Stark County will get free K9 unit from McDonough County

By JOHN A. BALLENTINE For The Prairie News TOULON – Stark County will soon have its own K9 unit. At the May 9 Stark County Board meeting, supervisors learned from Sheriff Steve Sloan that the Sheriff's Office will be taking possession of a K9 unit free of charge from McDonough County.

Sloan said Stark County Dep-

uty Adam Henson will become the K9 unit handler/officer.

Sloan said donations have paid for a K9 cage and training involved with supporting a K9 unit. McDonough County gave the K9 unit to Stark because their K9 unit officer has become an Illinois State policeman. The K9 cage cost was between \$2,500 and \$3,000.

Sloan also reported that the

Sheriff's Office has one cage for a deputy's vehicle but isn't installed yet.

In other news, Sloan said the E911 system is going to be rebid because bids were too high from the previous bid letting.

The board heard a report from county auditor Ron Hilton who said, "This is the healthiest fund balance I've seen in 13 years," referencing the county's financial

status.

Hilton highlighted the recently completed audit and pointed out that the county now sits with a \$536,000 surplus for the year as opposed to years ago when the county's financial situation at times looked dire.

Al Harmon addressed the board and made a Tri County Opportunities Council awareness presentation. Harmon wants Stark

awmakers considering grants for grocers.

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD – Lawmakers are considering creating a grant program that would send state dollars to grocers in Illinois communities that have few options for buying food.

Senate Bill 850 would direct the state's Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, or DCEO, to establish the "Grocery Initiative," a program that would study "food deserts" in Illinois and provide grants to new or existing grocery stores in these areas. Grants would be available to grocery stores that are organized as independently owned for-profits, co-ops and nonprofit organizations as well as grocery stores owned by units of local government.

"It's incredibly expensive to run a grocery store," bill sponsor Rep. Mary Beth Canty, D-Arlington Heights, said. "It takes a lot of product and your margins are very thin."

The initiative was first introduced in Gov. JB Pritzker's proposed budget for the upcoming fiscal year,

which called for \$20 million to fund the program. Canty, who is sponsoring the proposal in the House, said she will continue to work on it in the next two weeks as lawmakers craft next year's budget.

The bill defines food deserts as low-income communities that are at least a half-mile from a grocery store in urban areas and at least 10 miles from a grocery store in rural areas.

Approximately 3.3 million people about one in four Illinois residents live in a food desert, according to a 2021 Illinois Department of Public Health report.

In more rural areas, when a grocery store closes, a store like Dollar General or Family Dollar might be a town's only source of food other than a gas station. Dollar General reports they have more than 19,000 stores in 47 states.

The bill would require any grant recipients to carry a "substantial variety of perishable foods" including things like meat and fresh produce, items not typically carried by dollar

stores or convenience stores.

Sean Park, a program manager at the Illinois Institute for Rural Affairs, spoke to lawmakers about the proposal at a House Revenue Committee hearing last week.

"If there was money to be made from the convenience stores doing this, they would already be doing it," Park said, referring to selling meat and produce. "What we're proposing in the bill is support for new models."

Those new models might not need to rely as heavily on a profit motive for operating the grocery store.

Other new models include municipally owned grocers. A municipally owned grocery store is under consideration in Cutler, a community of several hundred people in southern Illinois' Perry County.

Some Republicans said they want to make sure the bill wouldn't require any municipalities to use this model. In committee and in a followup interview, Canty clarified that no such requirement exists.

The council heard a presentation by two Toulon residents who want to keep chickens within city limits. The council passed an ordinance in February of 2020 that prohibits all livestock in Toulon. After the presentation, a motion was made to revise the ordinance to allow chickens in Toulon. It failed due to the lack of a second to the motion. Therefore, the 2020 ordinance stays in effect.

Dust control of Willow Street, which is south of the high school and leads to the city's burn pile and maintenance building, will be addressed. The council approved an expenditure of \$2,850 to have the street sprayed

with a tree sap blend that controls and limits dust from the street.

The council heard a plan to attract developers to develop the city's southern subdivision, which has remained undeveloped for years. The original plan was to build 44 houses at that location until a housing market downturn stopped development. The plan is to "advertise" the potential development to area developers.

The council approved a \$500 donation to the Toulon Fire Company for burning down a house on North Washington Street. Also approved was a \$7,800 expenditure to Saw 'N Logs to remove five dead cemetery trees and a dead tree by the Faith Baptist Church.

A short, unhappy history of carbon sequestration

The key element of informed decision-making is facts. And not just any facts; the best, most tied-to-reality facts are needed to make the best decision.

One more thing: "Alternative" facts only exist in alternative universes so use them at your intergalactic peril.

Which is what Verra, "the world's leading carbon standard for the rap-

idly growing \$2 billion voluntary [carbon] offset market," appears to have done for years, reported The Guardian Jan. 18.

According to the newspaper, research found that "more than 90%

of (the) rainforest offset credits," packaged by Verra and purchased by greenie-wannabes like Shell, Disney, and Gucci, "are likely to be 'phantom credits' and do not represent genuine carbon reductions."

Specifically, that means that "94% of the credits" Verra sold to "internationally renowned companies" had "no benefit to the climate" at all. Moreover, The Guardian continued, "The threat to forests had been overstated by about 400% for Verra projects."

Big Biz wasn't alone. Angst-filled grunge bands jumped on the CO2 bandwagon, too: Pearl Jam was among "... organizations that have bought rainforest offers approved by Verra...'

The findings hit experts like Barbara Haya, the director of the Berkeley Carbon Trading Project, like a sledgehammer. After all, reported The Guardian, Haya "has been researching carbon credits for 20 years, hoping to find a way to make the system function."

"The implications of this analysis are huge," she told the newspaper.

"Companies are using credits to make claims of reducing emissions when most of these credits don't represent emissions reductions at all.""

Huge, sure; but they mirror what others found whenever forest carbon offsets are examined as a conscience cleanser for corporate CO2 creators. For example, when a ProPublica reporter dug into forest-based CO2 offsets four years ago she found spoiler alert - the same sorry results as The Guardian found earlier this vear.

"In case after case," wrote Lisa Song in her story, An (Even More) Inconvenient Truth, "I found that carbon credits hadn't offset the amount of pollution they were supposed to, or they had brought gains that were quickly reversed or that couldn't be accurately measured ... "

"Ultimately," Song added, "the polluters got a guilt-free pass to keep emitting CO2 but the forest preservation that was supposed to balance the ledger either never came or didn't last."

Several ag researchers have sent up similar flares to warn farmers that carbon markets may not benefit the farm, the farmer or the planet. To start, today's highly industrialized farming makes long-term carbon sequestration – the key to selling any carbon credit - a tricky feat.

Second, there are few market rules in any ag carbon credit market anywhere for any farmer or buyer to follow, noted J. David Aiken, an ag economist who specializes in water and ag law at the University of Nebraska.

"What does the ag carbon credit market look like today?" Aiken asked in a 2021 paper. "It is the wild wild west," he warned.

The reason is simple: "No rules or regulations exist, so let the buyers and sellers beware. From where I sit, the two largest players appear to be speculators and pilot project developers."

But the lack of transparent markets, standardized rules, or even solid agronomic science behind ag's possible carbon sequestration has not kept the federal government from entering - and juicing - the nascent, unproven enterprise.

Last year's bipartisan omnibus spending bill included the Growing Climate Solutions Act, explained Grist this winter, to "get the nation's growers to adopt climate-friendly practices by encouraging participation in the carbon market."

Like everyone else in the carbon market, however, farmers are "unclear how the law will address (their) biggest concerns."

Other experts like William Rees, the University of British Columbia emeritus professor and co-creator of the human eco-footprint - later renamed "carbon footprint" - are far more clear-eyed on carbon sequestration, carbon trading, and carbon "net neutrality."

"Carbon neutrality," writes Rees in an April 17 email, "... is an engineer's fantasy and popular wishful thinking. Or, as I like to put it, 'Humanity's propensity for socially constructing comforting shared illusions.""

The italics are his but the takeaway is clear: There's nothing neutral about "carbon neutrality" and our wishful thinking won't make it so.

Illinois dust storms rare, but not unheard of

The large dust storm that struck central Illinois May 1 was a rare event for its widespread nature and destructive results.

But such storms are not unheard of in the Prairie State, which is comprised of about 57,913 square miles, according to nationsonline.org.

"Dust storms are more common in the Plains and southwest U.S.," the National Weather Service (NWS) Lincoln office noted in a special report. "They do not happen often in Illinois but are most common around early May and June."

Spring is typically the peak time for severe weather in the state and also the time when farm fields and other land are more exposed to wind events before crops and other vegetation emerge.

NWS reported wind speeds between 35 and 45 mph with a peak gust of 54 mph at the Springfield airport May 1 that generated the dust clouds. At those rates, the wind reached speeds comparable to a tropical storm. The NWS April climate summary also showed most of central and southeast Illinois received only 1 to 2.5 inches of precipitation in April, about 1-3 inches below average.

Radar subsequently indicated a large plume of dust across Sangamon, Montgomery, Christian, Shelby and Effingham counties May 1. It reduced visibility to near zero in some areas and resulted in a 72-vehicle pileup on Interstate 55 near Divernon and Farmersville that resulted in 37 people being transported to local hospitals and seven fatalities, according to the Illinois State Police.

The deadly portion of I-55 was closed May 1 and reopened May 2, but closed again as a precaution for several hours the afternoon of May 2 because of high winds and low vis-

Here now is a look at other notable dust storms in Illinois the past 40 years, according to the NWS report.

May 17, 2017: Wind gusts of 40 to 50 mph required the closure of Interstate 72 from Jacksonville to Springfield and Interstate 55 from McLean to Bloomington. Two people were killed in an accident caused by the storm.

June 3, 1990: Much of northern and east central Illinois was impacted by winds up to 60 mph. Interstate 57 was closed from Arcola to Mattoon. One accident injured five people.

May 6, 1983: A dust storm developed in central Illinois and spread northeast to Chicago with wind speeds up to 60 mph. An accident along Interstate 57 near Rantoul involved nine cars and two semis.

Source of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricul-

tural livestock operations and wildlife. Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production,

mining, or farming. Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be ex-

pected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Based on information obtained in a Well Site Survey published in 1991 by the Illinois EPA, several potential sources are located within 1,000 feet of the wells.

The Illinois EPA has determined that the Bradford Community Water Supply's source water is not susceptible to contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and available hydrogeologic data on the wells.

Furthermore, in anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that the Bradford Community Water Supply is not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the community's wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper siting conditions; a hydraulic barrier exists which should prevent pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and the sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. Because the community's wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should prevent the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the susceptibility determination. Hence, well hydrau-lics were not evaluated for this system's ground water supply.

Johnston wins four events in final sectional tuneup

PRINCEVILLE – In a final tuneup for sectionals, the Stark County girls track team won last Friday's Lincoln Trail Conference meet.

"Coach (Bob Rennick Jr.) and I are very proud of this group and have a great time watching these girls succeed the way they have," Stark County Coach Clint Terwilliger said. "We hope for a great performance at sectionals and see how many tickets to state we can get punched!"

Stark County edged Kewanee Wethersfield at the LTC meet, 106-101, and got its usual point production from senior standout Lindley Johnston. Johnston won four events, taking the 100 meters in 12.78 seconds, the 200 in 25.91, the 400 in 59.42 and the high jump by clearing 5 feet, 1.75 inches.

But to win its fifth meet this season (along with three second-place finishes). the Lady Rebels needed contributions from plenty of other athletes - and got them.

"We have a very good, well-rounded team and we get points from all areas," Terwilliger said.

Stark County's young throwing crew was particularly strong at the LTC, as sophomore Lauren Orwig won shot put with a heave of 36-3. That placed her ahead of sophomore teammate Chelsey Stotler, who was second with a toss of 34-3.75. Orwig also placed second in the discus, with a personal record of 104-10.25.

More points in the field events came from freshman Claire Bowser, who tied for second in high jump, clearing 4-9.75.

Other top-five finishes came from sophomore Keagan Hamilton in the 400 (4th, 1:06.51), freshman Paytin Terwilliger in the 800 (5th, PR, 2:36.43), sophomore Alexis Martinez in the 3,200 (5th, 14;15.51), the 4x100 relay (4th, 54.03), the 4x200 relay (4th, 1:59.97) and the 4x800 relay of senior Paige Rewerts, sophomores Hamilton and Sarah Kraklow and freshman Cheyenh Smith (3rd, 10:12.61).
