dropping 17 percent and kindergarten enrollment dropping 8 percent.

The report also shows a disturbing increase in chronic absenteeism since the pandemic began. More than one in five students, or 22.8 percent, missed 10 percent or more of all school days in the year. That's up from 13.4 percent in 2019, the most recent full pre-pandemic year.

Officials cautioned, however, that the 2021 figures might not be reliable because of the number of students who were engaged in remote learning.

The report card also showed declines in student performance on standardized tests, although those numbers are still preliminary because schools were given the option of administering those tests this fall. Full results will be published next spring.

All students in grades 3-8 take the Illinois Assessment of Readiness, or IAR, which covers English language arts and math proficiency. High school students are tested in 11th grade by taking the SAT exam.

#### **Farmington** passes levy, resolution

FARMINGTON - The Farmington School Board on Monday approved one measure that will definitely impact education in the district next year and one resolution that board members hope will have an impact.

First was passage of the tentative 2021 tax levy, which for the second year in a row will result in a tax decrease for property owners.

"Last year was when we let the bonds fall off and we had a 30-cent falloff in the levy, as we had predicted back in 2018," Superintendent Zac Chatterton said. "This year it has just stabilized, but we were able to shave off two cents."

#### Elmwood city OKs post office change

#### But renaming decision made by feds

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD - The Elmwood City Council voted its support for an ongoing effort to rename the city's post office in honor of the late Ben Desilets, an Elm-

wood native who died in

action in 2007 in Iraq. Speaking at the

council's Nov. 4 meeting, Ron and

Crouch

explained their effort to rename the city's federal post office after Desilets, a U.S. Marines corporal who was killed in action at age 21 on May 22, 2007, in Zanti, Iraq, while conducting combat operations in the Anbar Province.

Desilets was a member of the 3rd Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force based at Camp Lejeune, N.C. He was also an Elmwood High School graduate.

"My proposal that the post office be renamed in the honor of one of Elmwood's own, Corporal Ben Desilets, who was killed in battle in Anbar Province, in 2007. May we never forget," Ron Crouch said.

The councils approval is merely in support of a decision that must be made on the federal level. The





#### **ELMWOOD:** City purchasing new police vehicle

Crouches said they have been in contact with the local postmaster and with Congressman Darin LaHood's office.

"I just want to get everybody on board, I think it's the right thing to do," Crouch said. "I think it's good for the city. I'm asking for the city council's support."

The council was in agreement with renaming the post office.

In other business, the council approved Elmwood part-time police officer Nick Robbin's hourly pay rate at \$16.07 per hour.

In his report, Police Chief Aaron Bean said there were 3 arrests, 10 stops, 1 citation, 9 warnings, 38 reports taken, 2 notices to appear, 1 open door, 2 ordinance violations and 66 incidents handled for the month of October.

The council heard from Councilman Andrew Almasi concerning the

purchase of a new police vehicle. The Dodge Durango has a base price of \$41,500 and will cost an additional \$8,000 to outfit with police equipment.

"This is the only vehicle available until after the first of the year," Almasi said.

He said a grant could pay for the majority of this item's cost. The police car that is to be replaced has over 150,000 miles on it according to Bean. Delivery cost of the vehicle pushes its total price to \$50,215, which was approved by the council.

The 1981 Elmwood street sweeper has over 10,000 hours of service on it and has broken down recently. A replacement hose was installed and then the hydraulic pump that empties the sweeper failed. That pump is no longer manufactured.


It would cost approximately \$30,000 to repair the sweeper according to Mayor J. D. Hulslander.

He added that a refurbished sweeper could cost from \$40,000 to \$250,000 depending upon the type and brand. A refurbished sweeper is available for purchase, but the mayor wants to research this agenda item further and make a decision at the Nov. 16 council meeting.

Economic Development Director Amy Davis reported that Dec. 4 is the scheduled Christmas Walk this year. Also, luminaries are planned to be sold to residents and businesses. The cost for 300 feet of luminaries is \$65 according to Davis, and the price for less footage declines proportionately.

The Elmwood businesswomen's organization has requested a donation from the city for their auction that pays for scholarships. Davis will put this and the luminary cost on the next agenda for action.

Finally, the council approved meeting dates for 2022.

Continued from Page 1 level standards compared to 2019, especially among younger students, Dixon said.

The number of students meeting grade-level standards dropped 17.8 percent in math and 16.6 percent in English language arts.

The rate of ninth-grade students who were on track to graduate dropped 5.1 percent from 2019, reflecting an increase in students receiving failing grades,

ISBE said.

One area of academic performance that did improve was in college and career preparation.

Students taking courses for both high school and college credit grew 12 percent.

Advanced Placement enrollment grew 1.6 percent, to 129,574.

The state's overall teacher retention rate also rose more than a percentage point, to 87.1 percent.





#### Help for dealing with anxiety, depression

Abraham Lincoln recently visited the auditorium of the Elmwood High School, giving a presentation on his life with an emphasis on his battle with depression. Lincoln was portrayed by Rick Otey from Tremont. He has been sharing his skills as a Lincoln actor for five years, becoming known by his programs to

civic groups, libraries and more recently to schools.

Two assemblies were held for the high school on Nov. 4, with the desire to help the students understand that

they are not alone when they suffer from depression, anxiety and suicidal thoughts. Otey cited statistics showing that before they graduate from high school, 1 in 3 students would experience anxiety; 1 in 5 students will experience depression and, sadly, 60 students in the state of Illinois would take their own lives.

Otey continued his message saying that what people post on social media is always their best news, their best achievements, their best

success – so that they look like they're perfect and have everything all together. A student may compare themselves to a friend's posts and feel like they're not half as together as their friend. But you need to remember that each one of you has value. You are a unique and special person and the world would be a lesser place without you. When you have feelings of loneliness, anger, anxiety, depression and suicide please reach out and share your struggles with someone.

An interesting note: student ID badges have the suicide hotline phone number printed on the back, so that help is just a text or phone

Hannah, a senior from Tremont High School, shared her story in the program as well, citing depression which caused her to be exhausted and not able to get out of bed to go to school after she lost her father to cancer. She reached out for help and began counseling which brought about personal growth. She also discovered the one thing, the one cause that she was able to grab on to and give her a purpose for living: advocating for teenage mental health.

Thank you Hannah, for your courage to share your story with others!

Ask your teenagers about this presentation and engage them in a conversation about mental health. Assurance that they're not deficient or abnormal if they think they have had anxiety or depression goes a long way in boosting their willingness to reach out and to receive mental health help and counseling.

As a follow-up to this presentation, Elmwood First Presbyterian Church is hosting another program on the same topic and extends an invitation to all the community. Parents and grandparents, and leaders from the school, church and community are all urged to attend and take advantage of the mental health education provided by the professionals at the Antioch Group from

Bring your teenagers (pre- and post-teens welcome too!) so they can continue their learning and ask their own questions. Adults and students will meet in different rooms with different leaders, so that honest and open questions may be asked.

#### America needs Trump – without Trump

The recent election of Republican Glenn Youngkin to be governor in Democratic stronghold Virginia displays emphatically that Trump conservatism fares better - without Trump. The conundrum for Republican Party leaders, a weak lot, is how to double down on this fact in 2022, and keep former President Donald Trump off the ticket in 2024.

Youngkin upset former Democratic Virginia Governor and national Democratic Party leader Terry McAuliffe by capturing significantly greater percentages of in-

dependent as well as women voters than did Trump in 2020 - while apparently keeping the support of the Trump base.

This suggests strongly that campaigning on Trump-like issues while downplaying connections to Trump could help the GOP take back a sizable majority in the House in 2022 and win the presidency in 2024 – without Trump.

An anti-Trump Republican, I find much of the Trump program positive, straightforward:

• Make "Made in America" great again

- Orderly immigration
- Stand up to China
- Strengthen the American family
- Safe streets

I would add "fiscal integrity," something out of favor in both the Trump and Biden administrations.

Yet the man himself is a pathological narcissist, dangerously obsessed with self; everything else everything – is subservient.

But, as is obvious, Trump dominates the Republican Party right now. After all, he was there to speak loudly for his base in 2016 and 2020, while the GOP before him had only mealy-mouthed nostrums to offer.

The Trump base may have been rallied to come out for Youngkin even though the governor-elect rarely mentioned him - because opponent McAuliffe incessantly advertised a Trump-Youngkin connection, which was in fact rather

And, can dissatisfaction with the Democrats' big spending, quite liberal messaging be enough alone to bring out Trump voters, if Trump is not front and center?

Related, what can GOP leaders at the national and state levels do, if anything, to keep the Trump excitement alive – without Trump? Maybe nothing, which would be tragic.

Or, maybe the following:

- The "chattering class," even those like me with small megaphones, hammers away, as follows: Trumpism does better without Trump. Over time, the message might bring some Trump backers to conclude this as well, and
- GOP leaders quietly encourage even-keeled political types like Youngkin to contest congressional seats next year in many suburban districts across the country. Dems are vulnerable in the 'burbs, and Trump is far less popular there than in rural and small-town America. If highly successful next year in the suburbs, the GOP would send a strong message to all that to win in 2024, do it with a Trump-like platform — but without Trump.

Even this might not be enough to dislodge The Donald from candidacy, yet I feel it must be tried. After all, GOP party leaders, and even the Trump base, I would hope, want to win, even if just on the issues, even without Trump.



#### Solar panels saving Billtown schools money

By JEFF LAMPE

WILLIAMSFIELD - The Williamsfield School Board learned Monday that solar panels saved the school district 18 percent on electricity costs in Fiscal Year 2021.

The field of solar panels north of the school have been operating since July 28, 2020, and last year generated 374 megawatts to help reduce the overall energy bill to \$43,323 from \$52,751 the year before.

Teresa Welch of Blucker, Kneer & Associates presented the board with a summary of results from the annual audit of Fiscal Year 2021. Welch said the school district received "recognition" status and a grade of 3.55 out

"That's a very good thing," Welch

As of June 30, 2021, the district had 116 days of cash on hand.

"This is the lowest point you've been in the last five years, but you've planned this, as well," Welch said.

Superintendent Tim Farquer said the district received only 30 percent of the early tax income usually in hand and levied less for a few funds.

Farquer reported on various school performance assessments. He said 42 percent of students met or exceeded standards in ELA/Literacy and 22 percent met or exceeded standards in math. Overall, 33 percent of students in grades 3-8 who took the tests met or exceeded standards in both areas.

The 19 juniors who took the SAT last year were just below the state average in total mean score (977 vs. 980), just above in evidence-based reading and writing (EBRW) (501 vs. 495) and just below in math (476 vs. 485). Overall, 52 percent met or exceeded the EBRW benchmark and 21 percent met or exceeded the math

benchmark. And of 20 students who took AP exams, 4 received scores of 3 or better.

The board also heard Meet the Cougars night will be Friday at Robert P. Anderson gym starting at 5 p.m. And Farquer said the girls volleyball team finished with 21 wins, which is believed to be the third team in school history to top 20 wins.

- Heard that the district received \$55,000 for the purchase of Chromebooks from a federal grant.
- · Renewed general liability and workers compensation policies.
- Approved the West Central FS 2022-23 diesel fuel purchase process to lock in pricing for 7,900 gallons of diesel fuel.

Continued from Page 1 ied for 2021 is \$8,164,117 – a 3.24 percent increase over 2020. That increase, however, is due to a 3.68 percent increase in the equalized assessed value of properties in the district.

The board also passed a resolution requesting that the General Assembly of Illinois pass legislation reaffirming the authority of public school districts to make all decisions regarding COVID-19 mitigation measures which are not inconsistent with state statute

Farmington is thought to be the first school board in Illinois to pass such a resolution. And while it is largely a symbolic move, Chatterton said the board thought it was significant.

"I appreciate the board wanting to keep the district out of any litigious situation. At the same time, they are very philosophically conflicted," Chatterton said. "They ran for the school board to have local control over our school district based on the local matrix, the needs of our kids and the pulse of our community."

Board members worked with the district attorney to draft the resolution, which seeks to have legislators clarify that school boards can treat mitigation measured of Gov. Pritzker, the Illinois Department of Public Health and the Illinois State Board of Education as "recommendations but not requirements."

"Theoretically, our stance is that local control already exists, to it very specifically says reaffirm," Chatterton said.

The board also approved the 2022-23 course catalog, dealt with some surplus items in the vocational department and approved several personnel moves.







Continued from Page 16 visitors lacked speed to the outside. Not so Farmington, though you would not have guessed that on the first series.

Tremont's 6-foot-3, 235-pound fullback Shemar Williams ran 49 yards on the first drive for a 6-0 lead.

"The scary part was that we couldn't catch him," Vallas said. "But we're notorious for giving up a firstseries score. Once we get our bearings and figure things out, we were pretty good at it. And that's really all he had."

Thereafter Williams' runs seldom topped 3 yards and the Turks finished with just 160 yards overall, 90 on the ground.

"I would not want to run against our defense," Embry said. "You get those free-release guys on the edge ... especially with Kevin [Shultz] and Rese [Shymansky], you can't get around those guys."

Farmington responded to Tremont's score with a 45-yard scoring pass from Gage Renken to Evans on fourth-and-4 at 7:28 of the first quarter. That score effectively helped spring Embry later in the game, as did a 6-yard score early in the second quarter by Shultz.

"Ethan and I were talking before the game and I said, 'You know they're going to be all over you,"" Vallas said, due to Evans' two TDs the week before. "And Ethan said, 'That's OK, Riley will be fine."" Indeed, Embry has run for 857 yards this season on just 40 carries – a gaudy 21.4 yards per carry. That's second only to Shultz's 1,264 yards.

"His best asset is how patient he is when he gets out there," Vallas said of Embry. "If you seal the outside, he'll cut it back."

Yet Embry might not be featured this week against a Tri Valley team that has good speed, according to Vallas. Or he might, depending on how the game progresses. Until the game is over, opposing teams can't be sure which Farmers player will haunt their dreams this season.





With a second straight win over solid teams from the Heart of Illinois Conference, Farmington (11-0) now gets to meet that league's champion, unbeaten Downs Tri Valley (11-0). Game time is 1 p.m. Saturday.

Playing Tri Valley means you have to contend with quarterback Andrew Petrilli, who in a first-round win over Taylor Ridge Rockridge had a hand in 513 yards and six TDs.

"He's a one-man wrecking crew. He's really good," Farmington Coach Toby Vallas said. "What I was impressed with is one time he'll come right at you. And the next time he'll jump-cut you. He's pretty elusive."

Vallas said the same is true for Embry, who became the top option against Tremont because the Turks set up to stop the inside running of Kevin Shultz. And also because the

E-B sophomore Addie Symonds was the top local girls finisher, placing 55th in 19:04.04, nine spots ahead of Princeville freshman Alyvia Cowser (64th, 19:09.70).

The Lady Trojans finished 24th overall with 540 points, while Tolono Unity was the girls winner with 126 points. Top individual was senior Lianna Surtz of Aurora Rosary in 17:21.45.

E-B's other runners were junior Chloe Kelly (145th, 20:08.79), junior Ashley Wolcott (153rd, 20:12.71), freshman Olivia Stage (173rd, 20:37.23), sophomore Aleah Zehr (224th, 21:52.52) and junior Bre Turner (243rd, 22:45.12).
