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GOP governor race big draw in unusual summer primary

The race to run against Gov. JB Pritzker is one of the hottest in Illinois' unusual summer primary being held Tuesday, June 28. Against a backdrop of concern about limited knowledge of the primary hurting turnout, six men are vying to be GOP candidate for governor when the general election is held on Nov. 8.

Recent polls for the Republican race show state Sen. Darren Bailey, a farmer from Xenia, has pulled ahead of Aurora Mayor Richard Irvin after trailing a few weeks earlier. Both candidates have benefited from mega-donor funding: Bailey receiving a re-

ported \$9 million from Richard Uihlein and Irvin getting \$50 million from Ken Griffin.

Pritzker and the Democractic Governors Association, meanwhile, have spent \$34 million to boost Bailey in the Republican primary, according to politico.com.

No other race in the primary has generated that much spending and many elections are uncontested or have no candidates on the local level.

Two competitive local races are covered in this edition: Peoria County Sheriff (Page 1) and state representative in the 93rd district (Page 8).

In Peoria County, Rep. Darin LaHood faces three foes in the Republican Congressional primary: retired Rockford engineer Walt Peters, Rockford attorney JoAnne Guillemette and Minooka business owner Michael Rebresh.

And Sen. Win Stoller of Germantown Hills is on the ballot for northeastern Peoria County voters in a newly drawn 37th Senate District. After serving one term, Stoller faces a challenge

from businessman Brett S. Nicklaus of Dixon, who has not previously held elected office.

Experience aplenty in Peoria Co. sheriff race

PEORIA – The two men running for Peoria County sheriff are attempting to succeed their current boss. Jason Buckley and Chris Watkins, both longtime county law-enforcement agents, seek the Republican nomination in the primary election scheduled for Tuesday.

No Democrats have filed to run in the general election in November. Sheriff Brian Asbell, a Republican, announced late last year he wasn't going to pursue a second four-year term. In 2017, Asbell was appointed to his current

Buckley, 44, is a lieuten-

ant who has worked almost 22 years in the sheriff's office, including as a patrol deputy and canine-unit supervisor. The Princevillearea native joined the force in early 2001, not long after he graduated from Western Illinois University in Macomb.

"When I was at Western. a teacher said, 'You're really good with people, you have a good way about yourself and you can speak in ways people can understand. I'd like to see you think about running for sheriff someday," Buckley said. "It kind of caught me off guard. He planted the

Known as the eastern monarch population, the monarchs that overwinter in Mexico migrate north through Texas and the Southern Plains, up through the Northern Plains, Illinois and the Midwest before moving into

Farmington buys Kevilus' house



FARMINGTON - One week ago, Arron Kevilus thought he might be suffering from a heart attack due to what doctors later termed an anxiety attack.

Monday night, Kevilus was dancing between rows of spectators at Farmington's City Council meeting.

Selling your house and getting paid for a lawsuit settlement can do wonders for a person's mood.

"I'm dropping the lawsuit. Why not? They're at

After spending the first 27 minutes of Monday in closed session, the council returned and voted unanimously to pay Kevilus \$86,500 – \$25,000 to settle a lawsuit he filed in 2021 and \$61,500 for his home at

That home is the source of Kevilus' lawsuit and his anxiety, which he said dates back to May 2019 when a new Ulm Veterinary Clinic was built immediately east of his house. Lights that illuminate the Ulm parking lot have been a bone of contention ever since

Kevilus said the lights are too bright and shine into his living room and bedroom at night. The Ulms have made attempts to shield the lights and built a fence between the lot and Kevilus' home, but they maintain that the lights are needed for medical emergencies and because the vet clinic has a store of controlled substances used to treat animals.

Efforts by the City of Farmington to negotiate between the parties reached a stalemate years ago and Kevilus has for years put up vulgar, hand-painted signs expressing his dissatisfaction. In time, Kevilus

turned his ire toward former Mayor Kent Kowal, who resigned in April.

"I got stuck in a whirlwind I never wanted to be stuck in," Kevilus said.

The same can be said for the city. Kowal's replacement, Kenn Stufflebeam, helped facilitate Monday's deal, which he said had been in the works for more than a year.

"I want to be proud as people drive into our town and not worry about what's written on a sign," Stufflebeam said. "I just want this behind us. It scares me that I've set a precedent. However it seems to me we've spent enough on our staff and attorney dealing with this. I may take a beating from the citizens of Farmington over this. But I think in the long run, it was in the best interest of the city to do this."

Stufflebeam expects signs to come down in about a week, though he said they may be painted over sooner than that. He said there are no plans right now for the property.

Kevilus said he is looking for another place to live in Farmington. And he said he still plans to attend council meetings.

"I want this community to be better for my neighbors," he said.


In other business, the council approved an Oct. 22 Halloween program at Jacobs Park put on by the elementary PTO.

The council also heard a presentation from Herb Stufflebeam on a 502-page book he has published listing the known names of everyone buried in five Farmington Township cemeteries: Oak Ridge, Providence Chapel, Chapin Pleasant Hill, Hill and Coal Creek Dunkard. Stufflebeam has worked on the book since 2015 and said copies will be available at city hall, at the Farmington Historical Society building and at libraries in Farmington, Yates City, Elmwood and Canton. the Great Lakes region.

Mexican officials reported a 35 percent increase in the forested area where the butterflies stayed. The population covered 7 acres of trees compared to 5.2 acres the previous year. The annual butterfly count doesn't measure numbers of individual butterflies, but the area they cover when clumped in trees.

Monarch expert David Zaya, a plant ecologist with the Illinois Natural History Survey, reported seeing his first monarchs of the season May 25. Earlier, Zaya had projected the first monarchs would start arriving in Illinois in late May.

"The overwintering monarch butterfly numbers each year should be viewed with an eye to the recent past. Not only should we be looking at the 2.8 hectares (7 acres) from this year, but also at the trends in the last 10 or so years," Zaya told FarmWeek.

"My takeaway from the reports out of Michoacán (Mexico) is that monarch numbers this year are 'average' for the last seven years – actually the median, not exactly the average," Zaya continued.

"If we're hit with another extreme year like 2012, or even worse two extreme years, the species could be on the brink of extinction. For that reason, conservation efforts along the migration route and especially here in their summer breeding range are urgently important," he said.

Illinoisans can support monarchs by planting flowers, such as coneflowers and black-eyed Susans, for adult butterflies. Their larvae depend on milkweeds and grow on only milkweed plants.

In Zaya's view, farmers and rural landowners have an opportunity to make an impact because of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and other largescale conservation programs, which he described as "game changers for pollinator conservation in Illinois."

Monarch butterflies west of the Rocky Mountains overwinter on the California coast. This year, their numbers rebounded to more than 250,000 butterflies.

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

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

Oh well. At least we were ahead of the curve in having a milksnake serve as unofficial mascot here at The Weekly Post

Last week, Illinois designated the eastern milksnake as the offi-

cial state snake. Credit goes to **Gentry** Heiple, a 7th grader at Carterville Junior High School. Heiple worked with Republican State Rep. Dave **Severin** to pass legislation as a way to learn more about state government.

"I decided to do this bill to try and highlight the good and importance of snakes all over," Heiple said in a press release. "And by doing this, I was able to visit the capitol and meet some of the most important people in Illinois."

A cynic might say Heiple also encountered more snakes in Springfield than he could meet in the wilds of Illinois, but this is a feel-good-story, so we'll skip that cheap shot.

Besides, I'll always have a soft spot for milksnakes thanks to memorable experiences with Milky and Milky Jr., who for a time lived in the front window of The Weekly Post office.

Back in August of 2014, I offered a

\$20 reward if anybody would bring us a snake. The only taker was my fish biologist friend, Rob Hilsabeck, who showed up with Milky and a custom-made snake aquarium that actually kept the occupants inside.

Milky was a docile, friendly snake that anyone could handle. He even let me put a **Santa** hat on him for the Elmwood Christmas Walk, though he quickly wiggled through a rock to shed his hat. After 10 months, we deemed he had spent enough time frightening the staff, so he was released at Camp Big Sky under the watchful eye of Elmwood fourthgraders in Franke Keefer's class.

Milky Jr. arrived in May of 2016 and provided plenty of memories too, though they were not warm and fuzzy. What we did not know was that Milky Jr. came to us as a pregnant mother and would eventually lay a clutch of seven eggs in her tank. No doubt that explains why she tended to bite everybody, since milksnakes are generally easy to handle.

Or maybe it was just genetic, because the six babies we hatched also bit whenever given the opportunity.

Even so, when we paid state track qualifiers a reward for finding Burl Ives' statute on the Eastern Illinois campus, they had to reach past the snake for their money. We never vetted that with our insurance guy and didn't check with him before asking former Lt. Gov. Evelyn Sanguinetti to hold our snake during her lone visit to Elmwood.

Looking back at it, hatching those babies in an incubator ranks among my greatest accomplishments. I still get panicked thinking about the day

they emerged. Graphic artist Lynne Breitbarth loves all critters and had been keeping an eye on the incubator, where we placed the eggs in a mixture of sand and vermiculite.

"Um, I think the snakes hatched," she said one day, though there was at first no evidence to prove her claim.

But as we stood there watching, tiny heads started poking up, only to slip back under the sand once they spotted us. This set off a panic and a hasty trip to buy Tupperware. Each baby got their own plastic container and on the top of each, along with holes poked to facilitate fresh air, was written a name: Wiggly, Walter II, Milky III, Squirmy, etc. I remember the names because those containers have been repurposed as storage for prairie seeds.

Alas, raising baby snakes is no easy task and we eventually released them. Milky III was last to go and, true to form, bit my oldest son.

Elmwood man cited after one-vehicle crash

ELMWOOD - A man was cited for drunken driving, among other charges, as the result of a single-vehicle accident south of Oak Hill that injured him and two passengers.

William B. Bean, 27, registered a blood-alcohol level of .313 following the accident, which took place about 2:15 p.m. Sunday in the 18000 block of W. Meehan Rd., according to the Peoria County Sheriff's Office. The legal blood-alcohol limit for intoxication is .08.

Bean sustained a punctured lung and a broken left hand and other injuries and was life-flighted to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria. He was moved out of intensive care on Tuesday. Also in the vehicle were a 24-year-old woman, who suffered an arm injury, and a 4year-old boy who sustained minor scrapes. The women and boy were transported by ambulance to OSF Saint Francis and released.

According to reports, Bean was driving west in a 2002 Ford pickup truck when he swerved right into tall grass, then left across the roadway into an uphill embankment. The vehicle rolled.

Bean told a deputy he noticed something in the road but didn't remember what happened after that. The female passenger said Bean swerved to avoid hitting a deer.

The deputy noted empty beer cans and liquor bottles next to the pickup truck. But the female passenger said those containers were from previous days, and Bean had only one beer.

Bean also was cited for endangering the life of a child and for driving with a suspended license.

GOP Incumbent Luft faces challenger Weaver in new district

The primary attraction among Weekly Post-area state-legislative races in the primary election Tuesday might be the 93rd House District Republican race.

De facto incumbent Mark Luft of Pekin faces Travis Weaver of Edwards for the right to represent the GOP in the general election in November. No Democrats have filed.

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The 56-year-old Luft, who also is the Pekin mayor, was elected in 2020 to represent the 91st District. Subsequent redistricting has placed Luft's hometown in the new 93rd District, which extends north from Pekin to outskirts of the Ouad Cities.

Among communities in the 93rd are Brimfield, Edwards, Elmwood, Kickapoo, Laura, Williamsfield and Yates City.

Weaver, 30, is a former manager at Caterpillar Inc. He is a son of former Peoria City Councilman and ex-state Sen. Chuck Weaver. Luft also has the General Assembly in his bloodline – his father is Dick Luft, a former Democratic state representative and senator.

The Weekly Post asked both candidates identical questions. What follows is their responses, edited for brevity and clarity.

Question: Why did you decide to run?

Mark Luft: To continue my dedication to improving the direction of our state and my district. We desperately need to stop the bleeding of losing businesses and taxpayers from Illinois. We need to reduce our taxes and raise the quality of life for our citizens in Illinois. My experience in achieving these goals in my community and in Springfield on behalf of my district will help turn Illinois around.

Travis Weaver: Central IIlinois is my home. It is a special place with wonderful people. It is worth fighting for. As I watched (Gov.) JB Pritzker enforce his reckless spending agenda along with 9-month abortion, some of the nation's most strict COVID mandates and education policies that rob our kids, I knew it was time to step up. I have the background necessary to bring solutions to Illinois' financial woes, improve our education environment, grow jobs, support farmers and get our state back on track.

The decisions the Democrats have made over the past two years have sent a clear message to the people of Illinois, and that message is Democrats are not listening. I believe there will be a clear statement made at the polls and we will finally be able to move needed reforms forward and bring much-needed balance back to our state. I have worked hard and will continue to work with the other side through committees and on the House floor to push much-needed legislation that helps the people in our state. My success working with all sides is reflected in the bipartisan support of initiatives I have supported and sponsored.

Weaver: Last fall I enjoyed opportunities to meet with (gubernatorial candidates) Darren Bailey, Jesse Sullivan, Gary Rabine and Paul Schimpf to hear their plans for Illinois. They are great men of faith and great leaders. I am excited to fight for our Republican gubernatorial candidate so we can defeat JB Pritzker. That said, I am confident in my ability to work across the aisle. I treat people with respect, bring forth sound ideas, and work hard. That has served me well throughout my life, even when dealing with tricky situations with conflicting viewpoints.

Q: What do you think of

your opponent, personally and professionally?

Luft: I have major concerns about my opponent's professional ability and lack of experience to walk into Springfield at such a critical time. We cannot afford to lose the experience and the advances we've made to push back the other side of the aisle. The Democrats recognize the strength of our team and have acknowledged that strength of opposition by their gerrymandering effort. They have made every attempt to create unnecessary primaries in hopes of dismantling the outstanding team House Republicans have in place. Unfortunately, we have some willing accomplices who play right into the Democrats' hands when they put their personal ambition before regional growth strategies. Experience is a must at this critical time. If we send inexperienced individuals to Springfield in this cycle, our region will move backward.

Weaver: Anybody willing to serve their community is worthy of respect. However, in looking at Mark Luft's anti-business voting record and his Democratleaning financial backers from Chicago and Springfield, I do not believe he is the best candidate to serve as the representative for this strong Republican district. This district deserves a person who is willing to stand up and be strong on issues like life, agriculture, education, business, voter integrity and fighting inflation. My opponent had a chance to stand up for these issues and he was silent. For those reason, I believe I am the better choice.

Continued from Page 1 20-plus years, I've been (doing) nothing but gaining experience."

Watkins, 40, is a captain in charge of patrol and investigations. He also has been a patrol deputy and a detective, among other duties. The native Peorian joined the department in 2004 after he spent four years in the U.S. Air Force.

"The sheriff's office has been part of my life since I was a kid," said Watkins, whose mother was a book-keeper there. "I've always had some involvement with the sheriff's office, but I wanted to serve my country first. I really care about this place and want to keep moving it in the right direction."

Asbell has endorsed Watkins. Buckley said some of his co-workers suggested he run.

Buckley suggested intradepartment training isn't adequate, particularly in an era when law-enforcement officers are under more attack and scrutiny. He also advocates more traffic stops and an expansion of the office's canine program.

"I think a person who comes into town to commit a crime sees or hears the canine in the police vehicle, it makes it overall safer for the officer and the community," Buckley said.

Watkins said he plans to continue Asbell's efforts to help reincorporate ex-convicts into society. Watkins also wants to renew an emphasis on recruitment of new officers and retention of current ones. A primary focus would be on corrections officers, of which there is a significant shortage.

"Attrition leads to more attrition," Watkins said. "We have to stop that ASAP."

To that end, Watkins wants state lawmakers to reduce the corrections-of-ficers hiring age from 21 to 18.

"I'm not saying that every 18-year-old should be a corrections officer, but if you can join the military at 18, we should at least be able to see who you are," Watkins said.

Buckley doesn't agree. He cited Illinois' restrictions on handgun possession and/or ownership by individuals younger than 21.

"I don't see the state changing their stance on the handguns and also on the level of maturity," Buckley said.

Buckley also said he doesn't believe Watkins will fight for his officers. Buckley mentioned a policy regarding the department's response to medical calls.

"We don't have enough officers to send to every medical call," Buckley said. "I have asked myself, 'If Chris is the plan, am I OK with it?' After some soul-searching, the answer is no. I don't think he's tough enough for what the future will bring us."

As did Buckley, Watkins praised his opponent's character. But Watkins believes Buckley pales in comparison regarding experience.

"There's a lot more to this department than patrol, and my opponent has just worked in patrol," Watkins said. "He has not worked in investigations. ... Talk to the state's attorney. Talk

to Peoria police officers. I've developed relationships over time with these people."



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
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
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Elmwood OKs new grade school ceiling

ELMWOOD – Work is well underway on a new HVAC system in the Elmwood Grade School, which will also be outfitted with a new ceiling.

Meeting Monday, the Elmwood School Board voted to approve \$71,345 in new acoustic ceiling tile as an add-on to ongoing HVAC work. The original plan had been to remove and reinstall the old ceiling tile and gridwork. But with new lights and ductwork going in, the board opted to hire Wright Way to replace the 1993 ceiling.

Board President Val Ramirez said timing seemed right since so much other work was being done. Ramirez also said it might be wise to repaint walls next year and replace flooring to finalize a complete update to the grade school.

Wright Way was also awarded the job of repairing the fire door soffit and ceiling located between the Commons area and the school. The cost is not to exceed \$15,000.

One reason the board did not blink at ceiling repairs was a report from Superintendent Chad Wagner that projections for Fiscal Year 2022 show revenue exceeding expenses by \$644,000 thanks to various forms of federal funding.

"We have a lot of federal dollars we didn't anticipate, which is putting us in a really good spot for this year," Wagner said. "This is not going to be the norm moving forward, obviously. It will return to being more of a balancing act."

HVAC work so far has involved pouring concrete pads for two chillers to be installed east of the grade school. Still to be installed are the HVAC units, ductwork and fencing around the chillers.

As a result, window units have not yet been removed from classrooms.

"We're not going to take those out until we're 100 percent sure everything is installed," Ramirez said.

At some point, window units may be made available for sale to the community.

Also approved was a premium of \$96,291 for the district insurance policy with Unland Companies. That reflects a 6.79 percent increase and Wagner said he plans to solicit bids for the insurance coverage for 2023-

24. He said switching to Unland for 2021-22 saved the district \$15,000.

The board also discussed hiring a licensed architect from the Farnsworth Group to look at drawings for a proposed Industrial Arts addition. Board member Claude Keefer said he has spoken with Dick Taylor of the Elmwood Community Foundation about that group possibly serving as a 501(c)3 facilitator for donations to the I.A. building.



"I think we need to think about the prices that we're paying and the raises that we're giving above cost of living," Patrick Meyer said at the June 15 board meet-

Meyer was the only board member to oppose approve a raise for Julie Albritton, the Brimfield Grade School principal. Meyer made it clear his decision had nothing to do with Albritton's job performance.

The 5-1 vote to approve Albritton's raise came after high school principal Billy Robison announced he is

Albritton's annual pay will increase from \$79,567 to \$87,523, according to Superintendent Tony Shinall. Meyer noted the size of the raise – more than 10 percent – and the hiring within the past few years of a grade-school assistant principal.

But board President Steve Updyke said Albritton, who in 2019 assumed her current post, has been underpaid compared to other area school districts.

"That is the way of the world right now," Board Member Katie Kappes said. "Everybody is paying a lot to get the talent or keep the talent."

Kappes acknowledged it's a balancing act, as did colleague Mark Bell. He noted the district has had significant personnel turnover the past decade.

"I'm concerned, too,

with adding all these things, but I also feel like we need some stability," Bell said in defense of Albritton's deal. "It's a huge loss losing Billy."


