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Coach returns \$13,000 to Brimfield school district

BRIMFIELD — School-district
officials have received about
\$13,000 in Brimfield-Elmwood
baseball-program funds the
former coach had been controlling.

Alleged mismanagement of money from baseball camps and other team functions spelled the end of Brandon Porter's 10-season tenure as high school coach, made official by his resignation May 24. A special school-board meeting that night attracted about 60 people, most of them Porter supporters.

Brimfield officials said Porter deposited the money in a private bank account, not one the district can access. Porter was asked to forward those funds to the district. But for at least three recent weeks, he had been incommunicado, district officials said at a July 19 school-board meeting.

Two days after the meeting, Porter released the money, Brimfield Superintendent Chad Jones confirmed Sunday. He considers the situation closed.

"There has been a lot of misunderstanding all around as it pertains to this matter," Porter said in a statement to The Weekly

Post. "The school district and I have worked together to resolve this issue. The funds have been turned over to the school and we are moving on."

The district is seeking advice from its attorney about how to handle the money, according to Jones. It probably will go to the baseball activity fund, to be divided equally between the grade and high schools.

Earlier, the district suggested there was no evidence of embezzlement or theft, although Porter's record-keeping was incomplete. Moments after the board meeting ended last week, Jones indicated the situation regarding the missing money was murky at best.

"I don't know all the legalities of it yet, but I can tell you that he should give back the money," Jones said. "But I don't know if we can really accept the money, because we don't know what kind of money it is. We don't have any records of what was deposited and what was taken out.

"We have no proof that he's stolen money, but we don't have any proof that he hasn't."

Events that led to and included Porter's resignation took place before July 1, when Jones became superintendent.

During the meeting July 19, School Board President Steve Updyke accused Porter of lying to baseball parents about the circumstances of his departure, among other things. The parents of two players had asked the board to reinstate Porter.

Beat blight

Trimming tomato leaves helps fight common issue

Summer's heat and humidity, which have been waiting in the wings for some time, have finally moved center stage. The TV weatherpersons are positively giddy, manipulating their meteorological maps and carrying on about heat indexes, heat domes and climate change. Nobody talks about the weather anymore. It's all about climate change.

Well, whether it's weather or climate, the heat and humidity that come with it bring on problems in the garden. In the tomato patch we'll find there's a fungus among us. Three fungal foliar diseases inevitably appear on those precious plants when heat and humidity is high.

Early blight starts on the lower leaves of the tomato plant and slowly works its way

Delays expected for Princeville sewer job

planned effort to upgrade Princeville's two sewer plants probably will take a little longer than anticipated.

Construction on the project the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency has mandated is expected to begin in April 2025 and end in July 2026, according to Chad Gardner, the village superintendent of public works. He expected the timetable to be one year sooner.

"It is what it is. It's a big project," Gardner told the Village Board during its meeting July 18. "Next year there will be literally nothing as far as construction."

According to Gardner, the approval and bid process is

to fill most of 2024. Total cost of the project is expected to be between \$5 million and \$6 million. The EPA is to forgive about \$1.25 million. Sewer-rate hikes and tax-increment-financing money are to help repay an EPA revolving loan.

The project is intended to eliminate sanitary-sewer overflows onto streets and into basements, because of heavy rainstorms.

"We have to file reports on all those things," Gardner said regarding the EPA. "Now they've finally said, 'Enough's enough, we need you to do something.' It's one of those things where if we had the money, we would have had it done a long time ago."

"Put Porter back where he belongs. Give him back to the kids," Regina Crowe said. "I'm not asking you for Porter's sake. I'm asking you for the kids' sake. This is ridiculous."

Updyke appeared to believe the situation is ridiculous, too, albeit for different reasons.

The board president suggested Porter committed a felony regarding the baseball money. According to Updyke, Porter deposited into a private account checks that were made out to Brimfield High School and Brimfield Grade School.

"That's fraud," Updyke said during a contentious exchange with parents. "We have the checks. If I did that with my employer, I'd probably be in jail and fired and sitting in front of a judge. We didn't do that. We removed him from coaching.

"He told us he was going to turn (money) over to the school three weeks ago, and he still hasn't done it. He has not been upfront and honest with the board and administration through all of this. There was an opportunity for him to continue with the program, but he's continued to lie."

As of last week, Porter still was employed as a Brimfield health and physical-education teacher, Jones said. He suggested Porter was telling parents he might return as a coach for the 2024 season.

"I don't want to have heated conversations with the public about this, but I feel like it was needed tonight," Jones said immediately after the meeting. "We just feel like the story hasn't been told correctly, as far as what Brandon's been telling people. And I hate to say that about one of my teachers, but that's just what's been happening."

Based on his statement, it appears Porter realizes he isn't likely to coach B-E baseball anytime soon.

"Thank you to all the players who have played here for me. I appreciate

all of you," Porter stated. "I am looking forward to spending more time with my family and to whatever the future may hold."

The board has not yet authorized a high school coaching replacement for Porter. Last week the board approved hiring Josh Johnson for the gradeschool coaching job Porter once filled. Johnson also was approved as a high school volunteer coach.

Mike Meinders was hired as a grade-school assistant, and Phil Johnson was authorized as gradeschool developmental coach.

"We're just trying to move on,"
Jones said regarding Porter. "He's
not going to coach here this year, and
we're going to see how things turn
out. In the grand scheme of things,
we were trying to protect Brandon in
this whole thing and it just kind of
blew up in our face, honestly, because he's been going around telling
people he's still going to be the baseball coach."

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
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

Of bison, boneheads, hiking & assassin bugs

Rambling through Wyoming, before ending vacation far too early.

We were hiking a scenic backcountry trail last week at Yellowstone National Park when I saw a big

brown hump off in the distance. Binoculars confirmed it was a sleeping bison, which was no surprise since there were bison everywhere during a wonderful threeday visit to the park. At one

point, a medium-sized bison barged ahead of cars to cross a one-lane bridge in the middle of a road construction zone – to say nothing of the regular bison-induced traffic jams as they crossed roads or just stood there looking big.

Bison were even in the headlines, unfortunately, after a woman was gored near Lake Yellowstone and suffered seven spinal fractures, bilateral collapsed lungs and other injuries on July 17. The woman reportedly did her best to get away from the big animal, which her fiancee said charged from 60 yards. Frankly, I'm surprised there isn't somebody gored every day the park is open – and not because bison weigh up to 2,000 pounds and can run up to 30 mph.

People are just idiots. Not everyone. And maybe not the latest victim. Maybe she just had bad luck.

But too many others keep pushing theirs. Spend time in Yellowstone or the Grand Tetons and you'll see far too many folks get far too close to bison. And bears. And moose. And every other animal they encounter. This happens despite repeated warnings from rangers, park publications and signs all over. Watching it kind of makes you wonder how humans have lasted this long.

Most people sidling up to bison have cellphone in hand for the allimportant selfie. Pondering it reminds me what I've often thought while visiting areas of natural beauty: Oh how wonderful this place would be if not for all the other visitors.

That said, it is comforting to pass other hikers now and then on a trail,



if only so they can be a bear's first choice for lunch. My wife, youngest son and I hiked a gorgeous trail to Little Gibbon Falls all by ourselves for a few hours. It was magical, but scary. If a bear decides to eat me, so be it. But to see a loved one taken by a wild critter would be hard to handle. ... Speaking of hikes, my sons turned me onto the AllTrails app, a helpful source of information that lets you download trails. That way when the internet connection evaporates, as so often happens in Yellowstone, you can still find your way. ... If you are headed to Yellowstone and

plan to hike, a must-have book is "A

What other critters did we see? Well there was a momma bear with three little cubs that captivated some of our crew (while one member hid back by the car). There were two wolves in the Lamar Valley, which is open again after being closed due to flood damage last summer. Moose sightings were most common in the Tetons. There was a ruffed grouse up in Yellowstone's Dunraven Pass. A bighorn sheep in the Badlands. Monster mule deer and plenty of elk, antelope and prairie dogs. ... Perhaps most unexpected of all, in Casper, Wyo., we encountered a pink-haired fellow named Jeffree Star, who my kids tell me is a YouTube influencer and who dates an NFL player. Seriously. Actually, we didn't see Mr. Star, just the 1,000 people who crowded Casper for the July 15 grand opening of his cosmetics store, where he peddles yak-based cosmetics and yak meat. All of it made my head hurt, but a clerk at the Lou Taubert Ranch Outfitters Store said Star is a good guy and a great customer. ... Star is also one of many Californians who have moved into Wyoming and Montana, apparently lured by lower

taxes, cheaper real estate and natural beauty. One nice thing about the influx of Californians is that they are hated more than Illinoisans. So we had that going for us, which is nice.

After arriving back in Elmwood, I figured the crazy wildlife experiences were over. Hah. Mary Case of Elmwood walked into TWP headquarters Monday with a covered Kerr canning jar that immediately raised suspicion. Always reserved, Mary wasted no time in asking, "Hey, what kind of bug is this?" Turns out she had captured a wheel bug, aka "the assassin bug." According to some internet scientists, the wheel bug has spread north, which may be due to warmer temperatures or because they like to eat stinkbugs. The latter might make you seek out wheel bugs. But beware: "The bite of the wheel bug is immediately and intensely painful," says Texas A&M Extension. Another website said your skin may "slough off" in the area of a bite. That made Mary look pretty brave, since she just barehanded the thing. Myself, I put the little rascal next to the Jim Beam decanter as a guard bug and will pay 50 cents apiece for the first 20 stinkbugs brought in to feed him. Also, any suggestions for a name will be welcomed. ... The road to the end of the road

The first names were common in the last century: Clara, Woodrow, Elmer, Ethel. The last names, Anglicized over time, mostly reached back to Germany and France with a few stopping short in Ireland and Scot-

All were neighbors up and down the single-track, thinly rocked road that ran a few miles from an ancient limestone bluff on the northwest to the fescue-clad levee a rifle shot southeast. The road was older than Illinois, a path worn bare by moccasins between Cahokia up north and the French settlement of Kaskaskia to the south.

At least until 1881, when the Mississippi River claimed the nearby Kaskaskia River's more eastern channel to give the old road a new end, the Mississippi. Seventy years later, the U.S. Army Corps

of Engineers built a second new terminus, the big-shouldered levee.

To us it was just Roots Road, a route between a village worn down to just a sign on an abandoned railroad that went past a nearly hidden tavern and some family farms to go, literally, nowhere. It was short, dusty and it held our whole world.

At one end lived Frank and Clara K., he a leathery, thin farmer and cattleman of German stock; she a chatty, apron-wearing mother of six who sold eggs to neighbors for "walkingaround money." Their son Gary carried his father's confidence and his mother's humor. He took over the farm until his too-young passing in

Down the road and to the right stood Roots Tavern, a low building designed to be exactly what it was, an out-of-the-way watering hole miles from any prying prig. A knottypine bar ran its length and was rarely uncrowded day or night, Sunday to

My mother disliked it, its proprietor, Russell B., and his brother, Elmer. My father, however, found Elmer, who farmed and drove a truck for a nearby rock quarry, great company because both were avid talkers and slow beer drinkers, two ingredients for a hearty laugh and a long friendship.

From there, a short walk took you to two aging gentlemen, George W. and Peanuts B., who lived in a twostory, shingled house. I never learned Peanuts' given name but he was a whiz mechanic who could fix almost anything that burned gas. George's mother, reportedly, had family ties to the indigenous people who had farmed our land generations before

Another half-mile or so towards our house lived three farming bachelor brothers, Woodrow, Tanny and Elvin L. They were as French as Napoleon but their family had been in Illinois long before the small Corsican became Europe's big man. Tanny was the silent one, Woodrow the homebody cook and Elvin the always-smiling, always-waving extrovert.

Nearby was Emil M., a retired farmer and Walter Brennan lookalike, and his wife Ethel, who was always wearing her Sunday best pearls, red lipstick, heavy face powder – every Saturday when I pedaled my bike to her house to buy our family's four dozen eggs. Two unmarried sons, Ivan and Harold, lived with them in the small, sturdy farmhouse.

Two years ago, while on a visit to southern Illinois, I came across Ivan (Harold died in 2003) mowing the lawn near the only home he had ever lived in. I asked him about a grave I had just encountered at the nearby cemetery that appeared to be a daysold baby his parents had buried in the early 1920s.

I was correct, he confirmed. "But," he added quietly, "it's just one of four babies they buried before my oldest brother was born."

Barely a half-mile from where Ivan related that unpowdered fact stood our house, an often-flooded, sweltering oven in the summer and drafty deep freeze in the winter.

Not quite a mile beyond our milking parlor, the road abruptly ended where Earl Gene P., the baby brother of our hired men Jackie and Howard, lived for decades with his large family.

Today, all those farms, homes and people - save the tavern and Ivan are either burned, bulldozed or buried. The old road, now all-weather, passes through only corn, soybeans and whispering ghosts.

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

Brimfield opts for hybrid sub/aide hiring

BRIMFIELD – Substitute-teaching help is coming to Brimfield Grade School, although its form will be different than first proposed.

The Brimfield School District is hiring a full-time paraprofessional who also is licensed as a substitute teacher. Following closed-to-the-public executive session July 19, the school board authorized the position.

Last month, Grade School Assistant Principal Nicole Loser proposed the district hire a permanent substitute teacher. Loser suggested the hire would alleviate scheduling issues, among other problems.

Superintendent Chad Jones indicated the hybrid hire will help with flexibility. A paraprofessional can help teachers manage classrooms or assist with student issues.

"There are so many needs, especially in the grade school," he said.

Starting paraprofessional pay is \$14 an hour, according to Jones. But if the new hire is substitute teaching on a particular day, he or she will receive \$125 instead. That's the current daily pay for district substitutes.

On days when the new hire teaches and does paraprofessional work, pay

is to be determined proportionally, Jones said. The position is nonunion. It's possible the board will consider a candidate during a meeting Aug. 9.

Also last week, the board accepted a \$30,000 donation from Trajectory Energy Partners, which is overseeing a solar-energy installation on school property. Trajectory representative Kiersten Sheets presented the check.

According to Sheets, the donation stems from successful solar renewable energy credits the Illinois Power Agency awarded the Jubilee Community Solar Project. It's to be completed next year.

High School Principal Marcy Steele told the board about a new cellphone policy for 2023-24. Students are to keep phones out of sight and silent during classes.

"Nobody's going to say they can't have them on their bodies, but we should never see them out," Steele said.

Students will be allowed to use their phones during lunch.

Before the board entered closed session, it approved various contracts for renovation of the grade-school office and kindergarten room.

Authorized were payments of \$13,700 to Wright-Way Interior Sys-

tems Inc. of Spring Bay for ceiling and soundproofing work; \$6,700 to Central Illinois Electrical Services of Bartonville for lighting; and \$12,057 to D. Joseph Construction Co. of Peoria for office-window installation.

The board also approved a maximum \$12,355 deal with Gorenz and Associates Ltd. of Peoria for the 2024 fiscal year district audit.

Regarding personnel, the board OK'd the resignation of Troy Tilly as grade-school golf coach and the hiring of Trent Trotter as his replacement and also hired Mallorie Menold as grade-school softball developmental coach, Nick Herbst as a grade-school volunteer golf coach, Griffith Inskeep and Devin Jones as grade-school volunteer cross country coaches and Devyn Lewis as a grade-school paraprofessional.

The meeting was the first for Jones, who on July 1 succeeded Tony Shinall as superintendent. Jones is a former Brimfield educator.

"I know half the staff by name already. I don't know if I would if I was coming in fresh," Jones said.
"But I feel like we're off and running in a good direction. I feel like there's trust — maybe not so much from the community yet, but we'll get there."

Princeville board discusses security

PRINCEVILLE - Security was a primary theme of the Princeville School Board meeting July 11. The board received at least one estimate of how much additional bus protection from thieves might cost. The board also heard about a way first responders might better access district buildings in case of emergency.

For \$25,285, Oberlander Electric Co. of Mossville offered to provide and install six wooden poles and LED fixtures at the school-bus storage facility. The district has sought ways to better protect its fleet after catalytic converters were stolen from three activity buses earlier this year.

Affordability has been a major consideration. The board took no action on the Oberlander quote, nor alternatives. It also is pondering whether it's worthwhile to install converter anti-theft devices.

One thing the board appears no longer pondering is constructing a new garage at the bus-storage facility, located at the west edge of the village. The cost of a garage that can house the district's 12 buses would be at least \$250,000, according to former Superintendent Shannon Duling.

Before he left office last month, Duling suggested the board consider a garage, for better security and for protection from bad weather. During the July meeting, Board Vice President Michael Harmon said he favors lighting and security cameras.

"I don't think that the taxpayers would want us to spend that kind of money on that solution," Harmon said. "I think our big risk is that a large number of buses would be taken out, and we would be unable to pick up students. But I think we would find a solution to that problem."

Harmon suggested thieves covet converters from buses that use regular gaso-

line, not diesel fuel. That's because gas converters contain more precious metals, according to Junior-Senior High School Principal Rich Thole. Most Princeville buses use diesel; the three buses that were vandalized do not.

Regarding better building security, the Peoria County Sheriff's Office has suggested the Princeville district and others install exterior wall-mounted safes that hold facility keys police and fire departments can access in emergency situations. Princeville Grade School and the district office each would receive at least one "Knox Box," named for the company that manufactures them. The junior-senior high school would require at least three, according to Superintendent Tony Shinall.

Local public-safety organizations would have master keys for the safes. Shinall said fire departments and law-enforcement agencies would not share the same safe. The push for Knox Boxes stemmed from a fake 9-1-1 emergency call last spring.

The district would be responsible for the cost of the safes and their school keys about \$950 for each set, according to Shinall. The board took no action.

Among matters in which the board voted, it approved the hirings of Bret Williams as high school varsity and juniorhigh baseball coach; Corey Campbell, Lori Carve and Chet Catton as junior-high volunteer softball coaches; and Tracy Thole as high school sophomore volleyball coach.

Williams resigned as high school and junior-high assistant baseball coach, according to Shinall. Also resigning were Jennifer Huss as eighth-grade volleyball coach, Jenni Kielion as a grade-school teacher and Malley Zadrzynski as juniorhigh cheerleading coach.

The meeting was the first for Shinall, who became superintendent July 1.

Farmington man dies in motorcycle crash

BARTONVILLE – A Farmington man was killed in a single-motor-cycle accident in Bartonville.

Jordan T. Marinich, 34, of West Fort Road was pronounced brain dead at 2:26 p.m. July 12 at OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria. He was transported there after the crash about 10:30 a.m. July 10 in the 2500 block of S. Kickapoo Creek Rd., according to Peoria County Coroner Jamie Harwood.

A passerby came upon the accident and contacted rescuers. Marinich arrived at the hospital in critical condition but succumbed to multiple blunt-force-trauma injuries, according to Harwood.

Marinich was not wearing a helmet at the time of the accident. Toxicology is pending, and the Bartonville Police Department is investigating. Marinich was cremated and a celebration of his life is to be scheduled, according to Oaks-Hines Funeral Home and Crematory in Canton.

Chillicothe man dies in crash near Monica

MONICA – A Chillicothe motorcyclist was killed Sunday in a twovehicle crash south of Monica.

William A. Dean, 64, was pronounced dead at 5:07 p.m. at OSF Saint Francis Medical Center in Peoria, according to Peoria County Coroner Jamie Harwood. That was about 45 minutes after Dean was involved in an accident at Parks School and Elliott roads.

The wreck involved a pickup truck, according to the Peoria County Sheriff's Office. Details weren't available, but afterward Dean was unconscious, not breathing and without a pulse, Harwood stated. Dean died, probably instantly, from multiple blunt-forcetrauma injuries.

Per the sheriff's office, the unidentified pickup-truck driver was not injured. Toxicology on Dean is pending, and the sheriff's department was investigating. The Brimfield Community Fire Protection District was among the responders.



The main village sewer plant is located along Woertz Road and is almost 60 years old, according to Gardner. A pumping station along Spring Street is about 90 years old. New lagoons at each location are part of the project.

"It's a safety issue," Gardner said. "We want to make sure it's right. We want to do it once and spend our money one time and spend it wisely."

The delay doesn't necessarily mean there won't be water-related work next year in Princeville.

It's likely a water main

will be replaced along Santa Fe Avenue in the southern part of the village, Gardner said. The main dates from the 1930s and includes lead service lines. Replacement could cost between \$300,000 and \$700,000.

Regarding action items, the board authorized adopting a new village codebook that can be accessed online at the municipal website. It probably will be available beginning Aug. 1, according to Village Treasurer Julie Delbridge.

The board also approved transfer to the village of the title for part of the land where the municipal water tower sits. The parcel had been held in a trust, according to Village President Jeff Troutman. The transfer is to facilitate the planned sale of the prop-

Also approved was a request to move a residential storage shed onto a property at 216 E. High St. There, two existing sheds are to be removed. The residents are moving the shed from their previous address, according to Delbridge.

Building permits were issued for the storage-shed work, as well as for a front-porch reconstruction at 320 E. High St.; installation of 33 roof-mounted solar panels at 325 N. Ostrom Ave.; a privacy fence at 1409 N. Town Ave.; and

replacement of a fire-destroyed garage at 215 W. Main St.

The board took no action regarding a request from a resident who wanted signs erected at village parks to indicate dogs are to be leashed. The resident observed leash-less dogs at least twice, according to an email. The resident suggested his or her daughter was unsafe to play in parks because of them.

"If we're going to put it in the parks, put it everywhere," Gardner said about signs. "We've got a leash law in town."

Gardner suggested those who see unleashed dogs should contact the Peoria County Sheriff's Office.

upward. It causes brownish-black necrotic spots on the foliage. The spots can grow up to a quarter- to a half-inch in diameter. A close look reveals the spots as concentric circles, like a target or a bull's-eye, but not a perfect circle.

Eventually the affected leaves turn yellow and fall to the ground, carrying with them spores of the fungus. These spores overwinter in the soil where they patiently wait for you to plant another crop. Plants infected with early blight can continue to grow and produce a crop before being overtaken by the disease.

Late blight is another story. Lesions are lighter tan and have a light green halo. It often starts at the bottom of the plant, but not always. It can leap to the upper parts of the plant rather than slowly working its way skyward. Late blight kills fast and spreads rapidly. It was the late blight fungus that caused the Irish Potato Famine, which killed more than a million people in the late 1840s.

The names we use for the two tomato blights are misleading. Late blight can show up early in the season and early blight may not appear until later on. Nevertheless, both are problems, early or late.

The third common foliar disease is Septoria leaf spot. It's often confused with early blight, however its lesions are smaller, a sixteenth of an inch or so. Infected leaves look like they were dusted with pepper. The centers of the spots often dry up and fall out.

According to the media, we can control the climate, but we all know we can't do much about the weather. We take it as it comes. So what can we do to control these toes or their relatives in the same spot.

common tomato maladies?

Keep in mind that the lesions of these diseases produce spores that overwinter on plant debris and in the soil. Remove any diseased plant material and dispose of it in the garbage, not the compost pile.

In the case of leaf spot and early blight, at the first signs of infection remove any diseased leaves and dispose of them in the garbage. For late blight, the experts tell us to bite the bullet and remove the dying vine, roots and all, and dispose of the corpse in the garbage.

Unfortunately there is no cure for any of these diseases. The label on that bottle of fungicide you have in the garage says to apply at the first sign of disease. Unfortunately that's too late. Rather, when the weather conditions are ripe for the onset of these fungi, start a preventive spray regimen if you're inclined to do so.

Back in the day there was a TV commercial for the Playtex Cross Your Heart bra. Its function was to "lift and separate." And that's your function in the garden. Remember to "lift" your tomato plants off the ground by trellising them. And "separate" them by planting them at least 2 feet apart to provide good air circulation. That's so the leaves can dry off quickly after a morning dew or rain shower.

Remove the lower leaves of the plants and mulch the surrounding soil with clean straw, chemical-free dried grass clippings, or chopped leaves. The idea is to keep spore-laden soil from splashing up onto the foliage during a rain shower.

And finally, rotate your crops. Allow two or three years before planting toma-

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Elmwood OKs paver patio, wall

ELMWOOD – The Elmwood School Board on Monday voted to approve construction of a wall and patio with pavers thanking donors to the school's new Claude W. Keefer Industrial Arts Building.

Donations for the building so far top \$245,000, according to Board President Mark Davis. Cost of the wall and a 2,300-square-foot patio will be \$111,635. Work will be done by Mark Hoerr Landscaping, Inc. of Brimfield, which submitted the lowest of three bids for the project.

"People are going to want to get their names on these pavers," Superintendent Chad Wagner said, suggesting the patio will encourage more donations in the future.

Blank pavers can be replaced with engraved pavers when people donate to the project, Davis said.

Wagner said the idea for a paver project was presented by Micki McCarthy of Elmwood, who has been running a fundraiser for the new building.

The patio will be installed east of the new Industrial Arts building and will provide a level seating area for fans who attend football games and track meets, according to Davis.

Davis said the building committee met recently to discuss configuration of electrical outlets and wiring in the building, which is about 70-75 percent completed, according to Wagner.

Davis said work has been completed on restrooms in the elementary school. Work on the football sound system should be completed this week by Thompson Electronics.

Wagner also said that the school district ended the 2023 Fiscal Year by accruing \$199,410 in operational funds, though \$50,000 must be transferred to address a negative balanced in the building fund. Wagner said this the ninth straight year for a surplus in operational funds.

Wagner also said that he anticipates seeking approval to transfer \$600,000 to the building fund to address costs of the Industrial Arts building, most likely at the August meeting.

Justices rule Illinois cash bail will end

SPRINGFIELD - A landmark criminal justice reform that eliminates cash bail in Illinois is constitutional, the state's Supreme Court ruled Tuesday, paving the way for the change to take effect Sept. 18.

The 5-2 decision – handed down on partisan lines – means an individual's wealth will no longer play a role in whether they are incarcerated while awaiting trial. Judges can still order someone to be detained as they await trial, but the new system will instead be based on an offender's level of risk of reoffending or fleeing prosecution.

With the new law's implementation, Illinois will become the first state in the U.S. to fully eliminate cash bail – and all provisions of the SAFE-T Act criminal justice reform will have taken full effect.

Short for Safety, Accountability, Fairness and Equity-Today, the wideranging measure was an initiative of the Illinois Legislative Black Caucus that passed following the murder of George Floyd by a Minneapolis police officer.

The act reformed police training, certification and use-of-force standards, expanded detainee rights and gave the attorney general's office authority to investigate alleged civil rights violations by law enforcement. It also requires body cameras at all police departments by 2025.

The state Supreme Court had postponed the scheduled Jan. 1 implementation of pretrial detention provisions pending its ruling, which was issued July 18.

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State Rep. Justin Slaughter, a Chicago Democrat who sponsored the 2021 measure in the House, said that the pretrial detention overhaul will addresses an "overly punitive criminal justice system" for impoverished Illinoisans – especially those in black and brown communities.

While opponents of the new law have argued it will strain smaller court systems and hinder judicial discretion to detain individuals, the lawsuit centered on the meaning of two mentions of "bail" in the Illinois Constitution and the interplay between branches of government.

The Supreme Court ruled on a set of consolidated cases filed against Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul, Gov. JB Pritzker and the state's Democratic legislative leaders by state's attorneys and sheriffs from over 60 counties.

The lawsuit specifically cited Article VIII of the state constitution, which states, "all persons" accused of crimes "shall be bailable by sufficient sureties." Any changes to the language, the lawsuit argued, would require a constitutional amendment to be approved by voters.

While a Kankakee County judge ruled with the state's attorneys and sheriffs late last year, Chief Justice Mary Jane Theis, writing for the majority, said the lower court misinterpreted the state constitution.

"The Illinois Constitution of 1970 does not mandate that monetary bail is the only means to ensure criminal defendants appear for trials or the only means to protect the public," she

She added that the "bailable by sufficient sureties" language in the current 1970 constitution mirrors the state's original 1818 constitution. Theis noted that when the 1818 version was written, the concept of monetary bail was "all but unknown."

Theis also noted the General Assembly first published "a comprehensive system concerning pretrial release" in 1963 and has since amended bail regulations "more than 20 times."

The high court's two Republican justices dissented.

Justice David Overstreet, of the 5th District in southern Illinois, wrote that he believed the General Assembly's elimination of cash bail was "in direct violation" of the constitution.

After the court's decision, Senate Republican Leader John Curran, of Downers Grove, called for a special session to clarify more of the bill in the 60 days before it takes effect. The proposed special session would need approval from Democratic legislative leaders or the governor, none of whom have publicly indicated support for the idea.

Curran said he'd support widening judicial authority to detain individuals accused of all felonies, including the crime of burglary. December's amendment allows a judge to order detention for residential burglary or burglary "where there is use of force against another person." But simple burglary – such as someone stealing change from a car or stealing from a business - is not detainable based on an offender's risk of danger to the community.

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
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
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
