## New look coming for Princeville's East Main Street

PRINCEVILLE – The 100 block of East Main Street in Princeville probably will look a little spiffier soon.

New sidewalks, trees and concrete curbs, among other improvements, are to be constructed over the next nine months on that stretch of street. During its meeting July 19, the Village Board received a report regarding the project. According to Village President Jeff

Troutman, it's the culmination of something that's been discussed in local government for a couple of decades.

"I'm just glad that we're finally getting able to do it," Troutman said.

The village is getting \$130,000 in Illinois Department of Commerce grant money to help pay for the work. The lower of two construction bids was \$369,348.91, from Illinois Civil Contractors Inc. of East Peoria, according to Village

Treasurer Julie Delbridge.

Most of the winning bid – \$351,013.47 – is to cover the cost of removing the current sidewalks and installing new

ones. The rest of it, \$18,335.44, is for installing curbs; gutter islands with trees and mulch; and other creative touches.

The project covers both sides of Main Street between Santa Fe and Walnut avenues, according to Delbridge. It is to comply with the federal Americans with Disabilities Act.

Parking on the north side of Main Street is to be reworked, Troutman said. Currently, when cars are parked along the street, their front bumpers overhang

the sidewalk. That bug is to be eliminated.

Ameren Illinois is to remove existing light poles and wiring in favor of four to six new overhead light-emitting-diode fixtures, Troutman said. The city is to pay for the new lighting. Bids for that work have yet to be solicited.

It's possible the village might reconstruct the pavement in that block, depending on possible damage the sidewalk project

## No sex ed classes in Brimfield

BRIMFIELD – Sex education won't be part of the Brimfield School District curriculum for the 2022-23 academic year.

A state-mandated change in how and to whom the topic is taught led to the Brimfield school board's decision during its meeting July 20. The decision was related to a general review of district policies and procedures.

Illinois public schools that teach sex ed are to provide lessons that begin as early as kindergarten, according to a state law enacted last year. According to Gov. JB Pritzker's office, the content is to be age-appropriate for students through 12th grade.

Brimfield board President Steve Updyke said his group doesn't believe the new sex-ed material is fit

## More soybeans than corn?

Illinois appears well positioned to maintain its recent run as the top soybean-producing state in the nation.

While soybean plantings fell more than 2 million acres short of expect-

tations in USDA's June 30 acreage report nationwide, the Ag Department raised soybean plantings by 200,000 acres in Illinois compared to the March estimate.

The current projections place Illinois plantings at 11.2 million acres

## Elmwood seeing comings, goings

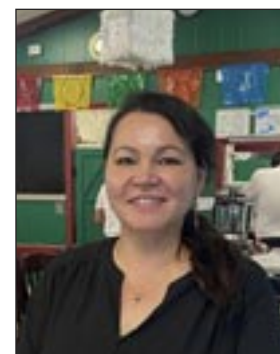

ELMWOOD – On the same Friday a crew was working here to prepare a new restaurant for its grand opening, another eatery announced it was closing and lodge members prepared for the end of a 162-year-old Elmwood institution. Such is life in a small town, where every grand opening seems to be greeted by a closure.

First to the restaurants. Mi Ranchito has opened at 110 W. Magnolia St. in the space formerly occupied by the Uptown Cafe. Tuesday's soft opening attracted a busy lunch crowd and drew relieved smiles from owner Dana Cardenas, who had been waiting on approval from the Peoria County Health Department since Friday.

But just one block away, lights were out at Elmwood's Subway restaurant, where workers last Friday announced it was closing permanently. No reason for the closure was given, though the com-

might incur. Cost could be about \$60,000, according to Troutman, but he didn't rule out pavement patching as an alternative. Regardless, no decision is expected in 2022.

Sidewalk work is to begin later this year, Troutman said. Project completion depends on weather, but April 30 is a realistic goal.

Non-grant funding is to come from the village general fund and/or from tax-increment financing, according to Troutman. In TIF districts, property taxes set to go to

various taxing bodies are frozen. Subsequent increases in those taxes are diverted into a fund that can be used for infrastructure improvements that lead to area redevelopment.

Among businesses located on the to-be-renewed block are Princeville Community Bank, Princeville State Bank and Ellen's Diner.

Years ago, an architect created plans for a more expansive project, but any semblance was placed on hold until the state-grant money became available, according to Troutman.

"Maybe down the road it'll help attract new businesses, but if nothing else it'll beautify the town and show that the Village Board is committed to making improvements in the town," he said. "We just don't get TIF funds and let them sit. We use them for what they're intended for."

The village also issued a building permit for a new residence at 1497 N. Town Ave. According to Troutman, the former farm property has been subdivided into residential lots. Within the past year, a house was constructed on one lot.

## SOYBEANS: Shift to beans goes against trend

of soybeans, up 600,000 from last year when it produced 672.6 million bushels – the most of any state in the nation. USDA estimates Illinois farmers planted 10.7 million acres of corn this season, down 300,000 from last year.

"If realized, it would be the first time since 1983 that soybean acres would be greater than corn acres in Illinois," said Illinois state statistician Mark Schleusener.

That not only would buck a long-time state trend, but the acreage shift in Illinois was the opposite of the national trend. The U.S. soybean planting estimate declined 2.6 million acres from March to June to just 88.3 million acres. The national corn acreage estimate increased 400,000 acres to 89.9 million last month.

University of Illinois Extension ag economists Scott Irwin and Joe Janzen discussed the shift during a recent webinar hosted by farmdoc.

"With soybeans we had some delayed planting and less-than-ideal conditions this spring," Irwin said. "When push came to shove, farmers in the U.S. faded toward corn and away from soybeans."

"Illinois stood out as increasing soybean acres (from the March intentions to the June planted acreage reports) as did Kentucky."

Overall, the total of U.S. principal crop acreage decreased from 317.4 million in March to 316.3 million in June, which helps explain the soybean acreage decline outside of Illinois.

"It's not that the acreage pie shrunk. We moved a bit more than 1 million acres from principal crops

into prevented plant," Irwin said. "That's primarily in North Dakota and to a lesser extent South Dakota and Minnesota."

Estimates suggest prevented-plant acreage could grow from 4.2 million acres last year to 5.3 million nationwide this season. However, the first official data on prevented-plant area won't be available until August.

Meanwhile, after a spring buildup, crop prices continued a downward trend following the June 30 report and the Independence Day holiday.

"We've seen some of the high-price action drop off," Janzen said.

### Of red-hot dollars, nets in the night & bats

The start of our most recent hulla-baloo came when I somehow made it home from vacation with money. Dollars carefully set aside to buy bison skulls started burning a hole in my pocket after we found no affordable buffalo racks out west.

In place of skulls, the leftover cash paid for some fancy trail cameras that can send pictures right to your telephone. Instead of having to trek out into the French Creek woods every few days to get a photo card out of the camera, I can sit at my desk and peruse pictures of deer, raccoons and crows while pretending to work. Much as I hate technology, sometimes it is pretty cool.

All that went real well until one recent night when two guys carrying big poles and nets appeared on the telephone. Photos kept coming all night as these busy fellows, who knew they were on camera and didn't seem to mind, worked with their nets until 2:30 a.m.

This bothered me on two levels.

One, they didn't have permission. Two, they were trampling our newly planted, tender soybeans that were doing such a good job attracting deer. Three, I didn't sleep too well.

The next day, I cut out of work a bit early and went to the bottoms to assess the damage. Much to my amazement, the poles those guys had been carrying were still there - stretching at least 25 feet straight up on either side of the creek. What the?

Slowly my mind pieced it together. Evidently, they were hanging a net between the poles to catch something that flies along the creek in the dark of the night. Bat survey!

As you may know, my little farm is in the corridor of a proposed CO2 pipeline. And as anyone who has dealt with government knows, before anything can happen, you must first spend lots of time and money on paperwork, surveys and other cover-your-butt items. Surveying critters that fly seems like the exact illogical thing a government agency would require in order to build an underground pipeline.

**Our money, their mouth, your choice**

If the political polls are to be believed, November's midterm election will sweep today's Democrats out of power in the U.S. House of Representatives and put Republicans back in charge.

If accurate, House Republicans will have a splendid opportunity to put your tax money where their collective mouth is by implementing their highly detailed, little-publicized "Blueprint to Save America," a 122-page, "alternate budget" introduced by the House Republican Study Committee (RSC) June 9.

If you're a small government/fiscal conservative, the Blueprint is 200-proof catnip. It attacks dozens of government programs as either "socialist," "radical" or "insidious" and wastes little ink on ways to reform any. Instead, its favorite alternative is the ax and its prescribed fix is either complete elimination or deep program cuts.

This is especially true when the Blueprint starts swinging at the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and its farm and ranch support programs. For example, under the deeply red Blueprint, the RSC – of which four out of five House Republicans are members – would:

- "Remove nutrition programs from the Farm Bill."
- Eliminate the nation's two, "duplicative," federal crop insurance programs to save "\$42.7 billion over 10 years."
- Replace both with a single program whose "subsidies (would be) 30 percent" instead of today's "60 percent" and "would only be offered to pay for catastrophic policies."
- And "phase out the Sugar Program," "prohibit new enrollments in

the Conservation Reserve Program" (to effectively kill CRP in 10 years) and end the "Conservation Stewardship Program."

Additionally, the GOP House group would "eliminate the Milk Program," "prohibit funding for National School Lunch Standards," eliminate "the Rural Water and Waste Disposal Program Account," and dismantle "McGovern-Dole International Food for Education Program."

And that's just a start and just USDA.

The Blueprint also urges big tax cuts, deep cuts in environmental oversight, greater defense spending, and privatization of federal agencies like the Animal Plant Health Inspection Service.

Yes, that's right: no milk program," no "sugar program," and no CRP.

Also, no federal crop insurance other than a "catastrophic" policy where farmers would pay 70 percent of the premium, not today's 40 percent.

And, yes, remove all "nutrition programs" – programs like the vast Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) – from the Farm Bill that would give every non-rural, non-farming House member the perfect reason to never vote for any Farm Bill again.

Coincidence or not, two weeks after the Blueprint went public the decidedly not-conservative and not-happy Environmental Working Group (EWG) released its own analysis of recent federal farm program spending.

It, too, was a stunner because it agrees with the GOP Blueprint's key assertion: Farm program spending is out of control. The problem, however, claimed the EWG, was the last Republican in the White House – not today's CRP, not crop insurance, not the milk or sugar programs, and certainly not SNAP.

"The government paid a record \$41.6 billion in a variety of subsidies to farmers in 2020," reported the Food & Environment Reporting Network (FERN) in reviewing the EWG's analysis, "double the amount they received in 2018, when the Trump-era cash gusher began flowing..."

And, FERN went on, "...farmers received a combined \$91.6 billion in 2018, 2019, and 2020 from crop insurance, traditional crop supports, trade war assistance, and pandemic relief," under the Trump Administration that few – if any – Congressional Republicans or Democrats even questioned.

If you add in 2021 data, direct farm program payments for the most recent four years total \$115.5 billion. That means 29 percent of all net farm income earned by farmers, ranchers, and landowners between 2018 and 2021 came from U.S. taxpayers.

Little wonder House Republicans consider USDA a ripe target for spending cuts.

Or do they? If put in charge, would Republicans really cut crop insurance, gut CRP, and eliminate the dairy and sugar programs, or is the Blueprint more baloney than beef?

Who knows, but when most House Republicans and the Environmental Working Group agree that farm program spending is out of control, farmers and ranchers might have a problem.

# BRIMFIELD: Raises for non-certified staff

for elementary grade levels in particular. If schools don't teach sex ed, which the state does not require, there is no need to adopt the new standards.

"It's either all or nothing," Updyke said. "So the board decided (it's) nothing."

Until now, some sex-ed principles were incorporated as part of Brimfield health classes in the upper grades, according to Updyke. That no longer will be the case, district Superintendent Tony Shinall said.

Classes at Brimfield begin Aug. 17.

The new Illinois curriculum, which takes effect this school year, is aligned with "National Sex Education Standards: Core Content and Skills, K-12." It was developed by the Future of Sex Education Initiative, a partnership of three progressive-leaning groups.

Among those groups is Advocates for Youth, which aims to provide "resources and opportunities necessary to create sexual health equity for all youth," according to the NSES document. The document states another group, SIECUS: Sex Ed for Social Change, works "to create a world that ensures social justice is inclusive of sexual and reproductive rights."

Among organizations that support the new standards are Planned Parenthood of Illinois and the state chap-

ter of the American Civil Liberties Union.

"Students who don't receive age-appropriate, comprehensive and inclusive sexual-health education are at risk of harm," Planned Parenthood of Illinois President and CEO Jennifer Welch said in a statement. "By developing standards to require inclusive, evidence-based curricula that includes information about healthy relationships, gender identity and sexual orientation, Illinois schools can reduce bullying, stigmatization, harassment, violence and discrimination for all students."

Standards by grade level are listed in the NSES document, which is available online. Among other things, students by the end of second grade are to be able to discuss the range of ways people express their gender and how gender-role stereotypes may limit behavior, the document states.

By the end of fifth grade, students are to be able to explain common human sexual development and the role of hormones – including romantic and sexual feelings, masturbation and mood swings, according to the document.

There is an opt-out provision if parents and guardians object to the subject matter.

Updyke declined to comment about specifics of the new curriculum but suggested the board's objections

might be evident to those who read it.

"Those discussions are better left not in a school environment but at home," Updyke said. "The board really felt that what we had in place before was sufficient, in our health classes."

Brimfield parents opposed to the new curriculum contacted board members before they voted, according to the president.

"I wouldn't say it was a lot, but it was enough to make sure we did our homework on it," Updyke said.

In other action, the board voted to raise by \$2 per hour the pay for about 35 non-certified employees. Earlier this month, the board approved pay raises for certified teaching personnel, as part of a new contract.

The non-certified raises are about 75 cents an hour higher than raises last year, according to Shinall.

"We value our employees immensely and do our best to stay competitive with the market around us as well," he said.

The board also approved hiring Angie McGrath as a grade-school counselor, Luann Baldock as a grade-school paraprofessional, Tammie Updyke as a grade-school cafeteria worker, Josh Johnson as a grade-school assistant baseball coach and Melinda Treadway as a high school yearbook adviser.

 bination of increased utility costs and a downturn in sales is thought to have contributed.

Subway had operated out of its current location since building owner Doug Whitney finished the rebuild of his 102 W. Main St. corner lot that was destroyed in the 2010 tornado.

"We've had a nice little wave of things with the Mexican restaurant coming and Cory [Jones] moving [Uptown Cafe] to a larger space, a new barber shop, and then you get hit the other way," said Amy Davis, Elmwood's economic development director. "Subway was a shock to everyone. The employees didn't even know."

Davis said she has started "putting out feelers" to potential businesses to fill the now-vacant Subway.

"We've had people interested in possibly doing coffee shops and bak-

# Elmwood bank robber gets 10-year sentence

Because he robbed an Elmwood bank, among other businesses, John W. Beck won't be leaving prison anytime soon.

Beck, 55, was sentenced to 10 years behind bars after he was convicted in federal court of robbing multiple outlets during a month-long central Illinois crime spree last year. Among Beck's victims was Elmwood Community Bank, which he robbed April 20, 2021.

In addition, Beck was sentenced to two years in prison for attempting to escape from the Livingston County Jail in Pontiac. The attempted escape happened in September 2021, while Beck was in custody for the crimes that took place five months earlier. The attempted-escape sentence is to be served consecutively to his robbery term, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Central District of Illinois.

Judge Joe Billy McDade sentenced Beck during a hearing June 29 in U.S. District Court in Peoria.

A resident of Mechanicsburg in Sangamon County, Beck pleaded guilty in January to all charges – four counts of interference with commerce by robbery, one count of bank robbery and one count of armed bank robbery. He is to serve those sentences concurrently.

There was no plea agreement, a court news release stated.

Beck admitted stealing an unrevealed amount of money from the Elmwood bank. He was accused of wielding a pipe during the robbery. It was his final apparent crime among at least nine he committed that month, according to federal law-enforcement officials.

The spree began April 7, 2021, when Beck stole an automobile from an individual in Mechanicsburg. The following day, Beck robbed a Dollar General store in nearby Buffalo. On April 9, Beck robbed a Bank of Pontiac branch in Odell. He returned there April 17 to rob a Fast Stop store.

Robberies April 18 at a Village Pantry store in Paxton and April 19 at a Subway restaurant in Danville preceded the Elmwood incident.

Beck stole cars April 19 in the Edgar County seat of Paris and on April 16 and 17 from two Springfield dealerships. He also stole license plates from two individuals and used the plates on the stolen cars, according to the feds.

Beck was arrested April 21, 2021, at a Springfield hotel. The U.S. Marshals Task Force, which includes Peoria County Sheriff's Office personnel, apprehended him.

At the time of his arrest, Beck was on parole for an armed-robbery conviction in Champaign County. He also was on supervised release for a bank robbery he committed in 2007 and for which he was sentenced to 151 months in prison.

Unsurprisingly, perhaps, McDade found Beck to be a career offender. Beck is in custody and awaiting a transfer to a federal prison, according to the court office in Springfield.

# Pritzker's lead over Bailey drops in July poll

In the first Illinois poll since the June primary, Gov. JB Pritzker leads his Republican opponent State Sen. Darren Bailey by nine points. The first-term Governor was the choice of 48.9 percent of respondents, while Bailey received 39.0 percent of the vote.

The results are part of the latest Illinois poll, conducted July 17-19. The poll is a semi-monthly survey conducted since 2001 by Victory Research, an independent polling company based in Chicago. The poll of 1,208 likely Illinois general election voters has a margin of error of 2.82 percent and was conducted by live callers. Respondents answered on land lines (411) and cell phones (797).

Pritzker, a first-term governor, fell below the 50 percent mark for the first time in 2022, according to the poll, in both the head-to-head matchup with Bailey, and in a question about whether he has earned another term in office.

In the January Illinois Poll, for example, Pritzker's "re-elect"



number was 51.7 percent, and in June it was 50.2 percent. Now it is 47.3 percent. In the head-to-head matchup with Bailey, Pritzker received 55.2 percent in January, and 51.8 percent in June, and now it is 48.9 percent.

Geographically, Pritzker holds a wide lead over Bailey in heavily Democratic Chicago (78.0-17.3), and a narrow lead in Suburban Cook County (49.8-42.3).

Bailey leads in every other part of the state, with his strongest region being his home area of southern Illinois (52.0-34.0).

Despite the bruising GOP primary for governor, Republicans appear mostly united behind Senator Bailey, who has 81.3

percent of GOP votes, only slightly less than Gov. Pritzker's 82.4 percent of Democratic votes, according to the poll. In addition, independent voters favor Bailey over Pritzker (47.8-36.7).

Pritzker's percentage falling below 50 percent could be significant if history is a guide. In the previous two off-year elections, with a Democrat (Barack Obama in 2010 and 2014), the incumbent Democratic Governor (Pat Quinn), finished election day with less than 50 percent of the vote.

In 2010, Quinn received 46.8 percent of the vote, eking out a victory over downstate State Senator Bill Brady by approximately 32,000 votes statewide. In 2014, Quinn lost to outsider Bruce Rauner, receiving 46.4 percent.

The poll is in line with other recently published polls. A poll by GOP pollster Tony Fabrizio in June showed Governor Pritzker's vote total at 50 percent even, while a Morning Consult poll released last week had the Governor's approval rat-

ing at 51 percent.

• **Campaign Funding** – Bailey's battle will be uphill on the fundraising front, as Pritzker has a net worth of \$3-4 billion.

Pritzker's campaign fund had \$60.8 million cash on hand as of June 30, while Bailey's campaign fund had just \$363,918. Pritzker spent \$27 million from April to June, while Bailey's camp spent \$9.2 million.

# ‘Scrim’ plants best used for special effect

In theatrical productions, a scrim, a semi-transparent fabric hung as a backdrop to a scene, is often used for special effects. For example, a tree painted onto the scrim looks like a tree when lit from the front. But when backlit, the tree becomes a silhouette. Sometimes a whole scene is set up behind the scrim and only becomes visible to the audience when the area behind the scrim is illuminated.

Taking a cue from the theater, landscape designers refer to some plants and shrubs as scrim plants and use them for special effect. Scrim plants typically have tall slender stems with little or no foliage. While it is customary when designing a perennial border to place short plants at the front and taller ones in the back, scrim plants are exceptions to the rule. They are situated toward the front of the border so that the observer gazes through the tall stems to see the rest of the garden.

Here in Zone 5, we have a number of plants that are sometimes used as scrim plants. Verbena bonariensis is probably the most common. V. bonariensis forms a neat rosette of deep green foliage

from which grows a tall sturdy stem topped with a cluster of tiny purple flowers. Depending on the genetics, the stems can be anywhere from 2-5 feet tall.

V. bonariensis is an annual for us here in Illinois but it seeds out readily and will pop up elsewhere in the garden. It's a welcome migrant in the border and you'll most likely let it grow wherever it appears. It's easily pulled out where it's unwelcome. Not only does this verbena provide the "see through" effect of a good scrim plant, but its tall slender stems sway in gentle breezes, a pleasant

sight. Butterflies find this verbena irresistible.

An even taller scrim plant is Thalictrum rochebruneum, or meadow rue. This is a favorite of mine because the plant is so spectacular when in full bloom.

While meadow rue is often used as a "see through" plant, your eye may ignore the background and be drawn to the meadow rue itself with its unusually tall sturdy stems, billowy clouds of tiny lavender flowers with lemon yellow stamens, and delicate columbine-like foliage.

In our garden there are several meadow rue plants that are over seven feet tall. The first couple of years the stems needed staking but now the plants are several years old and have outgrown the need

of support.

Meadow rue, like V. bonariensis, seeds out readily but is by no means a nuisance. Leave it where it pops up or move it near other meadow rue plants to form a cluster or grouping. The visual effect of meadow rue is enhanced when planted in groups.

The daylily, Hemerocallis 'Autumn Minaret', is another fine scrim plant. From a mound of typical daylily foliage, slender stems grow six feet tall or more, topped with golden yellow daylily flowers. 'Autumn Minaret' makes a fine show in the perennial garden as a scrim plant but is just as useful when planted at the very back of the border where the flowers can sway above shorter perennials such as shasta daisies, phlox and salvia.

One disadvantage of 'Autumn Minaret' is that, like so many other daylilies, the foliage can look tacky in late summer, especially if the weather is dry. That's why many gardeners prefer to plant it behind other perennials.

Some gardening experts consider certain ornamental grasses as scrim plants but I don't find any of them tall enough to qualify. To be considered scrim, a plant needs to be tall enough that an observer can see through the plant. And most ornamental grasses, even the tall ones, are too dense to be considered scrim.

## Illinois unemployment dips to 4.5% for June

The Illinois economy added 18,800 jobs during June as the unemployment rate fell to 4.5 percent, the lowest it has been since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.

That is down one-tenth of a percentage point from May, and down two full percentage points from June 2021.

Preliminary numbers released July 21, by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Illinois Department of Employment Security showed the sectors with the biggest gains during June were leisure and hospitality, professional and business services, construction, and educational and health services. Slight declines were reported in the financial industry and the catch-all category "other services."

"With the statewide unemployment rate at its lowest since the onset of the pandemic, the data released (Thursday) is a further reflection of continued economic recovery and evidence of a strengthening Illinois labor market," Deputy Governor Andy Manar said in a statement.

Prior to the pandemic, Illinois had seen its lowest unemployment rate ever, at 3.5 percent in December 2019. It climbed to 4.9 percent in March 2020, when the World Health Organization declared a pandemic existed, and reached a historic high of 17.4 percent in April 2020 after restaurants, bars, theaters and other "nonessential" businesses were ordered to close in an effort to contain the spread of the virus.

The state's jobless rate has since been on a continuous downward trend as businesses gradually reopened.

The trend in Illinois mirrors what has been happening nationally, although the state continues to lag behind the rest of the country in its recovery. The U.S. unemployment rate stood at 3.6 percent, unchanged from the month before but down from its peak of 14.7 percent in April 2020.

Illinois' unemployment rate also stood higher than all of its surrounding states. Indiana, Missouri, Iowa and Wisconsin all had jobless rates below 3 percent, while Kentucky stood at 3.7 percent. In fact, the 4.5 percent rate recorded in Illinois was the fifth highest in the nation. Pennsylvania and Delaware also were at 4.5 percent.

• **Biden approval dips** – While Gov. JB Pritzker's numbers have been remarkably consistent in the Morning Consult measurements since January 2021, President Joe Biden's approval rating in Illinois as measured is an example of how quickly public sentiment can change.

Morning Consult distributed the polling results under the headline "Democratic Governors Facing Re-Election Are Resisting Biden's Drag Effect." The firm measured Biden's approval at 47 percent in Illinois while disapproval measured at 50 percent.

It was a major drop from one year prior for Biden, who logged a healthy 58-38 approval-disapproval rating in Illinois for the quarter ending in June 2021.

The discrepancies between the approval ratings of Biden and Democratic governors help explain the level of intrigue in national news outlets regarding Biden potentially being replaced atop the Democratic ticket in the 2024 election cycle.

Pritzker's name – along with California Gov. Gavin Newsom, who had a 53-40 approval split according to the poll – has been floated time and again in that conversation. Many news outlets, including Capitol News Illinois, have asked him about his plans should Democrats seek a new presidential candidate next time around.

Pritzker hasn't directly denied an interest in a presidential run, but he said at the end of June that Illinois remains his focus.

The intrigue has also been largely stoked by the governor's recent speaking engagements.

In June he spoke at a gathering of Democrats in New Hampshire, normally one of the country's first states to hold a primary, and last weekend he spoke at Florida Democrats' Leadership Blue gala.

State Sen. Darren Bailey, the Xenia farmer who gained the GOP nomination and has vowed not to be outworked in the race for governor, saw Pritzker's recent East Coast trip as a line of attack.

"Gov. JB Pritzker spent the weekend hobnobbing in Florida with wealthy liberals and fueling his presidential ambitions," Bailey's campaign said in a Monday news release. "Meanwhile in Illinois, rampant crime continued unabated. Seven people were killed over the weekend in Chicago, and eight carjackings terrorized Chicago neighborhoods in the span of just one hour."

## Water customers can apply for federal assistance

Water and sewer customers who qualify and need financial assistance with their water and/or wastewater bills can uti-

lize the federal assistance program LIHWAP.

LIHWAP is a federally-funded program that provides bill payment assistance to help low-income families pay their water and/or wastewater bills. Qualifying residential customers could receive up to \$1,500 for their water and/or wastewater bill.

The program is available through Aug. 31, 2023, and is open to residential customers only. The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) is

administering the program.

The federally LIHWAP program assists residential customers who have been disconnected, are facing disconnection or have balances.

**Chicago touted for Democratic convention**

SPRINGFIELD – Illinois Democrats are vying to make Chicago the host city for the Democratic National Convention in 2024 while considering who will lead their party for the next four years.

Meanwhile, the state’s Republican Party is hearing calls for a censure of one of its sitting congressmen.

Officials for the Democratic National Committee were in Chicago on Tuesday as state leaders, including Gov. JB Pritzker and Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot, called a news conference to tout the city as a host for the Democrats’ 2024 convention.

DNC Chair Jaime Harrison said at

a Tuesday morning news conference in Chicago the committee was looking for a city that represents diversity, inclusion and opportunity. He said it will be the first big showcase for President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris, who didn’t have a convention in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Other finalist cities include New York City, Atlanta and Houston.

Pritzker, whose name has frequently been mentioned in the conversation as a potential replacement for Biden if he doesn’t run in 2024, said he looks at the convention as an opportunity “to show off” the city.

Republicans, meanwhile, were

dealing with intraparty tensions as state lawmakers in the conservative Freedom Caucus called on the party to censure U.S. Rep. Adam Kinzinger, R-Channahon, for his role as an outspoken critic of President Donald Trump on the U.S. House committee investigating the Jan. 6 attack on the U.S. Capitol.

The state party issued a statement saying it was “focused on uniting the party to defeat Gov. Pritzker in November and make Illinois a safe and affordable place for people to live.”

“I have dealt with Adam Kinzinger on my own,” Bailey said. “I’ve made my statements. I don’t agree with anything that Adam Kinzinger stands for. And I’ve made the statement.”





## Anderson back at R-W

Relatively few coaching changes in local sports

If continuity helps ensure success in athletics, then local programs should be in good shape heading into a 2022-23 prep sports season that saw very little coaching turnover.

And Bob Anderson – the poster child for coaching continuity – will be back for a 44th season on the bench for the ROWVA-Williamsfield boys basketball team.



Anderson

After topping 700 career victories last January, Anderson ended the season saying he would spend some time pondering his future before committing to another campaign. That decision didn't take long for two main reasons.

One, Anderson was unhappy with the way last season ended – a two-game losing streak at Monmouth United and then home against Stark County in the regional opener. Anderson said during those two games his 16-16 team did not play at the same level it had for much of the year.

Two, there is more talent returning to the Cougars' roster than Anderson had grown accustomed to over the past few years.

"We've got a couple pretty good kids

coming back and a couple kids moving in that I think will help us," said Anderson, who has a career record of 707-534 at Williamsfield and R-W. "I've fought that racket without talent some, so if we've got a little, I'd like to have a shot at that, too."

Back to lead R-W is 6-foot-2 senior post player Graham Wight, who averaged 18 points per game last year, and senior starter Adam Koll. Other promising returnees include junior point guard Louis Sams, 6-2 Riley Danner, 5-10 post Gage Aldred, senior Grant Erlacher and junior guard Jack Godsil.

Bolstering the lineup will be Galva transfers junior Braxton Rylander (now at ROWVA) and 6-1 sophomore left-hander Talon Hull (Williamsfield). A three-sport athlete, Hull injured an elbow this summer and may be questionable for football.

Anderson said depth in the post will be an unusual strength for his team, which will need to work to get better at shooting outside the 3-point line.

"We've got some possibilities. I can't say we're going to mow everyone down, but we're a little more talented than we've been for awhile," Anderson said. "And I think we're going to be OK for a couple years. So maybe I'll be back after this season."


