Volkert re-elected as Galva mayor in rare contested race

In a mostly quiet consolidated election, one of Tuesday's more

heated local races was for mayor of Galva. In that race, incumbent Richard Volkert won with 255 votes, good for 46 percent of the 30 percent voter turnout in Galva.

Traci McClintic collected 208 votes to finish as runnerup and David Heck had 54 votes.

The Galva turnout was well above the 15 percent overall turnout for Henry County.

Another contested race was for the Bradford Village Board, with four candidates running for three open positions. Angela Stange was leading vote getter for trustee with 104 votes, good for 29 percent of the turnout, followed by incumbent Pat Berlin with 99 votes and Kodi Cade with 90 votes. Incumbent board member Tony Carlton was fourth with 62 votes.

Turnout in the Osceola Precinct, which included the Bradford Village Board race, was 26.3 percent, highest in Stark County.

The race for Black Hawk College trustee pitted four candidates for two six-year positions and spanned nine counties, including Stark, Henry, Henderson, Rock Island, Bureau, Mercer, Knox, Marshall and Whiteside.

Unofficial tallies show Samantha Gange was top vote getter with 8,843 votes. The race for the second spot was very close, with Dave Dyer at 7,166 votes and incumbent Steven Spivey at 7,114. Incumbent Jon A. Looney was fourth at 4,769 votes.

Christian Jackson was elected to fill an unexpired four-year

term as a Black Hawk trustee.

In Wyoming, David Lindahl received 37 votes in the race for Ward 2 alderperson for the Wyoming City Council. Ian Potter received 4 votes.

Worth noting is that mail-in ballots postmarked before April 4 but not yet received are still to be tallied on April 18, which could change some races.

Most elections were uncontested, though some will yield new faces on local boards. Here is a look at those races organized by community.

• Bradford - Elected as school board members for Bradford

CUSD 1 are Tanya S. Walker (141 votes), Brian Knobloch (137) and April Shockey (91).

Elected to four-year terms as Bradford Library trustees are Mary E. Robbins (161), Letitia Leeper (144) and Barbara Fehr (120).

• Bishop Hill - Elected as village trustees are Lisa Nordstrom (24), James Nolan (24) and Amanda Laub (21).

Elected as village trustees to serve an unexpired two-year term are Michael Keup (24) and Patrick Light (22).

Good things come in threes

Be on lookout for trillium

In a recent article, I shared my affection for bloodroot and boldly claimed that "among the myriad of spring blooms, few thrill me as much as Bloodroot (Sanguinaria canadensis)."



That sentiment was sincere, however, I must confess there are others that are equally as exciting. This week, I'm on the lookout for trillium (Trillium spp.).

Found in rich, moist woodlands, trillium is an easily identified, distinct plant and flower. As the name suggests, the number three is closely tied to the species. Trillium is a unique plant, given it does not techni-

Nursing a life passion

Long career in care for Foglesong

For The Prairie News TOULON-Nursing has dominated the work and possibly the life of Carolyn Jean Foglesong from an early age to retirement at age 73.

"I recall my mother saying when I was young, she

said, 'You wanted to be a nurse when you were 3years-old. If somebody didn't feel well, you

were always taking care of them.' She said that I said that I was going to be a nurse and she said, 'You stuck to it!' It just kind of grew up with me, I guess," Carolyn said.

After graduation from

Toulon Township High School in 1951, Carolyn attended and graduated from the Methodist (Hospital) School of Nursing with a Registered Nurse's degree, in Peoria, in 1954.

Carolyn worked in the pediatric ward at Methodist Hospital for two years, then began working for noted Peoria pediatrician Dr. Robert Hart for 16 years.

After that, Carolyn decided to transfer closer to home in Toulon. So she worked at the Kewanee hospital for two years and then spent 30 years working for Dr. Richard Jakobi and then Dr. Carla Greby, both general practitioners in Kewanee.

"I remember Dr. Jakobi went to Germany for a month and he said, 'Caro-



Continued from Page 1 lyn, the office is yours.' I thought, 'Oh, no! Oh no!' But things went very well and there were no bad effects. It was quite an experience, though," Carolyn remembered.

A nurse's hat is the identifying feature of the uniform a nurse wears that tells what school they attended and the year a nurse is in during preschool graduation. Carolyn said the style of hat is different for each school and so is the stripe. A stripe is earned after one year of preschool. Carolyn's stripe is black, but each nurses' gold pin is also identifiably different, as well. Hers is round with a blue cross in the center. Every nurse wears a pin.

Recently a party was held celebrating Carolyn's 90th birthday. She was born on March 5, 1933, to Mary Ethel (Peterson) and William Robert Grieve. She is the fourth child in her family, which includes siblings Donald, Dean, Katherine, Evelyn and Paul. The Grieves lived northeast of Toulon in three different farmhouses.

Carolyn met her future husband and life partner Harry Foglesong (TTHS Class of 1948) in high school. Harry enlisted in the U.S. Air Force after graduating high school. He and Carolyn were married 68 years until Harry passed away, in 2020.

To them were born three children – Steve, Stan and Teresa (deceased). Carolyn has 11 (one deceased) grandchildren, 28 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren, with two on-the-way.

"What keeps a marriage together (for so long) is patience, love and determination," Carolyn said.

Toulon has changed over the years for Carolyn.

"If I were to choose an era where life was really good, I would choose when we were growing up. People

were kind and friendly. It isn't like that today," she said. "I think we who grew up in my era are the luckiest people alive. I honestly do.

"There's no shopping uptown now. That used to draw people to town. Saturday nights we used to get to come to town and get our orangepineapple ice cream cone from the 'Wiggie-Man'. That was our treat back then."

Family activities keep Carolyn active today. She attends as many family functions as possible. Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners are still held at Carolyn's house in Toulon where upward of 40-plus family members attend.

In 2012, Harry and Carolyn were named the Old Settlers' Association Badge Honorees. That event and Stark County's Fall Festival were important for the Foglesongs.

Carolyn retired in 2006 after 50plus years in the nursing field.

Continued from Page 1 cally have above-ground stems or leaves. What we identify as leaves are morphologically bracts or modified leaves. The bracts of trillium are capable of photosynthesizing, contributing to the production of plant

What we identify as stems are extensions of the rhizome known as a peduncle. Stems are below ground and produce modified scale-like leaves called cataphylls.

Emerging from a rhizome, a single, smooth stem produces a single whorl of three bracts. The bracts of many species are mottled with lightly contrasting colors of green. Above the bracts, a single flower develops with three petals. Depending on the

species, flowers are white, cream, purple, pink, or dark red.

Common names of Trillium spp include Birthroot, a name given by the earliest settlers believing that indigenous people used the root to induce labor and other childbirth-related issues, although this has not been verified. Other medicinal uses of the plant include extensive use of the root's astringent and antiseptic qualities on wounds and sores.

Trillium prefer moist, organic matter-rich soil and are partial to the full shade of woodlands. Seedlings are slow to mature, taking two to three years to produce fully developed bracts. Young plants will appear as thin leaves poking out of the soil. Flowers take longer to develop, up

to seven years in some species. Seeds are a favorite food source of ants who are attracted to the small, nutritious, fat-rich structures attached to seeds called elaiosomes. Seed dispersal is a result of ants harvesting the seeds, transporting them for the elaiosomes, and discarding the seeds along the way.

Interestingly, many spring ephemeral plants rely on ants for seed dispersal including Bloodroot, violet and Dutchmans' breeches.

Trillium's unique, early blooms are appealing to homeowners and many species are suitable for the home landscape. However plants should only be obtained from reputable providers to ensure wild populations are





Of cypress-crazed critters & a molehair coat

People probably think me melodramatic when talk turns to all the critters eating my trees. Well, now there's proof. The other day the youngest and I planted 25 bald cypress trees. They were gorgeous little 16- to 24-inch saplings that we wanted to give some chance of liv-

So far, every bald cypress we've ever planted has been nipped into nothingness

within days, sometimes hours.

So this time around, we cut up some tree tubes that raccoons had wrecked and used the pieces to protect the cypress trees. The original plan was to come



back once they start growing out of the tubes and encircle them with concrete reinforcing wire until they are big enough to make it.

Well, based on my latest round of trail-camera pictures, I'm worried we may need to hire some Brinks armed guards instead.

The pictures above right were taken within 24 hours of the trees being planted. In several snapshots not included, there are multiple critters kind of waiting in line for a chance to sniff the tree tubes. It's like those pictures from an African water hole where every animal is circling around, waiting for a chance to drink.

Except in this case, they are just trying to get at some bald cypresses. Now, Google won't confirm this, but

my hunch is that bald cypress is critter cocaine. Sure they like to eat almost every tree, but bald cypress is another level. Forget Cocaine Bear, I'm dealing with cocaine squirrel.

Look straight right. That little dude is

hugging that tube and trying to get

his tongue in there, I swear.

First came a few herds of deer that had to sniff every tube. Then the rabbit. Last was the squirrel, who had never previously even been a suspect. Fortunately, we gnawed down our colony of beavers over the winter, or I'd suspect them next.

And don't tell me the critters are just being "curious." As mentioned, we have planted bald cypress trees before and, usually within hours, were left with a tiny nub sticking out of the ground that never grew again.

All of which returns me to my original premise. How does any tree survive life in the wild?

Well it turns out write-in candidate laws are more lenient that I thought. Fulton County Election Judge Bill Runyon texted to let us know, "We are instructed write-in candidates need not be spelled correctly, only





judged to be the voter's intent and on the write-in list." That makes more sense, though you can see how that could create problems in Chicago, where "Nixon" might be misread as "Kennedy." ... Parting shot: Some folks pine for coats made of mohair, a long, smooth fiber taken from angora goats. Not the Mayor of Oak Hill. He visited this week and detailed plans for his first-of-its-kind Molehair Coat. "Gonna take a lot of moles," he said, noting his best year trapping the star-nosed rascals yielded 13. "If you had a mole dog, you could make some money," he suggested. Now that's an idea.

Two dangerous, unwanted carbon dioxide pipelines are being planned for central Illinois. Local landowners are threatened with eminent domain if they refuse to accept the companies' offers for their land.

Navigator's CO2 pipeline is 1,342 miles long and crosses four states (much of western Illinois, including McDonough/Fulton/Knox counties) before depositing its CO2 in Christian and Montgomery counties. The second is the Wolf Carbon Solutions-Archer Daniels Midland 280-mile long CO2 pipeline, which begins in



Iowa and passes through Peoria County before burying its CO2 underground in Macon County.


CO2 pipelines are substantially different from oil and gas pipelines. CO2 is highly pressurized; ruptures are common; the technology is new and unproven. It is marketed as

"green" technology. It is anything but

Illinois House Bill 3119 is being considered. It would, at the very least, create sensible protections at all steps in the process, shield our state from future financial and liability risk, protect landowners' rights and eliminate eminent domain and indus-

Illinois artist inspired by family farm

Jeanne Helm recreates the cattle. forest and creek she loves in soothing shades of blues and greens. They personalize the home her great-grandfather built on the Centennial Farm along Kirby Road that is named for her ancestors.

The beauty of farming, conservation and history meld in her watercolor paintings and reflect the care Jeanne and her husband, Ron, give their "conservatory" farm near Oreana. In one of her paintings, Ron walks home from cutting out invasive honeysuckle to create a wooded pasture for their cows.

Although she's a farmer, the Macon County Farm Bureau member views rural landscapes through an artist's eyes.

"Trees in the forest are very different from the trees around the house. They (forest trees) all fit together like children in a row," she says, using her hands to imitate compact, straight tree trunks.

Since retiring from teaching early childhood education at Richland Community College in 2020, Jeanne devotes more time to painting scenes of the farm and forest. Helm's son, David, would like his mother to paint more dogs, she adds, looking over a watercolor of a family border collie.

Jeanne does take commissions to paint clients' dogs and homes, but for her own enjoyment, she favors painting the family's Hereford cows, streams meandering among stately trees, and an occasional antique auto as seen in sepia tinted family photos.

Along with clearing invasive plants, Ron, a retired geography teacher, cares for a cow-calf herd of

17 Herefords, 13 Angus and an Angus bull and 196 acres, including 20 acres of pasture. Ron's focus is protecting the farm's natural resources by participating in water quality and conservation programs. Jeanne calls her studio the Conservatory Art Gallery – a play on words.

Water figures prominently in her

Jeanne prefers painting with watercolors and demonstrates how the paint can flow across the paper. "I can pick the painting up, and the color moves," she says, slightly tipping a wet painting. She finds watercolors easier to use compared to oils and acrylics.

But water - more specifically flowing water – also bedevils Jeanne.

"The rocks and the ripples, it's hard to make it look natural. You have to let the paintbrush act like water when you paint. I'm almost there," she

"My goal is to paint deer in the forest. I go online and look at deer (images) but they're not the deer in our forest," Jeanne says, adding that she isn't quick enough to photograph deer moving through their trees. She prefers photographs as references for works of art.

Neither Jeanne nor Ron have entirely stopped teaching.

She tutors reading online to six children who live around the country. A couple of her students call Ron, "the farmer," she adds. The couple even devoted one tutoring session to lessons about their Macon County farm for two urban-dwelling Michigan brothers.

Jeanne also shares her artist skills by providing art lessons for some church members and neighbors.

"They've always got to come to Jeannie's," Ron adds.

One of her favorite subjects, the forest has transformed in the artist's eyes and become a treasured family spot. Ron even built a picnic table from Osage orange.

"When we bought the forest land, she was mad," Ron says, smiling as he looks over at his wife. "I thought it was a waste of money," Jeanne adds and nods.

Pausing, Jeanne muses about what draws her back again and again to illustrate the creeks that flow through her paintings.

"There's life there," Ron says with a smile.
