Wyoming OKs cameras for **Thomas Park**

For The Prairie News WYOMING - The Wyoming City Council has approved the purchase of three new security cameras at the cost of \$3,845 in hopes of combatting alleged illegal drug dealing at the park.

The council heard from Wyoming resident Trent Frisby, who asked for cameras to be installed about the park to help eliminate illegal activities.

State Bank of Toulon representative Jodi Dienst addressed the council and reported that the bank has volunteered to conduct the Moonlight Madness parade on Friday, Nov. 18. Dienst asked the council for the parade route, which is starting at Duryea Park with a 7:30 p.m. lineup and 8 p.m. kickoff. The parade will start at Park Street, continue to Seventh Street heading south into the downtown area past Casey's and turn left onto Elm Street.

The council approved in a split vote with Kathy Hardy voting "no" the cap of \$1,500 on all city donations to organizations or individuals. A stipulation is that the requesting organization hold at least two fundraising events during the Continued on Page 2

School board approves work on SC campus

WYOMING – The Stark County school board approved improvements for both the Toulon and Wyoming campuses Monday

The board also held a public hearing on the fiscal year 2023 budget, which shows an anticipated end-of-year balance of \$10,123,561.

A new roof has been installed on the Wyoming Athletic Complex building.

Bids are to be let for the Toulon Junior High School parking lot expansion that will include grading the existing parking lot and top coating it with asphalt. The current lot will be expanded east toward the bus garage with an exit/entrance at the rear and east. There will be 35-45 new parking spaces added and the estimated cost is \$230,000 to \$280,000, with a \$50,000 matching grant available.

Bids will be let for the painting of the Toulon High School and Wyoming complex gymnasiums. A rough estimated cost of \$12,000 to \$18,000 for each gym is projected, plus \$10,000 for the main gym ceiling to be painted for a total project cost of between \$34,000-\$46,000.

Snow removal bids will be let for both school campuses for the 2022 winter season. A fuel bid was approved from AG View for \$3.17 per gallon gasoline and \$4.25 per gallon diesel fuel.

Information about running for the school board is now available from local county clerks as well as deadlines to run for the open school board seats in the Spring 2023 election.

An intergovernmental agreement with the Bradford School District was approved for the sending of Bradford students to either Bureau Valley High School or Stark County High School.

WYOMING – Spoon River Days will come back to Wyoming on Saturday, Oct. 8, after a 30-plus-year absence

Representative organizers Jon Knoblauch, Stacy Unhold and Amy Stutzman hope to make this event an annual celebration with its continuation next year, in June.

"Growing up here [in Wyoming] as a kid, we looked forward to this so much. The carnival, street dances – all the buzz and activities uptown really brought people together," Unhold said. "The parade used to be big - it was Pete Johnson's event. He organized the parade with a passion and was the leader of the Spoon River Days commit-

"It was just a fun event for our community," Unhold continued. "I think the time is right [to bring back Spoon River Days]. A lot of people miss it and there

are many people who want to get onboard and bring this back!"

Organizers say they are planning a family-oriented event with numerous activities for children and adults beginning with a 9:30 a.m. Kiddie Parade and the 10 a.m. main parade. The Kiddie Parade will organize in front of Wyoming Public Library, and the main parade will line up at the WyHi Center.



Also approved was the purchase for \$1,231 of LED lights for the downtown light poles - specifically near the school Sports Complex and two lights on Van Buren Street.

The council approved rescinding Ordinance 20/21-19 concerning a Wyoming TIF District 2 redevelopment agreement with AG View for its property on Route 17 west of Wyoming. AG View never signed an

agreement to be included.

Mayor Pat Maher stated that the City of Wyoming has received a second American Rescue Plan Act funding check of \$86,617.

The council approved selling a parcel of property located at 100 N. Galena Ave. for \$1,500 to a Wyoming property owner. The parcel is adjacent to Mallard Street. The ordinance selling the property will be voted on at the next council meeting.

Approved was \$3,900 to pay for the repair of the City Hall building's

rear exterior that is in disrepair. Gerard Tuck Pointing and Masonry Repair will provide the repair work.

Economic Development advisor Denny Rewerts submitted a written report that says Wyoming will close Sept. 30 on the property that is designated to be the new location for a Family Dollar/Dollar Tree business.

Finally, Water and Wastewater Plant Operator Greg McCauley's written report said, "work will be beginning soon for our wastewater plant project."



Illinois State Fair sets attendance record

By JERRY NOWICKI

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - The 2022 Illinois State Fair set an all-time attendance record with more than 636,700 visitors.

Weekend attendance increased by 95,000 from one year ago. Attendance topped 2021 overall by more than 160,000 and 2019 by more than 127,000. There was no fair in 2020 for the first time since World War II due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The 2022 fair brought in \$6.4 million in estimated revenue, which could be amended upward as more vendors report earnings, according to a news release. As it stands, it's just off a record of \$6.5 million set in 2019.

Grandstand events brought in \$2.3 million in revenue, up from the previous record of \$2.2 million. There were 48,104 grandstand tickets sold, putting this year's events fourth out of the past five in ticket sales.

"We were blessed with 11 days of great weather, which meant large crowds and even larger smiles for our fairgoers," Illinois State Fair Manager Rebecca Clark said in a

news release. "While it is great to have these amazing numbers, it was even better seeing so many people enjoying the Illinois State Fair.'

The news release noted \$58.1 million in construction at the fairgrounds will pick back up with the fair concluded. The renovations are funded by the state's Rebuild Illinois capital infrastructure program, including \$8.6 million in work on the multipurpose arena, which was closed this year due to the renova-

To the Electors of the State of Illinois:

The Illinois Constitution establishes a structure of government and laws for the State of Illinois. There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) a petition initiative may propose amendments limited to structural and procedural subjects contained in the Legislative Article. The people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Illinois Constitution before they become effective. The purpose of this document is to inform you of proposed changes to the Illinois Constitution and to provide you with a brief explanation and a summary of the arguments in favor of and in opposition to the proposed amendment.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ADD SECTION 25 TO ARTICLE I OF THE ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION ARTICLE I — BILL OF RIGHTS

SECTION 25. WORKERS' RIGHTS

(a) Employees shall have the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing for the purpose of negotiating wages, hours, and working conditions, and to protect their economic welfare and safety at work. No law shall be passed that interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment and work place safety, including any law or ordinance that prohibits the execution or application of agreements between employers and labor organizations that represent employees requiring membership in an organization as a condition of employment.

(b) The provisions of this Section are controlling over those of Section 6 of Article VII.

EXPLANATION

The proposed amendment, which takes effect upon approval by the voters, adds Section 25 to the Bill of Rights Article of the Illinois Constitution. The new section will guarantee workers the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively and to negotiate safety conditions, wages, hours, working conditions, and economic welfare. The amendment prohibits the passage of any new law within the State that restricts or prohibits workers from engaging in collective bargaining with their employer over wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment, like safety protocols or training.

Arguments In Favor of the Proposed Amendment

This amendment will protect workers' and others' safety. That includes guaranteeing nurses' right to put patient care ahead of profit and making sure construction workers can speak up when there's a safety issue. It will protect workers from being silenced when they call attention to food safety threats, shoddy construction, and other problems that could harm Illinoisans. This amendment protects firefighters and EMTs who put their lives on the line to protect Illinoisans. It means they get the training and safety equipment they need to do their jobs, and can speak out when they see a problem without fear of retaliation. This amendment will help our economy by putting more money in workers' pockets who join together and get raises. That will mean more money going into our communities and small businesses as people join the middle class with good-paying jobs.

Arguments Against the Proposed Amendment

A fundamental right provided to all citizens under the First Amendment of the United States Constitution is the right to free speech and freedom of association. This amendment prohibits any law or ordinance that allows union workers to choose whether they wish to be a member of the union or not. Under the 2018 United States Supreme Court decision Janus v. Illinois AFSCME, non-union government workers cannot be required to pay union dues as a condition of working in the public sector. Approval of this constitutional amendment will deny that protection to private sector workers. The amendment also states that lawmakers could never "interfere with, negate, or diminish" certain rights. These terms are broad and undefined and leave lawmakers without the ability to clarify through legislation. Our Illinois Constitution provides such protection to public employees. The result of that protection has been to squash efforts by state lawmakers and voters to address Illinois' pension fund deficits.

The new amendment would also prohibit from being passed any new law that interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment and workplace safety. At the general election to be held on November 8, 2022, you will be called upon to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

Galva would have committed an IHSA violation if it had played Parkview Christian, according to Anthony Mytas, the Yorkville school's athletics director. Parkview Christian had to redo its schedule to remove all IHSA opponents.

The game is considered a forfeit victory for Galva, according to Coach Mark Jeffrey. Instead of playing Friday, he and the Wildcats plan to travel to Oneida to watch ROWVA-Williamsfield play Mercer County. It'll provide an opportunity for team bonding, Jeffrey said.

It also will provide a couple of practice-free days and give some Galva players time to heal from injury. Among them is junior wide receiver/cornerback Carter DeVenney, who sustained a wrist injury in Week 3 and didn't play against Edwardsville Metro-East Lutheran.

"The bye week couldn't come at a better time," Jeffrey said. "We've got some guys that are banged up."

Galva (1-3) didn't have as many guys available to play as Metro-East Lutheran did. Rebels run over E-B

Rewerts runs for 181 yards, 3 TDs in 31-22 victory

WYOMING – In a 31-22
non-conference victory last
week over ElmwoodBrimfield, the Stark
County football team
might have startled the opposing coach. Maybe their
own coach, too.

Stark County's varied offense gave way to rushing, and plenty of it. Quarterback Luke Rewerts ran for three touchdowns and a season-high 181 yards.

Rewerts' total at Gary Johnson Field was among 391 rushing yards Stark County (3-1) amassed against E-B, which lost for the first time in four games this season.

"It was a little bit of a surprise to me that we were able to run for 400 yards," Stark County Coach Jade Noard said. "We made some adjustments up front, and I think our running backs did a good job of trusting our linemen. We kept having success running the football. We just stuck with it."

Stark County was coming off a 35-7 Lincoln Trail Conference loss to first-place Knoxville. Noard said his players corrected mistakes made in that game. Among them were turnovers and failure to prevent big plays.

E-B Coach Todd Hollis noticed something was different, based on Knoxvillegame video he watched. He also noticed Stark County wasn't the same team that beat Nokomis 49-21 in the season opener.

That game featured a nearequal mix of rushing and passing.

Hollis suggested the rushing Rebels caught him and his coaching staff off guard.

After the Trojans lost, Hollis offered his renewed opinion to Noard.

"I said, 'You are not the team you were Week 1 when you won big and Week 3 when you lost big," Hollis said. "They found their identity. All of a sudden, their linemen were coming forward and being physical."

That physicality helped Rewerts run for touchdowns on the Rebels' first two possessions. Meanwhile, the Trojans' first two possessions were three-downs-and-out.

"That was the momentum I don't really think we ever gave up," Noard said.

E-B cut its deficit to 24-22 in the fourth quarter, thanks to Bo Windish's 2-yard scoring run.

But on third down, Nolan Orwig's 67-yard run *Continued on Page 11*
