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Farmington schools may take over student transportation

For The Weekly Post FARMINGTON - Farmington schools will likely take over control of transporting students starting next fall.

At Monday's school board meeting, Board President Alex Slack announced that Illinois Central School Bus will discontinue services after this school year.

Illinois Central had asked in October to reopen its contract with Farmington to cut back 3 of

19 bus routes. The contract was scheduled to last through the 2023-24 school year and in fiscal year 2022 paid the company \$1,074,000. Illinois Central said it was losing drivers and needed to increase driver compensation.

"Yes, our drivers are regionally underpaid, but who is at fault for them being underpaid is our discussion with Illinois Central," Superintendent Zac Chatterton said.

Farmington owns its fleet of 23 buses and pays for insurance and

maintenance.

When Illinois Central sought a 15.25 percent increase, Farmington asked to "share the burden," according to Chatterton.

"But there was no sharing in the burden," he said.

As a result of Illinois Central's decision, the school board must determine whether it wants to seek another vendor or take on transportation duties and hire its own drivers.

"We could put it out for bid and have another vendor pick it up,

but I don't see the district going that route," said Chatterton, adding he expects a decision no later than March.

Farmington had considered taking over transportation in 2015 but was able to renegotiate a deal with Illinois Central.

"Our drivers have consistently known there has been an issue between the district and Illinois Central and they have been patiently waiting and making sure our kids got to and from the school safely while we sort this

out," Chatterton said. "The district is extremely appreciative of their professionalism and patience."

In other business, the board voted to approve the annual SEAPCO hiring survey, noting the district will seek an increase in speech pathology services.

Much has been made about pro football players serving as our incarnation of Roman gladiators. There are certainly similarities. But there is a significant error in that logic that was graphically illustrated by the recent cardiac arrest of Damar Hamlin during a Monday Night Football game. This was a huge game with major ramifications for the NFL playoffs, for bettors and for millions of fantasy football players. Even pausing the game created all sorts of headaches. But pro football players are not gladiators, whose deaths in the arena were an accepted and even hoped-for result. Led by coaches in the game (and public sentiment), the NFL made the right call to cancel the game. The outpouring of support for Hamlin since has been amazing. Seeing a tragic story turn inspirational has been wonderful to witness. ... Will Hamlin's injury cause more parents to shy away from football? Probably. Worth considering, though, is that heart-related deaths are a sad reality in every sport. Ballroom dancing, soccer and even golf have stories of professionals dying on the field, or dance floor. And research by the National Athletic Trainer's Association found that sudden cardiac death accounted for 76 percent of youth sports deaths in the U.S. from 2007-15. The largest proportion were in basketball (36 percent), followed by baseball (16 percent), followed by baseball (16 percent), football (16 percent) and soccer (13 percent). Yes, there are inherent dangers in sports – for that matter in doing anything. But the same is true for doing nothing.

A new section in this space is Stupid Politics. First entry is the U.S. Consumer Product Safety commission considering a ban on gas stoves. Next up is a 16 percent pay raise for Illinois lawmakers, approved by Illinois lawmakers. ... So much for Happy New Year. Callahan stepping down as IDNR director

SPRINGFIELD - Colleen Callahan, the first woman to serve as director of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, will step down from that post on Monday, Jan. 16, after nearly four years leading the state agency charged with managing, conserving and protecting Illinois' natural and cultural resources.

A resident of rural Edwards, Callahan served as director since March 1, 2019, when she was appointed by Gov. JB Pritzker.

While at IDNR, Callahan oversaw efforts to develop a strategic plan for the agency, with a focus on reducing the state's carbon footprint. A climate action plan is currently under review and set to be released in early 2023.

Callahan also led the launch of Copi – a new brand name for invasive carp designed to spark consumer interest in the plentiful fish found in Illinois waterways.

In 2022, Callahan advocated for IDNR to receive its largest state budget in 20 years to address long overdue improvements at state sites and to increase Open Space Land Acquisition and Development grants.

ups water/sewer rates 4.5% council Elmwood

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD - It isn't too early to start pondering strawberries in spring and a fall festival at the end of summer.

In addition to increasing water and sewer rates by 4.5 percent, as expected, members of the Elmwood City Council on Jan. 5 approved routine street closures for the Elmwood Strawberry Festival, set for June 3, and the Elmwood Fall Festival, to be held Sept. 7-9.

The primary reason for the council deciding this in January is simple, according to City Clerk Bethany Lovingood. It's so she doesn't forget to add it to a council agenda later this

year, when the item might become too tardy to be authorized.

According to Lovingood, the Illinois Department of Transportation requires a 30-day notice when a municipality wants to close thoroughfares for special events.

"The dates always change, but the road closures never do," Lovingood said.

Portions of Althea, Main, Magnolia and Rose streets are to be closed for both festivals, according to Lovingood. For the Strawberry Festival, the closures are to be from 5:30 a.m. until 10:30 p.m. June 3. The Fall Festival closures are to be from 6 p.m. Sept. 7 until early Sept. 10.

During a meeting that lasted about 15 minutes, the council also approved a 4¹/₂-percent increase in water and sewer rates. The increase was proposed and discussed in detail during the council meeting Dec. 6.

Effective with bills issued this week, the monthly rate for use of 1,000 gallons of water or less will be \$17.90. Between 1,001 and 3,000 gallons will cost an additional \$4.66 per thousand. From 3,001 to 6,000 gallons will cost \$4.42 per thousand.

Between 6,001 and 11,000 will cost \$4.17 per thousand. The rate per thousand for 11,001 to 20,000 gallons will be \$3.45. Above 20,000 gallons, the new per-thousand

rate will be \$2.22.

their farm in Peoria County.

The new monthly sewer basic rate is \$15.87 up to 1,000 gallons of water used. The new fee for each 1,000 gallons beyond that is \$2.91.

City Councilman Nathan Brunnelson, who helps oversee public works, said he was anticipating a 3 percent hike for 2023. But inflation affected the cost of chemicals, testing and employee salaries, among other expenses.

proven guilty in a court of law. High-speed chase leads to multiple charges

• FARMINGTON - A driver from Rock Island was accused of multiple crimes after he led Farmington police officers and others on a nocturnal chase that exceeded 70 mph.

Within about a half hour after Daniel T. Morgan, 32, posted bond on those charges, he was taken into police custody again - this time on an Iowa warrant for attempted murder.

The chase began about 1:15 a.m. Jan. 6 in Farmington. A Farmington officer spotted a 2021 gray Chevrolet Blazer with headlights off near Main Street and Barlow Road. When the officer flashed his vehicle's headlights at the Blazer, it took off at high speed, according to a police report.

Morgan and two male passengers were in the Blazer, which traversed Fort Street, Diamond Point Road and other rural Fulton County byways. The vehicle struck at least two ditches and Morgan disregarded at least three stop signs, the report stated. Morgan also drove through at least two fields.

Canton police joined the pursuit, which ended when the rented vehicle crashed into a ditch along Owens Road near Norris. Morgan and a 40year-old passenger from Monmouth were transported to Graham Hospital in Canton. That passenger complained about back and neck pain.

The other passenger, a 27-year-old from Kissimmee, Fla., was transported to the Fulton County Jail in Lewistown. So was Morgan, after he was treated at the hospital.

Morgan was cited for aggravated fleeing and eluding, aggravated driving under the influence of alcohol, resisting arrest, speeding, improper lane use, operating a vehicle without insurance, disobeying stop signs and driving without headlights. The other men were released from custody.

Later Jan. 6, Morgan posted \$250 in bond and was released. Then came word from authorities in Bettendorf, Iowa, about the attempted-murder warrant, according to Chris Ford, a Fulton County Sheriff's lieutenant.

"They called right after he posted bond and walked out our back door," Ford said. "One of our deputies found him at Casey's (in Lewistown). It was good timing they got the warrant to notify us when they did. We had some good deputies who had their eyes peeled."

About 8 a.m. Jan. 5, Robert B. Woolsey III, 20, was piloting an eastbound

2016 Volvo XC90 in the 2000 block of East U.S. Route 150 when a Knox County Sheriff's Office deputy recorded the vehicle's speed on radar.

The posted speed limit is 55 mph. Woolsey acknowledged he was driving at least 100 mph because he was late for work in Peoria, according to a sheriff's-office report. The pavement was slick from light snow that was falling at the time of the traffic stop. Woolsey received a notice to appear in court.

• SPEER – Authorities were searching for a suspect in a hit-andrun accident at an intersection southwest of Speer. About 4 p.m. Dec. 31, a Bradford man was driving a 2015 Chevrolet Equinox south on Holmes Road at County Line Road when a westbound pickup driver disregarded a stop sign, according to a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report.

The pickup truck struck the driver's side of the Equinox, which spun into a ditch southwest of the intersection. The gray-beige pickup truck continued at high speed. No injuries were reported. The Equinox driver was unable to see who was driving and unable to report a license-plate number.

Later, a Stark County Sheriff's Office deputy found a 2000 beige GMC Sierra pickup truck parked along Duncan Road, a few miles west and north of the accident site.

The pickup truck had front-end damage. A nearby resident spotted two males leave the vehicle on foot, but the deputy couldn't find them. The vehicle is registered to a Galva man with whom Stark County lawenforcement officials are familiar, according to the report.

• **PRINCEVILLE** – A man was taken to a Peoria hospital after he was found with head injuries at a Princeville business. About noon Jan. 3, a Peoria County Sheriff's Office deputy was dispatched to Casey's, 105 E. Spring St., where the 25-year-old man was stumbling and falling, according to a report.

The man's name was redacted. Bystanders were attempting to help the man, but he was swinging at them, the report stated.

The man had swelling above his right eye and at the back of his head and was bleeding from his mouth. The deputy attempted to speak with him, but he was incoherent and smelled of alcohol, according to the report. An ambulance transported him to UnityPoint Health-Methodist for treatment. • DUNLAP – A Princeville man lost consciousness after his vehicle struck a power pole west of Dunlap, according to authorities. Gerald A. Dwyer was driving a

2015 Chevrolet Silverado about 7:15 p.m. Dec. 22 east on Legion Hall Road west of Feucht Road when he saw powerlines hanging in the roadway, a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report stated. In attempting to avoid the powerlines, Dwyer drove the vehicle off the road.

The Ameren-owned pole was on the south side of the pavement. Dwyer sustained head and facial injuries and was transported to OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria. The Silverado sustained passenger-side bumper damage and was to be towed.

• ALTONA – A Williamsfield-area man avoided injury in a head-on collision east of Altona. The accident happened about 6:45 a.m. Dec. 14 in the 1700 block of Knox Highway 4. Bruce W. Bouchez Jr., 36, was driving a westbound 2001 Chevrolet Silverado that was parked on the eastbound side of the roadway. An eastbound 2023 Volkswagen Super Beetle driven by Defenbaugh J. Defenbaugh, 18, of Kirkwood struck the Silverado as it was parked.

A trailer was attached to the Silverado and Bouchez was retrieving garbage at the time of the accident, per a Knox County Sheriff's Office report. Defenbaugh was uninjured. Both vehicles were towed.

• **PRINCEVILLE** – A two-vehicle accident in Princeville resulted in a Mapleton woman being transported to a Peoria hospital for observation.

The accident happened shortly before 10 a.m. Nov. 8 at Spring Street and Cottage Grove Avenue, according to a Peoria County Sheriff's Office report filed recently. A 2013 Subaru wagon driven by Gina C. Edwards collided with a 2014 Freightliner truck driven by Jefferey E. Bassham of Peoria.

Edwards was stopped on Cottage Grove Avenue and didn't realize there was no stop sign for traffic on Spring Street, the report stated. Her vehicle was missing its front bumper. House, Senate agree on assault weapons ban

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD – The Illinois House gave final passage Tuesday to a bill banning the purchase, sale and manufacture of semi-automatic assault weapons, .50 caliber rifles and ammunition, and large-capacity magazines in the state while still allowing people who already own such weapons to keep them.

The House passed a similar bill Friday and sent it to the Senate, where it appeared over the weekend to run into roadblocks. But negotiations continued behind the scenes throughout the weekend and into Monday when a final deal came together just as Gov. JB Pritzker was being inaugurated into his second term.

As recently as Sunday, the House and Senate seemed to be far apart, both on the weapons ban and a bill expanding access to reproductive health services, two major items being considered in a lame-duck session that concluded Tuesday.

A sticking point concerned a requirement that people who own such weapons register them with the Illinois State Police. Those individuals would be required to disclose the make, model and serial number of the specified weapons to obtain a special endorsement on their Firearm Owners Identification.

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The final version of the bill, contained in a package of amendments to House Bill 5471, includes the requirement but extends the deadline for compliance to Jan. 1, 2024, instead of 180 days after the bill is signed, as the House had proposed.

Other changes included a more upto-date list of weapons that would fall within the banned category along with authority for the Illinois State Police to modify the list through administrative rules to capture new and copycat models.

The Senate bill also clarifies that any device that makes a semi-automatic weapon fire more rapidly whether it converts the weapon into a fully automatic one or merely increases the rate of fire - will be illegal. And it defines large-capacity magazines as those capable of holding more than 10 rounds for a long gun or 15 rounds for a handgun.

The Senate version also does not change the age limit to obtain a FOID card, so people between age 18-21 can obtain one with consent of a parent or guardian. The House proposed eliminating that exception.

To ease concerns from hunters and sportsmen, the bill also authorizes the Department of Natural Resources to adopt administrative rules exempting weapons used only for hunting.

opposition of gun-rights advocates who argued that the weapons to be banned are "commonly used" weapons in American society and thus, under standards of recent U.S. Supreme Court rulings, will likely be deemed unconstitutional.

"I think folks at home need to know, and folks here in the chamber, that many of the commonly used semi-automatic shotguns will still have to be registered as assault weapons," Sen. Terri Bryant, R-Murphysboro, said during debate on the floor. "So even though some may come off, we're still going to have many commonly used shotguns that will be listed as assault weapons."

Democrats pushed the bill through the Senate 34-20, sending it to the House, where it passed 68-41 on Tuesday with only one Republican vote: outgoing House Minority Leader Jim Durkin, R-Western Springs. Aside from Durkin, however, GOP members echoed Bryant's sentiments.

"I can tell you that we will not comply, and you're not going to do a darn thing about it," Rep. Blaine Wilhour, R-Beecher City, said during House floor debate. "Because the law, the constitution and the founding principals are on our side."

The bill will next be sent to Pritzker's office for his signature.
