Still surveying

Little middle ground among Senate candidates

The two candidates for Illinois' U.S. Senate seat – both suburban women - challenged each other's records on women's rights, abortion access, guns and a bevy of other issues in a candidate forum Monday where little middle ground was found.

In the forum organized by the Illinois Associated Press Media Editors collaboration, Democratic incumbent Tammy Duckworth said her



opponent, attorney Kathy Salvi of Mundelein, "wants to rip freedom from women" because of her "dangerous anti-choice views on abortion."

But Salvi argued Duckworth was an "extremist" on the abortion issue, saying

"there isn't an abortion she doesn't support."

Duckworth, of Hoffman Estates, reiterated multiple times she supports codifying abortion access as outlined in the now-overturned Roe vs. Wade case.

"The majority of Americans support a woman's right to make her own decisions about abortion between herself and her doctor with a 24week viability restriction," Duckworth said. "There are women who are facing

cancer treatment but can't get access to an abortion so they can have their cancer treated. This is inhumane."

Salvi said she agreed with the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision reversing the 50-year-old ruling that decriminalized abortions. States now have the ability to restrict access to abortion serv-

"I think it's properly in the hands of the states' duly elected representatives,"



Escaped calves add excitement to a morning

I was just getting started on my morning crossword puzzle, coffee mug steaming nearby. I looked up to ponder the answer. Seven letters. My eyes rested on the row of maple trees along the lane to our house. Doves were landing heavily on the branches as finches flitted from tree to feeder and back again. Suddenly there was a black blur fol-

lowed by a cream colored one heading down the lane toward the road.

That was not the answer I was looking for.

"We have an outage!" I shouted to AJ who was in the

kitchen making himself a sandwich for breakfast. I was foolishly already dressed for an appointment, but took time only to kick off my Mary Janes and stuff my feet into my work shoes, tying the laces as I half hopped and half fell out the door. By then the two calves had made it to the gravel road and taken a left.

AJ's first concern was to ascertain where these two rogues had gotten out and to prevent further mayhem. He drove the RTV around the barnyard but could see no evidence of where the two escaped. This was a Wednesday. We'd weaned calves Monday. It was not a shock that a couple would try to return to the cows. We'd brought the ones home from the other place, a mile and a half away, but on this still, humid morning I could hear those mama cows bellowing for their calves. The calves heard it too, and did what they were programmed to do: go to mom when she calls.

After his quick survey, AJ drove to where I stood in the yard, trying to maintain visual contact with the calves on the lam. He paused long enough for me to point and say, "I'll call Matt." He nodded and putted off down the lane.

When Matt answered I just said, "We've got a couple calves headed north up the road. You might want to head this way."

I doubt he did want to head this way right at that moment, but he just said he'd be there.

AJ got around the calves and slowly worked them back toward our lane. Once they headed up our lane they were more or less contained within fences, albeit some pretty dodgy ones. For the next several minutes we played a game where one or both of the calves would come up along the fence of the little house pasture where the three off-duty bulls now live. We would try to direct the calves to head out to the barnyard where their penmates were now bawling loudly, since they saw people but were not being fed.

The calves would go into the corner of the yard by the gate, then just as we approached them, they would bolt and go charging down the lane again. On about the fourth lap, Matt showed up on his four-wheeler. We eased the calves, a big black steer and a pretty cream-colored heifer, out of the corner and into the lane. We intended to just work them out into the barn yard where there were lots of options to stash them. Instead, the steer bolted down the lane to the road. He crossed into a neighboring bean field and headed due east at a high rate of speed.

We tried to get the gates into the lot open so the heifer could just go back in with her friends, but since they hadn't had breakfast, and they could see Matt, their food-bringer, standing right there, they were unwilling to wait for us to put Miss Runaway back in. Matt went to feed them so they would leave the gate area. I kept an eye on the heifer, who by this point was content to just stand there and gobble yard grass. AJ got the gates opened up and then Matt was back.

The heifer could see where she wanted to be, but she wasn't sure how to get there. Matt is infinitely patient, and these calves trust him implicitly. After all, he is the first human many of them ever saw, and he carried a good number of them into the barn when they were just minutes old. So the cream-colored heifer was willing to trust Matt to get her back home. AJ and I stood back a bit and Matt just spoke gently to the calf. He encouraged her when she moved in the direction of the gate and slowly extended his arm if she seemed to balk. She did not feel

threatened by him. He allowed her to nibble grass from time to time.

Slowly but surely she neared the gateway. Another step and she could see the open path back to her new home. Some of the other calves had finished eating the three bags of feed Matt had scattered in the bunks as a distraction and were now heading back to see what we were doing. She looked at them, then looked back at Matt, then trotted through the gate. One down.

AJ and Matt now saw that the best plan was to open up this area of the lot that was familiar to the calves so that if and when the black steer returned he could easily see where to go. They set off to close gates to keep the other 96 calves on the platform while I set out on a reconnaissance mission to locate the steer. I would drive around the block and see if it had gotten to the next road. I didn't have to go that far. There, just across the road at the end of our lane, was the steer, busily eating grass. I parked my car cattywampus across the road just south of the lane and called Matt.

While he eased down the north side of the little house pasture on his fourwheeler, I stayed in my car. My black capris and brightly patterned blouse would looked very unfamiliar to our livestock, and I didn't want to make this calf uneasy. I just waited. Soon enough the steer moseyed into the lane, munching grass along the ditch as he went. I let him get ahead of me a fair distance, then pulled the La-Crosse in behind him. Now the steer heard the other calves and set out toward them. Matt was there when he got to the gate and coached him in as he had the heifer. Whew.

AJ and Matt carried the remaining seven bags of feed to the now very disgruntled calves. I dusted myself off and wasn't even late for my appointment, though I was a bit surprised to see my sorting stick still in the back seat of my car. All's well that ends well, though. It could have been much worse.

Continued from Page 1 Salvi said.

Illinois has some of the most relaxed abortion laws in the nation, with a growing number of women from other states seeking services here. Abortion providers from neighboring states have set up clinics in Illinois, just across the state line, to provide services.

For the first time in Illinois election history, both major-party candidates for a U.S. Senate seat are women.

The two candidates traded barbs over gun control as well during the hourlong forum.

Duckworth said she supports reinstating a ban on what have been called assault rifles and instituting a ban on high-capacity bullet magazines, saying she's heard from law enforcement the "common denominators in mass shootings are an assault weapon and a high-capacity magazine."

She argued Salvi would never vote in any way to curb access to firearms because of her "A rating" from the National Rifle Association. Duckworth received an F from the gun lobbying group.

Salvi wouldn't directly say if she would vote to reinstate what's called an assault weapons ban. She said local, state and federal Democrats failed to follow existing laws, and that has led to an increase in crime.

"Before we consider passing any new and additional laws, we should let the laws that are on the book be implemented and employed," Salvi said.

Duckworth, a retired Army helicopter pilot who lost her legs when she was shot down in Iraq in 2004, said current laws don't do enough to curb gun violence.

"I carried an M16 for 23 years in the military," she said. "I know what those weapons are supposed to do. They are supposed to shred a human body."

When asked about climate change, both Salvi and Duckworth acknowledged the legitimacy of the crisis. But they have different views on how to com-

Salvi touted natural gas as a clean fuel that could relieve some of the nation's reliance on foreign energy sources, but she complained Democrats were pursuing energy alternatives without the proper framework in place to support the conversion.

"It doesn't make sense to be able to say let's switch over to renewables before

we have the infrastructure," she said. "And our economy is hurting because of it."

Duckworth touted her support of legislation that has led to greater pursuit of renewable, clean-energy sources in an attempt to combat climate change. She said her voting record has allowed the country to "position ourselves toward a future where we can fix both climate change and grow our economy right here in Illinois."

The two candidates are also far apart on finances. Salvi has raised less than \$450,000, including a \$250,000 loan she made to herself, according to Federal Election Commission reports. Duckworth has a war chest of nearly \$8 million and has spent very little during this campaign.

The election is Nov. 8. Early voting has already begun.

using the form or online.







Continued on Page 10 veying Company. Dwain retired in 1969-70 and sold the business to Dailey Associates.

Ron Wallace worked eight years under his dad to learn and pass the test to become a licensed surveyor. He worked from 1953 to 1968 at Wallace Surveying, then became the Stark County engineer for 20 years and additionally six years as Warren County's engineer retiring in 1994.

In 1980 Wallace Land

Surveying was begun by Ron's son Kevin. "The reason we started the business again was because in 1980 the economy was so bad there was no work," Kevin stated. "In 1980 I did the work and Dad was licensed so he could sign on the projects, but then I got my license in 1983-84." Ron's other son, Kyle, joined the business in 1987.

There will not be a fourth generation of Wallace surveyors to continue running the local firm. "I guess we

are the end of the line," Kyle said.

"Presently there is an incredible shortage of surveyors and the demand is so big that our huge hurdle is too much work," Kevin said. "The shortage is due to it taking eight years to get a license as a surveyor. If any kid was thinking about it and they did the eight years then there is a huge amount of work waiting for them."

On that note, the Wallaces agree that if there's any youth interested in becoming a land surveyor, there's a lot of variety of work and it is outdoor ing career. Every survey is

different so monotony does not factor into the equation when thinking about becoming a licensed surveyor.

The one negative aspect the Wallaces indicated that dealing with some of the public can be quite challenging. One must be a skilled negotiator at times in order to deal with public issues. Property disputes can become hostile when dealing with families who inherit land and there are issues prevalent.

Overall, the Wallaces encourage young adults to consider surveying as a career path because it is often overlooked in choosing

Voters face 'right to unionize' amendment

SPRINGFIELD – Illinois voters will be asked in November to decide whether the right of workers to form unions and engage in collective bargaining should be enshrined in the state constitution.

The first clause of the amendment contains two sentences. The first would establish a "fundamental right to organize and to bargain collectively and to negotiate wages, hours, and working conditions, and to promote their economic welfare and safety at work."

The second would prohibit the state or any local unit of government from enacting "any law that interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively over their wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment and workplace safety."

The provision is intended to prevent passage of any state or local "right to work" laws, which prohibit employers from requiring workers to be union members to keep their jobs.

The second clause states that the amendment would be controlling over another part of the constitution that spells out the powers of home rule units of local government, meaning those units of government would



still be subject to the amendment.

Lawmakers approved putting the measure on the ballot during the 2021 spring session. The resolution passed both chambers with bipartisan support: 49-7 in the Senate and 80-30 in the House.

Like any constitutional issue, however, there is considerable disagreement over what those words mean and what effects they would have if the amendment is adopted.

The proposal is supported by several large labor unions, but it has drawn opposition from groups such as the Illinois Association of School Boards, the Illinois Chamber of Commerce and the Illinois Manufacturers' Association.

To gather a sense of the arguments for and against the measure, the Illinois Associated Press Media Editors spoke with Joe Bowen, communications director for a Vote Yes for Workers Rights, and Mailee Smith, director of labor policy and a staff attorney with the Illinois Policy Institute.

Bowen and Smith were asked at

the outset what they believe the amendment would mean.

"The workers' rights amendment will guarantee your fundamental rights in the workplace to organize and bargain collectively with your coworkers to negotiate for things like better pay, safer working conditions, and crucially, it will also protect Illinois voters from politicians who try to take away their rights in the future," Bowen said.

Smith, on the other hand, asserted that the amendment would apply only to public-sector workers because private-sector workers are already covered by the National Labor Relations Act, which would supersede any state law or state constitutional provision.

As a result, she argued that it would drive up local property taxes by giving public employee unions power to negotiate a broader range of issues, including "economic welfare," which isn't defined in the amendment or other state law.

If it were adopted, Bowen said, it would apply uniformly statewide to all workers in both the public and private sectors. He also said it would protect workers from politicians who attempt to enact right-to-work laws, a reference to former Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner.



That speed caught up to Rewerts. He lost a total of 36 yards on the four sacks - two by Grant Erlacher, one each by Wight and Luke Nelson. During the first drive of the third quarter, not long after Erlacher's second sack, Rewerts departed. According to Noard, Rewerts had been dealing all week with stomach issues and migraine headaches. Ailments caused Rewerts to miss a day of school and practice.

"He couldn't keep going," Noard said. "It wasn't any one hit that happened. He was feeling a little bit queasy in the second quarter. He thought he could come out and try to go in the third."

Backup quarterback Xander Swank led a four-play scoring drive that cut the Stark County deficit to 27-13 with 11:21 left in the game and was capped by Nolan Orwig's 5-yard run. Swank passed for 117 yards overall, an effort Noard praised.

"He doesn't have a lot of reps," the coach said. "He came into a situation where you're behind and they know we're going to have to throw."

Running wasn't going to save the Rebels. Orwig had a team-high 40 yards. Rewerts ran for 7 yards on 10

"A lot of our running stuff was kind of a little bit gimmicky, to be honest, where we're scrambling around and making something out of nothing, not designed runs," Noard said.




A Galva High School senior, Willer tees off at 10:18 a.m. today at the 6,407-yard, par-72 Prairie Vista course.

WYOMING - The visitors' locker room survived the ROWVA-Williamsfield football team's enthusiasm. The Stark County running game did


R-W held the hosts to 69 yards rushing Sept. 30 as the Cougars' defense dominated a 34-13 Lincoln Trail Conference victory.

Riley Danner's 20-yard touchdown pass to Jaxon Sharp with 9:41 left in the second quarter broke a 7-7 tie and put R-W (4-2, 3-1) ahead for keeps. The Rebels had scored in the first quarter on a 34-yard pass from Luke Rewerts to Daniel Kieser.

After that, R-W sacked Stark County junior quarterback Rewerts four times before illness forced him from the game early in the second half.

"They were very aggressive," Stark County Coach Jade Noard said. "We just didn't seem to have a whole lot of pep in our step. We seemed a little groggy. Maybe that's what they did to us. They kind of made us one-dimensional."

The postgame celebration after upstart R-W won sounded

"We tried to rock the building. It almost went down," R-W lineman Graham Wight said with a smile.

In truth, the locker room never was in danger. But Stark County (4-2, 2-2) was in trouble almost from the start of its

homecoming game.

The R-W offense did its part. Danner passed for 203 yards and the Cougars rushed for 244. Bryan Bertlshofer ran for 129 yards, including 81 for a touchdown that gave R-W a 20-7 lead with 9:05 left in the third quarter.

But according to R-W Coach Grant Gullstrand, defense was emphasized in practice following a 20-point loss Sept. 23 to

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
