

Supreme Court stays cash bail provisions statewide

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD – A Kankakee County judge ruled Wednesday, Dec. 28, that lawmakers overreached their constitutional authority in passing a measure to abolish cash bail in Illinois, while other provisions in the wideranging SAFE-T Act criminal justice reform were not affected by the ruling.

The ruling by Judge Thomas W. Cunnington initially left the impending cash bail reform in limbo in at least 64 of Illinois' 102 counties that had joined the consolidated lawsuit ahead of the reform's scheduled Jan. 1 implementation.

A Dec. 31 order from the Illinois Supreme Court, however, stayed the cash bail provisions' implementation for all 102 counties until the court could rule on an appeal to the case on an expedited but indefinite timeline. The ruling prevented an uneven application of pretrial practices, as many counties had planned to forge ahead with cash bail changes until the order was issued.

Local counties involved with the lawsuit include Knox and Fulton. Peoria and Marshall counties had also indicated they would implement the new bail reform measures.

"(On Dec. 28) the Pretrial Fairness Act was declared unconstitutional. Although Peoria County did not participate in this ruling, we are required to follow it," Peoria County State's Attorney Jodi Hoos said in a press release. "When a statute is unconstitutional, the statute becomes invalid and has no force or effect on anyone. As a result, and until the Illinois Supreme Court provides further clarification, we will abide by this ruling and not implement the new bail reform."

Neither Cunnington's ruling nor the Supreme Court order invalidated other provisions of the SAFE-T Act that had already taken effect, such as reforms to police officer training and certification standards and police body camera requirements.

Cunnington wrote in a 36-page decision that the cash bail provisions effectively and improperly amended a section of the state's constitution that states "all persons shall be bailable by sufficient sureties," except in a few specific circumstances.

He also wrote that ending cash bail is an improper overreach by lawmakers, who have no constitutional authority to govern the *Continued on Page 2*

Toulon Tap burglary suspect surrenders

TOULON – The suspect in the Toulon Tap burglary turned himself in to law enforcement authorities on Dec. 20, according to Toulon Police Chief Gary Bent. The suspect remained incarcer-

ated in the LaSalle County Jail under a Stark County arrest warrant.

John P. Malik, 53, of Mendota, turned himself in to the Mendota Police Department after learning of the Stark County arrest warrant. He allegedly burglarized the Toulon Tap tavern on Dec. 11 between 1-2 a.m.

Malik was identified as the alleged burglar using footage from a video surveillance camera. On Dec.13, Stark County State's Attorney Caroline Borden Campion and Chief Bent appeared before Circuit Judge Bruce P. Fehrenbacher and requested the arrest warrant. Toulon Police, in conjunction with the Stark County Sheriff's Office, have extradited Malik to Stark County Jail from the LaSalle County Jail. Malik will remain incarcerated in the Stark County Jail under a \$200,000 bail bond, or \$2,000 cash, which is 10 percent.

Henry County land auction gets top price

As the cold, post-holiday reality of winter arrives, land auction season is ready to get hot. And while interest rates doubled in 2022, land prices have still increased.

In fact, on Dec. 20, Murray Wise Associates auctioned a farm that is believed to have generated the highest sales price ever in Henry County. A 38-acre parcel of high-quality soils located just southwest of Kewanee sold for \$21,100 per acre and a 9-acre tract sold for \$18,100 per acre.

While that pales in comparison to the \$30,000-per-acre price tag from a Nov. 11 auction in Iowa for 73.19 acres, it does underline a market trend that has seen land prices increase by an estimated 42 percent since 2020. During the first half of 2022, farmland prices rose by 18 percent across Illinois and many expected that to stagnate. If the Henry County sale is any indication, that does not appear to be happening.

Continued from Page 1 administrative functions of Illinois courts because of the separation of powers. Bail, Cunnington wrote, has been held by the Supreme Court to be "administrative" in nature.

The constitution also specifically mentions bail in a section on victims' rights, when it states victims have a right "to have the safety of the victim and the victim's family considered in denying or fixing the amount of bail." Cunnington found that eliminating bail prevents courts from "effectuating the constitutionally mandated safety of the victims and their families."

Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul said in a news release the state will appeal the decision directly to

the state Supreme Court. That appeal was filed Dec. 30.

"Most of the SAFE-T Act's provisions have been in effect for more than a year, and regardless of today's circuit court decision, all parts of the SAFE-T Act, including the pretrial release portions addressed in the court's decision, will go into effect Jan 1." Raoul said. "For instance, the right of individuals awaiting criminal trials - people who have not been convicted of a crime and are presumed innocent – to seek release from jail without having to pay cash bail will go into effect in a few short days, despite the court's ruling against those provisions."

Cunnington rejected other arguments by the dozens of state's attorneys that centered on the legislative process, namely that the bill was not given a proper hearing and violated the "single subject" rule. Court precedent holds that as long as the House speaker and Senate president certify that a bill is properly passed, courts have no standing to intervene, he wrote.

The Supreme Court's Dec. 31 order also noted the clerk of the Supreme Court is "directed to contact the parties and coordinate an expedited process for this appeal."

Continued from Page 1 "We had a good mix of farmers and investors. Farmers were a major factor in this auction because it makes sense to purchase this and integrate it into their existing operations," said Liz Strom, a Toulon native who is a vice president at Murray Wise.

On the same day it conducted the \$21,100 sale, Murray Wise auctioned a 78-acre Grundy County farm for \$16,200 per acre. That land had average soils for the area, but also had an existing lease for a wind turbine.

"That we were able to have two sales of such success in different locations and dissimilar farms just goes to show how strong the market is holding up in the face of higher interest rates," said Eric Sarff, President of Murray Wise. "We had 25 and 32 bidders registered for each auction respectively and of those we had 12 bidders place bids during the auc-

tions with farmers and investors alike participating."

Van Adkisson of Roseville has also seen prices remain strong at the auctions he has conducted, including a \$20,200 price tag for a 47-acre tract sold Nov. 18 in Warren County, northwest of Roseville.

"I don't think we've seen the interest rates impact the Class A land, but I think it has started to affect the lower-class lands," said Adkisson, who classifies Class A land as having a productivity index over 138.

Adkisson said commodity prices have remained high enough to stabilize land values and to attract investors from other parts of the country. Adkisson, who has been selling farms for 49 years, said his best recent sale was \$20,750 per acre for a 77.9-acre parcel located between Galesburg and Monmouth that sold on

146.3.

"That got the attention of some outside investors and we sold it to a guy with farming interests in California, Arkansas and Illinois," Adkisson said. "We're seeing the strongest peracre prices we've ever seen and we're seeing more outside interest. I think that's due a lot to the technology we use to market these properties online and that sort of thing."

Adkisson said the interest being shown by outside investors could help minimize any expected price correction for Class A farmland.

"The commodity prices are a big part of it and there is not a lot of money being borrowed," Adkisson said. "I think if we do have a correction, we're not going to see a real radical one."



ministration.


EIA estimates winter expenditures could rise by an average of 28 percent for natural gas, 27 percent for heating oil, 10 percent for
