Shoeing for a living

Farmington man has enjoyed career of working with horses

FARMINGTON – William Jones is a rarity. One notable way is that he owes his career to his mother-in-law – and admits that fact.

Then, too, there’s the matter of Jones working as a farrier, making him one of about 25,000 people in the U.S. who earn a living caring for the feet of horses.

For the past 17 years, Jones has traveled central Illinois trimming and shoeing horse hooves. He enjoys the work and does plenty of it, having had to

establish a policy of not taking on new customers. But it’s not a career he planned for growing up.

“The honest truth is, I was standing around one day waiting for one of the farriers to come do our horses and my mother-in-law (Kate Beckman) said that’s something you ought to do,” said Jones, who at the time had a job framing houses. “She printed a bunch of paperwork on all the horseshoeing schools in the U.S. for me.”

At first, Jones tossed the papers onto the floorboard of his truck. But curiosity *Continued on Page 10*

Traffic Talk

Elmwood council to discuss traffic mitigation measures

ELMWOOD – Vehicle traffic and driver behavior in Elmwood is becoming an issue, according to some city officials.

“I’ve noticed a lot of fast driving, disobeying signs at intersections, and it’s a concern,” Alderman Kenny Blum said.

During its meeting tonight (Sept. 7), the Elmwood City Council is expected to consider implementing some mitigation efforts.

An obvious one, according to Blum, is to change the traffic-control situation at Ash and Jarman streets at the northeast fringe of the city. That also is where Tiber Creek Road blends into Jarman Street from the northeast. Ash Street runs east-west, Jarman Street north-south.

The T-intersection features a stop sign (on northbound Jarman), a yield sign (on eastbound Ash) and no sign at all (on southbound Jarman/Tiber Creek).

“I’ve never seen that in my life,” Blum said. “It’s ridiculous. There is an awful lot of traffic in the morning and the afternoon there.”

Finale for local festivals arrives this weekend

While there’s technically more than two weeks left until summer ends on Sept. 22, another sign of fall’s arrival comes this weekend as the local festival season draws to an end.

First up is Elmwood’s annual Fall Festival, which starts today and runs through Saturday at Central Park. The three-day event offers a last chance for kids to enjoy carnival rides and

eat funnel cakes while adults can play bingo, sample live music and sample foods and vendors.

There’s also a parade Saturday at 12:30 p.m. with a “Let’s go to the rodeo” theme and a few local horse owners planning to bring their steeds.

Following that on Sunday will be Williamsfield’s increasingly popular Ag Day Festival, held in Doubet-Benjamin Park. The event, which celebrates the area’s

heritage and future in agriculture, begins at 8 a.m. with a free pancake breakfast. A community-wide worship service led by three churches begins at 9:30 a.m.

After the service, a one-hour scenic Spoon River tractor drive departs the park at 10:30 a.m. At the same time, more than 20 free events and activities open to visitors.

Ag Day organizers will bring back some favorites, such as the bale climb,

farm-chore course and tent of barnyard animal friends from local farms. New activities include a grain rescue demonstration and a second set of Ag Olympics-style obstacle courses for younger ages.

All events and activities are free. Proceeds from sales of food benefit the festival fund. Ribeyes, pork burgers, hot dogs, pie and caramel apples will be available on site.

The council is expected to ponder whether to make that intersection a three-way stop. Also to be discussed is whether the intersection of Main and Rose streets should be converted to a four-way stop. Currently, there are stop signs on north-south Rose Street but none on east-west Main Street.

Alderman Bob Paige made that intersection at the east edge of downtown a focus of his concern during a council meeting last month. According to him, some drivers on Rose Street don't heed the signs already in place.

"They don't stop," Paige said. "People know, 'Hey, the police don't come on duty until this time and they're gone at this time.'"

The block of Main Street east of Rose Street also is problematic, Paige said. He believes topography and congestion because of vehicles

parked on both sides of Main create potential danger.

Police Chief Aaron Bean said there have been two recent non-injury traffic accidents in the area. Limiting parking to only one side of Main between Rose and Rural Avenue might be a worthwhile restriction, Paige suggested.

Blum appears to agree, although he said he's wary of eliminating parking spaces near downtown.

"You shouldn't have to pull out halfway into the intersection to make sure it's safe to go," he said.

Lighting at some intersections also is lacking, Blum said. He plans to ask for new LED streetlights to be erected at Cypress and Jarman streets and at Main Street and Westfield Drive.

Other council members might present for discussion traffic-safety issues that affect their wards, according to Blum.

"The utmost thing I'm concerned about on this particular topic, which could be ongoing ... it's safety," he said. "It's the safety of people walking, riding their bikes and driving, and just obeying things and being respectful to our community."

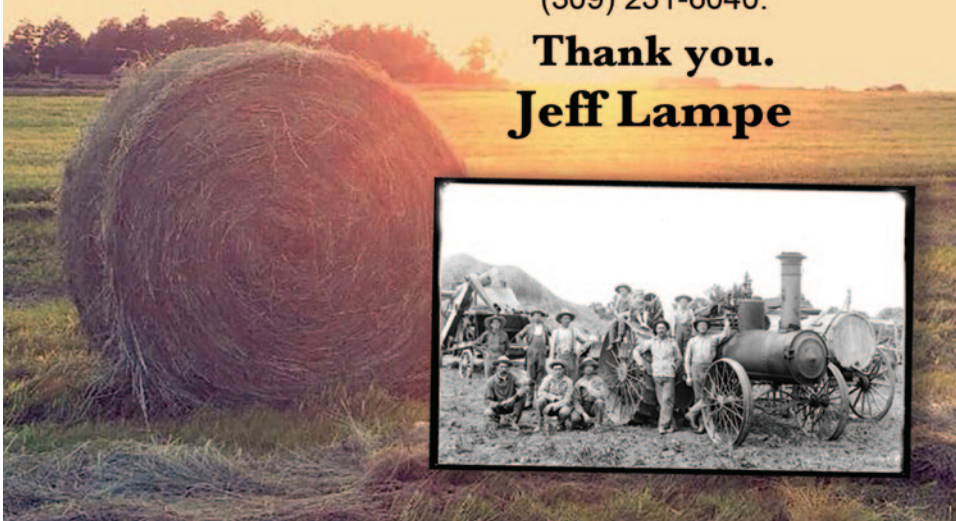

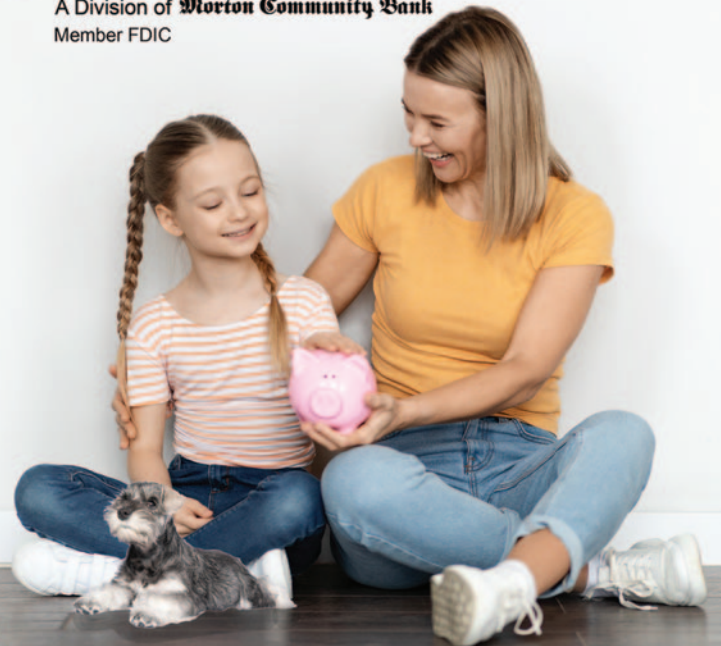
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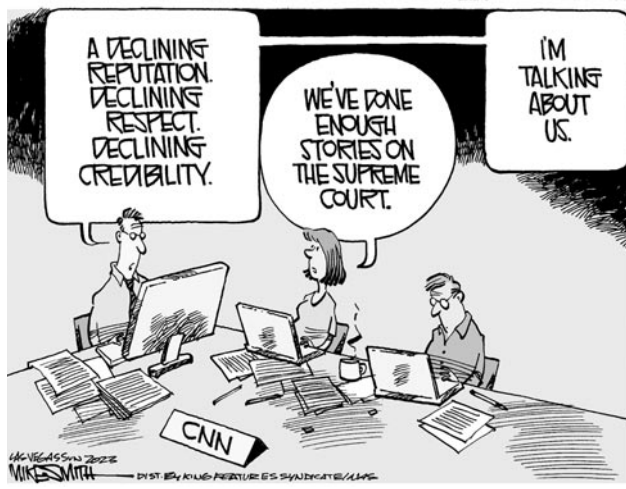

Court ruling makes Clean Water murky

In the bitterly divided, highly partisan world of Washington, D.C., few institutions are more divided and more partisan than today's Supreme Court.

The court showcased that split again this spring when it significantly narrowed the federal government's authority to protect wetlands under the 51-year-old Clean Water Act (CWA) in Sackett v. Environmental Protection Agency. The 5-4 decision was as groundbreaking as it will be water-polluting, say environmental advocates.

The facts of the case are clear: In 2007, an Idaho couple, the Sacketts, planned to build a home near a lake. As construction began, EPA ordered it halted "because their lot contain(ed) wetlands protected by the CWA, which bars the discharge of pollutants, including rocks and sand, into 'navigable waters,'" explained the independent, peer-reviewed SCOTUSblog.

The Sacketts didn't file suit over the fact that a wetland was on their property; everyone agreed that there was. Instead, the fight ensued over whether the wetland drained into a "navigable water" as defined under the Clean Water Act.

EPA ruled it did; the Sacketts disagreed, noting that the wetland first drained into an unnavigable creek before it drained into the indisputably "navigable" lake. Despite court loss after court loss, the couple pursued the case until it rose, appeal after appeal, to the high court.

The court, unsurprisingly, accepted the case because previous Supreme

Court rulings in Clean Water Act cases seemed to muddy the complicated law "as property owners and the federal government wrestled with how far to extend its protections against polluting the navigable waters of the country," Roll Call recently explained.

Farm and ranch groups joined the Sacketts in the fight. After decades of tiptoeing through legal and legislative fights over what constitutes a "navigable water," everyone – even environmental groups – wanted someone, be it Congress, the courts, or the White House, to arrive at a clear, workable clean water rule.

Previous attempts centered around WOTUS, or the broadly interpreted, EPA-empowering Waters of the United States rule.

To most farmers, WOTUS was a "I-can't-tell-you-what-it-is-until-I-see-it" EPA trap that had not kept up with agriculture's rapid industrialization under the aging Clean Water Act. The courts agreed and, as such, WOTUS went through several updates and revisions under succeeding administrations.

The May 25 Sackett decision, however, ended that bitter, decades-long fight by starting another bitter, probably decades-long fight.

Justice Samuel Alito (he of recent Alaskan water fame) wrote that the Sacketts had been right from the get-go: "In sum, we hold that the CWA extends to only those 'wetlands with a continuous surface connection to bodies that are 'waters of the United States' in their own right'..."

In fact, Alito added, "...they are 'indistinguishable' from those waters."

The decision, joined by Chief Justice John Roberts, Justice Clarence Thomas, Justice Amy Coney Barrett, and Justice Neil Gorsuch, "significantly shrank the reach of the federal

clean water protections, dealing a major blow to President Joe Biden's efforts to restore protections to millions of acres of wetlands and delivering a victory to multiple powerful industries," reported Politico.

That's an understatement; most land developers, farmers, and ranchers were elated after the razor-thin decision was handed down.

Also understated are the ruling's long-term consequences, notes DemocracyNow, a left-leaning news organization. The court's action "ends protections for about half of all wetlands in the contiguous United States, jeopardizing access to safe drinking water for millions."

In a curious twist, the court's other four justices agreed that the Sacketts had been right from the start but strongly disagreed with their colleagues' solution: knee-capping the Clean Water Act by appointing themselves "as the national decision-maker on environmental policy." That was Congress's job and, in fact, it had done that job when it "drafted the CWA."

Justice Brett Kavanaugh went further in his dissent. Writing for his three colleagues, Kavanaugh, a Trump appointee, noted that the "court's new [WOTUS] test is 'sufficiently novel and vague' and that it will create precisely the kind of regulatory uncertainty that the majority criticized."

In short, the split decision only further muddies the law and rural America's increasingly dirty waters – navigable or unnavigable.

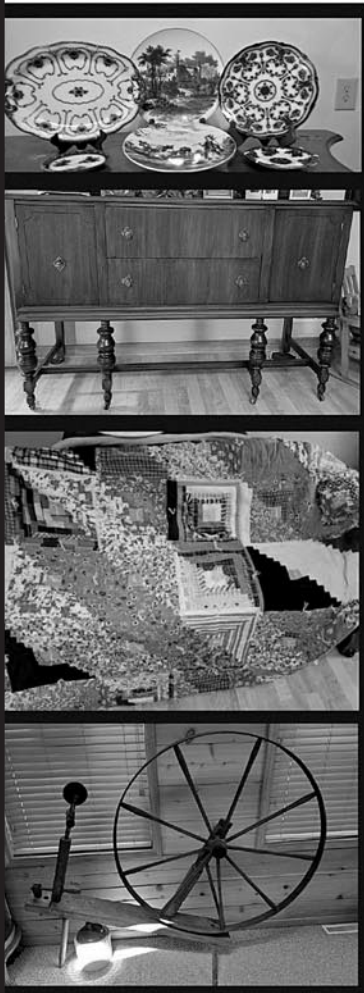

High school sports participation increasing

INDIANAPOLIS – Participation in high school sports eclipsed 7.8 million in the 2022-23 school year, reflecting a sharp increase from the previous year, according to the National Federation of State High School Associations.

A total of 7,857,969 participants competed in high school sports in 2022-23, an increase of nearly 240,000 and up more than 3 percent from 2021-22. That includes 4,529,789 boys and 3,328,180 girls, according to figures obtained from 51 NFHS member state associations, including the District of Columbia.

This year's total marks

the first upward movement in participation since the record of 7,980,886 in 2017-18, which was followed by the first decline in 30 years in 2018-19 and a two-year halt in data collection due to the pandemic.

"Perhaps the most encouraging news with this year's survey is that most every sport for boys and girls registered an increase from the previous year. Certainly, that is the goal of these programs – to meet the needs of as many students as possible. We salute coaches, administrators and everyone involved in school-based sports the past few years

for their efforts in keeping these programs alive," said Dr. Karissa Niehoff, NFHS chief executive officer.

The top 10 sports remained the same for both boys and girls. For boys, basketball is first in number of programs while

football is tops in number of participants. Outdoor track and field is second in both categories.

For girls, basketball is tops in number of programs at schools and outdoor track leads in number of participants.

Landscape, garden day at ICC this weekend

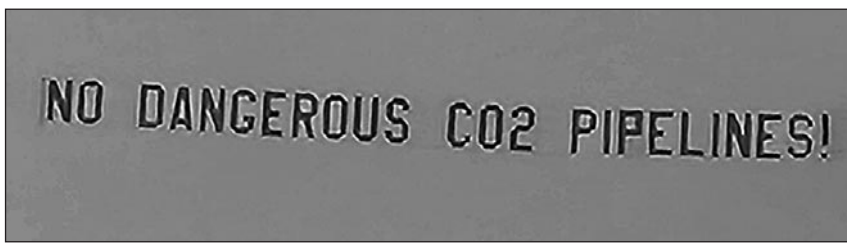



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FARRIER: Horseshoes changed every 4-6 weeks

 took over and he eventually enrolled for three months of training at Midwest Horseshoeing School in Macomb. While such schooling is not required, Jones said most horseshoers have at least worked as an apprentice.
 “If nothing else, I figured I could shoe my own horses,” said Jones, who worked part time as a farrier for two years. “It got to

where I was working every night and every weekend and it was either quit taking shoeing work and keep framing, or quit framing and go to work for myself.”

Jones chose the latter because he enjoys working with horses and with metal. At first, he would travel all over Illinois to visit stables. Now he limits his range to about a 40-mile radius of his house south of Farmington, where he lives with wife Kayla, two children and five horses.

“There’s not a shortage of horses, there’s a shortage of horseshoers,” he said.

Why?
 “For one thing, physically it’s pretty taxing,” Jones said. “It’s hot in the summer and cold in the winter and you are bent over the whole time. You are trying to work with a

foot between your legs – it’s not the easiest thing to do.”

That’s also why shoeing is not a career one typically works at until retirement age. With that future in mind, Jones also runs a snowplow business, owns rental houses and is considering taking his mobile coffee shop off the road in Bartonville and into a building somewhere.

But for now, he’s content to keep trimming and shoeing. Trimming is the first step in hoof care and involves using various knives, nippers and rasps to get a hoof into proper form.

“We’re looking at the balance of the foot, the angle of the foot and toe lengths,” Jones said. “The difference between a farrier and a horseshoer is that a farrier has a bit more vet-type experience.”

Some equine clients re-

quire only a trim. Others also need new shoes.

“If you are riding on rocks or up and down a road, (horseshoes) are a protection thing,” Jones said. “For barrel racing and roping, the shoes give them traction.”

Jones charges \$40 for a trim and \$130 for four shoes. Shoeing is done every four to six weeks and trimming can be pushed to eight weeks if the horse has not been shod.

Jones previously made his own shoes but found it was not cost-effective. Now he buys steel or aluminum shoes from Anvil Brand, a nationally known hoofcare store located in Lexington.

Jones said it takes about an hour and a half to shoe most horses. A full day of work, he said, entails shoeing four horses or trimming 10-12.

“It doesn’t matter to me if it’s a \$50 horse or a \$50,000 horse,” Jones said. “The job I do is the same for all of them. These horses have to be on their feet when you are done with them and I just feel like taking a little extra time is the right way to do it.”

Jones has been around horses all his life and said he is very comfortable with them. Even so, he is often asked if horses kick while being shod.

“That’s what everybody thinks, but that’s the last thing on a (horse’s) mind,” he said. “The first thing on their mind is just to get away if they are afraid.”

The key, he says, is to keep horses calm.

“Horses can read your body language. If you’re rushing around they get kind of nervous,” he said. “If they start getting nervous, just rub them and talk to them. A lot of times if you just talk to them you can calm them down.”

Besides, who doesn’t like getting a new pair of

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Organizing surge has labor leaders hopeful

SPRINGFIELD – As workers in Illinois prepare to celebrate Labor Day this weekend, a new report shows there has been a surge in efforts to organize labor unions in workplaces throughout the state, while overall public approval of labor unions nationally is the highest in nearly six decades.

In 2022, there were 72 successful petitions to organize labor unions in Illinois, which represent 9,600 new unionized workers, the highest single-year numbers at any point in the last decade.

That's according to The State of the Unions 2023, an annual report by the Illinois Economic Policy Institute, a think tank with strong ties to organized labor, and the Center for Middle Class Revival at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign.

After decades of declining union membership and declining unionization rates, U of I's Robert Bruno, a coauthor of the report, said those numbers may signal a resurgence in the labor movement.

"That's kind of a leading indicator of an upsurge, of growth in the movement," Bruno said. "And if you

look at where you're seeing organizing happening – in a lot of growth sectors with larger numbers of employees – then you see the kinds of conditions for increasing the actual density of the labor movement."

While the rate of unionized workers in Illinois had increased in 2020 – followed by a boost of nearly 16,000 new unionized workers the following year – the state saw declines in both metrics in the past year, according to the report. That continued a downward trend in unionization in the last decade.

In 2022, there were 734,430 unionized workers in Illinois, which represented 13.1 percent of the state's total workforce. The report attributes that to a shift in the state's economy away from manufacturing and other unionized sectors toward more service- and knowledge-based industries with low unionization

rates. It also cites a large number of vacancies in federal, state and local government positions, which make up the bulk of union membership.

The authors attribute some of that to the 2018 U.S. Supreme Court case, Janus v. the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, which struck down an Illinois law that required public employees who chose not to join a union to nevertheless pay a portion of their union dues.

Statewide, public sector union membership has fallen by about 3.3 percent since the Janus decision.

Still, the report notes, Illinois' unionization rate of 13.1 percent of its workforce is significantly higher than the national average of 10.1 percent.

The report cites an August 2022 Gallup poll that found 71 percent of Americans say they approve of

labor unions, up from 68 percent the year before and the highest rating Gallup had recorded since 1965.

Demographics of union membership have also been changing, with younger workers aged 25-34 making up a larger share of the total.

The top four industries by unionization rates were public administration, construction, transportation and utilities and the combined educational and health-services industry.

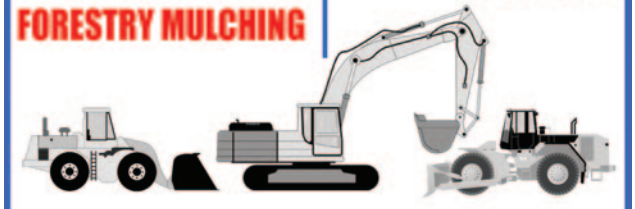
The manufacturing workforce is now only 8.8 percent organized in Illinois.

Extension responding to survey

URBANA – Using feedback received from farmers and other agricultural stakeholders through a 2022 survey, the University of Illinois Extension is currently implementing changes and staffing additions.

Throughout 2022, Extension's Assistant Dean and Agriculture and Agribusiness Program Leader Travis Burke and a team of Extension educators initiated a statewide survey on agricultural needs to gain insights on the current and expected programming,

educational and training needs across agricultural topics. More than 300 survey respondents shared priorities for research and education along with their preferences for programming format, timing and content.

Extension educators are now developing programs based on the responses, particularly with respect to row crops, specialty crops and livestock management.

“Soil health and quality emerged as a top outreach priority for both row crop and specialty crop pro-

ducers,” said Talon Becker, commercial agriculture educator.

A field day is planned for this fall and work is being done to provide an update on research being done at the U of I on estimating and measuring carbon sequestration.

Local Foods Educator Bronwyn Aly has incorporated specialty crop producer needs into upcoming education and research as well.

More broadly, survey results will be used to shape statewide hiring in the future.

“We heard loud and clear that agricultural stakeholders throughout Illinois would like a greater presence from Illinois Extension, and so we have hired seven new commercial agriculture and local foods educators, with plans to fill at least 10 positions by the end of the 2023-24 fiscal year,” Burke said.

Seven new staff members have been hired, including Kevin Brooks (Fulton, Mason, Peoria and Tazewell counties, farm business management) and Rachel Curry (Henry, Mercer, Rock Island and Stark counties, commercial agriculture).

Access to maternal care worsens in rural areas

In rural areas across Illinois, 35.5% of women live more than 30 minutes from a birthing hospital compared to 3.5% of women living in urban areas.

And in 21 counties, pregnant women must travel 28.4 miles or more to the closest birthing hospital.

The data comes from a new March of Dimes report that takes a deep dive into maternal care with a state-by-state analysis.

The Aug. 1 report, "Where You Live Matters: Maternity Care Deserts and the Crisis of Access and Equity," shows more than 5.6 million women live in counties with no or limited access to maternity-care services. The research shows that for millions of women in the U.S., it's more difficult to access maternity care. One of the largest analyses on maternity-care access, the report offers insight into the factors that impact pregnancies in all 50 states, Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico.

"A person's ability to have a healthy pregnancy and healthy birth should not be dictated by where they live and their ability to access consistent, quality care but these reports show that, today, these factors make it dangerous to be pregnant and give birth for millions of women in the United States," said Dr. Elizabeth Cherot, March of Dimes president and chief executive officer.

"Our research shows maternity care is simply not a priority in our health-care system and steps must be taken to ensure all moms receive the care they need and deserve to have healthy pregnancies and strong babies."

Hospital closures and a shortage of providers are driving changes in maternity-care access, especially within rural areas. Data shows that in Illinois, 34.3% of counties are defined as maternity-care deserts.

Care deserts are defined as counties without obstet-

ric providers or a hospital or birth center that offers obstetric care. Across the country, 6% of counties have less access to maternity care than they had in 2018, the first year March of Dimes issued a report on maternity care.

Overall in the U.S., women travel 9.7 miles to their nearest birthing hospital, with Illinois women traveling an average of 6.8 miles. And 4.6% of women in Illinois had no birthing hospital within 30 minutes. Of the 21 counties where

women must travel 28.4 miles or more to the closest birthing hospital, Hardin County in southeast Illinois (the least populous county in the state) had the highest mileage reported, at 47.8 miles.

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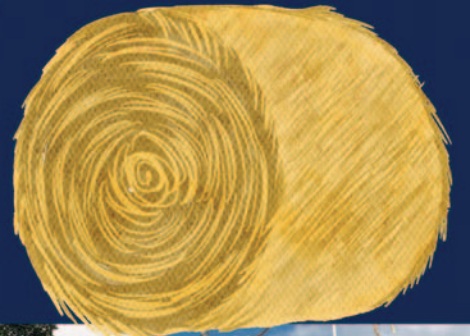

All property in Peoria County, other than farmland and coal, is assessed at 33.33% of fair market value. For tax year 2023 (payable in 2024) all farmland soil types in the PI scale from 82 to 130 will receive the same dollar-per-acre increase of \$42.61 per acre for cropped soil. This is a result of Public Act 98-0109 amending the Property Tax Code.

Your property is to be assessed at the above listed median level of assessment for the assessment district. You may check the accuracy of your assessment by dividing your assessment by the median level of assessment. (33.33%) The resulting value should equal the estimated fair cash value of your property. If the resulting value is greater than the estimated fair cash value of your property, you may be over-assessed. If the resulting value is less than the estimated fair cash value of your property, you may be under-assessed. Your assessment, less exemptions will be used to determine your 2023 payable 2024 property tax bill. If you are not satisfied with the results, you may file an assessment complaint with the Peoria County Board of Review from June 1, 2023, thru **October 13, 2023**. YOU MUST FILE AN ASSESSMENT COMPLAINT WITH THE BOARD OF REVIEW TO PRESERVE YOUR RIGHT TO AN APPEAL.

All assessment complaints filed with the Board of Review must be in writing using the forms provided by the Board. Assessment complaint forms and instructions can be acquired from the Peoria County Board of Review, Room 301, Peoria County Courthouse, or downloaded and printed on-line from the link at the bottom of the [propertytax.peoriacounty.gov](https://www.peoriacounty.gov/propertytax.peoriacounty.gov) website. Once on that site you can go to GIS/Property Characteristics to view the residential property characteristics and any sales information. If you have questions about filing a complaint you may contact the Board of Review at (309) 672-6022.

You may be eligible for one or more of the following homestead exemptions if the property is your primary residence, you are liable for paying the property taxes, and in some instances, meet additional qualifications. <https://www.peoriacounty.gov/504/Forms-Documents>

Owner Occupied Exemption - \$6,000 reduction in EAV
Homestead Improvement Exemption - an additional amount, up to \$25,000 reduction in assessed value for four years, if assessment increases due to a new improvement of an existing structure on homestead property or the rebuilding of residential structures following a catastrophic event.

Senior Citizen's Homestead Exemption - \$5,000 reduction in EAV if you are 65 years or older during the tax year.

Senior Citizen's Assessment Freeze Homestead Exemption - an additional amount that freezes your property's EAV if you are 65 years or older and meet household income requirements.

Returning Veterans Homestead Exemption - \$5,000 reduction in EAV the year that you return from an armed conflict and the following year.

Disabled Persons' Homestead Exemption - \$2,000 re-

duction in EAV if you meet disability requirements.

Disabled Veterans' Homestead Exemption (specially adapted housing) - up to \$100,000 reduction in EAV if the federal government has approved payment to construct or modify your home if you are a 100% disabled veteran with a service-connected disability.

Disabled Veterans' Standard Homestead Exemption - If the veteran has a service-connected disability of 30% or more but less than 50%, then the annual exemption is \$2,500; if the veteran has a service-connected disability of 50% or more but less than 70%, then the annual exemption is \$5,000; and if the veteran has a service-connected disability of 70% or more, then the residential property is exempt from taxation under this Code.

Sweet Princes win soured by QB injury

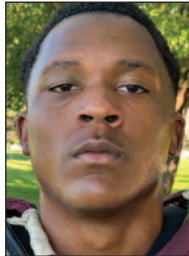
PRINCEVILLE – What should have been a sweet victory for Princeville last Friday developed a sour taste partway through the second quarter.

Ahead by 24 points against Havana and playing some of its best football in years, Princeville lost starting quarterback and defensive back Logan Carruthers to a dislocated shoulder in his throwing arm.

While the Princes went on to win 36-14 to improve to 2-0 overall and 2-0 in the LincolnLand Conference

small-division, Carruthers is out for at least a few weeks according to his father, Coach Jon Carruthers, who said he was sick over the injury.

"We were just clicking on all cylinders. We played about the best a Princeville team has played since the COVID season," Coach Carruthers said. "And I had multiple people say they hadn't seen Princeville hit like that for

years."

Logan Carruthers was injured while making a tackle and has been checked out by orthopedic specialists who saw no bone chips in the shoulder socket. No definite timetable for his return has been set.
