Toulon cafe closing at end of this year

For The Prairie News TOULON – Julie's Café Market in Toulon will

close at the end of the year. Shareholders of Toulon Market LLC, which owns the store and the building, met Tuesday and voted to put the building on East Main Street on the market.

"After a year of renovations, the store opened in early 2020, three weeks before we had to close because of the pandemic," shareholder Jim Nowlan said. "Even with the incredibly hard work and fine effort of Julie Henderson, we have not been able to close the gap between revenues and expenses."

Nowlan said shareholders applauded Henderson for providing the community for almost two years with a place to stop by for coffee with friends,

to buy some produce, enjoy lunch and take part in community activities.

"I suggest that folks drop by to tell Julie how much they appreciate her, as I do," Nowlan said. "We shareholders are deeply disappointed we were not able to make Julie's Café Market work. A small town needs a place like Julie's.

"Now, for less than the cost of a nicely equipped Ford F-150 a creative person(s) or couple could have a modern building and adjacent lot with which to start the venture of one's dreams."

The building will be listed with the Leezer Agency in Toulon.

Nowlan said shareholders also thanked the City of Toulon for its financial support, which has improved the looks of a big section of Main Street.

Tips to avoid killing this year's poinsettia

'Tis the season to kill poinsettias. Not intentionally of course, but let's face it. There's a lot going on at this time of year and little details, like checking the soil moisture of your poinsettia plant, can be easily overlooked. Permit me to present a few pointers to keep your pretty poinsettias perfectly pristine.

If you have a real live Christmas tree, you're probably pretty careful about keeping it watered. You know

that if the tree runs dry, it won't take up water again without re-cutting the trunk. Keep the tree stand topped off and make it a habit to check your poinsettias at the same time. That little trick works for me.

While the tree will take additional water pretty much every day, that's not the case with the poinsettias. Nevertheless, check the plants daily. If the soil is moist, don't add water. Another way to check soil moisture is to lift the pot. If it feels heavy there's no need to add water.

Poinsettias don't like wet feet and need the soil to dry out slightly between waterings. Some poinsettia plants are sold in pots with a decorative foil or cellophane wrapper. Either remove the wrapper or punch holes in the bottom so excess water can drain into the saucer. And empty the saucer after you water

Keep your poinsettias away from drafts and direct sunlight and they'll last much longer. If the lower foliage should yellow up or drop off,



Allow poinsettias to dry out between waterings, since they do not like to have wet" feet."

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


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Kewanee man gets year in prison

TOULON – A 24-year-old Kewanee man has been sentenced by Circuit Judge James A. Mack to a year in prison as part of a negotiated plea last Friday, Dec. 3, 2021.

In return for pleading guilty to a Class 4 felony domestic battery charge, a charge of battery was dismissed.

Two charges of home invasion and criminal trespass to a residence were previously dismissed against Cassel O.R. Taylor of four initial charges against him.

Taylor will have his Stark County prison term run concurrently with his re-

cent Henry County sentence of two years in prison. There, he was convicted of two counts of possession of a controlled substance, and of aggravated battery.

He will receive 52 days of credit for time served in Stark County's jail and will receive day for day credit while in prison. Taylor was ordered to make \$2,675 in restitution to Mike and Sheila Rumbold, plus a \$75 fine and a \$250 fee for DNA testing for a total of \$3,000.

Taylor was convicted of domestic battery to Courtney Frisby by physically striking her during a dispute on March 16 after entering her Wyoming residence without permission.

POINSETTIA: Avoid wilted leaves

Continued from Page 1 the colored bracts will still remain for a long time. You can hide their naked legs by sticking some evergreen boughs or boxwood cuttings into the soil.

The colorful blooms on a poinsettia are called bracts and are actually modified leaves. The bracts surround the small yellow flowers, called cyathia. This peculiar arrangement of flowers and bracts is a common characteristic of the euphorbia family.

When you're purchasing your poinsettias, pay special attention to the green foliage beneath the colored bracts. Avoid plants that show wilting or yellowing leaves, sure signs of mistreatment. And check closely the little yellow cyathia in the centers of the colored bracts. They should be a bright golden yellow, not tan or brown, or even

missing altogether.

Big box stores are death chambers for plants like poinsettias which have a natural aversion to cold drafts and drought. These stores stock up on Thursdays or Fridays for the weekend. If you're tempted to buy your poinsettias there, try to make your purchase on a Friday. Better yet, go to a local garden center or florist.

All euphorbias have a milky-white sap flowing through their veins which is toxic and can irritate your skin. But contrary to popular belief, poinsettias are not poisonous. Ohio state researchers tell us that a young child must eat more than five hundred poinsettia leaves to have any harmful effect. So I'm thinking. How did they get that kid to eat all those leaves when he won't even touch a salad? But I digress.


But what if Fido or

Tabby chooses to chew a few poinsettia leaves? Well, they may feel ill for awhile and even vomit but it's unlikely they'll die from it. You'll be happy to hear that the same milky sap also makes poinsettias deer resistant, so you don't have to worry about Rudolph and his cronies devouring your decorative display.

In the horticulture world, breeders are constantly working to bring new colors and bract shapes to market to satisfy our appetite for unique poinsettias. Beautiful shades of red, burgundy, pink, and buttery white are available everywhere. There's even a variety, 'Autumn Leaves', with shades of yellow and apricot, perfect for Thanksgiving.

There is a beautiful snow white cultivar, 'Princettia Pure White', but I have yet to see it for sale in these parts. That's too bad. It would fly off the shelves.

You'll want to celebrate Poinsettia Day, Dec. 12. It's the anniversary of the death of Joel Poinsett, who brought the poinsettia to the USA from its native Mexico. My wife says she's planning to mark the occasion by making me a great big bowl of salad.



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

'Corn Saves America' a compelling listen

It's an ever more uncomfortable fact for journalists like me that 67 percent of today's media-consuming Americans do not have one paid-for subscription to anything.

Even more striking, 87 percent of the Baby Boomer generation – we of gray hair and paid subscriptions – use free, electronic media like Facebook, Twitter and podcasts everyday. Only Gen Z, the 18 to 25 years

the 18-to-25 year-old youngsters who actually remember their website passwords, use social media more.

That describes me to a T: I have a dozen paid print subscriptions and

two dozen free electronic subscriptions to podcasts on everything from "The Lutheran Hour" (which, oddly for the fastidious Lutherans, is just a half an hour) to the BBC's "Farmarama."

The best of my current listening, however, is an ag podcast titled "Corn Saves America," a fact-filled, compelling dive into the potential, profitability, and probability, of agaligned carbon markets through, what its writer and host, Sarah Mock, explains, "the lens of corn ethanol."

The series – there are nine episodes varying in length between 40 and 60 minutes each – is an audio history of what we've learned in the rocky, 40-year marriage of broad environmental goals like clean air to far narrower farm needs like value-added markets and better incomes.

Those lessons serve as a yardstick to measure the next big environmental-ag policy push, carbon sequestration. Mock, and the pod's full-time sponsors and part-time contributors, Brent Gloy and David Widmar of Agricultural Economic Insights, or aei, are clear-eyed in their reporting and even-handed in their analysis of ethanol's slow start in the 1990s, its gold rush in the 2000s, and now, its likely peak.

But the series isn't the fuzzy, "we persevered" success story offered by farm group officials, ethanol executives, and commodity association lobbyists who have so often mixed thin facts with thick fiction that few policymakers now know what government's role could be in the rush to sequester carbon.

Continued from Page 4 Not so for Mock and the aei crew; they bring several well-connected contributors to the fore who played critical roles in ethanol's fast rise. Many tell compelling stories of political intrigue, changing geopolitics, and fast market moves that often had nothing to do with farmers, farm groups, or farm politicians but everything to do with getting the fuel in millions of American cars. It's one side of the ethanol origin story that few have ever heard.

More importantly, these experiences with building, expanding, and then riding the biofuel boom give them unique insight into what to expect when - or even if – the farmers ever partner with carbon emitters. They have many questions.

For example, should a sequestration program be voluntary, as most farm groups suggest. If so, who establishes its rules for fairness, accuracy, and whether it even works the U.S. Department of Agriculture, private business, farm groups, a new government agency?

Even before then, though, "...while everyone is figuring out how to sequester carbon," say Mock and the aei economists, many interested players are "still trying to figure out what all this means to commodity prices, land values, and farm business in general" given today's "financial, political, and climatic uncertainties."

Again, while no one knows, ethanol can provide insight. When the Bush Administration lit a fire under biofuels with the 2005 and 2007 Renewable Fuels Standards, they brought government's biggest blowtorches to the party: mandated blending levels, import tariffs to wall off cheaper imports and generous tax breaks for investors and users.

But no one in either the federal government or the private sector is calling for anywhere near that level of heat in any carbon sequestration program today. Why, Mock asks the experts, when everyone knows we don't have an

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ethanol-like 40 years to design, fund, and put into action any carbon

sequestration plan. Or do we?

I can't say because I'm only five episodes into the deeply-researched and well-written "Corn Saves America" that is delivered

to me for free. What a delicious - and worrying treat.

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A monument of unknown composition

Railroad boulder marks grave of Galva's James E. Breckenridge

The June 20, 1901, issue of The Galva Weekly News tells the story behind the unusual boulder monument of James E. Breckenridge in Galva Cemetery.

"A strange and unusual monument has recently been erected in the Galva cemetery to the memory of James E. Breckenridge. It is a huge boulder standing three feet high and weighing about 8,000 lbs.

"In erecting this monument section foreman Murphy carried out a trust of Mr. Breckenridge's. The boulder formerly stood near the R.I. &P. right of way between Galva and Bishop Hill. For years Mr. Breckenridge saw it daily as he passed up and down the line and he grew to have a strange attachment for the great rock standing out on the hillside, huge and alone, a

mute reminder of past ages. He took a desire to have the rock as a monument and asked Mr. Murphy to do this favor for him should he die before he could attend to it himself.

"Mr. Murphy kept his word. The big rock was hauled onto a truck with difficulty and hauled into town to the Bates Marble Works. There one face was smoothed and polished and a simple inscription carved upon it.

"The rock is of peculiar composition, porous and yet exceedingly hard. Some maintain that it is a meteoric fragment, though the probability is that it is simply a bit of glacial drift. At any rate after lying untouched for eons of years it has undergone a metamorphosis. Instead of a field boulder it is now a monument."

It is still a mystery what kind of rock this is. I am hoping that a geolo-

Applications accepted for rental assistance

SPRINGFIELD – The application portal is now open for another \$297 million of rental assistance for Illinoisans who lost income due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Illinois Rental Payment Program, or ILRPP, money comes from the federal American Rescue Plan Act signed into law by President Joe Biden in March. It will be administered by the Illinois Housing Development Authority.

The application portal is available

at illinoishousinghelp.org. To be eligible, a tenant must have an unpaid rent balance on a rental property which is their primary residence. They must have experienced a financial hardship due to the pandemic, have a household income below 80 percent of the Area Median Income and must be an Illinois resident.

Proof of citizenship is not required, and assistance is available for renters of state- or federally-subsidized housing.

The portal for the latest round of funding will be open until 11:59 p.m.

on Jan. 9. IHDA said it expects that 32,500 households will receive assistance through this round of funding. Approved applicants will receive one-time grants of up to \$25,000, paid directly to their landlords, and IHDA said it would begin releasing funds by the end of the year.

The launch date was pushed back one month so the portal could undergo testing. A spokesperson for IHDA said the portal had received more than 3,000 applications and the department had no concerns about its ability to handle the load.



I have had several Stark County Citizens ask me why Peoria City will be doing our dispatching for

This is not true, to get E911 Stark County had to join an ETSB Board (Peoria County and Stark County have come to an agreement, that Stark County will have 2 seats on Peoria County's ETSB. one System Board).

With Stark County on their board, we will have our own PSAP. (Public Safety Answering Point) which E911 will get dispatched from our dispatchers. The equipment we will need for the PSAP will come from a grant to pay for the equipment from the

State of Illinois

Stark County Citizens will not be taxed more for this project.

The reason we must be on an ETSB Board is that Stark County had to have an ETSB Board by the end of 2015. Stark County didn't start talking about the ETSB until January 2016 and at that point we had to join an ETSB Board.

Peoria County will do all the grant writing for Stark County and the E911 coordinator for the State of Illinois has been fantastic to work with and Peoria County has been great to work with. It will probably take 1 1/2 years to get the E911 up and running.

With the E911 we will know exactly where you are calling from, which will make our response time quicker. With the E911 we will have all places in the county mapped out, even if it is a grain bin.

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



Paxson named to IBCA hall

Stark Co. girls drop 3, illness/tracing sideline boys

The best news of the past week for any Stark County basketball program came from the Illinois Basketball Coaches Association, which announced that girls coach Scott Paxson has been selected for induction to the IBCA Hall of Fame.

Paxson started at Toulon as girls head coach in 1989 and served in that role for

three seasons prior to the Stark County High School consolidation. After consolidation, he served as sophomore coach under Gary Johnson for eight years. Paxson took over as

head coach from Johnson in 2000 and has been at the helm of the girls program ever since. Last spring, Paxson surpassed his 400th career win.

His teams have won 20 or more games 10 times and have won six regional championships, including the 2006-07 squad that went 26-6 and reached the Elite Eight before falling to Jacksonville Routt, 35-28. Whitney Rumbold was top scorer on that team at 15.3 points per game.

"I wasn't born here, but I say I'm from here," Paxson has said in interviews about his career, which includes time as

SC athletic director and assistant football coach.

Paxson is retiring after this school year and will be honored at the IBCA Hall of Fame banquet on April 30, 2022.

On the court, the Lady Rebels (1-6) dropped three straight games.

The best performance was Monday at Aledo, where Stark County dropped a 46-36 game to Mercer County. Down just 26-20 at halftime, SC was outscored 15-7 in the third quarter, which provided a lead the Lady Rebels could not over-

Kylee Frisby led SC with 19 points, Paige Rewerts added 6 and McKenzie Tilch and Payten Hillier scored 4 apiece.

Last Saturday afternoon, the Lady Rebels fell to Kewanee, 51-33, despite 16 points from Frisby and 8 from Paige Rewerts. After a 4-4 first quarter, SC was outscored 24-10 in the second quarter as Kewanee took control.

On Dec. 2, the Lady Rebels lost 52-9 at home to Illini Bluffs. Stark County fell behind 20-3 after one quarter and never got closer.

The girls are home against Midland on Saturday for an 11 a.m. start.
