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Movie crew in Elmwood for indie film

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD - Walkers through Elmwood Township Cemetery had their morning stroll interrupted Tuesday for a rather unusual happening.

A movie crew was busy in the west side of the cemetery shooting a scene for the independent film "Wardcliffe," directed and written by Peoria native David Ferino.

Ferino's film - his first fulllength narrative feature - tells a tragic father-son story set during the 2020 COVID quarantine.

The film crew of 25, gathered from Los Angeles and various other locales, is expected to work in Elmwood for two weeks and will shoot at several locations, including 203 E. Evergreen St., once home of the late Middle

Tap owner Don Ferro. That brick house, its 1960s-era wood paneling and bathroom played a pivotal role in bringing the movie to Elmwood.

"I posted on Facebook searching for a property that we could shoot in, and a member of my family found a friend (Lea Lizabeth) who had an empty house in Elmwood," he said. "It was perfect for us."

While checking out the house, Ferino and his crew decided they could shoot all but one scene in Elmwood. The only non-Elmwood scene planned is at

For The Weekly Post Some meteorologists are claiming we may soon experience a flash drought. Others are saying we're in the midst of one. One thing's for sure - we need rain

So what exactly is a flash drought? It's the rapid onset of extremely dry conditions which occur when strong sunlight, low humidity and lack of rain occur simultaneously. That describes pretty well what's hap-

Billtown water service may be affected

For The Weekly Post WILLIAMSFIELD - Water service to some Williamsfield residents might be a little hot and cold for the next month.

Long-anticipated work to replace and/or repair water infrastructure in the village was expected to begin this week. Replacement of water-distribution lines on the east side of Billtown is part of the \$1.75 million project.

Crews from Bruner, Cooper & Zuck Inc. of Galesburg, Hoerr Construction Inc. of Goodfield and G.A. Rich & Sons Inc. of Deer Creek are to install and test the new lines. After that, east-side residents should expect temporary water-service interruptions. "They'll start house by house and say, 'We're going to cut your water off," Village President Robert Johnson told trustees during their meeting

Monday night.

Johnson said affected residents probably will lose water access for a few hours, but not for more than one day. Once service is restored, water might be discolored briefly.

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DROUGHT: Watering critical for vegetables

Continued from Page 1 shrubs and trees well watered. Young trees need special attention moisturewise the first two years after planting to establish a vibrant root system.

At least once a week, let water trickle from a hose placed at the base of the tree or shrub. Water slowly to avoid runoff. Set a timer on your phone so you don't forget the water's running.

A layer of mulch will help prevent the soil from drying out in the hot summer sun. Chopped leaves, shredded bark or a layer of compost over the root zone will all do the trick.

An established perennial border will benefit from

mulching, too. Keep an eye on the border when the sun is high. Plants suffering from lack of moisture will show their pain by wilting and drooping. Give them a drink using a watering wand or a sprinkling can.

Apply the water at the base of the plant and let it soak in. Then water it again.

We have 25 large pots and planters filled with a variety of flowering annuals and tropical plants. Most of them get by with a good watering every other day. We've put saucers under the few that dry out quickly.

Watering is critical in the vegetable garden, especially if your garden



is in raised beds. For tomatoes and peppers it's important to maintain consistent soil moisture.

Uneven moisture levels are the major cause of blossom end rot in tomatoes. A layer of mulch does wonders for keeping soil moisture on an even keel. Mulch and regular watering will ensure a good yield of plump tomatoes and peppers.

Enough talk about droughts and watering chores. Let's turn to happier thoughts.

The foliage on your daffodils has surely faded by now and it's time to get some new bulbs for free. Dig up those clumps of daffodils, gently separate the bulbs and plant them elsewhere in your landscape.

You've probably received a bulb catalog or two in the past few days.

That means it's time to order bulbs for planting later this fall. And while you're at it, look up the prices for the bulbs you already have in your garden and you'll find you have a gold mine in your own backyard.

We have a large area south of the house where we planted 100 'Jetfire' daffodils about 14 years ago. Since then they've multiplied into large clusters. I'm guessing there are at least 30 healthy bulbs in each clump.


Just for fun I grabbed a catalog and checked the price of 'Jetfire' daffodil bulbs. I can buy 100 bulbs for \$60. So let's see ... 100 clumps with 30 healthy bulbs each means I've got 3,000 bulbs worth about \$1,800. Best bloomin' investment I've ever made.

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

Honor Flight made up for lacking homecoming

To the Editor:

On May 23, I had the privilege to go on the Honor Flight to Washington D.C., thanks to the Greater Peoria Honor Flight Association. My son, Jeff Ralston, submitted my name and he accompanied me as my guardian.

Our journey started at 4:30 a.m. at Peoria International Airport. Free coffee and donuts before boarding at 6:30 a.m. There were 75 veterans on this trip, including three men from World War II who were 94, 94 and 99 years of age. There were 25 men from the Korean War and 47 veterans from the Vietnam era.

I was surprised to learn that there are 140 Honor Flight hubs throughout the United States. Since the inception, approximately 150,000 veterans have made the trip to D.C.

We arrived in D.C. at 9:30 a.m. Eastern time. First stop was at Arlington National Cemetery, 640 acres. They have, on average, 30 burials a day. We witnessed the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. This first stop was the most humbling and respected part of my trip.

The Vietnam Memorial was my second-most inspirational stop, as I found the name of Leonard Allen Moore from London Mills, who died in Vietnam. Allen is buried in Uniontown Cemetery south of Douglas. To his family in the area, please know I paid tribute to Allen.

We stopped at all the branches of memorials, plus the White House and the Pentagon.

What's amazing is this whole trip is free and paid for through donations. Each Honor Flight costs \$100,000. We boarded the plane in D.C. at 9 p.m. after a 12-hour day. Everyone was tired but excited to get back home.

We touched down in Peoria at 9:40 p.m. and what I experienced for the next one and a half hours will forever be ingrained in my head. We were pre-warned of the homecoming, but never in my life did I think I

you are special in my heart. Thanks also to everyone who sent letters of support. All of you are special in my heart.

Finally, I can say with everything that took place, I have come to peace with myself and my country for getting the homecoming that I missed 51 years ago. Thank you and God bless!

House bills, corruption spell trouble for Illinois To the Editor:

Research in 2014 by two Princeton professors found that public opinion had a near-zero impact on laws the public gets. In Illinois that's not hard to believe. Actually, it serves as more of a stinging reminder of what we face in downstate Illinois year after year. Here are a few laws the state deserves to hear your opinions on.

First is House Bill 3062, which would mean any serious challenges to the constitutionality of Illinois' laws must be brought to courts in either Cook or Sangamon counties. Regardless of where in the state your rights are violated, as long as it's the state violating them they will force you to bring the claim in the courts the state finds the coziest.

Some proponents of the bill tout it as an enhancement of the whole process, streamlining it as these sorts of cases ultimately get decided in Cook or Sangamon counties anyway. I at least appreciate the naked admission that nothing that happens outside of those counties matters to these

will authorize non-citizens to be various types of police. I can't think of a better group of people to enforce laws the public doesn't want than non-citizens who may or may not have a real vested interest in our state. These non-citizen police will, subject to federal approval, be authorized to carry firearms.


Please keep in mind that Gov. Pritzker's firearm ban carves out exceptions for police. Effectively, some non-citizens would then have more legal privilege in Illinois to exercise rights than actual citizens!

Both these bills have passed both houses of the General Assembly.

Next up isn't a bad law, but two out of seven of the justices on the Illinois Supreme Court each received more than \$1 million in campaign donations from Gov. Pritzker. The same two justices also each received an additional six-figure donation from Speaker of the House Chris Welch. The court investigated itself and found no impropriety. The Supreme Court, including the two marionette justices, heard arguments last week on Illinois' controversial firearms ban. Gov. Pritzker and Speaker Welch are defendants in the case.

In summary, and assuming the governor intends to sign the bills mentioned, the highest justices in the state are up for sale via campaign donations, you will be forced to travel to kangaroo courts in order to air serious grievances against the state and the state will hire non-citizens and give them full authority to exercise state-sanctioned force.

Also not expected to begin until 2024 is reconstruction work on a 10mile stretch of Illinois Route 180, which runs through Williamsfield. Trustee Nancy Everett said the Illinois Department of Transportation still is working on plans for widening and resurfacing.

"They've surveyed it several times," Everett said of IDOT. "There are certain things they can and can't do, because they don't have the right of way or are cost prohibitive. They don't see that as one of the big roadways in the state, so they're not going to pour a ton of

cash into it." The budget for the proj-

ect, which includes work on Illinois Route 167 between Route 180 and Victoria, was \$39 million when announced last year.

Regarding action items, trustees approved Lucas Leckrone to fill a board vacancy. A project manager for Industrial Trade Services Inc. of Monmouth, Leckrone is to replace Jeremy Eagle, who resigned in April.

"He's young, he's energetic, he's got a young family here. He seems to be pretty sharp," Johnson said about Leckrone.



Continued from Page 1 School and various city streets.

"Really, the fact that everything is in such close proximity made it a much more efficient production," said Ferino, 36, a Peoria Richwoods graduate. "We'll be able to save a little bit of money based on Illinois tax incentives. And Peoria, Elmwood, these places aren't charging the insane rates you would get in southern California."

That's an important consideration for independent filmmakers, whose budgets pale in comparison to those of major studios.

Roger M. Mayer is producer of the film and said he is also financing the project. Mayer said the total budget ranges between \$44,000 and \$400,000.

First asked merely to provide Ferino advice, Mayer went well beyond that.

"I said, 'Nope, I'm not just going to give him advice, we're going to make this movie," Mayer said. "It's a character study of two people locked into a situation that's not one of their choice who find themselves at odds with one another. And they have extenuating circumstances that just make it more unpalpable, particularly for one of them, that ultimately ends in a tragic conclusion that will transform their lives forever."

Mayer said it will take 12 days of shooting to complete the movie, which is based on Ferino's 73-page script. Crew and actors will commute from Peoria.

"It has a voice and a vision," Mayer said. "I think it's going to have a powerful something to say."

Ferino has lived in Los Angeles for the past 14 years and said he only returns to Peoria to visit his parents for special occasions and holidays. Among his previous works is a feature-length documentary on the band Morphine called "Cure for Pain." He has also directed several shorts, including "Nocturnally Yours," "The Fortune Teller" and "Run!"

Among Ferino's claims to fame is starting his career as an intern for Martin Scorsese while attending film school at New York University.

His shorts have played at various film fests and he has submitted several entries to the Sundance Film Festival in Park City, Utah, which is where he and Mayer hope to see "Wardcliffe" play next year after editing is completed. "I worked for Sundance for 14 years and I really want this shown there," Mayer said.

While he said he could not recall ever visiting Elmwood, Ferino said he is greatful for the hospitality shown his crew so far.


"I just want to express on behalf of myself and the crew our deep gratitude to the City of Elmwood for opening their arms to us and for the Bean family being so generous with us," Ferino said. "You don't get this everywhere and the kindness that has been shown to a bunch of crazy interlopers feels really nice and we feel very taken care of."

Elmwood Police Chief Aaron Bean will have a cameo in the movie, Ferino said.

"We love local talent," he said.

Playing the father in "Wardcliffe" is Joel McKinnon Miller, who spent the past eight seasons as Detective Norm Scully on "Brooklyn Nine-Nine," a sit-com that aired on Fox and later NBC.

"I really like the script and what David Ferino did with it," McKinnon Miller said. "Sometimes it's not always for the money, it's for the project. And this is a good project."







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Farmington OKs new city website

For The Weekly Post FARMINGTON - The Farmington City Council on Monday voted yes to a new city website and no to a proposed beer garden.

Actually, the council did nothing regarding the beer garden at Rob Batterton's Spin City Laundromat at 217 S. Main St., but it effectively killed the proposal by making no motion for or against the project.

Batterton had proposed a 10-foot-by-15-foot beer garden for his business at the council's May 15 meeting. The council tabled his request then due to concerns about the noise level. On Monday, one neighbor spoke out against the idea and another submitted a letter against the beer garden. Alderwoman Jeni Crusen also said she thinks "with a beer garden there will be more noise."

The council did approve spending \$18,500 with Central States Marketing of Peoria to create a new website that will replace the one currently residing at cityoffarmingtonil.com.

"I did not find (the current website) user-friendly at all and we want to make things more convenient for the public," said Bettina Bohannan, city administrator.

Council members generally agreed with Bohannan, calling the website "clunky" and "hard to navigate."

In addition to costs to build the new website, the council approved paying Central States Marketing \$125 per month for hosting and support.

Bohannan said the new website, which will hopefully be functional in 12 weeks, should also allow the city to accept payment for water bills and for city permits. She said Central States Marketing has designed websites for the cities of Havana and Canton as well.

Payne to assistant public works superintendent. The council also approved Mayor Kenn Stufflebeam's appointment of Roger Depperman to the police commission. He replaces Steven Peters, who resigned as of May 16.

The council also OK'd two TIF grants: one of \$2,500 to Jerry Agnoletti for sidewalk repairs and one of \$1,000 for Brandi Foster for removal of a dead tree.

In other business, the council approved donating \$200 to the Farmington FFA Alumni group for a June 10 livestock show at the Fulton County Fairgrounds; \$500 to the Elmwood, Yates City Farmington Fireworks Inc. for the annual July 4 show at Elmwood's Sweetwater

Park; and \$250 to Farmington's July 4 celebration, which includes a parade, inflatables, music and kids' activities at Reed Park.

Fulton County Clerk Patrick O'Brian, who has purchased a home in Farmington, asked the council to reconsider the 6-foot fence height required around swimming pools. O'Brian suggested a 4-foot fence should be sufficient.

Finally, Alderwoman Lesley Smith will bring to the next meeting price quotes from Star Metal Art for metal signs for Jacobs and Dimmitt parks.

At its May 15 meeting, the council approved ordinances continuing TIF residential grants and business facade grants for Fiscal Year 2024.





Source of Drinking Water

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pickup substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that my be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a varity of sources such as agriculturem urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Source Water Assessment

Source of Water: ELMWOOD To determine Elmwood's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, a Well Site Survey, published in 1991 by the Illinois EPA, and a Source Water Assessment Program, were reviewed. Based on the information contained in these documents, twenty-one potential sources of groundwater contamination are present that could pose a hazard to groundwater pumped by the Elmwood community water supply wells. These include two stores/sales, a hardware store, five below ground fuel storages, a small engine repair, four above ground fuel storages, a warehouse, a manufacturing process, a ready mix/cement, a de-icing agent, a pile of material, a lagoon, a feed lot, and a mortuary. Based on information provided by Elmwood water supply officials, the following businesses, also indicated as potential sources in the site data table, are no longer present: J&J Oil, Maplelane Country Club, Elmwood Construction Co., Linder's Garage, Central Illinois Monument, Croziers Auto Parts, Blunier Concrete Co., Gorham Brothers, Knox Sunoco, and an unknown feedlot. Based upon this information, the Illinois EPA has determined that Elmwood Wells #1, #3, and #4 are not susceptible to IOC, VOC, or SOC contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydrogeologic data for the wells. In anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that Elmwood's community water supply wells are not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the community's wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper site conditions; there is a hydrogeologic barrier that restricts pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and the sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. However, having stated this, the U.S. EPA is proposing to require States to identify systems in karst, gravel and fractured rock aquifer systems as sensitive. Water systems utilizing these aquifer types would be required to perform routine source water monitoring. Because the community's wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should provide an adequate degree of protection to prevent the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the vulnerability determination.

Due to favorable monitoring history, aquifer characteristics, and inventory of potential sources of contamination, our water supply was issued a vulnerability waiver renewal. VOCs are monitored once every 6 years and SOCs once every 9 years. We monitored in 2020 and there were no detections.



LTC, Prairieland combining; more changes ahead

A planned realignment of area football leagues will have at least one season of stability.

The new LincolnLand Conference – a merger of the Lincoln Trail and Prairieland conferences - will create a 17-team football-only league starting in a few months when the 2023 season kicks off on Aug. 25.

For this fall, Elmwood-Brimfield, Farmington, Mercer County, Illini West, Knoxville, Lewistown-North Fulton, Macomb and West Hancock will make up the LincolnLand's large-school division.

Princeville, ROWVA-Williamsfield, Stark County, Abingdon-Avon, Annawan-Wethersfield, Havana, Rushville-Industry, South Fulton and Monmouth United are the small-school division.

But changes to the league's membership are already afoot. The Mercer County School Board recently voted 4-3 in late April to join the Three Rivers Athletic Conference for all IHSA events starting in 2024-25. Mercer County will take a spot vacated by Peru St. Bede, which is moving to the Tri-County Conference for most sports and the Chicago Prairie Football League for football only.

The game of musical chairs could eventually see a TRAC member leaving that league to join the LincolnLand. Sources say Bureau Valley is pondering the switch, although that school's principal Duane

Price said no decision has been made.

"Our school board has just asked us to go out and explore options to see what is best for our student-athletes," Price said Tuesday. "At this point we are still in the TRAC and nothing has changed. We are just exploring our options."

Keeping league numbers up is critical in football to avoid scheduling problems and has historically been a reason for many realignments.

Teams in the LincolnLand will currently play one crossover game between the large- and small-school divisions, while large-school teams will also have to find one non-conference game. For Farmington, that will be at Tuscola this year and Decatur St. Teresa in 2024. For E-B, the non-league clash this fall will involve a trip to El Paso-Gridley.

Farmington opens this football season at Illini West, while E-B begins its season at home vs. Knoxville, Princeville is home against Abingdon-Avon and R-W is at Havana.
