# **Bradford Catholic church slated to close**



BRADFORD - As part of its Growing Disciples initiative, the Catholic Diocese of Peoria is tentatively proposing that its churches in Bradford and Williamsfield will no longer be in use.

The diocese this week released its second round of models for Growing Disciples, a plan designed to map out which churches will remain open, which will be designated as secondary sites and which will be designated for no use. Information is listed on the diocese website (growingdisciplescdop.org) and is still preliminary.

As part of the latest proposal, Bradford's St. John the Baptist and



Bradford's St. John the Baptist Catholic church was established in 1875, but the cornerstone of this building was laid in 1906.

Williamsfield's St. James are both listed as "not in use" parishes.

The diocese lists sacramental, financial and demographic data for each parish as a consideration for

making decisions. Other considerations include evangelization potential, geography, demographics, natural affinity between parishes, long-term sustainability and feedback from priests and parishioners.

Bradford's average mass attendance in 2022 was 32 people, which is down 63% since 2015. Attendance in Williamsfield was 40 per mass in 2022, down 40% since 2015.

Currenty slated to be secondary sites are St. Dominic in Wyoming and St. John the Evangelist in Galva. The primary site for those parishes will be St. John Paul II in Kewanee, where two priests are scheduled to be assigned. The diocese website says a mass schedule

# Harvest heats up

23% of corn in bins as of Oct. 1

Dry, breezy conditions have worked wonders bringing down the moisture content in corn and drying soybeans in fields all across Illinois.

Not surprisingly, combines have been roaring all over the state in the past few days. Through Oct. 1, the USDA reports that 23% of the corn crop has been harvested. While that's up 13% from the Sept. 24 report, it's also slightly behind the fiveyear average of 25%. Given recent dry weather and the current pace of

harvest, that should change by the next report on Oct. 8.

Corn is 92% mature, which is above average.

Soybean harvest was at 19% – up 13 percent from last week and right on the five-year average. A total of 94% of soybeans are listed as dropping leaves, which is 21% above aver-

The Aug. 1 federal estimate pegged the Illinois corn yield to average 201 bushels per acre, down from 214 last year.

Corn for December delivery was trading at \$4.84 on Wednesday.



Warm, dry and breezy conditions have allowed farmers to pick up the pace of harvest lately. According to the USDA, 23% of the state's corn and 19% of soybeans were harvested as of Oct. 1.

#### Director to resign after scathing audit

Children and Family Services Director Marc Smith will resign effective Dec. 31, he told colleagues in an all-staff town hall meeting Wednesday morning.


For years, critics had called on Smith to resign or be fired, amid legislative hearings, contempt citations, a murdered child protection investigator and the highest number of children who died after contact with the agency in 20

Smith announced his voluntary resignation Wednesday via a livestreamed video to agency staff, noting that his decision came after discussions with family and colleagues.

"Sometimes the media sometimes politicians, sometimes critics take an opportunity of tragedy to move an agenda," Smith said during the call.

The resignation came after another scathing audit of the agency was published last week, finding that in recent decades, DCFS repeatedly violated state laws meant to protect children from abuse and neglect.

Smith's announcement was one of three agency head departures made public by Gov. JB Pritzker's office Wednesday. Theresa Continued on Page 2

# DCFS: Agency violated numerous state laws

Eagleson, who has led the state's Department of Healthcare and Family Services since January 2019, will leave her post at the end of the year, according to a news release from the governor's office. Illinois Department on Aging Director Paula Basta will also retire in December.

The personnel announcements come less than a month after Pritzker's office announced Deputy Gov. Sol Flores, who oversees Illinois' health and human service agencies – including DCFS, DHFS and the Department on Aging – will be leaving in mid-October. Grace Hou, the current director of the De-

partment of Human Services, will be promoted to that role.

The DCFS audit released last week found DCFS violated state law by:

- Failing to notify law enforcement within 24 hours of the death, serious injury or sexual abuse of a child. Audits have included similar findings seven times in the past decade.
- Failing to complete investigations of abuse and neglect within statutory timelines. Audits have included similar findings 17 times since 1998.
- Failing to respond to a report of abuse or neglect within 24 hours, putting the child in further jeopardy. Previous audits have included similar findings 17 times since 1998.

- Failing to notify schools of credible sexual and physical abuse.
- Failing to timely notify prosecutors of test results for children born having been exposed to controlled substances.
- Failing to alert the Illinois Department of Public Health and the Illinois Department of Human Services when there were allegations of abuse or neglect of a hospitalized child.

House Republicans renewed what have been repeated calls for Smith's removal after the audit's release. In January 2022, Republicans called for hearings after Smith was found in contempt of court 12 times by a Cook County judge.

Continued from Page 1 is still to be determined.

Bradford parishioners would theoretically be encouraged to attend mass at Wyoming or Kewanee.

As part of the downsizing, bookeeping will be centralized at the primary site.

Williamsfield parishioners would be grouped with St. Mary of the Woods in Princeville, the primary site, or St. Joseph in Brimfield, a secondary site.

Next steps are parish meetings Oct. 1-31, online feedback starting Nov. 22, an announcement of the final plan on May 19, 2024, by Bishop Lou Tylka to be followed by implementation over two years.

Other churches being designated as not in use include Sacred Heart in Annawan, St. Patrick in Sheffield and St. Mary of the Fields Shrine in Hooppole. St. Anthony in Atkinson will be the primary site for those churches.

Cambridge would also see St. John Vianney closed, with St. John the Apostle in Woodhull listed as primary site and St. Mary Our Lady of Peace in Orion a secondary site.

Elsewhere, the second round of Growing Disciples models also calls for designating Elmwood's St. Patrick as a secondary site in a merger with St. Mary of Kickapoo and Brimfield as a secondary site to be affiliated with St. Mary of the Woods in Princeville.

# Angst about CO2 pipelines keeps bubbling up

Pipeline awareness and angst is heating up in our area. A process that has dragged on fairly quietly for nearly two years is increasingly reaching the forefront with the emergence of a second proposed line that would pass through Peoria County.

Now that it's no longer merely af-

fecting us "rural" folks to the west, CO2 sequestration has earned more headlines and plenty of roadside signs.

Last week, Peoria County filed a petition to intervene with the Illinois Commerce

Commission in regards to the Wolf Carbon Solutions pipeline. That will allow the county input in a decision on the pipeline, which is expected in the next year.

"The proposed pipeline impacts all parts of Peoria County – our citizens, our infrastructure and our public safety," said Jodi Hoos, Peoria County State's Attorney. "I filed to make certain we have a choice on what the impact will be."

That's a smart move on several fronts, since filing also makes it more likely Peoria County will get paid by the pipeline company if

plans move forward, as has happened elsewhere with the Navigator CO2 Ventures pipeline.

Since that first proposal, I've thought often about what makes this pipeline different than others that already snake their way underneath our roads, yards and farms.

Consider that we tolerate naturalgas pipelines without much griping. And in Fulton County, there are even pipelines that transported Chicago's sludge from the Illinois River to land owned by the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District.

Why have these pipelines been tolerated? At some point, whether in court of law or court of public opinion, we deemed these as necessary.

We want natural gas for heat, warm water and cooking, so we need pipelines to move it safely into our homes, schools and businesses.

In the case of these latest pipelines, I've not yet heard a compelling reason for pumping CO2 deep underground into a rock formation that is supposedly safe. Some say by capturing CO2 and burying it we are protecting the climate, the planet and future generations.

But there is lots of scientific skepticism on this point. Isn't it possible that burying CO2 might actually be passing on a problem to future generations who live near the sequestration sites – both of which are located in Illinois.

The real issue here, as usual, is making money, with much of the cash being put up by taxpayers in the form of tax credits for big businesses. In essence, we are paying for something that might or might not work and that will cause problems for landowners in the path of the pipeline – all for dubious reasons.

Not very compelling.

Much is also made of the potential danger of a CO2 pipeline, with many pointing to a 2020 rupture in Mississippi that led to an evacuation and put people in the hospital.

That was bad. But something arguably as bad or worse happened last week in south-central Illinois, where a truck hauling anhydrous ammonia crashed, killed five and forced hundreds to evacuate the town of Teutopolis. We tolerate anhydrous being hauled around because we have deemed it necessary for fertilizing


Until somebody can show CO2 sequestration serves a similar need, look for angst to keep bubbling to the

# Autumn brings its own chores to the garden

Here is just a friendly reminder to water those newly planted trees and shrubs weekly until late fall, the first couple years especially. It takes a while for woody shrubs and trees to "take purchase," as they say.

New plants need time for their roots to reach out and grab hold of the surrounding soil. Until purchase is taken, the plant's only source of moisture is the rootball it came home with.

By the way, right now is an excellent time to plant new shrubs and trees. Experts say fall is the best time of year for such chores. The soil is still warm enough for root growth. The sun is lower in the sky and the air is cool so the plants aren't stressed.

Elsewhere in the garden, your containers and hanging baskets should be looking pretty darn good if you've been diligent in their care. But Jack Frost is bound to arrive sooner or later and turn those beautiful planters to mush

That's the one thing I hate about this time of year. When the weatherman predicts a frosty night, do I haul all these planters into the garage until the angel of death has passed by and then haul 'em all back out? How often am I willing to do that?

Or do I just let them set there, helpless victims of impending doom? If I leave them out to become casualties of the first frost, you can be sure the next six weeks will be warm frostfree weather.

Hauling them in and out is no easy task. There are more than 20 large pots and planters around our place. Many of them have tender plants from which we take cuttings for next season. Such a dilemma.

Anyway, on to more productive projects.

Now is the time to plant the bulbs you ordered a while back. It's also time to plant the bulbs you should have ordered a while back when the catalog first arrived. Instead you set it aside to order from later. Well, now it's later and you have no bulbs.

Fortunately, most garden centers, big-box stores, drug stores and grocery stores all have bulb displays now. Size matters when you're selecting bulbs from the display. Choose the biggest bulbs in the box. Choose bulbs that are plump and firm, not soft, mushy or moldy.

Tree leaves are green right now but soon will be turning yellow, red and gold, then brown. They'll fall to the ground, smothering your lawn. If the leaf litter is light, you can just mow over them, turning them into valuable organic fertilizer for your lawn.

But if the leaf layer is heavy and unmowable, you've no choice but to rake them up. At our place I run them through a shredder and spread them over the perennial gardens as mulch.

In the vegetable garden, remove all plant debris to prevent insects and fungi from wintering over and attacking next year's crop. If you had problems with fungal diseases, especially on tomatoes and cucumbers, don't put that debris on your compost pile. Send it for a ride on the garbage truck instead.

If you need to do any corrective pruning on shrubs and trees, it's best to wait until the leaves have fallen. You don't want to stimulate new growth this late in the season. To avoid oak wilt infection don't prune oak trees until late November through February.

Be careful pruning hydrangeas. When to prune them depends on the variety. Hydrangeas that bloom on old wood, such as the oakleaf hydrangea, should not be pruned now. Prune them next year immediately after flowering.

Panicle hydrangeas, such as Limelight, Quickfire, and PeeGee, bloom on new wood. They can be pruned after frost if you don't want the dried flowers on the shrubs through the winter.

Some folks hate the looks of the flowers in wintertime while others love the sight. It's up to you.






# **Energy costs will create challenges for farms**

Farmers looking to trim historically high production costs could face more challenges again next season.

The price of oil and natural gas, both instrumental components of farm inputs, is expected to rise into next year compared to current levels.

The Energy Information Administration's (EIA) short-term energy outlook predicts prices could average \$86.48 per barrel for Brent crude oil and \$3.22 per million BTU for natural gas in 2024. That's up nearly \$4 per barrel for oil and 64 cents for natural gas compared to the average estimates for 2023.

"Crude oil prices have increased since June, primarily due to extended

voluntary cuts to Saudi Arabia's crude oil production and increasing global demand," EIA noted in its latest report

EIA projects the U.S. will boost crude oil production from an average of 12.76 million barrels per day this year to 13.09 barrels daily in 2024.

But the planned uptick in production may only help to moderate price increases.

Farmers should also consider hedging some of their fertilizer needs for the coming season. Anhydrous ammonia prices declined to a range of \$560 to \$760 per ton across the state as of Sept. 7, according to the Illinois Production Cost Report. That's down significantly from historic highs last year.

However, the statewide average price of \$636 per ton for anhydrous on Sept. 7 represented an increase of \$47.78 from the previous two weeks.

Overall, Basse looks for inflation to remain a major issue in the U.S. for some time to come, which could trigger the Federal Reserve to continue increasing interest rates down the road.

Inflation slowed to 3.3% in July. But Basse questions whether the Fed can get inflation back to its target of 2%

The situation could cause the dollar index to weaken over time. If that happens, the commodity markets could find some strength amid new sales opportunities in the world market, Basse added.







# Still unbeaten

#### Rebels all alone in first after win

ONEIDA – Nolan
Orwig's feet helped the
Stark County football team
remain undefeated. So did
Adrian Manzano-Garcia's
right foot.

Orwig ran for 253 yards and two touchdowns, and Manzano-Garcia kicked a tiebreaking field goal in the fourth quarter of a 24-14 victory Sept. 29 over ROWVA-Williamsfield.

Victory in the Lincoln-Land Conference small-division showdown at Bill Adams Field made Stark County 6-0 overall, 5-0 in the league. It also assured the Rebels a second consecutive state-playoffs berth and boosted the team to 8th in the Class 1A state rankings. Host R-W fell to 5-1, 4-1.

"I've been ready for this game, and it finally came at the biggest moment," Orwig, a junior, said about his 27-carry effort. "The whole time the ball was in my hands, I was like,

'How many more yards to the end zone?' That was the only thing I had in my mind."

Manzano-Garcia's 29yard kick with 8:49 remaining in the game atoned for an earlier miss and gave Stark County a 17-14 lead. On the ensuing R-W drive, Braden Lindley intercepted a pass by R-W quarterback Riley Danner. Following seven rushing plays, Luke Rewerts ran in from 1 yard at 1:44 to seal the victory.

R-W defeated Stark County twice last season, including in the first round of the Class 1A playoffs. An inability to rush consistently was damaging in those games, according to Rebels Coach Jade Noard. That wasn't a problem this time.

"I thought that was the big difference – we could run it on them," Noard said. "We didn't have to throw. We could throw when we wanted to."
Rewerts did throw a little

last week against R-W -- 5for-13, for 60 yards. But Stark County amassed 338 yards on the ground, including the breakout performance from Orwig.

"He's had another game over 100 (yards), but tonight was special," Noard said. "He was determined, man. He was really determined running that football, and it was good for him."

Orwig credited the Stark County offensive line for the sizable running lanes. That group included Chet Gillespie, Cole Kinsella, Cole Merriman and Ben Siebenthal.
