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# Musselman pleads not guilty to federal porn charges

PEORIA - Facing a federal indictment that could send him to prison for up to 30 years, Jason Musselman of Toulon entered a plea of not guilty to seven charges at a hearing in Peoria's U.S. Courthouse on Tuesday.

U.S. Magistrate Judge Jonathan Hawley released Musselman, 34, without bond into the supervision of his father, Ron Musselman, who will act as third-party custodian.

According to Jason Mussel-

man's attorney, Kevin F. Sullivan of Peoria, the decision to release his client came despite "vigorous objection" by Assistant U.S. Attorney Sarah Holst Schryer, who is representing the government in the prosecution.

As a stipulation of his release, Musselman is on home detention with electronic monitoring, he can't have contact with anyone under 18 years old without court approval and can't use devices with Internet connections.

Sullivan said Musselman is not allowed to go into his home or to

leave the family farm near Toulon, except to help with farming operations.

"He can work on the family farm and assist his father in the planting of crops and whatever has to be done, including on their farmland," Sullivan said. "Other

than the allegations, I think the court was impressed by Jason's and his

father's credibility. [Jason Musselman] has no criminal history."

In addition to serving as an alderman, Musselman

has been affiliated with the Toulon Fire Department, the Toulon Civic Association, the Toulon Old Set-

Musselman

tlers Association and was an announcer at Stark County High School football and basketball games and a football statistician. He also worked as a DJ and farmed. He is former publisher of the Stark County News weekly newspaper and is a former Stark County ESDA Director.

Tuesday's hearing capped a busy four days for Musselman, who was arrested on March 11 by Illinois State Police and charged in a 14-page criminal complaint with multiple in-

# Cover crops

# Use of ground covers helping more farmers improve soil

After farmer Lucas Roney spends the fall season gathering crops, he

likes seeing his fields greening with new growth as he parks harvesting equipment in the shed.

"As farmers, we always like to see things growing," said Roney, who grows corn and soybeans with his family in Moultrie County. "Whenever you can look out there in the winter and see there are plants growing in the field, it makes you feel good about what you are doing. You feel like you're keeping the soil alive."

They've got it covered Throughout the Illinois landscape, more and more farmers have adopted the use of cover crops, a ground cover planted but not harvested in the traditional sense. Instead, a cover crop's job is to hold soil in place, keep the soil active, store nutrients, retain moisture and improve the soil structure. (Some cover crops are harvested for forage, such as oats and turnips used for feeding cattle.)

Environmental benefits abound, including reduction of both soil erosion and nutrient loss into rivers and streams. By spring, farmers terminate

the cover crop and plant corn and soybeans directly into the residual blanket that naturally gives yield-robbing weeds less space to grow.

An unharvested benefit

An early adopter of cover crops, Livingston County farmer Matt

Boucher remembers neighbors asking if he was growing hay or planned to harvest a field of rye before planting it to soybeans.

Instead, he planted right into the green cover on his field, contrary to the

# Resignation, reports occupy Toulon council

TOULON - In addition to dealing with the resignation of Alderman Jason Musselman, the Toulon City Council heard reports on various city projects at its Monday meeting

Mayor Larry Hollis said he has 60 days to appoint a replacement for Ward Two Alderman Jason Musselman, who tendered his notarized letter of resignation. The council voted to approve his resignation on Monday.

City Engineer Ed Andrews of the Farnsworth Group reported on the sanitary sewer lift station project; the Uptown Sidewalk Project; and about MFT (Motor Fuel Tax) pertaining to this year's

street sealcoat program.

Streets designated for sealcoating and rock chipping are: Veteran's Parkway, north Downend, parts of Jefferson Street, and east Turner Avenue from the Stark County Food Pantry to Route 17. The council approved a \$50,000 resolution for this project that will commence this summer.

Also discussed under MFT was the remaining 2021 street refurbishment program – especially Washington Street, which requires being redone after refurbishing of it was deemed unacceptable.

The Prairie Street Lift Station project was discussed and Andrews stated that updates from Continued on Page 2

# MUSSELMAN: Retired as alderman on Monday

stances of sexual exploitation of minors and the production, possession and distribution of child pornography. He was detained by U.S. Marshals until Tuesday on the order of Hawley.

Monday evening, Toulon Mayor Larry Hollis announced at the Toulon City Council meeting that he received Musselman's notarized letter of resignation as Ward Two Alderman. The city council voted to accept the resignation. The letter was not read in the open meeting.

The mayor now has 60 days to appoint a replacement to the council. Musselman's term started in 2019 and runs through 2023.

On Tuesday, Sullivan filed a motion to dismiss the state's charges against Musselman that were heard on Jan. 21 in the Stark County Courthouse. Sullivan said that since the case had moved to the federal courts, "charges should be prosecuted in a single prosecution in one court."

Sullivan's filing also seeks a refund of the \$25,000 bond posted on Ian 21

Stark County State's Attorney Caroline Borden Campion said Wednesday in a press release that her office, "will not be able to prosecute charges in state court that are also being prosecuted in federal court, and consequently will be dismissing state charges with the right to re-file if necessary."

The federal charges include five counts of sexual exploitation of a child, one count of distribution of child pornography and one count of possession of child pornography.

If convicted of the federal charges,

Musselman faces maximum penalties of up to up to 30 years in prison, a fine of up to \$250,000 and up to a lifetime of supervised release. The possible federal penalties are more onerous than those that could have resulted from the original nine state charges.

Next up for Musselman is a pretrial conference scheduled for April 21 at 9:30 a.m.

A federal jury trial has also been scheduled for Monday, May 2. Sullivan said he expects that jury trial will be continued due to the "hundreds if not thousands of pages of discovery" that has to be assembled.

The Illinois State Police (ISP) investigation into Musselman started on Aug. 21, 2021, after a report was submitted to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children by MediaLab.ai Inc., which owns the mobile messaging app called Kik. According to the federal affidavit filed March 10, that report was about an incident of child sexual abuse material being transmitted using Kik.

On Jan. 19, special agents from the ISP and the Department of Homeland Security executed a search warrant on Musselman's home, his three vehicles, his electronic devices and his person.

In response to questioning at the time, Musselman reportedly told officers "he may have clicked on a few wrong things but denied searching for child pornography."

Investigators say while searching Musselman's cell phone they found a folder with 226 digital images of nude individuals on or near a tanning bed. The images were also

found on a computer storage card located in Musselman's bedroom. Investigation is ongoing into the identity and age of some of the individuals shown in those pictures.

The storage card also contained other pictures and videos of a pornographic nature, according to the complaint. Images included those of a partially-clad woman taken by "someone using a camera to view the inside of a second-story window on a home." Investigators used GPS coordinates to determine the pictures were of a Toulon home near Musselman's residence.

The federal affidavit alleges that from April 2010 to March 2013, Musselman gathered sexually explicit photos and videos of minors. Eight adults – who were minors at the time the pictures were taken – told investigators Musselman invited a group of 13 to use a tanning bed at his Toulon home. They said they were not aware they were being photographed.

The affidavit also alleges that on or about Dec. 21, 2021, Musselman distributed child pornography and that on or about Jan. 19, 2022, he committed the offense of possessing material containing child pornography, including images of children age 13 and under.

Agencies participating in the investigation include the Stark County State's Attorney's Office, Illinois State Police, the Department of Homeland Security, Homeland Security Investigations, Immigration and Customs Enforcement and the Washington Police Department. *John A. contractor Stark Construction have been requested.

Councilmember Donna Lefler inquired about the deadline on the contract. Andrews said that it was mid-March. Nobody commented on the fact that is is currently mid-March.

To date, no lift station and sewer line construction has begun. The contractor blames material supply delays as the reason that they have not started work.

The Uptown Sidewalk Project and revamping of the city's codifications are both still in progress. City Attorney Kate

Carter reported that the codifications are close to being completed.

The council approved making the sewer connection fee \$350. That fee applies to new sewer line hookups to the city's sewer system. An ordinance will be composed and presented for formal acceptance at April's council meeting.

There was no action taken on the Stark County Student Council Hope Week donation request; the Hazardous Mitigation Plan; or the sale of a property at 413 E.

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

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

# Broken systems raise costs fast

One of the most beautiful – and inexplicable – aspects of economics is how its practitioners never seem to be wrong.

Indeed, almost every school of economic thought, from John May-

nard Keynes' demand-driven economics on the left to Arthur Laffer's supplyside economics on the right, is crowded with disciples defending their leader's theories and just often, if subtly,

attacking their theological foes.

One such fistfight broke out in, of all places, the Feb. 28 editorial pages of the New York Times. In it, writer and editor David Dayen undressed one of the most famous economists of the last 40 years, Lawrence Summers, for his role in building one of the most efficiencycentered, imbalanced and fragile economies in history.

"For decades, economists like Mr. Summers advanced policies like globalization, deregulation, and markets that valued efficiency over competition," says Dayen. "They promised that these trends would deliver lower prices. And they did, for a time. But they also left the system vulnerable."

Vulnerable to what we see today – broken global supply chains impossibly slow to repair; a domestic economy that, somehow, is both quickly growing and mired in inflation; and a consumer culture so treasured that we gladly trade regulation and competition for lower prices and higher economic growth.

It's the manifestation of Nobel Prize-winning economist Milton

Friedman's "marketized economy," explains Dayen. "(T)he sole social responsibility of business is to increase profits. Cut regulations, cut taxes and allow companies to structure markets, people like Friedman maintained, and watch the economy take off."

In short, markets are most important and government – regulation, taxes, antitrust – are far less impor-

That's been a solidly bipartisan tenet for 50 years. While Republican administrations - Reagan, Bush II and Trump – cut taxes and nearly eliminated antitrust, Democratic administrations, especially Carter and Clinton, deregulated trucking, airlines, railroads, banking and agriculture.

And most of this was accomplished by the early 2000s to lay the foundation for globalization – ever bigger free trade deals; the rapid rise of unregulated financial derivative markets; easy access to cheap, plentiful labor; and sophisticated, just-in-time supply chain manage-

A Summers' acolyte, Dayen reports, once likened it to how Walmart initially impacted the U.S. economy. The giant retailer might not have been good for local communities or local job markets, but there "is little dispute" Walmart's cutthroat business model helped the other 120 million Americans not employed in local retail.

As such, "The trade-off was clear: sacrifice resiliency, wage security, and community for the promise of a five-dollar pack of tube socks."

We may not like the comparison but we know it's spot-on because, by golly, a pack of tube socks for \$5 – even if the socks were made by children working 70 hours a week

in a pollution-riddled sweatshop – is still an easy, smart buy, right? Until this year, when those socks, like our long-ordered television, new dishwasher, or car, were trapped somewhere in a global supply chain with too few manufacturers, too few shipping companies, too few ports, too few railroads, too few truck drivers, too few retailers, and too few solutions on how to fix the whole bloody mess.

American farmers and ranchers know the feeling. Two years ago a global pandemic, predicted though it was, fouled the food system because no one thought it could happen so no one had any plans for when it did happen.

And when it did happen, what was our first instinctive reaction? Give market giants like exporters and meatpackers even more market power; power it will take decades, if ever, to get back.

Today, war is ripping through integrated markets from Odessa to Omaha. No tax cuts, fewer environmental rules, more deregulation or less antitrust enforcement will lower crude oil prices or cut U.S. potash costs.

But none of this should be news because, as Dayen reminds us, "Broken systems raise costs far faster than resilient ones."

America's too few farmers and ranchers, too many broken rural communities, and too much cheap food are testament to that inarguable economic fact.

# Prevent avian flu in your small flock

URBANA – In the past three weeks, Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) has been detected in wild birds in the central U.S. flyway. The HPAI strains being detected are Eurasian H5 and Eurasian H5N1. Cases of HPAI have been confirmed in commercial and small flocks in Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky and Michi-

So far, no cases have been reported in Illinois, says Doug Gucker, University of Illinois Extension local food systems small farms educator. He provides several management practices to protect flocks from infec-

First, keep infected wild waterfowl, such as ducks and geese and gulls

from interacting with your poultry flock. Avian flu circulates in the wild waterfowl and gull populations without affecting them; yet, it is deadly to domestic poultry flocks.

"It is important to separate your birds from the wild birds," Gucker said. "Using enclosed outdoor areas and shelters will allow your birds to have some outdoor time without the risk of coming in contact with possibly infected wildlife or wild birds."

Ensure that wild birds do not have access to your flocks feeders and wa-

"Keep the poultry coop clean to reduce the risk of your birds coming in contact with their waste," Gucker said.

Any new birds being brought on the property should be kept separate from the flock for 30 days to ensure that they are healthy and disease-free. Any crates or cages that have been off the farm should be disinfected before using.

"It is recommended not to share equipment with neighbors until the current avian flu situation has passed," Gucker said.

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



# **COVER CROPS:** Setting environmental goals

most popular practice of planting into a field considered "clean," or free of growth. Today, his farm primarily uses a drill to sow cover crops on about 70% of the family's farmland. He also has hired aerial application, which involves showering cover crop seed above standing corn or soybeans just before fall harvest to grow by late fall. Sometimes, fertilizerspreading trucks have broadcasted cover crop seed across a harvested

Boucher's most common cover crop choices include annual rye, cereal rye, buckwheat or radish.

"We've gone from a straight single product to 12- to 15-way mixes of cover crop varieties, and we've seen

good results" said Boucher, who grows corn, soybeans and wheat

Boucher doesn't measure the results of cover crops in bushels or the boost to his corn and soybean production. Instead, his family sets environmental goals for the cover crops to accomplish. He finds that cover crops and their various root systems loosen the soil and produce a suitable seedbed without relying on mechanical tillage.

Cover crop adopters recognize the investment in management, time and expense creates the largest barrier to wider adoption.

"We are putting something out in the field that isn't going to be harvested, that we are not necessarily going to get a direct financial result

from year one," Boucher said. "It can be a challenge for some farmers to

see the return on their investment." After about seven years of cover crops, his family now sees improve-

ments in the soil structure. Roney's cover crop practices are enrolled in the Conservation Stewardship Program, a U.S. Department of Agriculture initiative that helps with its costs.

"I really think there is going to be increased adoption in cover crops," Roney said.

# Primary ballot fills up as deadline passes

SPRINGFIELD – Seven teams of Republicans and one team of Democrats have lined up to challenge Gov. JB Pritzker and Lt. Gov. Juliana Stratton in the 2022 elections.

Monday was the deadline for candidates to turn in their nominating petitions to the Illinois State Board of Elections to get their names on the June 28 primary ballot.

Candidates who were in line at 8 a.m. on the first day of filing, March 7, will enter a lottery for a chance to have their names listed first on the ballot. But those who filed in the final hour before 5 p.m. Monday, March 14, have a chance to be listed last on the ballot.

Some studies have suggested being listed first or last in a crowded field of candidates improves a candidate's chances, especially in races where the candidates have low name recognition.

The State Board of Elections has another week, until Monday, March 21, to certify the petitions. In the meantime, candidates and party officials may try to challenge other candidates' petition signatures.

Among the last to file in

the governor's race were Republicans Jesse Sullivan, of Petersburg, and his running mate Kathleen Murphy, of Warrenville.

"To be honest, it's not a beautiful day today and any day I don't have to be next to a bunch of other politicians and we get to be outsiders stepping into this race, it's a good, day," Sullivan said to reporters outside the State Board of Elections office in Springfield just before turning in his petitions.

"Yeah, we're not looking for a photo op with Gov. Pritzker. We were looking to turn in the best petitions possible to represent the people who worked so hard to help us get them," Murphy said.

Sullivan, a political newcomer and owner of the venture capital firm Alter Global LLC, and Murphy, a former spokeswoman for former state Rep. and 2018 GOP gubernatorial hopeful Jeanne Ives, will face formidable competitors for the 2022 nomination.

Those include Aurora Mayor Richard Irvin and his running mate, state Rep. Avery Bourne, of Morrisonville.

Another late filer Monday was GOP gubernatorial candidate Max Solomon, of Hazel Crest,

and his running mate, Latasha Fields, of Chicago. According to his website, Solomon is a native of Nigeria who now practices law in the Chicago area, while Fields is the founder of Christian Home Educators Support System.

They join other teams of candidates who filed earlier: state Sen. Darren Bailey, of Xenia, and his running mate Stephanie Trussel of Lisle; Bull Valley businessman Gary Rabine and his running mate Aaron Del Mar of Palatine; former state Sen. Paul Schimpf, of Waterloo, and his running mate Carolyn Schofield of Crystal Lake; and the team of Emily Johnson, of Wheaton, and Bret Mahlen, of Orland Park, members of the group We Are the People Illinois, which has called for investigations into unfounded claims of voter fraud in the 2020 elections. The website for the group identifies it as consisting of "over 200 people."

One other GOP candidate, Keisha Smith, of Country Club Hills, filed for governor without a running mate, something that a State Board of Elections spokesman said could be grounds for objection and disqualification because state law requires candi-

dates for governor and lieutenant governor to run as a team.

Pritzker and Stratton also face one challenge from within their own party, Beverly Miles, a nurse and U.S. Army veteran from Chicago, and her running mate Karla Shaw.

Illinois voters this year will also choose candidates for other constitutional offices. The most contentious of those will likely be for the office of secretary of state, where incumbent Jesse White is stepping down after six terms in office.

On the Democratic side, former state Treasurer Alexi Giannoulias and Chicago City Clerk Anna Valencia appear to be the leading candidates, while Chicago Alderman David Moore and charity director Sidney Moore, of Homewood, are also in the race.

On the Republican side, former U.S. Attorney John Milhiser, of Springfield, and state Rep. Dan Brady, of Bloomington, are competing for the nomination. Also in the race is former Chicago police officer Michelle Turney, of the group We Are The People Illinois.




