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### COVID cases taking toll on local schools, sports

The Princeville School District switched to remote learning on Tuesday and has called off all sports until Dec. 7 due to a recent increase in COVID-19 cases.

In Elmwood, a promising 7th grade girls basketball postseason came to an abrupt end after two players tested positive for COVID and the 8th grade girls basketball postseason appears to have barely survived becoming a pandemic casualty.

No question, COVID is rearing its ugly spiky head locally.

At Princeville, Superintendent Shannon Duling said the school district there went from three students out for COVID-related issues during the week of Nov. 8 to 96 out by Tuesday afternoon. Of those, 25 students were positive cases, 19 were experiencing symptoms and 52 have been in contact with a pos-

itive case. Most of those contacts were outside of school, Duling said in an email sent to Princeville parents Tuesday.

"The [Peoria County] Health Department has put us on an adaptive pause," Duling said.

What that means is students will be learning from home and all extracurriculars are on hold until at least Tuesday, Dec. 7.

"We are hopeful the 14-day pause will help lower the community spread we are experiencing and provide time for many of our families to recover," Duling wrote.

Another 104 students were in the school's Test to Stay Protocol after likely contact with a positive case. Because they

wore masks, they could remain in school Monday. Duling said five staff members were out: two who tested positive, three in quarantine.

In Elmwood, a promising 7th grade girls basketball season which included a school-record 17-game win streak – ended after the top-seeded team was forced to forfeit Monday's IESA regional game against Brimfield due to two positive

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






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### **COVID:** 8th grade team earns late reprieve

COVID cases among players. Two days earlier. Princeville had forfeit to Brimfield due to COVID cases. As a result, Brimfield reached the title game without playing.

Monday night, just a few hundred yards away from the gym where that 7th grade regional was being played, parents were asking the Elmwood School Board to find a way to let the 8th grade girls team play in the Brimfield Regional on Nov. 30 at 6:15 p.m.

"Give these girls the chance they

really deserve," said Erin Magee, parent of a 7th grader.

Chances of the 8th graders playing appeared unlikely on Monday, though, since 7th and 8th grade Elmwood players "intermixed" during a practice on Nov. 19, according to Grade School Principal Marcy Brugger, who said she contacted health department officials.

"They said the girls are out for 14 days and that's the final decision," Brugger said Monday.

Elmwood Superintendent Chad Wagner followed up with the IDPH on Tuesday, however, and was told that intermixed practices did not require quarantine if officials could "accurately deduce that individual students were not in close contact for more than 15 minutes at three feet." After analyzing footage of the one-hour practice, Wagner said it was deemed that all 8th graders could play Nov. 30 so long as they are asymptomatic.

Princeville's 8th grade team had previously forfeit its regional game scheduled for Nov. 29 vs. Elm-



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



### Lost Angeles and Long Beached

Not many people or events lead both the New York Times and CBS's 60 Minutes television broadcast on the same day. The stillbuilding mess at many American ports, however, pulled off that rare feat Sunday, Nov. 14, by simply being the biggest rat's nest anyone in port management, railroading, trucking, and the West Coast ag exporting business has ever seen.

In fact, the backlog of, well, almost everything not moving in or out of American ports is giving the

word "chain" - as in supply chain a new meaning. Everyone from importers to exporters, farmers to foreign food buyers, and the White House to Santa's workshop seems chained to the anchors of

hundreds of ships waiting to be loaded or unloaded in or near U.S. ports.

The ports of Long Beach and nearby Los Angeles, which collectively handle 40 percent of American overseas cargo, are especially besieged.

For example, according to Times reporting, California Dairies, Inc., which manufactures and exports 50 million pounds of milk powder and butter a month from the California ports, has seen 60 percent of "shipments cancelled or delayed" during the back-up. That costs the cooperative and its members a "catastrophic" \$45 million a month.

And the big dairy cooperative isn't the only milk group soured by the bottlenecks. The National Milk Producers Federation, the self-proclaimed "voice of America's dairy producers," estimates transportation delays, higher inventory costs, and increased shipping fees have already cost U.S. dairy farmers \$1 billion this year.

Farm and ranch groups are increasingly frustrated with the delays. Right now, according to the Agricultural Transportation Coalition (AgTC), 22 percent of all foreign agricultural sales are being lost to transportation "challenges."

With no clear, overarching solutions in sight, it's bound to get

Right now, noted an October report from the American Trucking Association, the U.S. is short 80,000 truck drivers. Moreover, it adds, another 80,000 will be needed by 2030. The likeliest cure for the shortage, higher wages and better benefits, means today's median trucker wage, \$47,000 per year, will need to rise dramatically - and along with it, shipping costs.

An even bigger problem is American ports themselves; like most of the country's infrastructure, they're old, inefficient, and – relative to other ports around the world – an embarrassment.

On Oct. 19, Reuters reported that both the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach "are some of the least efficient in the world." In fact, "In a review of 351 container ports around the globe," the news service noted, "Los Angeles was ranked 328, behind Tanzania's Dar es Salaam and Alaska's Dutch Harbor."

Long Beach is worse: it "came in even lower, at 333, behind ... Kenya's Mombasa," according to the ranking by the World Bank and IHS Markit.

Given their shameful positions,

the ports would be more accurately named Lost Angeles and Long Beached.

There are clear reasons behind these – and other American – ports' poor performance. As noted in the 60 Minutes report, the causes run from "antiquated booking systems" for returning shipping containers to more nuanced problems like most of the ports are locally owned and, therefore, locally controlled.

That means a local community can stymie a nationally vital port by not agreeing to build an access road or dredge a harbor entrance. That's

Nuttier still is just how many rural-based U.S. representatives voted against the just-passed \$1 trillion infrastructure bill that contains \$17 billion to upgrade these antiquated ports that now badly handle the 20 percent of U.S. ag production – one-tenth of total U.S. exports – sold overseas every year.

While \$17 billion is nothing to sneeze at, it's a drop in America's \$2.5 trillion-a-year trade ocean. By comparison, Singapore, also a trade-dependent nation, is now spending \$20 billion to build just one new container port.

So if you're going to endlessly tout U.S. ag exports as the key to rural prosperity, you shouldn't be a chicken when it comes to investing to make those exports happen.

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
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### Thank you, Elmwood, for flushing the toilets

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### Elmwood school board approves tax levy cut

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD – The Elmwood School Board on Monday unanimously approved a 2021 tax levy that will result in lower tax rates for property owners in the Elmwood School District.

By reducing the amount collected for two funds, the district will reduce the tax rate by 19 cents. That equates to a reduction of

\$72 per \$100,000 in home value.

As a result, the school district will collect \$14,000 less for its IMRF fund and \$155,000 less for Tort Immunity.

"We don't want to be overtaxing our community," Superintendent Chad Wagner said.

He explained that one of his goals since taking over as superintendent eight years ago was to have six

months of reserves on hand for operation funds. Having achieved that reserve level recently, Wagner said he felt the tax cut was in order and should not create problems for the district in years to

Wagner said the change will bring Elmwood's rate down to the 10th or 11th highest out of 18 school districts in Peoria County from its previous spot at 6th or 7th.

Board member Mark Davis reported that bids will go out Dec. 3 and are required back by Dec. 17 for a long-awaited HVAC project in the grade school. Davis said he expects the building com-

mittee will have a recommendation for the Dec. 20 board meeting, but of-

fered a caveat. "Prices are pretty high," he said. "There's not really any competitive



Continued from Page 1 Waters said. "The state fire marshal is here assisting with the investigation, but we don't have a cause of origin yet."

Waters said some water and smoke damage was reported to the Froehling, Weber & Schell LLP business located few feet west of the building that burned.

There were no injuries in the fire.

Fulton County Clerk & Recorder Patrick O'Brian of Farmington has owned the N. Cone St. building since 2015 and said he will weigh options moving forward.

"It's a total loss. We'll have to look at our options and see what we can do," O'Brian said. "There's no way at today's prices we could build a 7,500-



square-foot building for whatever limits I have on my property casualty [insurance]."

O'Brian said Parkside Deli & Diner had been closed due to a recent "COVID exposure" but was going to reopen after Thanksgiving.

Cara and Marc Stewart

had recently purchased Whiskey Dixie's from Marshall Threw and, after spending nearly four weeks remodeling the bar, were planning to have their grand opening Wednesday night.

This is the third major fire in Farmington in the past seven years. In the wee hours of Oct. 25, 2015, a fire that started in Crossroads Bar claimed four businesses and two apartments on Fort Street. More than 40 fire departments responded.

Just 17 months earlier on May 15, 2014, the old three-story Farmington High School at East Vernon St. caught fire and burned. Afterwards, the dead body of Emmanuel Cervantes was found inside the old school.







**Cost of Thanksgiving** 

Thanksgiving dinner is expected to cost 14 percent more this year, with higher turkey prices pulling up that percentage.

American Farm Bureau Federation's 36th annual survey indicates the average cost of this year's feast for 10 is still affordable at \$53.31 — or less than \$6 per person. This is a \$6.41 or 14 percent increase from last year's average of \$46.90.

The centerpiece on most Thanksgiving tables – the turkey – costs more than last year, at \$23.99 for a 16-pound bird. That's roughly \$1.50 per pound, up 24 percent from last year, but there are several mitigating factors.

Farm Bureau volunteer shoppers checked prices Oct. 26 to Nov. 8, about two weeks before most grocery store chains began featuring whole frozen turkeys at sharply lower prices.

All the items surveyed saw price

jumps from last year – except stuffing – which trends with rising inflation for all goods. Taking turkey out of the basket of foods reveals a 6.6 percent price increase compared to last year, which tracks closely with the Consumer Price Index for food and general inflation across the economy.

The shopping list for Farm Bureau's informal survey includes turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a veggie tray, pumpkin pie with whipped cream, and coffee and milk, all in quantities sufficient to serve a family of 10 with leftovers.

"Several factors contributed to the increase in average cost of this year's Thanksgiving dinner," AFBF Senior Economist Veronica Nigh said. "These include dramatic disruptions to the U.S. economy and supply chains over the last 20 months; inflationary pressure throughout the economy; difficulty in predicting demand during the COVID-19 pandemic and high

global demand for food, particularly meat.

In Illinois, prices are slightly higher than the national average, with the cost of a Thanksgiving feast for 10 coming in at \$58.15, a \$4.84 or 8 percent increase from the national average.

Association the means to offer scholarships to Elmwood High School students pursuing additional education.



### Jury awards \$7 million to family

For The Weekly Post PEORIA – A jury of 12 people has awarded \$7,020,883 to the family of a Wyoming woman whose wrongful death occurred on July 11, 2017, two miles west of Toulon on Route

Corina Miller, 41, was headed westbound on Route 17 when at 4:42 a.m. she drove into, underneath and beyond the tankertrailer of a milk semi-truck driven by 51-year-old Timothy E. Schwenk, of Brimfield.

Schwenk had stopped in the eastbound lane of Route 17 in front of Doug Murray's dairy farm and had backed the trailer across the westbound lane to enter the farm for a pick-up of milk.

Court documentation stated that Schwenk had installed "extra bright halogen headlights on his truck two weeks previously that were for off-road use only." He used them on the road and blinded Miller as she approached from the east.

The civil case found that Schwenk and his employer, Cluver Milk Transportation, admitted in April Court pleadings that they were negligent and caused Miller's death. The jury deliberated two and a half hours before delivering their verdict.

Last year in a Stark County criminal case, Schwenk won several Circuit Court decisions that re-

sulted in that case being dismissed. Schwenk's attorney argued successfully that Schwenk's constitutional rights were violated and Circuit Judge Bruce P. Fehrenbacher agreed. Both urine and blood tests taken shortly after the fatal crash were suppressed, as well as, Schwenk's statements.

Corina Miller is survived by her husband, Michael,


who has remarried, and by her daughter, Kaylene, 25.





#### **Brimfield**

New coach Kreiter has spent 24 years as an assistant and said it has been 40 years since he graduated after playing for the Indians.

"It means a lot to be able to lead my alma mater," he said.

Better yet, he has plenty to build around with a lineup that includes five seniors who saw starting time on last year's 9-3 finisher. Back is top returning scorer Max Walters, a forward, guards Levi Moon, Jakoby McKown and Thomas Harmon and center Caleb Tyre.

"We have 35 points per game returning. It's good, but it's not enough to win," Kreiter said. "We lost a lot with Luke [Groeper]."

The graduated Groeper was top scorer and rebounder last year.

Kreiter said Moon and Walters have worked a lot on shooting and should provide an outside presence. Finding time for everyone will be the challenge, Kreiter said.

"We have a solid group. Unfortunately, only five can play. That's going to be the issue," the new coach said. "We have to find a way to play people and keep people happy. It's a

good problem but there's also a fine line."

As another added bonus, former coach Scott Carlson has returned to help as a volunteer assistant and do some scouting, joining a staff that includes assistant Jake Lowery.

"I really welcome that help. I don't think you're going to see a whole lot of change," Kreiter said. "One thing that won't change is we've got to keep the stripes on our warmup pants."

Brimfield opened Tuesday in its Turkey Tournament vs. Tremont and plays again Friday vs. Midwest Central at 5 and Saturday at 6:30 against a strong Knoxville team.

#### **ROWVA-Williamsfield**

After some recent lean years, there's reason for optimism again in Billtown, where veteran coach Bob Anderson stands just eight wins away from 700 career victories after the season opener.

ROWVA-Williamsfield started Monday with a 63-42 win over Galva that featured 22 points from junior Graham Wight, 12 points from junior Adam Kohl, 10 points from senior Carson Malek and 8 points from sophomore Riley Danner.

That's pretty close to the formula Anderson said R-W needs to follow for success this winter.

The 6-2 Wight is top returning scorer after averaging 14 ppg for a 4-11 finisher last year.

"He ought to be a load inside," Anderson said. "I need about 20 ppg out of him. He's got a good body, is strong and should be a handful inside."

The 5-11 Malek is an outside threat who will also be asked to rebound and Kohl is good at going to the bas-

"With those three kids we're hoping to have a little inside game, some outside shooting and drives to the basket," Anderson said. "We've got much better talent this year than we have in the last three. We haven't been very good the last couple years and we need to get that turned

Another starter is senior Dylan Tucker, who will help handle the ball and be called on as a defensive stopper.

Beyond that, the fifth spot is pretty open, with Danner among those likely to see time. Other candidates to start include twins Andy and Dean Hamilton, senior Matt Sanchez and sophomore Lewis Sams

### Elmwood

Two starters return to lead what is otherwise an inexperienced crew on the varsity level.

Headlining the attack is gifted scorer Andrew Marincic, a 6-3 senior who averaged 18.7 ppg last year on a more balanced scoring attack that finished 9-4. Along the way, Marincic shot 38 percent on 3s, 78 percent from the free throw line and took the ball to the basket with more authority. This year he will earn even more of the focus from opposing defenses, meaning others need to step up.

A prime candidate for that is 6-6 senior Victor Lenzi (2.7 ppg), whose size, experience and presence are strengths, according to Coach Josh Fugitt. After that the roster is relatively untested, as this summer showed.

"We struggled," Fugitt said. "We found out quickly over the summer where our weaknesses are and how our inexperience will provide challenges early on."

Monday's opener at the Wally Keller Invitational at Kewanee Wethersfield was a bright spot, though, as Elmwood topped Putnam County, 58-54, behind 27 points from Marincic, 17 from Zach Howerton and 6 from Brayden Lehman – two juniors Fugitt is counting on to step up.

"Lehman's size and athleticism is going to be important," Fugitt said. "And Zach has been the most consistent player in the offseason. He has put in the time this offseason and I'm excited to see what he can do."

The Trojans were back in action Tuesday vs. Bureau Valley and face Wethersfield Friday at 8.

Fugitt said 6-3 junior Brendan Williams has "length and size that will help us." Beyond that are two other seniors who have seen very little varsity time. Michael Seibert was out last year while recovering from Tommy John surgery but "has always been the glue guy with that senior class," according to Fugitt. And Fugitt said Johnny York's athleticism and speed will help on defense end.

"We're going to need our juniors to step up and really play well for us to have success early on," Fugitt said. "But I like where we're going to be in February."

### Princeville

As if replacing all five starters and eight lettermen from a 10-3 finisher wasn't challenge enough for new coach Tait Sennett, he now has no games or practices until Dec. 7 due to a COVID outbreak at the school.

Once the Princes return to action, Sennett is looking for leadership from senior guard Grant Hunt (1.4 ppg) and 6-1 Cole Brower and 6-2 junior Marcus Daily, the latter two who are both inside players. Sennett said Torence Kieser will also help outside.

"We will rely on our defense and hustle to win games," said Sennett, who has been JV coach at Princeville for six seasons.

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
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# New hoops coaches in boys ranks

#### **Farmington**

Doesn't it seem Farmington always has thin, tall athletic players well-suited to an aggressive run-and-jump defense? This year is no different, as Lozier can call on at least six players 6-foot-2 or taller who can run the floor.

Topping that list is 6-6 senior guard Corbin Rutledge, last year's top scorer. A good shooter and penetrator, Rutledge will be joined in the starting lineup by 6-3 senior Ethan Evans and captain Riley Embry, who Lozier called "the leader of the team" and "a

hard-nosed kid."

Among the top newcomers are 6-5 sophomore Keauntrey Barnes, 6-2 junior Gage Renken, 6-5 junior Jace Crawford and 6-4 senior Matt Kenney, who is out for the first time. Barnes is the most promising of that group, as he has grown a few inches in the past year and is "an effortless dunker" who hopes to play basketball at the next level, according to Lozier.

Others who may contribute include senior guard Jeremy Schlueter, junior guard Logan Morse ("an excellent scorer on the soph level," according to Lozier) and 6-0 junior Tanner Kenney.
