

Mallett to get trial for alleged thefts

TOULON – Thomas P. Mallett, 50, of Vero Beach, Fla., has demanded a jury trial after being arrested Aug. 16 for allegedly possessing a stolen vehicle and burglary of another vehicle on Aug. 15 at 11562 Modena Rd., Wyoming.

Mallett appeared in Stark's Circuit Court last Friday only to waive his right to a preliminary hearing and to plead not guilty to the charges filed against him. Mallett asked for and received a jury trial, which was set for Nov. 14.

In court, Mallett said he has no money to post bond. His Public Defender Robert M. McBride requested a personal recognizance bond, which was granted by Circuit Judge Bruce P. Fehrenbacher. Mallett was then released from custody after the court appearance.

Mallett's next court appearance is Oct. 28 for a scheduling conference. Besides the felony charges of possessing a stolen vehicle and burglary, Mallett has been charged with felony aggravated assault and felony aggravated battery while he was in custody at the Stark County Iail

Arson trial set

Man faces 6 felony charges

TOULON – John Henry Cramer, 59, of Pekin appeared in Circuit Court Friday, and has a bench trial scheduled for Oct. 11.

Cramer has charges filed against him in Stark County of Class X felony aggravated arson, Class 1 felony residential arson and four Class 4 felony counts of aggravated cruelty to animals.

Cramer pleaded not guilty to all charges on May 13.

Cramer was arrested shortly after a Dec. 22, 2021, incident in Bradford where it is alleged Cramer set fire to a residence on West Main Street near Bonita Avenue. Two people escaped from the residence, but four dogs died as a result of the fire and smoke. The residence was also a dog-grooming business. Other dogs were taken to the Wyoming Veterinary Services for treatment.

Cramer posted 10 percent of his \$175,000 bond on Jan. 14. Cramer has Stark County Public Defender Robert M. McBride as his legal counsel.

Pawpaws ripe for the picking, fall mushrooms soon to come

"Pickin' up pawpaws, put 'em in my pocket ... save 'em for a rainy day."

The old children's folk song always runs through my head as I walk through wet and raindrenched patches of bottomland woods in September. I remember fondly walking in the creek and river bottoms with my mother singing the song in the early fall as we sniffed out the sweet banana-like scent of ripe pawpaws.

I can almost always smell pawpaws before seeing them. The fruits have a sweet, almost banana/melon-like scent, unlike anything else you would typically expect to find in the damp woods. That sweet, slightly fermented scent means a pawpaw tree is nearby.

It's the time of year for pawpaws to start ripening and falling. Pawpaws always seem to ripen right behind the first early flights of teal that come balled up and blasting into the same low potholes and damp places where the pawpaw trees thrive.

Right behind the teal, right ahead of the hen of the woods, and right alongside the elderberries – that's the mantra for looking for pawpaws throughout much of Illinois. If you are lucky, your pawpaw hunt will also net fall mushrooms. Keep

your eyes open for chicken of the woods, oysters, chanterelles or even an early hen of the woods. I am always surprised by the number of people who, while familiar with the old song "Picking up Pawpaws," had no idea the fruit existed. Pawpaws have an interesting historical aspect. Thomas Jefferson had pawpaws at Monticello and when he was minister to France in 1786, he had pawpaw seeds shipped over to friends in France.

Lewis and Clark wrote in their journals about finding and eating pawpaws. The journal entries indicated that they were most fond of the fruit. During their 1806 expedition, they relied on pawpaws when other provisions ran low.

Ripe pawpaws don't last long in the woods. Virtually every four-footed creature likes to dine on them. I've often seen a stack of them tucked into a brush pile or against a log by some enter-





bruised areas. Don't worry about bruises – they can easily be trimmed away and usually don't impact the inner sweet goodness.

Pawpaws have a sweet, creamy, almost banana custard-like taste and texture. They are good simply split open and scooped out with a spoon, made in a custard sauce, pies or cakes – the list of culinary uses for the pulp is long.

Just scooping it out of the rind with a spoon (or fingers) and slurping it up is my favorite way to consume pawpaws. I can never wait until I get home for the first taste of the season – and quickly split open the first few for a snack right then and there.

Fun facts about pawpaws

- The fruit is also known as the American custard apple and Missouri banana.
- Largest edible fruit native to the U.S.
- Most commonly found along rivers and creeks in moist bottomland forests.
- Blossoms of the pawpaw tree smelling like rotten meat to attract the single species of fly that pollinates them.
- Pawpaws will only last a few days at room temperature, barely a week in the fridge.
- Pawpaws are higher in protein and fat than bananas, apples and oranges and are a source of vitamin C, potassium, calcium, riboflavin, niacin, and manganese.
- Folklore says the seed may forecast winter weather in similar fashion to persimmon seeds.

The Illinois Constitution establishes a structure of government and laws for the State of Illinois. There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) a petition initiative may propose amendments limited to structural and procedural subjects contained in the Legislative Article. The people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Illinois Constitution before they become effective. The purpose of this document is to inform you of proposed changes to the Illinois Constitution and to provide you with a brief explanation and a summary of the arguments in favor of and in opposition to the proposed amendment.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ADD SECTION 25 TO ARTICLE I OF THE ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION ARTICLE I — BILL OF RIGHTS

SECTION 25. WORKERS' RIGHTS

(a) Employees shall have the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing for the purpose of negotiating wages, hours, and working conditions, and to protect their economic welfare and safety at work. No law shall be passed that interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment and work place safety, including any law or ordinance that prohibits the execution or application of agreements between employers and labor organizations that represent employees requiring membership in an organization as a condition of employment.

(b) The provisions of this Section are controlling over those of Section 6 of Article VII.

EXPLANATION

The proposed amendment, which takes effect upon approval by the voters, adds Section 25 to the Bill of Rights Article of the Illinois Constitution. The new section will guarantee workers the fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively and to negotiate safety conditions, wages, hours, working conditions, and economic welfare. The amendment prohibits the passage of any new law within the State that restricts or prohibits workers from engaging in collective bargaining with their employer over wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment, like safety protocols or training.

Arguments In Favor of the Proposed Amendment

This amendment will protect workers' and others' safety. That includes guaranteeing nurses' right to put patient care ahead of profit and making sure construction workers can speak up when there's a safety issue. It will protect workers from being silenced when they call attention to food safety threats, shoddy construction, and other problems that could harm Illinoisans. This amendment protects firefighters and EMTs who put their lives on the line to protect Illinoisans. It means they get the training and safety equipment they need to do their jobs, and can speak out when they see a problem without fear of retaliation. This amendment will help our economy by putting more money in workers' pockets who join together and get raises. That will mean more money going into our communities and small businesses as people join the middle class with good-paying jobs.

Arguments Against the Proposed Amendment

A fundamental right provided to all citizens under the First Amendment of the United States Constitution is the right to free speech and freedom of association. This amendment prohibits any law or ordinance that allows union workers to choose whether they wish to be a member of the union or not. Under the 2018 United States Supreme Court decision Janus v. Illinois AFSCME, non-union government workers cannot be required to pay union dues as a condition of working in the public sector. Approval of this constitutional amendment will deny that protection to private sector workers. The amendment also states that lawmakers could never "interfere with, negate, or diminish" certain rights. These terms are broad and undefined and leave lawmakers without the ability to clarify through legislation. Our Illinois Constitution provides such protection to public employees. The result of that protection has been to squash efforts by state lawmakers and voters to address Illinois' pension fund deficits.

Wildcats win

First all-Galva FB victory since 2006

GALVA – It took a
while, but Galva finally
won a football game under
its own name and colors.

The host Wildcats overcame a halftime deficit and 16 years of futility to beat Peoria Heights 48-28 in an 8-man game Sept. 1.

Heights also was the victim the last time an all-Galva team won – 26-14 in 2006, according to local sports historian Jason Bates. Before last week, the most recent Galva football win was 13 years ago over Biggsville West Central, 41-32. That was a coop with Williamsfield. The 2009 and 2006 victories were in the 11-man format.

In recent years, Galva and Billtown joined ROWVA in the Mid-County co-op. This year, the Galva 8-man season was in doubt almost until the start of practice. Galva had difficulty finding a head coach, but local resident/educator Mark Jeffrey agreed to do it.

From that to a convincing victory in less than a month isn't shabby. Particularly after the Wildcats' openingweek loss, by 40 points at Cambridge Ridgewood.

"It feels a little bit surreal," Jeffrey said. "The win doesn't feel surreal, but the way we played the first week and the way we played (vs. Heights), it was probably more than nightand-day.

"These guys are special. They learned so much that first week, but learning it is one thing and putting it into play is another. That's a difficult thing to do."

Against Heights, Galva led 12-0 after one quarter. Jett Olson scored on a 2-yard run, and Cameron O'Brien fell on a ball in the end zone after a fumble.

"The ref came over and told me this is the first time you've held a lead in 12 years or something like that," Jeffrey said. "I'm like, 'What? That's crazy."

The lead didn't last. Heights, playing its season opener, scored on three

consecutive second-quarter drives to lead 20-12 at intermission.

But Galva scored three times in the third quarter to take a lasting lead. Carter DeVenney's 49-yard run and the ensuing two-point conversion tied it. Then came Jaxson Meier's 1-yard score.

A second-half ability to neutralize Heights passing helped Galva, Jeffrey said.

"We talked to our defensive ends about getting a good shove on a guy," he said. "We told them football is just a game of adjustments. The team that can make the most adjustments is likely to win the game. Ridgewood ran the ball every single play. We weren't used to defending

the pass at all."

Now, Galva is getting used to victory – and the accompanying spoils.

The Heights game was played on a Thursday night. At school Friday, some parents ordered lunchtime pizza for the players. Jeffrey's wife, Brenda, brought ice-cream sandwiches to practice.

But the coach suggested he won't let that victorious brain freeze go to the Wildcats' heads. Not with a home game looming Saturday morning against Bushnell-Prairie City.

"If you chase for rewards, you're not going to get them," Jeffrey said. "But if you stay humble and do your job, the rewards will come to you."
