Two candidates are running for Stark County Sheriff. Here are a series of questions and answers from the two candidates.

Question: Why are you running for Stark County Sheriff?

**Chief Deputy Chuck Deme**treon: The Stark County Sheriff's Office needs change. It's currently not being run properly. Strong leadership is the first step in change. We need a hands-on sheriff during day-to-day operations who's available in the office and on the road.

As Chief Deputy I take on an excessive amount of responsibilities and tasks that are not given due credit. The budget needs to be strictly monitored so there are no excuses for being over budget and, if so, have legitimate reason

and explanation.

Sheriff Steve Sloan: Law enforcement is so much more than making arrests and writing tickets. We hold hands as we give hard news to loved ones and we handle with compassion some of the worst events in people's lives. I love Stark County. I grew up here and raised my family here. I enjoy people and being part of a community where we know our neighbors and care about people.

Q: What goals do you have if elected sheriff?

Sloan

Demetreon: Adjusting dispatcher shifts to reduce excessive and unnecessary overtime. Hire more deputies for more area coverage and add more deputies to help with the safety of deputies who are currently by themselves. This will also help with our response time for calls for service. Secure a K-9 program to help with the drug problem. Strictly review the budget to manage spending.

Sloan: I am committed to community policing, continuing food drives in all communities with

food banks, and getting the E-911 center up and running where all Stark County first responders, police, fire and ambulance will have access to immediate information in locating people during emergency and non-emergency situations.

Q: What do you believe is the most prevalent crime in Stark County?

**Demetreon**: I believe drugs and thefts would be the biggest problem.

Sloan: Stark County, like so many communities, is having problems with drug use and property thefts.

Q: What will you do to reduce the crime rate in Stark County?

**Demetreon**: To reduce the crime rate, I would, as mentioned before, seek to hire more deputies for better coverage in the

county. Along with that, I would work on getting a K-9 program to better serve the department with apprehending individuals distributing or using illegal drugs. I would have an active role with the deputies to offer any assistance during active investigations and to assist in any way possible. My connection with surrounding counties and as an active member with the Henry County SWAT team will offer huge assets for our department.

Sloan: Twenty-four-hour police patrols in our county is top priority. Stark County also works with a larger task force as needed to aid in stopping drug traffic. Reducing crime also takes community involvement as in, if you see something that doesn't look right, say something to the police. I encourage the public also Continued on Page 2

## **Bradford** arson case underway

TOULON – A 59-year-old former Bradford man, now living in Pekin, appeared in Stark County Circuit Court on Oct. 11 for the start of his bench trial for arson that occurred in December of 2021. Circuit Court Judge Bruce P. Fehrenbacher presided.

John Henry Cramer was charged last year with six counts in connection to an arson case involving people and numerous dogs who were present at a dog grooming residence located at 405 W. Main St. in Bradford. Cramer was charged with a Class X felony aggravated arson, Class 1 felony residential arson and four Class 4 felony counts of aggravated cruelty to animals.

In court testimony on Tuesday, Cramer Continued on Page 6

Continued from Page 1 to deter criminals by using video cameras on their property and to always lock up homes and autos.

Q: Describe your law enforcement background.

**Demetreon**: I started my law enforcement career at the Stark County Sheriff's Office 19 years ago. In those 19 years, I started as road deputy to Sergeant and now Chief Deputy/ Deputy Coroner. I am currently active on the Henry **County Special Operations** Squad, which has endless resources for high-risk situations. I have obtained many certifications including Firearms Instructor, Police Strategy and Tactics, Police Tactical Firearms, Taser Instructor re-certification and Patrol Rifle instructor. Also, Public Agency Training, Normal, Illinois: National Criminal Justice – manage the property and evidence room and child death investigation: child death scene to court. Illinois Law Enforcement Training and Standards Board, Springfield, Illinois: Basic COB/SWAT course, comprehensive DUI awareness, Illinois code and law enforcement defensive driving for Sedans, SUVs and Pick-ups. Alice Training

Sloan: I was hired at the Stark County Sheriff's Office on Dec. 7, 1978, by Sheriff Kenneth (Buck) Dison and I was enrolled in the Illinois State Police Academy, in Springfield, Illinois where I graduated

from police training. I have completed state-mandated 24 hours plus any additional continuing police education and training every year since 1978 for law enforcement as Sheriff, Chief of Police and also as Stark County coroner 24 hours mandated training and continuing education starting in 2016. The mandated hours are accumulated through many training sessions throughout the year.

Q: What can be done to increase deputy's hourly coverage with current budget constraints?

Demetreon: The deputy's hourly coverage has been a problem for years. Since I have taken over the deputy schedule, I was able to secure 24-hour coverage for the county by implementing 12-hour shifts. Stark County has never had 24-hour coverage until now.

Sloan: It is a financial balancing act to provide 24-hour coverage without paying overtime per budget constraints. Twenty-four-hour coverage is a must, plus there is always an officer on call to aid assistance or back up the officer on duty.

Q: What is your view on the changing law for law enforcement officials that puts restrictions on law officers? i.e.: The "No cash bail" legislation.

**Demetreon**: The no cash bail coming in January will be a huge burden for law enforcement and the citizens. The new legislation will not hold offenders accountable.

**Sloan**: Jan. 1, 2023, the IL SAFE-T act, ironically named, will then charge and release criminals without cash bail in cases of second-degree murder, rape, kidnapping, arson, robbery and many other offenses. The climate in which these laws were

*Q*: What can be done to keep deputies from leaving Stark County after they are trained here?

**Demetreon**: Retaining all Sheriff's Office employees is important. We've lost deputies and jail staff for years to surrounding counties due to lack of competitive salaries and benefits. Stark County salaries are starting to compare, and health insurance benefits are now being offered. My strong leadership and willingness to lead by example has proven to the current staff that I would not ask them to do anything that I wouldn't do myself. Honesty and respect go a long way. If I'm elected sheriff, my top priority will be to ensure deputies have the proper resources and training needed to protect the community and have sufficient back up.

Sloan: The Stark County Sheriff's department has historically had issues with employee retention. The Sheriff and Chief Deputy are management employees of the department and pay approval is negotiated with County Board's approval. The road deputies and dispatches/jailors receive union representation in negotiating their union wage and benefits package with the County Board. Stark County does not pay sign on bonuses and cannot compete with bigger departments' pay scales.

Q: Where did you grow up and what schools have you graduated from?

**Demetreon**: I moved to Toulon when I was 11 and grew up there, graduating from Stark County High School, in 1995. I attended the Police Training

Academy through the University of Illinois, obtaining my law enforcement certification, in 2004.

Sloan: I grew up in Wyoming. I attended Wyoming Grade and Wyoming High Schools where I graduated, in 1977.

Q: Would you like to add something?

**Demetreon**: I would like to close with it has been an honor to serve this community for the past 19 years. I will not take being sheriff of this county for granted and will hold the sheriff's office employees and myself to the highest standard that the community can be proud of.

Sloan: I was appointed Sheriff in December of 2016, and I wanted to increase coverage hours for deputies and office staff and to have a resolution in place for prisoner booking fees, as there wasn't one. I was quickly thrust into securing E911 services as required by the state of Illinois as it had not been started when mandated. I traveled to all the bordering counties to meet with their system boards on numerous occasions in an attempt for Stark County to be allowed on their E911 telephone system managing boards. I also had to update the state via a letter monthly outlining progress in getting on an E911 system. Five and a half years of working on this came to fruition when Peoria County agreed to work with Stark County and the State awarded Stark County a 2.4 million dollar grant for the construction of an E911 center and I continue to go to the weekly E911 meetings on all aspects of build and technology that goes into

## Nitrogen use has farmers in climate change debate

It usually goes without notice or comment, but three of the planet's key elements – carbon, nitrogen, and oxygen – sit like ducks in row as Element Six, Seven, and Eight, respectively, on the Periodic Table.

None is more important than the others but if there's a first among equals it would be nitrogen, as a prescient report from Canada's National Farmers Union (NFU-C) pointed out in August.

The reason for nitrogen's importance is elegantly simple: it is an "essential part of DNA, RNA, and all amino acids" which are the "key building blocks to the metabolisms of humans, other

animals, plants, and all life."

Equally important, the 76-page report emphasizes, "Nitrogen... (is the) key to photosynthesis, the foundation of virtually all Earth's food chains, natural and agricultural."

That emphasis cannot be overstated, notes Darrin Qualman, the report's author, because "Human population, and thus the size and pace of our global economy are functions of nitrogen flows."

Today, however, there's barely enough natural nitrogen in our biosphere to sustain one-half of the Earth's nearly eight billion people. But humanity survives, even thrives, because of our cleverness: we discovered how to make "synthetic nitrogen" and that became life's massive game changer.

It's also a climate changer because "Nitrous oxide, N2O, the main GHG [or greenhouse gas] re-

sulting from the use of nitrogen fertilizer, is one of the three main drivers of planetary warming," right behind carbon dioxide and methane.

Pound for pound, however, "N2O has a warming effect approximately 300 times that of CO2." Worse, "with an atmospheric residence period of more than 100 years, N2O emitted today will ... disrupt the climate well into the 22nd century."

That we are using more nitrogen than our biosphere can handle and that this extra N is a key GHG driver has put nitrogen and one of its biggest users, agriculture, squarely in the gunsights of climate-change advocates.

And not just crop farmers where synthetic fertilizers are critical inputs in grain production, but also livestock farmers like those in the Netherlands, whose 1.6 million dairy cows are sizable contributors to Europe's nitrogen emissions.

Indeed, the Netherlands recently adopted the European Union's recommended 50 percent cut in N2O emissions as a principle method to address climate change. That move, understandably, angered farmers who, reported the New York Times Aug. 20, have "set fire to hay and manure along highways, dumped trash on roads ... and blockaded food distribution centers with tractors" to register their fury.

The NFU-C report anticipates this well-founded anger and addresses it straight on. "(F)armers are not doing anything wrong" by using fertilizer, it stresses. "Our levels of nitrogen use are functions ... of the core economic, material, and food flows and patterns ... driven by concerted corporate and government policies at the highest levels."

In short, our personal, national, and international fear of hunger dictates a food system where "farmers are embedded in a multi-trilliondollar system that pushes for everhigher yields, production, exports, [and] agribusiness profits" in a "ceaseless drive to endless increase."

Acknowledging that fact won't make it easier or less "risky" for farmers to "renounce fertilizers and step outside [this] economic logic... Instead, the rules of the game must be changed," writes Qualman. "Incentives need to be altered. Market power must be rebalanced... We must get less of what we need from industry and more from biology."

If, for example, he suggests, Canada "rolled back" its nitrogen fertilizer use "by perhaps one-third" to "the tonnage [used] in the period 2008-2010" there would be "significant net benefits" for farmers and the environment.

But farmers can't foot the entire bill for needed changes in fertilizer use that would be wise for both farms and the environment, says Qualman in a telephone interview. "These significant costs would be shared by the government" because the key benefit, "a better environment," would benefit all.

And this isn't a "for or against," fight because "it is likely that most farmers, other citizens, and policymakers will be against continuing [nitrogen's] massive overuse."

If, of course, we don't want to cook our own goose, er, duck, first.

Fehrenbacher granted the continuance to Nov. 9 at

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10:30 a.m. after Stark County State's Attorney Caroline Borden-Campion indicated that she wanted a shorter period than the initial date of Dec. 2. During the bench trial

Borden-Campion called Cramer's wife Jamie D. Cramer, Thaddeus Ingels and State Fire Marshall Special Agent Eric Duckworth to each testify on behalf of the prosecution.

Jamie Cramer testified that she received text messages from John Cramer after they had an argument at a local Bradford bar on Dec. 20, 2021, in which he texted that he "was going to burn her house down" and "to get Megan (Jamie's sister) out of the house."

She additionally testified that she was staying at a friend's home after the Dec. 20 argument and returned to her house to find

that it had been set on fire and that fire and police personnel were present at the site.

Thaddeus Ingels testified that he was in Bradford to pick up his brother for work during the early morning hours of Dec. 21 and saw that the house at 405 West Main Street was on fire. He said that he saw Jamie Cramer's sister Megan "covered in soot and that she was coming out of the garage of the residence."

Megan told Ingels that "John lit the house on fire" and that there were "dogs still in the burning house."

Special Agent Duckworth testified that he spoke with Jamie Cramer and interviewed her as he began his investigation on Dec. 21. He also talked with John Cramer at the Stark County Sheriff's Of-

Duckworth said he read Cramer his Miranda Rights and testified that Cramer denied involvement at first, but later admitted, "that he set the fire."


Cramer said that he helped Megan out of the house and into the garage.

The dogs that were in the burning house were taken to the Wyoming Veterinary Service, in Wyoming. Dr. Lynn Keller treated the dogs for smoke inhalation, but four dogs were pronounced dead.

A Class X felony is punishable with 6-30 years prison, a Class 1 felony is punishable with 4-15 years in prison and Class 4 felonies are one to three years in prison for each count. Sentencing will likely occur Nov. 9 for the counts Cramer pleaded guilty to last Tuesday.

## Woman arrested after body found in Maquon

MAQUON – A woman was arrested Tuesday in connection with a dead body found last week in a storage unit in southern Knox County.

Marcy L. Oglesby, 50, of Maquon was accused of concealment of death, a felony, according to the Knox County Sheriff's Office. To be released from jail, Oglesby would have to pay \$1,000 toward her bond.

The body was found Oct. 7 among storage units at 105 E. Third St. in Maquon. An autopsy didn't determine the cause of death, according to Brad Davis, a sheriff's-office detective.

"The body was in too much of a state of decomposition to be sure," Davis said Tuesday, before Oglesby's arrest was announced. "We're hoping the DNA (testing) will give us what we need."

Dental records also might be used to help identify the body, according to Davis.

Law-enforcement officials were summoned about 6 p.m. to the storage unit after the sheriff's office received a complaint about a suspicious odor. The unit owner opened it but told deputies the smell was from a dead opossum, according to a news release.

Deputies asked the owner to open a large box inside the unit. At that point, the owner told them the box contained a body. Knox County investigators and Illinois State Police Crime Scene Investigation officials were called to the scene and opened the box after obtaining a search warrant. Decomposed human remains were found inside.

The unit owner was detained, then for unspecified medical reasons was transported to OSF Saint Mary Medical Center in Galesburg. It

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## Weed scientists criticize EPA's proposed rules

BLOOMINGTON - Weed researchers are challenging proposed federal restrictions on a common weed control ingredient, arguing that the rules could reduce yields and increase herbicide resistance.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in June unveiled new concentration limits on atrazine to stop runoff from harming aquatic plants and animals.

"Atrazine is one of the most costeffective herbicides for farmers, used especially in corn, literally for decades," said Aaron Hager, University of Illinois associate professor of crop sciences. "We're trying to manage these pests that basically have the same requirements and same resource needs as what the crop does. If we allow these unwanted plants to go and utilize these resources, then that begins to adversely affect the

yield potential of that crop."

If adopted, the new regulations would lower the current concentration equivalent level of concern (CE-LOC) to 3.4 parts per billion (PPB), far below the 15 ppb CE-LOC set by EPA in 2020 through an interim decision. Farmers would also be prohibited from using the herbicide in saturated fields and limited application rates of 2 pounds per acre for sorghum, sweet corn, and





## Red-zone woes

### Rebels driving, but not scoring enough to win

KEWANEE – When you drive the football inside the 20-yard line, everything gets tougher for an offense. The field shrinks. The defense focuses. Penalties are even deadlier.

For Stark County's football team, a lack of efficiency inside the 20 – the red-zone – has had plenty to do with the Rebels' two-game losing streak. For the second week in a row, Stark County lost 34-13 with a chance to be much closer had its efficiency been better inside the 20.

"It's the second week in a row we had three drives inside the 20 and got no points," Stark County Coach Jade Noard said. "And we lost by three scores both weeks."

Last Friday the foe was Annawan-Wethersfield (6-1, 5-0), which maintained its grip on first place in the Lincoln Trail Conference behind junior quarterback Dillon Horrie and sophomore tailback Zeb Rashid. That duo combined for 362 of the Titans' 426 yards and had a hand in all five AW touchdowns.

The Titans have now won seven straight vs. Stark County to lead the series 7-5.

Even so, Stark County was in this game most of evening, scoring first

on a 1-yard run by junior quarterback Matthew Bowser, who filled in for injured starter Luke Rewerts. Bowser also passed for a score in the second quarter, hooking up with Connor Wagenbach on a 25-yard pass to make the score 20-13 at halftime.

"(Bowser) does a good job with our running game and I thought he played really well and ran the ball well," Noard said.

Bowser finished 11-for-24 passing for 117 yards and ran for a team-high 78. But options were more limited for Stark County, as top running back Matthew Henry was out of town for a family issue.

"Lately, we've got inside the 20 and our ground game has not been solid enough to punch it in," Noard said. "In the Elmwood game, there were long runs from a long way out that got us in to score."

On the other side of the ball, Noard said Stark County gave up too many big plays – including a 69-yard touchdown pass to Mason Heitzler that included 64 yards after the catch.

"We didn't tackle well, and that's something early in the year we were doing very well," Noard said.

That will need to change quickly heading into this week's game at Aledo against Mercer County (5-2, 4-1), which is coming off a 53-6
