Bobi Thonebury started Kewanee Welcomes in 2022, a local organization designed to aid refugees from other countries that are in turmoil.

"Kewanee Welcomes is a group of volunteers who help refugees resettle into the United States. It's basically where the next crisis is," representative Brandon Simpson said in describing the group.

He said there are similar organ-

Galva to refurbish high school lockers

Lunch fees to increase for 2023-24

For The Prairie News GALVA - The Galva school board on Monday approved ElectroCoat to repair and refurbish all the lockers in the Galva Junior/Senior High School.

Cost for the high school lockers to be refurbished is \$20,686, while the junior high lockers will cost \$13,440. The estimated cost to replace lockers was about \$150,000, not including installation. The lockers are believed to be original from when the school was built in 1966-67.

Several board members said this issue has been discussed for a long time and they are happy to update the lockers.

The board approved Gorentz and Associates to continue doing their annual budget.

In other business, the board discussed summer school that will be available in June for students to make up classes.

The board set June 12 for its regular June board meeting at 7 p.m. and a special meeting on June 27 at 6 p.m. for an amended budget hearing.

The 2023-24 school fees will be passed at the June board meeting. The high school yearbook will have an anticipated increase from the \$50 now charged.

Lunch fees will increase due to state requirements: elementary \$2.50 daily and \$50 monthly; Jr.-Sr. high \$3.10 per lunch and \$62 monthly; breakfast is \$1.50 or \$30 a month. Adult lunch Continued on Page 2

Continued from Page 1 teers and fundraisers. The group has a Facebook page and can be reached via email at kewaneewelcomes@gmail.com.

Approximately 30 Kewanee volunteers serve on the transportation team, documentation team, a resettlement team and an employment team.

"We have a small army of volunteers to assist with setting up a refuge family," Simpson said. "We have a housing team, which se-

cures places for them to stay mostly in Kewanee. The people are free, so once they feel comfortable, they can move on without being subsidized by Kewanee Welcomes."

Local landlords, the Murray Brothers, have been instrumental in securing local housing for the refugee families. "They're pretty easy to work with," Simpson said.

Sometimes there is a language barrier, but Simpson says that usually there is a

Borutskis act as interpreters for new families from Ukraine.

So far, Kewanee Welcomes has helped three Afghan and three Ukrainian families set up new roots in Kewanee. Simpson speculates future families may be coming to the area from Cuba and Haiti.

Families are screened and informed that Kewanee Welcomes is based in a rural area, since many foreign families believe the U.S. is made up of large cities, such as Chicago and San Francisco. Their con-

cept of the U.S. is skewed toward larger cities, Simpson said.

"The goal is for these families to become independent. The family members are not looking for free things. They want to get back up on their own feet," Simpson. "They are very proud and the fact they're in this vulnerable situation doesn't set right with them."

He said Kewanee Welcomes exists to help these families transition from dependent to independent citizens of the United States.

Pride before the fall – with walking after

Long before the arrival of ATVs, UTVs and even color TVs, the most used implement on the southern Illinois dairy farm of my youth was our own two feet.

Everyone from my parents to Uncle Honey to the hired men walked everywhere every day without complaint or, as often was the case for my brothers and me, shoes.

My mother walked more than any of us. For decades, she was on her feet from before dawn until well after dark cleaning, cooking, canning, baking and doing laundry. You name it, Mom did it on her feet and in a hurried, keep-up! pace.

Dad probably walked as much but his stride was less urgent. His day began with a starlit, 300-yard walk to the milking parlor and, after two hours of back-and-forth shuffling between cows (alongside the farm's born shuffler, herdsman Howard) Dad walked home for breakfast.

After that it was work, work, work and walk, walk, walk.

Noon dinner and a brief nap broke Dad and Mom's on-their-feet routine.

Then, right at 1 p.m., an afternoon of more working and more walking ensued until 4, when Dad would walk back to the house for a "lunch." Ten minutes later he was walking to the dairy barn for two more hours of the milking parlor shuffle with ever-shuffling Howard.

Finally, around 7 p.m., Dad would make another quiet, alone walk

Those walks ended in the late 1960s when, after nearly 20 years of farming, Dad bought a used Ford pick-up truck. It had two purposes: to carry an equally-used pick-up camper a couple of times a year and to carry Dad to and from the dairy barn daily.

It was a mid-1960s plowhorse, not a 2020s bejeweled showhorse. It had a bent tailgate, a clattering, six-cylinder engine and a threespeed-on-the-tree transmission. Its air conditioning was two handcranked windows, its power steering was your two arms, and its spring-filled bench seat sported the finest, cracked blue vinyl Detroit ever sold.

My brothers and I followed Dad's cue. As we approached our midteen years, each of us traded our growing feet for rubber tires, gasoline engines, and the rush of wind through our crew-cut hair.

Oldest brother Rich acquired a high-mileage Cushman motor scooter. It was fat-tired, primer gray, and almost impossible to start. Still, when running, it was a dream machine to any farm boy.

Shortly thereafter, second oldest David purchased a solidly built, homemade go-kart. It sat about four inches off the ground, a real hazard on our crowned rock road, but its baby Briggs & Stratton engine pushed it past 20 miles per hour.

That inspired me to weld together a short-lived duplicate; short-lived because Dad preferred his garden tiller engine on his garden tiller.

I soon out-machined everyone, though. Through an advertisement in Boys' Life magazine, I bought -

home to another quiet, alone supper. for only \$69! – a sparkling blue, factory-made minibike. The purchase included a frame, wheels, handlebars, hand throttle, chain, centrifugal clutch and the promise of unparalleled freedom.

> Mom was furious that I had purchased a "death-trap" without her permission. For days, she predicted I would break my arm or neck -"Or both!" - the first time I rode it.

I assured her that nothing of the sort would ever happen.

Then, on my maiden voyage across a frozen soybean stubble field, I crashed. Hard.

My arms and neck were fine; my pride and the minibike's right handlebar were in pieces. Somehow I got the broken machine back to the farm shop without Mom's notice. There, David, a better welder than me, tacked the death-trap back together.

That minibike, again as good as new, ended my farm walking days forever. Better yet, I explored every back road, field road and road shoulder - all without a license for the minibike or myself - within 15 miles of the farm.

Two years ago, my speedy, twowheeling days ended for good with a crash on my bicycle to make me, again, a full-time walker.

Pride, it's said, comes before a fall. True enough, and it's usually feet that come after it.

Princeville's Troutman starting another trek

For The Prairie News PRINCEVILLE - Dean Troutman is on the verge of another trek. And why not?

"It's better than sitting in a damn house staring at a wall, or in a nursing home waiting for someone to change your diaper," the 92-year-old Princeville resident said last week. "Get out and do something.

"There's a million things I can't do, but by golly, I can walk."

Can he ever.

Sunday morning at the Princeville Heritage Museum, Troutman is to begin an on-foot trip of more than

350 miles. It would be the fifth longdistance walk Troutman has attempted with not-for-profit fundraising in mind.

This Troutman's Trek is to head north — across the state line to as far as Monroe, Wis. That's about 125 miles one way in a straight line from Princeville, but Troutman's route is to take some twists and turns. Troutman expects to return home July 3. He plans to walk rain or shine.

As has been true for several of Troutman's trips, this one benefits St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. In 2016, Troutman walked 600 miles to the St. Jude base in Memphis, Tenn.

The following year, he started but didn't complete a walk from Texas to Princeville for St. Jude.

Troutman's first long-distance voyage, in 2015, was a 700-mile loop around Illinois to raise money for his eponymous park in Princeville. It's a memorial he built to his late wife, Peggy.

Troutman called this walk kind of short, relatively speaking.

According to granddaughter Carrie Christ, Troutman is to walk 6 to 10 miles most days. Christ is to update the Troutman's Trek Facebook page with his progress. Fundraising links are to be embedded on the page.

Lawmakers pass job-posting bill requirement

Capitol News Illinois SPRINGFIELD – As the General Assembly prepares to wrap up its spring legislative session this week, Democratic lawmakers are advancing a bill that would mandate job postings to include a salary range in a move they say would promote equity within the workplace.

Democrats in the Illinois Senate last week approved a measure that would require employers to list a pay scale and expected benefits for any position listed on a job posting. It would also create a regulatory structure for the Department of Labor to investigate violations of the proposed law.

House Bill 3129 passed with a 35-19 vote. Because it was amended in

the Senate, it now goes back to the House for consideration.

The bill would require expected pay disclosures from employers with 15 or more employees in the state and would apply to things such as job board listings, newspaper ads and postings made by a third-party on behalf of an employer.

If the bill becomes law, Illinois would join a growing number of states considering ways to make compensation more transparent in the job application process. New York passed a law last year that requires all job postings include a minimum and maximum salary or wage.

Colorado passed a similar law that requires disclosing pay range and a general description of benefits in 2019.



Under another bill soon to be sent to Pritzker's desk, community college students in Illinois would be assured that class credits related to their chosen major in certain fields of study will be transferable to all public colleges and universities in the state.

Senate Bill 2288 passed the House on a unanimous vote last week.

Under current state law, four-year colleges and universities in Illinois can decide whether to accept community college course credits as direct equivalents.
