

Toulon lift station delayed again, awaiting electronic parts

TOULON – After approximately one and a half months of progress on a long-awaited lift station project, action has screeched to a halt.

According to City Engineer Farnsworth Group representative, Zach Knight, Stark Excavating has "completed the mainline excavation and installation" of the sewer sanitary lift station project. Stark began in late August trenching the line for pipe installation south of the Prairie and Whittaker Streets intersection and also east and north from that point.

Knight stated that Stark Excavating is "held up waiting for [electronic] parts" for the lift station unit. Knight said, "The delay will be until winter [December], but that anything that can be done in regards to restoration — pavement, cleanup, they'll do everything they can. Pressure test-

ing was done [Oct. 11] and is going very well. There will be a final test where they pull a preformed insert through the pipe to make sure it hasn't settled."

Residents are not to hook up to the piping yet, although one resident did and it effected the pressure testing negatively. Residents will have to go to City Hall and fill out a form in order to properly hookup to the sanitary sewer system.

In other business at its recent

meeting, the Toulon City Council discussed the new water tower grant, but took no action. A report is needed by today, Oct. 21, that updates the previous reports submitted regarding water pressure readings, etc. The City is planning on meeting that request for the grant application.

If approved, Toulon will replace the current water tower with a new tower that has more storage capacity, which is needed according to past studies.

The council approved Halloween hours for Oct. 31, from 5-7 p.m. Also approved was vacating LaFayette Street to resident Kyle Wallace who lives on West Clinton Street. The property will become part of Wallace's driveway.

City Attorney Rob McCoy, who filled in for Kate Carter, said during his report that two ordinance violators who were taken to court in the past and found guilty of "maintaining a *Continued on Page 2*"

WYOMING – The City Council heard Monday that work is underway on the water and wastewater plant.

Water and Wastewater Plant Operator Greg McCauley reported that work has started on renovating the plant. McCauley said that the old sand filters are now offline and will be removed in the near future.

The council approved a second payment to Leander Construction in the amount of \$9,342 for work connected with the wastewater treatment plant. Also, a payment of \$61,000 to Farnsworth Group, Inc. was approved for construction engineering costs.

The council also approved changing the route for the Moonlight Madness Celebration Parade, as presented by State Bank of Toulon reprsentative Jodie Dienst. The parade will assemble and line up at Duryea Park and travel west on Williams Street to the four-way

BANDITS ABOUND

Raccoon numbers on the rise

Raccoons: Love them or hate them, Illinois has plenty!

If it seems as though there are plenty of masked bandits in Illinois, that's because there are. Raccoons are found in every county in greater numbers than when European settlers first arrived.

No wonder almost anyone you talk with – in the city or country – has at least one raccoon encounter tale to tell.

According to the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, "The number of raccoons in Illinois has increased dramatically since the 1930s." Populations of 9-45 racoons per square mile are common in Illinois, with fall estimates of

more than 100 raccoons per square mile in parts of Cook, Kane, and McHenry

Stan McTaggart, IDNR wildlife diversity program manager, tells us that based on survey data for spotlight and roadkill counts from 1981-2022 show a slow and relatively steady increase

Anecdotally, many hunters, wildlife watchers and folks who have issues with nuisance raccoons might be more inclined to proclaim that there's a population explosion. When asked about this perception of a population explosion and any concerns related to the perception of population gains, McTaggart said, "We do not have data at a fine enough scale to show this. Artificially high populations are generally stabilized by disease and/or starvation if animals exceed the carrying capacity of their habitat.

"Some people are willing to tolerate more wildlife than others. Some people love seeing raccoons, etc., and unfortunately, feed

Stark CUSD takes on snow removal

WYOMING – Stark County School District is considering purchasing a new truck with a snowplow attached to remove snow at the school campuses. The board of education approved Superintendent Brett Elliott's exploration of "the cost and the purchase of a new truck and plow for snow removal."

The school district let bids last month for snow removal and received no bids, which prompted the board's action to approve Elliott's search for snow removal equipment. If a truck and plow are approved for purchase, then the snow removal would become the responsibility of the district's maintenance director.

In a related item, the board approved the adoption of the 2022-23 Snow Day/Emergency Day procedures remain the same as last year.

Elliott said that if the tax levy exceeds five percent from the previous year, then the school district would be required to hold a Truth in Taxation Hearing prior to submitting the fiscal year 2023 levy. Elliott pointed out that the district usually

Continued from Page 1 nuisance" have failed to pay their fines and costs. The violators have been turned over to a collection agency.

McCoy said that the property at 413 E. Jefferson St. that was going to be developed has been put on hold. Mayor Larry Hollis indicated that demolition of the house at that location will probably occur.

Bids to construct a maintenance shed at the city's sewer plant location were opened and Kenny Musselman's bid of \$27,000 was approved. A 32-foot by 40-foot shed is to be built to house city equipment.

Signs will be posted at and near the intersection of Jefferson and Union streets warning of weight restrictions there because of a collapsing culvert. Recommendations are to replace the culvert as soon as possible.

The farm lease was approved for another three years. Also approved was the purchase of an electrical backup generator from RAB Electric for \$8,700 for the citymaintenance shed located at the sewer plant.

The parade will travel east on Park Street until it returns to Duryea Park. This year's theme is "Candyland." The event is scheduled for Nov. 18 with the parade starting at 8 p.m.

According to Superintendent Joe Kinsella's written report, playground equipment has arrived and been installed at Duryea Park. The council was informed that additional equipment for toddlers has been installed at Thomas Park.

The council approved the Downtown Beautification Program grant of

\$3,000 to be paid to Stark County Assets (Keith Ratcliff). The grant was approved on Sept. 20, 2022. Also approved was an ordinance continuing the health insurance coverage for city employees from H&M Blue Cross – Blue Shield at an 8.02 percent increase.

Land measuring 20 feet by 105 feet has been vacated by the City of Wyoming located at 100 N. Galena Road. The land was sold to Nancy Whaley for \$1,500. She intends to have a ramp built to access her home.

Michael Schott was approved to develop a city website for a cost between \$620 and \$1,040. There will be an annual fee of approximately

\$1,330 to monitor, host and update the website in the future.

Lighting has been completed by Ameren on Main Street and on Van Buren, near the school located there. Also LED light bulbs have been installed at various downtown loca-

The Wyoming City Council has adopted a consent agenda for its meetings. This means that little to no discussion happens during the council's monthly meetings. Consideration of ordinances are brought forth and voted for approval. Packet information is distributed prior to the meeting to inform council members about ordinances up for a vote.



them. Others see one raccoon around their home and feel that it's a problem. The most common nuisance wildlife concern we hear about is property damage from raccoons. They are pretty savvy, and once they figure out where to find food and shelter near people, especially where they are being fed - the bad behaviors are almost impossible to change."

The 2018 Nuisance Wildlife Report shows there were 19,043 raccoons handled by individuals with nuisance

Concerns about the steady rise of raccoon numbers go beyond nuisances and property damage. Raccoons may carry diseases such as parvovirus and distemper that could conceivably be transmitted to domes-

"Raccoons are like many wildlife species that can carry zoonosis or diseases found in wildlife that can be transmitted to people (and pets). It is important to take basic precautions when handling or cooking wildlife and to keep all pets current on vaccinations. More information can be found in the Disease and Public Health section of wildlifeillinois.org."

It's also wise to think about your property and surroundings regarding 'raccoon proofing."

Here are some simple tips courtesy of Wildlife Illinois:

• Remove tree branches that overhang the roof to limit access to chimneys or attics.

- Do not leave pet food outside overnight.
- Store garbage in metal or rugged plastic containers with tight-fitting lids. It may be necessary to secure the cover with wire or a clamp.
- Close dumpster lids each night.
- Attach heavy-duty chimney caps at the top of the chimneys.
- Repair holes and close all openings to attics. Make sure all raccoons are out of the building before sealing openings.

If all of your best measures fail, the raccoon will have to be removed. To remove the raccoon yourself, you need a permit from an IDNR district wildlife biologist. If you don't want to trap yourself, contact a nuisance wildlife control operator.

No discussion about raccoons is complete without discussing coon hunting and trapping – which seem to be dying arts.

In 1980 there were an estimated 43,460 coon hunters in Illinois. In 2020 there were just an estimated 4,776.

Coon season opens Nov. 10 and runs through Feb. 15. Hunting is allowed 24 hours per day, except for archery hunting of raccoons, which is limited to one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset during archery deer season.

Trapping license sales aren't quite as low as one might think, despite the disastrous drop in fur prices that has sidelined many would-be coon trappers who say it's not worth the

effort right now.

Even so, in 2021, Illinois sold 6,580 trapping licenses. The all-time high for trapping licenses was 21,407 in 1979, and the all-time low was 2,130 in 2000. Raccoon trapping season in Illinois is Nov. 10 to Feb.

McTaggart stressed that recreational fur-trapping (and hunting when and where it is allowed) is the preferred method to deal with nuisance furbearer issues. Trapping can help control a local population of animals and, in some cases, reduce the number of nuisance complaints.

Legal trapping can occur 100 yards from an occupied dwelling without permission of the occupants, closer with permission, as long as there are no municipal ordinances prohibiting trapping.

To learn more about raccoon hunting/trapping and how to get started, seek out a local coon club by visiting the website coonhuntingclub.com. The Illinois Learn to Hunt program or the Illinois Trappers Association are also excellent sources of informa-



Smith, a home-schooled eighth grader from Bradford who runs for Stark County, finished the Maxwell Park 2-mile course in 12:00.2. In the process, she completed a rare feat for a cross country runner: Going undefeated for a full season.

"She never lost a race," Stark County Coach Gary Frail said. "In fact, through sectionals, the closest anyone had been to her all year was 18 seconds."

Smith was just 1.6 seconds ahead of runnerup Berritt Shure of Chicago St. Benedict, the state champion team in Class 2A, but still ran a strong, smart race according to Frail.

"She got out in front and

her, which is what she has done all year," Frail said. "She never has been behind."

Prior to the state meet, Smith had complained of a sore knee on Wednesday and again on Thursday. Stark County High School Coach Bob Rennick Jr. stepped in to help tape Smith's knee.

"Obviously, it didn't bother her in the race," Frail said.

This is the first year for a Stark County junior high cross country program and Frail said he felt fortunate to have a runner of Smith's caliber.

"She's a great kid. A little shy but a heckuva runner ... just an amazing talent," Frail said. "I don't know how I got so lucky to have a girls like her on my first year team.

"She was a great role model for our girls. They idolized her. I'm looking forward to seeing how she does in high school."

Smith is also a skilled track athlete, having wor
