PRINCEVILLE – If Princevillearea residents want public swimming pools in their community, they probably will have to demon-

The Princeville Aquatic Center is projected to have a deficit of more

than \$100,000 to begin the 2023 summer season, based on 2022 income and estimated expenses. The facility that's about a quarter-century old always has operated at a deficit, but this one is extreme, according to village officials.

Increases in the minimum wage, higher costs for materials and expenses for necessary upgrades are part of the recent issue. That last

category includes \$15,000 for a new chlorine system and \$10,000 for a pool heater.

"If the pool was open seven or eight months out of the year and you lost \$100,000 or \$80,000, that's feasible," said Chad Gardner, the village superintendent of public

works. "For 2½ months, to lose that kind of money it just seems like it's become astronomical."

A decision regarding the aquatic center's 2023 fate probably will have to be made within the next month or so, Village President Jeff

Elmwood votes to extend sports co-op

Brimfield school board V.P. anticipates similar vote from his group in March

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD – The ball is in Brimfield's court regarding the future of a long-standing sports cooperative agreement with Elmwood.

The Elmwood School Board on Monday voted 5-1 in favor of extending the co-op as it currently exists for the 2023-24 and 2024-25 seasons. Kevin Windish cast the lone dissenting vote after indicating he would prefer to wait until March for a decision.

The Brimfield School Board is scheduled to discuss the co-op again at its March 15 meeting, after tabling a vote on Feb. 15. One Brimfield board

member said at Monday's meeting that he thinks the agreement will be extended.

"I can't speak for the other board members, but I personally feel it will probably be approved to extend for two more years," said Jason Snyder, Brimfield board vice president.

Snyder also said Brimfield is open to forming a co-op committee to discuss issues that arise, including parental complaints, finances and other matters.

Several Elmwood board members also spoke in favor of a committee, whose makeup could include members of the school board, school ad-

Three races contested on April 4 ballots

With the next Illinois consolidated election just over a month away, sample ballots include a few contested races in The Weekly Post area. Three races will be contested on April 4, to be exact: Brimfield and Williamsfield school board elections show multiple candidates and two men are running to be Farmington mayor.

In all other cases, ballots for Peoria, Knox and Fulton counties show just enough candidates to fill open positions – or in some cases not enough

In Farmington, acting mayor Kenn Stufflebeam will run against Chadric

J. Zessin for the unexpired two-year term left by the resignation of former mayor Kent Kowal. Stufflebeam vacated his alderperson position to step in after Kowal's resignation **Stufflebeam** last spring.



The Brimfield School Board race has 10 total candidates running for four open positions. But there are two different races, since the compo-

sition of the board is restricted to three members from any Congressional township.

Katie Kappes, a current appointed board member, will run against Natalie M. Zeman for a two-year position.

In the election for three terms of four years each, the following candidates are listed on the ballot: Rachel E. Blodgett, Joshua L. Murdock, Nicholas K. Butterfield, David Hicke Jr., Constance R. Monk, Christopher S. Schachtrup, Nathan B. Hamilton and Meliss M. Klabel.



Troutman said.

What Trustee Teresa Gilroy called a "save the pool" campaign is likely. It would entail newspaper advertising to help increase awareness of the problem and to solicit donations. Village public events and social-media accounts also are to promote the campaign.

The village has used money from other funds to cover previous aquatic-center shortfalls. But the problem has been building for years and can't continue, Gilroy said.

"I'd love to keep that pool there, but I'm elected to be fiscally responsible, too," she said. "I don't want to have to pay for the pool with water funds or sewer funds or whatever."

Gilroy leads the Village Board committee that oversees the aquatic center. The committee met Feb. 21 to discuss the deficit and to brainstorm about how to address it.

Located at 620 Princeville Ave., the aquatic center is open daily in the summer, weather permitting. It has three pools – a 25-yard lap pool, a T-shaped pool and a wading pool.

Daily aquatic-center admission last

year was \$8 for most children and for adults 60 and older, \$10 for most others. Season passes also were available for Princeville residents and non-residents. Pass prices ranged from \$200 to \$300.

According to village figures, about 4,400 customers used the facility last summer. Total receipts were \$44,659. Estimated expenses for 2023 are \$149,024. The highest expense, \$60,264, is for salaries for part-time aquatic-center employees. Statemandated minimum-wage raises are not included.

Per Troutman, aquatic-center deficits used to be in the \$25,000-30,000 range annually.

"That's a little more easy to swallow," he said. "Nowadays, when you're pushing \$100,000 or \$150,000, that kind of changes things."

Michael Harmon, vice president of the Princeville School Board, attended the pool-committee meeting. He suggested a public call to action might be the best way to help address the problem.

"I don't see a way you can raise fees enough to cover that kind of cost," Harmon said. "But there may very well be enough support in the community for other organizations to come in and throw something into the kitty to make a difference."


Gardner and others said such fundraising can't be a one-shot deal. Expenses, including wages, aren't likely to decrease soon. Otherwise, closing the aquatic center and selling the property might be an option. Gardner estimated two to four houses could be built on it.

"I know a lot of people love the pool. I get it," Gardner said. "I think it's good for a lot of things, too. But ..."

In the Village Board meeting that followed the pool-committee meeting, trustees authorized spending about \$110,000 to sealcoat and/or resurface all or parts of at least 16 village thoroughfares. Gardner said work should begin in June.

The owner of a structure at 526 W. Main St. was approved to receive \$2,500 from the village Residential Rehabilitation Program, to help pay for new siding. A building permit also was issued for a new fence in a back yard at 309 S. Edwards Ave.

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
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

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

Now don't get me started about the Williamsfield School Board somehow managing to be in executive session for nearly six hours until 1:48 a.m. a few weeks ago. Christ said the Goldrush tends to get a little wrinkly after it has been stored for awhile. "It has to be held just right," Christ said. "But the inside has a real distinctive taste that stays that way for a year." ... Christ shared samples of a second apple variety that keeps even longer. Called Evercrisp, the apple is a cross between Honeycrisp and Fuji and ripens at the tail end of

apple-picking season. Christ planted 500 Evercrisp trees at his orchard six years ago and said he wishes he had planted more. "You can put those on your counter and in two months they'll still be hard," Christ said. Can't vouch for that. Mine lasted just two days.

Speaking of trees, we've added white peaches to our grow list at TWP headquarters this year, courtesy of peach pits from Janet McKinty or Louise Thompson (can't recall which of those generous seed sharers provided them, so better credit both). So far only one peach has hatched, but patience is a virtue when raising baby trees. Faring much better are our bur oaks, sycamores and red buds. We may have extras this year, so stay tuned. ... Joe and Lauri House of Princeville have sold the Pumpkin Place to Cody and Maria Blunier of Princeville, who plan to move the business to 21416 N. Holmes Rd. east of the current location. But don't worry, Joe is going to continue to raise giant pumpkins. ... Parting shot: What possible excuse do dogs or cats have for yawning after sleeping for a few hours in a sunbeam? Are they just showing off?

Paltry fine proves what we truly value

A much-favored line often quoted by preachers and politicians rightly notes that "The true measure of any society can be found in how it treats its most vulnerable members."

Curiously, a famous American politician, former Vice President Hubert Humprey, and an even more famous attorney-turned-preacher, Mahatma Gandhi, are both credited as its originator.

It's doubtful, however, that many in Big Meat ponder its authorship,

let alone its admonition.

The latest evidence to highlight Big Meat's low light is a mid-February case where, according to the Washington Post, a company

named Packers Sanitation Services Inc. (PSSI) paid a \$1.5 million fine after it "allegedly employed minors as young as 13 to use caustic chemicals to clean 'razor-sharp saws,' head splitters and other dangerous equipment at meatpacking facilities in eight states ... in some cases for years."

Take a moment to consider the full meaning of those words: 13-year-olds, caustic chemicals, razor-sharp saws and something called "head splitters."

Now contrast them to words like skateboards, video games, bussing tables and high school sports – you know, some of the more common diversions "employing" teenagers.

The difference is stark, violent and even brutal.

The absolute topper in this woeful tale is that some of the meatpackers using PSSI-hired contract cleaners "are operated by some of the country's most powerful meat and poul-

try producers, including JBS Foods, Tyson and Cargill. Those companies were not charged or fined," reported the Post Feb. 17.

It's not that these Big Three (of meatpacking's Big Four) aren't profitable enough to have their own cleaning crews of trained professionals who are old enough to drive or at least shave once a week.

We know this because, in 2022, for example, Tyson Foods' net profits totaled \$3.3 billion on sales of \$53.3 billion. The world's biggest meatpacker, JBS, posted results for 2021 (its latest) that showed \$20.5 billion net profit on \$351 billion in sales. Privately-held Cargill doesn't reveal profits but did report \$165 billion in total sales for 2022.

And remember, none of these immensely profitable, global meatpackers were "charged or fined" by the U.S. Department of Labor in this case because none of the cleaners – baby-faced or bearded – were employed by JBS, Tyson, or Cargill.

Instead, all worked for PSSI, a Kieler, Wis., company that is "privately owned by Blackstone, one of the world's largest private equity firms, and employs roughly 17,000 workers," explained the Post.

Simply put, that means three of ag's biggest, richest players are at least two steps removed from legal liability for "accidents" or injuries that occur while workers, some as young as 13, are cleaning and sanitizing their industrial slaughterhouses.

PSSI provides other benefits, too, according to its website. For example, the "vision" of company founders more than 50 years ago included PSSI "providing contract sanitation services using a non-unionized workforce."

The website doesn't say if that

founding vision also included child labor.

Still, it may get a helping hand in that endeavor as at least two Midwestern states heavy with meatpacking presence, Iowa and Minnesota, are now considering laws that allow "exceptions to child labor regulations in their respective states due to the persisting labor shortage," reported Business Insider Feb. 13.

Of the two legislative proposals, Iowa's is particularly "abhorrent," related a Feb. 12 Cedar Rapids Gazette editorial. The legislation "pushes for teenagers as young as 14-years-old to work in ... jobs like mining, meatpacking, and logging ... work longer shifts that last late into the evening ... (and) what's more ... the company they worked for would be free from any civil liability or negligence."

If that proposal becomes law, warned the former Successful Farming writer Cheryl Tevis in a Feb. 18 Substack post, all Iowans "would be complicit, along with our elected representatives and governor, if we look the other way... [while] putting our children in harm's way."

Exactly, but we continue to "look the other way;" we continue to give power to the already too powerful until, like now, all we have left to give is our most vulnerable, our children.

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



ELMWOOD: Baseball main factor in co-op talk

Continued from Page 1 ministrators and community members.

"The co-op committee is an idea I've talked about for 12 years," Elmwood Board Member Tom Conklin said. "In the last 10 years, the communication between the schools has not been as strong."

The main issue driving co-op uncertainty is baseball, with Brimfield Coach Brandon Porter saying his numbers next year are projected to reach a level where he needs another coach and more facilities. Porter has also mentioned that participation by Elmwood has dropped to two players last season, though he expects that to increase this year and next.

Snyder and fellow Brimfield Board Member Katie Kappes said their board's extracurricular committee supports hiring a third baseball coach and providing an additional baseball diamond.

"Unfortunately we're not going to be able to build a baseball field overnight," Kappes said. "It's in everybody's best interests. We don't want to leave that handful of boys (from Elmwood) with no team to play for."

Porter spoke at the meeting, which drew a crowd of nearly 60. He said he recalls a co-op meeting held in 2017 when "a lot of the issues we talked

about then are the same issues now."

"I hope we can resolve them, but realistically I don't know," Porter said.

"We're going to try to do what we can as a board to help you on facilities and to get you more coaches," Snyder repeated.

"If we can accomplish that, I feel good," Porter said.

One audience member asked how the baseball decision is different than when the two schools opted to split apart for volleyball.

Elmwood Superintendent Chad Wagner said that – despite a strong voice on the Elmwood board calling for an immediate split – that decision came only after a two-year analysis by the schools showed they could support programs on their own.

"We need this for baseball and softball," Wagner said. "We don't have the numbers to have our own program and we don't have our own facilities."

Added Elmwood Board President Val Ramirez, "In the co-op both schools have opportunities to play sports that can't provide."

Ramirez called it an "equitable partnership," but said that if baseball and softball are removed from the co-op "it is no longer equitable for Elmwood."

In other business, the Elmwood

board voted to approve a revised intergovernmental agreement with PERFECT, a cooperative effort by Peoria County schools to provide career and technical education.

The board also approved giving Wagner the authority to spend up to \$51,512 in federal IDEA funds to purchase one new minivan or two used minivans to be used to transportation of special education students.

Wagner said the lone new vehicle he has so far found was a 2023 Chrysler Pacifica seven-passenger model for \$42,289 through the state's fleet program with Bob Ridings.

During board member reports, Conklin said he has taken part in two negotiating meetings so far with the Elmwood teacher's union. Two more meetings are scheduled.

"Our goal is to have this wrapped up in the next 30 days," Conklin said.

In regards to the two failed boilers at Elmwood, Wagner said he negotiated with the manufacturer and was able to get replacement boilers for \$31,000 - a far cry from the \$142,000the manufacturer had first proposed.

The board also approved moving its April meeting back two days to April 26. In order to comply with state statues, the board cannot seat new members until 21 days after the April 4 election.

Farmington man faces fraudulent check charges

• FARMINGTON – A Farmington man faces a Fulton County Circuit Court hearing after he was accused of cashing \$4,850 in fraudulent checks at a local bank office.

Clinton J. Shaffer, 46, was charged with deceptive practices, according to the Farmington Police Department. He is to appear in court at 9 a.m. March 15 in Lewistown, per the Fulton County State's Attorney's Of-

Shaffer submitted nine checks between Dec. 16-27 to the Farmington branch of the Bank of Yates City, according to a Yates City Police Department report. Amounts ranged from \$300 to \$900.

The bank processed eight checks, but not one for \$700 dated Dec. 23. That's when bank employees discovered a problem. The checks were from a credit union in Louisiana.

Shaffer has a lengthy criminal history of theft, fraud and burglary, the Yates City police report stated.

A Farmington police officer attempted to contact Shaffer at his residence but was rebuffed. According to a Farmington police report, Shaffer also has been uncooperative with other authorities. The officer notified a Shaffer relative about the charges and court date.

The relative also made restitution, including fees. On Feb. 15, the relative submitted a \$4,866.99 check to the Bank of Yates City, according to Farmington police.

Fulton County authorities took over the case from Knox County counterparts after it was determined Shaffer cashed the checks in Farmington.

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Elmwood OKs sealcoating project

ELMWOOD – The Elmwood City Council meeting Feb. 21 was short in duration but longer in appropriation.

On the agenda were three new action items. All involved expenditures.

The biggest ones were for sealcoating and fog sealing of at least 13 city thoroughfares later this year. The council approved bids of \$112,165.24 from R.A. Cullinan & Son Inc. of Tremont and \$34,190.44 from Porter Brothers of Rock Falls for those respective projects. The total of the bids is \$146,355.68.

Cullinan also bid on the fog-sealing project, and Porter Brothers bid on the sealcoating. Also bidding on the fog sealing was American Road Maintenance of Tucson, Ariz.

A fog seal is a light application that seals narrow cracks and helps rejuvenate asphalt surfaces.

During a meeting in December, the council authorized the road work. The estimated total cost then was about \$221,000, to be paid with Rebuild Illinois funds and state motor-fuel-tax money. An engineer estimated the

total cost recently at \$185,999.30, according to city records.

Elmwood Mayor JD Hulslander did not respond to a request for comment regarding the bids and the apparent savings. Earlier, Hulslander said the road work probably would take place in late summer.

Among roadways scheduled for sealcoating are Cypress Street and Rural Avenue between Magnolia and Main streets, Morgan Street between Maple Row and Main Street, Rose Street between Maple Avenue and Main Street, and Walnut Street between Maple Row and Main Street.

The council also ap-

proved spending about \$22,000 to purchase a 2022 Diamond C Trailer from Country Blacksmith Trailers in Mount Vernon. The street department is to use it.





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Navigator files updated ICC application for pipeline

Navigator CO2 Ventures LLC on Friday filed an updated permit application with the Illinois Commerce Commission for its proposed Heartland Greenway CO2 pipeline.

Navigator said in a press release that its new application includes adding 42 miles to the proposed pipeline that is designed to "connect to additional permanent storage locations in central Illinois."

"Our team is excited to advance the development of additional permanent storage locations for the Heartland Greenway platform," Navigator CEO Matt Vining said in the press release. "The updated permit and expanded

footprint allow us to address the increasing commercial demand regionally, especially within the Illinois industrial complex."

According to Navigator, central Illinois is "home to some of the world's most well-studied and proven geology for carbon storage."

The planned pipeline is designed to capture and store 15 million metric tons of CO2 every year, according to Navigator.

A Phase 2 map showed on Navigator's website shows proposed future expansion of the pipeline in Iowa, South Dakota and Nebraska.

In Illinois, the pipeline is currently proposed to pass through 14 counties including Henry, Knox and Fulton

 on its way to the sequester locations in Christian County and Montgomery County.

Navigator says its supporters include various biofuel producers and labor and construction unions.

Detractors include a group called the Coalition to Stop CO2 Pipelines, whose recent press release included this quote from McDonough County farmer Steve Hess: "Navigator Heartland Greenway may be persistent in its attempts to endanger Illinoisans through the construction of this pipeline, but they are up against farmers like me who will not let a greedy corporation take our land through eminent domain without a fight."

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



MOUNT CARROLL - A road trip that was long and delayed turned out to be the final one this season for the Farmington boys basketball team.

Port Byron Riverdale beat Farmington 49-47 in a Class 2A regional semifinal Feb. 23 at West Carroll Middle School.

Senior Logan Morse had 16 points and junior Keauntrey Barnes scored 15 for Farmington (19-13), which was the third seed in Orion Sub-Sectional A. Jake Willems had 16 points for Riverdale. The Rams (17-16) were seeded seventh and beat No. 9 Prophetstown-Erie, 50-47, in the regional final last Saturday.

The semifinal was to have been played Feb. 22, but inclement

weather prompted postponement the morning of the game, according to Farmington Coach Marty Lozier. That gave the Farmers an extra day to prepare for the 125-mile trip north.

Farmington hadn't played since Feb. 14, a loss at Brimfield. The idleness and the bus ride didn't help the Farmers, Lozier suggested. But he also said the regional game was a good one.

According to MaxPreps.com, Riverdale lost seven regular-season games by five points or fewer.

"I knew they'd be good, and we were just mirrored teams of each other," Lozier said. "Both played hard man-to-man defense and were aggressive. It was a fun game. My kids had been really struggling, but we played really well."

Riverdale led 29-28 at halftime and by about seven in the third quarter. But Farmington scored eight in a row, capped by Kaden Runyon's only points. His 3-pointer at the end of the period gave Farmington a 38-

"It worried me," Lozier said about the deficit. "I was thinking, 'We can't let this one get away.' We went to a full-court press, turned them over a few times and got back into it."

But both teams had a scoring drought in the fourth, and Farmington missed a shot to tie it toward the end. Thus ended the Farmers' efforts to win a regional championship for the second season in a row.

"There were just times all year we struggled shooting a little bit, and it came back to bite us," Lozier said.

He made a couple of those shots that won us the game. He made one like that over in Abingdon ... But it didn't go, and there you are."

The Cougars (21-10) got the ball back on a travel call with 3.2 seconds left, but an inbound to Graham Wight led to a loose ball scrum on the floor that ran out the clock.

"I just knew I had to dive on that ball," Howerton said. "If I'm on that ball, they can't get a shot off and we win the game."

Of course, there was plenty before the final seconds helping Elmwood avenge a 58-46 regular-season loss at Williamsfield.

For starters, R-W's leading scorer Wight (18.5 points per game) picked up two offensive fouls in the first 2:06.

"That was very huge. It changes the look of the game and the look of the offense," Anderson said. "We had other kids who stepped up and kept us in the game, but that hurt us, it did."

With Wight sitting, Elmwood eventually grabbed an 18-10 led midway through the second quarter, prompting Anderson to put his center back in.

From there, the Cougars clawed back to a 24-21 lead midway through the third, as Wight passed to Danner for a layup and a free throw after he was fouled.

But Elmwood battled back time after time, buoyed in large part by dominant offensive rebounding that allowed the Trojans to attempt 15 more shots from the floor than R-W.

"We had five guys who looked like they wanted the ball every time it went up in the air," Elmwood Coach Josh Fugitt said. "Whether they were sacrificing their body to block somebody out or pursuing the basketball. That has been one of the strengths of an undersized team."

Fugitt also praised seniors Brendan Williams and Brayden Lehman and sophomore Bo Windish for their combined defense on Wight, who had four points.

"Night-and-day difference from the first time when it seemed they could get the ball inside to him at any point," Fugitt said.

Danner led R-W with 11 points and was 2-for-5 on 3-pointers, Braxton Rylander came off the bench to score 7, Lewis Sams had 6, Adam Kohl tallied 3 and Talan Hull scored 2.

The Cougars shot 11-for-22 from the field while Elmwood was 12-for-37 and was 7-for-20 on 3-point attempts. The Trojans had 50 percent of all offensive rebounds and 85.7 percent of the defensive boards, according to Fugitt.

Williams led Elmwood with 11 points, while Howerton scored 7, Lehman added 6, Sirus Nims came off the bench for 6, Layne Durst tallied 3 and Windish had 2.

On Feb. 22, Elmwood beat Annawan in the semifinals, 52-44, as Howerton scored 15, Nims tallied 11, Windish 9, Williams and Lehman 8 apiece and Durst had 1. The Trojans went 12-for-14 on free throws in the fourth quarter.

R-W beat Abingdon in the semifinals, 41-36, with a 12-7 run in the final quarter. Wight led with 12 points, Kohl had 11, Danner scored 8, Hull had 6 and Sams tallied 4.

Elmwood also won its last regional at United, in 2019.

"More good memories. We said that all week, let's make some more good memories in a gym where we already have some," Fugitt said.

Added Howerton, "It's crazy to be a part of history.
