Care at risk

Expert says current situation for rural health care 'not-sustainable'

For FarmWeek Rural communities are older, sicker and poorer.

"It's a terrible marketing line ... but a great elevator speech when trying to communicate the uniqueness of rural communities," said Alan Morgan, chief executive officer of the National Rural Health Association.

Morgan, who has more than 31 years of experience in health policy, spoke during an Arizona Telemedicine Program webinar earlier this month about the state of rural health.

How are rural hospitals faring as they emerge from the height of the pandemic? That's a difficult question to answer, Morgan said.

"We're in a precarious situation where we're seeing almost half of the nation's rural hospitals currently operating at a negative margin," he said. "We're seeing tremendous Medicare and Medicaid cuts happening across the nation. And this is happening at a time where we're see-*Continued on Page 2*

TOULON – Linda (McRell) Dean, of Toulon, is a fixture around town with her horse and carriage. This time of year, people can hear them coming before they are sighted because Dean puts sleighbells on the harness.

"Horses average about 22 years for their lifespan," Dean said.


That makes Dean's previous horse, Candy, the exception to the rule because Candy was 33 years old when she passed on.

No change in school taxes in Bradford

BRADFORD – Scheduling a truth in taxation hearing might seem to indicate a major change in tax rates for residents of the Bradford School District.

In fact, the opposite is true. At its Nov. 21 board meeting, the Bradford School Board unanimously approved a tentative 2022 tax levy that is above the 5 percent threshold set to require a taxation hearing, which will be Dec. 19 at 7 p.m. at Bradford Grade School.

But Superintendent Chad Gripp explained that is due to the continued increase in equalized assessed valuation of homes in the district, not to a tax increase. The district needs to increase the levy to capture all the new revenue, he said.



RURAL HEALTH: 13 rural Illinois hospitals at risk

Continued from Page 1 ing an amazing staffing crisis. ... It's just a tremendously difficult time for rural providers."

Federal funding helped prop up operations during the COVID-19 public health emergency, but much of that assistance was temporary.

Since 2005, 180 rural hospitals have closed across the U.S., and a report released last month by the Center for Healthcare Quality and Payment Reform estimates more than 600 rural hospitals - nearly 30 percent of all rural hospitals in the country – are at risk of closing in the near future. The report states 13 rural hospitals are

at risk of closing in Illinois but did not name them.

Looking ahead, the immediate challenge within the halls of rural hospitals is a workforce shortage, and in rural communities a lack of rural behavioral health services.

"There's a bipartisan understanding that we have to see some movement in behavioral health and behavioral health legislation," Morgan said. "I expect that as we move out of the public health emergency there is an understanding among both sides of the aisle that a lot of the flexibilities that the health care system has seen, most notably rural providers, has to continue."

Congress could pass a spending bill before years' end, and rural health advocates hope legislators will incorporate provisions from the proposed Save America's Rural Hospitals Act. The legislation would eliminate Medicare sequestration for rural hospitals, make Medicare

telehealth service enhancements permanent for Federally Qualified Health Centers and Rural Health Clinics and extend increased Medicare payments for rural ground ambulance services set to expire Dec. 31.

With the nationwide health care workforce shortage, particularly in rural areas, Morgan points to rural residency training programs as a path to encouraging more students to practice in non-urban communities.

"They go to rural and they stay in rural; we need to have more of that going ahead," he said.

Several medical school and grant programs in Illinois already incorporate that mission.

Morgan also said telehealth usage is "not flourishing" in rural communities, largely due to lack of broadband. "There is no path forward for rural health without telehealth," he said.

care environment is not sustainable, Morgan said, adding "we need new reimbursement models and new provider-type models."

Earlier this month, federal officials finalized rules for the first new provider type in 20 years – a Rural Emergency Hospital designation. These facilities must provide 24/7 emergency medical services and observation care, and have the option to provide additional outpatient medical services. However, these facilities would not provide inpatient care.

The designation goes into effect Jan. 1, with facilities likely beginning to come online within the next five years, Morgan said. He estimates between 60 and 100 communities across the U.S. will conduct feasibility studies in the coming year.



GUEST VOICES CFTC's is more lapdog than watchdog in 'crypto'

If you don't understand the allure, gyrating value, and many crack-ups of cryptocurrency, a few words from New York University's Nouriel Roubini, the economist who predicted the 2007-08 housing collapse, might help.

Speaking at the Abu Dhabi Finance conference in mid-November, Roubini, reported CNBC,

"described crypto and some of its major players as an 'ecosystem that is totally corrupt."

Roubini went on to explain what he meant by listing his "seven Cs of crypto:

concealed, corrupt, crooks, criminals, con men, carnival barkers" and "CZ," the initials of a Chinese

crypto bigshot. Roubini isn't the only economist who sees crypto as a crock. Nobel Laureate Paul Krugman, both a professor and New York Times columnist, began warning readers about crypto's sorcery in 2013. This past July he slammed it again in a column that (again) highlighted out-tolunch U.S. regulators, including the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC), the boosterish futures and derivatives watchdog.

Krugman foresaw big trouble because of the lack of regulation in the then-\$3 trillion market. All the looking away, he noted in quoting a Federal Reserve official, "has created an environment subject to bank runs, not to mention 'theft, hacks, and ransom attacks' plus 'money laundering and financing of terrorism.""

"Other than that," he cheekily added, "it's all good."

Krugman's dislike of crypto is

legendary. Recently he labeled Bitcoin, the best known of almost 21,000 - yes, 21,000 - crypto "coins" in existence, as "useless, wasteful, niche and only valuable to hype and speculation."

He's been proven mostly correct. In early November, one of the big crypto exchanges, FTX, collapsed in a matter of days. Its founder, Sam Bankman-Fried - a well-known crypto "bro" who often testified before Congress on crypto's virtues watched as 90 percent of his \$26 billion crypto wealth evaporated.

Other crypto exchanges and coins were teetering before FTX immolated. The value of one bitcoin fell from about \$60,000 in January 2022 to below \$17,000 by Thanksgiving. According to one analyst, an estimated 70 percent of all 2022 bitcoin buyers lost money investing in it. In fact, the once \$3-trillioncrypto market now has an estimated value of \$1 trillion.

Where were U.S. regulators in crypto's long run-up and, now, in its swift, steep decline?

The two biggest players, the relatively benign CFTC and the far more feared Security and Exchange Commission (SEC), have been fighting a turf battle over who has jurisdiction in the broad, fluid and ill-defined crypto market.

The fight isn't as straightforward as it seems. If crypto is seen more like an investment – say, shares in a company or corporate bonds - then the SEC could claim the regulatory role. If, however, crypto is defined more as a spot market for "tokens," like crypto coins, then the CFTC might become the regulator.

Even more complicating is Congress. Competing House and Senate committees are vying to write crypto's rules. Whichever committee seizes power - Banking oversees the SEC, Agriculture the CFTC - will see their clout increase both on Capitol Hill and in the campaign cash game.

Meanwhile, trillions are riding on the answers. Most analysts view the SEC as a rule-rich, tough regulator. Just ask Wall Street. On the other hand, high risk/high reward market players - like futures market speculators – love, love, love the smaller, myopic CFTC.

Before crypto's unhappy pre-Thanksgiving clobbering, the weaker approach looked like the stronger bet. "The momentum in Congress is on track to elevate the CFTC as the key front-line regulator," reported coindesk.com, a crypto newsite.

Here's another tell: The Senate CFTC/crypto bill is backed by Senate Ag Committee Chair Debbie Stabenow, the Michigan Dem whose former staff expert on crypto is Rostin Behnam, the now-serving (wait for it) CFTC chairman.

That leaves Stabenow's 2023 Senate Ag basket overflowing – a new Farm Bill to steer through a divided Congress, a complicated crypto regulatory bill that puts guardrails on that Wild West show, and a push to reauthorize the CFTC.

That's right; the CFTC, the agency crypto wants as its regulator, is operating on an expired charter. Little wonder Big Crypto wants the CFTC as its lapdog, er, watchdog.



Lawmakers plan to pay down debt

By JERRY NOWICKI Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD - Lawmakers on Tuesday announced a bipartisan plan to use state revenues to pay down the remaining \$1.4 billion in debt taken on by the state's Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

Part of the agreement is expected to move through

the General Assembly this week. It would increase the amount of an employee's wages for which an employer must pay unemployment taxes – by 2.4 percent for each of the next five years. It would also increase the target balance of reserves from \$1 billion to \$1.75 billion.

It does not decrease the number of weeks or maximum amounts of benefits. A \$1.8 billion state cash appropriation would be included in a supplemental funding plan to spend the current year's anticipated surplus.

That will come next year as lawmakers look to spend an estimated surplus of about \$2.9 billion for the current fiscal year, ending June 30, 2023.



Illinois to create local food buying coops

By KAY SHIPMAN FarmWeek

Illinois will use \$14.4 million in U.S. Department of Agriculture funding to buy locally produced food and distribute it to those in need, according to state officials. The two-year program will involve direct purchases from eligible farmers and multiple aggregation sites where goods will be consolidated and then distributed to schools, nonprofits and food banks.

The Illinois Department of Agriculture and the Illinois Department of Human Services received the money as part of a local food purchasing cooperative agreement with USDA. Under the agreement, the state will

buy produce, protein and fresh processed food at fair market value directly from underserved farmers.

To develop an implementation plan, a planning committee will hold regional listening sessions facilitated by the University of Illinois Extension next year, said Kristi Jones, deputy Illinois agriculture director. Planning committee members include representatives of the Illinois Farm Bureau, Illinois Specialty Growers Association, the Illinois Association of Meat Processors, FFA, 4-H and the Minorities in Agriculture, Natural Resources and Related Sciences organization.

After Extension experts create an implementation plan based on infor-

mation gathered from the listening sessions, the state will issue a formal request for aggregation sites where farmers' products will be collected, packaged and distributed equitably to underserved committees. Jones noted the aggregations sites will be located around the state.

A large percentage of the \$14.4 million will be used to buy products directly from farmers, while a portion of the money will go for aggregation site operation, according to Jones.

Jones estimated the regional listening sessions will occur in the winter and spring of 2023 with an implementation plan coming out later in 2023.

Fast start, slow finish

Stark County boys go 2-3 at Wethersfield tourney

Things started well last week for the Stark County boys basketball team at the Wally Keller Invitational. But things could have finished better.

Following two consecutive victories, Stark County lost three times in a row at the season-opening tournament in Kewanee. A defeat Nov. 25, 67-62 in overtime to Bureau Valley, was particularly soulsucking, according to Rebels Coach Dusty Browning.

Stark County led 40-25 at halftime but scored only 18 over the third and fourth quarters. Bureau Valley rallied to take the lead late in regulation.

According to Browning, Stark County had a chance to win at the end of the fourth quarter but missed a layup. Cooper Balensiefen (16 points) then scored six in OT for Bureau Valley. Stark County had baskets from Daniel Kieser and Xander Swank.

Luke Rewerts finished with a game-high 19 points for Stark County but was scoreless after halftime. Kieser had 17 points and Swank scored 11.

The following night, Elmwood defeated Stark County 41-33 despite 14 points from Rewerts and 11 from Kieser. Elmwood led 20-14 at intermission and 31-20 after three quarters.

"We never had any offensive rhythm and struggled scoring points the entire game," Browning stated after that game. "I think we were still in shock from last night's loss."

On Nov. 23, Kieser had 18 points in a 60-37 loss to Putnam County, which finished the tournament 4-1 to win it. Elmwood (4-1) was runner-up, and host Wethersfield (3-2) finished third.

Kieser and Rewerts were selected to the all-tournament team.

Stark County plays its home opener Friday night against Brimfield.

In the freshman-sophomore portion of the Wally Keller event, Stark County finished second.

Riverdale went 5-0 in the tourney. Host ROWVA-Williamsfield was 4-1, United 3-2, Henry 2-3 and West Central 1-4. Galva was host Tuesday night to Midland and travels Friday night to North Fulton.
