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‘Red Wave’ in election was strongest in Fulton County

LEWISTOWN – The red wave that was supposed to carry Republicans to resounding victories in last week’s elections was uneven at best. At a state-wide level in Illinois, it was nonexistent.

But in Fulton County, a Democratic bastion for decades, the GOP might have reached a high-water mark.

Every Republican on the Fulton County ballot finished ahead of their Democratic opponent in head-to-head matchups, accord-



ing to unofficial results. Among them were Congressional and statewide constitutional offices, even as Democrats won most of those overall.

“Unfortunately, I think the days of Fulton County being a blue county are probably behind us for a while,” said Laura Hepp Kessel, who since July has led the county Democratic Party.

In the race for Fulton County Sheriff, Republican Jon Webb defeated Democrat Ryan Maricle by more than 1,300 votes out of about 13,000 cast. Webb will become the county’s first GOP sheriff in recent memory and succeeds Jeff Standard, a Democrat who served for 16 years. He endorsed Webb.

Perhaps a more striking example of Republican ascendancy came in the Fulton County Board results. Republican candidates won 8 of 15 board seats. That gives the GOP the board majority for the first time in at

least 40 years, according to County Clerk Patrick O’Brian.

“That’s probably the one and only (other) time that’s happened,” said O’Brian, who is a Republican and former County Board member. “It didn’t last very long, either.”

This election was the first since the board voted to downsize from 21 members, in part because of population loss. Los-

ing used to be the predominant theme among Fulton County Republicans.

Democrats long were dominant in the county, thanks to organized labor. Unions were prevalent in what had been the county’s two major industries – coal mining and agricultural-equipment manufacturing at the old International Harvester plant in Canton.

Those businesses have disappeared or declined, but until recently, the Democratic voting habit remained.

Constitutional amendment approved

SPRINGFIELD – Illinois voters have approved a state constitutional amendment guaranteeing workers the right to organize and engage in collective bargaining.

Estimates compiled by multiple media outlets projected Tuesday that the ballot measure had support on an estimated 53 percent of the total ballots cast in the election, with more than 95 percent of the ballots counted. That’s enough for approval under one of two paths to passage for a constitutional amendment in Illinois.

The amendment, which will be added to the Bill of Rights of the Illinois Constitution, states that employees have a fundamental right to organize and bargain collectively “for the purpose of negotiating

MOUNTAIN LION MYTHS

Pair of big cats turns rumor mill

There’s much ado about mountain lions in Illinois these days, as the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) has recently documented two cougars traveling though the Land of Lincoln.

Since those back-to-back reports in September and October, it seems as if everyone had a mountain lion story. Almost as if scripted, once initial reports are made public, the mountain lion and black panther sightings seemed to jump a thousandfold. Along with sightings, many old myths and misconceptions also

began resurfacing.

If one were to believe all the internet, coffee shop, gas station, quilt club and duck-blind chatter, Illinois should be overrun with big cats.

But the facts seem to offer a

different perspective, albeit not quite as exciting a perspective.

Here’s a quick recap of documented cougar encounters in Illinois. According to IDNR:

No bidders emerge for JFL field

FARMINGTON – The saga of the current JFL football field is no closer to resolution after Monday’s meeting of the Farmington School Board.

No bids were submitted to meet the \$50,000 minimum sale price for the field, located near the old high school and owned by the school district.

In an effort to speed up the sale, the school board did approve engaging a real estate agent. Board members and Superintendent Zac Chatterton also reiterated their support for the JFL.

“The district is committed to making sure the JFL has a home,” Chatterton said. “If we don’t get the property sold, you’ll probably be back at the property because

“I think with those jobs going away, so is that Democratic support,” said Kessel, who won re-election to the county board. “We have some organized labor in the county that maybe aren’t voting for the candidates in the party that generally supports them.”

Kessel, who moved to Fulton County about seven years ago, said she isn’t sure why that’s happened.

“I wish I had the answer, but I definitely think we have some people who are voting against their interests,” she said.

A decade ago, no County Board members

were Republicans. That might have been a recent low point for the party, which is outnumbered 15-5 on the current board.

Local voters’ drift to the GOP has been building since that County Board nadir, according to O’Brian. He attributed it to cultural changes in the national Democratic Party. Once a predominantly working-class group, Democrats have become more well-to-do and suburban.

“It’s just followed the trend of rural downstate Illinois,” O’Brian said. “There’s other counties that are around us that have followed that trend. It’s just that disconnect.

It’s the Midwest rural-values disconnect from the modern Democratic Party.”

O’Brian cited Tazewell County, one of Fulton County’s neighbors. Following last week’s results, there will be no Democrats in any elected position in Tazewell County government. That’s a first for either party, according to County Clerk John Ackerman.

“I think that the Fulton County results mirrored what we’re seeing across rural America,” Kessel said. “Republicans are making gains in rural areas. Fulton County had stayed blue for some years, but we’re kind of following suit.”

Democrat. She received about 1,100 fewer votes than did O’Brian.

According to Kessel, regaining Democratic influence in the county will take time and effort.

“We just need to continue to be involved, to be engaged, to encourage participation,” she said.

Still, for all the recent Republican success, O’Brian isn’t sure whether the county’s current red tinge is lasting or cyclical. Fulton County Democrats serve as circuit clerk (Charlene Markley), coroner (Steve Hines) and state’s attorney (Justin Jochums). And last week, the so-called Worker’s Rights Amendment to the Illinois Constitution received 54 percent support in the county. Democrats had championed the amendment.

“Worker’s rights and collective bargaining is still important in Fulton County,” O’Brian said. “That base of union solidarity is still here. That’s still here, and that will always be here.

“But a lot of folks feel like they’ve been left behind by the modern party. And it shows in the results.”

O’Brian has been instrumental in the growth of the Fulton County GOP. In 2018, despite being among only four Republican members, his county board peers selected him chairman. Two years later, he was elected to his current position, the first Republican clerk since 1978.

Last week, O’Brian ran unopposed for re-election and received about 11,000 votes. Also running unopposed was County Treasurer Staci Mayall, a

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Mother Nature has a population plan, too

A scientist friend recently noted that at today’s rate of consumption, the world is environmentally and economically sustainable for roughly 1 billion people. “That means with the world’s population of 8 billion,” he half-joked, “you’re a goner.”

Right, just not right now; let nature take its course, eh?

Recent population trends, however, show that nature might already be winnowing us a bit faster – still too slow for my friend, but winnowing non-etheless.

For example, at a recent conference on the U.S. economy, the discussion quickly diverted from the more normal short-term economic outlook to the rarely discussed longer-term view with demography, the science of populations, as the key yardstick.

In fact, wrote Bloomberg columnist Niall Ferguson, the “main event” at the Aspen Economic Strategy Group conference, “turned out to be a series of disquieting papers on the U.S. demographic trends and their implications. These turn out to be,” judged Ferguson, a senior fellow at Stanford University, “a big deal – and at first sight a rather bad one.”

Bad for the nation’s quickly-aging population because America’s steadily falling birth rates will, he notes citing research, “lead to slower population growth, which in turn [will] cause slower economic growth and present fiscal challenges” like Social Security “which is banking” on a growing population “to keep its actuarial deficit manageable...”

Still, adds Ferguson, the United Nations (U.N.) estimates that if the U.S. birth rate returns to pre-1980s levels (slim chance) and the country reopens its immigration doors (even slimmer chance), its population could rise to 394 million by 2100, or 17 percent more than today.

If, however, the American birth rate remains historically low and the country continues to limit immigration, the U.S. population will drop to 280 million in 80 years, or 16 percent less than today.

The numbers are far more certain if the focus is China, America’s biggest ag importer.

“By contrast,” Ferguson explains, “the U.N. offers no scenario in which China’s population does not decline. Best case, it falls by a fifth. Base case” – essentially the median – “it declines by 46 percent, to 771 million,” from today’s 1.4 billion. “Worst case, it falls by nearly two thirds, to 494 million.”

Think what 1 billion less people in China means to both the world and world markets, and think fast because, according to the Bloomberg writer, “The Chinese government has stopped denying it has a demographic problem.” Last month China “admitted that its population” would start to shrink before 2025.

But that’s only if China’s current population numbers are true. Recent reports strongly suggest that China’s infamous one-child policy – that limited families to one child from 1979 until 2016 – actually trimmed today’s overall population to 1.2 billion, substantially less than its official count of 1.41 billion.

Despite these projected declines, the U.N. still sees global population at 10 billion by 2059, then entering a generation-long leveling off period.

Overall population decline is estimated to begin around 2086.

Ninety-five percent of all the population growth until then, says the U.N., will occur in the relatively young, relatively poor sub-Saharan nations of Africa.

Strikingly, that means that in less than 40 years – or about the average length of an American farmer’s career – sub-Saharan Africa will have 2 billion more people to feed, cloth and shelter; China might have 1 billion less; and rural America will be emptier than it is today.

Another massive shift already in the cards is, again, in China, where its recently reappointed leader, Xi Jinping, continues to push farmers to “divert resources from profitable agribusinesses to basic staples” so the nation will be less dependent on the “hostile” west “led by the U.S.,” according to the Financial Times.


If that shift proves successful, China’s impact on U.S. ag markets – now a \$36 billion-a-year customer – will change long before its shrinking population shrinks its collective stomach.

That is, if Mother Nature and her increasingly intense floods, droughts, hurricanes, rising seas, melting glaciers and other climate-forged scythes don’t winnow most of us first.

wages, hours and working conditions, and to protect their economic welfare and safety at work.”

It also prohibits state and local governments from enacting laws that interfere with that right, including passage of so-called “right-to-work” laws, which prohibit requiring membership in a union as a condition of employment.

On election night, the Vote Yes for Workers’

Rights campaign declared victory, but media outlets were slow to confirm that due to the complicated rules in Illinois for passing a constitutional amendment.

The state constitution provides two pathways for passing an amendment. It must either be approved by 60 percent of all those voting on the measure or by more than 50 percent of all ballots cast in the election.

According to projec-

tions, the amendment received about 2.1 million “yes” votes and 1.5 million votes against. That’s 58.4 percent of the votes cast on that issue but about 53 percent of all the ballots cast in the election.

“From day one, the Vote Yes for Workers’ Rights campaign has been based on the simple idea that every Illinois worker deserves better. Better pay, stronger benefits, and safer workplaces don’t

just help workers thrive; they strengthen our state and keep us all safe,” Illinois AFL-CIO President Tim Drea said in a statement on election night.

The amendment will become effective once the Illinois State Board of Elections certifies results of the election. The board is to meet on Dec. 5.

Billtown grades 3-8 show testing improvement

WILLIAMSFIELD – Improved performance in statewide testing of students in grades 3-8 was a topic of discussion at Monday’s meeting of the Williamsfield School Board.

Like many schools, Williamsfield showed a decline in average scores for the Illinois Assessment of Readiness tests in 2021 following the pandemic. But Williamsfield’s 2022 IAR scores have improved and have the district standing 9th out of 32 area schools in terms of combined IAR average according to numbers compiled by Superinten-

dent Tim Farquer.

Williamsfield’s combined average of 34.3 was up from 31.5 last year but down from a 50 average in 2019. Billtown students scored 43.9 in IAR’s English Language Arts section

and 24.7 in the math component. Those numbers were also up from 2021 but down from 2019.

In other business, the board applauded Farquer for his efforts to secure \$2.6 million in grant fund-

ing to switch the district’s school bus fleet to electric vehicles.

it’s already all set up.

“You won’t be without a facility. That’s been the promise since the get-go.”

JFL supporters at the meeting were glad to hear that, but are also concerned about the timeline of what happens next, since their lease expires on Nov. 30. Once hired, a real-estate agent will have 120 days to sell the property at the minimum price of \$50,000.

Previously, it was thought that Sue and Scott Smith – owners of a building north of the field – had interest in purchasing the field.

JFL Director Tom Oldfield said if the property sells, volunteers will need time to move the scoreboard, press box and playground equipment currently located at the property, as well as football equipment, uniforms and tackling dummies.

And Oldfield said it could be difficult for the school district to have a dedicated JFL field prepared on its property in time for the July 25 start of practice. He said advice from experts is to give a new field one year to fill in before playing on it.

In addition to nightly practices, Oldfield said the JFL has up to seven games per weekend on its field.

“We just kind of need some direction,” Oldfield said.

“We can press the varsity field into use for one year if we have to,” Board Member Keith Depperman said. “I know that’s a leap of faith. But really, as a board, that’s all we can offer right now.”

In other business, the board tabled a decision on its bus transportation contract with Illinois Central until its Dec. 12 meeting.

“I think there are a lot of questions to be answered,” Board Member Eric Stanley said.

Illinois Central is asking Farmington to reopen its service contract to eliminate three bus routes but maintain the same costs for the district.

The bus company has reportedly said it needs to increase compensation to drivers to keep them and to recruit replacements.

The board also voted 7-0 for a resolution approving a tentative 2022 tax levy that will show a slight decrease due to a corresponding 3.66 percent increase in the equalized assessed value of properties in the district. A hearing on the levy will be held on Dec. 12 at 6:20 p.m., prior to the regular 6:30 p.m. board meeting.

In personnel, the board approved hiring Susan Payne as a playground

supervisor, Laura Atchley as a student facilitator in the elementary school and acknowledged the resignation of Becky Holloway. Also OK’d were Kerry Beoletto as high school scholastic bowl head coach and Joe Maske as an assistant coach and the following volunteer high school coaches: Jerod Jones, Jake Melton, Kevin Frye, Broc Shymansky, Jake Jennings, Mat Huber, Cade Lansford and Kyle Peckham, all in high school wrestling; Emma Vallas, girls basketball; and Nate Schroder and Justin Anderson, boys track.

The board also approved:

- Using an ISBE maintenance grant to focus on interior paint, carpet and windows in the junior high school.
- Changes made to the 2023-24 Farmington Course Catalog.

High School FFA members reported to the board on their activities. Highlights include first-place finishes by the Ag Sales team at the section and district events, which advances the team to the state competition this Saturday at Lincoln Land college in Springfield. Anna Webel was third overall and Jacob Gilles was fifth.

The FFA’s 16-acre farm produced 60.5 bushels per acre this fall while an 8-acre test plot made 69.7 bpa.

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COUGAR: Illinois is not releasing mountain lions

- There have been eight confirmed cougars in Illinois from 2002-22.
- A cougar was killed by a train in Randolph County in 2002. A bow hunter killed another cougar in Mercer County in 2004.
- In April 2008, a cougar was shot and killed in the Roscoe Village neighborhood in Chicago.
- All cougars were sub-adult (2 to 3-year-old) males. DNA analysis indicated that these animals were genetically similar to cougars from South Dakota and strongly suggests that these were all wild males dispersing from that western population.
- Images taken by trail cameras in Jo Daviess County in September 2012 and in Morgan, Pike and Calhoun counties in October and November 2012 were confirmed by IDNR to show a live cougar. Given the long distances typically traveled by cougars and the proximity of the counties (especially Calhoun, Morgan, and Pike), it is possible that the camera images may have shown the same cougar.
- Illinois Conservation Police killed a cougar at a farmstead in Whiteside County in 2013.
- In November 2014, trail camera images in Sangamon and Effingham counties were confirmed by the IDNR to show a

cougar. The distances and chronology of the photos suggest that they may have shown the same animal.

- There was a confirmed sighting of a cougar captured on a trail camera on private property this year in Whiteside County on Sept. 28, with field confirmation on Sept. 29. IDNR experts believe it may be the same cougar struck and killed in DeKalb County on Interstate 88 on Oct. 16. That cougar was transferred to the University of Illinois Champaign-Urbana for a complete autopsy and DNA analysis.
- A collared mountain lion from Nebraska was captured near Springfield on Oct. 22.

Obviously, it is indeed possible to encounter a cougar in Illinois. But is it probable? Not so much.

“The animals periodically wander into our state, which is exciting, but most of Illinois does not have the habitat to support populations, so they will continue to move on,” said Peggy Doty of the University of Illinois Extension.

Additionally, Illinois does not have sufficient habitat to support stable populations of these large predators. Southern Illinois has the most contiguous forest in the state but still could not support many mountain lions, says Joy O’Keefe, a University of Illinois natural resources and environmental sciences assistant professor and Extension wildlife specialist.

Here are answers from IDNR regarding some of

the most common myths and misconceptions about mountain lions.

Question: *Is there a breeding population of mountain lions in Illinois?*

Answer: There is no evidence of a breeding population of mountain lions in Illinois. With a lack of documented females in Illinois, it is highly unlikely and not expected in the near future.

Q: *Are there any documented cases of females with cubs in Illinois?*

A: There have been none documented.

Q: *Did IDNR release any bobcats or mountain lions?*

A: Regarding mountain lions, state fish and wildlife agencies in states where mountain lions were once extirpated regularly hear stories that “the government” has released mountain lions or other animals in secret. That is a myth, and the reality is that the reintroduction of large carnivores is a very complex and public process involving years of research, planning and community engagement prior to any large animals being released (e.g., wolf reintroduction at Yellowstone National Park).

The IDNR has not released mountain lions in Illinois and has no plans to do so. Of the eight documented mountain lions in the last 20 years in Illinois that were able to be examined by IDNR, they were young males from western states, typically South Dakota and Nebraska.

Young mountain lions have the ability to cover vast distances in a relatively short time, with one of the furthest documented being a young male that traveled from South Dakota to Connecticut in 2011, an estimated distance of over 1,600 miles which was likely achieved in about two years’ time. Females are not known to disperse as far or as often as males.

Bobcats have also not been released by IDNR.

Q: *Is there such an animal as a black panther in Illinois or elsewhere?*

A: No, black panther is not actually a species, but a genetic color variant in individuals known as melanistic, in which the skin has increased amounts of dark pigment. This can happen in many animals and is essentially the opposite of albinism (lack of color pigment). Melanistic black panthers have been known to occur infrequently in leopards and jaguars. The mountain lion is the only big cat known to inhabit the U.S. A melanistic individual has never been scientifically documented in the wild or captivity.

Q: *Is the IDNR running a collared mountain lion study to track the movements of the large cats?*

A: No, the mountain lion captured in Springfield last month was the first collared mountain lion known to have entered Illinois. That cat was collared in Nebraska as part of a multi-year study.

He then spilled coffee to distract the clerk, placed the booze in his coat pocket, paid for the coffee and left.

The tequila was priced at \$69.99. As of early this week, police were searching for the suspect. A similar incident took place Oct. 24 at the Marathon station.

• FARMINGTON – A Farmington woman stole another woman’s credit card and used it to purchase a gift card, authorities allege. Taylor M. Beach, 26, was accused of using the stolen card about 10 p.m. Oct. 17 at

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Princeville TIF payment delayed

PRINCEVILLE – The Princeville Village Board’s attempt to approve a tax-increment-financing reimbursement will enter a third month, it appears.

During its meeting Nov. 7, the board again tabled a TIF-related item because it didn’t have enough eligible members to conduct a legal vote. An agreement to reimburse German-Bliss Equipment Co. for part of its \$1.5 million expansion project is to be considered again Dec. 5.

The issue first was deferred Oct. 3, because of a shortage of eligible trustees. Then and last week, Donald Peterson Jr. and Nathan Wineinger abstained from voting because they own property in the same TIF district as German-Bliss. State statues consider that a conflict of interest.

Another abstention last week came from Trustee Ron Delbridge, whose son works for German-

Bliss. The six-trustee board also has one vacancy, because Lisa Hughes resigned last month. Including Village President Jeff Troutman, that left the board one short of a TIF-related quorum.

Trustees didn’t appear to realize the situation until they attempted to vote.

“Here we go again,” Delbridge said with a laugh.

Troutman suggested the board try again Nov. 22, by which time he expects the Hughes vacancy to be filled. But Trustee Teresa Gilroy said she will be absent for that meeting.

If approved eventually, German-Bliss is to be reimbursed up to \$345,000 over multiple years. The firm at 624 W. Spring St. sells agricultural and construction equipment. Money would come from new real-estate taxes the project is expected to spawn.

The board was able to OK another TIF-related

issue deferred last month for the same reasons. The owner of a residence at 504 N. Walnut Ave. is to be reimbursed \$2,500 from the village Residential Rehabilitation Program, which helps pay for completed exterior physical improvements.

In TIF districts, property taxes that are to go to various bodies are frozen. Subsequent tax increases are diverted into a fund used for infrastructure improvements that can lead to area redevelopment.

Peterson said he isn’t likely to have his property removed from the TIF district. Wineinger suggested his efforts are on hold, pending legal advice.

The board also approved construction of a 10-by-20-foot prefabricated storage shed at 219 W. South St. Another vote authorized storage facilities as permitted uses in certain commercial districts. A mini-storage building is planned for property located near Princeville Junior-Senior High School, Troutman said.

Regarding new building permits issued, Troutman listed six. The permits are for:

- a 70-foot stretch of 4-foot-high chain-link fence at 330 E. Main St.;
- demolition of a roof over a porch at 526 W. Main St.;
- construction of a single-family home at 418 W. Blanchard St.;
- construction of a 12-by-16-foot garden shed in a back yard at 1409 N. Town Ave.;
- construction of an 8-by-8-foot garden shed in a back yard at 217 W. Evans St.;
- and installation of solar panels on a roof at 209 E. North St.

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Businesses showing interest in Elmwood

ELMWOOD – The storefront a fast-food restaurant once occupied in Elmwood might soon return to productive use.

It isn't clear what might be in store for the home of the former Subway restaurant, 102 W. Main St. Amy Davis, the Elmwood municipal economic-development director, said the space might open next month.

When interviewed following a City Council meeting Nov. 8, Davis suggested she wasn't free to reveal additional information. Subway closed earlier this year.

According to Davis, three individuals are considering locations in Elmwood for their businesses.

"Some established and some new," she stated. "There are never any guarantees if (it) will end up happening, but we are working hard to find suitable spots and support them in any way we can."

During the council meeting, Elmwood Police Chief Aaron Bean said his short-handed department is close to hiring a part-time officer. But that might fall through, depending on whether the Peoria County Sheriff's Office wants to hire the

prospective Elmwood officer.

According to Bean, the candidate is Dorian Utsinger, an Elmwood resident who is on the Farmington police force. Utsinger was planning to work part-time in Elmwood while attending school.

But Utsinger also has applied for a sheriff's-deputy opening and had at least one interview. According to Bean, if the sheriff hires Utsinger, he can't work for another law-enforcement agency.

Bean said he has another candidate should Utsinger become unavailable, but that person requires training.

The police department has lost to other jobs two part-time officers in recent months. Bean and Officer Mike Darrah have been handling weekend shifts in their absence.

"Right now we're doing OK, but we're burning our budget up," Bean said about overtime.

The council also learned City Hall was to receive four new exterior doors.







tian, but had to reschedule because the foe did not have enough players. Instead, Elmwood opens today at Canton and then plays in the Brimfield Tournament Nov. 19, 23, 25 and 26.

Brimfield

Despite losing four starters and a coaching staff from last year’s 32-4 state championship team, the Lady Indians proved Monday they will still be a team to contend with.

Brimfield (1-0) won easily on the road at Princeville (0-1), 44-24. The Lady Indians led 25-5 at halftime and got contributions from several players who spent most of last season watching the best team in Class 1A.

And Brimfield won despite just two points from senior Elly Doe, the lone returning starter. New Coach Josh McKown had said heading into the season he was “confident we have other girls who can score” and Monday proved his point.

Leading Brimfield was 6-foot-1 sophomore center Ava Heinz, who had 19 points, while Kylie Vaughn added 8 and Olivia Kappes tallied 6. Vaughn is a junior guard who was slated for time last year before she was sidelined in the first week of December after tearing the ACL in her knee. Kappes is also a junior guard who saw occasional minutes last year. Both are building blocks for McKown’s team, which also started junior CJ Troxell.

“They’ve worked really hard and I’m anxious to see how we stack up against other teams,” McKown said.

Added support comes from two 5-10 juniors who are out for the first time since eighth grade: Kierra Johnson and Ava Simpson. Senior Taylor Wiewel will also see time in McKown’s

rotation.

And then there’s Doe, a 43 percent 3-point shooter last year who averaged 5.6 ppg and had plenty of clutch baskets. “She knows that she’s probably going to get most teams to gear their gameplan to stop her,” McKown said.

That may not be the case for long if Doe’s younger teammates keep stepping up, though.

McKown said he picks Elmwood as the favorite in the Prairieland Conference “until somebody proves otherwise.”

Princeville

Senior Destinee Harwood is back to lead the Lady Princes after putting up more than 14 points per game last season. But the 5-6 Harwood will need to handle a lot more attention from defenses after the graduation of Caitlyn Thole and Jesenia Horton-Meza from a 19-10 team.

“She didn’t have a lot of defense played on her last year because of those two seniors,” Coach John Gross said. “But she’s a lot stronger than last year and she will be a threat taking the ball to the basket.”

Harwood scored 11 in Princeville’s 44-24 season-opening home loss to Brimfield on Monday.

Another returning starter is junior guard Kinley McGinn, who scored six

against Brimfield and figures to share point guard duties with Harwood.

Other starters figure to be junior Sydney Kratzer, senior Leah Wieland and junior Brianna Brodie, who at 5-9 is Princeville’s tallest player and “is going to have to do a little bit of everything,” according to Gross.

Two others who are part of the rotation are skilled defender Paisley Schock and guard Sierra Stahl.

“We don’t have much height,” Gross said. “We’ve got some experience, but it’s all experience as role players, except for Destinee. So it’s going to be interesting, especially early.”

Gross calls Elmwood a top area team and listed Annawan, Abingdon-Avon, West Central and Knoxville among Lincoln Trail Conference favorites.

Princeville can contend too, Gross said, “if we play well. The best thing we have going for us this year is we have a lot of our rougher games at home.”

One issue for Princeville is low turnout. With just 12 girls, Gross said the team will not play JV games until more players join the squad.

Farmington

Senior Anna Webel is the lone returning starter from a 13-16 Farmers team that placed fourth in the Prairieland last season.

Coach Brad Whitcomb expects top newcomers will be junior guards Kyleigh Miller, Mariah Hayden and Madilyn Hanlin, along with junior forward Emily Vallianatos.

All five should have a chance to score on a given night.

“We have very good team speed and we want to play fast,” Whitcomb said. “We have a very balanced team this year and aren’t reliant on one or two players to score. We will look to utilize our depth as well by increasing the

tempo at which the game is played.”

A fast tempo will also be important for Farmington as it attempts to make up for an overall lack of size.

Whitcomb listed Elmwood and Lewistown as Prairieland favorites.

Farmington hosts this year’s Fulton County Tournament. The Lady Farmers were to play North Fulton Tuesday at 6 p.m., South Fulton today (Nov. 17) at 6 and Lewistown on Saturday (Nov. 19) at 7:30 p.m.

ROWVA-Williamsfield

Senior guard Carolyn German returns for her fourth season as a starter after averaging 11 ppg and earning all-conference in

the ICAC and LTC. German also collected 5.8 rpg and 3 apg for the Lady Cougars, who finished 13-18 and 8th in the LTC.

Also back is part-time starter Emma Seibold, who will be joined in the starting lineup by junior guard Lizzie Johnston and junior center Maggie Blust, both backups last winter.

“We should be solid offensively. We have a nice mix of shooters from perimeter, with a solid center who can play both inside and outside,” Coach Michael Weitekamp said. “We have more speed than we’ve had in the past, which will allow our game to be faster and more ag-

gressive than the past two seasons.”

Defense and rebounding are the areas that need the most work.

Weitekamp said he expects his team to push for the top half of the LTC and ICAC and hopes for the program’s first winning record in several years.

Weitekamp lists top teams in the ICAC as Elmwood, Illini Bluffs and Brimfield and Annawan and Knoxville in the LTC.

German scored 14, Johnston 13 and Blust 5 in a 40-34 loss to West Central in Monday’s opener. “We just didn’t shoot as well as we normally will,” Weitekamp said.

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
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
