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LaHood seeking to rename Elmwood Post Office for Desilets

ELMWOOD – Congressman Darin LaHood introduced legislation to honor the life of late Corporal Benjamin Desilets of Elmwood. The legislation would rename the Elmwood Post Office located at 114 N. Magnolia St. after Desilets.

Born on Jan. 16, 1986, Corporal Desilets would have celebrated his 36th birthday this past weekend.

"Our country will forever be

indebted to Corporal Benjamin Desilets and we can never fully repay him or his family for his dedication to America," LaHood said. "Renaming the Elmwood Post Office is a small but important gesture that will serve as a humble reminder of his service in defense of the

freedoms we enjoy every day. We live in the greatest country in the world because of men and women like Corporal Desilets and we will forever be grateful for his sacrifice."

Desilets graduated from Elmwood High School in 2004. He left for boot camp that Labor Day and graduated from Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego in December 2004. Later, he was assigned to Camp Lejeune, N.C. Desilets deployed to Ramadi, Iraq, in August 2005.

In February of 2007, he deployed again to Fallujah, Iraq. On May 22, 2007, Desilets, 21, was driving the lead vehicle returning from a mission in the dark of the night where he was killed by an Improvised Explosive Device in the Al Anbar province of Iraq.

Desilets was awarded a Purple Heart, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal with Combat Distinguishing Device, Combat Action Ribbon, Good Conduct Medal, National De-

fense Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal, Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal and Sea Service Deployment Medal. He was posthumously promoted to Corporal.

He is survived by his daughter Kyra Coyle-Desilets.

Last November, Ron and Kim Crouch approached the Elmwood City Council with the idea.

"I just want to get everybody on board, I think it's the right thing to do," Ron Crouch said.

The Council agreed.

THE GREEN 'GOLD RUSH'

Pipeline could impact local landowners

The latest Gold Rush in the United States is actually a Green Rush for underground pipelines designed to capture and sequester CO2 emissions to make biorefineries "greener" by lowering their carbon footprint.

At least three pipeline projects are currently proposed in the Midwest, and one that would stretch 1,300 miles to an underground storage area in Christian County will cross Knox and Henry counties if approved.

Texas-based Navigator CO2 Ventures is proposing what it calls the Heartland Greenway Pipeline. The \$3 billion project would transport 10 to 15 million metric tons of liquified carbon dioxide per year from ethanol and fertilizer plants in Nebraska, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa and Illinois to a subterranean sandstone formation more than a mile below the



earth's surface in Christian County. The project is still in its preliminary phases and the earliest construction could start in 2024.

Representatives from Navigator CO2 Ventures held an informational open house Jan. 11 in Knoxville that filled the American Legion Hall with landowners. Similar meetings were held last week across Illinois, which has 13 counties targeted to be part of the pipeline. Meetings have been held since November in Iowa.

Organized opposition to pipelines has developed in Iowa, including one county board voting to oppose the use of eminent domain for the projects.

Locally, landowners at the Knoxville meeting seemed primarily interested in learning if the pipeline was going to cross their land, how they would be compensated and how restoration would be handled. Those answers are still somewhat cloudy.

Yates City board appoints new president, clerk

YATES CITY – The Yates City Village Board named a new president and clerk at last Wednesday's meeting after the elected officials in those positions resigned last week.

Leslie Gavelys was elected as village president as a write-in candidate last April, but tendered her resignation along with Stephanie Arrowsmith. Gavelys said she had "no comment" and Arrowsmith could not be reached.

Named to act in their place at last Wednesday's meeting were Ken Vallas as acting president and Susan Hostetler as clerk. The vote for Vallas was 3-1, with Ron Smith the dissenting vote. Vallas was also a write-in candidate for president last fall, but lost to Gavelys, 59-40.

Approval of those appointments, which last until the next municipal election on Nov. 8, was part of a busy meeting that saw the board increase fees for water and sewer and garbage and discuss a possible sale of the city water system.

"I don't want to raise water rates, but it's got to go up sooner than later," Vallas said, noting that

pipeline will run is tricky, since the planned corridor is one-half mile wide and can change depending on what surveyors – and land agents – encounter. Navigator is contacting landowners to set up surveys to help finalize the path.

“We’re going to need to winnow that half mile down to 50 feet, and that’s going to take some time before we can have valuation conversations,” said Elizabeth Burns-Thompson, vice president of government affairs for Navigator.

In regards to compensation, Burns-Thompson said Navigator plans to pay 240 percent of crop yield, prior to construction. The company would also pay for a 50-foot permanent easement for the steel pipe, which would be buried 5 feet deep and is 6-24 inches in outside diameter.

There is also a payment for a 50- to 75-foot temporary easement for construction. And Burns-Thompson said there are payments for damages resulting from construction, including fixing drainage tiles and fences.

Ethanol and fertilizer plants are expected to be the main users of the pipeline, including the Big Rivers Resources facility in Galva. Valero Energy Corp. is the anchor customer. And there is room for expansion in the future, as more producers seek carbon credits. Renewable diesel producers are another possible user and Burns-Thompson said having a pipeline in place could be a factor in where those plants are built.

One motivation for ethanol producers is being able to sell their product in states that have adopted low carbon fuel standards (LCFS), such as California, Oregon and Washington. Ethanol would also become more competitive for sale internationally with lower LCFS scores.

“The whole western part of the United States has a program that is developing fuel based on its carbon score,” Burns-Thompson said.

Tax credits are another strong motivation. Under Section 45Q, the IRS offers tax credits for \$12 to \$50 for each metric ton of carbon captured and sequestered by 2026. The Biden

administration has proposed increasing credits to \$85-\$120 per ton with a construction deadline of 2030.

Given those deadlines and the potential return, it’s no surprise Navigator’s project is one of at least three proposed in the Midwest. Others include a 2,000-mile Summit Carbon Solutions project in Iowa and other western states and an Archer Daniels Midland 350-mile pipeline from ethanol plants in Iowa to ADM’s Macon County sequestration site.

Navigator says its system could capture and store enough CO2 equivalent to removing approximately 3.2 million cars from the road per year.

Navigator has partnered with BlackRock Global Energy and Power Infrastructure Fund III to develop the project.

The next step for Navigator is seeking state and federal approval to conduct land, environmental and cultural surveys. The pipeline will also require an agreement with the Illinois Department of Agriculture, according to Burns-Thompson. That process would require more local meetings.

ELMWOOD – In the Jan. 13 issue of The Weekly Post, water and garbage fee increases were published that were incorrect. The Weekly Post was inadvertently provided an old list of fees at a council meeting when those rate increases were discussed.

Elmwood City Hall verified the new rates that will be imposed for water, garbage, etc. They are as follows:

- Water – minimum 1,000 gallons or less, \$17.13
- 2,000 gallons per thousand, \$4.46
- 3,000 gallons per thousand, \$4.23
- 5,000 gallons per thousand, \$3.99
- 8 9,000 gallons per thousand, \$3.30

After the first 20,000 gallon, per thousand rate is \$2.12.

Sewer rate – \$15.19 plus \$2.78 each 1,000 gallons.

Garbage rate – \$18.96 per month.

In pursuit of warmth in winter

Of all the daily chores my father performed on the southern Illinois dairy farm of my youth, the most vital to me each winter morning was his rekindling of the banked fire in the tall, round wood stove that dominated my mother's kitchen 60 years ago.

The stove was, no kidding, a Warm Morning model. It was as tall as me then and more round than my great Uncle Honey. Somehow Dad, despite his city upbringing, knew how to manage this iron maiden for maximum effect in minimum time. In fact, the stove usually radiated heat before the water for his first cup of morning coffee boiled.

But rekindling the fire was only the final heat-promising chore in a whole series of high-heat chores that led to it. There was wood sawing, splitting, hauling, stacking, hauling into the house, lighting, and, finally, hauling the ashes, in our case, to the garden.

Dad, and Mom, too, couldn't wait until the town's "furnace man" installed a whole house, thermostatically-controlled "furnace" that burned what they called coal oil fed to it by a copper line from a smelly fuel tank in our side yard.

That upgrade brought our farmhouse's two unheated and, until then, unused upstairs bedrooms into the

lives of my three brothers and sister. We four boys were assigned the colder northern room while my sister smiled warmly from the sunnier southern room.

The only problem with the new arrangement was that, despite clear evidence that the new furnace's ductwork did indeed reach the rooms, there was no evidence whatsoever that any of the furnace's heat ever did. Winter, for my brothers and me, was the season of flannel sheets and layers and layers of toe-curling woolen quilts.

The farm's two principal hired men, herdsman Howard and his field hand brother Jackie, had no such problem because they had no such furnace. Their living room stove, our old kitchen stove, glowed invitingly hot in their farm-provided house until they moved to another place in the late 1970s.

Howard was its main attendant and his favorite fuel was southern Illinois coal. Early each winter a local trucker, after delivering a load of cull cattle from our farm to the stockyards, would backhaul five or so tons of coal and dump it near Howard and Jackie's backdoor. Each winter day, Howard filled a five-gallon bucket with softball-sized chunks to burn in the brick-lined Warm Morning.

Sometimes, the ever-impatient Jackie would top the red-glowing coal with what he called "a chug" of split pecan wood. The wood, almost as dense and BTU-bearing as the bituminous coal, could make the stove glow pink at night.

After my father installed a furnace in the dairy barn in the late 1960s, however, neither brother was in any hurry to return to their piles of split pecan and lumpy coal. All the heat they ever wanted was, literally, at their dial-turning fingertips in the dairy barn.

My siblings and I had a similar revelation when we became aware of electric blankets. Our comfort, nay, our very survival, depended on electricity and our parents, downstairs and warm, had given us coal oil? Oh, the cries that went up!

Soon three electric blankets - one for Richard and David's bed, one for Perry and my bed, and one for Miss Sunshine Across the Hall's bed - appeared. From then on, our biggest worry each evening was who among us would brave the arctic upstairs to switch on the three, life-sustaining blankets.

Of no concern at any time, however, was being immolated in a roaring fire started by extension cords plugged into extension cords that ran from our toasty blankets under several rugs to each room's only electrical outlet in a makeshift closet. Should we have worried? Of course, but I don't remember worrying about anything once tucked into our pre-warmed nests of flannel, wool, and innocence.

the water department currently owes the village corporate account \$25,000 on a loan it has not been able to pay back.

The board voted unanimously to raise water and sewer rates 10 percent and to increase the monthly garbage collection fee by 80 cents per customer. Increases are effective next billing cycle.

Following along those lines, it was noted that Illi-

nois American Water has expressed interest in purchasing the Yates City water system. Illinois American has said it would not connect Yates City with the Farmington water supply due to costs.

The board agreed to request proposals from other water companies to "see what it is worth to them" according to Vallas.

Dave Mahr said village water lines date to the 1940s and sewer lines are

from the 1960s.

Jim Ralston asked if the village could provide a bathroom at the water building for workers to use to reduce clean-up in the Yates City Community Center bathrooms.

The board also approved:
• An inter-governmental agreement with Elba-

Salem Park District for the sharing of equipment.

• The resignation of part-time police officer James Record, who took over as Avon Police Chief.

• Buying a load of cinders, paying \$1,051.44 for well house wiring upgrades and purchasing a chlorine booster pump.

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




