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## Appointments needed soon at 44 driver services facilities

Capitol News Illinois Many Illinois drivers who need

to renew their license at a Secretary of State facility will have to make an appointment to ensure service starting this fall.

Starting Sept. 1, 44 driver services facilities in medium- to large-sized cities around Illinois will require appointments for driver services - things like renewing a license, updating a license to meet Real ID requirements or taking a driving test. Customers without an appointment may not be guaranteed

Vehicle services, like title registration and license-plate sticker renewals, will still be offered to walk-ins.

The facilities impacted by the move to appointmentbased service are in some of the state's most high-traffic locations. These include Peoria,

Galesburg and others.

Many facilities in smaller communities will still allow walk-ins for all services. Those include Canton, Havana, Kewanee and

Wyoming.

The change in policy is accompanied by a standardization of hours at driver services facilities. All driver services facilities will operate from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Sixteen locations will offer Saturday morning hours from 8 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., including Peoria.

"Our goal is to change the stereotype of dealing with government offices," Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias said. noting he hopes customers have a "positive experience."

Giannoulias said the cost of the changes falls within the existing secretary of state's budget.

"This is sort of the first major step in implementing the rest of our modernization goals," Giannoulias said.

Giannoulias also encouraged Illinoisans to make use of online services, including driver's license renewal and ordering license-plate stickers.

## A life of service

#### Farmington's Blanche Wilson has made the most of her 105 years

philosophy. "According to Mark's gospel, 'She did not come to be



served, but to serve'," says Kathy Welch, Wilson's daughter. Much of Blanche's service has come as a member

of Farmington's First Pres-

byterian Church.

"I did everything in the church but preach," says Blanche, noting that she served as every officer and on every board that you could possibly join. She's been a member of First Presbyterian Church since age 12, going every Sunday until the COVID-19 pandemic hit.

Blanche said the pandemic changed her life in drastic ways. She couldn't see family as often or go to church and she stopped driving. Still, she kept active with painting, gardening or taking walks.

## Illinois to spend \$23M for access to abortion

As another of Illinois' border states is set to enact a near-total abortion ban this week, Gov. JB Pritzker on Monday announced several new programs to help address the influx of out-ofstate abortion seekers the state has seen in the 13 months since the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade.


On Tuesday, Indiana will join Missouri and Kentucky in its near-total ban on the procedure, while court battles are ongoing over Republican attempts to restrict abortion in Iowa and Wisconsin. Pritzker said Illinois Democrats had been preparing for such a reality even before last summer's landmark Supreme Court deci-

"While our neighboring states revert to forcing backalley abortions, Illinois will remain a safe haven for women," Pritzker said Monday at an event in Chicago announcing the investments. "And I will continue to do everything in my power to ensure widespread equitable access to reproductive rights."

To expand Illinois' capacity to care for the sharp increase in abortion-seekers, the state's Department of Public Health will spend \$10 million to create a hotline to aid callers in finding providers and making appointments. Pritzker had proposed the funding in

When asked how she
has managed to live to
105, Wilson first said,
"Keeping your mind and
body active."

That included swimming at the YMCA in Canton until the age of 95, where Wilson would swim laps or walk the track to keep active. She also golfed once a week until breaking her arm at age 95, daughter Kathy said.

Though she has stopped swimming and golfing, Wilson said she still likes to have a goal of waking up every morning and thinking "What could I do to fill my day?"

And that's exactly what she has always done, whether by winning a state athletic competition, participating in her church or helping those around her.

"There's always someone who needs help, you just have to look for it," Blanche said.

Wilson moved to Farmington when she was 7 and she always knew the city would be her forever

home. She was very active in sports during her time in high school, participating as a cheerleader and as a basketball and volleyball player. In a statewide competition involving various athletic events conducted by the Girls Athletic Association, she had one of the highest scores in Illinois.

Blanche and her siblings Melvin and Francis graduated from Farmington grade school and high school together, before she went on to marry her high school sweetheart Robert Wilson. He had moved from Scotland to Farmington at age 9.

Two years after they were married, the Wilsons had their first child, the late Dicky Wilson. Then five years later, they welcomed their daughter, Kathy.

Kathy said her mother was always happy to help watch her grandkids, or grandpets, whenever she could. Babysitting was even more convenient because Blanche lived just five doors down from her daughter in Farmington.

When grandsons Scott and Chris Welch began to grow and have lives of their own, Blanche said she tried to see them as often as possible, even traveling to visit with her daughter and son-in-law, Randy Welch.

"From the time they started having great-grand-babies in 2003, every trip we took, Mom went with us," Kathy said. "It was her job to take care of the babies."

Those ties have remained tight even after Blanche moved into Courtyard Estates in Farmington in October 2022. And since moving, she still finds ways to keep active.


Wilson has a small apartment with a kitchenette, a small living room and a separate bedroom-bathroom area that allowed her to live her life as she pleases, even going as far as making her breakfasts herself.

Blanche said she keeps busy by going on walks in the courtyard, reading new books and doing crosswords in the newspaper. During a recent interview, she was reading "The Invention of Wings" by Sue Monk Kidd.

Blanche said she reads two to three books a week, because "Television isn't that good anymore."

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

## Russian roulette with missiles, drones & food

The one certainty about the Ukrainian-Russian war is that there is little certainty.

Even with Russia's recent history of aggression, few predicted outright war. Then, when it came, no one predicted Russia would so badly misplay its opening gambit. And who could have foreseen a former television comedian rallying his out-manned, out-gunned citizenry to meet every bloody challenge and, incredibly, reverse the field on the invaders?

Past events suggested that the next big event would also be a surprise but – surprise! – it was just

He then sent missiles to destroy much of Odesa's export infrastructure to ensure the world received the his mad message.

By itself, however, the closing down of "Odesa shipments," tweeted Andre Sizov, a 27-year veteran of the Black Sea grain trade, "are not a game changer. Ukraine can ship 40+ mmt of grain via other routes." One of the "other" routes Sizov pointed to July 21 was a Ukrainian "Danube port" on the Black Sea's northwestern shore.

Then, surprise, Russian drones bombed that port, Reni, too. The July 24 action took guts because the bombed side of the river is Ukraine; the other side Romania, a NATO ally that, had it been hit, would

have likely required a military response by the U.S.-led, 31-nation security group.

News of the drones, destruction and export delays lit global grain markets on fire. Corn, the soy complex and wheat went up and down and then back up. Some of the move's energy came from continued dryness throughout much of the grain-producing Midwest. Most, however, arrived courtesy of Russia's attacks on Ukrainian ports.

But Russia, noted Sizov, "has much to lose, too" if Ukraine rises to the challenge – as it has for 17 months now - and retaliates by attacking Russian shipping. Right now, "Russia has almost 50 mmt of wheat to ship" to finance its war. Like the Ukrainian grain, it too is waiting for a ride.

Also, any increase in attacks on Russian shipping imperils its economic lifeblood, oil exports. Experts estimate that 43 percent of all exported Russian oil is shipped through the Black Sea, mostly on Greek-flagged tankers. Any move by anyone in that arena carries repercussions - market-wise, political, and military - that few want to consider.

Five days after the first Putin action, European Union ag ministers met to develop a plan to move the mountain of now-stuck Ukrainian grain through its border-sharing member nations - Poland, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary, and Slovakia - and into key markets in Africa, the Middle East and Asia.

It's not a new idea – it was used to move some of the 2022 Ukrainian crop into the world market – but it's not very popular either.

In fact, two months ago, on June 5, the European Commission, the body that oversees EU trade policy, said it would extend its current rule that allowed the five border nations to "restrict Ukrainian grain" flowing through their nations. What's more, the Commission allowed the same five to outright ban sales of Ukrainian wheat, corn, rapeseed and sunflower seeds in their coun-

Any new deal now will be met with quiet derision, not boisterous unity.

"The road and rail routes through neighboring countries have stirred anger from local farmers faced with a glut of Ukrainian grain that has driven down prices and hurt their livelihoods," ABC News reported July 25, 2023.

It's not great for Ukrainian farmers either. Shipping delays and higher transportation costs mean lower farm prices and smaller profits for the already war-weary group.

In the meantime, unsurprisingly, Russia keeps raising the stakes. When EU ag ministers suggested Ukrainian grain exports might be diverted through Baltic ports in Lithuania, a Russian spokesman said, sure, go ahead and try it.

Be forewarned, he added, "We will continue to counter that."

What does that mean? The chances are good that not even Vlad the Invader knows, but it's certain that the threat to global commodity markets is far from over.

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

## Peoria Co. changes rule for access to county roads

PEORIA – The Peoria County Board has unanimously approved a new Peoria County Highway Access Regulation Ordinance, which affects property owners looking to add a new driveway or access point to a countyowned road.

Previously, the Peoria County Highway Department provided driveway-entrance construction using county equipment and employees. This usually includes creating a culvert structure over a drainage ditch to access the road.

The original ordinance was set in 1998 and called for a fee of \$650 to cover installation costs. That fee had not been adjusted since, and it no longer covered material, time, or labor costs. While each project is different, it is estimated that it now costs the county approximately \$3,000 to put in an access point.

The county receives about 20 access requests per year.

The new ordinance went into effect Aug. 1 and is modeled on neighboring counties. It involves permitting similar to other construction, in that the highway department will permit and inspect the work done by the property owner or developer.

"The most significant change from the existing ordinance is that the construction of new entrances will be the responsibility of the property owner, with the county highway department responsible for permitting and inspecting that the work has been done to highway department standards," said Amy McLaren, Peoria County engineer. "After the completion of the work, county highway will then include the culvert into the roadway's maintenance program."

The new permit fee is \$500 for minimum-use access, such as a field entrance or single-family home driveway. For a major access permit intended for 150 or more uses per day, such as a subdivision or commercial development, the fee rises to \$1,000.

"I see this as a positive ordinance change," said Board Member Matt Windish. "We have to be responsible with taxpayer money, and by putting the burden of construction on the developer, we save funds as well as staff time. Time that can be better spent on road maintenance throughout the county."

## **ABORTION:** Hotline created for high-risk cases

Continued from Page 1 February, and Democratic lawmakers included it in the state's fiscal year 2024 budget this spring. The hotline is in its beginning stages as IDPH puts out a request for proposals.

The state's spending plan also included \$8 million in additional training for reproductive health care providers and a specialty consultation program for at-risk patients.

And on Monday, Pritzker said the state's Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity will open a \$5 million grant program for reproductive health care providers in Illinois. That money comes from the non-transportation portion of Illinois' \$45 billion infrastructure program, Rebuild Illinois. It can be spent on improvements, repairs, new construction, security upgrades and equipment, including vehicles that can be turned into mobile care units.

Additionally, Pritzker announced a new collaborative meant to help patients who need more complex reproductive health care. The state's Department of Healthcare and Family Services, along with IDPH, will join the University of Illinois at Chicago hospital, Rush University Medical Center and the Chicago Abortion Fund to launch a hotline aimed at these high-risk patients next month.

The hotline, dubbed the Complex Abortion Regional Line for Access, or CARLA, will be staffed by nurses who will aid patients through scheduling appointments within hospital systems and getting set up with any required pre-operative testing. Additionally, CARLA's partnership with the Chicago Abortion Fund will help patients with funding for reproductive health services, plus any transportation and child care costs.

CARLA's startup costs for the first year come from \$600,000 that IDHFS already had in its budget, according to a spokesperson for Pritzker.

Also on Monday, the governor announced the creation of a family planning program for Medicaid recipients that will cover

planning counseling, basic infertility counseling, screenings for cancers related to reproductive organs and FDA-approved methods of contraception, tubal ligation, vasectomies and abortion.

The program will be paid for with a mix of federal Medicaid funding and Title X funding. Pritzker also announced

the state would reimburse travel costs for state employees and dependents who live out of state but seek abortion care in Illinois.



## Peoria man a suspect in Farmington crimes

**FARMINGTON** – Authorities are investigating whether a Peoria man is connected to a spate of recent vehicle burglaries and thefts in Farmington.

Cameron A. Puryear, 20, was arrested in connection with a Farmington vehicle theft that resulted in a police chase of more than 100 mph. Peoria police apprehended Puryear about 3 a.m. July 20 near Glen Oak Park in the city's East Bluff neighborhood

A vehicle reported stolen the previous day from the 200 block of N. Elmwood Rd. in Farmington was found near where Puryear was arrested. Puryear told Peoria police he had been in the 2010 black Mitsubishi Outlander but did not steal it.

Farmington police first tracked the Outlander about 2:15 a.m. July 19 as it sped west on Court Street, then east on Fort Street. It did not stop at the sign at Fort Street and Lightfoot Road, according to a police report.

The Outlander continued to speed east on Farmington Road, through Trivoli and Hanna City. Police lost track of the vehicle as it passed Airport Road near Peoria.

Puryear was accused of possession of a stolen vehicle, aggravated fleeing/eluding of 21 mph or more, vehicle trespass, speeding 35 mph or more over the posted limit and disobeying a stop sign. He was transported to the Fulton County Jail in Lewistown.

## Princeville man dies in head-on collision

PRINCEVILLE - A two-vehicle head-on collision Sunday south of Princeville killed one of the drivers.

Robert L. Renken, 66, of Princeville was pronounced dead at 8:30 p.m. at the scene, on Illinois Route 91 just north of Akron Road, according to Peoria County Coroner Jamie Harwood. The accident happened about one hour earlier.

#### **USDA OKs emergency** having for CRP

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has authorized 89 counties in Illinois for emergency haying and grazing of Conservation Reserve Program acres for fiscal year 2023.

The Farm Service Agency's fiscal year runs from Oct. 1 to Sept. 30.

Beginning Aug. 2, Fulton, Henry, Knox, Peoria and Stark counties are among those eligible for emergency having and grazing through Sept. 30.

Counties become eligible for CRP emergency having and grazing when they reach the D2 (severe drought) level on the U.S. Drought Monitor for at least one week and are outside of the primary nesting season of April 15 through Aug. 1.

Additionally, the 2018 farm bill authorized counties with a documented 40% loss of forage production to be

eligible for emergency grazing and haying.

Local FSA County Committees can review forageloss data and make a recommendation to the Illinois FSA State Committee to authorize emergency haying and grazing outside the primary nesting season.

Eligible producers who are interested in emergency haying and grazing CRP acres must request approval before having and grazing eligible acreage and must obtain a modified conservation plan from the Natural Resources Conservation Service that includes haying and grazing provisions.

All practices for emergency haying and grazing are eligible except CP38 (SAFE) and Conservation Reserve Enhancement acres.


There will be no CRP annual rental payment reduction for 2023 emergency

haying and grazing authorizations.

To take advantage of the emergency having or grazing provisions, authorized producers can use the CRP acreage for their own livestock or may grant another livestock producer use of the CRP acreage. Participants are limited to one hay cutting and are permitted to sell the hay.

In counties that are authorized for emergency having and grazing, producers are reminded that the same CRP acreage cannot be both hayed and/or grazed at the same time.

## Perennial plant of 2024 is phlox 'Jeana

About this time every summer, the Perennial Plant Association announces the winner of the Perennial Plant of the Year award to the trade. To qualify, a plant must tolerate a wide range of conditions and be relatively easy to grow. It should have good resistance to pests and diseases, be readily available and have multiple seasons of interest.

The general public will read about the PPOY later on in consumer magazines such as Better Homes and Gardens and Southern Living, to name a couple. Well, I have the inside scoop and I just know you're sitting on the edge of your chair waiting for me to spill the beans. So here it is. The PPOY for 2024 is Phlox paniculata 'Jeana.' Okay, now that the drum roll and trumpets have quieted down and you've had a chance to catch your breath, I'll give you the vitals.

'Jeana' was not created by a breeder or hybridizer. Rather, a gal named Jeana Prewitt discovered it in a patch of phlox while walking along the banks of Tennessee's Harpeth River. I don't know Jeana Prewitt, but the fact that this particular plant caught her eye tells me she's an experienced and knowledgeable gardener.

Called garden phlox or tall phlox, Phlox paniculata is native to the eastern United States. It's an upright perennial that grows 2-4 feet tall in clumps 2-3 feet wide. The strong stiff stems hold pointed, 4-inch green leaves and are topped with domed clusters of tightly packed florets in shades of pink, lavender and white. Each floret is a tube supporting five



lobes or petals. Garden phlox blooms from July into September.

This particular phlox cultivar, 'Jeana,' with its fragrant lavender-pink blossoms, has two characteristics that make it an outstanding selection. Its most important trait is its extreme resistance to powdery mildew, the unsightly curse that afflicts many varieties of garden phlox. Some gardeners have given up garden phlox completely because of powdery mildew. Fortunately, several modern varieties show good resistance.

Butterfly enthusiasts will appreciate the other outstanding feature of 'Jeana': It's a butterfly magnet. In a two-year study, volunteers doing weekly observations at the Mount Cuba Center in Delaware documented the butterfly visits on 94 different garden phlox varieties. 'Jeana' was visited 539 times. The distant runner-up had a paltry 117 visits.

Researchers have tried to determine why butterflies find 'Jeana' so irresistible. They examined the nectar but found its volume and sugar content were similar to those of less popular cultivars. Some folks think the shorter and narrower tubes of the florets

make it easier for butterflies to sip the nectar. And because the florets are smaller, butterflies can reach several in one landing, rather than having to move more often.

If you've thrown in the trowel on having garden phlox in your garden, let me offer some advice. Maybe you'll give it another try.

Select a variety with proven resistance to powdery mildew, such as 'Katherine,' with lovely soft lavender flowers with white eyes. Introduced in the 1920s, 'Katherine' has earned its keep with its resilience and quiet beauty. It's a favorite of mine, probably because I have a daughter with the same name but a different spelling. Both are beautiful.

Plant your garden phlox in rich, moderately moist but well-drained soil in light shade or full sun. Remember it is not drought tolerant and wilts in prolonged dry spells. Give it plenty of space for good air circulation. Air movement helps the foliage dry off more quickly after a rain or morning dew.

Remove any mildew-infected foliage and put it in the garbage. In late fall, cut the plant to the ground and put it in the garbage to help prevent any mildew spores from overwintering in the garden. Removing blossoms as they fade will prevent unwanted seedlings. Phlox cultivars do not come true from seed.

Furry bunnies and famished deer are foes of phlox. Protect phlox foliage with the foul fragrance of a repellent such as Plantskydd liquid spray. I've found it to be very effective against both varmints.





## Wine will still flow despite dry conditions

Grape production this season is expected to flourish at Mackinaw Valley Vineyard despite it being mired in a severe drought.

Diane Hahn, owner/operator of the specialty farm and agritourism center located on a scenic glacier moraine in central Illinois, discussed the reasons for her optimism during a recent FarmWeek interview.

"Grapes are an interesting fruit. They're a fairly drought-resistant plant," she said. "Of course they need water, but they do much better in drier conditions than row crops."

Hahn's late husband, Paul, purchased the farm and planted grapes in the former row-crop fields nearly a quarter century ago. Diane operates the 15acre vineyard and tasting room with her son Eric and daughter Carly Drezek.

The family grows 20 varieties of French-American hybrid grapes developed at the University of Minnesota and Cornell University

"They're good for our climate," Hahn said of the grape varieties. "They can survive in up to 30-below temperatures."

The 25-year-old grape vines, which aren't irrigated, have also established deep roots that allow the plants to tap into subsoil moisture during dry spells, such as the current drought.

"They are pretty tolerant of low-water situations," Hahn said. "Our biggest issue when rain is a problem is toward the end of August when the berries are starting to finish.

"If it's wet in August, the berries can swell and split."

One impact of the drought is the grapes could be smaller come harvest later this summer and fall. But that could actually be a good thing as far as wine production goes.

"We may not have as much fruit," Hahn said. "The grapes could be smaller, so they'll have

the rest!

more intense flavor."

The other main weather impact on the grape crop near Mackinaw so far this season was a hard spring freeze, which damaged about 5% of the plants.

Mackinaw Valley Vineyard produces and harvests all its own grapes and makes all its wine on site. Mackinaw Valley typically offers about 20 to 24 wine varieties each season, including reds, whites, blushes and flavored wines

"We have very farm-cen-

tric, local stuff," Hahn said. "We just appreciate people supporting us."

The vineyard hosts several family-friendly events, including a popular concert series during the summer.

"Paul had a vision when he bought the place and we keep expanding it," Hahn said.

The vineyard and tasting room were opened to the public 20 years ago, in 2003.

"It's kind of an exciting milestone," Hahn added. For more information about Mackinaw Valley Vineyard, visit mackinawvalleyvineyard.com.

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## Ag slowdown could last all year

The economic outlook for agriculture in the second half of 2023 appears quite similar to what farmers experienced the first six months of the year.

Inflationary pressure and slower economic growth will likely maintain pressure on farm margins, according to Nathan Kauffman, senior vice president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City and Omaha branch executive.

"I'd describe the economy as having slowed recently after some sharp gains in 2021 and 2022," Kauffman said during a webinar hosted by the National Pork Board. "It happened alongside a sharp increase in interest rates and ongoing inflationary pressure that's proven to be challenging."

After the U.S. gross domestic product increased 6% in 2021, it slowed to 2% in 2022 and is projected to grow by just 1% this year and 0.5% in 2024.

"It has pretty far-reaching impacts felt across a lot of segments of the economy, including ag," Kauffman said of the slow-down. "It's not to suggest a recession is imminent. But there's a certain amount of trepidation among businesses (moving forward)."

Farmers are feeling the effects from tightening margins due to a double whammy of lower commodity prices and higher production costs amid the economic slowdown.

Commodity prices have fallen from 2022 highs by 30% to 40% for hogs, milk and wheat; and by roughly 20% for corn and soybeans. USDA earlier this year pro-

jected U.S. net farm income could drop nearly 16% in 2023 compared to 2022.

Meanwhile, USDA estimates farm production expenses could climb 4.1% this year to \$459.5 billion. Interest expenses and livestock/poultry purchases are expected to post the largest gains this year.

"The scale of increases for interest rates has a significant impact on producers that have a large amount of borrowing or leverage relative to their operations," Kauffman said.

The Federal Reserve raised the federal funds rate 10 consecutive times from the spring of 2022 until a pause last month to a range of 5% to 5.25%. And with inflation still well above the Fed target rate of 2%, rates could remain high.


On the bright side, many farmers entered the economic slowdown in a fairly strong financial position. But some are quickly burning through equity.


"Even though (USDA) is expecting a slight pullback in farm income for 2023, it's still quite high in an historical context," Kauffman said.

"And, from 2021 to 2022, we saw some pretty dramatic increases in farm real estate values," he said. "This would suggest there's a lot of producers in strong positions because they have high levels of equity to draw on."

Farm-loan delinquency rates recently remained at historical lows, with a dip near 1%, after steadily rising in the years heading into the COVID pandemic, he said.

a devout Catholic, and member of St. Matthew's Catholic Church in Farmington, where he was a Eucharistic minister.







Continued from Page 20 zero times I played a team that had all of their guys."

But come November, Brimfield probably will have most of its key guys back from a team that went 14-18 last season. Granted, the only non-returning starter is leading scorer Oliver Heinz. But Carlson said he liked what he saw this summer from senior Drew Kieser and junior Brady Johnson. Also expected to return are senior Cam Blodgett and sophomore Connor Doe. Carlson is high on junior Landon Klein, who wasn't in uniform last season until January but worked his way into sixth-man status.

"We needed somebody else inside," Carlson said about the 6-foot-4 Klein. "He's a strong kid. If he stays healthy, I think he can really help

All told, things look better for Carlson than they did last summer. Then, he was returning from a one-season failed attempt at retirement. In 24 previous seasons at Brimfield, Carlson coached 495 victories and the 2015 1A state championship.

"Last summer was basically nonexistent for me as far as helping to get a team ready," he said. "We have a lot of guys back who went through what we were looking to do last year. It was a very beneficial summer for us."

#### Farmington

The summer also was good for the Farmers, who appeared to plant plenty of seeds of potential.

Farmington won its one-day, eightteam shootout in early June. Among teams that played in it were Abingdon-Avon, Canton, Chillicothe IVC and Peoria Christian. Farmington also played host to a 14-team, fourweek summer league that included Elmwood, Peoria Christian and Macomb.

The leagues and the shootouts were intended to be more educational than anything, according to Farmington Coach Marty Lozier. Like Carlson, games in which Lozier had a full complement of players were rare.

"I've got a lot of kids without varsity experience," Lozier said. "I did see a lot of improvement out of the

sophomores coming in, so I was pretty happy with that group. They just need some time. In my offense, you need to learn each others' tendencies."

Lozier tends to believe incoming sophomore Jack Gronewold might be one of his best players in 2023-24, based on summer performance. Another sophomore, Landon Crawford, was a surprise.

"He played some point guard for us and was really good," Lozier said.

Incoming juniors Owen Morse and Zach Simpson also had productive summers, according to their coach. Those players are expected to contend for starting spots alongside incoming senior Keauntrey Barnes, the only returnee who started regularly for a team that finished 19-13. Classmate Zac Taylor also is expected to contribute.

Barnes and Taylor missed some Farmington playing time because of vacations, Lozier said. Barnes did not participate in the Farmington shootout, but he gained good summer experience playing AAU ball for a Peoria-based team.

Lozier said almost everybody on his roster also plays football. July is reserved for the gridiron, under Coach Toby Vallas' tutelage, so that's when Lozier puts basketball on hiatus until fall.

"They're involved in that, and I

don't want to risk getting someone hurt for Toby, either," Lozier said.

#### Princeville

Like other area coaches, Tait Sennett of Princeville dealt with a fluctuating roster this summer. But that gave him a chance to try different combinations of players, as well as to welcome back a couple who missed most of last season.

"That's the good thing about these summer basketball games," Sennett said. "We can play an offense and if it works, great, we found something. If it doesn't, we know what we need to work on."

Princeville was host to a round robin that included Dunlap and Peoria Christian. The Princes also played at Williamsfield a few times, but their major event was in late June at Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington. There they played Erie-Prophetstown, New Berlin and Newton.

According to Sennett, all three of those teams were in the 20-victory range last season. That's about where Princeville was, too. It finished 19-14 and lost to Peoria Christian in the Class 1A regional finals but is expected to return four starters.

Sennett said the three IWU games against teams from other parts of the state gave his group a fresh start, as well as confidence.

"You jump on the court and they don't know anything about you," Sennett said. "Some of the teams that we play around here, they know this guy's a driver, or this guy's a shooter. It's nice to play new teams."

Sennett wasn't sure if any of his players stood out more than others, but he did note decent summers from incoming seniors Josh Hunt and returning starter Parker Melick. Hunt is expected to be in the mix to replace the graduated Marcus Daily, the only senior starter last season.

Also participating in summer hoops were seniors Joey Bosch and Tayshaun Kieser. For disciplinary reasons, they didn't play after early last December. Both had been starters.

"You could see some rust, but I think they'll provide us a spark here and there," Sennett said.

## Boys summer hoops recap

#### Elmwood, Brimfield, Princeville will return plenty of experience

In summer high school boys basketball, there's nothing wrong with a little traveling, as Josh Fugitt sees it.

Games played the third week of June in a shootout at Illinois College in Jacksonville helped the Elmwood coach understand what he might expect when the 2023-24 season begins in November.

For now, expectations might be high for an Elmwood program that last season finished 22-10 and reached the Class 1A sectional semifinals.

Key members of the incoming senior class showed improvement at Jacksonville and at smaller events in Elmwood and Farmington, according to Fugitt. Among those seniors was Layne Durst, a returning starter.

"For some reason last year, he just didn't get it to fall at the clip he had averaged before that for us," Fugitt said. "He had a few games he couldn't miss this summer. He kind of steadied our play. I expect him to really lead the show for us in a lot of ways this year."

Jimmy Babcock has blossomed over the last nine months as an aggressor under the basket and as a capable passer, Fugitt said. He also

praised Jackson Magee, who is recovering from off-season surgery, and classmates Dax Alger, Mason Griffith and Sirus Nims.

"That has me really excited going into the season, knowing what that senior leadership can do," Fugitt said.

Among newcomers who made a mark this summer was Garrett Webster, an incoming sophomore. He broke his nose in a junior-varsity game in Farmington, but after medical consultations he reported to Jacksonville. Webster then

played some hard-nosed defense, including taking two charges.

"If that doesn't epitomize what we're looking for in our players, in terms of playing the game the right way and putting their body on the line ..." Fugitt said.

In six games at Jacksonville, the Trojans played Brown County, Hardin Calhoun and Hillsboro, among others. Fugitt believes it's beneficial to play teams from beyond the Peoria-Galesburg region.

"It's been competition that's been fitting for us. Most games are close," he said. "It's neat to get out of our area and recognize good basketball is played in other parts of the state."

#### **Brimfield**

Another team that traveled this summer was Brimfield – to Bourbonnais, home of Olivet Nazarene University. Brimfield won the Class 1A portion of a one-day shootout there June 10. Brimfield played Normal Calvary, Milford and St. Anne.

Brimfield also played six summer games at Williamsfield and went about .500, according to Indians Coach Scott Carlson.

"I don't get real wrapped up in records in the summer," he said. "There were probably zero games where I had all of my guys and
