

Galva super unhappy with window project

GALVA – Superintendent Joe Becker discussed several projects that the district has under construction at a recent Galva School Board meeting.

Becker said he is disappointed with the window project in both schools that is being done by East Moline Glass. He said it has been discovered that the windows for the lower level of the Elementary School were all to be shatterproof glass. But the shatterproof windows have been installed on the second and third levels of the building.

Becker said there are gaps in caulking and the stickers are still on the windows. Becker said the windows were to be thoroughly cleaned and shades were to be installed on all windows. None of these items are done.

Becker said that the district has paid for part of the project but not all. He said an artitect was coming to the school to meet with East Moline Glass to get this situation resolved.

Early voting expands as campaign enters final two weeks

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD – Early voting hours and locations greatly expanded across the state this week as the campaign season entered According to the state elections board, 265,937 of the 795,085 requested mail ballots had been returned as of Monday, while 66,934 early votes had been cast and 1,009 grace period votes





Illinois will be the first state in the nation to end cash bail, which is sparking concern that more criminals could be out on the street.

WOODSTOCK, III. - The McHenry County Board has voted to oppose a controversial Illinois public safety law set to take effect next year. County board members voted 13-8 at a Tuesday night meeting to pass a resolution opposing the SAFE-T Act after listening to the public's comments and engaging in a "robust debate" on how to protect the interests of McHenry County constituents, a statement said.

The Illinois Safety, Accountability, Fairness and Equity - Today Act, also known as the SAFE-T Act, is a broad criminal justice reform law enacted by the Illinois General Assembly, which will eliminate cash bail and change standards for detaining arrested individuals.

The board also passed a resolution Tuesday opposing House Bill 3447 by a vote of 14-6, the statement said.

The criminal justice legislation would reduce the penalty for possession of less than three grams of heroin, fentanyl, and cocaine from a felony to a misdemeanor.

"As public officials, it is our highest responsibility to protect the safety of our residents," said County Board Chairman Mike Buehler, R-Crystal Lake. "By opposing the SAFE-T Act and House Bill 3447, McHenry County is sending a clear message to Springfield that we oppose legislation that could put criminals back on the streets and decriminalize illegal drugs in our community."

Portions of the SAFE-T Act are set to take effect on Jan. 1, 2023. "I think the (Stark) County Board should do this also," Sheriff Steven Sloan.

Mother Nature has a population plan, too

A scientist friend recently noted that at today's rate of consumption, the world is environmentally and economically sustainable for roughly 1 billion people. "That means with the world's population of 8 billion," he half-joked, "you're a goner."

Right, just not right now; let nature take its course, eh?

Recent population trends, however, show that nature might already be winnowing us a bit faster-still too slow for my

For example, at a recent conference on the U.S. economy, the discussion quickly diverted from the more normal short-term economic outlook to the rarely discussed longer-term view with demography, the science of populations, as the key yardstick.

In fact, wrote Bloomberg columnist Niall Ferguson, the "main event" at the Aspen Economic Strategy Group conference, "turned out to be a series of disquieting papers on the US demographic trends and their implications. These turn out to be," judged Ferguson, a senior fellow at Stanford University, "a big deal-and at first sight a rather bad one."

Bad for the nation's quickly-aging population because America's steadily falling birth rates will, he notes citing research, "lead to slower population growth, which in turn [will] cause slower economic growth and present fiscal challenges" like Social Security "which is banking" on a growing population "to

keep its actuarial deficit manageable...'

Still, adds Ferguson, the United Nations (UN) estimates that if the U.S. birth rate returns to pre-1980s levels (slim chance) and the country reopens its immigration doors (even slimmer chance), its population could rise to 394 million by 2100, or

If, however, the American birth rate remains historically low and the tion, the U.S. population will drop to 280 million in 80 years, or 16 percent

The numbers are far more certain if the focus is China, America's biggest ag importer.

"By contrast," Ferguson explains, "the UN offers no scenario in which China's population does not decline. Best case, it falls by a fifth. Base case"-essentially the median-"it declines by 46%, to 771 million," from today's 1.4 billion. "Worst case, it falls by nearly two thirds, to 494 million."

Think what 1 billion less people in China means to both the world and world markets, and think fast because, according to the Bloomberg writer, "The Chinese government has stopped denying it has a demographic problem." Last month China "admitted that its population" would start to shrink before 2025.

But that's only if China's current population numbers are true. Recent reports strongly suggest that China's infamous one-child policy-that limited families to one child from 1979 until 2016-actually trimmed today's overall population to 1.2 billion, substantially less than its official count of 1.41 billion.

Despite these projected declines, the UN still sees global population at 10 billion by 2059, then entering a generation-long leveling off period. Overall population decline is estimated to begin around 2086.

Ninety-five percent of all the population growth until then, says the UN, will occur in the relatively young, relatively poor sub-Saharan nations of Africa.

Strikingly, that means that in less than 40 years-or about the average length of an American farmer's career-sub-Saharan Africa will have two billion more people to feed, clothe, and shelter; China might have one billion less; and rural America will be emptier than it is today.

Another massive shift already in the cards is, again, in China where its recently reappointed leader, Xi Jinping, continues to push farmers to "divert resources from profitable agribusinesses to basic staples" so the nation will bee less dependent on the "hostile" west "led by the U.S.," according to the Financial Times.

If that shift proves successful, China's impact on U.S. ag marketsnow a \$36 billion-a-year customerwill change long before its shrinking population shrinks its collective stomach.

That is if Mother Nature and her increasingly intense floods, droughts, hurricanes, rising seas, melting glaciers, and other climate-forged scythes don't winnow most of us first.



Continued from Page 1 emphasized throughout the campaign, and he has remained on the attack against his conservative rival even as recent polls have shown the incumbent with a double-digit lead. As of Oct. 18, the political handicapping website FiveThirtyEight, which aggregates data from multiple polls, estimated Pritzker's average lead at 14.3 percentage points, 49.5 percent to 35.2 percent. It had the Libertarian candidate, Scott Schluter, at about 6.4 percent.

Bailey's campaign released its own sponsored poll, which was logged by FiveThirtyEight, that showed him trailing Pritzker by about two percentage points – a drastic outlier from multiple nonpartisan polls.

In his daily Facebook video Tuesday - a method of virtual outreach that reaches in the thousands to

The Republican spent Monday morning greeting voters at the Belmont train station in Chicago while his Twitter account spent the early part of the week retweeting stories about shootings in the city that he has repeatedly described as a "hellhole."

He spent the previous week on a "get out the vote" bus tour, stopping in 16 cities and towns across the state, including Anna, Belleville, Springfield, Champaign, Arthur, Joliet, Aurora and Naperville.

At the Springfield stop last week, Bailey once again mentioned a "zero based budget" as his plan for balancing state finances, although he has persistently refused to name any state spending cuts he would look to implement if elected. He has

Bailey told Crain's Chicago Business in an interview that he believes schools receive too much state funding, and he has since stated that he believes administrators are paid too much. Administrative salaries are set by local school boards.

Pritzker, meanwhile, touted his first-term legislative wins to the union members in Urbana, highlighting the increased minimum wage to \$15 hourly by 2025, protections for women seeking abortions in Illinois, the Climate and Equitable Jobs Act that increases investment in renewable energy, and the requirement that LGBTQ and Asian Ameri-

"It's the first year for awhile we're not in the playoffs. That stings for me and the coaching staff and I know it stings for a bunch of these kids. Hopefully that carries over into the offseason."

That is a feeling Stark County has had to endure for four years. But no longer.

"It's good to have a reason to watch the show again on Saturday night," Noard said. "That show is not a lot of fun when your name doesn't get called."

Noard said returning to the playoffs is important for the program, which has good numbers on a JV team that finished 6-3.

"The seniors showed up for the underclassmen to show how it can be done," Kieser said.

Rewerts has returned, but neither team is headed into the postseason on a roll. R-W (5-4, 4-3) lost its final two regular-season games. Stark County (5-4, 3-4) beat Princeville in Week 9 but lost its previous three, including the R-W game.

"We're preparing for them the same way," Gullstrand said. "It's strange to play a team twice. We're not going to reinvent the wheel. Whoever makes the least amount of mistakes is going to come out on top."

This will be the first playoff game at Bill Adams Field since 2006 and the first playoff berth for the R-W coop program.

Against Knoxville (7-2, 6-1), things for the Cougars were tough from the beginning. An opening fumble led to a Blue Bullets touchdown. On the next series, an interception led to a 14-0 deficit.

"We had the worst start we possibly could have had," Gullstrand said.

He'll trade that for a solid finish to what's been a solid season.

"Wipe away whatever experience we had last week. Wipe away the game that happened in Wyoming a month ago," Gullstrand said. "We've got a pretty big opponent in front of us. The community is pretty excited. The kids are pretty excited. They should be. This is kind of what it's all about."

Rebels return to playoffs

Stark County routs Princeville, earns rematch with R-W

For The Prairie News WYOMING - Jade Noard had a long-awaited comment as his team huddled on Gary Johnson Field last Friday night.

"Welcome to Week 10 fellas," Noard said after a 49-12 victory that clinched a playoff berth for his Stark County football team.

The postseason, once a given during Stark County's impressive 22-year playoff streak, had become an elusive goal since 2017 when the run ended.

But after spotting visiting Princeville (4-5, 2-5 Lincoln Trail) leads of 6-0 and 12-7 in the first quarter, the Rebels ended a three-game losing streak by scoring 42 unanswered points.

That earned Stark County (5-4, 3-4) a trip to Oneida tonight at 7 p.m. for a Class 1A first-round game against Lincoln Trail Conference foe ROWVA-Williamsfield (5-4, 4-3).

"It's kind of a monkey off our back getting back in," Noard said. "Because the kids know what the tradition is here and how long we were in."

Senior Daniel Kieser confirmed that after a game that saw **IHSA Playoffs** Friday's Games

him end two promising Princeville drives with interceptions, one of which he ran back 95 yards for a score. Kieser, who also scored on a 44-yard slant pass in the first quarter, said he has heard plenty about getting back to the playoffs.

"From our coaches, our team, community, our school ... it was just 'Get back to the playoffs," Kieser said. "That's the main goal."

At 4-1 earlier this season, the playoffs looked to once again be a mere formality. But a threegame losing streak made last Friday a must-win for the Rebels.

Early on, that was no certainty, as Princeville used long passes to set up two scoring drives. But Stark County outscored Princeville 21-0 in the second quarter

on a 3-yard run by Matthew Henry, Kieser's long pick-six and then a 12-yard pass from Rewerts to Xander Swank in the corner of the end zone, where Swank used his size to an advantage.

"That was (Kieser's) seventh and eighth interceptions of the year," Noard said. "Good things happen when the ball is in his hands and he goes and gets it. We had a few games where he was quiet. So I was not all that surprised. He was due."

Kieser said on the first interception he recognized the play from film study. The pick-six was more of a hunch.

"They hadn't passed backside for a slant for awhile, so I just creeped over and there it was," Kieser said. "They threw it to me."

The Rebels scored 21 more points in the second half, with Rewerts and Nolan Orwig running for scores in the third quarter before Stark County started substituting heavily in the fourth. Chris Barnwell got the last TD on a 1-yard run.

"I thought we did a better job out there of being a little more diverse offensively," Noard said.

"We threw the ball a little. We ran wide a little bit and we hit them inside a bit."

Princeville was without all three of its starting running backs in the second half due to various injuries. That hurt the Princes' effort, as did 11 penalties for 67 vards, two lost fumbles and three interceptions.

"We moved the ball well. They made a nice play on that pick-six and then we just got banged up," Continued on Page 15
