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Pipeline foes stepping forward as hearing approaches

WILLIAMSFIELD – John Feltham does not want a CO2 pipeline built across his Knox County farmland. He doesn't even want the Navigator CO2 Ventures pipeline near his farm overlooking the Spoon River north of Williamsfield.

"No amount of money Navigator offers will return my land to its pre-pipeline state. Navigator wants to construct the Heartland Greenway Pipeline across slightly more than half a mile of our farm, through ground that is classified as highly erodible," Feltham said.

"Because of the damage the pipeline will cause to my farm, I am doing everything I can to prevent Navigator from constructing this pipeline."

And the retired U.S. Marine Corps colonel is not alone in his opposition. According to Hannah Lee Flath of the Illinois Sierra Club, five Illinois townships – most in the Springfield area – have filed resolutions opposing the pipeline heading into a Sept. 1 pre-hearing conference with the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC).

The ICC is a quasi-judicial body that is responsible for regulating several industries, as directed by the Illinois General Assembly. According to the 2011 Carbon Dioxide Transportation and Sequestration Act, the ICC must take local landowners' concerns and objections into account before approving a permit and allowing the use of eminent domain.

As a result of the filing, Navigator can contact landowners for easements. Certified letters have been sent to landowners along the proposed pipeline, which would transport liquified CO2 across 240 miles and 13 counties in western Illinois to be stored underground in Christian County.

Price hike

Galva council passes garbage price increase

GALVA – The Galva City Council voted
Monday night to approve a new 10-year

Monday night to approve a new 10-year contract with Eagle Enterprises for garbage and recycling that includes a 4 percent increase.

Final approval of the deal will be made at the September meeting. And there will be some changes.

The new contract begins Jan. 1, 2023, and all residents will get a 96-, 64- or 48-gallon container. The cost of a 96-gallon container is \$14.25 per household, per month; a 64-gallon container is \$13.25 per month and a 48-gallon container is \$12.25 per month. If a household needs more containers, an additional 96-gallon can will cost \$7.25 per month; a 64-gallon is \$6.50 per month and a 48-gallon is \$6 per month.

All weekly trash must be placed inside one of the containers. No bags can be put on the ground. Large items must be affixed with a sticker, which can be purchased at Galva

is president of a group called Citizens Against Heartland Greenway Pipeline, which filed a petition for leave to intervene last week. That's because the ICC will only hear objections from landowners or other legal "intervenors."

And Feltham feels strongly about intervening. He believes the pipeline will do long-term damage, despite Navigator's assurances that the Texas-based company will make every effort to return farmland to its previous condition.

"Essentially, it's the same principal as repairing a car after a wreck," Feltham said. "A wrecked, repaired car is never the same after the wreck."

Feltham also questions the effectiveness and motives of CO2 sequestration, has concerns about the storage site and worries about the dangers of a pipeline

"It's an eco-friendly masquerade," he said. "This is a mercenary, for-profit venture designed to make money off tax credits, selling CO2 for industrial use and probably trying to sell what are called carbon offsets."

Feltham also noted that while the pipeline so far has one Illinois customer, Galva's Quad County Corn Processors ethanol plant, most of the CO2 will be

piped to Illinois from Iowa, South Dakota, Minnesota and Nebraska.

But Feltham does not believe the pipeline's future is a certainty, which is why he is speaking out prior to the ICC's first hearing, which starts Sept. 1 at 11 a.m. in Springfield and is online at illinois.webex.com/meet/nicole.roth2.


The Illinois Farm Bureau (IFB) has not taken a stance on the pipeline.

"Now that Navigator has filed for approval of the Heartland Greenway carbon dioxide pipeline, IFB staff will review the filing and monitor the regulatory approval process before the ICC," said Richard Guebert Jr., IFB President. "IFB previously conducted landowner education meetings for our members along the pipeline's proposed route. The meetings helped our members understand how to work through the approval and easement negotiation process. We will continue to provide information to our members as the process continues."

Negative reaction to the pipeline is widespread in Iowa, where 36 of 56 Iowa counties the pipeline would pass through have filed objections with state regulators, according to the Iowa chapter of the Sierra Club.

A call to a Navigator spokesperson was not returned.

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

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

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

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Political theater part of Illinois State Fair

SPRINGFIELD – Along with fried foods, carnival rides and an 800pound cow made of butter, the Illinois State Fair is known for its political theater.

For the Statehouse press corps, it means we clear our schedules for at least two days in mid-August each year to take in the candidate stump speeches, hand shaking and oneliners. On that last front, the quips ranged from knee-slappers to browraisers.

One comment that falls into the latter category came from Republican attorney general candidate Thomas DeVore, the lawyer who gained statewide notoriety by suing Gov. JB Pritzker to challenge his executive order authority during the COVID-19 pandemic.

During his stump speech at Republican Day Thursday, DeVore took aim at Cook County State's Attorney Kim Foxx, a favorite target of many on the Republican ticket for her prosecutorial leniency.

"You make me attorney general, and if Kim Foxx won't prosecute 'em, I will," DeVore told the crowd. "And she better get to prosecuting or we'll figure out a way to prosecute

It's the type of comment Democratic Attorney General Kwame Raoul alluded to when he contended the AG's race "matters more than any time in American history."

Crime was also on gubernatorial candidate Darren Bailey's mind when the downstate farmer said for at least the third time in recent months that he believes Chicago is a "hellhole."

He doubled down when asked by reporters if he thinks most Chicagoans believe the same.

"Actually, I believe they do," he said. "Because it's unsafe. But it's going to change."

Pritzker, meanwhile, characterized the Bailey-led GOP as having been taken over by the "lunatic fringe."

While Bailey also criticized Pritzker's "soft hands" as compared to his work-worn "hands of a farmer" in a compelling contrast, the hellhole comment is the type of messaging that has made many in the GOP hesitant to even mention Bailey's name.

House Minority Leader Jim Durkin, of Western Springs, told members of the media he'd support the Republican ticket but wouldn't go as far as name-dropping Bailey for an endorsement.

Durkin said he's optimistic the record-high 106 Republican candi-

dates for the state House can make a dent in Democratic supermajorities, especially if candidates focus on economic conditions.

"The cost of living, inflation," he told me in an interview. "Those are the things on people's minds, and they've had enough."

Durkin also had one of the more memorable one-liners in characterizing the Democratic festivities at the Bank of Springfield Center, sometimes referred to by its initials, BOS.

"The only thing they should have done is removed the 'O' from the BOS because it was more of a BS center, because I could smell it all the way on I-55 when I was driving into town," he said.

While Durkin used the phrase "limousine liberals" to describe the majority party, "Democrats deliver" was a tagline put forth by the opposite side as they spoke of climate legislation, minimum-wage increases, a tax relief plan and other accomplishments.

Senate Majority Leader Don Harmon, of Oak Park, contrasted the two parties with alliteration as well.

"It has become clear to anyone paying any attention to Washington or Springfield that there's a party that whines and there's a party that works," he said.

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



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
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Jeffrey emerges just in time for Galva

GALVA – Mark Jeffrey is a busy man. But when Galva needed someone on short notice to coach high school football, he wasn't too busy to help.

Days before the start of practice earlier this summer, Jeffrey filled the Galva coaching void left after predecessor Tyler Nichols departed to become principal at Kewanee Wethersfield. Nichols coached the Wildcats to an 0-9 record last season, their first in eight-man football.

In mid-July, a second season was looking tenuous at best, so Galva athletics director Adam Norway took to Facebook to solicit potential coaches.

Turns out the ideal candidate might have been in Galva all along.

"I was on the chain gang last year, so I watched those guys every game," Jeffrey said. "Seemingly impossible odds, sticking it out, getting back up, keeping their heads up, cheering each other on.

"I kind of thought to myself, 'If I ever get the chance to coach those guys, I probably will.' Because that was probably the most impressive thing I've ever seen on the football field.' Nobody quit. Nobody bowed out. Those guys are some warriors."

Most players on Galva's roster last fall are back. For some, playing for Jeffrey isn't new. He has coached JFL in Galva, where he resides with his wife, Brenda, and their three children aged 13 and younger.

Jeffrey also was an assistant coach at Mid-County, a former football coop with ROWVA and Williamsfield.

"I was ecstatic. I loved it," senior quarterback/safety Jaxson Meier said when he heard about Jeffrey's new gig. "He coached me when I was little, fifth and sixth grade."

With his kids involved in local sports and a job at an alternative school in Atkinson, Jeffrey already had a full schedule. Jeffrey hadn't coached in a few years, he told Norway, and wasn't sure he knew how to organize a high school program.

But after domestic and perhaps divine intervention, the East St. Louis native – his wife is from Galva –put aside his trepidation.

"I'm a man of faith," he said. "I believe that sometimes you get the call. And when you get the call, you've just got to go. I had no idea how it was going to happen, but I was pretty

season, in five conferences the Illinois High School Association is overseeing. Those teams aren't eligible for the state playoffs.

Playing at all is a significant accomplishment for Galva, all things considered. But Jeffrey sees himself as no different than other busy folks in his adopted hometown.

"Some people say, 'Thanks for stepping up.' I don't see it as something that I saved," Jeffrey said. "I consider myself lucky to be a part of something like this. Because it's just carrying on that tradition of that small-town hard-work ethic – grab your lunch pail and don't complain."

Meier, for one, certainly isn't.
"He's always been a part of my

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Mercer County labeled as LTC favorite

Lincoln Trail Conference football coaches are pretty much in agreement on one thing this year: Mercer County is the league favorite.

But beyond many also picking Knoxville as a title contender, the LTC looks fairly wide open.

"Mercer returns quite a bit. Knox-ville doesn't return as much, but both are upper 300s (in terms of enrollment), and it gives you an advantage," Noard said. "Honestly, I think everybody else is kind of fighting to be at the top of the track of teams."

Mercer County faces a challenge in Week One, as it will play host to Farmington, which is favored to win the Prairieland Conference after going 11-1 and reaching the quarterfinals last year.

Princeville is another traditional

league contender and has the best turnout in Coach Jon Carruthers coaching career. But 35 of the 52 players are on the frosh-soph level. And several of the Princes varsity returnees are switching positions.

ROWVA-Williamsfield may be on the cusp of a breakthrough season, with key returnees and more depth. But like Stark County, R-W has not had much success in recent years and needs to learn how to win.

Monmouth United has 45 players out and gets to play six home games, but lost several key skill players and leaders from a playoff team.

Abingdon-Avon must replace 17 of 22 starting positions and may not play a home game until Week Five due to a new grass field.

Traditional league power Annawan-Wethersfield also suffered serious graduation losses.

Rebels have experience, but need wins

WYOMING – Experience is there for the Stark County football team just not much good experience.

So the challenge heading into a fairly balanced Lincoln Trail Conference season will be to flip the switch for a group of 11 seniors and 13 juniors who should see the bulk of varsity time.

"I think there is potential there. But it's a group that has not won a lot of football games on the field. And you kind of have to learn how to do that," said Coach Jade Noard, whose team has not made the playoffs since a 22year postseason streak ended in 2018. "We have some things that we're doing well. Until you see it on a Friday night, you never really know how well."

Stark County opens on the road at Nokomis today at 7 p.m. as a replacement game for Ridgewood, which has dropped into 8-man play. An independent team, Nokomis (enrollment 179.5) went 7-3 and made the playoffs last year – as did seven other teams on the Stark County schedule. The Redskins should prove a good measuring stick for the Rebels, as they seek to put a 1-8 campaign behind them.

One other schedule change is in Week Two, when the Rebels will face Abingdon-Avon at Galesburg High School on Saturday, Sept. 3 at 6 p.m. A-Town's new grass field is not year ready for play.

Seven starters are back on defense for Stark County, which has struggled to stop opponents in recent seasons.

"I think they understand defense was a deficiency for us and they are interested in changing that," Noard said. "We feel like we have a group that runs well and is quicker and should be an attack group, we hope."

A strength early looks to be a veteran secondary. Junior Matthew Bowser and senior Jordan McCauley saw time at cornerback while senior Daniel Kieser returns at free safety. Senior Ryne Hillan is switching to strong safety after playing linebacker last year.

"We feel pretty good about that group," Noard said. "They're all bigger and stronger than a year ago."

Returning at inside linebacker are seniors Charlie Rouse and Camren Watson. Four players are competing at outside linebacker: senior Xander

Swank and juniors Colton Wagenbach, Kaiden Libby and Avery Gerber.

The lone returnee on the d-line is senior nose guard Ethan Baxter (6-foot, 220 pounds), who figures to be flanked by senior Colby Stotler (6-6, 305) and junior Tanner Price (5-10, 270).

On offense, Stark County returns most of its experience at the skill positions. Kieser was leading rusher last season with 451 yards and 5.2 yards per carry. He was also the top receiver with nine catches for 137 yards and three scores. Noard has him penciled in to lead a strong corps of wide receivers, but expect Kieser to get his carries, too.

Throwing and handing the ball to Kieser will be junior Luke Rewerts, who saw time under center last fall.

"He's a smart kid who will make good decisions for us and he's a capable runner, as well," Noard said.

Other backs are senior Matthew Henry and sophomore Nolan Orwig.

"Henry is the fastest kid we have," Noard said. "He's a kid that if you can get him out in the open, I don't see many people catching him.

Other likely wideouts are returning starter senior Xander Swank (eight

catches, 76 yards in 2021), Wagenbach (six catches, 115 yards) and Bowser..

"We feel like we have good depth in our receiver spots beyond those four," Noard said. "We just don't have a lot of depth up front."

The left size of the offensive line is a big veteran group while the right side features quicker newcomers. Baxter is back at center while Price returns at left guard and Stotler is back at tackle. On the right side, Rouse (5-11, 175) and Watson (5-11, 180) should start.

"We have had the best off-season in a few years," said Noard, who is 121-63 at Stark County as a head coach since 2005. "Our varsity numbers are the highest in several years as well. It's a change for us that we're not having to play sophomores."

As for the Lincoln Trail, Noard sees Mercer County as the favorite, based on a strong returning class, and Knoxville the next strongest. Those two also have the LTC's biggest enrollments.

"Behind them I think there is a pack of teams trying to get some momentum towards a playoff berth," Noard said. "We hope to be in that pack and find
