Master carver visits Princeville Reactions his reward

For The Weekly Post PRINCEVILLE – Candy took a backseat to pumpkins for Joe Adkins one Halloween as he was trick-or-treating with his friends in the 1980s. Spotting a jack-olantern more intricate and detailed than the ones he was used to seeing, he lingered to talk to the lady of the house while his friends moved on.

Adkins was "mesmerized" as the lady explained how the carving was done through the use of stencils. This was the beginning of a hobby that has spanned more than 20 years. Today, Adkins is a "master carver" of giant pumpkins.

A resident of Wheaton, Adkins usually sticks closer to the Chicago area than years past to showcase his skills. Even so, last Sunday afternoon, Adkins traveled to rural Princeville to carve a giant pumpkin at The Pumpkin Place. On this sunny, albeit breezy day, Adkins carved a bewhiskered face into a 571-pound pumpkin to the delight of onlookers ranging from small child to older adults.

From his beginning with stencils and books on carving, Adkins turned to online videos and DVDs. He said watching tutorials of Ray Villafane influenced his

Stark Co. Historical Society sets Oct. 8 for grand opening

TOULON – The Stark County Illinois Historical Society has designated Saturday, Oct. 8, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. as a grand opening of displays and museum artifacts. The society was reorganized approximately three and a half years ago after having been closed since about 2010.

Interest in revitalizing the organization brought the society "back to life" along with a concerted effort to refurbish the group's two-story Victorian home that was donated by the McKeigan sisters and is home to various historic displays and items of Stark County. The society will have Dr. Hall's office building open for touring as well as a new Ag display building that is located at 318 W. Jefferson St., in Toulon.

"All of a sudden there was a resurgence to reopen it [the society and buildings]," President Jeanne Currier Ryan said. "Karen Ehnle Krans really worked hard with Bluniers, of Eureka, to build on this [Ag] addition. We had the funds for the building but are reserving funds for monthly expenditures in the years to come."

Fundraising will pay for future programs and other enhancements to the buildings.

In two and one-half years, there have been 150 or so *Continued on Page 7*

Galva discusses cemetery plots

For The Prairie News GALVA – The Galva City Council discussed unpaid cemetery plots in the Galva Cemetery at Monday night's meeting.

There is an ordinance on the books that anyone who purchased a plot had six months to pay for it with 6 percent interest. City Administrator David Dyer said something needs to be changed as one woman only paid \$100 and then died and the city did not get paid for the remainder.

First ward alderman Jamie Hopping said he would think the family would be responsible.

"The city is acting like a bank," Dyer said. "Mowing and string trimmers don't work for free." Dyer said the city usually hires high schoolers and pays \$12 per hour, a cost that will increase over the next three years until it reaches \$15 per hour. Lots cost \$1,000 at Galva Cemetery, and are usually sold in pairs, though there are also single lots.

No action was taken Monday night.

Third ward alderman Dougie Anderson asked about a house belonging to Justin West on Southeast First Street. The attorney said it will be in court this Thursday. The house has been in poor shape for years and the plan is to tear it down. *Continued on Page 7*

Continued from Page 1 current style and what elevated him to "master carver" status. As he approaches autumn each year, he practices his carving techniques for two months using sculpting tools rather than knives.

Although Adkins has taken requests from people – like the face of Mike Ditka - he said specific requests are his least favorite.

He likes to take a big pumpkin, say 400 pounds, and work with it to reveal the shape underneath. Someone may ask him what he's going to do with the pumpkin in front of him and he'll reply, "Come back in an hour and we'll find out together." This size of pumpkin takes him about 1-1/2 hours to finish, but he also like even bigger pumpkins in the 1,800pound range. These huge pumpkins may take 6-7

hours to complete.

What Adkins likes most about pumpkin carving are the reactions. At Halloween, he keeps an ear open for those passing his house. Hearing a child say, "Daddy, that's the coolest thing I've ever seen!" gives him a lot of joy. He said even adults find his creations "magical," and wonder whether or not the carving is on a real pumpkin or a fake.

"I love that," he said. Even the challenges of weather, critters, and vandalism don't get this master carver down. He knows how to be gentle to keep them solid in pumpkin-withering weather. He works around chipmunks and other critters curious about his pumpkins, plus the tiny humankind who sometimes like to stick a hole in them. He then asks himself, "What do I do with that?" He simply "adjusts, goes with the flow" to create something

that turns out even better.

Once, a kid smashed his pumpkin with a baseball bat. In a very positive way of "I'll show that kid," he turned the pumpkin around and had another original carving in three hours. He hoped that kid came around and was surprised.

One side aspect to pumpkin carving that provides Adkins pleasure is the giving and selling of pumpkin seeds. He said he is amazed at how much people will pay for a seed that has the potential of growing a giant pumpkin. At the upper end, he said he's seen people pay as much as \$1,500 for one seed. He sells seed but also gives them away at Halloween. He said it's "cool to hear stories of people who grow pumpkins" and that some people come to his house on Halloween just to get the approximate 500 he gives away.

Much debate on student debt relief plan

To the Editor:

A recent letter criticized the federal plan to forgive all or part of some student debt ("Student Debt Relief Not Among Nation's Needs," Sept. 9). There is much to debate in the debt relief plan.

Certainly, those who took out the loans consented to pay them off. They made a promise; shouldn't they keep it? If they are released from their obligation, it seems unfair to previous borrowers who endured the repayment process.

However, recent student borrowers have faced new obstacles. The "Great Recession" that began in 2009 had lasting effects on the economy.

Recovery, though steady, was slow. Wages grew slowly, and barely kept up with costs of housing and other basics. Many businesses added few jobs despite the recovery. Opportunity lagged for new graduates. All the while, college costs kept rising, at both private and state schools.

Students who did not finish col-



lege and those who did not find high-paying jobs have struggled to repay their loans, even when the amount was in the \$10,000 to \$20,000 range, or less.

Even if they can pay the monthly minimum, because of high interest some keep falling further into debt. It appears that the debt relief plan

would especially help these borrowers.

Our economy should benefit if more people can spend money on things other than endless loan repayment. Is it fair if some today get this special break? No, not perfectly fair.

Still, it seems reasonable, and it's seasoned with mercy. Those of us who pray on Sundays that our debts be forgiven might see a connection

here.



Galva school board passes deficit budget

For The Prairie News GALVA – The Galva School board passed a \$503,534 deficit budget at Monday night's meeting.

Revenue is estimated at \$8,431,435 with expenses of \$8,934,969.

There was no public comment at a budget hearing to open the meeting and the board unanimously passed the budget.

The district current enrollment is 489 students compared to 501 students last year. The largest class is kindergarten with 47 student and the smallest class is fifth and sixth grade with 29 students each.

Superintendent Joe Becker reported on the ESSER funds that the district received from COVID 19. Galva received \$1,837,607 that was used for new windows in both schools, new restrooms, nursing supplies, cleaning supplies and other items.

The district has about \$272,367 remaining. The board approved the







Rebels keep rolling

Playoffs within reach after 33-0 over United

For The Prairie News MONMOUTH – With scores on four of five first-half possessions last Friday, the Stark County football team rolled to an efficient 33-0 win at Monmouth United.

Quarterback Luke Rewerts ran for Stark County's first two scores and then hooked up with wideout Daniel Rewerts for two more touchdowns. Sandwiched in between was Nolan Orwig's 2-yard plunge to paydirt.

The victory moves Stark County to 4-1 overall and 2-1 in the Lincoln Trail Conference.

"We were a little worried with what (United) had done against Knoxville the week before, when they were up on Knoxville at halftime," Stark County Coach Jade Noard said. "We kept them from big plays and I think that's what we've been pretty good at this year. If somebody is going to score on us, they have to do it on long drives."

Instead of mounting long drives, United (0-5, 0-5 LTC) suffered four turnovers, including Kieser's sixth interception of the season. Kieser returned the pick to the United 5-yard line to set up Stark County's second score.

The Rebels defense held strong in a

scoreless second half and, for the game, limited United to 2.6 yards per rushing attempt and just 31 yards passing. Camren Watson led the defense with seven tackles and Braden Lindley added six stops.

That helped end United's two-game win streak against Stark County and boosted the Rebels' record in the alltime series to 14-6.

The victory and the team's continued improvement this season has moved the Rebels closer to this year's top goal: returning to the playoffs. Stark County faces ROWVA-Williamsfield tonight at Gary Johnson Field with a chance to earn its first playoff berth since 2017.

"To have a shot to accomplish that in Week 6 is a pretty awesome thing," Noard said. "I think it should be a pretty good matchup. There are lot of similarities between us (and ROWVA). They didn't win a lot of games last year either and we are both playing better this year."

R-W (3-2, 2-1) lost to Macomb and Mercer County so far this season and was competitive in both games and R-W Coach Grant Gullstrand said Stark County's diversified offense is similar to what his team saw in those losses.

Rewerts has emerged as a dual threat for Stark County and his run-

ning has surpassed expectations.

"I thought he could be a pretty good runner, but I would say he's even run a little better than we imagined," Noard said.

In fact, the same has been true for the entire Rebels team, which has played with increasing confidence, Noard said.

"From when we took the field in Week 1 to right now, our confidence level has gone way up. We were a little unsure of ourselves in Week 1," Noard said. "Coming off the Elmwood win, that was big for us." More good news for Stark County
