# Wellness center plans unveiled

For The Weekly Post ELMWOOD – A wellness center on the north edge of town took one more step toward becoming reality last Thursday though several larger leaps are still to come.

A crowd of more than 55 people gathered on a sultry morning to hear details about the proposed Community Wellness Center, which planners hope will open in 2025 on the west side of Illinois Route 78, adjacent to the Graham Medical Clinic.

The \$12.4-million, 33,000square-foot facility will feature a swimming pool, basketball courts, an indoor walking track, workout equipment, a community room and various programs coordinated by the YMCA, which is partnering with the Elmwood Community Foundation and Graham Medical to spearhead the joint venture.

At present, the site of the proposed center is planted in corn.

"It is a field of dreams," said Tony Hart, president of the ECF, which has been working on the project for nearly eight years.

"When we come back for the ribbon-cutting, I have one suggestion: Let's do it indoors in the air

conditioning," U.S. Rep Darin La-Hood said, drawing a laugh from the sweaty crowd.

How soon that ribbon-cutting will happen depends on how well fundraising proceeds. Hart said the campaign is so far in the silent phase, with a public drive to start around Sept. 1.

So far, a total of \$5,250,000 has been raised, according to Andy Thornton, director of the Peoria YMCA, which will run operations at the new center.

That includes \$3.75 million in federal dollars that LaHood and former U.S. Rep Cheri Bustos Continued on Page 2

## **Crafty duo** Beer makers with local ties share passion for brewing

For The Weekly Post Nick Babcock and Matt Potts might represent opposite ends of the craft-beer business. But both men share local roots, as well as apparent bottomless enthusiasm for what they do.

Babcock is proprietor of Bearded Owl Brewing, located at 112 State St. in Peoria. Babcock, who resides between Oak Hill and Edwards, describes his 5-year-old business as a boutique craft brew-

and bars. Among Bearded Owl beers are pilsners, stouts and ales.

Potts is founder and CEO of Destihl, a Normal-based craft beer and restaurant company that employs about 175 and sells its products in 38 states. A 1987 graduate of Williamsfield High School, Potts homebrewed and operated **Continued on Page 9** 

# Williamsfield to get more federal money

WILLIAMSFIELD-Federal money keeps coming for Williamsfield CUSD 210's nearly completed solar array and bus-electrification project.

Williamsfield Superintendent Tim Farquer learned last Thursday that a grant application he wrote, along with 19 other Illinois schools, had been selected to receive nearly \$15 million in federal funding through the Renew America's Schools Program. Williamsfield and its partners were among 24 recipients selected from a nationwide pool of 236 applicants. "I didn't expect to get it, just because I knew it was going to be so competitive," Farquer said.

Farquer's bid was to install solar-powered microgrids on the campus of 20 public school districts, including Williamsfield, Stark County, Monmouth United, Wethersfield, Peoria and others.

Williamsfield will likely receive about \$500,000 from the grant total, because Farquer said the school district already has most components for its own microgrid already in place thanks in part to \$6.75 million in previous grants.

"We're ready to rock and roll. We've already got the engineering in place at our location," Farquer said. "My goal is still a full active microgrid here by the end of 2023."

"I think people really appreciate our product and what we've created here," said Babcock, a Peoria native. "Even though we're small, I like to think we're small but mighty."



Continued from Page 1 steered toward the project, a \$1 million donation from Graham Medical and \$500,000 from an anonymous donor. Not tallied yet are pledges from ECF members and others helping to promote the center.

"I will defend these federal tax dollars any day of the week," LaHood said. "Because this is going to help rural America.

"Unfortunately, we don't bring a lot of federal dollars back to rural America. We had to work hard to get this money and part of it

was educating our colleagues. If we want to keep people in our smaller communities, you've got to build facilities like this wellness center.

"Young people want to have a place to work out and exercise and bring their families to and raise their kids. This is a perfect example."

Speakers last Thursday stressed that the wellness center expects to have a regional draw.

"It's not just for Elmwood, it's for all the communities around here,

Brimfield, Yates City, Maquon, Farmington," La-Hood said. "This is not the federal government carrying all the weight, it's a collaborative effort that we're willing to step up and put this money forward towards. But it's going to have to be the community and others that step up for the rest."

Thornton said he was surprised to learn there are 18,000 people and 7,000 households within a 15- to 20-minute drive of the proposed facility. He said for the center to succeed, it will need about 15-20 percent participation by those surrounding community members.

"We will develop a menu of programs based on the

input of residents in the area," Thornton said. "This is a regional effort. We are here for everyone and the goal is to eliminate the barriers to this type of a facility."

Once established, Thornton said the facility could generate 50-60 jobs many of them for "young kids."

Construction is estimated to cost \$12.4 million, according to Dick Taylor of the ECF, with another \$2 million to be raised for a permanent endowment to offset annual operating and maintenance costs.

"This will be a first-class facility here, not a government-run facility, that is going to benefit the community," LaHood said.

# Digging thistle to celebrate the end of a drought

Of course it couldn't just rain. After nearly six weeks without measurable precipitation, Mother Nature had to flex her fury last Thursday, bringing much-needed rain but also bringing down tree limbs

and power lines. Then she just kept the faucets open, switching the fear from drought to flood in some spots (like my basement).

It's a tradeoff we had to take.

The difference following that first downpour was immediate. Moments after the rain stopped, crops looked better, humidity returned and ground was once again workable.

The last item was as important as the first for me, since we are in that sweaty time of summer when long hours are spent battling prickly foes.

Despite the drought, thistles have been rearing their pretty/ugly flower heads for over a week. But with ground like concrete, the only option had been to spray herbicides or to chop thistles down.

That changed last Friday morning, when a worrisome patch of Canadian invaders was dispatched fairly quickly by digging and pulling the prickly plants out of still-moist soil.

With every pull, a thistle pricked my hand through a hole in my gloves and made me curse scheduling miscues that have haunted one of our two restored native wetland prairies.

Hey, you give Matt Goedecke and the folks at Nutrien Ag Solutions a chance to treat a field and they will slobberknock weeds. Plant prairie seeds after you harvest corn or beans, and the native plants have a decent chance of gaining the upper hand.

That's what we did on our prairie north of French Creek and the results have been much more satisfying. Fewer weeds means less frustration.

Unfortunately, thistles are just one issue plaguing our smaller south prairie, where weeds had a full growing season to gain a hold, even though we planted a thick stand of millet and Kelly Seed's Champion Buck Mix during the gap year.

Heading into this third summer of establishment, prairie plants should be booming but are still struggling to outpace weeds and the Kelly Seed mix of clover, alfalfa and chicory. That despite two summers of mowing and plenty of burning by my pyro wife. While alfalfa, chicory and some clover are tolerable, I lose sleep over cocklebur, horseweed and thistle.

So Friday was deeply satisfying, mostly because 1.5 inches of rain should keep trees alive and give row crops a chance to produce. But it also allowed for the most effective form of thistle control there is: digging the damned things out of the ground.

While spray is effective, it also kills prairie plants and leaves open areas for weeds to invade. That's one way cocklebur invaded the south prairie. And most herbicides I've used don't kill all of a thistle's roots.

Merely chopping down thistles is not good enough, either, because you leave seeds behind. Anecdotes about people who bag thistle seedheads to remove them from a field once made me think, "Crazy." No longer. Friday's infested area is one where I chopped and left lay plenty of thistle last year. I also sprayed several plants, thinking that would do the trick. Now seedheads leave the field in a bucket.

People who say "work smarter, not harder" have it wrong when it comes to thistle in prairie. The surest way to victory is also the sweatiest. After a few more months of digging thistle, mowing cocklebur and another spring burn, I'm optimistic the prairie will gain control. Patience is a key.

Besides, what better way is there to celebrate a drought-breaking rain than to get soaked head to toe and covered in mud while dodging bees in a vanquished thistle patch? Contact Jeff Lampe at (309) 231-6040 or jeff@wklypost.com

many new home builders, such as Custom Builders for whom I worked for nearly 20 years. Time flies – I always had 6-10

full-time guys plus some parttimers because of all the work there was. In 1990, I opened our store in Elmwood. Many asked how I would make it, and I just smiled because I knew my customers would follow me, and they did.

When Ray Stuaan, known as the best installer in the area, told me he was retiring, I took the green light and never looked back.

I was smart enough to surround myself with good employees who helped make me look good. I knew I couldn't do it all. I had to take care of my customers, and they would take care of me. I never

could have succeeded without my family, friends, employees and a good banker who had faith in me.

Above all the rest, the most important factor in my success was the work ethic given me by my mother. She taught me to work and always told me to sit down, lace up my boots and get going.

If you do the math, I have completed 52+ years of flooring, from a kid, to an installer and then retailer. Therefore, it is time for me to phase myself out of the trade I love, my life's work, that I have done to the best of my ability for all those years.

Merrick Floorcovering has a senior installer who has been working with me for many years, so he will be handling all installations as I phase out. I will make certain that all sold jobs are complete to the high standard expected from Merrick's.

In closing, to all who helped along the way, and you know who you are – I always carry you with me.

# **BILLTOWN:** Delivery of electric buses delayed

Continued from Page 1 of the other 19 schools who joined in the grant applications, Farquer said.

"We plan to use our specs and lessons learned for the other 19," Farquer said. "As we developed plans and specs for electrifying our bus barn, we had the engineers put together the plan for a microgrid. And we were just going to plug in the components as we went along.

"What we lack funding for is stationary battery storage and a micogrid controller."

Those two components will complete Williamsfield's microgrid and will provide the school district added flexibility during power outages, as well as a chance to possibly generate revenue down the road.

At present, Williamsfield can only use power from its solar array when the overall power grid is operating. By having its own microgrid and stationary power storage, the school can use its solar energy to keep the lights on even when an outage shuts down power elsewere in town.

"And one thing I would still like to get done is to install some wiring at the local public library to we connect to the library to power their building when the grid is down," Farquer said. "You get the added benefit of these energy assets in your community when the grid goes down."

Eventually, Farquer hopes the school's stationary power storage can also be sold to generate revenue during the summer months when e-buses are not running

"The rules have to be changed for that to occur," Farquer said.

Even without that, Farquer estimates Williamsfield will save \$90,000 per year based on typical spending of \$100,000 on electricity and diesel fuel for buses.

Of course, that requires the new electric-powered school buses to actually be delivered. An anticipated Aug. 1 delivery of seven buses to Williamsfield has turned into sometime between September and December, according to Farquer.


"They keep giving me the sales pitch that they're working out all the kinks," Farquer said. "It's disapppointing, but so it goes."

The district still has its fleet of diesel buses to transport students in the interim. Once Lion Electic delivers the new electricpowered people movers, Williamsfield plans to sell most of its diesel buses as a discount to neighboring

school districts.

The other 19 schools that are part of the grant are in varying stages of electrification on their campuses. Stark County already has on-site solar power, as does Spoon River Valley.

"The goal is for everyone to have at least one electric bus," Farquer said.

# Jury trial set for Oct. 2 in animal abuse case

• **PEORIA** – A jury trial is to be held Oct. 2 for a Princeville woman accused of animal abuse.

Stacy R. Mueller, 41, pleaded not guilty during an appearance June 29 in Peoria County Circuit Court. She was charged with felony aggravated cruelty to animals and three misdemeanor counts of cruelty to animals after a dozen dogs were found locked in a shed in May on her property.

One dog was found dead. Others were covered in feces and flies. In all, 21 living animals were removed from Mueller's property, according to authorities.

Mueller, a dog groomer, is free on bond and has a public defender. Mueller is to appear in court again Sept. 21. She also has been accused of 10 counts of failure to register a dog or cat and 10 counts of failure to inoculate a dog or cat for rabies. Those are ordinance violations.

## **BEER:** Destihl a top crafter brewer

*Continued from Page 1* the old Elmwood Brewing Company before he started Destihl in 2007.

Now, Destihl can produce 150,000 barrels of beer annually and ranks among the top 2 to 3 percent of almost 10,000 U.S. craft breweries, according to Potts. Destihl's barrel-aged sours and canned wild-sour series of beers gained the brewery national attention.

"I just keep dreaming bigger and bigger. I don't really stop," said Potts, whose brews are consistent winners at the prestigious Great American Beer Festival. "Not being bigger for the sake of getting bigger, but we have a great team and are really passionate about what we're doing and growing the company."

Potts didn't begin his craft-beer odyssey until after he earned a law degree from DePaul University in Chicago and went to work for the family firm, Whitney & Potts Ltd. in Elmwood.

A glass of Californiabased Anchor Steam Beer during a mid-1990s meal at Landmark Café and Creperie in Galesburg began Potts' pivot toward pints.

In 1997, the old Odd Fellows lodge in Elmwood, located just down Main Street from the law office, came up for auction. Potts said he talked his wife, Lyn, into bidding on it. After considerable reconstruction, the building that now houses Uptown Café opened in late 2001 as Potts' first brewery.

Elmwood Brewing started distributing its beer

to other retailers, and business was good, according to Potts. But he still was working three or four days a week at the law office, as well as serving on the Knox County Board.

"At some point, something had to kind of give," said Potts, who does Destihl's legal work. "I wanted to go more all-in on the brewery side of my career while keeping my law license."

Real-estate developer Diane Oberhelman took note of what Potts was doing in Elmwood. She offered him an opportunity to open at a Normal shopping center she was developing.

Potts thus left Elmwood in late 2005 and began to develop Destihl. It has two locations in Normal, where Potts resides – a restaurant and a brewery/beer hall.

Babcock still serves two masters, employment-wise. His full-time gig is in information technology and cybersecurity. A former homebrewer like Potts, Babcock opened Bearded Owl in early 2018.

"We've run the gamut," Babcock said about his beer business. "The first year was kind of a honeymoon period and we kind of crushed it, to be honest. We introduced food, we had a full kitchen going and we were super-profitable the first year, even the second year."

Babcock and Potts acknowledged the COVID-19 pandemic was hard for their enterprises. Statemandated closures of restaurants sparked Bearded Owl to deactivate its kitchen and sell beer beyond its facility. Destihl focused on canning beer for distribution to retailers.

Now both brewers are eyeing ways to proceed and expand.

For Potts, that entails continuing to pursue a 50state strategy and brewing beer for other companies. For Babcock, that entails opening on Sundays and offering wood-fired pizzas, which he's making himself. Craft cocktails have joined the Bearded Owl menu.

"I've always got irons in the fire," said Babcock, who with his wife, Malinda, has three children in Elmwood schools. "We'd love to expand into a production facility where we can make more product and do more in that space. It has to happen – if I have my way, soon."

Potts probably can relate. He was there once, too, just a few years removed from playing drums in the Billtown pep band.

"You can always dream big when you're in this business, but I would say this would far exceed that," Potts said about what Destihl has become. "I love doing this every day."





## Illinois's rainy day fund increasing

By HANNAH MEISEL Capitol News Illinois As the start of a new fiscal year arrived last Saturday, Illinois Comptroller Susana Mendoza is celebrating a record-high \$1.94 billion in Illinois' "rainy day" fund and setting her sights on doubling that figure in the next decade.

"\$2 billion sounds like a lot of money, certainly in contrast to \$48,000," Mendoza said, citing one of her most frequently repeated stories about the fund's balance in August 2018 when the state was still recovering from a two-year budget impasse between Republican Gov. Bruce Rauner and Democrats in the General Assembly.

The paltry sum would have only funded state government operations for 30 seconds, Mendoza said.

In contrast, nearly \$2 billion "gives us about 10 days' worth of operating reserves for our state," she said.

Despite achieving that high-water mark - and celebrating Illinois' eight recent credit-ratings upgrades from the three major finance agencies that determine public and private creditworthiness -Mendoza joked it's her job to be the "party pooper" or "Debbie Downer" of state government.

"The majority of states

in our country have about 40 days' or more worth of reserves for their state operation," she said. "So we're doing great, but we have a far path yet to trek through."

Mendoza said she'd settle for 20 days of reserves - which would be roughly 8 percent of Illinois' operating budget for a year. She said that's what the major credit ratings agencies have advised if Illinois is to receive future credit upgrades.

Mendoza has been pushing legislation to mandate that lawmakers put more into the state's rainy day and pension stabilization funds during

strong fiscal years, but it has never received a vote in either chamber of the General Assembly despite clearing a House committee unanimously. The comptroller said she plans to reintroduce the bill through allies in the General Assembly.

Mendoza said lawmakers should be able to increase the rainy day fund's balance to 8 percent of Illinois' budget in the next 10 to 15 years.

From there, she said, Illinois should focus on paying down its unfunded pension liabilities, which stood at \$139.7 billion at the end of Fiscal Year 2022

During the spring and summer months, living in Crested Butte, she developed a love for rafting and fly fishing. Sara always looked forward to fishing with her father, whether it was on a river in Colorado or a lake in Illinois. She had many friends and was well-known in the community for her smile and kindness.

In the spring of 2021 Sara moved to Durango with her partner, Seth Trujillo, and their newly constructed tiny house. Sara and Seth built the tiny house themselves during the COVID pandemic. She was certified as a Colorado raft guide, Wilderness First Responder, AIARE 1, Leave No Trace Master Educator, PSIA Level 1 ski instructor and for NOLS rock climbing.

Sara lived by a quote from naturalist John Muir: "The mountains are calling, and I must go..." though her passions extended past mountains into the rivers of the American west, southwest and through Mexico. She was drawn to the power and beauty of the currents as they cut through the land. In just a few years she traveled 15 of Colorado's most well-known rivers, including the Arkansas, Yampa, Colorado, San Miguel and Animas.

In Utah she traveled four: the Green, San Juan, Colorado and Virgin. In New Mexico she rafted the Rio Chama. In Idaho, the Main Salmon. She traveled to Mexico with Seth where she was one of just a few boaters permitted to take a run on the Rio Chocolja, Rio Santa Cruz and the Jatate River in Chiapas, Mexico.

In Arizona she rafted the Grand Canyon for three weeks, not once but twice. She was scheduled to go
