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# Bailey, Sampson, Watkins winners in Illinois primary

Gov. JB Pritzker will find out Nov. 8 whether spending millions to pick his Republican foe was a good idea or not.

Unofficial results show State Sen. Darren Bailey (R-Xenia) won the Republican gubernatorial primary held Tuesday. With 58 percent of the vote counted, Bailey led a crowded Republican field with 56.9 percent of the vote. Jesse Sullivan was at 15.9 percent and Richard Irvin was running third at 15.5 percent.

Pritzker, who won easily on the Democrat side, spent heavily on ads for Bailey in the primary, a practice that seems certain to end


before the general election.

The Republican governor race was one of the most interesting statewide in an unusual June primary that saw light turnout and was necessitated by a much-delayed process of redrawing Illinois voting maps.

In Peoria County, turnout was running close to 15.1 percent, down from 20 percent in 2018.

old eSlate Voting system purchased in 2006 could no longer be supported.

Locally, one of the more interesting races involving a new district saw Travis Weaver leading Pekin Mayor Mark Luft to serve as State Rep. in the 93rd district. With 75 percent of the vote in, Weaver had 64.3 percent of the vote to lead Luft, technically the incumbent though his district changed dramatically.

Also contested locally were primary races for Peoria County and Knox County Sheriff.

In the Republican primary for Peoria County Sheriff, with 92 of 116 precincts reporting, Chris Watkins was leading

Jason Buckley, 61.8 percent to 38.2.

"The platform I ran on was my experience. We both mean well and I'm glad we kept it in house," Watkins said. "Jason is a very great asset to Peoria County. But people saw the resumes and saw I've brought more to the sheriff's office my whole career."

In Knox County with all precincts reporting, former Deputy Douglas Sampson topped Williamsfield Police Chief James Robertson in the Democratic primary, 51.7 percent to 48.3 percent – winning by a mere 30 votes. The winner will face off

# Princeville ups pay rate for subs, staff

PRINCEVILLE - Keeping up with the job market and the Joneses led the Princeville School Board to approve pay raises for some of its employees.

In the 2022-23 academic year, pay for substitute teachers is to be \$125 per day, a \$25 increase from 2021-22. Minimum wage for most personnel not certified to teach aides, custodians and cafeteria workers, among others – is to rise

to \$15 per hour. That's a \$3-anhour increase.

Princeville Superintendent Shannon Duling said the hikes were necessary to attract new employees and retain current ones.

The new substitute rate matches those of the Princeville district's peers, according to Duling. He suggested the non-certified raises help make Princeville more competitive with those peers and other employers in what has become a ruthless labor market.

"When you can go out and work fast food and make over 15 bucks an hour, how do we compete with that?" Duling said. "We've lost a lot of our staff to higher-paying positions. It's one of those things where the board felt they didn't have a choice."

The board made its choices during a meeting June 21.



Continued from Page 1 in November against Republican Jack Harlan and Independent Zachary A. Cox.

Also on the Democrat ballot, Knox County Public Defender David M. Hansen of Galesburg was well ahead of Jim Harrell of Rio to fill a vacancy as a Judge of the Circuit Court for the Ninth Judicial Circuit. Hansen had 69.1 percent of the vote with all precincts reporting.

And with 35.5 percent of the vote in, incumbent Sen. Win Stoller of Germantown Hills was in a close race, with 53.8 percent of the vote in a newly drawn 37th Senate District. At 46.2 percent was businessman Brett S. Nicklaus of Dixon.

Here are preliminary results in other elections:

• U.S. Senate – With 52 percent of the vote counted, Attorney Kathy Salvi of Mundelein was the leader among seven Republicans vying to run against incumbent Sen. Tammy Duckworth in November. Salvi had 31.2 percent of the vote according to the Chicago Tribune, while Peggy Hubbard was next at 23.9 percent and Matt Dubiel was running third at 12.7 percent.

• Congress, 16th Congressional District – Rep. Darin LaHood was poised to win easily in the Republican Congressional primary against retired Rockford engineer Walt Peters, Rockford attorney JoAnne Guillemette and Minooka business owner Michael Rebresh.

• Congress, 17th Congressional District – In the race to replace Cheri Bustos, Esther Joy King was leading Charles Helmick Jr. on the Republican ballot, 68 percent to 32 percent with 40 percent of the expected vote counted. A former weatherman on television stations in Rockford and Moline, Eric Sorensen led a crowded field of six Democrats with 35.8 per-

cent and 58 percent of the expected vote counted. Litessa Wallace was next closest with 28.1 percent.

• Illinois Attorney General – Greenville Attorney Thomas DeVore was leading three Republicans seeking to face Democrat Kwame Raoul in November. With 43 percent of expected votes counted, DeVore had 43.3 percent. Deerfield Attorney Steve Kim was at 35.3 percent.

• Illinois Secretary of State – In the race to replace Jesse White, former State Treasurer Alexi Giannoulias was leading the Democrat race with 53.4 percent, putting him ahead of Chicago City Clerk Anna M. Valencia (34.1). Republican Dan Brady had a commanding lead over John C. Milhiser with 77.6 percent.

• State Central Committee – In the 17th Congressional District, State Rep. Jehan Gordon-Booth was winning easily in a three-person race for state central committeewoman.



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

# Simple answers to the simple questions

Often, the simple answer to a simple question is the simple truth.

Some don't want the simple truth, so they bend facts or shave figures so their square pegs replace roundly accepted reality. It's common in ag.

For example, on April 12, President Joe Biden traveled to Iowa to an-

nounce an expansion of the ethanol blend in summertime gasoline from 10 percent to 15 percent. Monte Shaw, the Iowa Renewable Fuels Association boss, called Biden's action "the single most important

step the President is empowered to take to keep fuel prices down this summer."

But Biden's political gambit and Shaw's hefty hyperbole held more gas than any ethanol blend. Nationwide gasoline prices that day, according to AAA, averaged \$4 per gallon. Today national gas prices hover around \$5 per gallon.

Despite the effort, many in farm country continue to blame the Biden Administration for high fuel prices. One reason, some conservative critics cite, is that crude oil production is slowing due to the White House's allegiance to the "Green New Deal."

That's a stretch for two reasons. First, the Green New Deal isn't law and, second, data from the U.S. Energy Information Agency shows that "average annual domestic crude oil production" rose from 5.3 million barrels per day (mb/d) during the Bush administration to 7.2 million mb/d under Obama to 11 mb/d under Trump to 11.2 mb/d under Biden.

But, hey, facts rarely sidetrack political railroading.

The same goes for agriculture. For months, we've been warned of an impending global famine because of Russia's invasion of Ukraine, an important wheat exporter. Indeed, reported Politico June 17, U.S. officials "estimate the (Russian) blockade (of Ukrainian ports) is holding back more than 20 million tons of grain from the world food supply, driving food prices and world hunger to near-crisis levels."

Twenty million metric tons (mmt), or about 740 million bushels, is a lot of wheat – except when compared to global supplies. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) most recent World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates forecast 2022-23 world wheat production at 773.4 mmt, or 28.4 billion bu.

As such, the bottled-up Ukrainian wheat is equal to about 2.5 percent of this coming year's world production – not nothing, but hardly enough to

fuel a famine this year or any year.

Some market worriers, though, continue to make a mountain out of that molehill. On June 20, Farm Journal's AgWeb noted that a private forecaster had pegged current global wheat stocks at 20 percent of yearly production instead of USDA's recent estimate of 33 percent.

Again, that sounds like a dramatic drop but, even at 20 percent, world stocks stand at "over 10 week's of ... wheat consumption in storage." Historically, that's average supply - especially when compared to U.S. stocks of corn and soybeans.

According to the same USDA report, American soybean stocks now stand at a slim 4.6 percent of total usage and, given a productive 2022, a year from now will be 6.8 percent. Likewise, this year's U.S. corn stocks are 10 percent of usage and, estimates USDA, will slip to 9.6 percent. No one sees either as cause for global

I'm not alone in my doubt: Few in the futures market see 2022-23 wheat supplies as worrisome. From mid-May to late June, new wheat crop futures prices dropped 17 percent while new crop corn futures are just 9 percent lower and soybean futures are only 2 percent lower.

Continued from Page 1 once did, according to Duling. Last school year, the usual list of substitutes was 5-7, down from the 10-15 of past years. Typically, the district requires two or three substitutes per day.

"Anybody that has a pulse," Duling said jokingly about substitute-hiring criteria. "We need them."

Duling said the general shortage of qualified teachers is the worst he's seen in a decade at Princeville and more than 20 years in education administration overall. He noted the district has received no

applications for two prekindergarten positions posted since April.

"The last two years have been tough on teachers," Duling said in an apparent allusion to the coronavirus pandemic. "We have a lot of teachers who are retiring early, moving to other careers."

Duling didn't have specifics regarding the district financial budget for substitutes, but he estimated the pay raise would increase it by 15 to 20 percent.

Minimum wage for most non-certified personnel was to increase this year

by \$1 per hour, to \$13, with a \$15 floor expected in 2024-25. The board opted to advance the timetable.

Whether minimums exceed \$15 in subsequent years might depend on the economy, the superintendent suggested.

The board also approved hiring Breckon McKinney as a Migrant Head Start/daycare teacher and Maeghen Potter as a special-education aide.

Employees who resigned were pre-K/Bright Futures teacher Whitney Bliss, grade-school library worker Kristi Christianson, junior-high science teacher Michael Davidson, seventh-grade volleyball coach Alyssa Dial, high school assistant football coach Ronald Francis, daycare director Ann Ladd and MHS/daycare teacher Julianna Trevino.

The village personnel committee is expected to affirm Rice's hiring when it meets July 5. During the Village Board meeting, Gilroy joked she wanted to keep Rice for the next five years at the aquatic center.






### **Donald Duley**

His work also included supervising and educating teachers and college students who desired to pursue other medical fields. Additionally, Everett performed some of the necropsies on animals from the Brookfield Zoo.

During his lifetime, Everett had many interests, including reading, performing in men's chorus and barbershop chorus, playing the saxophone for the Naperville Municipal Band, hunting, fishing, taxidermy, painting, carving birds, as well as making rock-
