Toulon lift station progress criticized

TOULON – Progress on a new sanitary lift station, or the lack thereof, was a hot topic at the latest meeting of the Toulon City Council.

When city engineer Ed Andrews told the council he did not have an exact date when Stark Construction would start moving dirt for the new sanitary sewer system, Mayor Larry Hollis asked, "What about the fabrication of the lift station itself?"

Andrews replied that the USEMCO [the fabricator] package is "progressing."

Hollis then asked, "They don't have a date when that'll be finished, either?"

Andrews went into an overall project construction explanation, but did not answer the question.

"Well, I'm glad that the IEPA [Illinois Environmental Protection Agency] and the health department are happy with the progress, but I don't know that we're happy with the progress," Hollis said.

Added council member Jason Musselman, "There's nothing that's viewable to any of the people that there has been progress since last time. And, I've had more people angry that are on there [the affected sewer line area] that have

County board discusses Castleton water issue

TOULON – The majority of the
Stark County Board of Supervisors' Tuesday evening meeting
dealt with the issue of Castleton's
situation of not having water. This
residential area of Stark County
has been basically without water
from its four wells for approximately four months.

Residents, who have hired an attorney, attended the county board's meeting and voiced their concerns about obtaining a working water well, or wells. The situation has been described as "dire."

Castleton has four water wells

that are located on Penn Township's right-of-ways. Penn Township representatives have been seemingly unwilling to address this issue, according to the Castleton residents. Each well serves approximately eight households.

Penn Township officials, though, have agreed to accept ARPA [American Rescue Plan Act] funds, if the county board designates funding for the Castleton water issue.

After a lengthy discussion, it was agreed that a committee should be formed of six members – two members from the county board, two from Castleton res-

idents and two from the Penn Township members – to see if a resolution to this problem can be formulated.

It was suggested that the Castleton residents reform a now defunct "water association" so as to have an entity available to receive funding. Currently, no entity is in existence to represent the residents of Castleton.

In other business, the county board set its 2022 meeting dates; appointed Tom McMahill to the Stark County Planning Commission; approved a resolution to pay \$1,500 for services from the

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

Continued from Page 1 pumped [their septic tanks] again and again."

According to one resident who attended the council meeting, that family has paid approximately \$3,800 in septic tank emptying fees since the onset of this situation because they have disconnected their septic tank to keep it from discharging into the sewer line. Their cost is around \$200 a month for emptying their septic tank every two weeks.

Musselman pointed out that the project is well into the contract time and, with the onset of winter, it appears that a March date would be plausible for construction to begin.

"I'm very frustrated with the pace of this [project]," Musselman said.

Hollis said that it appears that the frustrating part is that the city is obligated to be at the manufacturer's timeline and that it can't be sped

"What are we waiting on, who are we waiting on, is it Stark or is it the State?" asked council member Connie Jacobson.

Andrews said part of the delay is due to the contractor/manufacturer waiting to obtain materials. This generated multiple responses from the council.

"When did we sign this – [last] June or July?" Musselman asked Andrews, who said that the approval

was at last June's meeting and the contract execution was at the end of July. "Six months! And we've had nothing [done]!" Musselman exclaimed.

Hollis told Andrews, "You need to pass on our frustrations."

In the meantime, residents affected by this situation continue to pay to have their septic tanks reguemptied.

In other business, the council passed a new raffle ordinance; set New Year's Eve hours for 1 a.m. last call for bars with a 1:30 a.m. closing time; set Christmas bonuses for city employees; approved 2022 councilmeeting dates and times; approved expenditures for obtaining police department equipment; agreed to

sell a recently obtained property at 413 E. Jefferson Street after an appraisal is completed; and discussed holding a special meeting concerning the city's water treatment plant's aerator.

The council approved a time change to 6 from 6:30 p.m. for council meetings to begin, effective with the Jan. 10, 2022 meeting. Meetings are usually held on the second Monday of the month.

Sheriff Sloan reported that there's a Jan. 5 ETSB meeting scheduled that he will attend. He estimated that it will be a year and a half before Stark County's E911 system is completed.

County treasurer Paula Leezer reported that of the \$518,000 American Res-

cue Plan Act money received, there is \$88,891 remaining that has not

been officially designated for expenditure or other obligations.

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

Meatpacking isn't for chickens anymore

People have strange hobbies. For example, a Great Plains friend of mine once trained a chicken to play dead. Remarkably, on command, his chicken would

take a wholebody flop that could have taught Steve Martin a thing or two about physical comedy.

Another friend, a retired professor, is (unsurprisingly, really)

even more iconoclastic: he reads Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) corporate filings for fun. Honestly.

Why? Well, first because he's a nerd's nerd and second, because every now and then the professor stumbles across a brain-seizing gem like the one contained in the Oct. 2021 SEC filing by Tyson Foods.

"Many of our customers," reads Tyson's 10-K, a legally-mandated report, "such as supermarkets, warehouse clubs and food distributors have consolidated in recent years, and consolidation is expected to continue throughout the United States and in other major markets."

But "These consolidations," it continues, "have produced large, sophisticated customers with increased buying power who are more capable of operating with reduced inventories, opposing price in-

creases, and demanding lower pricing, increased promotional programs and specifically tailored products."

Wait an Arkansas minute, is Tyson Foods, the proverbial Big Chicken of Big Big Meat, warning shareholders of a possible market flop to newly "sophisticated consolidators" like "warehouse clubs" such as Walmart's Sam's Club and

Maybe, because worrisomely, "These customers also may use shelf space currently used for our products for their own private label products."

There's no "may" to it; many are already doing it.

Re-establish the Commission on Children

To the Editor:

I am still wrestling with Jim Nowlan and Allen Andersen's, September 17th article on Trumpism.

The hallmarks of America are that we tell the truth and do our best to follow the 10 Commandments, the Golden Rule and the Rule of Law. That's what makes America great! Other countries respect us for it and expect it from us. They know they can rely on us to do what we say we

The building blocks of our American society are family, church, education and jobs. Jim Nowlan's book, Fixing Illinois, describes Illinois' abundant resources, advantageous Midwest location and reasonable taxes in the comparison to other states.

We must believe in ourselves and think beyond our own individual families. All Illinois children are important. They are our greatest resource. In order to compete in the global market and get beyond the current violence, we must invest in all our children's education. This is not only good schools and teachers but also an environment which is safe and conducive to learning. Nowlan's "Sleep Walking Through our own Decline" (Dec 3, 2021) is

on the mark. I just returned from teaching near Prague, Czech Republic. Like the Chinese, the



Czechs prize education particularly Math and Science and revere their teachers.

My most unforgettable character is the late Naomi Hiett from Nokomis, Montgomery County, Ill. Miss Hiett, Executive Director of the Commission on Children through the 1960's and 1970's said: "Children are neither Republican nor Democratic but children." The Commission coordinated all Illinois child and youth serving organizations both public and private, secular and religious through the college years. There was a youth and young adult component which brought together youth from all geographical areas and backgrounds. Kids from rural counties worked with youth from the cities and suburbs including ghetto projects. Because everyone was prepared in advance, no one knew their economic background. It fostered mutual respect and cooperation that has lasted a lifetime. It gave Illinois youth a voice during turbulent times in the late 1960's Viet Nam era.

Deborah Myrow from the University of Illinois gave the Invocation at the 1970 White House Conference in 1970, speaking just before President Nixon's opening address. Governor Richard Ogilvie was so impressed that he asked the Youth of the commission to study the Age of Majority, because 18-year old males were being drafted into a War for which they had no voice. It was this group that recommended 18 as the minimum age to vote, subsequently enacted by legislation. We need to re-establish the Commission on Children with its Council of Youth and focus on providing quality education for all Illinois children!

Continued from Page 4 Indeed, in 2019, Costco began pushing the construction of a captive poultry supply chain from contract chicken growers through its instore chicken rotisseries in eastern Nebraska for all retail stores west of the Mississippi River, including Hawaii.

At the same time and a day's drive east, Walmart (as noted in this space in March 2019) already had "Walmart-contracted truckers hauling Walmartcontracted milk to a Walmart bottling plant that Walmart will then process and haul to Walmart stores on Walmart trucks to sell directly to Walmart customers."

Tyson's public recognition that its market power is being bled away by some of its biggest customers rather than some of its fiercest competitors came just weeks before several poultry company executives went on trial in Denver federal court for alleged price fixing in U.S. poultry mar-

Could these two events be simple serendipity or is there a connection between the meatpackers eroding pricing power and the systemic price-fixing the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) alleges occurred for several years between poultry slaughterers?

The DOJ doesn't say but, according to an Oct. 25 report by Forbes, the department is more than emphatic in its investigation of "price-fixing on a mass scale... across the [poultry] industry's top 18 companies, which are responsible for some 99 percent of commercial

chicken sold."

Some of Big Chicken's biggest customers, however, suspected something was wrong in the poultry market and they were angrier than a flock of wet hens. The angriest, it appears, was KFC, the global chicken fast food chain.

According to early November testimony at the Denver trial, one prosecution witness "told of an alleged interaction between (one) KFC" official who told a poultry company's "executives that 'he was going to beat us down with a hammer and baseball bat' as payback for three years of high chicken prices."

Hammers and bats aside, end users like KFC, Costco, and Walmart unlike hog farmers, ranchers, and poultry growers - increasingly have alternatives to giant meatpackers: they are establishing captive supply chains to provide their own customers with their own products.

And, sure, farmers and ranchers will still be part of those new chains but they'll still be "chained" to the same, now decadesold flow of market power - upward toward the retailer, not backwards toward the farmer and rancher.

But it may take time for Tyson, historically a chicken company, to get used to the ages-old farm idea that what's good for the goose is good for the gander.

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

The reason we must be on an ETSB Board is that Stark County had to have an ETSB Board by the end of 2015. Stark County didn't start talking about the ETSB until January 2016 and at that point we had to join an ETSB Board Peoria County will do all the grant writing for Stark County and the E911 coordinator for the State of Illinois has been fantastic to work with and Peoria County has been great to work with.

It will probably take 1 1/2 years to get the E911 up and running. With the E911 we will know exactly where you are calling from, which will make our response time

Act creates Office of Firearm Violence Prevention

SPRINGFIELD – A state program aiming to take a "comprehensive approach to ending Illinois' firearm violence epidemic" will be expanded under a law signed Friday by Gov. JB Pritzker.

The Reimagine Public Safety Act became law in June, but the expansion signed Friday clarifies guidelines in the original bill and gives the Illinois Department of Human Services and a newly created Office of Firearm Violence Prevention greater grant making flexibility.

The crux of the RPSA is that it creates the Office of Firearm Violence Prevention to coordinate violence prevention efforts and give grants to on-the-ground community organizations that know how and where intervention is needed in the state's most violent communities.

Heading that office is Chris Patterson, who was appointed by Pritzker as assistant secretary for violence prevention at IDHS.

"We will work hand-in-hand, individually and collectively to address

the violence on our streets and invest in addressing the underlying root causes that cause so much despair: Too much addiction, too little mental health, and too few opportunities," Patterson said Friday.

Contracted organizations are to focus on programs such as youth intervention services, violence interruption and trauma treatment.

This year's budget includes \$50 million for programs, and Pritzker said he'll work with the General Assembly for another \$100 million in each of the next two years.



Firearm deer harvest down from last year

SPRINGFIELD – The 2021 firearm deer harvest in Illinois was down from last year according to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR).

Gun hunters shot a preliminary total of 71,675 deer during the sevenday 2021 Illinois Firearm Deer Season that concluded Dec. 5. Hunters harvested a final total of 77,160 deer during the firearm season in 2020.

The preliminary harvest for the second segment of the 2021 firearm season Dec. 2-5 was 21,375, compared with 29,432 during the second season in 2020. The preliminary harvest for the first segment of this year's firearm season was 50,300 deer.





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

New law allows midwife licensing

Colleen Marotta has delivered hundreds of babies.

Marotta, 43, of Arlington Heights, became a nurse in 2001. Ten years later, she became a certified professional midwife, or CPM. When Marotta was a CPM the law barred her from delivering babies in Illinois, forcing her to drive to Wisconsin to deliver babies there.

On Tuesday morning, Gov. JB Pritzker signed a bill that allows the certification and licensure of certified professional midwives in Illinois. The new law sets qualification and educational standards for CPMs. It is effective on Oct. 1,

"With the legislation I sign today, the lifesaving and life-giving work midwives perform will be legally recognized here in Illinois," Pritzker said.

The 2020 report to the General Assembly by the Illinois Task Force on Infant and Maternal Mortality Among African Americans stated that the pregnancy-related mortality rate in Illinois is 23 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births, a severe maternal morbidity rate of 51.4 per 10,000 births, and an infant mortality rate of 6.5 infant deaths per 1,000 live births. In all of these categories, African American mothers and infants die or are injured at sig-

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nificantly higher rates than their white counterparts.

In order to be licensed as a midwife, a candidate must be a certified professional midwife registered with the North American Registry of Midwives. In addition, the candidate must complete a midwifery education program accredited by the Midwife Education and Accreditation Council.

Illinois is the 37th state in the US to recognize certified professional midwives.

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

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
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
