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Brimfield parents speak out against school curriculum

For The Weekly Post BRIMFIELD - Some parents of Brimfield School District fifthgraders believe some of their children's reading assignments are inappropriate based on age.

For about an hour during a school-board meeting Nov. 16, parents and others criticized selections from Wit & Wisdom. It's an English Language Arts curriculum produced by Great Minds, a Washington, D.C.-based publicbenefit corporation.

Almost all of at least eight who

addressed the board said assigned passages from Wit & Wisdom books overemphasized violence, murder, racism, cannibalism and promiscuity, among other things. The newly adopted curriculum is for fifth-through-eighth-grade students.

"I don't think everything has to be sunshine and rainbows," said one parent, Heather Donnelli. "But ... if it's going to be the same repetitive doom and gloom and death and gore, I don't feel like that's appropriate, even for my eighth-grader."

District officials defended the curriculum but also suggested it wasn't perfect.

"There's things we'll learn that we'll tweak and do differently, perhaps," Superintendent Tony Shinall said after the meeting, which about 30 attended. "But I trust the people who made the recommendations to vet curriculum. And those are our principals and teachers."

Among the Wit & Wisdom works mentioned during the meeting was "Thunder Rolling in the Mountains" by Scott O'Dell

and Elizabeth Hall. The book fictionalizes the Nez Perce War fought in 1877 between Native Americans and the U.S. Army.

Parent Holly Greer told the board her fifth-grade son was assigned passages to read aloud three to five times a day for a week, then reflect on them.

Greer said one passage described a soldier shooting a pregnant woman in the chest and her shooting him in the face. Another described children making masks of dead soldiers, with severed ears and with eyes hanging off

their cheeks.

"Nothing about this enabled my son to be more fluent, enabled him to write strong paragraphs," parent Lindsey Birkel said. "It was very fearful, it was very violent and it was very graphic. And he does not need to be exposed to

Other Wit & Wisdom books focus on white people's mistreatment of various cultures and races, according to Greer.

"Is this really a good idea, to have a constant stream of fifth-

The Feed Store shares space with Country Feed & Supplies, an agricultural business.

FARMINGTON – The City of Farmington will be looking for a new city administrator after Monday's meeting, but may not have a new mayor after the April 4 election.

City Administrator Rollen Wright

tendered a letter of resignation to the city council prior to Monday's meeting and will retire from his position effective Dec. 22. Wright, 63, has been administrator since 2009 and

"This is the hardest decision I have made since we closed our family business on October 31, 2006,' Wright said in his letter.

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
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

Continued from Page 1 grade books point out only one race's flaws without redeeming characteristics?" she said.

Brimfield Grade School Principal Julie Albritton said the Wit & Wisdom selections fulfill state education standards. Some of the passages probably weren't suitable for use in class, Albritton suggested, but the books were an improvement over anthologies the district was using.

Albritton also said some parents might be taking some passages out of context.

"This is probably the best curriculum I've seen in 23 years – the best writing, the best conversation, the most engagement in our stu-

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that are educational and accessible.

dents' classrooms," Albritton said.

Shinall said he's received a handful of recent emails from parents complaining about Wit & Wisdom. Albritton appears to have received more than that.

"My whole week has been responding to emails about this and misconceptions," she said. "I can't be bombarded. I haven't gotten to my job in over a week."

In Board Member Mark Bell's opinion, a different program of studies might have elicited fewer adverse responses.

"I don't know why we're using a curriculum that is going to cause a lot of strife," he said. "It's a dis-

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traction from learning.
There's lots of curriculums out there. If this book was read in ninth or 10th grade, I don't think you'd have a single problem. There's obviously some disconnect here."

The literature issue wasn't the only complaint audience members had. Several decried formation of a support group for LGBTQ high school students that meets on campus. According to Shinall, the group was formed in response to a student survey.

"I'm not advocating hate for anyone at all," said Matt Gillespie, who also said he isn't a high school parent. "I am asking today that we as a district stop the support of sexual perversion."

Gillespie appeared to find an ally in Board Member Patrick Meyer, who also questioned the Wit & Wisdom passages. "Where do we draw the line?" Meyer said. "I understand inclusion, but there is a time and a place for school and education, and there is a time and a place for other things. This is not the place to have that."


Shinall said the LGBTQ group is voluntary. Its existence would continue to be assessed, as will be Wit & Wisdom.

Board President Steve Updyke praised the giveand-take about the curriculum, although he indicated it might be more appropriate at a parent-teacher level.

"As a board, we don't get involved in day-to-day lesson plans. (But) we want to know what's going on," Updyke said. "We do not want a divisive curriculum at all. Just have a serious conversation with the teachers."

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

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




Of cold deer hunting & 'lame' cartoons

nois that even insurance salesman Scott Jehle of Elmwood bagged a 13pointer with a nifty drop tine.



Memories of camping along the Mississippi River


As widespread rains begin to slowly refill lakes, reservoirs, and rivers, Thanksgiving thoughts turn back to the southern Illinois dairy farm of my youth where the Mississippi River, just a mile from our dairy barn, was a constant, often dominating presence.

Except, that is, in the late summer months when everything around the farm – cows, hired men, and even the river – moved in a slow granny gear.

That was especially so on Saturday evenings where nearly 100

panting Holsteins and an airless milking parlor promised a sweaty session of steamy drudgery.

Those languid Saturdays were, however, the perfect time for two young adventurers, my older

It was a rhetorical question: Two fewer sulking teenagers for supper and another long night in an un-air conditioned farm house? The answer came quickly, "Go!"

Like most Tom Sawyers, we traveled light. Two cotton sleeping bags, some frozen hot dogs, potato chips, butter, a handful of sliced bread, a black skillet and a half-dozen eggs were breakfast, supper, and sleep. A rinsed chlorine jug from the dairy barn held a gallon of water and, of course, we each carried a pocket knife and matches.

We never took a tent because we didn't have a tent.

Ten minutes later we were crossing the heifer pasture to climb the

levee that shouldered the western bank of the Kaskaskia River. Our "trail" was the levee and its biggest danger was a sleepy dry cow or two blocking the way.

When the Kaskaskia levee married the Mississippi River levee, David and I left it for a short hike through a forest of silver maples, rattling cottonwoods and swaying willows.

Adventurous as it sounds – and it was for us – the simple geographic fact remained that had we backtracked to the levee, we could have easily seen the dairy barn, dry cows and Mom's clothesline in the distance.

Still, we were in the middle of our own personal kingdom, a massive sandbar at the meeting point of the brown, lazy Kaskaskia River and the wide, roiling Mississippi. Here was enough driftwood for an allnight fire and acres of sugary sand on which to make our starlit beds.

In no time at all we were Marquette and Joliet, or Lewis and Clark, risking our sacred lives, used baling twine and fast-melting butter by walking through a forest of ancient trees, uncharted creeks and hordes of hot dog-hungry opossums and raccoons.

And we were free; the kind of free that farm boys only felt when there were no cows or alfalfa fields within sight. We were buccaneers on a free-flowing river with the freedom to go anywhere.

Except into the water. Our mother's only condition to get us out of her frazzled hair was no swimming in either the Kaskaskia, a lazy, oversized creek most summers, or the broad, secretive Mississippi.

And we never did. Honest. But we explored the nearby woods, ran barefoot through the sand and sat for long silent minutes watching the Mississippi flow around the next bend.

Supper was hot dogs roasted on the end of sharpened willow branches. Breakfast was eggs cracked, scrambled, and eaten from the skillet, and toast made over the still-hot fire. Butter-soaked, both.

Nights were the best, though. We always made a roaring campfire to ward off all things real and imagined.

Often we were awakened by towboats' drumming diesel engines as they clawed their way up the Big River's strong current. Other times their powerful searchlights, looking for channel markers, lit our camp like the noon sun.

The next morning, after more dangerous deep-woods explorations and less dangerous sandbar sitting, we'd slowly make our way home. Somehow we always arrived a few minutes after the rest of the family had departed for church, another sweat-dripping event we never regretted missing.

Now, though, that would be a small price to pay for two old men to meet back on Old Man River for one more starlit, lazy night amid the sand, willows and memories.

Toulon man pleads guilty to child porn charges

PEORIA – In a dark, cold corridor in the U.S. Courthouse Thursday morning, Jason Musselman exchanged hugs and tears with his

Less than one hour later, Musselman was handcuffed and led out of Courtroom A by two U.S. Marshals after pleading guilty to three felony child pornography charges.

Musselman pleaded guilty to production, distribution and possession of child pornography and now faces 15-30 years in a federal prison, according to his attorney Kevin Sullivan of Peoria.

Judge James E. Shadid scheduled Musselman's sentencing for March 23, at 10 a.m. Shadid also cautioned Musselman that, "the sentence imposed could be different than any estimate Mr. Sullivan has given

Shadid said the maximum sentence for Musselman would be not more than 60 years and not more

than \$750,000 in fines.

Sullivan said by pleading guilty, Musselman effectively cut the maximum sentence in half to 30 years. Sullivan said he did not believe Musselman would face the \$750,000 in fines.

Musselman will be held in a jail until his sentencing date. Sullivan said he was uncertain where Musselman would be held, noting that the U.S. Marshals contract with several Illinois correctional facil-

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change to previously released election filing dates. The first day to file petitions for the election is Dec. 12 at 8 a.m. and the last day to file petitions is Dec. 19 by 4 p.m. Dec. 27 is the last day for a local official to certify candidates with the county.

In other business, the council approved the purchase of a 2023 Dodge Ram 1500 pickup as the city's new K-9 vehicle. The truck costs \$38,580, less than the cost of a new squad car according to Wright, but once fully equipped will cost \$57,715.50.

Police Chief Chris Darsham said money for the new vehicle comes from "officer-generated money" from tickets and other fees, not from tax dollars.

Darsham said the plan is to take out of service and sell two current police vehicles, 2013 and 2015 Ford Interceptors.

The council also OK'd using funds from the federal CARES act to pay for Christmas bonuses for city staffers: \$600 for fulltimers and \$300 for parttimers.

A total of \$10,000 was also approved to be set side for employee bonuses in 2023 and 2024.

Herb Stufflebeam reported to the council that the Oak Ridge Cemetery Board of Managers is planning to redo entrances to the cemetery and is seeking input on "what people want the cemetery entrance to look like."

Continued from Page 1 workers \$100 Visa gift cards. According to Superintendent Shannon Duling, the amount reflected the

employees for their hardships during the coronavirus pandemic. Total cost for gift cards will be about \$7,000, Duling said.

Among action items, the board approved the district tax levy for the 2023 fiscal year. The district is to levy \$5,371,776, an increase of about \$233,000 over the previous fiscal year.

Taxable assessed property value in the district is expected to be about \$108.8 million, an increase of almost \$6 million from last fiscal year. That's a departure from the usual stability, according to Duling.

"I think the housing market has driven up a lot of the (value) on a lot of those homes," he said. "I think it's going to drop, because the market's going to bail out. But I think we'll have one more year where the market is fairly high."

The board also authorized a five-year extension for Go Math!, a Houghton Mifflin Harcourt-produced curriculum used at the grade school. The price is about \$45,000, some \$2,700 more than a threeyear option.

Regarding personnel, the board approved Brett Williams as a high school assistant baseball coach; approved an extendedleave request for secondgrade teacher Kahlia Metz; and approved stipends of \$6,000 for Luisa Horton-Meza, \$5,000 for Stephanie Baysingar and \$1,500 for Kelly Elwell for taking over the daycare-director duties.

The board also OK'd a five-year contract renewal with Tracy Strebel as a district innovative-practices coach and the coordinator of its Illinois Multi-Tiered System of Support process.

Strebel helps Princeville teachers improve instructional strategies and helps struggling students.

When Peoria County Sheriff's Office deputies arrived, they found Markham on the front porch, bleeding from his face. A pair of medics attempted to treat Markham, but he yelled at the two to get out of his house, according to a report.

After cursing the deputies and threatening to stab them, a struggle ensued. Markham grabbed a deputy and elbowed one of the medics in the chest, the report stated.

Eventually, deputies subdued and handcuffed Markham, who was taken to Peoria County Jail. Among other crimes, Markham was accused of two counts of aggravated battery to a peace officer, two counts of aggravated battery to a medical worker and two counts of aggravated assault.

• WILLIAMSFIELD – A residential garage that caught fire last week in Williamsfield was deemed a total loss, according to authorities. The blaze began about 9 a.m. Nov. 15 at 129 N. Poplar St. By the time help arrived, the roof of the unattached 40by-60-foot wood-frame garage had collapsed, according to Ty Landon, a Williamsfield Fire Protection District trustee.

"It had fire coming from every part of the building," Landon said.

Firefighters from Brimfield, Elmwood and Yates City helped douse the flames in about two hours.

"We're short staffed all the time, let alone during the day during the week," Landon said. "But we were able to get it out with the help of area departments who have the same problem we do."

No injuries were reported. Cause of the fire was undetermined. Landon said nothing appeared suspicious.



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

Continued from Page 1 and feathers away, hopefully for a long time.

Since August, contractors, plasterers, painters and artists have given fresh life to the mural that depicts what downtown Brimfield looked like in 1909. Source for the mural is a postcard of the downtown from that era.

Brimfield High School art teacher Bernadine Tucker and her students painted the original mural

in 1977 over a 20-foot-by-80-foot brick wall that was faced with chicken wire and coated with cement and plaster.

A Brimfield art class updated the mural in 2001.

But of late, cracks had started showing up in the wall after water got behind the cement and plaster.

"At first we thought we could repair the wall and then do the mural. But when we got into it, we realized we had to take the whole exterior down," Keith Sherman said.

Dalton Construction of Elmwood handled the repair and repainting of the west wall, which was

primed and painted twice.

The final artistic brush work was left to Doug Hafner of Wyoming, a member of the Walldogs – artists whose murals brighten walls in many central Illinois towns and cities. Hafner also based his work on the 1909 postcard.

The Shermans paid for restoring the wall, while the Brimfield Area Men's Club funded the mural.

"It's a community asset," Keith said. "Hopefully now it's good for another 45 years."

Curtis admitted he was at first worried about the brighter oranges and reds of the new mural.

"But it just jumps out at you. The colors are a lot brighter," Curtis said. "It turned out very nice."

Curtis' other concern was fulfilling his daughter Micalena's request that the new mural incorporate a Dalmatian dog, since there was one in the old version. Hafner accomodated that request.

Also added to the new mural are names of all who helped work on the previous versions.

Now the wall can go back to serving as a backdrop for wedding pictures, mariage proposals and senior pictures.

"It's kind of a landmark," Keith said. "Curtis and I thought it was good to leave a legacy."

The brothers are also in the process of selling their pharmacy businesses in Brimfield and Princeville to Williamsfield native Kevin Frye. Kevin is pharmacist in Brimfield while his brother, Kody Frye, is the pharmacist in Princeville. Curtis also works part-time in Brimfield.

Last week, Illinois Comptroller Susana Mendoza visited the Brimfield pharmacy to discuss the state's Critical Access Pharmacy Program. Mendoza posted on Facebook, "These are community institutions where staff truly know their customers, and are there for the medically underserved. They deserve our gratitude and support."

Providing a cool mural for generations to come is an added bonus.

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





As the years went by, they always wondered what had become of Barbara's first son, who had been whisked away and placed for adoption immediately after his birth. Barbara wrote to the adoption agency and let them know she was open to being contacted by her son. When 50 years had gone by with no news, Barbara believed she would never know what happened to her firstborn.

But then in the spring of 2015 the phone rang and it was her son, John Owen, of Sanger, Calif., whose adoptive parents had both passed away. On Mothers Day of that year Barbara was reunited with her son and his husband, Tony Diaz, at their home east of Fresno.

They had seven wonderful years together, enjoying visits, vacations and many hours of telephone calls. And Barbara got to meet her granddaughter, Julianna Whittington, and three great-grandchildren.

Barbara and George were intensely in love for 58 years. Barbara loved birding, hiking and all things nature. For more than 20 years they backpacked into the northern California mountains once or twice each summer for a week at a time, swimming in crystalline lakes, spotting birds and bears, climbing into the high country and hiking in fields of wildflowers. Annual summer visits to Camp Mather, a family camp near Yosemite National Park run by the City of San Francisco, gave their sons a love of nature to match that of their parents.

Barbara suffered from congestive heart failure and COPD for the last two years of her life, but was diagnosed with cardiac amyloidosis only on Sept. 29. Amyloid plaque is a protein that is found in the brains of Alzheimers disease patients. In the heart it is incurable and terminal.

Hospice care set her up with a hospital bed in her home. For the first week Barbara's dear friend Mary Small moved in to care for her at night while George did daytime duty. When Mary had to leave, caretakers were hired, one for weeknights and another for weekends. George cared for her from 7 a.m. until 10 p.m. when the evening caretaker arrived. Barbara was at peace and glad to be out of the hospital.

Her final day was spent with her husband by her bedside, talking and holding hands. She was on the phone a half-hour before she passed with her "co-granny" Varda Zamir, the other grandmother of Barbara's grandson Oliver, in Hawaii, with whom Barbara had developed a close bond. She slipped away quietly at 6:05 p.m. leaving the world a darker, lonelier place. She remains in the hearts of her husband, family and many friends.

Barbara was a devoted 35-year member of Alcoholics Anonymous, where she had several sponsees over the years and was a popular speaker with her story of the adoption and reunion with her son John.

Her friends at the local fellowship held a celebration of her life on Saturday, Nov. 19, her son's 59th birthday.

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





Carlson is rebuilding a bit from a 16-10 team that returns only one player who received quality playing time. But Oliver Heinz isn't a bad returnee to have. The 6-4 senior forward averaged 15 points per game, was a first-team all-Inter-County selection and was a second-team Prairieland pick.

"It is a young squad," Carlson said. "I think it's a young, excited group that'll be anxious to learn."

Aside from Heinz, the only seniors on the Brimfield roster are guard Jesse Dawson and forward Konsta Hamalainen, an exchange student from Finland.

Carlson is looking for good things from junior shooting guard Drew Kieser, hobbled last season by a knee injury, and sophomore point guard Brady Johnson. He is among four sophomores on the roster.


